PALESTINE GOVERNMENT PLANS EMPLOYMENT ZONES FOR JEWS AND ARABS Will Attempt to Make Fair Division

of Employment in Public Works (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 18-The division of the country into zones of employment for Jews and Arabs in governmental public works is said to be a method now considered by the government for securing what it believes to be a fair division of employment. According to the plan, certain zones are to be earmarked for the employment of Jewish labor exclusively. This would not how-ever disqualify Jews from securing employment under other contracts. The governmental budget for public works in the near future calls for the expenditure of three quarters of a million nounds. The portion which is to be given to Jewish workers exclusively is not to exceed 10%. It is stated that the government is energetically seeking to solve the problem of securing ernment works.

TEL AVIV WANTS

EINSTEIN FOREST (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 18—Tel Aviv, the first Jewish city of Palestine, wants to have the planned Einstein forest within its confines. The municipality has started negotiations with the headquarters of the Jewish National Fund with a view towards reaching an agreement that the forest be planted in its territory .

A fund for the purpose was initiated by the Zionists of Germany on the occasion of Professor Einstein's fif-tieth birthday, which occurred on March 14, 1929.

DESECRATE SYNAGOGUE IN LITHUANIAN TOWN (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, July 18-The main synagogue of Wilkowischki was desecrated last night by unknown vandals. The Ark of the Holy Scroll was opened and the parchments were torn and mutilated. A young girl, Rachel Stropolski, was found unconscious not far from the synagogue.

EXILED RABBI, ACADEMY HEAD, SUFFERS HARDSHIP (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, July 18—Letters received here from Soviet Russia, described the plight of Rabbi Levitan, former head of the Talmudic Academy at Mevl who was exiled by the Soviet Government to Symbirsk. The Academy head was exiled following the close of his Yeshiva. The Rabbi and his family are actually on the verge of starvation, it is reported.

FEAR CRITICAL ATTITUDE TO MANDATORY AFTER AGENCY CONSUMMATION

British Journal Expresses This View: Resents Criticism of Palestine Officials

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 18-The consummation of the extended Jewish Agency for Palestine will bring about an increase of criticism against Great Britain as the Mandatory, particularly on the part of American Jews, is the opinion expressed in an editorial appearing in the "Near East and India," British magazine, said to be in close touch with the colonial office.

This tendency, the paper declares, is already discernible, before the convening of the World Zionist Congress. It has manifested itself in the bitter charges, it alleges, which are being levelled against Sir Robert Chancellor, the present High Commissioner. Hailed first as a practical administrator who would give fresh impetus to the re-building of the Jewish Homeland, he is now the object of censure. He is blamed, the paper states, for the curtailment of the autonomy of Tel Aviv, the land conflict, the transfer of the Iewish colonies, of Infvat, to an administrative unit which is Arabic, the stricter enforcement of the certificate system, and the attempts to minimize the rights of the Hebrew language.

Discarding this criticism, the editorial declares that the measures were undertaken merely to tighten administrative efficiency. It states, however, that the criticism is symptomatic.

After lauding the Palestine officials.

who, it says, have performed their work admirably and require neither apology nor defense, it states that it is quaint that the nationalist press should insist upon attacking them as anti-Semitic in a land which is wholly people by Semites.

Referring to the forthcoming World Zionist Congress, the editorial points out that whereas the Palestine Survey Commission recommended a minimum budget of a million pounds, the Zionist Congress will be asked to ratify a budget of three-quarters of a million pounds for the next two years.

SIR HERBERT SAMUEL PLEADS PALESTINE CAUSE IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Asks for Greater Loan and Railway Facilities (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 18-The first address delivered by Sir Herbert Samuel, Lib-

eral leader and former High Commis-sioner of Palestine, was devoted to a plea in behalf of a fair opportunity for development for Palestine.

