

AGENCY COUNCIL ISSUES CALL TO WORLD JEWRY, ANNOUNCING UNITY ON REBUILDING OF PALESTINE

Adopts Unanimous Resolution Urging Great Britain to Effectively Cooperate with Enlarged Body, Giving It Full Rights Provided for in League Mandate; Demands Solution of Wailing Wall Controversy; Upbuilding Work Declared Sacred Cause to Which All Jews Must Rally

Zurich, Aug. 14—A call to the Jews of the world to lend financial support to the united Jewish effort for the rebuilding in Palestine of a Jewish National Home, irrespective of their group or party affiliation, and an expression of hope that Great Britain, as the Mandatory Power for Palestine, will cooperate effectively with the enlarged Jewish Agency, were contained in a resolution adopted unanimously at today's session of the Jewish Agency Council.

The assembly of Zionists and non-Zionists combined unanimously approved the following resolution, which was submitted in behalf of the constitution committee by James N. Rosenberg, New York lawyer, who was named one of the twelve vice-presidents of the Agency Council session. The resolution reads:

Rejoice Israel Is United for Palestine, Sacred Cause

"I. Whereas the government of Great Britain, by the Balfour Declaration, has pledged to use its best endeavors to facilitate the establishment of a National Home for the Jewish people in Palestine;

"Whereas, the Declaration has been approved by the League of Nations, which designated Great Britain as the Mandatory Power and by the Congress of the United States of America;

"Whereas, the Palestine Mandate created the Jewish Agency as a public body to cooperate with the Mandatory Power in all matters concerning the establishment of the Jewish National Home;

"Whereas the Mandatory Power has approved the enlargement of the Jewish Agency to include and represent all Jews, Zionists as well as non-Zionists;

"Whereas, the Zionist Organization and the non-Zionists have now joined in forming the enlarged Jewish Agency, the Council of the Jewish Agency at its first session unanimously resolves:

"1. That it rejoices that all Israel is united for the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home in Palestine and calls upon every Jew throughout the world to rally to the sacred cause.

"2. The Council of the Jewish Agency expresses its appreciation to Great Britain for the issuance of the Balfour Declaration and confidently hopes that the Mandatory will cooperate with the enlarged Agency in fully realizing the great aim set by the Declaration and the Mandate.

Ask Effective Cooperation of Mandatory Power

"With that end in view the Council of the Jewish Agency for Palestine asks that the acknowledged status of the Agency be effectively realized and measures be adopted by the Mandatory to foster the growth of the Jewish National Home, while guarding the just rights and promoting the welfare of all the inhabitants of Palestine.

"II. The Council of the Jewish Agency instructs its Administrative Committee and Executive to urge upon the Mandatory, the strong feeling existing among Jews throughout the entire world regarding the events at the Western Wall on the last Day of

"III. The Council of the Jewish Agency, recognizing the vital importance of the Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund), made it the main financial instrument of the Jewish Agency.

"The Joint Palestine Survey Commission declared that the future satisfactory development of the National Home depends primarily on the adequacy

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DIFFERENCES IRONED OUT AS AGENCY COUNCIL COM- MITTEES ARE AT WORK

Executive to Consist of 8 Zionists and 4 Non-Zionists for Coming Year, Weizmann Announces

Zurich, Aug. 14—As the Jewish Agency Council in session here seemed to conclude its meetings before sundown on Wednesday when Tisha B'Ab, commemorating the fall of Jerusalem and the burning of the Temple 1,859 years ago, will be ushered in, progress in its work was marked as the committees continued deliberations to iron out differences and to pave the way for joint action at the last session.

The three-day sessions were expected to be concluded Wednesday afternoon according to schedule. The Zionist and non-Zionist groups, in addition to their participation in the committees, met separately at caucuses and at banquets given by various groups.

