

## 25,000 DECLASSED BEING EVICTED FROM LENINGRAD HOMES BY SOVIET ORDER

Large Percentage of Those Affected  
Are Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Leningrad, Apr. 2.—The eviction from nationalized houses of 25,000 persons classed as a non-productive element, former merchants and traders, was begun here yesterday on a wholesale scale.

It is difficult to establish definitely the number of Jewish residents involved in this mass eviction. The Jewish population in Leningrad numbers five per cent of the general population. However, the proportion of Jews in the declassified category is much larger. The evicted may secure homes in the abandoned, dilapidated houses outside of the city, provided they undertake to repair the buildings, the authorities declared.

Eviction proceedings will soon start in Moscow.

## RUSSIAN JEWS APPEAL FOR MORE MATZOTH

Berlin, Apr. 2.—An urgent appeal for an increased supply of matzoth for the forthcoming Passover was received by the Berlin committee for the supply of matzoth.

The committee, headed by Dr. Hildesheimer, announced today that as the result of the Russian appeal, its previous decision to limit its shipments will be revised. Notwithstanding the high import duty, further shipments will be made. Up to date, 27 carloads have been despatched, in addition to thousands of individual packages.

Money remittances coming from the relatives of Russian Jews in various parts of the world are an important factor in relieving the situation.

## AUSTRIA HONORS TWO DISTINGUISHED JEWS

Vienna, Apr. 2.—President Miklos of the Austrian Republic conferred a gold medal upon Max Stoessel, president of the Jewish community of Klagenfurt. The honor was given Mr. Stoessel in recognition of his thirty years of communal activities.

A street in Vienna will be named for the late Professor Samuel Oppenheim, astronomer and mathematician, according to a decision taken by the Vienna Streets Commission.

## BUCHAREST KEHILLAH GIVES FUND FOR BESSARABIA

Bucharest, Apr. 2.—The amount of 100,000 Lei was voted by the Bucharest Kehillah as an emergency relief fund to aid the starving Jews in Bessarabia.

## VATICAN TO PRESS HOLY SITES QUESTION THROUGH INTERNATIONAL CHANNELS

Differs with Britain on Method of  
Forming Holy Sites League  
Commission

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Rome, Apr. 2.—The settlement of the question of the holy places in Palestine will soon be placed in the center of international interest through action expected to be taken by the Vatican, according to a report of the Italian news agency, Corrispondenza, said to be closely informed on the policies of the Holy See.

According to this report the Vatican holds views which are directly in opposition to those entertained by the British Government with regard to the control of the Christian Holy Sites in Palestine. Under the provisions of the Palestine Mandate, the Mandatory, that is, Great Britain, undertook full responsibility for the safeguarding and safekeeping of the Holy Sites before the League of Nations.

The Commission which was provided for in the Mandate has not yet been appointed to "study, define and determine the rights and claims in connection with the Holy Places and the

## TRANSJORDANIA GETS LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL; FIRST SESSION OPENED

Emir Abdullah Urges Legislature to  
Ratify Agreement with England

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 2.—Transjordan, the western part of Palestine, the territory across the Jordan administered by Great Britain under the terms of the Palestine Mandate with the exception of the clause referring to the establishment of the Jewish National Home, has secured its legislative council.

The first session of the body, partly appointed and partly elected, was opened at Amman this morning with pompous ceremonies. The British Resident, Cox, was present when Emir Abdullah opened the session.

The Prime Minister read the throne address of the Emir who emphasized the advantages which will accrue to Transjordan from the ratification of the legislative council of the agreement with Great Britain which was opposed by the Transjordanian nationalists. The Emir promised to take steps for improving all public utilities in the territory and to place Transjordan on an equal rank with other countries.

The British representative departed following the covering in of the deputies and the reading of greetings from Sir John Chancellor, Palestine High Commissioner. The council thereupon devoted itself to a discussion of the questions on the agenda.

## WORSHIPPERS RESIST CONFISCATION OF THE MINSK SYNAGOGUES

Action Postponed Following Conflict  
Between Worshippers and Workers

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 2.—Members of two religious congregations in Minsk, White Russia, have offered resistance to the order of the Communist authorities to confiscate their synagogues, according to a report from Minsk circulated by the Polish news agency, Wip.

The synagogues were confiscated for the benefit of the unions of iron-mongers and of leather workers, to be converted into clubs.

