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## LIFE TOO SHORT TO BOTHER ABOUT GIFT, EINSTEIN TELLS BERLIN CITY FATHERS

City Government Attempts to Persuade Scientist, but He Remains Adamant

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 15—Life, alas, is too short to bother with an honorary gift, whose process of granting is so long, was the caustic reply given by Prof. Albert Einstein to the Berlin city fathers who were still contemplating the making good of their announcement to honor the scientist by presenting him with a gift in behalf of the city on the occasion of his fiftieth birthday which he celebrated on March 14.

The famous scientist, annoyed and irritated at the dissension in the council and the many changes in the form of the gift, wrote a letter to the City Mayor requesting him "to cease all efforts for providing me with a quiet home." This rejection of the gift was final on the part of Prof. Einstein, those close to him declaring that he arrived at this decision with great difficulty, but that he finally was convinced that the honor which the council sought to bestow upon him has turned into a degradation.

When this letter reached the Mayor, members of the Berlin city government attempted to influence the Professor to withdraw his letter, but the scientist categorically declared that his decision was final. The bill of grant, asking for the allotment of 20,000 marks for the purchase of a site to be given to Dr. Einstein, still pending in the council and opposed by the anti-Semitic councillors of the Deutsch-nationale party, was withdrawn.

## BAR JEWS AND HUNGARIANS FROM PHYSICIANS' ASS'N.

Vienna, May 15—Jewish and Hungarian physicians will be excluded from the Physicians' Association at Arad, states a report of the Hungarian Telegraphic Agency.

The newspaper "Apararea Nationale" praises this action of the Roumanian Physicians' Association and urges the population to boycott the excluded physicians who should go, the paper says, "to Palestine and Budapest."

## PARADE AGAINST SCHECHITA IN VIENNA

Vienna, May 15—On the occasion of the opening of the international congress of Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, a demonstration against schechita was staged by the local society.

The demonstrators carried placards bearing slogan, "Fight against the slaughter of animals without stunning."

## MIZRACHI SEES DANGER FOR ITS SCHOOL SYSTEM IN PALESTINE

Bublik Administration Is Re-elected; Agency Welcomed; Insist on Religious Character of Jewish Education in U.S.

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 15—Authorizing a budget of \$38,000 for propaganda and administrative expenditure, including a \$3,000 subsidy to its youth organization, Ha'mizrachi Ha'zair, the fourteenth annual convention of the Miz-rachi re-elected its last year's administration at the closing session Tuesday evening at the Adath Jeshurun Congregation. Gedaliah Bublik was re-elected president, Rabbi Wolf, Brooklyn, and Rabbi Elijah Inselbuch, vice-presidents, and Abraham Cohen, treasurer. Rabbi Meyer Berlin was re-elected honorary president.

An executive committee of twenty-one New Yorkers and five from other cities was chosen. Those elected are Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum, Rabbi Jacob Levinson, Rabbi N. H. Ebin, Rabbi E. Predmesky, Rabbi I. M. Kovalsky, Dr. I. Bluestone, Mr. Samuel Wilner, Baruch Schnur, Mendel Stavisky, Joseph Dauber, H. L. Selig, Mordecai Nadler, Samuel Goldstein, Jacob Mathews, Harry Karp, Isaac Epstein, I. Bunim, M. Hegler, Mrs. A. Goldstein, Mrs. B. Gottesfeld, and Mrs. A. Shapiro, all of New York. Others elected are Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, Philadelphia, Rabbi A. M. Ashinsky, Detroit, Rabbi D. Boruchow, Boston, Rabbi S. Silber, Chicago, and A. L. Gelman, St. Louis.

In addition, a general committee of seventy-five, comprising active Miz-rachi workers in all parts of the country, was chosen.

At the closing session the delegates were urged to dedicate themselves to new and vigorous work on behalf of the Orthodox Zionist movement in addresses delivered by Gedaliah Bublik and Rabbi Gold. A list of thirty-five candidates for Mizrachi delegates to the forthcoming Zionist Congress in Zurich was approved to be submitted to the electorate.

A number of measures looking toward the strengthening of the Mizrachi

## WARSAW TAILORS END STRIKE; GET INCREASE

Warsaw, May 15—The strike in the Warsaw needle industry, which lasted several months and led to street fights between the Bundists and the Reds, was concluded today.

An agreement was reached by compromise. The workers gained an increase in wages of fifteen per cent. They will not be paid for the strike period. The majority of the employers and employees in the industry are Jews.

