CHANGING ORTHODOX TO CONSERVATIVE SYNAGOGUE TRUST BREACH COURT RULES

Court of Appeals Upholds Orthodox Contention in Celebrated Cleveland Jewish Center Case (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, O., July 20-The Court of Appeals yesterday reversed the decis-ion of Chief Justice Homer G. Powell of the Common Pleas Court, when it granted an injunction against the granted an injunction against the Board of Trustees of the Cleveland Jewish Center and Rabbi Solomon Goldman, enjoining them from the use of the synagogue as a Conservative house of worship. The decision upholds the contention of the Orthodox members of the congregation that the synagogue was a trust, formed for Orthodox purposes, and that its trustees, without violating a trust, could not change the synagogue ritual from Orthoodx to Conservative. The decision that a breach of trust had occurred was unanimously upheld by all three judges sitting on the case.

The defendants, who were permitted to file an answer within two weeks, must stand trial in the Court of Appeals this fall, or revert the synagogue to its Orthodox status

W. K. Stanley, attorney for the de-fendants, stated that he did not know what further action would be taken. Rabbi Goldman is no longer the spir-itual leader of the Cleveland Jewish Center, now being with a Chicago congregation. The decision was handed down by

Judges Kent W. Hughes, Charles L. Justice, of the Third District Appellate Court, and Roy H. Williams of the Sixth District Appellate Court.

The case, which has been two years in litigation, has attracted nation-wide interest. Plaintiffs in the suit were an Orthodox Committee of the congregation, headed by A. A. Katz, which pressed charges against Rabbi Solomon Goldman and trustees of the Cleveland Jewish Center.

Formed as an Orthodox congregation, dissension arose among the members, when Rabbi Solomon Goldman, its spiritual leader, with the concur-rence of members of the board of trustees, changed the ritual to Conserv-

JEWISH LEADERS AGAIN SEE MANIU IN PROTEST

No Solution Found: Government Member Acknowledges Growing Dissatis-

faction Throughout Country (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 20-A group of Jewish leaders of Roumania against called upon Prime Minister Maniu vesterday to confer on the Jewish Communities Bill now in its final stage before enactment into law by parliament.

The Prime Minister listened to the objections of the Jewish community to the proposed law, as harmful to the interests of the community and the state. So far, however, no solution of the problem was found.

The member of the Government, Mirto, in an interview with a correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, admitted that the government was in the receipt of reports from all parts of the country concerning the growing dissatisfaction of the Jewish population with the pending bill.

MANDATES COMMISSION OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS CONCLUDES SESSIONS

Vaad Ha'Ir and Agudath Israel Petitions Not Considered (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, July 20—The Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, in session since July 1, concluded its sessions here yesterday. No official report concerning its decisions is as yet available, but the cor-respondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the petitions sub-mitted to the League body by the Vaad Ha'Ir, the Jerusalem Jewish Com-mittee, and the Orthodox Agudath Israel, were not considered, due prob-ably to the fact that the petitioners informed the Commission that they would submit new documents, which failed to arrive in time.

Concerning the Arab petition and the controversy over the Wailing Wall, it is stated the Commission decided to reiterate its views formulated at a previous session.

VOLKIST LEADERS ACKNOWLEDGE PROGRAM

OF PALESTINE WORK Party Has Considerable European Following; Branches Formerly

Opposed to Zionism (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, July 20-A further triumph for the Palestine work idea was seen here with the publication of a mes-sage addressed to the International Committee for Working Palestine by four leaders of the Jewish Volkspartei, Peoples Party, which has a considerable following in East European countries.

Professor Simon Dubnow, the Jew-ish historian, Lazki-Bertoldi, Efrojkin and Kreinin, four of the founders of the party, sent a message to the Working Palestine Committee, in which they subscribed to its program. The Peoples Party was founded on the conception that Jewish life must be continued in the Diaspora countries and that the recognition of Yiddish as a national language of the Jewish masses of Eastern Europe must be the goal of Jewish political activities in these Under certain conditions, countries. the Peoples Party was distinctly anti-Zionistic, often coming in conflict with those Zionists who were active in local politics.

ANTI- JEWISH TERROR SPREAD IN GERMAN TOWNS

Berlin, July 20-The spread of an anti-Jewish agitation in Mecklenburg towns is reported by the "Berliner Tageblatt" today.

In Gnojen, Mecklenberg, the anti-Semites posted large placards at the entrance and along the thoroughfares of the city, containing the following descriptions: "German Girls Avoid Jewish Company!" "Do Not Purchase from Jews." At night, members of the anti-Semitic National Socialist party arranged "katzenjammer" music in front of Jewish homes. The police do not interfere with these doings.