An agreement between the Zionists and non-Zionists concerning the composition of the Executive for the ensuing period was reached, according to an announcement by Dr. Chaim Weizmann. The Executive is to consist of 8 Zionists and 4 non-Zionists. Mr. Marshall appeared before a meeting of the Zionist half of the Council which discussed in harmony various details of the outstanding questions. A point of discussion was the demand of the non-Zionists to include in the constitution the resolution adopted by the Zionist Congress, on the initiative of the Mizrahi, to incorporate the care for Jewish religious needs in the program of the Jewish Agency. The laborites and the Radical Zionists were opposed.

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HONOR PREUSS, AUTHOR OF GERMAN CONSTITUTION

Berlin, Aug. 14—A bust of Hugo Preuss, author of the text of the German republican constitution, was placed in the Reichstag on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of the establishment of the Republic and the adoption of the Weimar constitution.

The late Herr Preuss, who was one of Germany's leading jurists, occupied a place of honor next to the then president of the Republic, Ebert, at every constitution celebration.

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S. ROSENBAUM GETS MEDAL
FROM LITHUANIAN PRESIDENT

Tel Aviv, Aug. 14.—The Order of
Prince Gedimin was conferred by the
President of Lithuania upon Samson
Rosenbaum, former Minister for Jew-
ish Affairs in the Lithuanian cabinet
and now Lithuanian Consul at Tel Aviv.
The honor was conferred upon Mr.
Rosenbaum on the occasion of the
celebration of his seventieth birthday.

Mr. Rosenbaum also received numer-
ous greetings, including a message from
the Lithuanian Premier, Waldemaras,
wishing him long life for his work in
Palestine and asking him "not to for-
get his second fatherland, Lithuania."

SUED FOR SENDING CHILD TO
CHRISTIAN SCIENCE SCHOOL

A Jewish mother went to court to
prevent her divorced husband from
weaning the 10-year-old son away
from her faith by sending him to a
Christian Science school.

The mother is Mrs. Clara Mann, of
New York City, former wife of Dr.
Joseph Mann, a dentist. In Supreme
Court she opposed her husband's ap-
plication for a writ of habeas corpus
for possession of the boy, David,
whose custody she won when they
were divorced eight years ago in
Mexico.

A month ago Mrs. Mann consented
to allow her former husband to edu-
cate the child, and he was sent to
Winnwood school, at Lake Ronkon-
komo. When Mrs. Mann discovered it
was a Christian Science institution,
she brought her son home.

FIRE DESTROYS HOMES

IN POLISH TOWNS

Warsaw, Aug. 14.—The population of
the township Korelich, near the eastern
Polish border, remained roofless as a
result of a fire which destroyed all
houses. Eighty per cent of the popula-
tion is Jewish.

MOSCOW HEARS SAFETY
OF JEWISH POPULATION
IN HARBIN ENDANGERED

White Guards Flock to City; Organize
"Actions Committee"

Moscow, Aug. 14.—Disquieting re-
ports concerning danger threatening the
safety of the Jewish population of the
city of Harbin, Manchuria, the region
where the Chino-Russian conflict is
raging, reached the Soviet press.

According to these reports, large
numbers of Russian White Guards are
flocking to the city. They organized
there an "Actions Committee" under
the leadership of the notorious pogrom
leader, Tashkoff, who was responsible
for many anti-Jewish pogroms during
the Denikin period. What the func-
tions of the newly organized "Actions
Committee" will be are not known, but
the Jewish populations is apprehensive
of provocations. Heads of families are
sending their wives and daughters away
from the city.

BROOKLYN JEWISH BULL-
FIGHTER RETURNS TO RING

received on Monday during a bullfight,
Sidney Franklin, Brooklyn matador, in-
tends to appear in another bullfight
here on Thursday.

Franklin has received wounds at al-
most every performance in Spain but
has thus far escaped serious injury.

12,479 JEWS ENTERED

U. S. IN PAST YEAR

During the fiscal year, July 1, 1928
to June 30, 1929, there arrived in the
United States 15,886 Jews from prac-
tically all parts of the world; 12,479 of
these were immigrants and 3,407 non-
immigrants. In the 6 months, from
January 1, 1929 to June 30, 1929, there
arrived 7,837 Jews, of whom 6,305 were
immigrants and 1,532 non-immigrants.
These figures were published by the
Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid
Society, based on official information
from Washington.