## BUDAPEST KEHILLAH FACES HUGE DEFICIT; ASKS PERMIT TO INCREASE TAXES

Government, After Refusing, Pledges to Reconsider When Kehillah Threatens Court Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, May 15—Facing a huge deficit of half a million Pengoes the Budapest Kehillah has now turned to the government for aid which may be granted either by permission to increase its tax on the Jewish population or by subsidies for the maintenance of the institutions.

The government at first declined permission for an increase of the taxes. At yesterday's session of the parliamentary finance committee, Deputy Paul Sandor raised the issue, declaring that failing any other action, the Kehillah would be compelled to go to court and to leave to the state to take care of the Kehillah schools and hospitals which have, in recent years, taken care of a greater number of Christian than Jewish sick.

The Minister of Finance, pressed for an answer, declared that he will consider the granting of greater subventions to the Jewish Teachers Seminary and will likewise permit increase of 10 per cent in the Kehillah tax in certain cases.

## 50 COMMUNITIES PROTEST AGAINST KEHILLAH CONTROL

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 15—A joint protest against the plan of the Roumanian government to place government officials in charge of Kehillah affairs was submitted by fifty Jewish communities in Old Roumania.

The memorandum declares that the violation of the autonomy of the Kehillahs would be considered by the Jewish communities as an action to stifle the free exercise of the Jewish religion.

## HITLER WINS LIBEL SUIT DUE TO LACK OF EVIDENCE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Munich, May 15—The libel suit instituted in the Munich court by Adolf Hitler, against the anti-Semitic deputy, Graefe, the Catholic editor, Osterhuber, the Socialist deputies Zerfas, Dichtl and Wimmer, was decided in favor of the plaintiff.

The defendants were sentenced to ten days in prison or a fine of 1,000 marks. The defendants had accused Hitler of having received money from Mussolini to mitigate the German feeling over the annexation of southern Tyrol. The court found that the defendants submitted insufficient evidence to prove their charge.

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## SPAIN REITERATES THAT JEWS ARE FREE TO ENTER THE COUNTRY

Statement Response to Demand 15th  
Century Exile Decree Be Abolished

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Sofia, May 15.—Persons of the Jewish race and faith are free to enter Spain, notwithstanding the fact that the fifteenth century Ferdinand and Isabella decree exiling the Jews from Spain has never been legally withdrawn.

A statement to this effect was received from the Spanish government by Dr. Saul Mezan, president of the Jewish League of Nations Society in Bulgaria. Dr. Mezan recently declared that the delegation of his society will not be able to attend the international meeting of League of Nations Societies which is scheduled to be held in Madrid this summer, since, officially, Jews are still banned. It was in response to this statement that the Spanish government made the declaration.

## ORTHODOX RABBIS TO TAKE STAND ON AGENCY

The annual convention of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada will open in Belmar, N. J., May 20 and continue until May 22. The sessions will be held at the Carleton Hotel, it was announced.

A decision on the Union's attitude toward the Jewish Agency will be taken at the convention.

Other problems to be discussed will deal with the strengthening of Judaism in this country, Jewish education and the function of the synagogue.

Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, the president, will present his message at the opening session.

## TEXAS VOTES \$100,000 FOR PALESTINE COLONY

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Dallas, May 15.—The climax of the three-day session of the silver anniversary convention of the Texas Zionist Association was reached with the decision that Texas Zionists will purchase land in Palestine for the sum of \$100,000 on which there will be established a colony in the name of Texas Zionists. A commission of three is to be appointed by the newly-elected president, David Wunth, of Tyler, to work out plans for raising the necessary funds.

The convention approved the extension of the Jewish Agency, and sent a cable of greetings to Louis Lipsky in Jerusalem, wishing him a speedy recovery. All the present officers of the Jewish National Fund were re-elected. The officers of the United Palestine Appeal for the State will continue in office until the fall, when a state conference will be called to decide the future of the appeal in Texas, at which time new officers will be elected.

Charles M. Bender was nominated as the delegate from Texas to the World Zionist Congress, which will be held in Zurich, Switzerland, beginning July 28th.

Besides Mr. Wunth as president, Rabbi H. Raphael Gold, Dallas, was chosen honorary president; A. Goldenernek, Tyler, treasurer; Charles M. Bender, Breckenridge, 1st vice-president; J. Swick, Galveston, 2nd vice-president; Louis Rochkov, Corary, 3rd vice-president; and Philip Goldenernek, Tyler, chairman of executive committee.