When the carrying out of the order led to street fights between the workers and the Jewish worshippers, the Minsk Soviet decided to temporarily seal the synagogues without converting them immediately into clubs. The congregation members have not given up their endeavors to regain the synagogues, while the Comsomol, Communist youth organization, expressed its dissatisfaction with the action of the authorities and demanded immediate conversion of the synagogues into labor clubs.

## 5 JEWS AMONG FASCIST PARTY FOUNDERS

Milan, Apr. 2.—There were five Jews among the 105 founders of the Fascist party in 1919, according to statements in the Italian press, reviewing the history of the party on the occasion of the tenth anniversary celebrations in Italy.

The Jewish leaders in the formation of the country's ruling party were Commander Caesar Goldman, C. Mogniano, Salvatore Atal, Professor Piero Jacchia, and E. Deangels.

## ITALIAN JEWISH CONSISTORY WANTS PLACE IN AGENCY

Rome, Apr. 2.—A decision to proceed with negotiations for participation in the extended Jewish Agency was taken by the Italian Jewish consistory. Negotiations are to be taken with the Italian Zionist Federation with a view to the representation of the communities represented in the consistory on the Jewish Agency.

## DR. COHL, ROUMANIAN JEWISH LEADER, DIES

Bucharest, Apr. 2.—Dr. Max Cohl, for many years president of the Jewish community at Braila, died yesterday.

Dr. Cohl was a well-known physician. He was decorated several times by the Roumanian government for distinguished services. He was also known for his philanthropic activities.

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**PALESTINE AND TRANSJORDANIA NOT AFFECTED BY NEAR EAST SMALL POX**

**Announcement of Palestine Health Department Offers Reassurance**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 2—There are no cases of the plague (Levant fever) or small pox in Palestine and Transjordan, declared the Palestine Health Department in a statement given the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. These countries are unaffected by the epidemic which is said to be spreading in the Middle East. The Health Department's statement was in the form of a denial that the epidemic had reached Palestine and Transjordan.

Various points in the Middle East have been affected, the Health Department declared. In Beirut there are 5 cases of smallpox. No deaths have been reported there. Thirty-seven cases were reported in the Hedjaz with 12 deaths; in Iraq 12 cases with 3 deaths; in the Sudan 22 cases and 2 deaths. In Egypt 1 death resulted from the plague and in Iraq 2 deaths.

**ABEL DAVIS NAMED TO INVESTIGATING COMMISSION**

Chicago, Apr. 2—Brigadier General Abel Davis is one of the three officers of the same rank of the Illinois National Guard who have been named as a board to hear charges of alleged irregularities in the handling of government property by men under him against Col. Otis B. Duncan, colored commander of the 8th Infantry of the National Guard. Taking of testimony will begin Monday. Other members of the board are Brigadier Generals John J. Garrity and Frank R. Schwengel.

**SAYS MANIU GOVERNMENT IS SLOW IN PREVENTING ANTI-SEMITIC ATTACKS**

**Newspaper Cites Recent Incidents; Sounds Warning**

Bucharest, Apr. 2—The Maniu government of Roumania, whose accession to power was hailed by the Jewish population as an earnest of better times, is described as slow in taking measures to prevent anti-Jewish attacks, in an article published in the "Lupta," oppositional paper.

The "Lupta" asserts that the government has been ignoring a number of anti-Semitic attacks which have occurred recently in various parts of the country. It cites incidents at the Technical Institute in Temesvar, where anti-Semitic students compelled the last Jewish student of the institute to leave. Another incident occurred at Clausenburg, where anti-Semitic hooligans attacked Jewish passersby, inflicting serious injuries upon three Jewish citizens. Although the authorities know the names of the culprits, those guilty have remained unpunished, the newspaper asserts, declaring that even the previous reactionary governments finally recognized that the toleration of anti-Semitic excesses leads to anarchy at home and to discredit of Roumania's name abroad. Much more is to be expected of the democratic Maniu government, which has publicly assumed the obligation to take speedy measures for the maintenance of peace and order, the paper points out.

**HONOR CLEVELAND B'NAI BRITH LEADERS**

Cleveland, Apr. 2—Two members of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith were honored here for their long years of activity and leadership in the communal, religious and civic life of Cleveland. Max E. Meisel and Alfred A. Benesh were tendered a banquet at the Hotel Cleveland by the Cleveland Lodge of the B'nai B'rith. Three hundred guests attended.