In the month of June, this year, 1,389
Jews entered, 1,100 of whom were im-
migrants and 289 non-immigrants.

A large portion of the new arrivals
were given aid by the Hias at its head-
quarters in New York or through its
branches in the port cities. Prior to
their setting sail for America, they
were guided by the Hias offices in
Europe.

Eleven Jewish institutions in New York City
will receive bequests according to the will of
Louis Kram of the advertising firm of Louis
Kram, Inc., offered for probate in Surrogate's
Court. The residue of the estate, estimated
at more than \$300,000, goes to the widow, Mrs.
Rosie Kram. Mr. Kram died August 1.

A. F. OF L. APPROVES
GARMENT WORKERS STRIKES
AGAINST SWEATSHOPS

Walkout December 1 to Affect 45,000
Workers in Principal Cities

Atlantic City, Aug. 14.—The Execu-
tive Council of the American Federa-
tion of Labor, meeting in quarterly
session here under the chairmanship
of William Green, unanimously en-
dorsed a program of strikes presented
by Benjamin Schlesinger, New York,
president of the International Ladies'
Garment Workers' Union.

The strikes which are to be declared
on December 1, are principally directed
against the elimination of the sweatshop
system, which the workers
are said to have again encountered re-
cently. Forty-five thousand workers
in the dress and waist branches of the
garment labor union in New York, To-
ronto, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia,
Kansas City, Baltimore, Cleveland and
other cities, will be affected. Many
large mail order houses and department
stores are in sympathy with the labor
union's drive against sweat shop pro-
duction.

I. MILLER, SHOES
MANUFACTURER, DIES

Israel Miller, of I. Miller & Sons,
shoe manufacturers, died suddenly in
Paris on Tuesday morning, of a heart
attack, according to word received in
New York. He was sixty-three years
old. His wife, who was at his bedside,
and five sons and a daughter, survive.
His body will be brought to New York
on the steamer Bremen for burial.

Israel Miller, born the son of a
shoemaker in East Prussia, near the
Polish border, retired three years ago
from the management of I. Miller &
Sons, an \$8,000,000 company with six-
teen retail shops in New York, 200
agencies throughout the United States,
and two shoe factories.

He arrived in New York at the age
of 24, having worked for four years
as a cutter and designer in Paris. He
obtained employment with John Azzi-
monti, then the leading manufacturer
of stage shoes, where he worked at a
cobblers' bench in Union Square.

Mr. Miller was wont to attribute his
success to a "lucky dollar" he found
in Union Square. One morning in
1893, shortly after he had formed a
partnership with a man who had been
soliciting orders for custom shoes.
Miller, who had no orders on hand and
whose wife and four children were
hungry, was walking along Union
Square. He saw a \$1 bill lying in the
street. Picking it up, he hurried home
and the family had a meal. When he
got back to his shop, a man came in
and ordered a pair of shoes. From
then on orders came in, and as suc-
cess came to him, Mr. Miller laid it
to the \$1 bill, which he called his lucky
piece.

Large philanthropic gifts were made
by Mr. Miller, in recent years, to the
Beth Israel Hospital, the Federation
for the Support of Jewish Philan-
thropic Societies and the Jewish Edu-
cational Alliance.

ZIONIST COMMITTEE ON UNDERSTANDING WITH ARABS, TO MEET IN LONDON

Committee of Ten to Formulate Proposals to Zionist Executive on Arab Problem

Zurich, Aug. 12.—By a recommendation of the political committee of the Zionist Congress a special committee of ten, with the cooperation and consent of the Zionist Executive, is to meet in London shortly to prepare and submit proposals to the Zionist Executive with regard to the Arab problem, the Zionist Congress decided at its closing sessions.

This step was taken in connection with the necessity that arose to formulate the attitude of the Zionist Organization toward the enactment of a constitution for Palestine and the discussions for a legislative council or parliament in Palestine.

