JOINT FOREIGN COMMITTEE TO ACT ON SCHECHITA PROHIBITION IN NORWAY Will Not Interfere in Controversy Between Jewish Leaders and Rou-

manian Government

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) London, July 22-The Joint Foreign Committee, the body representing the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Tewish Deputies, for the protection of Jewish rights, will spare no effort to persuade the government of Norway to reconsider the recent decision of Parliament to enact a prohibition on schechita, declared Lucien Wolf, secretary, in the committee's report submitted Sunday to the monthly meeting of the Board of Jewish Deputies.

A prohibition of schechita has already been adopted in Sweden, and there is real danger that the two Scandinavian kingdoms may be followed by Denmark. The Joint Foreign Committee was taken by surprise, since the promoters of the schechita prohibition in Norway made secret preparations for the passage of the bill to prevent Jewish bodies from counteracting their propaganda which was defeated two years ago.

The Joint Foreign Committee has decided that it cannot make representations to the government of Roumania in connection with the present controversy between the government and Jewish leaders concerning the Jewish communities law. Mr. Wolf explained that here was not a question of intolerable persecution or of an infraction of treaty rights, but an internal difference between various sections of the Jewish community.

NEPMAN TO BE GIVEN STATUS OF ARTISANS IF THEY INVEST IN FACTORIES NEAR TOWNS Concession One of Moves to Provide

Employment for Declassed (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 22-The Jewish Nepmen will be considered as artisans if they will employ their capital to build factories on a shareholding basis, near the various towns and villages, it is announced here. This change of status is being offered as a means of relieving the situation in the towns and villages, and thereby providing employment for declassed artisans and former Nepmen.

The factories will have to work on the collective principle, it is stated. It is hoped that American landsmanschaften will be interested in purchasing shares in such factories, inasmuch as most of the workers employed will be Iews.

The first town to take up this proiect is that of Karsnostav, trict of Wolyn, where the Jews have applied for permission to build a glass factory on a shareholding basis, with the Nepmen holding 35 per cent. of the shares, the artisans, 45 per cent., and the declassed, 20 per cent.

A brick factory in Stepanetz, Ukraine, is planned on a similar basis. The sum of \$160 received from a Landsmanschaft in America will be

invested in this factory. The Jews of Volotschisk are anxious to build a mirror factory where one hundred workers can be employed. The sum of 25,000 roubles is necessary. The local Soviet is willing to provide 5,000 roubles of that sum, while the rest of the money must be raised through selling shares. This movement, which is similar to private con cessions, may bring the Nepmen back to the towns, since their status as legalized shareholders provides them with artisan privileges and gives their children the right to enter schools. At the same time, their shares can be sold whenever they change their minds.

PROGRESSIVE ORDER OF WEST OPENS BIENNIAL CONVENTION IN PHILA

Philadelphia, Pa., July 22-With more than 250 delegates and visitors, representing a score of cities, in attendance, the Progressive Order of the West, insurance fraternal order, opened its 26th convention at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel here Sunday. The Order, which was founded in 1896, has en holding bi-ennial conventions in ecent years. The largest delegations are here from Chicago and St. Louis. The convention will last until Tuesday evening.

Today's sessions were featured by the rendition of the Grand Master's message by Joseph Schiller, of Chicago. Mr. Schiller reported that "two years ago there was dissension in our ranks, created by people who received honors at your hands. Today I am happy to report that that condition does not exist. We are all united to assist in the growth and uplift of your Order."