FEDERAL COUNCIL HEAD PLEADS FOR TOLERANCE (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Albany, July 20—A despatch from the Associated Press reports a plea for content of the Associated Albany, and the Associated Press reports a plea for content of the Solid Press, and the Associated Albany and the Federal Council of Churches, at an interdenominational service in the First Presbyterian Church of Glens Falls.

"Blind criticism of another's belief is born of ignorance," he said.

The publication by Felix M. Warburg of the names of the American non-Zionist delegates to the Council of the extended Jewish Agency was the subject of editorial comment in the New York Jewish press.

"An important step towards a united Jewish front was taken when Felix M. Warburg appointed the forty-one delegates who are to constitute the Annerican non-Zionist section of the Jewish Agency. Now is not the time to enter into a detailed consideration of all the members of the American non-Zionist personnel of the Agency," states an editorial in the New York "Daw,"

"What is important is that the personnel was appointed and that it includes several of the most important leaders in the United States, and that with this appointment the final preparation for the consummation of the Jewish Agency has been completed. The road towards the Jewish Agency the road towards the Jewish Agency that the state of the property of the deserves to be welcomed. The appointment of the American non-Zionist representation is indeed such a step.

"The entire weight of the Agency influence on the march of events in Palestine will become evidents of course, when the Agency will have started functioning and when we will have before us the actual results. Only then, will it be time to point out the merits and shortcomings, and to draw conclusions. Now, however, when the Agency is in process of formation, we may only welcome each step which brings it nearer, as a step leading in the long desired and expected direction," the paper says.

Similar is the view expressed by the "Jewish Morning Journal." "The list of the 41 Agency delegates selected to represent the non-Zionist American Jews is without doubt the greatest gain which Zionism has made in the past several difficult years," the paper past several difficult years, the paper writes. "The list represents a mas-terly combination of the many-sided Jewry in this country. Reform temples, radical labor leaders, 100% Yehudim, are represented in the list, which is not yet, complete There are even sons of fathers who were out-spoken enemies of Zion. Here is a triumph, which Zionism has scored in Jewish life, among ourselves, which is worth many times more than all the triumphs which the movement has recorded outside of Jewish life in pre-vious good years. UNEARTH TEMPLE OF ASSYRIAN KING (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, July 20—The Palace of Sennacherib, the Assyrian King who captured Jerusalem about the Christian era, has been uncertified by a University of Chicago expedition, Prof. Edward Chiera, just returned from the scene, says. It is larger than Solomon's Temple, and is close to the Tigris, not far from the site of ancient Nineveh.

Sennacherib figures in the Old Testament as the King who was smitten by the angel of the Lord, possibly with poison gas, as the whole army was destroyed, when it "came down like a wolf on the fold."

Coping with the Problems of Jewish Emigration

By Our Paris Correspondent

Paris, July 9—A high tribute to the memory of M. Franz Philippson, the president of the Ica, was paid by Deputy Dr. Oscar Kohn, the president of the Administrative Council of the Hicem (Hias-Ica-Emigdirekt) in opening its annual meeting here. The meeting then adjourned as a sign of mourning.

When the meeting was resumed, Dr. Kohn presented the report of the directors of the Hias-Ica-Emigdirekt on the activities of the Association during the period April 1, 1927 to December 31, 1928.

The meeting was attended by Aaron Benjamin and Dr. James Bernstein New York, Dr. Israel Bernstein, Berjin, Dr. J. Blau, Frankfort, Leonard L. Cohen and O. E. d'Avigdor-Goldsmid, London, Dr. Joachimssohn, Berlin, Mr. Gribeschock, Riga, Dr. M. Krainin, Paris, Mr. Latzki-Bertoldi, Riga, Prof. Mittwoch, Berlin, Leondzkin, M. Dr. James Simon was the first president of the Administrative Council of the Hicem, being elected at the constituting meeting held in Paris in April 1927.

Jewish emigration during the past two years, Deputy Kohn stated in his report, totalled between 35,000 and 40,000 a year. In spite of the reduction of Jewish emigration, the protection of the emigrants became increasingly difficult on account of the restrictions which surround the admission of the emigrants into the overseas countries, and the complicated formalities to which they are submitted.

