LEADERS AT JERUSALEM MEETING OUTLINE FIRST BUDGET FOR JEWISH AGENCY \$5,000,000 Required; Sixty Per Cent to Be Raised in U. S.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 2-The Palestine work in the first year of the extended Jewish Agency, which is soon to be consummated, will require the expenditure of one million pounds, approxi-mately five million dollars, according to an outline agreed upon at a meeting of the Zionist Executive here with the participation of Felix M. Warburg, Dr. Chaim Weizmann and Julius Simon. This sum was agreed upon in ac-

cordance with the recommendations of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission. The meeting elicited the understanding that the American leaders of the Agency will be prepared to undertake to raise the American quota of the general sum, which will amount to about sixty per cent.

1 KILLED, MANY WOUNDED IN ANTI-JEWISH ATTACK IN LITHUANIAN TOWN

Berlin Hears of Pogrom Perpetrated by Lithuanian Fascisti · (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 2-One Jew was murdered and many received serious wounds in an attack made on the Jew-ish population of Newi, a township near Kovno, a report received here to-

day states.

The Jewish population of the township consists of seventeen families, who were the victims of an armed band of Lithuanian Fascists. The pogrom last-ed five hours and was attended by gruesome scenes, the report states. David Schliachtil, 40, was killed and a half of the Jewish population of the township wounded. Schliachtil was killed when he attempted to protect his wife. Even the children were not spared. Jewish houses were plundered. The police arrived on the scene after the band had left the town, the report

Jerusalem, May 2—The District Commissioner of Jerusalem directed an order to the Moslem authorities in charge of the property adjacent to the Wailing Wall to cease all building activities in the neighborhood.

FIFTY JEWISH WORKERS INJURED IN WARSAW MAY DAY DEMONSTRATION Belong to Communist Group: Other Organization Marches Quiet

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Warsaw, May 2-With the exception of the Communist May Day demonstration, all other May Day celebrations passed without clashes.

The Communist demonstration was interfered with by the police. This led to a clash with the demonstrators, many of whom were injured, including 50 Jewish workers.

Unlike the May Day celebration of last year, the demonstrations of the Jewish labor parties were unmolested. They demonstrated exclusively in the Jewish quarter of the city. The Polish Socialist parties marched separately. Separate demonstrations were also held by the Jewish socialist parties, Bund, Left Poale Zion and Right Poale Zion. The size of these demonstrations was The size of these demonstrations was about one-fourth of the number of par-ticipants last year. Two reasons were given for the smaller number, first, that May Day occurred during the Passover week when many of the workers from the provinces return home and second, because the memory of last year's bloody clashes is still fresh.

The synagogues in the city arranged for early holiday services so that the worshippers might return home before the street demonstrations were scheduled to begin.

Authorities' Intervention on Basis of New York Law Does Not Materialize: Christian Clergy Silent as Jewish Press

Continues Protest

The expected intervention of the crucifixion scene, jeering and mocking New York District Attorney, on the The priests connive to bring about the basis of Section 2074 of the New York Nazarene's death as the "enemy of the Penal Law, prohibiting the personification of the Deity of any religion, to prevent the presentation of the Freiburg Passion Play at the Hippodrome. did not materialize and the production, sponsored by Morris Gest and David Belasco, is proceeding since the opening on Monday night.

The first night audience and the critics of the metropolitan dailies, to whom Morris Gest left the judgment as to whether or not it is offensive to Jews and likely to arouse religious and racial prejudice, ignoring Louis Marsall's protest, received the presentation with anything but enthusiasm. The opinions expressed by the theatrical critics on the artistic aspect of the presentation ranges from "disappointing" to "showing need of good acting." Emphasis is laid on the lavishness of the production, but not infrequently too much stagecraft, employed by Belasco in the presentation, is described as minimizing the religious character of the play. All are unanimous that the play did not inspire religious fervor in devout Christians witnessing it, in con-trast to the influence of the Passion Play when enacted in its natural settings in Freiburg or at Oberammagau.

