Felix and Max Warburg Join Zionist President in Response to Settlers' Greetings

Jerusalem, Apr. 26—Nahalal, the leading Zionist colony, was in festive dress to receive Felix M. Warburg, Max Warburg and Dr. Chaim Weizmann who visited the colony on Tuesday, April 23.

Replying to the greetings of the settlers, Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Warburg delivered addresses.

Dr. Weizmann stated that the Jewish village in Palestine is the basis of all Jewish hopes for the country. "We shall succeed if backed by all Jewry. The Warburgs can help us unite Jewry for Palestine. The technical questions concerning the constitution of the Jewish Agency will surely not prevent its establishment," the president of the World Zionist Organization said.

Felix M. Warburg stated that he was happy to see a flourishing Jewish agriculture in Palestine. Palestine, he stated, interests all Jewry. All those who come here are influenced by the upbuilding work. "I admire what I saw here and am confident of the country's future," he stated, concluding with the jocular remark: "I am afraid that in the future there will be no candidates for the non-Zionist seats on the Jewish Agency as all non-Zionists will become Zionists."

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CENTRAL RABBINICAL CONFERENCE TO MEET IN DETROIT

The convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis will be held in Detroit, Mich., June 26 to July 1, Dr. H. G. Enelow, president, announced. The Executive Board will meet June 25. Sessions will be held at the Hotel Statler.

Papers on the forty years' history of the C. C. A. R. and its future prospects will be read. There will also be papers on Moses Mendelssohn and Lessing, in honor of the bi-centenary of their birth. A religious education day program will be devoted to a survey of the religious schools in American Jewish Reform congregations during the past four decades, with an appraisal of their present work and worth.

There will also be a paper on recent excavations in Palestine. The Friday evening lecture will be given by Dr. Samuel Goldenson, while the sermon on Saturday morning will be preached by Dr. David Philipson, who took part in the meeting at which the C. C. A. R. was organized in Detroit forty years ago.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN TRANSFERRED TO NEW YORK Sessions to Take Place Here on Original Dates—May 11-12

The United Jewish Campaign Conference, scheduled to take place in Chicago May 11 and 12, will be held in New York at the Hotel Biltmore on that date. Announcement of the change was made by David A. Brown, national chairman.

In explaining the reason for transferring the conference from Chicago to New York, Mr. Brown declared: "No national conference of the United Jewish Campaign or the Joint Distribution Committee has ever been held in New York City, and the request both from east and west that this conference be held in New York, has been almost universal."

"In addition, the leaders of New York Jewry, who for many years have travelled long distances to attend these conferences, made it clear to us that New York City was fully entitled to the honor of having this conference called in this great city, and they have promised to lay aside all other social and business engagements and give themselves entirely to the delegates who will be in attendance at the conference."

"At a special meeting of the officers of the above organizations, it was decided to heed the request of so large a number, even at some inconvenience and slight embarrassment to ourselves. COUZENS \$10,000,000 CHILDREN'S FUND INSPIRED BY JULIUS ROSENWALD

Dr. Hugo Freund Named President of Foundation

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, Mich., Apr. 26—Senator James Couzens has chosen Dr. Hugo A. Freund, his personal physician and friend, as president of the foundation for the expenditure of a fund of \$17,500,000—\$10,000,000 principal and \$7,500,000 interest for the benefit of Michigan children.

"The idea of limiting operation of the trust to 25 years I first derived from a conversation with Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago," said Senator Couzens. "Mr. Rosenwald has followed this same course in instituting charities totalling approximately \$22,000,000. His thought that particularly appealed to me was that no one is capable of knowing the needs of the future generations and that these generations can be relied upon to provide for their own needs as they may arise."

ANTI-PASSOVER CAMPAIGNS IN RUSSIAN CENTERS BUT THE MOSCOW SYNAGOGUES FILLED "Who Does Not Come to Work on Passover Is Helping Our Political Enemies," "Emes" Headline

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 26—"Who does not come to work on Passover is helping our political enemies" read a headline across the front page of the Moscow Yiddish daily, "Emes," on the eve of Passover.

Notwithstanding the tremendous anti-Passover campaign, which was unparalleled since the outbreak of the revolution, it was declared here, the Moscow synagogues were crowded on the first two days of the festival. The Communists called mass meetings and arranged demonstrations in various centers of Jewish population. So-called "Proletarian sederim" were arranged in Moscow by the Jewish communists. Demonstrations are reported from Charkoff and Kiev, where the demonstrators carried banners urging the Jewish population to "fight the Jewish religion." No clashes occurred in any of these cities. A demonstration of a similar character took place in Tolchin in which fifteen hundred participated.