Rising, during the debate in the House of Commons, at the second reading of the Colonial Development Fund bill, Sir Herbert stated that he fails to understand why the loan facil-ities extended in the bill to East Africa are withheld from Palestine. He hopes, he stated, that the government will accept the amendment to remove the limitation. He wishes to direct particular attention to loans to mandated territories. Under the mandate system, the category (a) to which Palestine belongs, constitutes such mandated territories which should at some period become self-governing countries. If these territories were to try tries. It these territories were to try to float a loan, repayable within a period of forty to sixty years, investors would be unwilling to loan money because they would contend that it is indefinite how long the country will remain under British adminiistration. Consequently the mandated territories find themselves in a unique and unfavorable position. It is therefore essential that the British government be willing to guarantee their

Berlin, July 18-The memory of Wal-ter Rathenau, the late German Jewish statesman who died at the hands of anti-Semites, will be honored by his own city, according to a decision of the Berlin City Government.

The municipal government decided to rename a fountain monument in the people's park, Rehberg, the Rathenau Fountain. It is to be decorated with an artistic relief, representing Rathenau, father and son.

DEAD SEA GRANT AGAIN RAISED IN PARLIAMENT

London, July 18-The question of the Dead Sea concession was again raised in parliament by Colonel Heneage. Replying to a question, Assistant Colonial Secretary Lunn declared that while the agreement on the concession has not yet been put into its final form, the concession is binding, in its own substance, upon the governments of Palestine and Transjordania.

Colonel Heneage asked whether it is proposed to take action in view of the importance of potash to the agricultural community of Great Britain. To his query the Assistant Colonial Secretary replied that there is a pro-vision in the concession which prohibits the operating company from restricting its output without the consent of the government.

CONVERTS PLAN CHURCH IN JERUSALEM FOR USE OF HEBREW CHRISTIANS Are Given Property Outside Old City

Walls (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 18—The property, known as Abraham's Vineyard, which Landau President is situated outside the city walls of Jerusalem, is being handed over to the International Hebrew Christian Alliance, according to a decision adopted by the present owners of the property, the "Society for the Relief of Dis-tressed Jews," Sir Leon Levison, the President of the Alliance, states in the current issue of the "Hebrew-Christian," the quarterly magazine of the Al-Writing of the future administration

of this property, Sir Leon says that the Alliance intends to adhere to the pol-icy of the Society for Relief of Distressed Jews, and to give work to Jews in distress in Palestine, whether they be converted or not. Secondly, its plans will be to set up buildings, where it can teach Hebrew Christians trades. such as boot-making, carpentry, tailor-ing, printing, etc, in order that they may become self-supporting. Thirdly, in past years Jews were taught on this property to make oil soap. This the Al-liance intends to revive. They hope to build a Hebrew Christian Church, where services will be conducted by Hebrew Christians.

With the consent of the retiring trustees of the property, viz., the Earl of Shaftesbury, the Rev. A. H. Finn, Miss Finn, and Mrs. D. Petrie, Dr. Gold-Levin, the Rev. S. B. Rohold, and Sir Leon Levison have been appointed to act as new trustees along with Mrs. Petrie. Sir Leon has decided to go to Palestine next March, in order to inspect the property and report thereon to the executive committee of the International Hebrew Christian Alliance.

246.000 PUPILS ATTEND 2.031 RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS SUBVENTIONED BY J.D.C.

Orthodox Leader Praises Cultural Committee Headed by Dr. Adler

Two hundred and forty-five thousand, eight hundred and thirty-five pupils attend 2,031 religious schools in eight Europeas countries and Palestine eight Europeas countries and Paiestine which are subventioned by the Cultural Committee, according to a report of the Cultural Relief Committee, of which Dr. Cyrus Adler is chairman. "When, in the after-the-War period, the Joint Distribution Committee un-

dertook permanent rehabilitative work and constituted the cultural committee as part of its program, this work assumed a definite and organized form, in which budgets were drawn up in advance, the institutions selected to receive aid property listed and supervised, it became possible to keep track of the expenditures for this important Since the constituting of the purpose. Cultural Committee to date, a sum exceeding \$3,000,000 has been spent on Jewish education in the war-suffering countries. WILLIAM FOX HURT IN-AUTO ACCIDENT

William Fox, millionaire Jewish mo-tion picture producer, who is the head of the Fox Theatres Corporation, was

injured when the car in which he was riding with Jacob L. Rubenstein, collided with another sedan near Westbury, Long Island.

