2,000 DEMONSTRATE IN JERUSALEM; DEMAND FREE ACCESS OF JEWS TO WALL

Controversy with Moslems Over Temple Remnant Becomes Acute

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 16—A demonstration of protest against the attitude of the Palestine Government in the controversy between the Jews and Moslems of Palestine over the Jewish right of access to the Western Wall of the Temple, commonly known as the Wailing Wall, was held here this afternoon when the Jewish population observed the Fast Day, Tisha B'ab, commemorating the destruction of the Temple over 1,800 years ago.

Two thousand Jewish youths from Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and the surrounding Jewish colonies marched in solemn procession to the Wailing Wall carrying Zionist blue and white flags and making outcries against the Palestine Government and the Zionist Executive for their attitude in the controversy. The demonstrators took an oath at the Temple remnant "to sacrifice all for the Western Wall."

The demonstrators, singing "Hatikvah," demanded the dismissal of the British anti-Zionist officials in the Palestine administration and the restoration of the Western Wall as a Jewish Holy Site. A delegation representing the demonstrators called at the Government House where they were received by E. Mills, a government official, in the absence of the Acting High Commissioner, H. C. Luke. The delegation presented a set of resolutions for transmission to the British Colonial Office embodying their demands. The leaders of the demonstration, when advised by Mr. Mills to have confidence in the moderate attitude of the leading Jewish organizations in Palestine concerning the matter, declared that "the Jewish youth will not remain

ARAB STUDENTS ADOPT ANTI-JEWISH RESOLUTION

Jaffa, Aug. 16—What was termed an All-Palestine Arab Students Conference was held here yesterday with the result that a number of anti-Jewish resolutions were adopted.

The conference decided to combat Arab land brokers who are instrumental in selling land to Jews, to support Arab industries in Palestine and Syria, to boycott foreign products, to appeal for unity among the Arabs of Palestine for the independence of the country within an Arab Confederation, to demand the establishment of a parliament in Palestine and to urge the government to enact legislation for the compulsory education of boys and girls.

LITHUANIAN MINISTER TO U.S. DENIES EXCESSES; BLAMES COMMUNISTS

Jewish Communists Charged with Spreading False Reports

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Aug. 16—Jewish Communists are charged by the Lithuanian government with responsibility for spreading false reports concerning the pogroms against the Jews in Lithuania which are declared without foundation in a written statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent by B. K. Balutis, Lithuanian Minister, quoting a cable received from the Lithuanian government in response to an inquiry made by Minister Balutis.

"Reports regarding the alleged anti-Jewish pogroms in Lithuania during which scores of persons were supposedly injured are without foundation," the statement reads. "On the first of August scores of Jewish Communists who attempted to stage a manifestation were slightly jostled by some Lithuanian passersby. Following this incident the Communists spread reports concerning anti-Jewish attacks. The police arrested three Jewish Communists caught throwing stones at the windows of Jewish apartments with a view to instigating trouble."

Minister Balutis in the statement called attention to the fact that August first was designated for Communist demonstrations in various countries.

Human Rights League to Investigate Lithuanian Anti-Jewish Excesses

Danzig, Aug. 16—An investigation into the truth of the reports concerning the anti-Jewish excesses which occurred in Slobodka, suburb of Kovno, on August 10, was undertaken by a representative of the League for Human Rights, international organization with headquarters in Paris.

A representative of the League has proceeded to Kovno.

ARRESTED ON FALSE CHARGES, RELEASED. SUES

Riga, Aug. 16—The Estonian political police will have to explain in court on what basis they formulated charges and arrested Markus Pekar, member of the Jewish National Council of Estonia.

Mr. Pekar was arrested by the Royal police on charges of Communist activities and espionage in favor of Soviet Russia. He was released after several days. Mr. Pekar has filed suit against the authorities.

YOM KIPPUR PLANNED AS "JEWISH INDUSTRIALIZATION DAY" BY RUSSIAN COMMUNISTS

Move Part of Anti-Religious Campaign During High Holiday Season

Moscow, Aug. 16—October 14, the day when the Jewish calendar calls for the observance of Yom Kippur, the most sacred religious day when Jews are required to abstain from work and to fast, will be declared a "Jewish industrialization day" on which Jewish workers, artisans and farmers will be urged by the Communists to work and contribute their earnings towards the fund for the industrialization of the declassed and impoverished Jewish masses in Soviet Russia.

The plan, sponsored by the Jewish section of the Communist party, is a part of a vigorous anti-religious campaign now being prepared by the Jewish Communists in connection with the forthcoming season of Jewish High Holidays. The campaign is expected to be stronger than the anti-Passover campaign.