CARDINAL HAYES DELINES TO COMMENT ON PASSION PLAY

An inquiry directed by the Jewish Daily Bulletin to His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, for his opinion in the contemplated Passion Play production and the objections raised against it both from a Jewish and Christian point of view, brought forth the reply that the Cardinal does not "comment through the press on matters such as you suggest."

J. Francis A. McIntyre, assistant secretary, added that it is "needless to say the Cardinal has taken no interest whatever in the presentation of the Passion Play."

The current issue of the "American Hebrew" quotes the opinions of Bishop McConnell, Father Duffy and Dr. John Haynes Holmes, who deplore the presentation of the Passion Play, as leading to misunderstanding.

The same issue quotes Dr. Stephen S. Wise as declaring that he has, through the American Jewish Congress, joined Louis Marshall in registering a protest against the presentation.

Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, joined in the protest launched by Mr. Marshall and stated that if Gest and Belasco persist in their production of the Passion Play they will "produce a play on passions."

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13 REPRESENTATIVES LAID FOUNDATION STONES FOR J.N.F. JERUSALEM BUILDING

Corresponding to 13 Tribes, 13 Corner-
stones Laid

Jerusalem, Apr. 26.—Thirteen representatives of Jewish organizations and bodies, including many distinguished visitors now in Palestine for the Passover holiday, laid thirteen foundation stones for a new building in Jerusalem which is to be the headquarters of the Jewish National Fund, the Zionist land purchasing agency.

Corresponding to the thirteen tribes of Israel, thirteen stones were laid for the building which will be completed within twelve months, it was declared.

The participants were M. Ussishkin and Col. Frederick Kisch in behalf of the Zionist Executive; Dr. Joshua Thon for the Keneseth Israel; Leib Jaffe representing the Keren Hayesod; Mr. Frank for the Pica, Felix M. Warburg on behalf of the Joint Distribution Committee, Louis Lipsky on behalf of the Zionist Organization of America, Moses Gelber of Toronto on behalf of the Canadian Zionist Federation, Joseph Meyuhah for the Jerusalem Jewish community, Hillel H' Cohen for Tel Aviv, Eliezer Yoffe for the Zionist settlements, Mr. Suchavitzki on behalf of the Jewish farmers, and Dr. Judah L. Magnes on behalf of the Hebrew University.

Anthony W. Ivins, aged member of the First Presidency of the Mormon or Latter-day Saint Church, and second in authority to President Heber J. Grant, was one of the speakers at the Temple B'nai B'rith Israel on Friday night. Another speaker was the local Unitarian minister, Rev. R. B. Hunt. The Temple was remodeled and renovated.

The dedicatory services were in honor of two Utah pioneers of the Jewish faith, Ischel Waters and Watters. Herbert M. Shiller made a presentation address in behalf of the building committee, and Charles Ottenheimer, president of the Congregation B'nai Israel, made the Hebrew speech. Addresses were also delivered by Rabbi Samuel H. Gordon of Congregation B'nai Israel, and Rabbi J. E. Krinkstein of Congregation Montefiore.

SEPHARDIC CONGREGATIONS IN U. S. FORM UNION

A Union of Sephardic Congregations for the promotion of religious interests of Sephardic Jews was formed at a conference held at the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue, New York. It was estimated that there are at least 40,000 Sephardim in the United States, besides a number in Canada, Mexico and other parts of the continent.

Among the immediate tasks which the Union has set itself are those of training or providing adequate Chazanim for the Sephardic congregations, the provision of trained Sephardic rabbis, and a uniform Sephardic prayer book.

TEACHERS' ORGANIZATION TO HOLD CONVENTION

The second annual convention of the National Association of Hebrew Teachers and Principals of America will be held April 27-28 at the Hias Building, New York City.

Dr. David Yellin of Palestine and Dr. Nissan Touroff of New York, will speak on the status of Hebrew education in Palestine and in the United States.

Delegates are expected from the principal cities of the United States and Canada.

The first conference of representatives of Hebrew Teachers Training Schools will be held in New York, April 28 and 29 at Temple Avah Chesed. The National Council for Jewish Education is calling the conference.

The following schools will send delegates: Baltimore Hebrew College, Boston Hebrew Teachers College, Chicago College for Jewish Studies, New York Teachers Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary and the Teachers Institute of the Yeshiva College, Gratz College, Philadelphia, and Pittsburgh Hebrew Teachers Training School.

The purpose of the conference will be to discuss the establishment of uniform minimum standards to be applied to all Hebrew Teachers Training Schools of the country.