## ICA SENDS SUPPLIES TO RUSSIAN JEWISH COLONIES

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Paris, Apr. 16.—The steamer "Albano" has just left Marseilles for Odessa with a cargo of plantation supplies acquired by the headquarters of the Jewish Colonization Association (Ica) for the use of the old and new Jewish colonies in Russia. The consignment consists of 400,000 vine-grafts and a substantial quantity of seeds. It is one of a series which, with the arrival of Spring, the Ica has undertaken to send to Russia in order to provide the colonies with seeds, machinery and tools.

The goods recently despatched include a large supply of material intended for the construction of houses in the new colonies founded by the Ica—240 tons of sheet iron for roofing, several hundred cases of window glass, pots of paint, barbed wire for fencing, etc.

The Ica has also acquired in America 53 tractors, plows and harvesting machines and two car-loads of Sudan grass seed. The goods have just arrived at Odessa, and will be followed soon by various other implements for the use of the Jewish vine-growers.

In Russia the purchases and deliveries went on without a break all through the winter. Since August 1, 547 car-loads of seed, fodder, cattle, building timber, etc., have been purchased and sent to the colonies.

## TRIAL FOR 3 DESECRATORS OF CLEVELAND JEWISH CEMETERY

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, May 15.—Three persons charged with having participated in the desecration of the Jewish cemetery on Lansing Avenue belonging to the Beth Hamedrosh Hagodol Congregation on the night of April 27, were arrested by the police and will be tried before the Court of Common Pleas.

Two of the culprits are said to have signed a confession. The third protests innocence.

Preliminary information given out by the police points to a disregard of the theory current here that the desecration was perpetrated by members of one group. It appears that of the three prisoners one is a German, the second a Slovak and the third a Pole. The names have not been disclosed pending the court proceedings. It was understood that the two who have confessed to the vandalistic act will base their defense on the contention that they were drunk that night and did not know what they were doing.

## SUGGEST NEW INDUSTRIAL PROJECT FOR RUSSIAN JEWS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Charkoff, May 15.—A plan to develop the silk industry among the Jews in the small town was presented by the Charkoff Yiddish daily, "Stern."

The climate in the Ukraine is favorable for the growing of the mulberry bushes, on the leaves of which the silkworm feeds. Hundreds of deceased Jews could be helped through this project, the paper declares.

Practical results from the plan presented by the "Stern" would not be possible within ten years, since this time is required for the growth of the trees, it was declared.

## GLORIFY JEWISH WAR HEROES IN ROUMANIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 15.—The memory of the Jewish soldiers who fell during the world war was honored at special exercises on the Ashkenazic and Sephardic cemeteries in connection with the celebration of the unification of Greater Roumania.

Generals Fatineanu and Ionescu, representing the Ministry of War, attended the exercises. In their addresses they emphasized the valor of the Jewish soldiers who gave their lives for the unification of Roumania.

Albert C. Cornsweet of Cleveland, O., Rhodes scholar-elect and all-round Brown University athlete, has been awarded the class of 1907 scholarship, given annually at Brown University to the Senior class member "who combines in a high degree scholastic ability, athletic ability and character."

Cornsweet has the highest scholastic record of any Brown graduate, who has won the scholarship in the last four years. He is one of the four leaders of the class, a James Manning scholar, member of the Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi. When he enters Oxford next fall he will become a student at St. John's College. He played on the Brown football eleven for three years and was captain last year. He is a member of the Brown lacrosse twelve. For three years, Cornsweet was the New England inter-collegiate wrestling champion.

## VISCOUNT CECIL COMPARES PALESTINE BUILDING TO EMERGENCE OF LEAGUE

### Visualizes New Contribution of Jewish Race to World History

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 15—The two greatest achievements of the war were the establishment of the League of Nations and the establishment of the Jewish National Home, declared Viscount Cecil, opening the second day of the Palestine exhibition here. Both were fulfillments of age-long aspirations, he said. The organization of peace and the return of the dispersed Jews to the sacred soil of Palestine are ideals as old as history, both having a common source in the Prophets, in the Isaiah vision of beating swords into ploughshares.

At the moment only hesitant steps are being taken in this direction by establishing the Jewish National Home for the Jewish nation, but what is now the national home may develop into something much greater in years to come. Viscount Cecil declared that he is confident that, just as the Jewish nation in times of great difficulties exerted through its individuals influence on world history, the Jewish race as a whole may influence future world history. This may be visionary, but "without vision the people perisheth." This side of Zionism has always appealed to him, he said.

Sir Hugo Hirst, presiding, said that his experience in the Palestine Electric Company showed that the Palestine workers were second to none and the materials for the Palestinian works passed the experts' test. Sir Hugo welcomed Viscount Cecil, a kinsman of Lord Balfour, who conceived what Palestine may become for its own sake, for the sake of those oppressed in other countries and for the British Empire.