The work of the two leaders during the past two decades was reviewed by Isidore Feibelman, president of the Cleveland lodge. Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner addressed the gathering.

**WANT RAILWAY BETWEEN COLONIES AND TEL AVIV**

Jaffa, Mar. 11—A request that the colonies should be connected by railway with Tel Aviv was presented to Sir John Chancellor, Palestine High Commissioner, by the secretary of the Colonists' Association.

The High Commissioner replied that he was in sympathy with the plan but that there were no government funds available to carry it out at present.

**CONTINUE CAMPAIGN AGAINST SCHECHITA IN AUSTRIAN REPUBLIC**

**Not Biblical Commandment, Anti-Semitic Daily Argues**

Vienna, Apr. 2—The campaigns against the schechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering animals for food, is being continued by the "Wiener Tageszeitung," anti-Semitic daily.

In an article devoted to the question the newspaper asserts that the Jewish people are misleading the world by claiming that their schechita is a religious duty imposed by the Old Testament. Under this claim they hide "a practice which is cruel and sadistic." The "Tageszeitung" quotes the opinion which it claims to have obtained from a Rabbi L. Stein of Frankfurt, that the schechita is not a biblical command but rests merely on tradition. The Mosaic law does not indicate anywhere that incision in the throat of an animal is compulsory or that the flesh of animals otherwise killed is forbidden.

Plans for a campaign to raise funds with which to erect a new synagogue for Beth Israel Congregation, Philadelphia, Pa., were discussed at a meeting held at the Locust Club.

A contribution of \$150,000 toward the project has been made by Mrs. Hannah Morris, on the condition that a similar sum be raised by the congregation.

Organized ninety years ago, the congregation is one of the oldest in Philadelphia. According to tentative plans, the new building will be on Broad Street, though the exact site has not been decided upon, and will include the synagogue, a school and a community center. Rabbi Martin Nathan was the principal speaker at the meeting, which was attended by more than seventy-five members of the Beth Israel congregation. He urged the workers in the campaign. Emanuel Sacks, chairman of the alumni campaign committee, presided.

For the eighth consecutive time Harry Lehman was re-elected president of the Dayton Jewish Federation for Social Service. The executive board of directors who served during the last year were re-elected. These include: Samuel H. Thal, first vice-president; Charles Rosenbloom, second vice-president; Jacob Margolis, president; Harry Potasick, recording secretary. On the board of directors are: Sidney G. Kusworm, Dr. Leo Schram, A. M. Childs, Nathan Sanders, A. W. Schulman, Sam Harris, Joseph Thal, Max Israhel, Joseph G. Lehman and Rabbi Louis Witt.

The administrators of the estate of the late J. E. Bamberger, prominent Jewish industrialist of Salt Lake City, Utah, have added a further contribution of \$25,000 to the fund established by Mr. Bamberger not long before his death for the poor children of Utah, to be administered by the Utah State Board of Education. An institution for education and maintenance of the children with a hospital department will be constructed.

## FAMINE IN NORTHERN LITHUANIA AFFECTS JEWISH SCHOOL CHILDREN

1,470 Children in Immediate Need of Food; Oze to Establish Soup Kitchens in Schools

Kovno, Apr. 2—Conditions created by the famine in northern Lithuania have greatly affected Jewish school children, according to a bulletin issued by the Oze, Jewish health society, which is taking care of the children in 55 Jewish schools, with an enrollment of 54,000.

The teachers in these schools are now often compelled to settle disputes between pupils arising over mutual accusations of thefts of bread. Attendance at the schools rises and falls with the supply of bread. Parents of the starving children were largely engaged in trade with the farmers who are unable to make purchases this season because of the crop failure.

One thousand, four hundred and seventy children in the district are in immediate need of food. The society plans to instal kitchens in the schools.

## VIENNA HAKOAH'S VICTORIES LEAD TO FIGHTS

Vienna, Apr. 2—The habit of the Hakoah, Jewish sport club of Vienna, now reduced to a second class team, to win all the matches it plays, led to the eighth match in which the Hakoah emerged victorious. The score was 7-0. The captain of the Hakoah team, Scheuer, was injured, as were other players, in the skirmish which followed, in which the opposing team and some of the spectators participated.