X. M. H. A's, Y. W. H. A's and Jewish Community Centers of the United States are planning programs in celebration of Mother's Day on Sunday, May 12th.

In many associations, "Mother and Daughter Banters" and "Parents' Nights" will be arranged.

A bulletin has been issued by the Jewish Welfare Board for the observance of Mother's Day, with program material.

STRAUS HEALTH CENTER TO BE DEDICATED TUESDAY

The Nathan and Lina Straus Health Center in Jerusalem, Palestine's first modern institution for preventive medicine and health education, will be dedicated on Tuesday April 30, Hadassah, Women's Zionist Organization of America, announced. The date was changed from May 2.

An exhibit illustrating the work of Hadassah in Palestine will be part of the ceremony.

The seventh annual convention of Junior Hadassah, the younger branch of the Women's Zionist Organization of America, will be held at the Hotel Statler, Detroit, on July 2, 3 and 4, according to an announcement from the national headquarters of the organization in New York. Miss Flora Snyder, national president, will open the convention.

Three hundred delegates from 80 cities, representing 10,000 members, are expected. Among the guests will be Miss Alice Seligsberg, of New York, and Mrs. A. H. Vixman, of Pittsburgh, senior advisers of Junior Hadassah.

CHANIN BROTHERS PLAN \$16,000,000 HOTEL IN N. Y.

The Chanin brothers, Irwin S. and Henry I., who started their operations in the building industry ten years ago with the erection of a \$7,000 frame house in Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, purchased the Hotel Majestic, Central Park West, to be replaced by a forty-five story hotel to cost \$16,000,000.

The Chanin brothers have been instrumental during the past ten years in the erection of \$80,000,000 worth of new buildings in New York City. Fifty million dollars worth of construction has been completed by them in the Times Square and Grand Central zones during the past four years. Their \$15,000,000 office building at 42nd Street and Lexington Avenue was opened last January. Six theatres in the Times Square district, including the Roxy Theatre, were completed by them. Irving S. Chanin is 36 years old and his brother 34.

LUNCHEON TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY LAWYERS GROUP

Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo, Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals and Prof. Nathan Isaacs of the Harvard Law School will speak on "Jewish Law in Modern Civilization" at a luncheon at the Hotel Astor on May 4.

The luncheon is being arranged by the Lawyers' Committee which was formed to create and maintain a Department of Jurisprudence at the Hebrew University in Palestine under the sponsorship of Jewish lawyers practicing in the United States. It is intended to provide necessary professorships and an extensive legal library for research work and for the development of a modern system of jurisprudence based on historic Hebrew sources. Max Levy of No. 250 West 57th Street, is chairman of the committee and Louis Lande is secretary.

WEIZMANN SEES HIGH COMMISSIONER; ASKS FOR IMMIGRATION INCREASE

Zionist Executive Demands 2,000 Certificates for Workers
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 26—An increase in the immigration quotas for Chaluzim and Jewish workers was requested of the High Commissioner by Dr. Chaim Weizmann who called on Sir John Chancellor on the eve of Passover.

The Zionist leader demanded that Jewish labor be employed in the government works.

Jerusalem, Apr. 26—Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, stated to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on arrival here that the improved economic conditions in the country warrant the Zionist Executive to demand a greater number of certificates for the admittance of Chaluzim.

The present visit of Felix M. Warburg to Palestine brings him and his associates to a closer understanding of the Zionist problems and methods. The Zionist Executive is demanding over 2,000 certificates for workers from April to September of this year.

X-RAY INSTITUTE IS OPENED IN JERUSALEM

Jerusalem, Apr. 26—A Roentgen X-Ray Institute was opened yesterday in the government hospital at Jerusalem. The High Commissioner, who delivered an address at the exercises, praised the generosity of Mr. Loesch of Chicago who donated the amount needed for the institute. Its equipment amounts to \$10,000.

ADOLPH WEISMANN, GERMAN MUSIC CRITIC, DIES IN HAIFA

Haifa, Apr. 26—Adolph Weissmann, well known German music critic, died here yesterday of heart failure.

Mr. Weissmann arrived in Palestine last week from Berlin. Several days before his death he delivered a lecture at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem on modern music.

Bruno Eisner, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Herman Struck and Professor Schorr delivered eulogies at the funeral, which was held in Jerusalem.

Judaism as Described by U. S. Census Bureau

Washington, Apr. 26—The Jewish religion is a way of life and has no formulated creed or articles of faith the acceptance of which brings redemption or salvation to the believer or divergence from which involves separation from the Jewish congregation, according to a summary exposition of the doctrines of the Jewish religion contained in a 24-page closely printed report just issued by the Census Bureau of the Department of Commerce.