## COMMUNIST YOUTH THREATEN KEHILLAH HEAD

Lemberg, May 15—Mendel Potascher, president of the Kehillah in the town, Ustyzyk-Dolne, Eastern Galicia, received a threatening letter, signed "Youth Organization, U.S.S.R.," because he participated in a protest meeting against the synagogue desecration in the town.

A "Cherim" (excommunication) was pronounced by the rabbi against anyone knowing the culprits and not disclosing their identity. The vandals who attacked the synagogue, beating the students in the Beth Hamidrash, demolishing the Ark and burning the Scrolls of the Law, singing the Communistic international hymn as they went about their act, have not yet been found.

## J. D. B. NEWS LETTER

### Convene Good Will Meeting in Washington

Washington, D. C., May 15—The inter-religious meeting held under the auspices of the Threefold Movement at the Washington Hebrew Congregation, attracted nearly 500 persons.

Representatives of every major faith attended and paid tribute to the founders of other great religions. Rabbi Abram Simon presided.

The speakers consisted of Swami Yogananda, author, on "Buddha and the Hindu Teachers"; Arthur H. Hummel of the Chinese department, Library of Congress, on "Confucius"; Rabbi Edward L. Israel of the Har Sinai Congregation, on "Jesus Christ"; Prof. Stanwood Cobb of the Bahai Movement, on "Mohammed"; Dr. Hugh Stevenson, on "Moses"; Nedar Nath Das Gupta, on "The Threefold Movement"; Rev. Jason Noble Pierce of the First Congregational Church, on "Religious Unity," and Dr. Bhagat, Sing Thind, Sikh teacher of India, on other founders of religious faiths.

In addition to the religious addresses, there was community singing and the Hindu chant. Rabbi Simon, as presiding officer, in explaining the aims of the Threefold movement, declared that only through an understanding of the various prophets can the peoples of the world succeed in eliminating religious and racial prejudices. It was for that purpose, he declared, that the inter-religious meeting was held, and that similar ones would take place in other cities where the Threefold movement was represented.

The Threefold movement, which consists of the Fellowship of Faiths, the Union of the East and West and the League of Neighbors, was organized to work for peace and brotherhood through appreciation and understanding of all nations, races and religions.

It has branches in Washington, Chicago, Baltimore, New York, Boston, Dublin and London, all of which are taking part in the Peace week celebrations from May 12 to May 18, which are to culminate with an international Goodwill day on the latter date, when mass meetings and other exercises appropriate to peace will be held wherever the threefold movement has branches.

Ottawa, May 13—A. J. Freiman, President of the Zionist Organization of Canada, spoke from the pulpit of the St. James United Church on Sunday morning.

Mr. Freiman's address on "Zionism as I Know It and See It," was given on the invitation of the Rev. Robert Miliken, the pastor of St. James Church. The Canadian Zionist leader, in his address, asked for the moral support and understanding "in this great enterprise of all people, irrespective of creed, who are interested in the advancement of humanity as a whole."

## ANTI SEMITISM AS ISSUE PRESENTED TO ALL-RUSSIAN SOVIET CONGRESS

### To Amend Soviet Constitution, Lifting Restrictions on Practice of Religion

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, May 15—The fight against anti-Semitism as a state issue and the forthcoming amendment of the Soviet constitution to lift the restrictions on the practice of religion were two of the important points treated in the keynote address delivered by Alexei I. Rykoff, president of the Council of People's Commissars, before the fourteenth all-Russian congress of Soviets in session here.

Declaring anti-Semitism to be the result of a condition of "lack of culture," the Soviet leader stated that "anti-Semitism is the expression of inequality and exploitation which cannot be tolerated under the Soviet regime. We consider every worker as an equal citizen, without regard to nationality. Only the Nipmen and the Kulak, whether he is a Jew, Russian or any other nationality, we consider as the enemy of the Soviet."

Intimating that the Soviet congress will soon be asked to vote on the amendment of the Soviet constitution to permit the practice of religion, as well as the freedom to oppose religion, Rykoff stated that in the future the Communists will continue to advocate a fight against religion, but they will not apply against it the administrative force of the Soviet government. "We will recognize in our constitution the freedom of any religion," he stated. The text of the Soviet constitution as adopted during the revolution and the formation of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics prohibited the practice of religion.

It is stated here on good authority that the constitutional amendment will provide for the separation of church and state, and church and school, but will grant the citizens the right to

## DR. BERNSTEIN-COGAN, ZIONIST LEADER, DIES

Kishineff, May 15—Dr. Jacob Bernstein-Cogan, well-known Zionist leader in Bessarabia, died in Ekaterinoslav, Russia, on May 12, a report received here today states.

