

## WORLD LEADERSHIP PASSES TO AMERICAN JEWRY, VIEW AT ANGLO-JEWISH MEETING

Last 40 Years Witnessed Tremendous  
Change in Jewish Situation; Social  
Anti-Semitism Increasing

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 15.—The passing of world leadership in Jewish affairs from the ancient Jewries of Europe to the Jewry of the United States, as the result of the development in the past forty years, was the striking note sounded at the annual meeting of the Anglo-Jewish Association which was in session here all day Sunday.

Leonard Montefiore in submitting his annual report reviewed the record of the past forty years. "Forty years ago the persecuted Jewries turned to the English and French Jews. Now they turn to America. The preponderance of Jewish affairs is likely to pass more into the hands of American Jewry. What usefulness remains, therefore, for Anglo-Jewry?" he asked, and declared in reply: "Though American Jewry grows increasingly rich and powerful, it is, nevertheless, remote and also absent from the League of Nations, while England sits in the League's Council."

Mr. Montefiore paid a tribute to Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies. Mr. Wolf, he said, might have been a wonderful foreign minister for any country.

"Forty years ago the May laws were enacted in Russia, making it impossible for the position of Russian Jewry to become worse. Rumanian Jewry was in a situation of utter hopelessness."

## CATHOLIC WOMEN IN PORTUGAL OPPOSE RETURN OF MARRANOS TO JUDAISM

Authorities Ignore Opposition; Anti-Community Returns

Lisbon, Apr. 15.—A deputation of Catholic women voiced objection to the official return of Marranos in Portugal to the faith of their forefathers, when they presented to the governor of Braganza a memorandum asking him to prohibit the contemplated official formation of a Jewish community by the Marranos of Braganza.

The Catholic women based their objection on the contention that the Marranos returning to Judaism are Freemasons. The governor rejected the demand, declaring that the Jewish religion must be respected as are other religions.

The Marrano community in Braganza is constantly growing in numbers. Services are openly held every Saturday. The Marranos in Mirandadodouvo have also decided to officially return to Judaism.

## LEADERS PROTEST INTERVEN- TION OF GOVERNMENT IN BU- CHAREST KEHILLAH AFFAIRS

Government Commission Named to  
Look Into Kehillah Affairs

Bucharest, Apr. 15.—The Rumanian government has not dissolved the Bucharest Kehillah board as was reported in the Rumanian Jewish newspaper "Adevurul."

The Minister of the Interior has appointed a special commission of inquiry to look into the affairs of the Bucharest Kehillah. This gave rise to the report that the government is about to dissolve the board. Dr. William Filderman, former Senator Bercovi, and Mr. Steinhart have intervened with Prime Minister Maniu, protesting against the interference with the autonomy of the Bucharest Kehillah. The Prime Minister has promised to have the Minister of Religions make a new decision in the matter.

## I. O. B. B. VOTES \$6,000 AS MAINTENANCE FUND FOR HEBREW UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Decide to Delegate Jewish Social  
Worker to Mayo Brothers Clinic

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Apr. 15.—A sum of \$6,000 as a maintenance fund for two years for the Jerusalem branch of the Hebrew University library was voted by the Administration Committee of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith which was in session here on Sunday under the chairmanship of Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Order. The sessions were held at the Covenant Club.

The sum will be forwarded to the Palestine lodge of the I. O. B. B., to be applied toward the maintenance of the Jerusalem Library, which is housed in the B'nai B'rith building. The grant was made at the request of Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the University, when it appeared that Jerusalem residents objected to the removal of the library to the Wolfsohn Memorial Building on Mount Scopus. Arrangements are under way to continue the Jerusalem library as a branch of the Hebrew University library, with books made available at both libraries.

Following an experiment of three months, the Administration Committee decided to delegate permanently a Jewish social worker at the Mayo Brothers clinic at Rochester, Minnesota, to minister to the needs of the large number of Jewish patients at the clinic. This step was originally taken at the request of the Mayo brothers.

A meeting of the Anti-Defamation League, the branch of the I. O. B. B. working for the protection of the Jewish name, will be held here today.

## AEROPLANE LOCATES DIS- TINGUISHED PALESTINE PARTY LOST ON CRUISE

Harry Sacher, Son of Sir Herbert  
Samuel and Wives in Party Strand-  
ed All Day in Motorboat

Jerusalem, Apr. 15.—Stranded on the Dead Sea in a motor boat which had run out of fuel, a party of distinguished Palestinian residents was rescued after being hunted for 24 hours by boats and aircraft. An aeroplane sighted them and took them back safely to Jerusalem.