The fundamental doctrines of the Jewish religion are enumerated as the unity of God, the unity and brotherhood of the human family in its descent from man created in God's own image, born free, with the ability of choosing between good and evil. The perfection of humanity through the unfolding of the divine powers in man as the aim of history, the goal of which is the Messianic era, when a divine kingdom of truth and righteousness will be established on this earth. This era will usher in a social order of human perfection and bliss, of peace without end, when none shall hurt or destroy and when the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord. As a definite part of this conception, the Jews are regarded as a unique people that shall never cease from being a nation before the Lord forever.

It is not claimed that this people is better than others or that it possesses a special share of the divine love, but the People of Israel have been selected as a society of priests and a holy nation chosen from all peoples to proclaim the unity of God and to worship Him. Because of Israel's selection from among the peoples, they have been judged more severely by God. Therefore, for their iniquities, they have been dispersed and have suffered, but in the end will be restored unto the Land of Israel. In support of this there is cited Amos and also Deuteronomy: "If any of thine that are dispersed be in the uttermost parts of heaven, from thence will the Lord thy God gather thee and from thence will he fetch thee." This restoration will be not merely to compensate the people for all its sufferings, "but to enable Israel, unhampered by unfriendly environment, to carry on its work as an exemplary nation." The glory of God itself, it is sometimes declared, will be the power that will perfect the world as the Kingdom of God. At other times it is taught that the agent will be the Messiah and again it is asserted that it will be Israel.

These principles are thus summarized: The choice of Israel, its imperishability and restoration, and the blessed future that awaits mankind, whether the immediate agent for its accomplishment be the Messiah, or God's glory itself, or the people of

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PROFESSOR EINSTEIN DECLARES HIS FAITH IN SPINOZA'S GOD

Sends Answer to Cabled Inquiry from New York Rabbi

Albert Einstein, the famous scientist and author of the relativity theory, whose theories were recently attacked by Cardinal O'Connell as leading toward atheism, declared his faith in God in reply to a cabled inquiry from a New York rabbi.

The rabbi, Herbert G. Goldstein of the Institutional Synagogue, cabled to the famous scientist: "Do you believe in God?" He was anxious, the Rabbi declared, to refute the Cardinal's charge. In reply he received the following cablegram from Professor Einstein in German:

"Ich glaube an Spinozas Gott der sich in gesetzlicher Harmonie des Seienden offenbart, nicht an Gott der Sich mit Schicksalen und Handlungen der Menschen abgibt." (I believe in Spinoza's God who reveals Himself in the orderly harmony of what exists, not in a God who concerns Himself with fates and actions of human beings.)

RITUAL MURDER AGITATION SCARES POPULATION

Warsaw, Apr. 26—A ritual murder agitation which caused disturbance for a while was checked in the village Vashnikov near Bialystok.

On the eve of Passover a Christian boy who was employed in a matzoth bakery started to run along the street crying: "The Jewish baker tried to extract blood for his matzoth baking." Immediately the streets were filled with a mob which prepared to storm the bakery.

The police investigating the charge found that the boy's face had been smeared with tar by his employer as a joke. The police officials explained the facts to the excited mob and ordered dispersal.

Prague, Apr. 26—The disappearance of three peasant boys caused great anxiety to the Jewish population in Carpatho-Russian villages.

The boys, Andreas Beres, Ivan Ivanik and Michael Voni, all between 14 and 16 years old, have been missing since April 15. The old libelous rumors were again set on foot that the Jews kidnapped the boys for ritual purposes.

EINSTEIN FINALLY GETS GIFT FROM BERLIN MUNICIPALITY

Berlin, Apr. 26—The embarrassment in which the Berlin City Council placed itself by offering a house which had been leased for five years to Prof. Albert Einstein on the occasion of his fiftieth birthday was ended by the City Fathers yesterday.

The City Council now presented the famous scientist with a piece of land near Lake Kaputh, where Prof. Einstein will build a small house for himself at his own expense.

DETROIT TO CONTINUE U. P. A. CAMPAIGN

Detroit, Apr. 26.—The United Palestine Appeal will continue for a number of days to enable the workers to canvass prospective pledgers and thus to make it possible for the Detroit committee to reach its \$100,000 goal.

This announcement was made Sunday evening at what was to have been the closing dinner of the drive.

A report circulated among the guests at the dinner on Sunday showed \$55,382 raised among 722 pledgers. By adding to this the sum of \$13,500 raised by Hadassah at its \$25-a-plate luncheon, the sum raised toward the \$100,000 quota was reported to be \$68,882.

