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## FORMATION OF JEWISH AGENCY IS NEAR, MARSHALL SAYS AT BROOKLYN U. P. A. DINNER

Says Constitution Practically Completed; 44 Non-Zionist Members Selected

The draft of the constitution of the extended Jewish Agency has been practically completed, following a meeting of the Zionist and non-Zionist representatives and the non-Zionist members of the Agency have been selected, Louis Marshall announced Wednesday evening at the opening dinner of the Eastern Parkway Division of the United Palestine Appeal Drive. His first public appearance under local U. P. A. auspices was utilized by Mr. Marshall to answer the implied criticism of those who have challenged the sincerity of the non-Zionists in giving reality to the Weizmann-Marshall agreement.

Together with Mayor James J. Walker, Mr. Marshall was the guest of honor at the dinner in the Brooklyn Jewish Center, inaugurating the \$100,000 Eastern Parkway U. P. A. Campaign. Speakers in addition to Mr. Marshall were Mayor Walker, Rabbi Isaac H. Levinthal, and Justice Mitchell May, Honorary Chairman of the Brooklyn Division of the U. P. A. Henry Seinfeld, Chairman of the Dinner Committee, introduced Rabbi Louis D. Gross, campaign chairman, as the toastmaster. The sum of \$40,000 in cash and pledges was raised.

Making an eloquent plea for unity in all ranks of Jewry, the assurance was given by Mr. Marshall that the unanimous pledge of the October conference, where the Jewish Agency pact was ratified, was given with the full realization that Palestine requires "superhuman work and eventually a huge sum of money." Once the extended Jewish Agency is formally called into being, following the World Zionist Congress in July, the non-Zionists will be ready to assume the full extent of their obligations. The past performances of the non-Zionist leaders, he indicated, are sufficient guarantee that they will not be satisfied "by merely talking." The dawn of a new era of giving when there will be "the contribution of sums larger than you have expected by all," was forecast by him. There will be no saving of money through this combination, he said. Coupled with it, was the

## MEXICO TO RESTRICT IMMIGRATION FROM EUROPE; RULES EFFECTIVE ON MAY 1

Will Require Immigrants to Possess \$5,000; Declare Measure Temporary (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mexico City, Apr. 18—Mexico will, beginning May 1st, put into force regulations restricting immigration from Europe. The restrictions will principally affect immigrants from Russia, Ukraine, Poland, Lithuania and Hungary.

The regulations, it is stated, are to be of a temporary nature and were devised in order to cope with the economic situation arising out of industrial stagnation.

While the imminence of the regulations was not officially announced, and complete details are not known, it was learned from reliable sources that immigrants, in order to be admitted to the country, will be required to possess a minimum sum of \$5,000.

## ANTI-SCHECHITA BILL HEARING IN CONNECTICUT LEGISLATURE IS INDEFINITELY POSTPONED

Indicate Bill Will Be Calendered and Never Reach Legislature for Vote (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Hartford, April 18—The hearing on the bill which would make compulsory the stunning of animals immediately before or after slaughter, thus becoming in effect an anti-schechita measure, scheduled to take place today before the judiciary committee of the legislature has been indefinitely postponed.

According to all indications, it is doubtful whether the bill will come up at the present session of the legislature. From authoritative sources it was indicated that the bill will be calendered and may never reach the Senate or the House for vote.

The bill had originally been passed by both Houses and was ready for signature by the governor when a protest of Jewish leaders throughout the state caused its withdrawal from the engrossing clerk's office and re-introduction with amendments. Rabbis and lay leaders with the aid of counsel have been preparing to oppose the measure as aiming against the Jewish method of slaughtering animals for food.

## STORRS SENDS PASSOVER GREETING TO JERUSALEM

Jerusalem, Apr. 18—A Passover greeting to the Jews of Jerusalem was received here today from Sir Ronald Storrs, former governor of the city.

In a message to Norman Bentwich from Cape Town, South Africa, Sir Ronald addressed himself in Hebrew to the Jews in the following three words: "Pessach Sameach Lakehillah" (Happy Passover to the community.)