He praised his various official colleagues, urged continued organization of Ladies Auxiliaries; recommended abolition of so-called "state boards" and establishment instead of "city central bodies" to act "for the best in-terests of the Order;" praised the or-ganization's monthly bulletin and its editor, William H. Goldman, and assured the delegates that "all investments are amply secured and properly safe-guarded." He urged continued support for Zionist endeavor and also for the Ort and People's Tool campaigns. A recommendation was made that "legislation be enacted to issue policies in the sum of one hundred dollars, in order to make it possible for a number of people who are not inter-(Continued on Page 4)

AMY SCHECHTER, DAUGHTER OF DR. SOLOMON SCHECHTER HELD FOR MURDER IN STRIKE Formal Indictments Monday; Defense Asks Change of Venue; Fears Mob Spirit

Amy Schechter, a daughter of the late Jewish scholar and president of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, Dr. Solomon Schechter, is among the fifteen textile strikers who have been arrested in Gastonia, North Carolina, on charges of murder, in connection with the death of O. F. Al-

derholt, Chief of Police, on June 7. The formal indictment is scheduled to be made on July 29th, after which the date of the trial will be set. According to forecasts in the radical

labor press, the trial may have repercussions, rivalling those aroused by the Sacco-Vanzetti case. Miss Schechter was in charge of the International Labor Defense Headquarters in Gastonia which has been aiding in the defense of the millhands since the opening of the strike in April. Although she was in the headquarters of the International Labor Defense, and not on the scene of the battle, she is held without bond, on the charge of murder, together with the following: Fred Erwin Beal of Lawrence, Mass.; K. They contend that a fair trial is impossible when the jurors must be drawn from a panel of less than 20,000, most of whom own stock in the mills and are deeply prejudiced against the "Godless Communists." "Communism against Americanism" is the local slogan. One local paper repeatedly demanded "vengeance on the Russian anarchists who killed our beloved Chief in cold blood." The "Greensboro Daily News," a newspaper published in a neighboring town, reports that "Gaston County is desperately near the mood to try a dozen or more malcontents for murder and condemn them for what they think of God, marriage and the nigger."

Only six of the strikers indicted are known to have had guns at the time of the shooting.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT PERMITS MOSLEMS BUILD AT WAILING WALL

Allowed on Advice It is Not Infringement of Status Quo

Jerusalem, July 22-A report was mrent here today that the Palestine greenment permitted the Moslem authorities to resume their building attivities on top of the Wailing Wall which were discontinued when Palestine Jews protested against this as viohting the status quo.

It was further stated that this action of the government followed the opinion of the Juridical Advisors to the Privy Council that building on top of the Wailing Wall does not constitute a

violation of the status quo.

N. Y. REPUBLICANS AGREE ON JUDGE LEWIS FOR MAYOR Judge Henry E. Lewis, of Brooklyn, Justice of the Supreme Court of the

New York Second District, will be the Republican candidate for Mayor of the City of New York, if he can be pereaded to accept.

Judge Lewis is now in Europe, and a mend is now enroute to visit him to tender the proffer of the Republican party and to persuade him to accept the nomination.

It is learned that Judge Lewis, who is not eager to be a candidate, has made two conditions before he will eren entertain the possibility. These conditions are that he shall be virtu-ally the unanimous choice of his party and that he shall have a reasonable thance of election. The first of these onditions has already been met, and Republican leaders believe the second to have been circumvented through a survey which reveals that Mayor Walker's position is not impregnable, because, should ex-Mayor Hylan run, he will receive at least 200,000 Democratic votes, they state.

The Republican choice for Mayor is loty-nine years old, and a native of New York City. Educated in the pub-ic and high schools of New York City, he was admitted to the practice of law in 1901. In 1915, he was named County lidge of Kings County, New York, kaing that post in 1916 to become District Attorney of Kings County, an office which he held until 1921. In 1922 he was elected Justice of the Sufreme Court of the State of New York, which position he now holds. Word from Judge Lewis must be received before August 1, when the mofficial city convention will be held be draw up a ticket for the primary election on September 17.

Court of Appeals Renders Opinion in Orthodox vs. Conservative Litigation in Cleveland Jewish Center Case

By Our Cleveland Correspondent

Cleveland, July 22-Much interest was displayed in Jewish circles in this city in the opinion rendered by the Court of Appeals of Cuyahogo County, State of Ohio, 8th District, in the long drawn-out litigation, between the Orthodox and Conservative elements of the membership of the Cleveland Jewish Center.

