COVERNMENT INFORMS PAL-ESTINE JEWS IT WILL PERMIT BUILDING AT WAILING WALL Bases Decision on Legal Opinion of Crown Officers

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

lerusalem, July 24-The Palestine overnment will permit the Moslem religious authorities to carry out their bilding plans near the Western Wall of the Temple, commonly known as the Wailing Wall, the District Commissioner of Jerusalem has informed Rabbi A. I. Kook, Palestine Chief Rabbi.

In this communication, the District Commissioner declares that after reciving the legal opinion of the officers of the Crown, the government has decided not to object to the reconstruction, by the Moslems, of the Wall, south of the Wailing Wall, on condition that it is rebuilt to the extent of its former height. The govthe proposed opening which is now being made in this wall, provided that there will be no incursion, through this opening, into the pavement near the Wailing Wall, during-the custom-ary hours of Jewish worship there.

JEWISH NATIONAL FUND OPENS SPECIAL CONFERENCE IN ZURICH Delegates Approve Plan to Seek \$5,000,000 for Land Purchase in Two Years

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Zurich, July 24-A program of work for the Jewish National Fund, Zionist land purchasing agency in Palestine. was submitted and approved at a special national fund conference opened here, prior to the first session of the 16th Zionist Congress.

An amount of at least £1,000,000, to be raised and expended during the coming two years, will be sought, according to a decision of the conference, which was opened by M. M. Ussischkin, head of the Jewish National Fund.

Mr. Ussischkin described the land purchase conditions in Palestine and stated that a danger has arisen recently through the organization of Arab groups formed for the purpose of buying land in Palestine. The purchase of land is now the outstanding problem. Although it is necessary to obtain government land, no miracles are expected. Land is necessary for the establishment of new settlements in the old colonies as well as to purchase the Gaza region. Purchases are

EXCLUDE DISCOVERER OF NEW TUBERCULOSIS CURE FROM MEDICAL SOCIETY low That Method Is Recognized, Name of Jewish Physician Suppressed in German Press

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Berlin, July 24—The triumph of a Jewish physician who suffered hard ships including expulsion from the Medical Society in the process of find ing a new cure for tuberculosis is de-scribed by Deputy Moses, member of the Reichstag, and official physician of

that body. Dr. Max Gerson of Bielefeld, the Jewish physician whose new method of curing tuberculosis through diet was recognized a short time ago by the Berlin Medical Society, following approval given to him by the famous Sauerbruch clinic, was engaged in ex-perimenting with this method for many years. He was denounced by his non-Jewish colleagues as a quack and was excluded from the medical association, Deputy Moses now relates. Dr. Gerson for many years, despite his poverty, continued to carry on his research work. Now that his discovery has received recognition, the German nationalist press suppresses his name, giving credit only to the Sauerbruch clinic "It is high time, Deputy Moses declared, "that the entire world learned that Dr. Max Gerson was the unknown soldier of German science.'

JEWISH REGIONS SIMILAR TO THOSE OF UKRAINE MAY BE ESTABLISHED IN CRIMEA Unification Made Possible by Decree Permitting Land Exchange (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 24-Jewish regions in Crimea, similar to those established in the Ukraine, are now an eventuality to be anticipated, according to announcements made here. The possibility arises out of a decision of the Crimean Land Commissariat granting the Comzet, governmental department for settling Jews on the land, the right to exchange land with the government agricultural units now lying between the Jewish colonies in Crimea. Until now, Jewish regions in Crimea, long advocated by the Comzet, were impossible, because the colonies were split. The unifying venture is further made practicable through a new grant of ninety-five thousand hectares of land which can be used for exchange purposes. Fifty thousand hectares are already under Comzet jurisdiction, and preparations are under way to start settlements of Jews in 1930.

Agrojoint is digging wells there.

Hope is also laid on the land reform now going on in Crimea whereby the land taken from the Kulaks is being given to the Jews, thus supplying additional exchange possibilities.

J. Golde, a member of the Comzet, has left for Crimea, in connection with this decision, to which great importance is attached.

Moscow, July 24—The praesidium of the Zik has decided to rename the city and region of Trotsky in the Leningrad district to Krasnogvardeisk and Krasnogvardiesky.