## BERLIN PRESS RIDICULES CITY FATHERS FOR 'RELATIVE' GIFT TO RELATIVITY AUTHOR Urges Municipality to Make Good Empty Gesture; Land Accessible Only by Aeroplane

Berlin, April 18—The City Fathers of the German capital are the object of scorn and ridicule in the metropolitan press over the embarrassment they caused Professor and Mrs. Einstein by presenting them with a house of which they could not take possession.

The newspapers commenting today on the disclosure that the house given the Einsteins on the occasion of the scientist's fiftieth birthday was occupied under a five year lease, termed the gift a "relative" presentation. The same term is applicable, the papers say, to the new gift of a piece of land which is inaccessible "except by aeroplane." The papers urge the municipality to make good the empty gesture, otherwise Einstein will be compelled to acquire a house at his own expense.

## JEWISH COMPANY GETS TIBERIAS CONCESSION

Jerusalem, Apr. 18—A company, made up of American and Palestinian Jewish businessmen with two Arab partners, was awarded the concession for the exploitation of the Tiberias Hot Springs.

Bernard A. Rosenblatt of New York, Mr. Suprasky and Mr. Gesundheit of Palestine, own ninety per cent of the shares. Ten per cent are held by two Arabs, Soleiman Nassif and Amin Rizke, former owners of the baths.

The concession was granted for 40 years and the concessionaires are to pay the government £3,000 annually. Seven thousand pounds has already been invested and £50,000 is expected to be put into the undertaking during the next two years.

The High Commissioner signed the concession yesterday.

## SEE EINSTEIN CELEBRATION AS INTERNATIONAL EVENT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Apr. 18—The Einstein Jubilee Celebration at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, held on the initiative of the Jewish National Fund and the Zionist Organization of America, was prominently featured in the Austrian press as an event of international importance.

The newspapers quoted in particular the message of President Hoover praising Einstein's scientific contribution.

An amusing confusion was that found in the "Neue Freie Presse." Vienna's leading newspaper which believed that the Hoover message to the Metropolitan Opera House meeting was a part of the Presidential Message to Congress which came across the cables at the same time.

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## HOOVER DECLINES TO NAME M. BLOCH DISTRICT JUDGE

Although strong endorsements have been made for Maurice Bloch, minority leader in the New York State Senate, as one of the three United States district judges in the southern district of New York, judgeships created by an act of Congress at the last session, President Hoover, it was indicated, is not inclined to name Mr. Bloch, according to a report from Washington to the New York "Evening World."

The President, it was stated, prefers Francis G. Caffey, Democrat. Mr. Caffey, who is a former United States District Attorney under the appointment of President Wilson, was named by President Coolidge, together with Lloyd P. Stryker and John M. Woolsey, Republicans, but these appointments were not confirmed by the Senate at the last session.

It was indicated, however, that the New York Senators would support the appointment of Mr. Caffey, although they are disappointed that they could not obtain the nomination of Mr. Bloch.

## DAMROSCH RESIGNS AS PHILHARMONIC CONDUCTOR

Walter Damrosch will resign from the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra, according to an announcement by Clarence H. Mackay, chairman of the board of directors. Ossip Gabrilowitsch and Fritz Reiner will likewise resign as conductors.

Neither Mr. Reiner nor Mr. Gabrilowitsch, who appeared this season as guest conductors, is mentioned in Mr. Mackay's statement. But it cites correspondence with Mr. Damrosch on April 10, according to the quotations, Mr. Mackay wrote to the former leader of the New York Symphony Orchestra asking to what extent his services would be available next season. Mr. Damrosch replied on April 12 that owing to other commitments, especially in connection with the radio, it would be impossible for him to accept any engagements with the Philharmonic.

## AMERICAN JEWISH ADJUSTMENT PROBLEMS TOPIC AT SOCIAL WORKERS' CONFERENCE

National Conference of Jewish Social Workers to Meet in Atlantic City

Cross currents in American Jewish life and the adjustment of Jewish life to the American milieu will be the general topics of discussion at the next annual meeting of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service to be held in Atlantic City, June 2 to 5 inclusive, it was announced by Dr. Samuel C. Kohn, executive director of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities and chairman of the Program Committee of the Conference.