The party of twelve, which included Harry Sacher, chairman of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem, Edwin Samuel, son of Sir Herbert Samuel, former High Commissioner of Palestine, Mrs. Sacher and Mrs. Samuel, Dr. Norock of the Hebrew University, and Mr. Green, an architect, was due to return from a Dead Sea cruise on Saturday evening.

When they failed to return, a search was instituted by the Palestine and Transjordan police on both banks of the Dead Sea. They were missing all day Sunday and found early Monday morning.

## HEARING ON ANTI-SHECHITA BILL IN CONNECTICUT TO BE HELD THURSDAY

Rabbis, with Aid of Counsel, Will Op-  
pose Measure

Hartford, Conn., Apr. 15.—Another hearing on the bill which, if enacted, would prohibit Shechita in the State of Connecticut, will take place on Thursday, April 18, before the legislative committee of the Legislature.

The bill had already been passed by both houses but because of the protest of rabbis in the state it was at the last minute withdrawn from the engrossing clerk's office before being submitted for the Governor's signature.

The fight against the proposed bill is led by more than a score of rabbis who have retained counsel. At Thursday's hearing the case against the bill will be stated by Rabbis Hoffenberg and Hurwitz of Hartford, Rabbi Abraham Neusman of New Haven and representatives from New London, Waterbury, Bridgeport, Stamford and New Britain.

## ACT AGAINST EXTENSION OF MINORITIES PROTECTION

Geneva, Apr. 15.—The governments

in London, April 28, to consider the  
proposed changes in the procedure  
which would afford the minorities an

complaints against the governments of  
the countries in which they reside.

## TO BUILD INDUSTRIAL PLANTS FOR DECLASSED JEWS IN BOBRUISK

An example for providing means for  
self-aid to the declassified Russian Jews  
pointing the way for others, was fur-  
nished by American Jewish workmen  
formerly of Bobruisk, White Russia.

B. C. Vladeck, chairman of the Peo-  
ple's Tool Supply Campaign which is  
seeking to arouse the interest of  
American Jews in the movement to  
help the declassified Russian Jews by  
supplying them with tools, announced  
the decision of the Bobruisk Land-  
manschaft to undertake the erection in  
that town of industrial plants to pro-  
vide employment for the Jewish popu-  
lation there.

An initial contribution toward the  
funds necessary was made by Branch  
No. 206 of the Workmen's Circle, sup-  
plying \$2,300, which remained in the  
treasury of the branch from previous  
relief campaigns. The branch pledged  
to raise an additional \$10,000.

The work will be undertaken under  
the auspices of the People's Tool Sup-  
ply Campaign.

A special committee was appointed  
by Branch 206, which will seek ho-  
liday every Brobrusk "landsman" in  
the United States in the project. Prior  
to reaching this decision, the branch  
sought the advice of Mr. Vladeck, who  
instituted an investigation through the  
Ort. An engineer was despatched to  
Bobruisk to survey the ground. The  
survey showed that Bobruisk has a  
need for a textile factory which could  
employ immediately 40 declassified fam-  
ilies and that there is room for other  
plants. There also exists a market for  
the product.

# WARNING TO "MISS EUROPE" BECOMES AN ISSUE IN GALVESTON, TEXAS

City's Chamber of Commerce Asks Re-consideration of Withdrawals  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Galveston, Apr. 15.—Declaring that the letters of Bishop C. E. Byrne to foreign entries in Galveston's international pageant are an affront to Galveston's Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants' Association and other outstanding civic organizations sponsoring the event, W. L. Roe, managing director, has written to the various foreign beauties, protesting against the action of Bishop Byrne.

Reports of the withdrawal from the international beauty contest of "Miss Europe," Miss Elizabeth Simon and "Miss Austria," Miss Goldarbeiter, both Jewish girls, provoked city-wide protest and efforts are being made to have them reconsider.

"The most prominent men in the city, among them citizens of national importance, are behind the pageant and certainly would not sanction anything of the character described by Bishop Byrne, who admits that he has not viewed the event, but had received his information second hand," said Mr. Roe. "These men could not afford to be a party to any affair that would in any way offend the sensibilities of the public or degrade womanhood. All of the entries, both foreign and American will be accorded a courteous welcome, being received by representative women of the city, who assist in their entertainment."