The political committee also dealt with the question of an international loan for the Zionist Organization. The committee expressed its view that there exists a possibility for the successful conclusion of the negotiations for a large loan under the guarantee of the League of Nations or the Mandatory Power, which will enable the Executive to launch colonization projects on a large scale.

A controversial point, long debated, was the resolution sponsored by the Mizrahi giving authority to the school boards to dismiss teachers of the Palestine-schools; without the consent of the Zionist education department, on religious grounds. Several votes were taken on the question and frequently the Right and the Left kings voted together on this point. They were, however, defeated by a majority of 130 to 104, on a motion of Miss Szold which received the unanimous support of the Center group. This vote was the only reminder of the old power exercised by the Center.

The transferring of Herzl's remains to Palestine was termed a debt of honor on the part of the Jewish people in a resolution adopted concerning the matter. The Executive was urged to conclude the arrangements for transferring and reburial of the remains in Palestine during the coming year, when the seventieth birth date of Dr. Herzl will be commemorated.

REMOVES LITVINOFF DESPITE JEWISH PROTEST

Riga despatches to the "London Daily Mail" reported today that the Soviet Legation in Latvia announced that Josef Stalin, "Russia's Iron Man," had ordered the reorganization of the Commissariat for Foreign Affairs, involving the dismissal of Maxim Litvinoff, Assistant Commissar, a United Press despatch states.

Stalin, the despatch said, was determined to take this action in spite of charges of anti-Semitism. It was said that the charges were made by several Jewish Communists.

JAPANESE AUTHOR TRACES NIPPON ORIGIN TO HEBREW RACE

Mi-Kado Corrupted Form of Hebrew Tribe's Name, Gad; Theory Presented to Emperor

The origin of the Japanese is traced to the Hebrew race by Dr. Jenichiro Oyabe, author of "Origin of Japan and the Japanese."

Dr. Oyabe asserted in an interview with a representative of the "Japan Advertiser" that the Japanese Emperor is the descendant of the tribe Gad, one of the twelve tribes of Israel.

The book was placed on the market this spring and has already gone to the sixth edition. Dr. Oyabe presented volumes to the Emperor, the Empress and the Empress Dowager. The books were immediately accepted by the Imperial Household Department and placed before the Imperial Family.

Dr. Oyabe is a graduate of the Divinity School of Yale University. Upon graduation he travelled widely. He lived among the Ainu for more than ten years to trace the origin of the Japanese race.

"The annual festival of the Gion Shrine in Kyoto on July 17 is an interesting subject of study," said Dr. Oyabe. "It is on this occasion that shrine festivals take place in all parts of the country. Mikoshi, or miniature portable shrines are then often carried into the water. The custom may be traced back to the age of Noah. It was on July 17, according to the Old Testament, that Noah's ark arrived at Mt. Arrarat, Togarma, Armenia, when the flood subsided.

"The passengers of the ark offered thanksgiving to their god with dancing and music. The sacred casket containing religious objects of the Hebrew people, which is known as the 'Ark,' is the prototype of the mikoshi. The Old Testament states that the water was divided when the Ark was carried into the water. The carrying of mikoshi into the water on the occasion of a Shinto festival is traced to this tradition.

Togarma Is Takamagahara

"Togarma, Armenia, in which Mt. Arrarat is situated, is the Takamagahara, from which the ancestor of the Japanese race is said to have descended. Takamagahara means the Plain of High Heaven. The 'Arme' in Armenia means heaven, and the 'nia' means place. There is also a palace in the neighborhood of Togarma called Hara. The Jewish people claim that the district is their birthplace, and the Japanese people also claim that the Takamagahara is the birthplace of their ancestors. I can testify to the identity of Togarma, Armenia, as Takamagahara by producing countless evidence.

"The River Jordan was the river of purification. It was in this river that the Israelites purified themselves before they observed religious ceremonies. Izanami-no Mikoto and Izanagi-no-Mikoto performed the same rite in Huga.