Forty states and several Canadian cities will send representatives to the conference, Dr. Kohn stated, pointing out that this year's sessions will not be confined to the technical aspects of social work. Outstanding mass influences in American life today as reflected in the field of labor and other movements also will be considered.

Due to the national interest among social workers in the findings of the Jewish Communal Survey of New York City which for the past two years has been conducting an intensive study of the resources of the New York Jewish community for philanthropic purposes, one entire session will be devoted to the reports of each committee of the survey, according to Samuel A. Goldsmith of New York, executive director of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research and president of the Jewish Conference.

Other sessions will be devoted to the relation of the Jewish press to Jewish philanthropy, programs and views of large Jewish community movements, the Jewish Agency and its implications for American Jewish life and the relation between Jewish Agencies and general agencies in the social work field.

Representatives of Jewish community centers attending the social service conference will also attend the annual conference of the National Association of Jewish Community Center Secretaries.

In accordance with the decision of the Jewish Conference in 1927 to become affiliated with the National Conference of Social Work, delegates will proceed to San Francisco where sessions will be held.

## SAMUEL BARNETT, MUNICIPAL BANK PRESIDENT, DIES

Samuel Barnett, president of the Municipal Bank and Trust Company of the past seven years, died in Baltimore at the age of 57. He had been in a hospital in the city for the past three months.

Merger of the Municipal Bank which had resources of \$80,000,000 with the Bank of United States, was formally ratified twenty-four hours before the bank up from a small institution at Stone and Ekin Avenues, Brooklyn, to its present size, with nearly twenty branches in Brooklyn.

## JEWS, CATHOLICS AND PROTESTANTS OPEN FORUM TO NIGHT AT FLORIDA COLLEGE

Relationship and Mutual Understanding, Topics of Discussion

Winter Park, Fla., April 18.—More than fifty students and faculty representing other colleges will meet this week-end at Rollins College here to consider present-day American religious thinking, and survey the relationships of the Protestants, Roman Catholics and Jews in America. The student body, faculty, and visiting citizens from many states will take part.

Three national organizations are participating in the parley: the Religious Education Association of America; the National Conference of Jews and Christians, of which Hon. Newton D. Baker, Professor Carleton J. H. Hayes, and Mr. Roger W. Straus are chairmen, and the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

Speakers from New England, New York and the Middle West will participate in the forums and round-table discussions. Dr. William Adams Brown, Presbyterian, will preside at the sessions. Father J. Elliott Ross, Roman Catholic Chaplain at Columbia University, will speak at the opening session Friday evening, April 19. The other speakers will be Rabbi Solomon Goldmann, of Cleveland, Professor Cornelius Kruse, Philosopher of Wesleyan University, Connecticut.

Round-table with these four speakers, and Rev. Everett Clinchy, of New York, will be held to talk over the implications of religion in this age.

Elmira, N. Y., April 18.—Declaring the need of a common ideal as the basis of world peace, Rabbi Alexander Lynde of Brooklyn, who spoke here at the third session of the International Relations Conference which is sponsored by Elmira College, brought forth a plea for better human, moral and spiritual relationship. ## PLAN TO PLACE ANOTHER 2,265 JEWISH FAMILIES ON FARMS IN RUSSIA IN 1929

### American Jewish Farm Settlements Society Receives Report from Dr. Rosen of Agro-Joint

Eleven thousand Jewish men and women in Russia will be given the opportunity, through American cooperation, to rehabilitate themselves on farms in the Crimea and the Ukraine during 1929, according to a report from Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, Director of the Agro-Joint, made public today by James N. Rosenberg, Chairman of the American Society for Jewish Farm Settlements, in Russia, Inc.

This group comprises 2,265 families who will be added to the 125,000 Jews who have previously been aided by the Agro-Joint to settle on farm lands made available by the Soviet Government.