None of the reviewers, however, dwelt on the social side of the question aroused by the Passion Play production at the Hippodrome. No reference was made to the fear expressed that it may revive the ancient religious prejudices which have proven to be so fatal in the history of the Jewish people and in the Christian-Jewish relations for the past nineteen hundred vears

The Passion Play as presented by the Freiburg players at the Hippodrome is distinctly a heightened version of the ancient charges which gave rise to the cry of "Christ killers." It is distinctly anti-Jewish, without any redeeming feature. It follows closely the Gospel according to St. John, the least historically correct and the one Gospel which is self-evidently directed toward accusing the Jews of that time and toward white-washing the Romans. Two of the features of the Hippodrome Passion Play are most striking. The trial, which is the crux of the entire story, is forced upon the public four times in four different scenes, in a manner contrary to all historic knowledge. The founder of the Christian religion is made to appear once before the Synhedrin, twice before Pontias Pilate and once before Herod, a point added on the basis of an uncorroborated source to show the unwillingness of the Roman authorities to sanction the crucifixion and the insistence of the Jewish leaders of that time to accomplish their ends. The High Priest is made to appear at the!

synagogue." The founder of Christianity and the apostles are portrayed as blond in contrast to the priests and the people who are thoroughly brunette. Judas, of course, is the blackest of the black. Some of the characters, particularly Dathan, the conniving priest, is made up in a manner resembling the caricatures employed in anti-Semitic journals in reference to Oriental and East European Jews. priests, not the Roman soldiers compel Jesus to carry the cross, driving him on. Pilate, in washing his hands, lays responsibility on "you and your children," addressing himself to the The crucifixion scene is prolonged to

an unbearable extent. Every detail has been elaborated upon with a stark reality that cannot claim the excuse of The hammering of the nails resounds through the huge hall on the ears of a 6,000 strong audience.

While the Jewish press of New York city unanimously condemns the presentation and sharply criticizes Messrs. Gest and Belasco, the metropolitan press pay no attention to these protests. The Yiddish press, including the Socialist Labor daily, "Forward," is ourspoken in its criticism after the first night, although before some voices were heard in the "Forward" and the "Day," doubting the advisibility of in-terfering with the freedom of the stage. The "Day" quoted a statement by Mr.

Marshall given in an interview with a representative of that paper that "it would be sad if Jews alone would protest against this production. I expect to hear what our Christian friends have to say. I am sure they will not remain silent. The protest must be a general American one because it is an offense not only against Jews but against America. Naturally we Jews feel it most, since the Gests are, to our pain and shame, ours."

MAY DAY CLASHES IN KOVNO AND VILNA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Kovno, May 2-Notwithstanding the

order of the authorities against May Day demonstrations, a workmen's demonstration was held in the city, leading to a clash with the police. The authorities charged that the demonstrators were Communists and fired at the crowd. Several were killed and many wounded, including a number of Jews.

Vilna. May 2-Two were killed and many injured, including three policemen, as the result of a clash between the police and the May first demonstators. The clash occurred at Town Hall Square. Among those injured are many Jews.

LITTLE ENTENTE, POLAND AND GREECE, PROTEST MINORITIES PETITION PROCEDURE CHANGE League Committee of Three Meets in

London; Proceedings Secret (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 2-The Committee of Three, appointed by the Council of the League of Nations to consider the recently presented proposal for a change in the procedure of the submission of complaints by the national minorities. met here today in order to discuss the problem. The Committee consists of Sir Austin Chamberlain, Senor Qui-nones, and De Leon Adachi.

Neither the proceedings of the meeting and the memoranda submitted to the Committee by the powers of the Little Entente and governments of Poland and Greece were made public. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns on good authority, however, that the memoranda identically constructed, challenge in strong terms the proposal put forward by Senator Dandurand of Ottawa and amended by German Foreign Minister Stresemann for making easier the access of the national minorities to the League of Nations in submitting their complaints.

The memoranda declare that the governments of the countries which have accepted the stipulations for the protection of the national minorities were prepared to grant these minorities complete equality of treatment similar to that of their other nationals. How-ever, they are reluctant, quite legitimately they declare to agree to the new proposals since they hold it to be inconsistent with the principle of equality when they are asked to assume obligations which are not accepted by all other powers. They also feel, they contend, that such a step would be prejudicial to the establishment of interial tranquility which is the primary condition for consolidation of the sitution created by the peace treaties.