The Court, which upheld the contention of the Orthodox Committee. headed by Abraham A. Katz, in its legal fight against Dr. Solomon Goldman, former rabbi of the Center, a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary. maintained that size of the control of the Jewish Theological Seminary. seminary, maintained that since the constitution of the congregation spe-cifically states that it was formed for the purpose of preserving orthodox Indaism it is to be considered a trust, and those who changed the character of the congregation from Orthodox to Conservative, committed a breach of trust.

The opinion, dated July 19, 1929, written by Justices Hughes of the Third District, and concurred in by Judge Justice of the Third District and Judge Williams of the Sixth District, sitting by designation, states:

This action is before us on appeal and is submitted to us upon demurrer to the amended petition which seeks to enjoin the use of church property in violation of alleged trust conditions imposed thereon. There are thirteen individuals who join as plaintiffs, asserting that they are members of a committee representing the orthodox members of the congregation.

The amended petition further alleges in substance:

That the congregation is a corpora-

tion not for profit;
That the defendant Goldman is the acting rabbi for the congregation, and that the other thirty-two individual defendants are the trustees of the congregation;

That this action was brought by these plaintiffs on behalf of the orthodox members of the congregation who are too numerous to name and be made parties plaintiff, but that they are all in good standing;

That the congregation was incorporated for the purpose of promoting traditional or orthodox Judaism in the worship of God, and to build a syna-

gogue for a like purpose;

That this congregation was formed in 1917 by a consolidation of two orthodox congregations which at all times before accepted and promulgated the doctrine of orthodox or tradi-tional Judaism, and in the church services adopted the rites, ceremonies and practices appertaining thereto; That traditional or orthodox Juda-

ism means that religious doctrine which recognizes certain things set forth in detail;

BELGIAN JEWISH SCHOLAR LOSES SENATE RACE DUE TO AGE Prof. Schpeier Probable Belgian Rep-

ference in one year. Prof. Schpeier. the probable representative of Belgian Jewry on the Council of the Jewish Agency lost the race for membership in the Luxembourg provincial Senate. Prof. Schpeier ran on the ticket of

the Liberal party. He was opposed by numerous opposition groups, including the Socialists. When the votes were counted, it developed that Schpeier and an indeepndent candidate, Jabon, received an equal number of votes. The president of the Senate, to whom the matter was referred, ordered that the matter be decided, instead of by a new election, by a determination as to who is older. When both candidates produced their birth certificates, it appeared that the independent Jabon was 60 years of age where as Schpeier was 59.

Prof. Schpeier's Jewishness figured profi. Scapeler's Jewishness ingular prominently in the campaign. Even the Socialist organ, "Revue de Luxembourg," attacked him as a "Judas, who came to buy out Belgium with his millions." It is charged that the ruling to determine the election, by the age of the candidate, was found the most convenient way of barring the Jew since their respective ages were known in advance.

The battle started, it is alleged, when a police department automobile, with the chief of police, an ex-policeman named Roach and a policeman, Gilbert, entered into the tent colony established by the strikers with the help of the Workers International Re-Association. Following a fire which had destroyed the first tent colony of the strikers, forced to live in tents and maintain their own stores following their eviction from companyowned property, it was decided to maintain their own guards, inasmuch as police protection was declared unreliable. When the policemen were challenged by the colony's guards, it is stated that the policemen opened fire on the guards. The attempt to enter the tent colony followed the forcible dispersion of a picket line which was marching to the factory. Roach and Gilbert have been indicted for attempt to murder following an assault at 6:30 P. M. on the evening of June 7, prior to their visit to the strikers' colony, it is reported.

Miss Schechter was formerly associated with the editorial staff of the "Maccabean," a Zionist journal. Several years ago, she went to Soviet Russia, where she spent some time as a

teacher.