Picked up by other motorists and removed to the Nassau Hospital, Mr. Fox underwent a blood transfusion.
Dr. Wilfred M. Post, chief attending physician of the hospital, declared that the transfusion did not take place because of unfavorable symptoms, but merely as a safeguard. It was at first thought that Mr. Fox had suffered a possible fracture of the skull.

possible fracture of the skull. When brought to the hospital, Mr. Fox was bleeding from many cuts, and had lost a pint of blood. Mr. Fox's companion, Mr. Rubinstein, secretary and treasurer of the Namquist Worsday. ted Company, was less painfully injured. Mr. Fox's chauffeur, Joseph W. Boyes, was killed.
A number of Mr. Fox's associates

called at the hospital and issued a

statement of reassurance. Mr. Fox, who is fifty years old, was born in Tuchva, Hungary, January 1, 1879, and was brought here by his parents while still an infant. He began his theatrical career in 1904, as a man-

ager of a Brooklyn theatre, and is today the head of the Fox Circuit, the Fox Film Corporation and several associated concerns. His personal for-tune has been estimated at \$35,000,000, while he is said to carry insurance policies in the amount of \$6,400,000.

The news of the accident to Mr. Fox caused a decline in the price of Fox Film Corporation stock.

PEASANTS CHARGE JEWISH FARMERS SELL PRODUCTS AT HIGH PRICES

Ill Feeling Exists in Pokrovsk Region, Communist Paper Reports (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 18-Ill feeling against the Jews in the district of Pokrovsk, Ukraine, has developed in a sharp form among the peasants, the Stern, Communist Yiddish Daily of Charkov reports. The peasants accuse the Jews of marketing their corn to the peasants instead of selling it to the government. They also assert that the Jews mix sand into the corn thus increasing the weight, and at the same time charging high prices. They complain that the bread of which they are deprived is given to Jewish settlers who in turn sell it to the peasants.

The paper further reports that conditions in the Jewish collectives is not satisfactory. It is charged that the Jews who are official members of the collectives do not work themselves, but hire peasants, instead, which is a violation of the principle of collectivization.

Moscow, July 18—The Jewish situa-tion in Moldavia is steadily growing worse, reports indicate. The Jewish youth are deserting the villages due to unemployment. The work of the Ozet in that region, particularly in Balte, Tarispol and Revneze is poorly organized, it is said.

Bressler and Joseph C. Hyman.

The Growth of Judaism in Portugal Lisbon, July 1-The foundation stone Lisson, July 1—1 he foundation stone of the new building of the Synagogue "Mekor Haim" in Oporto, was laid yesterday on a site purchased by the Community in the Guerra Junqueiro Street. The purchase of the site and the building of the synagogue are being generously subsidized by the Pro-Marrano Committee in London, which was founded in 1926 through the initiative of Lucien Wolf, and is aiming to assist the Portuguese Marranos and crypto-Jews to return to the Jewish

It is due to the aid of the Pro-Marrano Committee that it has been possible to establish the Jewish commun-ities of Oporto and Braganca, which consist mostly of Marranos, who have publicly reverted to the faith of their ancestors. The Jewish community of Braganca consists exclusively of Mar-

ranos.

The street in which the Oporto Community is erecting its synagogue is named after the great Portuguese poet, Guerra-Junqueiro, who was of Marrano descent, and bore a striking resemblance to the famous Rembrandt "Portrait of a Rabbi." He died about four years ago.

Captain Arthur Carlos de Barros Basto, the founder and president of the Jewish Community of Oporto, himself an ex-Marrano, is the apostle and the inspiring leader of the movement of the Portuguese Marranos to ment of the Portuguese Marranos to Judaism. On the solemn occasion of the laying of the first stone of the new synagogue of Oporto, the crypto-Jews of Belmonte and Covilhan ad-dressed a message to Captain Barros Basto, through Samuel Schwartz, in which they said: "Your co-religionists in Belmonte and Covilhan, are with you heart and soul and congratulate the eminent Jew, Captain Barros Basto, for his great work, and wish the Jewish Community of Oporto peace

Jewish Community of Oporto peace and prosperity. Peace unto Israel."

The Oporto Synagogue "Mekor Haim," which is now being replaced by a new building, is situated in the Rua do Poco des Patas. It was consecrated on July 1, 1917, among those present being Moses Bensabat Amzalak, the President of the Lisbon Community. The synagogue serves and munity. The synagogue serves not only as a house of worship for the Jewish residents of Oporto, but is attended by Marranos from other parts of the country, who wish to familiarize themselves with various aspects of Judaism.