The memoranda of the Little Entente powers further contend that the promise of their territorial integrity, once guaranteed, has never been given. Under the circumstances, the least they can demand is that the obligations in regard to the minorities be construed in a most restricted sense without being extended, even indirectly, in their application. The memoranda go further than that. They challenge the authority of the Committee of Three to decide on the matter, arguing that the Council of the League of Nations has merely adopted the rules of procedure based on the legitimate aim of the clauses for the protection of the minorities, but which, nonetheless, exceed obligations laid down in the treaties.

These rules cannot therefore be in-troduced without the consent of the countries concerned. The governments of Poland and Greece declare, therefore, that under the circumstances they cannot accept the proposals of the representatives of Canada and Germany.

COLONIAL OFFICE INFORMS PARLIAMENT OF DEAD SEA GRANT TO NOVOMEJSKY AND TULLOCH

Submits White Paper on Subject, Giving Details of Project; Fabulous Amount of Gold Contained in Deposits. French Scientist Says

details and the arrangements made by the Colonial Office for the granting of the concession to exploit the minerals of the Dead Sea in Palestine to Engineer Moses Novomejsky and Major Pulloch, who were found the most suitable tenderers for the project.

In a White Paper submitted by the

Colonial Office the plan is described and the names of those who will financially back the project are given. Novomejsky and Tulloch will operate the concession through a special Dead the concession through a special Dead Sea company which has the support of four private London companies, the Palestine Economic Corporation of New York and the Jewish Colonial Trust of London. The Russo-Asiatic Consolidated Company, Ltd., is one of the four London companies cooper-ating. The Earl of Lytton will be the chairman of the company which will operate the concession.

It is further understood that it is the intention of Engineer Novomejsky and Major Tulloch, in agreement with their financial supporters, that the new company's articles of association contain a provision to the effect that the chairman of the board of directors must always be a British subicct and that British subjects or British subjects and Palestinian subjects should always form the majority in the board

of directors of the company.

Speaking today in the House of Commons during the discussion on the Palestine-Transjordania estimates, Colonial Secretary Amery, referring to the White Paper on the Dead Sea, stated that the Dead Sea region contains vast quantities of minerals. Whether these minerals could be extracted to yield commercial profit is uncertain, but the governments of Palestine and Transjordania have carried on negotiations which resulted in a practical conclusion satisfactory to both sides.

Paris, May 2-That the Dead Sea is a fabulously rich gold mine was the assertion made today by the French scientist, Georges Claude, writing in the "Revue Animateur des Temps Nouveaux" Prof. Claude states that in October 1922 he called on Raymond Poincare, explaining to him that sea water contains small quantities of gold, in a measure, however, insufficient to make its extraction profitable. The content of gold and chemicals in the waters of the Dea Sea is forty times greater the usual sea water and their extraction is, therefore, highly profitable, he declared. Prof. Claude estimated that the actual gold content of the Dead Sea is ten milliard pounds and that at least one-third of it could be extracted within the next fifteen years.

RULES TELEGRAPH OFFI-CIALS NOT OBLIGED TO ACCEPT HEBREW SCRIPT High Court Dismisses Case of Tel Aviv Resident Against Postmaster

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, May 2—Though Hebrew is recognized as one of the three official languages of the mandated territory of Palestine, the acceptance of telegrams in Hebrew script is not obligatory upon the Palestine postal authorities, according to the ruling of the Palestine High Court.

The High Court dismissed the case of a Tel Aviv resident against the postmaster for refusing to accept a Hebrew message written in Hebrew characters. He demanded that the message be rewritten in Latin characters The court declared that Hobrew in Latin characters is also Hebrew, as English in the Morse code remains English. The counsel for the Tel Aviv resident argued that if Arab telegrams are accepted in Arabic characters, while Hebrew telegrams are not accepted in Hebrew characters, discrimination exists.