The police were called to restore order. The riot, it was declared, was the climax of the envy aroused during the entire soccer season, when the Hakoah weekly vanquished every team it met in seventeen successive matches with second class teams.

## SAYS SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMPLETE IN PALESTINE

Paris, Apr. 2—Religiously Palestine is the only country on the face of the globe where the Sabbath is observed as a national day of rest, declared Harris L. Selig, formerly executive director of the Yeshiva College campaign fund which raised \$3,000,000 for the erection of the Yeshiva College building in New York City. Mr. Selig is here on his way back to the United States following a tour of European countries and Palestine. He is accompanied by Mrs. Selig.

Sabbath in Palestine is a day of inspiration. Old and young fill the synagogues. Mr. Selig stated to the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here. In the Diaspora, Judaism is a matter of individuals, the community as such is not supreme. In Palestine the community is Jewish in every respect. The action or the behavior of the individual is of minor importance, Mr. Selig stated.

New Orleans Pays Last Honors to Rabbi Heller at Impressive Services

New Orleans, Apr. 1—The funeral services for the late Dr. Maximilian Heller, Rabbi Emeritus of Congregation Temple Sinai, held yesterday afternoon at the congregation's new house of worship, were attended by nearly two thousand people who filled the auditorium, overflowing into the aisles, the balcony and at the entrances. Representatives of all sections of the community, Jewish as well as non-Jewish, were present to pay tribute to the late rabbi.

Six rabbis participated in the services—Rabbi Emil W. Leipziger of Touro Synagogue, Dr. Mendel Silber of the Gates of Prayer Congregation, Rabbi Moses H. Goldberg of the Orthodox Chevre Tillim, Rabbi David Fichman of the Jewish Federation and Rabbi Louis Binstock, successor of Dr. Heller at Temple Sinai. Rabbi Binstock pronounced the eulogy, the other clergymen reciting prayers and reading psalms.

In his address Rabbi Binstock stressed the qualities of Dr. Heller as a man among men, as well as scholar, teacher, pastor and leader.

"I would rather you remember him as a sun glass that gathered the bright beams of the light of understanding and intelligence and focused them to a point where they rendered most good. His mind was like a sun glass shedding light into the darkest of corners, bringing comfort and hope to thousands of persons. Like a sun glass drawing came the affection from a limitless well within. His family was all of humanity, his house was all the world."

The funeral procession was a mile long. The bier was draped with a blanket of flowers sent by the congregation, although the family of the deceased made public the late rabbi's often-expressed desire that instead of flowers at the grave gifts to charity be made at his death. The temple platform was decorated with flowers. All the surviving members of the family were present, his widow, formerly Miss Ida Marks of New Orleans, his son, James, who occupies the pulpit of B'nai Ieshurun Congregation, Cincinnati, O.; his son, Isaac A., attorney of New Orleans, and a daughter, Mrs. George Cohen of New York.

At the grave a great concourse of people heard the simple service climaxed with the Kaddish, read by Rabbi Binstock. The pallbearers were Monte M. Lemann, Jack Bloom, S. Walter Stern, Gen. Allison, Owen Harold Weil, Joseph Trumm, E. E. Lesitzky, Lewis Scherck, Isaac Alcus, Felix Kahn, Joseph Dinkelspiel and Isaac Harris of Dallas.

## J.D.C. WELCOMES EFFORTS OF OTHER GROUPS TO RAISE EMERGENCY RELIEF FUNDS

David A. Brown, in Reply to Inquiry, States Position; Encourages Bessarabian Group

The Joint Distribution Committee welcomes the efforts of groups of American Jews who are interested in bringing immediate succor to suffering Jews in countries affected by famine and other adverse conditions. The Committee is carrying on emergency relief work within the limits of its funds, having set aside an emergency fund of \$31,000, of which \$60,000 has been forwarded to Bessarabia and \$50,000 for the suffering town Jews in Russia. The Joint Distribution Committee will distribute any funds raised for emergency relief in countries designated by the groups. These statements were made by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, in reply to an inquiry of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" in connection with Sunday's conference called by the American Jewish Congress, the Roumanian-Bessarabian Relief Committee and the United Roumanian Jews of America, which decided to seek \$500,000 for immediate aid.

