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JERUSALEM ELECTRIC CORPORATION AGREES TO EMPLOY JEWISH LABOR 90% of Labor to Be Jewish in Future Undertakings, Promise Made

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 16—A promise to employ fifty per cent Jewish labor in inture undertakings which are to be started shortly was made by the Jerustarted shortly was made by the Jetus slem Electric Corporation, following the objections raised by the Vaad Ha'ir against the company's failure to emnloy Jews in the Jerusalem electrification work. The new work will begin as soon as new machines arrive.

London, Apr. 16-The Palestine renresentative of the Electric Corporation makes no distinction between Jews and non-Jews, but employment of labor is purely a business matter, declared Mr. Shearer, director of the London branch of the Jerusalem Electric Corpanel of the Jerusalem Electric Corporation to a representative of the lewish Telegraphic Agency. The company works closely with the Jewish people in England, he added.

The Jerusalem Electric Corporation

cannot see its way to cooperate with the Ruttenberg Electric Corporation which is a distinct and separate undertaking. It is expected that the work will be concluded by the end of the year when power and light will be available within a 20 kilometer radius from the Church of the Holy Sepul-

MANY TRIBUTES PAID TO PROF. EINSTEIN AT 50th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION Messages from President Hoover and

Lord Balfour Read; American Scientific World Joins in Praise Many messages of tribute and praise

for Prof. Albert Einstein, foremost scientist were read at the jubilee celebration held last night at the Metropolitan Opera House in honor of Prof. Ein-stein's fiftieth birthday.

President Hoover and Lord Balfour headed a long list of American and European statesmen and scientists who paid tribute to the author of the relativity theory. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Jewish National Fund and the Zionist Organiza-tion of America and sponsored by a representative committee of Jews and non-Tews of which Herman Bernstein was chairman.

Secretary of the Interior Ray Lyman Wilbur, the German Ambassador, Count Friedrich W. von Prittwitz and Louis Marshall were the principal speakers.

President Hoover, declaring his approval of "the plan to pay tribute to Prof. Albert Einstein on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of his birthday," said of the scientist: "Prof. Einstein ranks high among the foremost scientists of all time who have enriched mankind by their invaluable contributions to thought and human progress. Every important scientific achievement is a step forward in the direction of better universal understanding and good It is very fitting that distinguished educators and other publicspirited Americans are paying this tribute to Prof. Einstein.

ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT TO GRANT CONCESSIONS TO NATIONAL MINORITIES Recommendation to Be Taken Up at Cabinet Meeting (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Bucharest, Apr. 16-A turn in the governmental policy with regard to the national minorities in Roumania is exnected to result from the recommendations which are to be considered at the

next meeting of the cabinet.

The Roumanian press reports today that the governmental commission con-sisting of the Minister of the Interior, Minister of Finance and the Minister of Religioun and Education, formulated a series of recommendations concerning the minorities question. It is understood that the commission recommended the grant of important concessions to the national minorities, particularly in the field of education. It is stated that the minorities are to be permitted to use their own language in applying to the administrative authorities and that in-(Continued on Page 4)

PAPAL CONCORDAT WILL NOT AFFECT JEWISH COMMUNI-TIES STATUS IN JUGO-SLAVIA New Ordinance to Be Issued When

Pact Is Concluded (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Belgrade, Apr. 16-The Jewish communities in Jugoslavia were apprehensive as to their status in the near future when the news was circulated in the press that the concordat now being negotiated between the Jugoslavian government and the Vatican will secure for the Roman Catholic church a predominant position as the state religion.

These reports were denied in authoritative circles to the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. It was admitted, however, that a new ordi-nance regulating the status of the Jewish communities will be issued, although not before the conclusion of the concordat. Assurances were given that the new ordinance will preserve the previous status of the Jewish communities, which enjoy equal rights and standing with the other religious denominations. Under the new ordinance the Jewish communities in the country will be granted full autonomy for the administration of their affairs. A council of the Jewish communities is to be created with the power of taxing the members for religious and welfare needs.

HUNGARY SUBSIDIZES JEWISH COMMUNAL NEEDS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budanest, Apr. 16-To the extent of 500,000 pengoes the government budget for 1929 includes several subsidies for Tewish communal and religious needs in the country.

One hundred and sixty-five thousand pengoes are allotted for both the Neolog and Orthodox communities; 66,000 pengoes for Jewish welfare organiza-tions; 20,000 toward the erection of an Orthodox synagogues. Other allotments are mentioned including one to assist in the purchase of matzoth for the poor Tewish population.