EXECUTE FLOGGING SEN-TENCE ON JACK NAFTE (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Pretoria, South Africa, May 2-The sentence imposed by Judge Saul Solomon on Jack Nafte, South African mon on Jack Natic, South African Jewish farmer, of ten lashes, was exe-cuted today. Nafte was sentenced to seven years imprisonment and ten lashes for flogging to death a native, found guilty of insulting a white woman

The flogging sentence, the first to be executed against a white man, aroused wide opposition throughout South Africa and was the subject of an ap-peal to the superior court. The court declined to set aside the flogging sen-

SERVANT GIRL TAKES GAS; MEMEL JEWS ACCUSED OF RITUAL MURDER

Population in Panic, Vienna Corresnondent Reports

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Memel, Lithuania, May 2-The Free City of Memel, under Lithuanian administration, was greatly agitated be-cause of a ritual murder accusation sponsored by the local district attorney,

Tostaendte On April 6 a Christian servant girl employed by the Jewish merchant Schochar was found dead in a gas filled room. Although a physician estab-lished that the girl died as a result of inhaling gas, the local anti-Semites started a ritual murder agitation, accusing Schochar of having killed the girl for Passover. Schochar was arrested and his entire family was subjected to a severe cross-examination. Even his seven-year old daughter was questioned as to whether the servant was killed for Passover. Schochar is still under arrest

Vienna, May 2-A special correspondent, sent to Memel by the leading Vienna newspaper, "Neue Freie Pres-se," describes the state of mind of the Memel population as resembling that of inmates in an insane asylum, as a result of the ritual murder agitation.

During the entire Passover week the
Jewish population lived in fear and panic. The Iewish residents were afraid to leave their homes. Many Jewish families who employ Christian servant girls sent them away on free vacations, paying their hotel expenses, to prevent any further possibility of unfounded charges being made against them in case something happened to the girls.

The agitation over the ritual murder charge has even extended to the so-called enlightened Christian families in Memel. In these circles, German speaking, the opinion was current that (Continued on Page 8)

CELEBRATE COMPLETION OF THE WOLFFSOHN LIBRARY IN JERUSALEM

Reception to Celebrate Occasion; Formal Dedication in June

A reception marking the completion of the Wolffsohn Memorial Library of the Hebrew University was held in Jerusalem on Monday afternoon, the

American Advisory Committee of the Hebrew University announced. Among the distinguished American visitors present at the reception in the large reading room of the Library were Felix M. Warburg, member of the Board of Governors of the Hebrew University and chairman of the American Advisory Committee, and Dr. Cyrus Adler of Philadelphia. Other notables present were Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, Norman Bentwich. Attorney-General of Palestine and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the Zionist Organization.

After the reception, the building was thrown open for inspection. concert by the Jerusalem Music Society was held in the Open Air Theatre of the University, which has been built as a memorial to his wife by Samuel Untermyer of New York.

Due to the delay in the arrival of book-stacks, ordered from Germany, book-stacks, ordered non-dermaly, the building will not be formally dedicated until June, 1929. At that time the collection of books, comprising over 200,000 volumes, will be gathered on Mount Scopus in the new building. The collection has hitherto been housed in four buildings in Jerusalem, one of which will be retained under University auspices as the City Library.

The American Advisory Committee celebrated the opening of the Library in a series of meetings and addresses. Dr. John Haynes Holmes, Pastor of the Community Church of New York, and James Waterman Wise, Executive Secretary of the Avukah Organization. delivered radio addresses on the Hebrew University and the new library over WMCA.

MINNESOTA PASSES KOSHER FOOD BILL (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Minneapolis, Minn., May 2-A Kosher food products bill, modelled after the New York state law, was passed by the Minnesota State legislature.

12 CONSTANTINOPLE JEWS WILL AGAIN BE TRIED FOR NIEGO DEMONSTRATION

Date of Trial Set for May 28; Charged with Offense Against Turkism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Constantinople, May 2-Twelve Turkish Jews who were arrested and released and later tried and acquitted for participation in a demonstration at the funeral of the Jewish girl Elsa Niego, murdered two years ago by a prominent Turkish officer, Osman Bey, will again face trial on May 28.

The charge brought against the prominent Constantinople citizens is anti-Turkish feeling.

The twelve were among a group who were stricken by grief at the untimely death of the young Jewish girl who was murdered by Osman Bey because she repulsed his attentions. Osman Bey was released as irresponsible.

When first arrested they were tried before a local tribunal. The general prosecutor renewed the case before the Court of Appeals, which has now confirmed the decision of the tribunal to acquit them of the charge. The prose-cutor, however, has now brought the case before the first Court of Appeals of Constantinople demanding "a satisfactory sentence for offense against Turkism."