Until the Meiji Restoration, the Imperial messengers to the Grand Shrine of Ise observed purification

CHARGE ANTI-SEMITIC CONSPIRACY IN MOSCOW FACTORY ACCIDENT

Jewish Worker, Recently Promoted, Loses Hand and Forearm in Misdirection of Machine

Moscow, Aug. 14.—An accident to a Jewish textile worker, Aron Malinsky, member of the Communist Party, in Moscow's greatest textile plant which was formerly known as Zindelf's, has caused a stir in Communist and labor union circles here.

Malinsky lost his arm to the elbow, it is charged as the result of deliberate misdirection of the machine at which he was working. Three of his assistants, Nikolaeff, Elenin and Klopovskiy, all Communists, are charged with deliberate misdirection of the machine in order to remove Malinsky from the plant. Anti-Semitic bias is said to be the cause. Envy of Malinsky's efficiency and productivity was also a motive. The Jewish worker who held the record for output in the factory was recently promoted to mastery by the management. Since then he was the object of annoyance and persecutions at the hands of his fellow workers, who charged him with falsifying the output record to show that he produces daily hundreds of meters of goods more than the other workers. The management exonerated him of this charge and expressed recognition of his labors. A few days later the accident occurred.

The case, it is stated, will be given wide publicity as Malinsky was regarded as the "best textile worker, good comrade and brilliant party member." He is now at a Moscow hospital.

rites in the River Wataari before they reached the shrine. It is for this reason that the river was known as Misogigawa or the River of Purification.

"No scholar or Shinto priest seems to know why the Shinto shrine is built of cypress. The Meiji Shrine was built of lumber from 5,500 cypress logs. Old shrines now existent in Japan are all of cypress. The fifth and seventh chapters of Samuel in the Old Testament make some references to the King living in a house made of cypress. David ordered his son, Solomon, to build a shrine for the first time, and I have good reason to believe that the shrine was built of cypress. The shrine was thirty feet with an entrance fifteen feet wide. This detail is exactly that of the Japanese shrine. It has also the haiden (place of worship) and the okuden (holy of holies) of the Japanese shrine.

The main columns on both sides which support the beams of the shrine building were driven into the ground instead of being placed in a base of stones or other solid materials. This custom originated in the age in which the Israelites lived in tents. The two columns correspond to the two main poles supporting both sides of the tent. You will find that all the main

Three banquets were held Tuesday night. A reception was given at the Bauer-au-Lac Hotel by the American non-Zionist delegation in honor of the European non-Zionist delegates. Louis Marshall, Sir Herbert Samuel and Felix M. Warburg were the speakers. "I am happy that in the seventy-third years of my life the ideal which I sought in vain for thirty years is about to be realized," Mr. Marshall said. Sir Herbert Samuel promised to urge greater support by the British government by introducing interpellations in the House of Commons.

A banquet in honor of Dr. Albert Einstein was given by the American Jewish Physicians Committee for the Hebrew University. A banquet in honor of Leon Blum, French Socialist leader, was given by the Poale Zion, labor party delegation.

Dr. Wise Issues Statement

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, who is not participating in the Jewish Agency Council session, issued a statement to the press here giving his reasons for not entering the Jewish Agency Council. He was offered a seat on the Council by the group of Radical Zionists, but he declined not wishing, he said, "to pawn his conscience." He prefers to leave the Agency to its friends since the Zionist Congress declined to insist on the reservations he thought would safeguard the Zionist ideals. He would remain in the Zionist Organization and would cooperate with the Jewish National Fund, the Zionist land purchasing agency, as there is universal agreement that the land problem is most urgent, he said.

Zionist General Council Constituted

The Zionist General Council, otherwise known as the Actions Committee, being the legislative body between Congresses, was constituted yesterday. Dr. Leo Motzkin was chosen president and Abraham Goldberg of New York, vice-president. Other vice-presidents chosen are Deputy H. Farbstein, Warsaw; Richard Lichtheim, Berlin; S. Kaplan and Z. Rubaschow, Palestine.

At the same session, the Zionist General Council elected Col. Frederick H. Kisch, Dr. Hermann Struck and Adolf Boehm as directors of the Jewish National Fund.