GO TO JEWISH CEMETERY TO HONOR P.P.S. FOUNDER (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 16-The leaders of the P.P.S., the dominant Polish Socialist party, gathered yesterday at the Jew-ish cemetery of Warsaw to pay tribute to the memory of Felix Perl, the founder of the Polish Socialist Party and former editor of the party organ, "Robotnik."

It was the first anniversary of his death and the party arranged a procession to his grave. The procession was headed by Ignace Daszynski silver-tongued Polish Socialist leader and ver-tongace rouse Socialist teater and present speaker of the Sejm, Deputies Zhulawski, Lieberman and Diamand. Wreaths were laid at the grave and revolutionary songs sung.

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#### EINSTEIN URGES SUPPORT FOR SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTE

The American section of the Yiddish Scientific Institute of Vilna, at 1133 Broadway, New York, made public the following text of a message sent by Prof. Albert Einstein to Dr. Simon Dubnow, Jewish historian, who is honorary chairman of the history section of the Institute:

The impoverishment of Eastern Europe, caused by great political events, placed the Jewish masses in a difficult economic position. The urgent need was first of all to preserve their mere existence. However, man does not live on bread alone, certainly not a Jew. When a small group of people of the spiritual elite have gathered together in the Yiddish Scientific Institute in order to preserve the spiritual and moral, tradition of our people and wherever possible, to continue the further development of this tradition, this striving deserves the sympathy and the energetic support of those who are in a position to lend them. The names of those responsible men affiliated with the work is a guarantee for the proper application of the means supplied."

#### AMERICAN ZIONISTS TO HONOR HERZL THROUGH MEMORIAL ISSUE

To Dedicate Special Number of "New Palestine" to Zionist Founder

The Zionists of America will honor the memory of Theodor Herzl on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of his death by issuing a special number of "The New Palestine," official organ of the Zionist Organization of America, according to an announcement made by Mrs. Archibald Silverman. Chairman of the Heral Memorial Number Committee.

A special feature of the Herzl Memorial Issue will be a new translation and condensation of Theodor Herzl's iamous diaries, which will make available in English a comprehensive summary of the autobiography of the founder of the Zionist movement. This has been undertaken by Maurice Samuel, author of "You Gentiles," and "I. the Tew."

In a tentative table of contents made public by Meyer W. Weisgal, editor of "The New Palestine," it is stated that some of the foremost writers, Jewish and non-Jewish, will contribute to the issue. Among those whose contributions will appear are Steian Zweig, Sil-Vara, Maria della Grazia, Nobel Prize winner, Martin Buber, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, Max Brod, and Dr. Arthur Ruppin. A special section of this issue will also be devoted to a review of the past twenty-five years of general Jewish and Zionist history. The record of general Jewish history will be written by Prof. Simon Dubnow. Dr. Arthur Ruppin is writing a history of this period in Palestine.

Committees are now being formed by prominent Zionists throughout the country to make possible a circulation of 100,000 copies of the Herzl Memorial issue. The following have been appointed as chairmen of State and Regional Committees to stimulate interest in the Herzl Memorial Number: New York State, Jonah J. MOSCOW KEHILLAH LEADERS DENY COMMUNIST CHARGE OF MATZOTH SPECULATION

"Emes" Asserts Matzoth Sold at 23 Roubles Per Pud (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 16-Charges of specilation in the imported matzoth were lation in the imported marzon were directed against the Moscow Kehliba leaders by the Communist daily, "Emes," which is carrying on a campaign against the distribution of matzoth

The newspaper charged that the matzoth imported under the agreement with the Soviet authorities are being sold at a price of 25 roubles per pud Since the sale is prohibited, the leaders have resorted to another method, asking the customers to contribute toward the Moes Chittim (poor fund).

These charges met with a categorical denial by the Kehillah leaders who declared that they are fulfilling in letter and in spirit the agreement with the Commissariat of Trade.

#### H. L. SELIG RETURNS FROM PALESTINE

Harris L. Selig, former executive di-rector of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, returned on the steamer Berlin from an extended trip to Europe and Palestine. During his stay abroad Mr. Selig visited France, Germany, Poland, Italy and Palestine.

On arrival in New York Mr. Selig stated to the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" representative that most American Tews have an erroneous impression of things Palestinian. Often one hears criticism of the faults in Palestinian work. A visit, however, convinces one that the emphasis on faults is misplaced, for the Jewish work in Pales-tine possesses all the characteristics of Jewish accomplishments. Even the faults are Tewish, he said.

In the educational field Mr. Selig stated there has been a remarkable development. Thirty-six per cent of the school children are now attending the Orthodox schools maintained by the Mizrachi Organization and there is a growing appreciation of the traditional type of schools conducted along modern lines.