Of the 2,265 families to be settled this year, 1525 will be colonized in the Ukraine, 700 in the Crimea, and 400 in the Nikolaev section.

This farm colonization is made possible, said Mr. Rosenberg, through the consummation of the agreement between the American Society and the U. S. S. R. Through this agreement, he added, \$10,000,000 is to be advanced by the American group, a like sum to be granted by the Soviet Government, and land of pre-war value of \$20,000,000 made available to Jewish settlers.

It is toward this project, that Julius Rosenwald of Chicago last year subscribed \$5,000,000 and Felix M. Warburg of New York \$1,000,000.

"This is a wonderful achievement," was the comment of Mr. Rosenberg, in making public this statement, "because when Dr. Rosen was last here in the United States some three months ago, he estimated that it would not be practicable to attempt the settlement of more than 1000 to 1200 additional Jewish families on farms in the Agro-Joint districts during 1929. To a considerable degree the enlargement of the program has been made possible through the substantial aid rendered by the Government of the U. S. S. R. in extending the Jewish land settlement program."

"During 1929, in the district of the Agro-Joint in the Crimea and the Ukraine, a total of Roubles 4,135,895 is to be expended. This is to be borne equally by the American Society and the Comzet (the Russian Government Department for the Promotion of Agriculture among Jews). It is especially interesting to note that out of this total, Roubles 3,191,495 are in the form of returnable charges which are to be repaid by the settlers."

The expenditures will be for seeds, livestock, tools and implements, tractors, vineyards and orchards, fences, buildings, food and feed loans. In addition the Agro-Joint and the Comzet will assume nearly 1,000,000 Roubles of non-returnable charges for the purchase of land surveys, water supply, building of schools, libraries, and bath-houses, medical assistance to settlers, veterinary service, agricultural and technical assistance and instruction.

"The American Society," Mr. Rosen-

berg concluded, "has assumed the obligation to carry on this long-term program and has received at this time subscriptions from Jews in this country totaling approximately \$7,850,000. It has consummated the agreement to conduct this work in reliance on the co-operation of the Jews of America. No public campaign or drive to secure these subscriptions has been made, nor will any be carried on. It is felt, however, that in this great constructive work—whereby 200,000 Jews have already been enabled to lift themselves out of the uncertainty and despair of Ghetto life in Russia and to become self-supporting, self-respecting workers on the soil, tilling an area of a million and a half acres of land—men of wealth in this country will recognize an obligation to complete the subscriptions required by the American Society and bring them up to the total of \$10,000,000 called for under the agreement."

### VIENNA HAKOAH RESENTS USE OF ITS NAME BY AMERICAN TEAM

#### Announces It Will Take Action to Protect Name

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Apr. 18.—The management of the Vienna Hakoah, the famous Jewish sport club, has decided to take action against the use of the name Hakoah by the American team which won the United States soccer championship, it was announced here today.

Some of the members of the American Hakoah were formerly of the Vienna club. They joined United States teams following their spectacular tour several years ago and this season created a unit of their own. The Vienna club stated that it will take steps with sport bodies and Jewish organizations in the United States to prevent the use of the name Hakoah by the American team which, it charges, is a professional team operated for profit and not associated with the athletic movement among the Jewish youth which originally gave rise to the Hakoah club in Vienna.

### COUNCIL WOMEN PLAN INTERNATIONAL GOOD WILL DAY

A call for the celebration of International Good Will Day on May 18 was sent by Mrs. Arthur Brin of Minneapolis, National Chairman of the Department of Peace, of the National Council of Jewish Women, to council sections. It is proposed that permission be obtained from the local Superintendents of Schools for reading and explaining the Kellogg Pact in the schools on that day.

Participation of the children is planned through the presentation of special programs in the religious schools.

The Council Sections, in their respective communities, will also invite all local Jewish women's organizations to unite in a peace program.

### BAMBERG COURT MOVES TO DISPEL RITUAL MURDER AGITATION

#### Issues Official Statement on Manau Case

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 18.—The end of the ritual murder agitation, carried on by German anti-Semitic newspapers in connection with the murder of a Christian boy in Manau, Bavaria, as within sight when the Bamberg court took official action today to "give the lie" to the barbaric libel.