Some members of the Jewish section, anticipating opposition on the part of the Jewish workers to work on the Day of Atonement, have suggested the observance of a "Jewish industrialization day" on October 6, the second day of Rosh Hashanah. A general Soviet industrialization day was observed on August 6. The sponsors of the Yom Kippur industrialization day plan made it clear that their purpose to arrange for a special Jewish industrialization day is to combat the tradition of obtaining from work on religious holidays. The proceeds of the fund are to be used for the purchase of tractors for the Jewish settlers in Bira-Bidjan.

DENY RUMOR ANTI-JEWISH DISTURBANCES IN BIDJAN

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 16—Rumors circulating in the Ukraine that anti-Jewish disturbances occurred in Bida-Bidjan, the region where Jewish settlements for Jewish land settlement were being established, were denied by the Communist government. The government despatches from Charkov, principal Jewish land settlement, state that no disturbances occurred in the region.

The rumors are related to the Russian conflict and the withdrawal of Russian troops from the Ukraine.

A statement of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, which is being distributed by the Communist press, states that the disturbances occurred in Bida-Bidjan after the conflict between the Jewish and the Russian troops.

Party Strife in Palestine

By Our Jerusalem Correspondent

Jerusalem, July 20—A few weeks
have elapsed since the stormy inci-
dents took place in the Assefath
Ha'nivcharim (Assembly of Represent-
atives) and people are still arguing
about who was wrong and who was
right. However, this is unimportant.
There is no difference whether Ruben
has sinned or whether Simon. What
does matter is to know just what actu-
ally happened and whether what oc-
curred was merely something casual
or something revealing a deep wound.

The latter is the case. The fight be-
tween the parties in the Assefath
Ha'nivcharim is not a mere accident.
The relations between the parties and
the groups in Palestine have been at
variance for quite a long time past and
have become more acute among the
Lefts and the Revisionists. Day in
and day out the newspapers "Dwar"
of the Socialist Party and Vladimir Jabot-
insky's "Doar Hayom" conduct acrimo-
nious polemics, thus augmenting the
reciprocal hatred. At conferences and
meetings, and even at private reunions,
the same thing always happens: harsh
disputes saturated with hatred. How-
ever, the Revisionist-Socialist attitude
is only, as it were, the top of the
mountain and not the whole mountain
itself. It merely serves to show in
bolder relief what is going on in the
Jewish settlement in general in all its
parts. Unfriendly and even hostile re-
lations exist also among the Lefts and
the manufacturers and artisans, and
then again among the Lefts and the
colonists. Even among the Lefts and
the teachers and other intellectuals
there is a marked absence of friend-
ship. The brutal incident of the Assef-
ath Ha'nivcharim is thus only a
natural outcome of these extremely
strained relations existing for quite
some time past.

Other bourgeois parties react but
little to the "class policy" of the His-
tadruth Ha'ovdim (the organization of
the workmen) because these bourgeois
parties feel that they have no power

SPS NEWS AND INDUSTRIES

IN RUSSIAN HOME TOWNS

Two Landsmanschaften have pledged
support to industrialization projects in
their native towns, undertaken by the
"Home Town Department" of the Ort,
the Society for the Promotion of
Agricultural and Technical Trades
among the Jews of Eastern Europe,
under the direction of Gerson Zybert.

The Smela Landsmanschaft, with
branches in New York, Philadelphia,
Baltimore and Boston, will give
\$25,000 for three economic undertak-
ings. The Brusiloff organization, with
branches in New York and Chicago
will give their fellow townsmen \$6,000
for the restoration of several industries.

The sum of \$14,000 will be used to
establish a furniture factory in Smela
where 2,000 heads of families, now idle,
may earn a living; \$8,000 will be used
for developing an agricultural colony
near the town, and for creating farm
by-product industries. The remaining
\$3,000 will be used to open a trade
school for children from the ages of
13 to 16.

In Brusiloff, the funds of former
residents who have come to America
will be used to establish a leather co-
operative, and a starch and syrup fac-
tory. These industries were in exist-
ence before the war.

BRITISH ISLES SUPPLY PRINCIPAL IMMIGRATION TO CANADA

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Toronto, Aug. 16—Official figures
issued by the Canadian Govern-
ment show that there is a predom-
inance of settlers from the British Isles
from "preferred" countries, and
immigration from these countries
has increased, despite the fear
expressed in some circles concerning
the influx of Central and East Euro-
pean immigration to Canada.