## LEAVES \$131,000 TO NEW YORK CHARITIES

Educational and charitable institutions receive \$131,000 under the will of Dr. Michael P. Rich, physician, who died April 12 in a six-story fall from his apartment in the Oliver Cromwell Ho-tel, New York.

He left bequests of \$20,000 to Mount Sinai Hospital, the Jewish Social Service Association, and the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthrops Societies of New York City.

Seven other institutions were benefit ciaries in \$10,000 legacies. The residue of the estate, which is estimated at \$300,000 is divided equally among two nephews and one niece.

#### SPECIAL CONGRESS SES SION TO ACT ON NATIONAL ORIGINS POSTPONEMENT

No Other Immigration Measures Will Be Considered

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Apr. 16-Barring unexpected developments, it is probable that during the special session of Congress which convened yesterday, no legisla-tion with regard to immigration or naturalization will be considered, other than the question of postponement or repeal of the National Origins plan. The House Immigration Committee does not expect to function during this special session.

A resolution for postponement of the National Origins plan for one year was passed at the last session, but the Senate adjourned without taking action. It was learned today that Senator Nye of North Dakota, who introduced the bill for the postponement in the Senate at the last session, will renew his efforts at this session to get the Senate either to pass the House bill or to repeal the

National Origins plan

Senator David A. Reed of Pennsylvania, father of this legislation, will vigorously combat any effort to prevent the National Origins plan from going have behind him the weight of the in-fluence of President Hoover, who, though having issued the proclamation pursuant to the law, calling the National Origins plan into effect, declared himself on several occasions opposed to it. As a result of the clash between Senator Reed on the one hand and President Hoover on the other, a spectacular fight on the issue looms on the horizon, since Senator Reed claims to be speaking on behalf of the American Legion and other so-called patriotic organizations.

Congressman Dickstein and Congressman Bloom of New York will call on Secretary of Labor Davis today to confer with him regarding regulations which have been in process of preparation by the Department on naturalization and immigration bills passed during the last session, particularly the naturalization bill legalizing the status and allowing the naturalization of aliens who entered America unlawfully prior to June 3, 1921. The Congressmen will make suggestions as to the character of the regulations.

Milwaukee, Wis., Apr. 16—A call for a conference of all Jewish organiza-tions in the city to be held Wednesday, April 17, to make Milwaukee's United Palestine Appeal an "all Jewish drive," was sent out by Morris Miller, chairman of the campaign.

With the formation of the extended

Jewish Agency, Palestine is no longer a subject for debate. The issues that pletely dissolved, and forces headed by Louis Marshall, Felix Warburg, Dr. Lee K. Frankel, Lord Melchett, and others, are in complete harmony as to our responsibility to Palestine.

"I therefore, respectfully ask that your organization send two or more delegates to a conference, which I am calling. Please send such delegates as will volunteer to act as captains and will organize teams representing your organization in the forthcoming cam-

paign. "The Milwaukee drive to raise the 1929 quota of \$50,000 for the United Palestine Appeal must be an all-Jewish drive," Mr. Miller declared. "It is not the exclusive obligation of any one part, or one section, or one element of our community. It is not a 'Zionist' drive. It is a Jewish drive, and as such, we must have the equal support of Reform, Conservative and Orthodox groups. I appeal to every Jew in Milwaukee able to assist, to volunteer his or her services in raising our assigned quota.'

The campaign is to be conducted here from May 5 to May 15.

Organization of a centralized Board of Jewish Education in Milwaukee, negotiations for which have been carried on among the various educational institutions in the community, has finally been perfected.

#### "ATHEIST" GIVES FIGURES ON SYNAGOGUES CLOSED IN SOVIET RUSSIA

500 Synagogues Shut Down in Ukraine Since World War (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 16-The decline in the number of syiagogues and rabbis serving the religious needs of the Tewish population in the Union of Socialist oviet Republics is reported with satisfaction in the Moscow paper, "Bez-boshnik" (The Atheist).

According to "The Atheist" there were 1.400 synagogues in the Ukraine prior to the outbreak of the World War in 1914. In 1927 there were only 1.034 synagogues in the Ukraine. Since 1927 a hundred more synagogues were closed in the region. During the same period 100 synagogues were closed in White Russia. In 1914 there were 1,059 rabbis in the Ukraine. Today they number only 830. A similar proportion in the decline was observed in White Russia.

Apr. 16-The Soviet of the city of Vitebsk has decided to confiscate the local main synagogue, reports the Yiddish Communist daily of Minsk, "Oktiabr." Eight smaller syna-gogues, known as Minyanim, are also to be closed.