Judge Hoyle Sink of the Superior Court was appointed by Governor Max Gardiner of North Carolina to sit on the case. It is now believed, however, that he will be replaced by Judge Barnhill of the Superior Court. Clyde Hoey, brother-in-law of the Governor, is in charge of the prosecution.

"The spirit of animosity among Gastonia's authorities has been clearly hown already," according to Joseph Brodsky, one of the counsel for the defense, describing the habeas corpus proceedings which he conducted several weeks ago. "Arrests were made on the three days following the murder. We were denied our application for writs of habeas corpus. Ninetyfive men and women were held incommunicado. Finally, we secured a writ signed by Superior Court Judge Harding directing all the witnesses to be produced in court on the following Wednesday at 10 o'clock, in Charlotte.

"To embarrass the defense, the Gastonia authorities called a hearing in Gastonia at 9.30 A. M. Wednesday. Since the defense attorneys felt it most important to get to the Charlotte Court, they waived the preliminary hearing. Then Judge Harding put on the defendants the burden of refuting the presumption of guilt alleged to be carried by the unavoidable waiver of the first hearing in Gastonia.

"Typical of the attitude of Gaston County were the questions stressed by Clyde Hoey, prosecutor, before the Charlotte Court hearing. "Do you believe in God," he asked Amy Schechter. She said she could not answer, "yes" or "no." Judge Harding upheld the prosecutor's insistence that the witness answer categorically. She answered "no."

in 1917 there was adopted a constitution for the congregation, and officers were elected, and for six years the congregation was conducted as an orthodox church;

That pursuant to this consolidation agreement, the church property which had been so used for the past six years by the defendant congregation was sold, and that the sale money, together with money raised by contributions from the members of the congregation, a new synagogue was erect-ed and formally dedicated to the promotion of orthodox Judaism;

The real estate is then specifically described:

That by reason of the facts set

forth herein above, a trust was imposed upon this church property, and that it should be used for orthodox Judaism only:

That the defendant Rabbi and the trustees are opposed and hostile to orthodox Judaism and the ceremonial observations pertaining thereto;

That they have failed and refused to observe the trust imposed upon the property in this, to-wit, and here follow thirty-eight specifications of alleged omissions and commissions, all of which are alleged to be contrary to and in defiance of the provisions of the constitution which was adopted in 1917 by the congregation, and which is still in force; That, in 1924, a meeting of the con-

gregation was had for the purpose of adopting a new constitution, where and when a new constitution was adopted, ignoring orthodox Judaism, but its adoption was contrary to the terms of the old constitution relative to the manner in which amendments were authorized or made:

That the defendants are wrongfully operating under this new constitution and refused to permit the plaintiffs to conduct orthodox services within the synagogue.

Then follows the prayer.

There have been many theories presented to us in oral arguments and by briefs, raising nice questions regarding the rights of various congregations to change the use of properties once adopted to certain purposes, or dedicated for certain purposes, but we deem it unnecessary to discuss these various theories because, it will be noted, that in the amended petition there are two paragraphs, or perhaps three, setting forth certain facts which if established by evidence would enti-tle the plaintiffs, in our judgment, to an injunction.

It will be observed that it is alleged in the amended petition that the congregation was incorporated for the purpose of promoting traditional or orthodox Judaism in the worship of God, and to build a synagogue for a like purpose, and that this synagogue was so built and dedicated to the promotion of orthodox Judaism; and then it is alleged that defendants are guilty of certain wrongful acts set forth in some thirty-eight specifications of alleged omissions and commission, which the pleaders say is conduct contrary

It was stated that the Order now has nearly 12,000 members and a Reserve Fund of over half a million dollars. It is needless to go further into a discussion of the other questions raised in this case, because if these averments are true, and by the demurrer to the amended petition they are admitted to be true, the plaintiffs are entitled to an injunction.

The demurrer to the amended petition is, therefore, overruled and ex-ceptions noted and defendants given leave to re-file answers within two