Figures just issued here show that
between April 1 and June 30, the total
number of immigrants into Canada
was 17,730 and of that number, 34,967
came from the British Isles, an in-
crease of 46 per cent over the number
that came during the same months
last year. Northern European coun-
tries show an increase of 8 per cent
immigration into Canada, while im-
migration from thirty other countries
decreased 30 per cent. These fig-
ures are made available by the Can-
adian Department of Immigration.

PALESTINE ORGANIZATIONS SEND GREETINGS TO JEWISH AGENCY COUNCIL

American Jews Will Respond to "Union
Sacred" Call, Ort Fund Chair-
man Says

Jerusalem, Aug. 16—The consumma-
tion of the Jewish Agency and the crea-
tion of its Council at the close of the
Zurich sessions were welcomed with
joy by Palestine Jewry.

Rabbi A. J. Kook, Chief Rabbi, the
municipality of Tel Aviv, and many
Jewish organizations, sent cables of
greetings to the Agency Council.

"The Jewish Agency will usher in a
new era, marking the cooperation of all
Jewish forces in the United States and
the rest of the world for Palestine re-
construction," stated Howard S. Cull-
man, Commissioner of the Port of New
York Authority and chairman of the
American Ort campaign, to a repre-
sentative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

"As in the case of the Ort Recon-
struction Fund, of which I am chair-
man, which is promoting the rehabilita-
tion of Jews in Eastern Europe, I be-
lieve that the new method of Palestine
work provided in the program of the
Jewish Agency will provide for large
groups of Jews in Eastern Europe who
will be enabled to go to Palestine and
there reconstruct their lives under more
favorable conditions.

"I have watched reports in the Jewish
Daily Bulletin of the sessions of the
Zionist Congress and I am full of ad-
miration for the obvious sincerity of
Dr. Weizmann, Louis Marshall, Felix
M. Warburg, Col. Lehman and other
great Jews who are working so whole-
heartedly to bring about the elimination
of friction, controversy and lines of
division amongst all Jews who have some
interest in Palestine work.

"As one who has not in the past par-
ticipated in the work for Palestine, I
am happy to declare that my sympathies
are profoundly moved by the magnifi-
cent work of my friends, Felix M. War-
burg, Louis Marshall and young James
Marshall, who is doing such a fine thing
in his University labors. When the oc-
casion occurs, Felix M. Warburg and
Louis Marshall may feel assured that
they will have the sympathetic interest
and ear of those elements of the Jew-
ish community who have been non-Zi-
onistic but who, I am sure, will be glad
to participate in the program of the new
Jewish Agency. American Jews have
responded to all humanitarian appeals,
without distinction as to the race or
religion of the ultimate beneficiaries of
their generosity. I am confident that
when the appeal is made in the name of
the new 'union sacred' American Jewry
will as nobly respond to the call," Mr.
Cullman concluded.

UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN ISSUES URGENT APPEAL FOR PAYMENT OF PLEDGES

Conditions as Bad as Five Years Ago;
Ort Chairman Returns from Russia

Declaring that Jewish economic con-
ditions are in many parts of Europe
worse today than they were five years
ago, David A. Brown, National Chair-
man of the United Jewish Campaign
addressed an appeal to thousands of
local officers of the campaign, to speed
up collections in their respective com-
munities and make it possible for the
Joint Distribution Committee to send
abroad immediately funds that have
been allocated for various constructive
and palliative relief projects, which are
languishing for lack of money.

Mr. Brown states in his appeal, that
due to the prosperity prevailing in the
United States and Canada at this time,
many contributors have assumed that
Jewish conditions in Europe also have
improved, and consequently have
slowed-up their payments with the re-
sult that less money has come in this
summer in proportion to outstanding
pledges than at any time since the cam-
paign began.

The Jews of Europe still look to
America to save them from utter de-
struction, he says, and expresses con-
fidence that the appeal he has just is-
sued, though made in the midst of the
summer season will receive the response
which the situation demands.

"We had hoped that there would be
sufficient available funds coming in
through the summer months to take
care of budget requirements, but in this
we have been greatly disappointed," the
appeal states. "In fact, less money has
come in this summer in proportion to
the outstanding pledges than at any
time since the campaign was projected.

"The excuse of hard times is past.
The argument that we are going
through a period of depression cannot
stand in the light of the prosperous con-
dition in which this country finds it-
self at the present time. I can only see
one reason why our collections have
 dwindled to almost nothing and that is
an assumption that the same measure
of prosperity which we are enjoying in
this country is being enjoyed by the
Jews, in other parts of the world, who
have been dependent upon us for the
past years. Let me make it very clear,
my good friends, that the economic con-
ditions of our people abroad are in
many cases worse today than they were
five years ago, and that the cry com-
ing to us is as great today as it ever
has been in the history of our great ef-
fort.