CONGRESS SUPPORTS ROU-MANIAN LEADERS PROTEST AGAINST RELIGIOUS LAW

The Administrative Committee of the American lewish Congress, acting on the request of the United Roumanian Jews of America and several other affiliated organizations has called the attention of the Roumanian Minister at Washington to the threatened wrong with which the Jews of Roumania are faced in the proposed enactment of a law which would break up the unity and undermine the authority of the Jewish communities in Roumania, it was announced by Bernard G. Richards, Executive Director.

In the communication sent on the subject it was pointed out that the proposed new legislation would tend to mar he better relations between all elements the population in Roumania.

In the reply received yesterday from Government, the American lewish Congress was assured that its representations on the subject would be given immediate attention.

It was announced also that a special committee of the American Jewish Congress which, while abroad will confer with European leaders about Jewish conditions in Europe and will take steps to enlarge the Geneva Bureau of the Council of Minorities, is made up of the fol-lowing: Morris Weinberg, Chairman, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Major Julius I. Peyser, Morris Dlugasch, Abraham Goldberg and Joseph Weiss.

The Jewish Daily Bulletin is requested to state that the news story in quested to state that the news story in its issue of July 22 entitled: "Roumani-an Jews here protest new religious law" is not in line with the spirit of the decision taken at the meeting of the United Roumanian Jews.

It is informed there was really

no question of a protest but merely a friendly intervention with Prime Minister Maniu, to find a solution which will satisfy the Jewish needs.

ORDER JOINS PROTEST AGAINST RELIGIOUS PERSECUTIONS IN RUSSIA Endorses Jewish Agency; Urges Peace

Between Congress and Committee (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, July 24—That the Progressive Order of the Wost, whose membership is centered in the Middle West and West, will seek to extend its activities to the Eastern section of the country, was indicated here today at the final session of the 26th convention, when the delegates passed a resolution to have the Order seek an insurance license in New York State. The ways and means of achieving this were referred to the Executive Board. The Order at present has a special license to operate in Syracuse and has members in that city, and in New Jersey. The delegates unanimously adopted

a resolution strongly condemning the anti-religious activities of the sektzia" in Russia, and urging the American government to use its influence to have the acts of persecution cease. The resolution introduced by William H. Goldman, of St. Louis, is as follows:

"Whereas, over two million of our co-religionists in Russia are subject to the most outrageous interference in their religious belief and are deprived of every principle of religious freedom through the activities of the 'Yevsektzia,' who are preventing by force and other illegitimate means the practice of Judaism and Jewish religion; particularly that concerning the Jewish youth, who is compelled to be brought up in ignorance of Jewish traditions and learning; therefore,

"Be it resolved, that we, in convention assembled, solemnly protest against such intolerable and inhuman treatment of Jews in Russia, and join with other organizations in their mighty protest against such unbear-able discrimination and mistreatment. "Resolved, further, that a copy of

this resolution be sent to the Secretary of State and the Chairmen of the Foreign Affairs Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives."

Another resolution adopted, urged the consolidation of the American Jewish Congress and the American Jewish Committee to promote "a united Jewry." It was stated by the sponsors of this resolution that in the event the negotiations now under way between the two bodies fail to materialize satisfactorily, the Order will continue its financial support to the Congress as in the past.

The Jewish Agency was endorsed and greater stimulus for Zionist activity among members, urged. The chair-man of the Order's Committee on Jewish Activities was requested to give special attention to Zionist endeavor.

The convention voted financial and moral support to the Hias, Ort and People's Tool Campaign and Denver Home for Jewish Children. The amount of financial support will be

determined by the incoming Executive Board.

A membership campaign was voted A motion calling for construction of "center buildings" in various cities was defeated.

That the Order may eventually undertake construction of a sanatarium for its tubercular members was indi cated by a resolution which was appointed to work out plans for practical assistance and care for tubercu lar members, and this committee is to report back its findings for action, to the 1931 convention, which the members voted, is to take place in For Worth, Texas. Louis Jaffie, of Chicago, headed the Resolutions Committee

The matter of providing a contin-gency fund for the Grand Master which brought about an acrimonious discussion, was revived, but Grand Master Joseph Schiller refused to consider the motion and forthwith adjourned the session.

As result, the foundation for construcme development of new Jewish cen-ers in Central and South American Republics has been laid and contacts bre been established with Australia, South Africa and other countries in thich possibilities for large Jewish emigration exists. The decision of the conference in Paris to extend the greement between the three organiations for another three years is the ist evidence of the harmonious cogeration existing between them and which naturally reacts most favorably non the lot of the unhappy Jewish underers," Mr. Herman said.