BRITAIN MAY REOPEN CASE FOR ADMISSION OF LEON TROTSKY

Debate in Parliament; Clynes Says New Action May Follow Russian Recognition

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 18-The question of Leon Trotsky's admission to England may be reconsidered, after the recog-nition of Russia by Great Britain, if circumstances alter the case. statement was made today by Home Secretary Clynes, replying to questions in the House of Commons by Colonel Josiah Wedgwood and others. Trotsky's application for admission to England was based, he said, on his desire to secure medical treatment and arrange for the publication of his biography. Assurances were offered by Trotsky, he declared, that he would make no attempt to interfere with domestic affairs in England, nor would he seek to make himself prominent in any way. No communications on the subject have been received from the Soviet Government, he asserted.

After giving the fullest consideration to the application, the government decided to refuse the request because mischievous people would unquestionably seek to exploit Trotsky's visit with the consequence of grave embarassment to the government. Pressed to produce the correspondence, Clynes promised to consider the request. Further discussion on the matter was stopped by the speaker. Members of parliament gave notice, however, that further questions would be asked at a later date.

It was expected today that if the matter came to a vote the labor back benchers and the liberals would vote for admission of Trotsky, whereas the government members and some of the conservatives would be opposed.

BERGER SLIGHTLY BETTER, BUT CONDITION STILL GRAVE

mittee was due mainly to the initiative of the Central Relief Committee, whose directors and contributors to its funds represent the traditional element in Jewry interested in preserving intact the spiritual heritage of their people, its learning and its culture. They felt all the while that it was hardly worth the effort to save the body of the Jew if his soul be left to perish in an abyss of ignorance, and that without proper education the Jewish youth would surely be lost to their people. They were aware that without this intensive effort, there would have been no lewish schools, the native populaces in their daily gruelling struggle and poverty being too poor to constitute their sys-tem of education disrupted by the War.

"The contributions of the Joint Distribution Committee being limited, furnish, however, only the nucleus of the funds needed for the maintenance of these schools. With the best of intentions the Joint Distribution Committee portion of their daily expenditures. The rest-the largest portion of it-they must find for themselves despite their poverty and bitter daily struggle for existence. That they do succeed in keeping the doors of their institutions open, and are affording the funda-mentals of a Jewish education to tens of thousands of children is due to their own devotion, to their own zeal for the cause of learning. Education is, by the way, a form of relief in which rich and poor, radical and conservative, share alike, the schools of a town or city being open to all alike, irrespective of their financial or economic status. Nor is the aid given restricted only to the schools conducted in a traditional spirit, the Tarbuth and school systems receiving their quota of aid alongside of all others. And it is the consensus of opinion among all groups and factions in the countries in which the schools operate, conservative, radical, progressive and Zionist, that the very progressive and continued activity of these schools is due to the efforts of their American brothers. It is a cry frequently heard abroad: 'Had it not been for the American Jews there would have been no Jewish schools left in the Diaspora!'

"During the past year or so, the Cultural Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee has been compelled to currial considerably its appropriations for the various schools receiving aid from it, owing to the lessened income of the Joint Distribution Committee and its constituent organizations. Although the country is instortally ancient, it is economically new and is only now standing on the threshold of modern civilization. He believes, he added, that Palestine is the only country, of the territories affected by the World War, which ever repaid anything to the British Exchequer for railways and other assets left by the military administration.

The former High Commissione further stated that he wishes to draw the attention of the government to the desirability of constructing a railway from Haifa to the Syrian fronties, so that the Palestinian railways may be linked with the Syrian railways When he was High Commissioner, he discussed the matter with the French High Commissioner of Syria, who was strongly in favor of the project. This would be of great advantage to the Palestine railways because it would allow a through traffic between Egypt and Syria, permit trade between Syria and Palestine, and link Palestine with Asia Minor.

Sir Oswald Mosely, referring to Sir Herbert Samuel's query, repiied that Palestine is not specifically mentioned in the clause referred to, because Palestine can be assisted under other clauses of the bill which permits mandated countries to make loans under the Colonial Development Fund.