The Soviet of Mohilev decided to confiscate two of the smaller synagogues in the city.

## JUGO-SLAV JEWS BUILD COMMUNITY CENTER

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Belgrade, Apr. 16-The Jewish cen-ter idea of American Jewish origin has been adopted by the Jewish commu-nity in the Jugoslav capital.

On April 21, the official dedication

of the Jewish community building in this city will take place. It is expected that the King and members of the government and of the municipality will attend the dedication exercises.

The building is of Byzantine style and was erected at a cost of over 1.000,000 Dinar. It contains a number of meeting rooms, classrooms for the religious eschool, club rooms, offices for the cultural and religious institutions, and is counted among the most beautiful buildings in Belgrade.

#### Anti-Defamation League Meets in Chicago Chicago. Apr. 16-The Governing

Board of the Anti-Defamation League of the Independent Order B'nai Brith held a session at the Covenant Club here Monday night. Sigmund Livingston, chairman, presented reports of lectures and addresses to Rotary, Kiwanis, Lion, Optimists and similar business luncheon clubs, indicating the large territory covered and the enthustastic receptions and cooperation resulting. It was decided to extend the scope of these talks in the future as soon as adequate and definite plans and a program can be mapped out. A large number of cases of defamanon in American newspapers was reported to the Governing Board. These matters were called to the attention of the offending papers and in every instance sympathetic replies were received from the editor, with offers to gladly cooperate hereafter with anti-Defamation League in its work.

Directors of the Hillel Foundations. student presidents from six foundations at universities and members of the Commission met in an all day session here at the Bismark Hotel Monday. Special emphasis was placed on the presentation of criticism by students and directors to the Commission members. #### The Missionary Question Again

Toronto, Apr. 16-The efforts of Christian missionaries to win Jewish converts to Christianity has been the subject of discussion in the press and among the public here since the issue was raised by Rabbi Ferdinand M. Isserman of the Holy Blossom Congregation. Rabbi, missionary and pastor participated in the discussions in the press.

Rabbi Isserman, objecting to the missionary efforts, made the point that "goodwill between Jew and Christian is made difficult by the continued maintenance of missions to Jews, despite their notorious ineffectiveness." He argued that the implication involved in missionary effort among the Jews is that Judaism as a faith is inferior to Christianity. The establishment of missions among Iews constitutes a public insult to Judaism, a faith which managed to survive the crushing vicissitudes of the centuries. The second implication of missions among Jews is, according to Rabbi Isserman, a "covert accusation that Jews are inferior spiritually and intellectually, that the people from whose ranks sprang prophet and psalmist, pa-triarch and lawgiver. Amos and Jesus, Spinoza and Einstein; that the people who have defied kings and emperors, nations and armies for their religious iceal, and who have gladdy suffered for Yale University; President James Angell, it and yet maintained a standard of lamily life unattained elsewhere, are morally and spiritually anaemic. Naturally, such missions and these issues.

tions do not make for good-will."

The sermon of Rabbi Isserman reechoed in Christian clergy circles in Toronto. One clergyman, the Rev. John Inkster, a Presbyterian, defended the missions to the Jews and declared that "we will pray for that Rabbi that he will be converted to Christ." On the other hand, Rev. E. Crossley Hunter, pastor of Carlton Street United Church, stated that in his opinion Rabbi Isserman was justified to some extent in his criticism of the attempt of certain Christian denominations to convert the Jews to Christianity by special missions and missionaries. His church, he sta-

ted, has no missions to the Jews. Quite different was the tone of the Rev. M. Zeidman of the Presbyterian Mission to the Iews, the organization principally aimed at by Rabbi Isserman. We do not say that the Jews are inferior intellectually, but we do say that Judaism, both traditional and reformed, s inferior to Christianity," the missionary leader asserted, launching into an attack. "Rabbi Isserman objects to a mission to the Jews. What is the Bond Street (Holy Blossom) Synagogue but a mission to Gentiles, and the Rabbi a missionary to the Christians, to wean them away with his polished oratory from the raith of their fathers?"

He charged the Rabbi with adopting

struction in their native language be permitted in schools maintained by the government for minority groups.

The grant of these concessions would coincide with the forthcoming national celebrations on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of Greater Roumania and it is expected that the minorities would participate in these celebrations after their demands have been fulfilled.

It is still uncertain as to whether the Jewish population would benefit from these concessions, as the Maniu government considers the Jews not as a national minority in the full sense, but rather as an ethnic, religious minority.