"Prominent Jewish citizens are identified with the international movement, and a harmonious feeling exists between Jews and Gentiles here, both co-operating for the best interests of the city. Anti-Semitic demonstrations are unknown either in Galveston or its environs," he declared.

## "Miss Europe" to Join Contest After Marriage in June

Vienna, Apr. 15.—Miss Elizabeth Simon, crowned "Miss Europe" at the beauty contest in Paris, is engaged to be married to a Jewish young man, Weinzieher, of a well-to-do family of the town Topolcsany, Hungary, according to a report today in the Austrian press.

The wedding is to take place after the Feast of Weeks, the middle of June. The papers add that "Miss Europe" intends to participate in the international beauty contest which is to take place in Paris for the title "Miss Universe," competing with "Miss America," who is to be chosen at Galveston, according to latest plans.

Improved Casting Pen for Shechita Tested in England

London, Apr. 15.—The Weinberg Pen, invented by Harris Weinberg with the object of ensuring that no suffering shall be inflicted on animals during casting prior to shechita, was tested at Leeds by the committee appointed by the London Shechita Board to adjudicate upon the merits of the invention. In January 1928 at a test at Islington, the committee found that certain alterations were necessary and the majority of the committee agreed that a further test of the improved Pen should be held in a private slaughter-house in Leeds.

The Board of Shechita, having intimated that it will not take cognizance of a trial held otherwise than under its own auspices at Islington, the expenses of the trial were borne by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. There were present Professor Hobday, principal of the Royal Veterinary College, chairman of the committee, Captain C. W. Hume, University of London and Animal Welfare Society, Professor C. Lovati Evans, physiologist at University College, Professor A. Gofton, chief veterinary officer, Edinburgh, Major J. A. Dixon, chief veterinary officer, Leeds, Major W. J. deVine, chief veterinary officer, Birmingham, Captain H. L. Torrance, chief veterinary officer, Birkhead, Captain W. K. Johnstone, veterinary officer, Manchester, Dr. J. J. Jervis, medical officer of health, Leeds, Miss Violet Wood, secretary of Council of Justice for Animals, and Humane Slaughter Association, R. O. Paddison, honorary adviser for humane slaughter to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and also the Rev. E. M. Levy of South Africa, S. Landman of London, and Mr. Weinberg, the inventor of the Pen.

Two horned and four polled bullocks were cut. The Rev. H. R. Goldwater and Rev. Nemeth performed shechita. The animal to be slaughtered is walked into a padded stall which allows its head to protrude and the still is then revolved so that the beast is brought on its back in position for the ritual cut. It is claimed that this method is not only quicker in dispatch but also more humane than the present method of using ropes or chains to bring a struggling animal on its back.

After the demonstration, the committee held its deliberations and Professor Hobday then communicated the following unanimous findings of the committee: (1) That the defects in the machine witnessed at the last demonstration had been corrected; (2) that the Weinberg Pen is a distinct humane improvement on the present method of casting; (3) that the average time of casting of the six animals demonstrated was 9½ seconds; (4) that the question of an automatic brake for the machine to hold the Pen ready with the animal in it should be investigated.

## ROSENWALD TELLS MEDICAL SOCIETY HE WILL NOT ABANDON CLINIC PLAN

Says It Safeguards Physician, Nurse and Hospital as Well as Patient  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Apr. 15.—A statement that he will not permit the attitude of the Chicago Medical Society to interfere with his plans to help the middle-class public to obtain medical and hospital treatment at reasonable cost was voiced by Julius Rosenwald, Chicago capitalist and internationally known philanthropist, upon his return to Chicago from Arizona.

"I do not wish to take sides in the dispute between the medical society and Dr. Louis E. Schmidt," Mr. Rosenwald said.

"I wish further that it be understood that I have no 'official' information. I say now merely that I have had various statements brought to my attention to the effect that the Chicago Medical Society is opposed to the further extension of facilities whereby persons of moderate means may obtain medical attention and hospital care at prices within their reach.

"I do not know as a matter of established fact that such statements are true.

"But if they are true, then I will say this:

"The attitude of the Chicago Medical Society will make no difference in my plans for 'pay' clinics to be established under the fund that I have set aside for that purpose.

"Obviously, if the attitude of the medical society has been erroneously reported, there is no need for me to say anything.