BILL TO STOP IMMIGRATION 5 YEARS IS BEFORE SENATE

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., May, 2-A bill to suspend all immigration to the United States for a period of five years was introduced into the Senate by Senator Black of Alabama who declared his intention of proposing this measure as a substitute amendment to any bill to repeal the national origins clause of the immigration act which would come before the Senate.

Senator Black declared himself strongly in favor of the national origins clause and indicated he would vigorously support it, as the next best thing if his own bill was lost.

Congressman Cable of Ohio intro-duced a bill into the House to investigate propaganda to influence immigra-tion legislation. This bill was referred to the Rules Committee in view of the fact that the House Immigration Committee is not yet functioning during the present extra session of Congress.

HONOR CHICAGO SANITARIUM HEAD

Certificates will be issued by the railroad companies, beginning on or before May 6th to 8th, depending on the distance from New York, to all delegates who will apply for them. Delegates will pay the full one-way fare at the time of application. The certificates will be validated in New York City, provided 150 certificates are presented. The return trip certificates will be good until and including May 15th.

Delegates are urged to avail themsclves of this one-and-a-half fare arrangement and when asking for cer-tificates to specify the name of the "Joint Distribution Committee." This arrangement to use the name of only one of the organizations was neces-sitated to save time in making the change in meeting place from Chicago to New York.

All the sessions will be held at the Hotel Biltmore, 43rd St. and Madison Ave. The first session will begin at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, May 11th. The Sunday session will begin at 10 o'clock. Luncheon will be served at 1 o'clock, after which the conference will resume.

HIGH COMMISSIONER DEDICATES STRAUS HEALTH CENTER IN JERUSALEM Structure Erected at Cost of \$250.000: Institution to be Non-sectarian

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, May 2-The Straus Health Center, a non-sectarian institution for medical aid and advice for the population of Jerusalem, was dedicated here today by Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine. Miss Henrietta Szold, formerly of New York and honorary president of Hadassah, American women's Zionist Ordassah, American women's Zionist Or-ganization, which is carrying on health work in Palestine and to which the center was given by Mr. Nathan Straus, presided at the exercises. The Mayor of Jerusalem followed the High Commissioner in praising the

generosity of the American philanthro-pist and his aid to the health work. Miss Szold reviewed the work of the American Jewish women's organiza-tion in Palestine during the past ten years and declared that the Hadassah is greatly indebted to Nathan and Lina Straus, "This health center crowns their humanitarian efforts," she crowns their humanitarian efforts, she declared. The cornerstone for the structure, involving an expenditure of \$250,000 was laid on March 2, 1927, when Nathan Straus, then in his eightieft year, visited Palestine.

The Rev. John Haynes Holmes of the New York Community Church,

who visited Palestine recently, was among the many prominent personalities from whom messages were received. Greetings were cabled to Mr. and Mrs. Straus at the close of the exercises.

The health exhibit showing the work of the Hadassah in Palestine was opened in the new building which was thrown open for the public's inspection.

The Jewish Fraternity Issue at Brown University; Corporation to Decide: Pi Lamba Phi Chapter Disbands

Providence, R. I., May 1-The Brown | authorities and the group was for this University corporation must decide whether lewish students may organize a local chapter of Pi Lambda Phi, the national fraternity, which is predomi-nantly Jewish, Harold B. Tanner, counsel for Brown University, has

declared. Mr. Tanuer said that the question can not be decided by an administrative officer following the declaration of Dean Otis E. Randall that Jewish members of Pi Lambda Phi had resigned from the fraternity, and the denial by fraternity members that they had resigned. The members say that they have only given up the charter for a Brown chapter but are still memhers of the national fraternity and wear the pins of the organization.
The disbanding of the chapter was

brought about as the result of the university's stand that a man could not be a member of the chapter and a student at Brown at the same time. Dean Randall contended that this ruling did not constitute a threat of expulsion and said that the men resigned volun-

Because the chapter was formed and the charter was granted without the knowledge of the university, officials said that they demanded that the organization disband.

However, this action does not settle the question whether the fraternity may have a chapter at Brown, or whether any purely sectarian frater-nity may be formed on the hill, ac-cording to Mr. Tanner.