The ratification of the decision of the Paris conference," he stated, "is de-madent upon the support which Merican Jewry will give to Hias. Near-Eastern Notes By J. T. A. Correspondents

Jerusalem, July 11-The referendum among the members of the two principal labor parties "Achdut Avodah" and "Hapoel Hazoir" in regard to their amalgamation is nearing completion. That the results of the referendum will be favorable to the union is clear, the proposal having been approved at conferences which took place in May and June, when a common platform was worked out.

A group of non-partisan laborites was formed in Tel Aiv, among whom are men prominent in the artistic and literary life of the country. They have issued an appeal to all unaffiliated workers to join the united Labor

All but the final count of the election returns for delegates to the 16th Zionist Congress showed a majority for the Labor Party, which this year placed a united ballot before the vot-

There were nine other lists, namely the Mizrachi, Revisionists, Yemenite Labor, Yemenite National Organiza-tion, Mizrachi Hatzoir, Craftsmen, Democrat Zionists, and National Citi-

zens Party.
Of the 25,599 votes counted, Labor received (together with Yemenites) -15,937 votes, Mizrachi 2,742, Revision-ists 2,552, General Zionists 1,215, Democrat Zionists, 1,023, Yemenites 988, National Citizens Party 1,133, Mizra-chi Hatzair 183, Craftsmen 159.

Beirut, July 11-Separation of the Christian majorities in Beirut and the Lebanons from the Moslem majorities of Damascus, Homs, Aleppo and Alexandretta, is being urged by unofficial French sources here, who say that the Moslem state, with its capital at Damascus, should be a constitutional mon-archy under a Moslem prince, while the Lebanons should continue a re-public with a Christian president.

Candidates for the Damascus throne are not lacking. The latest is the Prince Adil Ben Ayad who, it is claimed, is held in such respect in the Moslem world, that all parties would accept him. A "Frenchman," he is descended from the ancient Arab line of the Ommyades. An ancestor of his was ambassador-extraordinary the Bey of Tunis to Louis Phillippe. His grandfather was naturalized as a Frenchman under Napoleon III, obtaining in recognition for the services rendered France, the medal of Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor. His mother, Princess Roukie Fazil of Egypt, is the direct descendant of the great Mehmed Ali of Egypt. His wife is the niece of King Fuad of

Egypt.

FUR STRIKE IN NEW YORK CONCLUDED AS FEW OBEY CALL

End of Strike Viewed as Collapse of Communism in Industry

The Needle Trade Workers' Industrial Union, made up of the Communist element that for a time controlled the cloak and suit and fur trades, has called off the fur strike it ordered June 11. Of the 10,000 in the industry, not more than 100 had quit their jobs.

The decision to end the strike came after a meeting of the Strike Com-mittee in Webster Hall, where Joseph Boruchowitz, general manager of the union, said it had been deemed best to permit unemployed furriers to seek work. Strikes against individual shops, he said, might be called from time to

Charles Stetsky, general manager of the International Fur Workers' Union, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, against which the strike was actually directed, hailed the decision as the formal end of Communist influence in the industry.

"Ben Gold, Aaron Gross and the rest of the wrecking crew now admit that the Communists no longer are a factor in the industry," he said. "The clean-up is complete. It is a matter of congratulation that so few honest furriers were misled or coerced into abandoning their jobs. At all times we had the situation well in hand."

Leaders of the Communist group

partly blame the police for the com-plete collapse of their strike, several saying in the meeting that it was impossible "to beat the bosses, the Federation and the police working together.'

Edward F. McGrady, who with Mat-thew Woll and Hugh Frayne of the American Federation of Labor, was assigned to clear up the Communist situation in the furrier's organization, predicted that the Communist organization will now crumble.

LITHUANIA DECORATES JUDGE AARON J. LEVY

The Order of Gedeminas, Grand Duke of Lithuania, third class decoration, has been conferred on Supreme Court Justice Aaron J. Levy by the Republic of Lithuania.

The decoration, an elaborate gold cross and ribbon, which was sent to Justice Levy by the Lithuanian Consul General in behalf of his government, was accompanied by a procla-mation signed by President Smetona and Premier Waldermaras, which re-cited that the decoration had been voted by the Lithuanian Parliament for meritorious services in connection with the recognition of Lithuania by the United States government.