In his reply Mr. Brown stated: "The questions put to be by the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' in connection with the Bessarabian situation, I take it, was prompted by the effort about to be launched by the Bessarabian Jews in this country to raise five hundred thousand dollars.

"Practically all of the questions you have asked—

"1. With reference to the expenditure of the Joint Distribution Committee for famine relief in Bessarabia;

"2. The actual facts with respect to Jewish suffering as reported by Dr. Bernhard Kahn, our European representative;

"3. The position of the Joint Distribution Committee with respect to making—

## BEGIN WORK ON ADLER PLANETARIUM IN CHICAGO

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Apr. 2—Work on the construction of the \$700,000 planetarium given to Chicago by Max Adler, philanthropist, started today with excavating and pile driving on the island east of the Shedd Aquarium in Grant Park.

The granite structure which will have twelve sides and a copper dome 90 feet in diameter is to be completed about January 1, 1930, it was stated by the South Park Commissioners.

Within the building intricate machinery imported from Jena, Germany, will show the course of the heavenly bodies and it will be possible to demonstrate within a few minutes the progress of stars and planets for many years. Each of the twelve sides of the planetarium will be 40-feet long and will be decorated with one of the twelve signs of the Zodiac. Across the 600 foot lakoon which separates the island from the mainland, a three span concrete bridge to cost \$950,000 is to be built by the South Park Board.

ing further allotments for emergency work;

4. What proportion of the \$310,000 appropriated for emergency will be applicable to Bessarabia;

"—are answered in the article which appeared in your issue of Friday, March 29, under the caption, 'J. D. C. Forwards \$110,000 of Emergency Relief Fund to Europe.' And it would be an imposition upon your readers to repeat that story.

"Frankly, I am extremely happy at the action of the Bessarabian Jews in coming, though a little late, to the assistance of their own flesh and blood in that country during this period of famine. I sincerely hope they will raise this five hundred thousand dollar fund and send it on its mercy mission, either directly to the social groups in Bessarabia or to the J. D. C. for special famine relief in Bessarabia. I might also urge other similar groups to raise special funds at this time to meet emergency conditions such as we have in Moldavia, Lithuania, Poland, and in Russia.

"The limited amount of funds received through the United Jewish Campaign can only do a minimum of relief and reconstruction work. Since September, 1925, we have been able to send over to these many countries approximately fifteen millions of dollars. I have realized, and have so stated time and time again, that instead of a twenty-five million dollar campaign, our campaign should have been for one hundred million dollars and more if we, the Jews of America, were to do more than a minimum.

"To stretch the generosity of the Jews of America to that extent would have been in my judgment an impossible undertaking and one fraught with great danger.

"Cablegrams are continually coming from all parts of Europe citing the appalling conditions in certain sections and it is heart-rending to realize how little we can do because of the limited funds which we have at our disposal.

"As I dictate this statement there comes to my desk a cablegram from Dr. Joseph A. Rosen from which I quote: 'Just completed trip through number of towns and cities in Kiev, Odessa districts; situation deplorable Jewish population aiter extremely severe winter and general deficiency foodstuffs appalling.'

"This cablegram tells of an immediate need that must be cared for at once if the people are not to suffer greater hardships. Resolutions, good wishes, mean nothing to these people. To tell them to wait until such time as we can help them constructively does not satisfy the hunger, care for the sick, or provide for the orphan.

"The J. D. C. has carried and is carrying a great responsibility. It realizes how little it can do even with the enormous sums that have been contributed, and yet our work over a long period of years has been a life-saving and soul-saving effort.

rights and claims relating to the different religious communities in Palestine." The Vatican is said to be insisting on its demand that the Commission is to be composed of representatives of such powers who are members of the League of Nations, while the British Government is willing to have the Commission formed of representatives of the religious bodies concerned. Great Britain objects to the method proposed by the Vatican, according to the report.

It was stated here today that the Rev. Pietro Fumasoni-Bioni, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, who is now in Palestine for the Easter holidays, will confer with the Anglican Archbishop of Canterbury who is soon expected to arrive in Palestine, regarding the disagreement between the Catholics and the Protestants on the question of the Christian Holy Sites.

Article 14 of the Palestine Mandate provides that "the method of nomination, the composition and the functions of this Commission shall be submitted to the Council of the League for its approval, and the Commission shall not be appointed or entered upon its functions without the approval of the Council."