This state of affairs, the report stated, is reflected in the activities of the Hias-Ica-Emigdirekt, which can be summed up as follows:

The number of people who appealed for aid to the affiliated committees of the Association in the countries of emigration amounted in 1927 to about 40,000, and in 1928 to more than 53,000.

The committees gave legal and consular advice and help in 10,975 cases in 1927, and in 19,816 cases in 1928. The number of emigrants who were aided by the Hicem in the Argentine, Brazil, Uruguay and Canada, where Braticularly effective, grew in 1927 to 6,453, and in 1928 to 10,831 in 1927 esour countries, 1,888 emigrants were in 1927 provided with employment by the effices organized under the auspices

J. D. C. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO MEET IN ZURICH IN AUGUST

First Meeting of Executive Ever Held Outside United States

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee will be held for the brst time in its history outside of the borders of the United States during the month of August, it was announced.

August, it was announced. The meeting will take place in Zurich, Switzerland, where the most prominent members of the Committee, including Felix M. Warburg, Louis Marshall, Dr. Cyrus Adler, Dr. Lee K. Frankel, will proceed to attend the inaugural session of the extended Jewish Agency. Other members of the Executive Committee, including Paul Baerwald, David Bressler, Joseph C. Hyman, who are now in Europe, will also attend. It is expected that Dr. Bernard Kahn, European Director of the Joint Distribution Committee, and Dr. Joseph Rosen, head of the Agro-Joint, will come to Zurich to attend the meeting.

QUEBEC GOVERNMENT INCREASES HOSPITAL GRANT (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Montreal, July 20—The subsidy of \$2125,000 granted to the Mount Sinai Sanatorium for the new building, has been increased by the Provincial Government by an addition sum of \$25,000, making a total grant of \$150,000. The ground for the new building was broken recently. Louis Salomon is the president of the Mount Sinai Sanatorium, which is under the direction of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of Montreal.

The sanatorium will be non-sectaian, and will be equipped with an upto-date operating room and complete K-Ray department. The new building will be erected at an estimated cost of \$250,000, and will accommodate one hundred patients.

OCHS, ROSENWALD NAMED HEBREW UNION ALUMNI (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Lodge No. 4 of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, in convention assembled, rejoices at the extension of the Jewish Agency, fully appreciates the added impetus it will give to the rebuildnig of Palestine, and greets it as an event of the greatest historical significance in the life of the Jewish people; and be it further
"Resolved, that this convention ex-

tends its congratulations to Dr. Chaim Weizmann and to Mr. Louis Marsahll, whose leadership, vision and untiring efforts have been largely responsible for the success of the Agency negotiations.

of the Hicem, and 4,367 were provided with employment in 1928.

The number of persons who entered the Argentine and Canada, thanks to the permits obtained by the commit-tees of the Hicem, grew in 1928 to 2,444. Many of the immigrants assisted by the Hicem have also benefited by the material aid granted them in the form of advances, amounting in 1927 to more than \$45,000, and in 1928 to over \$100,000.

The efforts made by the Association to adapt the emigrants to the conditions obtaining in the countries of immigration, are shown in the language courses, and in the training given in agriculture and other occupations. Several of these efforts have yielded excellent results, while others need still to be tested.

In the second half of 1928, the Hicem began to put into operation its work providing credits in the countries of immigration. This work was beset with technical difficulties, which the Hicem succeeded, however, in overcoming. Loans were granted accordingly to facilitate the establishment of the workers who had just arrived, and for the purchase of tickets for those persons who had not sufficient means to bring over their relatives from Eastern Europe.

These institutions were called upon to render services to the emigrants of a kind which could not be fully appreciated until the course of the year

1929.

Dr. Oscar Kohn, expressing his satisfaction with the results achieved. mentioned in particular that the ac-tivity of the Hicem was carried on during a period when the question of immigration in general was very difficult, and when restrictions bristled around the immigration movement to the Argentine, Canada, and South Africa, and when at the same time the need of Jewish emigration was more pressing than ever.

The situation was the more difficult because of the measures taken in the countries of immigration, not in contwas the duty of the Hicem to watch that immigration facilities in favor of Jewish emigrants should be as wide as possible

Dr. Joachimssohn reported to the Council on behalf of the Revision Commission, wheih, he said, had found all the financial operations of the Association in perfect order and to their complete satisfaction.

Leo Motzkin spoke of the fruitful results obtained by the cooperation of the Hias, Ica and Emigdirekt in the Hicem. The Administrative Council Hicem. then unanimously approved the re-ports. It also ratified the budget of the Hicem for the year 1929, which was adopted by the Executive Committee at the end of the year.