Dr. Bernstein-Cogan, who was born in this city in 1859, was one of the early workers in the Zionist movement and took an active part in its work in pre-war Russia. Following the World War he proceeded to Palestine, where he spent some time but could not adjust himself to the new environment. Recently he left Palestine for Soviet Russia.

Organization and its propaganda in the United States were adopted at the recommendation of a special committee. One of the features determined upon was a recommendation to local societies to arrange once a month the traditional Jewish Saturday night late supper known as "Mafveh Malkah," (farewell to the Princess Sobah), in a series of resolutions proposed by the nine committees headed by Rabbi B. Natalewitz of Palestine, H. L. Selig of the resolutions' committee, Rabbi Silber on education, Rabbi Horowitz on propaganda and Rabbi Mandelbaum on the Jewish Agency, the topics discussed during the sessions were formulated and the attitude of the Mizrachi defined.

A drastic resolution was adopted as the result of the charges made that the old institutions in Jerusalem lend financial support to the Agudah political machine in its fight against the Mizrachi and the general Zionists. "The convention expresses its indignation at the fact that some institutions in Jerusalem employ the funds placed at their disposal for maintenance, for political purposes which are dangerous to the rebuilding of our Homeland," the resolution read, adding that support is to be withdrawn from such Jerusalem institutions as compel their recipients to accept the institution's political views.

The convention urged Mizrachi followers and others to invest in the Mizrachi Bank which recently showed great progress. Another resolution urged the Zionist Executive not to discriminate against the Mizrachi immigrants in the distribution of certificates.

A special resolution welcomed the Jewish Agency, expressing the hope that all the Orthodox organizations throughout the world will join the Jewish Agency and that if the Agency deals with education in Palestine, that it accord full support to the Mizrachi school system. It also welcomed the plan of the Rabbi's Union to convene an international conference for the purpose of strengthening the Orthodox influence in the Agency.

The delegates discussed with great heat the resolution on education in Palestine introduced by Rabbi Silber of Chicago. The original text, considered by many delegates as too mild, was changed to include the charge that the Zionist General Education Board in Jerusalem plans an attack on the Mizrachi school system for the purpose of "destroying the autonomy enjoyed by the Mizrachi schools since 1921."

The resolution instructed the Mizrachi delegates to the Zurich Congress to insist on the following points: 1. That the engaging and dismissal of teachers in the Mizrachi schools remain exclusively within the jurisdiction of the Mizrachi Education Board. 2. When a conflict arises between the General Education Board and the Mizrachi Board, the General Board is not to suspend payment of allotments but that the matter is to be referred to

practice their religion, thus eliminating the stimulus which comes from persecution, while retaining the propaganda against religion. The text of the amendment which will be submitted and adopted reads: "For the purpose of insuring the freedom of conscience, the freedom of religious beliefs will be recognized for every citizen, as well as the freedom to carry on anti-religious propaganda."

Simultaneously there comes a report from the Ukraine that a vigorous campaign has been undertaken by the Jewish Communists against the observance of the Abrahamic rite of circumcision. The Communist Yiddish daily "Stern," conducts a campaign under the slogan: "Wipe out this barbaric rite." The newspaper complains that during the past two years the number of Jewish societies and religious schools has greatly increased in the Ukraine due to financial support they received from abroad.

A fund of \$5,000 has been subscribed by Dr. Harry Friedenwald and Dr. J. Frank Cronch to dedicate the main reception room of the Baltimore, Eye, Ear and Throat Charity Hospital in honor of Dr. Samuel Dushoff, one of the founders. Dr. Friedenwald and Dr. Cronch are members of the surgical staff of the hospital.

the Zionist Congress for decision. 3. That the Mizrachi delegates insist on placing the religious education of Jewish children in Palestine only with such teachers who are "sincerely religious and have had experience in religious training," eliminating those who are "indifferent and often hostile to the Jewish religion, although they wish to appear as religious."

The resolution also contained a recommendation to Mizrachi members in regard to Hebrew education in the United States. It declared that the so-called secular Hebrew education is insufficient, leaving the pupils indifferent to religion because the teachers in such schools maintain a disparaging attitude toward religion. Such Hebrew education endangers the future of Judaism in the United States, the resolution declared, urging members to use their best efforts that the Hebrew schools and Talmud Torahs be conducted in a national, religious spirit, that only Orthodox teachers be employed and that cooperation be extended in establishing parochial schools and financial aid given to leading and smaller yeshivas.

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