No Change in Status of Hadassah by Congress Decisions

No change in the status of the Hadassah, the American women's Zionist Organization, was brought about by the decisions of the Sixteenth Zionist Congress concerning the health work in Palestine.

The resolutions adopted concerning the matter are considered as material for further negotiations by the incoming Palestine Executive.

The budget of the Hadassah was set at \$81,000, exclusive of the Tiberias hospital and the nurses' training school.

JAPANESE AUTHOR TRACES NIPPON ORIGIN TO HEBREW RACE

supporting columns of old Shinto shrines in Japan are erected in the same way, including the Grand Shrine of Ise and the Meiji Shrine. This fact bespeaks eloquently that the Japanese people faithfully followed the tradition of their ancestors.

Uncut Stones

"I have visited the Grand Shrine of Ise many times and often wondered why the compound of the shrine is surrounded by walls about three feet high which are constructed of natural boulders instead of cut stones. The twenty-fifth verse of the twentieth chapter of Exodus states that God commanded Moses not to use cut stone in the construction of religious buildings. Iron was consequently avoided in such matters.

"The torii of Shinto shrines are often traced to a southern origin due to failure to study beyond the South Seas. Solomon erected two large columns on each side of the entrance to the temple he erected in Jerusalem, according to the seventeenth verse in the third chapter of Chronicles. Each pillar had a different significance, referring to the heroic ancestors of his race. Each column of a Japanese torii likewise has a different meaning. There is every reason to believe that the present torii originated in these columns.

Mi-Kado Corrupt Form of Gad

"The Emperor is the descendant of Gad, one of the twelve races of Israel. The Mi of Mikado is the honorary prefix. Kado is the corrupt form of Gad. It was the custom of the Hebrew people to adopt the name of a heroic ancestor as the name of their tribe or family. The eldest son of Gad, whose name was Jippon, came to Japan with the Imperial Regalia. It was for this reason that the country was originally named Nippon.

"The Imperial Regalia originally consisted of two objects instead of three. This is alluded to in the old Japanese records. The Regalia of the Hebrew people originally consisted of three articles, a metal staff, jar and the Ten Commandments. The stone tablet on which the Ten Commandments were inscribed was not brought to this country perhaps because it was too heavy. The metal staff and jar were well wrapped and no one was allowed to see them. The former was interpreted as a sword, it was long and made a metallic sound. Jar in Japanese is kame and the word has some connection with mirror, one of the Imperial Regalia. The jewel was added to the two Imperial Regalia, perhaps in remembrance of the stone tablet of the Ten Commandments," Dr. Oyabe states.

The new synagogue of the Shearith Israel Congregation, Atlanta, Ga., now under construction, will celebrate its cornerstone laying August 18 with a public ceremony. The synagogue will be completed within the next two months.

"IV. The Council of the Jewish Agency takes note of the resolutions adopted by the Sixteenth Biennial Zionist Congress and refers them for careful consideration to the Administrative Committee and the Executive.

"V. The Administrative Committee and the Executive shall take all necessary measures so that all groups in Jewry not yet affiliated with the Agency be enabled to join.

Pay Homage to Lord Balfour

"VI. The Jews of the entire world, Zionists and non-Zionists, now united in the Agency for common service to the cause of upbuilding the Jewish National Home, present their homage to Lord Balfour, the author of the historic Declaration which forms the basis for their work. The friendship he has invariably shown to the Jewish people will be forever remembered by every Jew.

Gratitude to Baron Edmund, Agency's Honorary President

"VII. This, the first session of the Council of the Jewish Agency, expresses to Baron Edmund de Rothschild, its respectful and affectionate gratitude for what he has accomplished in Eretz Israel and pledges itself to follow the example he set. The Council hopes that for many years he will, as the Honorary President of the Jewish Agency, inspire its labors."

The next session of the Council, Mr. Marshall announced, will be held at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon, to consider the constitution of the Jewish Agency. The constitution committee was at work through most of last night.

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