Abraham Cooper is chairman of the drive. Fred M. Butzel was toastmaster of the evening. Jacob Billikopf of Philadelphia, the speaker of the evening, informed his audience that in Detroit address marked his debut in behalf of the rebuilding of Palestine. 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Israel itself. Another doctrine of Judaism is obedience to the Torah, the Law, the emphasis being not on belief but on righteous conduct. The Torah, written and oral, preeminently emphasizes the principle of justice. Other principles stressed are purity and truth, optimism and hope, joy and thanksgiving, holiness and the love of God.

Righteousness and compassionate love are demanded for the fatherless, the widow, the oppressed, the stranger and even the criminal. Charity is Zedakah, justice to the needy, and compassion is required even for the dumb animal. Other fundamental teachings are freedom of will and human responsibility, divine providence, resurrection, immortality of the soul, resurrection of the dead, the power of repentance and of prayer, the need of study and education, and sanctification of labor.

Discussing the attitude of the Jewish religion toward the Gentile world, it is stated that although the Jewish faith brooks no compromise with other faiths, the Jewish religion, unlike other creeds, does not consign an unbeliever to eternal doom, for a man is not judged by creed but by deeds, inasmuch as it is taught that the righteous of all nations have a share in the world to come. While once the Jews carried on an extensive proselytizing propaganda, these activities have since been neglected. The Jewish religion enjoins application of one law for Jew and non-Jew.

The summary closes with a description of the varied forms of organized Jewish activity in the United States, mentioning all principal organizations and epitomizing the results achieved by them. Reference is made to the fact that the Jew's interest in Palestine is universal and age-old, and mentions the deepening of this interest by the issuance of the Balfour Declaration of 1917 pledging the support of the British government toward the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, the awarding of the Mandate for Palestine by the League of Nations, and the adoption of the deepening of this interest by 1922 favoring the Jewish Homeland.

The amount of \$15,555,519 has been raised by the Zionist movement through the Palestine Restoration Fund, the Palestine Foundation Fund and the United Palestine Appeal, from July 1918 to the end of 1926, and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee distributed \$67,360,000 between October 1914 and the end of 1926 for the relief of Jewish and also non-Jewish war sufferers and of Jewish pogrom victims in Russia, Poland, Roumania and 30 other countries, according to the summary.

An appeal to the Jews of America to remember during the celebration of Passover the hundreds of thousands of their co-religionists who are in want, was made by David A. Brown, National Chairman of the United Jewish Campaign.

In his Passover message, he appealed to the Jews of America to bear in mind the words of the beginning of the Passover service, "Let all who are hungry come and eat," and he called their attention to the plight of their co-religionists who are destitute and starving in many parts of the world, notably Bessarabia, Roumania, Poland, Moldavia and Russia.

SIR FLINDERS PETRIE PLANS NEW EXCAVATIONS

London, Apr. 11.—Sir Flinders Petrie brings his 48 years' experience gained in Egypt to bear on the problems of the Old Testament and on the correlation of the little known Palestinian archaeology with that of Egypt, so much longer studied, Lady Flinders Petrie writes in the "Times," appealing for funds to assist Sir Flinders' researches on the Egyptian border of Palestine. Her appeal is supported in another letter signed by the Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. H. Hertz, the Bishop of London, the Lord Mayor of London, H. G. Wells, and others.

Sir Flinders, Lady Petrie says, hopes to find the headquarters of David's bodyguard, with perhaps the military dispatches and much else that may throw light upon a civilization, of which we have few actual remains. He is at present occupied on a great settlement of Hykso's Age. This is our great opportunity, she proceeds, for epoch-making discoveries in the periods of the Persian and Assyrian conquests, the Biblical Pharaohs, the Jewish Monarchy, the Exodus, and, last but not least, the Patriarchs themselves.

Dr. Mortimer D. Jones, medical superintendent of Kings County Hospital in Brooklyn, N. Y., whose administration was investigated in 1927 on charges that he practiced religious discrimination and was guilty of mismanagement, was ordered to a similar position at the City Hospital on Welfare Island, a smaller institution. Dr. Charles B. Bacon, head of City Hospital, takes over the Brooklyn institution. William Schroeder, Jr., Commissioner of Hospitals, in ordering the transfers, refused to comment on their meaning.

Dr. Jones was relieved of his duties while City officials were investigating charges that three Jewish internes at Kings County Hospital had been beaten up by other internes and that the institution was being mismanaged. He later was reinstated. Several months ago the "Brooklyn Express" and "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" offered to give additional evidence of the latter charge.