"All of us must arouse ourselves,
even though it interferes with our
usual summer pleasures. An effort must
be made now, even before the cooler
weather sets in, to raise as large a sum
of money as is possible."

Conditions among Jews in Russia
have not improved and the only hope
is industrialization, was the observa-
tion of Judge Jacob Panken, chairman
of the American Ort, who returned this
week from a three months trip abroad.

and those who work in Russia," said Judge Panken, "is that industrialization is the real hope of the solution of the problem confronting the Jewish people. Colonization is undoubtedly working out splendidly for those who were fortunate enough to have the necessary funds for undertaking, or to be selected by the Agro-Joint. It is impossible to place all the Russian Jews upon the land. That is conceded on all sides. The urban population therefore must have an other avenue of sustenance.

"The first necessity is the extension of the school system to teach the tens of thousands of applicants some trade. Secondly, they need assistance in the organization of articles where production may be put on a large scale, giving employment not only to the skilled but making provision also for the employment of the semi-skilled, and those entirely untrained," he said.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY EMPLOYS STUDENTS

In an effort to provide work for needy students, the Hebrew University in Palestine is employing students in construction work on the new buildings, states a report received by the American Advisory Committee today. Forty-seven students have been employed to date in work on the new Library and the Physics Building, now under construction. The University cooperates with the Students Organization in finding work for students, in connection with its building program, and in the administration offices of the University.

The American office of the Hebrew University also reports that among the recent acquisitions to the University Library is a letter written by Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, the first President of the Chinese Republic, setting forth his admiration for the Zionist cause. The letter, dated April 24, 1920, was donated by N. E. B. Ezra, Shanghai, China.

To help meet the needs of medical men in the Physicians Organization in Tel-Aviv, Palestine, the University Library has opened a branch in the Health Centre of Tel-Aviv. The University Library has donated its duplicates of books of medical interest and has enabled the Branch Library to open with about 7,000 volumes. Dr. Julius Jarcho of New York has assisted the Physicians Organization by subscribing to an important number of medical journals.

acter, as we witnessed in the Assefath Ha'nivcharin.

One of the painful problems in Palestine is the condition of our Sephardic brethren and our Oriental brethren in general: Yemenites, Georgians, Kurds. Hardly a day passes that a tale of woe cannot be read in the papers concerning one of these communities. The largest and most intellectual among them is the Sephardic community, which is better organized. The International Sephardic Union is in touch with the Zionist Executive, also with the Vaad Leumi (National Council), and very often obtains something. The other communities, however, are too poorly organized and have no influence whatever, but even the Sephardic are not satisfied and declare that promises have so far not materialized in anything. The Zionist Congress passes resolutions and the Executive in Jerusalem makes promises to satisfy their claims, but in reality nothing is being done and the interests of these communities are steadily neglected.

What is it that our Oriental brothers are clamoring for? It is a shame to confess: nothing but equal rights. They declare that with regard to immigration, colonization, schools and all other necessities, they are treated as step-children. By this they mean they receive less immigration certificates to bring over immigrants; they receive smaller shares when ground is divided among colonists; fewer schools are opened for their children than for those of the Ashkenazic children; the credit which they get is a small one, and that in general less attention is given to their needs than to the needs of the Ashkenazic colonists.

Unfortunately, it must be acknowledged that there is a large part of truth in these assertions, although very often nobody is to blame for this situation, as life itself leads to such an abnormality. The way to improve the condition is undoubtedly the way pointed out by our Oriental brothers, i.e., representation in the Zionist institutions. At the present time they have practically no representative at all in the Zionist institutions and there is no one to think about them and minister to them in the questions of everyday life. This should be taken into consideration when the Jewish Agency is formed. It is only right, and in fact, essential, that in the Jewish Agency there should be at least one Yemenite who should represent the interests of this clever but unfortunate Jewish tribe.

Feeling ran high in the city when the acuteness of the controversy over the Wailing Wall assumed added significance because of the Fast Day and the necessity for the government to provide strong detachments of mounted police to guard the Jewish worshippers at the Wall against feared attacks on the part of Moslems. No disturbances occurred.

U. S. BUSINESS PARTY MAY VISIT JEWISH COLONIES

Arrangements are being made for members of the party of American business men now touring Russia to visit a number of the Jewish colonies, David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, announced.

A cable was sent by Mr. Brown to Dr. Joseph Rosen, director of the Agro-Joint, in which the latter was asked to extend the hospitality of his organization and to facilitate the travels of the party who desired to make a tour of the colonies.