The court published an official statement setting forth the facts and emphatically denouncing the ritual murder agitation carried on by the National Socialists in connection with the discovery of the body of a boy named Karl Kessler, who had been murdered in the woods near Manau.

In contrast to the unfounded assertions in the anti-Semitic press which carried headlines such as "Blond Boy Murdered, Passover Blood Drawn," the court officially declared that it has established that there are no signs on the body that the was any artificial bleeding, that there was no mark of slaughter, and that there is no basis whatsoever for any assumption or suspicion that a "ritual murder" had been perpetrated.

### FOUR BILLS SEEK TO REPEAL NATIONAL ORIGINS CLAUSE

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Apr. 18.—Four bills for the repeal of the national origins clause were introduced in the House yesterday by Congressmen McCormack of Boston, Sabath of Chicago, Selvig of Minnesota and Douglas of Massachusetts. Congressman McCormack also introduced a bill to postpone the clause for another year from June 30, 1929, to June 30, 1930.

Congressman O'Connell of New York introduced a bill to exempt from the quota nuns, deaconesses and sisters of any religious denomination or order.

The question of excluding aliens when estimating the apportionment of representatives in Congress of the various states may become an issue at the present special session. A bill for such exclusion was introduced in the House by Congressman Stalker of New York. A similar bill was introduced last session but Congress did not act upon it prior to adjournment. Should this legislation be adopted the representation in Congress of communities having large alien population would be materially reduced.

### MARSHALL TO TALK ON AGENCY OVER RADIO

Louis Marshall will speak on the Jewish Agency in an address he will deliver over the radio from station WABC at 12:30 P. M. Sunday, April 28. This will be Mr. Marshall's first public pronouncement on the Jewish Agency since the Non-Zionist Conference on Palestine. The address will be made during the Radio Hour of the New York "Day."

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warning to the Zionists that anticipation of non-Zionist contributions must not be a signal for diminished efforts on their part.

Describing the composition of the extended Jewish Agency, Mr. Marshall said, there will be 200 or 210 members, of which one-half will be non-Zionists. "The non-Zionists of America will have a 40% representation or 40 or 44 members. The Committee has agreed on the names of the 44 to represent the non-Zionists, so can assure you they are the names of men of whom no one need be ashamed. As far as we are concerned, as soon as the Zionist Congress is held in July, we will be ready to attend a meeting at which the non-Zionists and the Zionists will be ready to assume the obligations attached to the Jewish Agency. The all important thing in Jewish life has been unity—one God, one Israel. There is nothing more hateful than suspicion and looking askance.

"The conference of October, 1928, voted unanimously to join the extended Jewish Agency knowing that it required superhuman work and eventually a huge sum of money. They have never turned their backs on their brethren. They have been largely instrumental in raising \$80,000,000 for relief; they have built our cultural and philanthropic institutions. They were induced by the sentiment that all Jews are brethren and that there must be unity in Israel. We have not been satisfied by merely talking, making promises."

Explaining his personal attitude to Palestine, Mr. Marshall declared: "I am a non-Zionist, but I have always, from my earliest days, had the deepest love for the Holy Land. My mother impressed that feeling in me. When I prayed 'next year in Jerusalem,' it had a sentiment for me. I had a great love for Palestine whence came the greatest contribution to the civilization of the world. But I was born in the United States and I loved it for the humanity and the liberality and the justice it accorded the Jew. So it was natural I should feel the dual attraction for the home of my birth and the home of my ancestors."

"For a long time I looked upon Zionism as a beautiful dream. I was happy that there were people who could dream dreams and see visions. But there were ideas connected with that dream which I could not accept. There is, however, one thing which I accepted and which every Jew can accept—the sense of duty and obligation to help rebuild Palestine for those Jews who desire to live there. To make of Palestine a Jewish Center, a Jewish Home for culture where there might be a place of refuge for our brothers and sisters in lands of oppression to live under their own vine and fig tree."