"I have no desire nor intention to interfere in the internal affairs of the Chicago Medical Society, nor in the private affairs of any of its members. I am not taking sides with or against Dr. Schmidt, nor with or against the society. Please make that clear.

"I have established a fund to assist persons in moderate circumstances to obtain adequate medical attention and hospital care at prices within their means. My plans concerning this fund were formulated only after long and serious consideration of present day problems from every angle and every standpoint.

"I believe that those plans safeguard the welfare of the physician, the nurse and the hospital no less than that of the patient.

"It is not my intention to set up a machine that will harm, either professionally or financially, any doctor, nurse or hospital. My plan simply is this—to assist persons in moderate circumstances to pay their doctor's and nurse's and hospital bills," Mr. Rosenwald stated.

The trustees of the Charity Fund founded by Sir Sassoon David, Bt. of Bombay, have given a further sum of £5,000 which, together with their previous donation, makes a total of £10,000 towards the Holland Park Synagogue. The synagogue, which was consecrated in December last, bears the name Keneseth Sassoon David, after the late Baronet.

### Hiliterites Claim Jews Desecrate Christian Cemeteries

Berlin, Mar. 31—Jews are desecrating Christian cemeteries in Germany, the anti-Semitic "Voelkischer Beobachter," the central organ of the Hiliterite Party, alleges as a sort of counter-move to the protests against the repeated desecrations of Jewish cemeteries in the country. "Jews in Essen," it says, "recently desecrated a Christian cemetery. Now we have a report of the new infamous action of the same kind. During Wednesday night, twenty or thirty grave-stones in the Protestant cemetery of Neustettin were thrown down and some of them were smashed. No Walter von Mollo has come forward to protest against this vandalism as he protests against the desecration of Jewish cemeteries, and no Ministers in the Government address demonstrations held in the former Parliament building against these desecrations of the sacred places of the German people by Syrian agitators and invaders."

"Altogether, the German people is oppressed under the yoke of the Jews," the paper continues. "In Elberfeld," it says, "the National Socialist Party has been prevented from holding open-air meetings, because they protected themselves against attacks by the Jewish defense troops."

"The situation, in fact, is such," the paper goes on, "that the National Socialist German Labor Party and the German National People's Party have put an interpellation in the Prussian Diet, asking the Government whether it intends to protect the German section of the population of Prussia against the Marxist agitators whose adherents are overwhelmingly members of Jewry, and whether it will take action in order to punish those intellectual inspirers of acts of violence against Nationalist Germans, and will put a stop to their activities."

Louis Lewinson, past president of Daniel Webster Lodge, Independent Order of Free Sons of Israel, New York, died on Sunday at the age of 48. Mr. Lewinson was a director and former vice-president of Julius Kayser & Company.

ness and degradation. The reports of the Anglo-Jewish Association for that period were full of unavailing protests against the outrages. Forty years," the president declared, "brought great progress. The League of Nations has proved to be a more efficient guardian of the rights of minorities than the Berlin Congress. Turkey no longer excludes Jews from Palestine where, under the Mandate, what seemed an illusion is slowly being translated into fact," he declared.

Haham Moses Gaster warned against an exaggerated optimism. "It is true that the position of Jewry has improved politically, but social anti-Semitism is on the increase. Ritual murder accusations are still being made and prejudices continue," he said. The speaker urged that the Association take steps to rescue the Jews of Yemen from annihilation.

Elkan Nathan Adler addressed the meeting on the question of the Yemenite Jews. He said he had just returned from Aden where he met a number of Yemenite Jews and he could say that the persecution is not as great as is imagined. "It is true that the Jews in Yemen are not liked, but they are tolerated. The persecution in Yemen is not like that in old Italy where the children were forcibly baptised. A great wrong is now being committed in Yemen when the governors receiving Jewish orphans as wards train them in the Moslem faith. It would be a mistake to think that the persecutions are of such a terrible nature that they are likely to annihilate Yemenite Jews," he stated.

American immigration restrictions are growing worse, noted Otto Schiff, president of the Jews' Shelter, reported at the annual meeting also held yesterday. He visited the United States recently and can declare that the conditions are unfortunate for prospective emigrants.

The Shelter officials met 20,000 emigrants during the year and 1,480 were accommodated at the shelter.

The radio programs of the United Synagogue of America will not be broadcast on Wednesday nights, April 24th and May 1st, 1929, owing to the Passover Holidays. Broadcasting will be resumed as usual on May 8th, 1929. Neither will the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America broadcast its programs until May 9th.