A statement regarding the situation is to be issued at the Pi Lambda Phi headquarters, New York City.

The organization is prominently Jewish in its membership, although not limited to lews. It was founded at Yale and among its first members are Albert Ottinger, Republican can-didate for Governor of New York at the last election: Arthur Garfield Hays, New York lawyer: Jerome Alextrader. New York chemist, and Su-preme Rex of the fraternity: Rev. Henry Mark Fisher of Atlantic City, arbo is a Christian; Louis Anspacher, dramatist; Alfred B. Nathan, New York attorney.

In ruling that the status of the fratermity must be decided by the university corporation, Mr. Tanner said:

"A group of undergraduates in Brown University organized, without the consent or knowledge of the university authorities, a chapter of Pi Lambda Phi. Subsequently representatives of the national organization brought the fact to the attention of the university authorities. The posi-tion taken by these authorities was that on pressp of any nature could be organized in the university without first speking the permission of proper

reason requested to disband."

Stating that the group did disband as a Brown chapter but still holds membership in the national organiza-

tion, Mr. Tanner continued: "The only question that has been settled is that a group organized within the university without the consent of its proper authorities must upon requirement be disbanded as an orga-

"The question of whether there maybe in Brown University a chapter of Pi Lambda Phi-or even a chapter of a sectarian fraternity under proper circumstances of application-has not been settled by any of the above events mentioned. This matter remains to be settled by the corporation of the university and is not in the hands of any administrative office."

There are at present at Brown two distinct cultural groups of Jews, the Menorah Society and the Tower Club. Dean Randall referred specifically to these two organizations as the nucleus for the possible development of a Jewish group which might at some time later become a local chapter of a nonsectarian fraternity.

Archie Smith, president of the Menorah, took exception to this specific reference and to Dean Randall's failure to mention the Psi Club of which Mr. Smith is chancellor.

"The Menorah Society never was a fraternity, never will be, never intends to be and won't become one if they force it on us," Mr. Smith said.

"The present discrimination against Jews is apparent from the fact that Jews constitute about 20 per cent of the student body at Brown, and yet it is almost the only college of its size without a fraternity to membership in which Jews are eligible," Mr. Smith

The question of Jewish fraternities at Brown University was the subject of correspondence last fall between Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, and President W. H. P. Faunce of Brown University.

In a letter to Dr. Faunce, Mr. Marshall said he understood there were at Brown University a number of secret irraternities in which it was impossible for a Jewish student to enter, however meritorious his character and abilities. Excluded because of racial and religious motives, said Mr. Marshall, the Jewish students had no alternative but to establish Jewish fraternities.

While he thought it would be better if there were no secret fraternities of anys kind, Mr. Marshall declared that the fraternity spirit has of late become very strong in university life and it has become the ambition of most students 'o join a fraternity.

BOSTON-CONGREGATIONS ASK JEWISH ATTENDANCE OFFI CER ON SCHOOL COMMISSION

Ten of Largest Congregations Unite for Vigorous Action (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Mass., May 2-A drive to enlist the support of Boston Jewry in petitioning the Boston School Committee to appoint a Jewish attendance officer was launched with the passing of resolutions by the Boston Association of Jewish Congregations, representing ten of the largest congrega-tions, with over 8,000 members. The Boston School Committee was recently accused in open session at a legislative hearing that the present board has ignored the demand of the Jewish community for the appointment of such an officer.

The fight has now been waged for over two years without success. Moses Mishel, president of the Boston Association of Jewish Congregations, and Rabbi Samuel Wolk, secretary, forwarded the resolutions to the school committee. Twenty per cent of the Boston public school children come from Jewish homes, recites the resolution. The Italian section has such an officer, but the board has failed to this date to meet the demands of leading lewish representatives. With the adoption of these resolutions the fight is again to be opened. The leading rabbis of the city, the local B'nai B'rith and other organizations have indorsed the proposal.

Col. Wedgwood, joining Kenworthy, declared that the friendship between England and the United Straes cannot be better cemented than by cementing it with the Jewish people throughout the world. Throughout England and Palestine one notices an atmosphere of hostility toward the Jews, he said, based upon an old religious prejudice. It is necessary to change the attitude of the Palestine administration where there is more anti-Semitism found than in England or America.

