### AMERICAN JEWISH CON-GRESS ENDORSES EXTEN-SION OF JEWISH AGENCY Dr. Wise Concurs in Resolution; Given Long Ovation; Bernard S. Deutsch Elected President

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Atlantic City, N. J., May 21-The American Jewish Congress, whose leader. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, was one of the staunchest opponents of the extension of the Jewish Agency as agreed upon by Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Marshall adopted a resolution welcoming the extension of the Agency. Dr. Wise, the retiring president of the Congress. concurred in the resolution, with the only reservation that as a member of the Zionist Congress he leaves to himself the right to emphasize at the forthcoming session in Zurich that the extension of the Agency be carried out in accordance with the resolutions of the Zionist Congress and on the basis of democratic principles. When he announced that he supports the resolution, Dr. Wise was given a long ovation by the delegates.

Bernard S. Deutsch was elected president of the American Jewish Congress; Dr. Stephen S. Wise, honorary president; Louis Lipsky, Max Silver-stein, Carl Sherman, Mrs. Archibald Silverman, Benjamin Winter and Dr. Haim Fineman, vice-presidents; Bernard G. Richards, executive secretary; Morris Weinberg, treasurer: Rabbi Solomon Goldman of Cleveland, Rabbi Barnett Brickner of Cleveland, Jacob Ginsberg of Philadelphia, Judge Aaron Levy of New York, Rabbi B. L. Levinthal of Philadelphia and Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia honorary vice-presidents. As members of the administrative committee the following were elected: Judge William M. Lewis, Rev. Z. H. Masliansky, I. Moses, Rabbi Louis I. Newman of San Francisco, Judge Hugo Pam of Chicago, Nathan D. Perlman of New York, J. Meiser, Leon Sanders, Elihu D. COLONIZATION BODIES NAME COMMISSION TO RECLAIM 200,000 HECTARES FOR JEWISH USE To Negotiate with Crimean Govern-

ment for Area on Sivash Seacoast (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, May 21—A special committee to negotiate with the government of Crimea concerning the possibilities of reclaiming an area of 200,000 hectares on the Sivash seacoust, near Feodosia, for Jewish colonization was appointed by the Connzet, government department for Jewish land settlement, and the Agrojoint, the agency of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

The commission also includes a staff of scientific investigators. It was stated if this area is reclaimed and the land cultivated by Jewish settlers, a foundation for a Jewish district would be laid.

Budapest, May 21—The Jewish delegation which came to participate in the Roumanian union celebrations at Buzeau was insulted in such a manner that it was compelled to leave the celebration, states a report from Bucharest to the "Pester Lloyd."

The delegation, which included a number of rabbis, was shown to its place on the platform, in accordance with arrangements of the Commandant of the local garrison. When the Jewish representatives ascended the platform, the Roumanian Bishop Ghenadie rose from his place, shouting, "We don't want any mixing with you. Get down." Whereupon the Jewish delegation left the celebration.

A protest to the local authorities was lodged.

ORTHODOX RABBIS,

DANGER TO FAITH
President Criticizes Reform and Conservative Winer, Cells Control

President Criticizes Reform and Conservative Wings; Calls Center Movement "Misguiding"

(Jewish Daily Bulletin) Belmar, N. J., May 21-A warning of

the danger to the future of Judaiss in the United States as interpreted and lived by Orthodox Jewry, was sounded at the twenty-sixth annual convention of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada which opened here Monday evening at the Carlton Hotel. Nearly 100 rabbis from forty cities were present at the opening session.

Both non-Orthodox wings, Reform and Conservative, were assailed in the presidential message of Ratbi Israel Rosenberg. The entire structure of Judaism is shaken, he said. Nonetheless, Orthodox Jewry should not despair, but rather renew its efforts to preserve its ancient faith, pure and undefiled. Orthodox Jews cannot derive any comfort from their knowledge that other movements in Judaism have likewise become waker. Weak as they are, their influence is still dangerous to Orthodox Judaism, he said, in uttering highly critical words against Reform and Conservative congregations and their rabbis.

Reform Judaism he termed "the angel of death" for Judaism. Still harsher was his attitude toward Conservative Judaism. "With Reform Judaism we have no difficulty, knowing where it stands and what it aims at," he said. He declared that Reform rabbis do not believe in the divine origin of the Torah and further charged that they frequently quote the New Testament in their sermons and confuse their congregants by "flirting with Christianity" and paying tribute to the founder of that religion. Conservative Judaism, he said, is the greater enemy of Orthodoxy since it is "going about masked, making a false pretense at being traditional Judaism." Both seek to cripple Judaism, he averred.