There were those who were anti-Zionists. To me it seemed impossible that anybody could oppose the hope of the Zionists because they were built on

beautiful ideals. I always thought it a crime to cast doubts and suspicion on those who think beautiful ideas."

Turning to the Zionists, he urged them to renewed effort in behalf of Palestine. "Don't expect miracles from the fact that there is unity and that there will be a Jewish Agency," he warned. "Your work is not over. It means hard work for all, cooperation by all. Nobody is going to save money by this combination. A larger constituency means larger funds. It will mean we have got to be one and inseparable. We must not grow weary in doing well. When the leaders of the 4,000,000 Jews in the United States are united and after them follow leaders from abroad, we will have an invincible army. But if we begin to reduce instead of increasing our contributions, another story will have to be told."

"We cannot permit the bankruptcy of the Jewish people. The failure of Palestine as a venture will be an everlasting disgrace to the Jews. There is hope, everywhere, if we consider ourselves one and not two. We are the people of monotheism. We must be equally one in our action to the land which gave the world monotheism."

"If you ever get enough Jews in Palestine to have a Jewish state, have it. I won't live to see the day. You won't and your children won't. But we can live to see there a body of Jews of whom we can be proud."

"Let us forget about the future and concentrate on the present. Let us develop Palestine economically. Let us encourage the Hebrew University and everything spiritual. Let us show the world that Zionists and non-Zionists recognize that the only worthwhile things is our sacred faith, our trust in God and the great principles the Jews have given the world," he concluded.

Introduced as the symbol of the Christian world, Mayor Walker expressed the wish that as that symbol he could unite non Jews with Jews in working for Palestine rehabilitation. "The Jews have done so much for the city of New York, why shouldn't New York do something for Palestine?" he said.

More than half of the \$2,000 quota of Danbury Center for the United Palestine Appeal was raised at a meeting held in the United Jewish Center. The amount contributed at the meeting was \$1,100.

The meeting was presided over by Nathan Spiro, chairman of the local United Palestine Appeal committee.

Jewish residents of Aberdeen and the Grays Harbor district in the state of Washington, have banded into a congregation known as Beth Israel, and will construct a new synagogue, it was announced. The new synagogue cost approximately \$6,000. It will be the only synagogue in the harbor district. Construction will start next month.

An initial sum of \$5,000 to assist the 65,000 Jews facing starvation in Lithuania as a result of the 1928 crop failure, has been called to a committee in Lithuania. The relief fund was established under the auspices of the Federation of American Jews of Lithuania. Delegates sent out to the Jews of the United States, conferences have been called in various cities for the purpose of raising funds. Levi Rokeach is treasurer of the relief fund. Other members are Henry Hurwitz, Harry H. Kanner, Meyer Kellison, Israel Matz and Herman L. Winer.

## SAYS EINSTEIN, THE

MAN, NOT A MYTH

Under the headline, "Einstein the Man," the New York Evening Post writes:

"Albert Einstein lives most humbly over a grocery store in Berlin. On a spindle on his desk are impaled dozens of unanswered appeals for articles from newspapers and magazines all over the world. For this strange, wistful little man is a world figure for reasons so mathematically abstruse that the world makes no pretense of understanding them. Yet he sees himself clearly and keeps unimpaired his fine humility. 'You meet to celebrate a myth bearing my name,' he cabled to New York's mass meeting on his birthday. 'This proves, however, that in our time, amidst all the ill-omened striving after power and luxury, there still lives an appreciation for the eternal aims of the human spirit. That makes me happy.' It is difficult for little men to view themselves so whimsically and their aims so magnificently. This birthday message makes us feel that the 'Einstein theory' may be a myth but that Einstein the man emphatically is not."

A men's group to participate in the work of the New York Educational Guild for Social Guidance was formed Wednesday night at a meeting held at the home of Mrs. Harold Spielberg, president of the Guild. Harold Spielberg presided.

A description was given by Dr. Dudley D. Schoenfeld, member of the Advisory Board of the activities in the field of mental hygiene being carried out by the Guild in psychiatric clinics at several New York public schools.