The speaker referred to the taxation system now in force in Palestine and particularly to the Werko tax and declared that this system was "mon-strously unjust." He asked whether the Colonial Office will permit the Jewish population of Palestine to gradually grow into a feeling of antagonism and dissatisfaction with the British administration, similar to the one held by the Arab intelligentzia. Is the government endeavoring to unite the Jews and the Arabs and to create a situation similar to the one prevalent in India and Egypt, putting the entire popula-tion of the country against them, instead of maintaining the friendship of the great and growing Jewish people? he asked.

The Labor leader, who is the spon-sor of the Seventh Dominion League, referred to the question of a loan to facilitate the settlement of Jews in Palestine and declared that it is the duty of the British Government to facilitate the floating of such a loan.
If Great Britain has lent money to the

Greek Orthodox Church in Jerusalem on the security of its land possessions in Palestine, why not lend on the same basis to the Jews? he asked. Jewish immigration to Palestine was not contrary to the interests of the Arabs. Indeed, it was the Arabs' salvation, he declared. The speaker further criticized the administration of justice in Palestine and the lack of English educational facilities in the country, declaring that Palestine will be incapable of self-government unless the inhabitants understand English.

Major Ormsby Gore, Under Secretary of the Colonial Office, who replied in behalf of the government, declared that the Zionist policy is enshrined in the Palestine Mandate and is the settled policy of all three parties. The same applies to the Balfour Declaration. He feels certain that any government that may be in power in England will do everything to facilitate the realization of the Zionist spirit, policy and ideal. He was himself a strong and keen Zionist, but for reasons different than those held by Col. Wedgwood, who sees Zionism more in the terms of Dr. Weizmann, who wanted a Palestine "as Jewish as England is English." This term, Ormsby-Gore stated, was perhaps unfortunate and certainly misconstrued in a political sense. However, the Jews strive for a Jewish Palestine, not an English, not a French, nor an American Palestine.

The Under Secretary for the Colonies then gave what might be considered his conception of Zionism. He believes he stated, in Zionism which aims to recreate in Palestine such physical and economic conditions which will enable the Jews, generation after generation, to create in their fatherland a type of poet, thinker who made the Jews once a world contributor to literature thought and religion. Therefore, he stated. Zionism is not dependent or vast numbers but on the quality of the Jews who go there. Therefore, he added. Col. Wedgwood's argument for Therefore, he English education in Palestine was unfounded. The best method to carry out the Zionist idea, he said, is to let the Jews deal with Jewish education and with the Jewish schools. On the other hand, to allow the Arabs to remain absolutely uneducated would be fatal to Jewish interests.

Major Ormsby-Gore took exception to Lieut. Commander Kenworthy's charges against the Palestine administration. Kenworthy's description of the Palestine administration, he said

was unjustified.

PRESIDENT HOOVER LAUDS EUGENE MEYER

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, May 2-Warm appreciation for the work of Eugene Meyer, Farm Loan Commissioner, during the past two years, on the occasion of his resignation from that post, was voiced by President Hoover.

In a letter addressed to Mr. Meyer on April 29, the President wrote:
"My Dear Meyer:

"I have received your letter of April 3, in which you tender you resignation as Federal Farm Loan Commissioner and as a member of the Federal Farm Loan Board.

"In intensely regret that your deci-sion is irrevocable and that, in the circumstances, the duty devolves upon me to accept your resignation.

"I particularly wish to take this opportunity to express the appreciation which all of us hold for the work you have accomplished as Farm Loan Commissioner during the past two years. I know that you undertook the difficult task of reconstruction at a time when the Farm Loan System was confronted with a critical situation and public confidence had been impaired.

"Under your leadership, the administration and supervision of the System has been greatly strengthened, this great institution of service to the farmers has been placed on a sounder basis and public confidence has been materially improved, and will be of lasting benefit to the agriculture interests of

the country. "I am aware that after ten years of public service you unwillingly under-took this additional two years of service, and I can realize your desire to be relieved

"I earnestly wish, however, that you could remain in public service where your high qualifications and sense of public service so respond to public in-terest. "Yours faithfully,