"The Reformers have not only dropped the outer shell, but have devastated everything dear to us. However, in comparison with the Conservative group, they are intellectually honest and above-board. The Jewish center movement, sponsored, by the Conserva-

# MONTE M. LEMANN NAMED BY PRESIDENT TO NATIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMISSION Is One of Outstanding Leaders of

New Orleans, May 21-Monte M. Lemann, one of the ten lawyers named Lemann, one of the ten lawyers named by President Hoover to the National Law Enforcement Commission to study the failures of law enforcement in the United States and the shortcomings of judicial procedure, is one of the outstanding leaders of the lewish community here.

Mr. Lemann takes an active interest in the work of the United Palestine Appeal campaign in New Orleans and is affiliated with a Reform Jewish congregation.

Monte M. Lemann was born April 3. 1884, in Donaldsonville, La. He relane University in 1902 and from Harvard Law School his LL.B. (cum laude) in 1906. He was admitted to the bar of Louisiana in 1907. He has been a member of the law firm Monroc & Lemann since January 1922, and Professor of Law at Tulane Uni-versity Law School since 1906. He was assistant chief counsel of the United States Shipping Board at Washington from July to December 1918. He is a director of the Chalmette Petroleum Corporation. Louisiana Oxygen Company, the Lousiana State Rice Milling Company and the Hunter Canal Company. Mr. Lemann is president of

Louisiana Bar Association and a member of the Council of the American Bar Association and the American Law Institute. He is a trustee of the Child Welfare Society.

MARTYRED SCIENTIST'S WIDOW RISKED LIFE TO TEST PELLAGRA THEORY

Congress Committee Report Describe Heroism of Mrs. Joseph Goldberger (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, May 21-The heroism of Mrs. Joseph Goldberger, widow of the martyred Jewish scientist who suc cumbed last year to disease resulting with his experiments on the cause and cure of pellagra, which he discovered is described in a report of a Congres sional committee. Congress, at its las session, voted a \$125 monthly pension to the widow who, with her three chil dren, was left penniless after her hus band's death.

A letter to the House Pension Com mittee by Surgeon General H. S. Cum ming, of the Public Health Service urging the pension, told how Mrs Goldberger had tested the transmissi bility of pellagra at a time when man medical authorities disagreed with he husband on this point.

# Text of Agency Resolution

The text of the resolution on the

Jewish Agency read: "The American Jewish Congress hails the effort of the World Zionist Organization to enlarge the Jewish Agency to the end that it may include all Jewish forces in the upbuilding of Palestine. It recalls with genuine pride the fact that at its very first session in 1918 it proclaimed the principle that the build-ing of the Jewish National Homeland was the privilege and task of all Jews.

"Now, as then, the Congress stresses the essential requirements that the Agency be constituted on a thoroughgoing democratic basis and that in all respects the fundamental principles of Zionism be preserved inviolate. And it looks to those entrusted with the shaping of the policies of the enlarged Agency to include therein the representatives of centrally organized Jewry the world over, and in particular of this Congress, as representative of leading central organizations in American Jew-ry; its sanguine hope and confident expectation being that ultimately a world Jewish congress will be estab-lished to embrace the function and to guide the destiny of the Jewish Agency.

"To the cause of the Jewish Agency, thus conceived and formulated, the Congress pledges its loyal, enthusiastic and unremitting support.

# Text of Amity Resolution

The resolution urging unity between the American Jewish Congress and the American Iewish Committee read as follows: "Whereas American Jewry has been aroused to a consciousness of the hurtful division which exists between the principal organizations dealing with the problems vitally affecting Jewish rights at home and abroad; and

"Whereas the cause of Jewry is paramount to any or all of the organizations concerned with Jewish problems; and

"Whereas the American Jewish Congress believes that steps should be taken to coordinate the activities of these

organizations; now "Therefore be it resolved that the American Jewish Congress recommends the appointment of a joint committee, which committee shall arrange for an early conference of representatives of the American Jewish Committee and American Jewish Congress to the end that sorely needed unity of action with respect to Jewish problems may be ef-fected and present and potential causes of discord in Jewish life be thus

tives, is dangerous and misguiding as it falsely results in laying the emphasis not on the synagogue but on the social activities, the swimming pool and the club room, and the dance, instead of the essence of our faith and tradition." he said.

The president of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis launched a bitter attack on some of the Conservative rabbis who he asserted, are violating Tewish religious tradition by permitting mixed pews in the synagogue, by disregarding the laws concerning the purity of familv life and the ritual bath, by taking upon themselves the authority to issue religious divorces in English, instead of the prescribed Hebrew "gett," and by officiating at weddings contrary to the Tewish religious law, without the required presence of qualified witnesses.

He suggested the organization of a federation of Orthodox synagogues and rabbis and the formation of a young people's league to be headed by the vounger Orthodox rabbis. He put forward a proposal for the convening of a world conference of Orthodox rabbis to be held in Europe this summer to consider the part of Orthodox Jewry in the Jewish Agency, and pleaded for generous support on the part of American Jews for the maintenance of yeshivas in the United States and in Europe.
