PRELIMINARY WORK ON CONSTRUCTION OF HAIFA BAY HARBOR BEGUN Engineers' Statement Describes Plans: Expect Work to Be Completed

in Three Years (Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, Aug. 22-Preliminary op-erations on the construction of the Haifa harbor were started. It is expected that the work will be completed within three years, declares a statement issued by engineers Rendel, Palmer and Tritton, with whose consultation the Palestine government is constructing the harbor.

The two principal features will be the construction of breakwaters requiring a million tons of rock, and the dredging of two million cubic yards of sand in deepening the harbor and reclaiming the strip of land along the shore. The rock will be obtained from neighboring quarries.

Haifa was chosen for the harbor due to its potential value in serving the ex-tensive hinterland of Transjordania and beyond, forming the best outlet to the sea by rail communication, the state-ment declares. Steamers are now forced to anchor half a mile offshore and lighters are employed to transport cargo and passengers to the jetty. This re-sulted in considerable losses in time and materials.

The breakwater will stretch about one and a half miles, parallel with the town front and will offer accomoda-tion to two or three steamers as well as

a number of lighters.

Complete railway and road facilities will be provided. The reclaimed strip of land will be utilized as follows: ten acres for coal storage and the remaining fifty-five acres for the expansion of business quarter of the city. To meet the increasing tourist traf-

fic an area near the harbor entrance will be deepened and moorings provided to enable 30,000 ton liners to safely enter the harbor and permit the passengers to disembark within the shelter of the breakwaters.

During last season 31 liners bringing more than 9,000 tourists called at

the Haifa harbor.

COMMUNISTS AROUSED OVER HUNGER STRIKER'S DEATH (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 22—The death of Chaya Lipshitz, 25-year-old Commun-ist of Kishineff, who died in the Clausenberg jail last week after a hunger strike of 42 days, has aroused Com-munists here. The Soviet press here proclaims her "the second victim of the Roumanian White Terror," the first being Max Goldstein, who died in 1924 after a hunger strike of 62 days.

On his way to the Jewish place of worship, Mr. Rosenbaum was overwhelmed by a group of Arabs, who beat him and pulled his hair.

Five other Jewish residents of Jeru-salem were assaulted during the day. A lewish young man was stabbed near Talpioth, Jerusalem suburb. A Jewish hospital nurse was among the victims in the Old City.

Jerusalem, Aug. 22-Abstention from independent action and the holding of further demonstrations by the Iews of Palestine was demanded in a cable despatched by the London Zionist Execu-tive to the Zionist Executive here, conveying the assurance of the British government that it fully appreciates the deplorable character of the events of last Friday when the Arab demonstration descended upon the Wailing Wall area, which was followed by a series of attacks.

The London Zionist Executive further declares that it is anticipated that emphatic instructions will be sent by the London government to the governor of Palestine for energetic measures to be taken to safeguard the Jewish posi-tion at the Wailing Wall. The holding of further demonstrations and independent action by other organizations in Palestine may render more difficult the efforts of the Zionist Organization to obtain a satisfactory solution of the whole problem, the cablegram stated.

MANDELSTAMM, REVOLU-TIONARY LEADER, DIES (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 22-Alexander Mandelstamm, revolutionary leader, known

by the name Odissey, died when he fell from a bridge. He was 51 years Mandelstamm was imprisoned four

times during the Czaristic regime and was also exiled to Siberia. Lately he was the editor of a Communist Russian daily, "Krestyanskaya Gazeta."

COMZET RULES SEASONAL SETTLERS WILL FORFEIT LAND IN JEWISH COLONIES

Agrojoint Chief Agronomist Lauds Decision of Soviet Government Agency (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 22-Those Jewish colonists who come to their land only during the season to cultivate it, living in the small towns for the rest of the year, will lose their fields, according to a decision of the Comzet, governmental department for Jewish land settlement.

Beginning October 1, the Comzet will institute strict control and will take away the land from those who do not reside on it continuously.

George Lubarsky, chief agronomist of the Agrojoint, praised the Comzet decision in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent. The colonists who reside partly in the colonies and partly in the small towns are menacing the normality of Jewish colonization and are not utilizing fully the land assigned to them, which could be utilized with better results by Jews desiring to settle in the colonies, staying there the whole year.

The Comzet overruled the suggesti-ons of J. Larin in rejecting his project to include in the Tewish colonization plan the Taman Peninsula in the Ku-ban region, near Crimea.

Moscow, Aug. 22-An aeroplane to be named Bidjan will be built through Jewish contributions. A fund to secure the contributions was begun today.

LEHMAN SEES NEW PEACE ERA IN CLOTHING INDUSTRY

Less strikes, more arbitration in disputes between employer and employee in the cloak and suit industry, setting an example to be followed by other trades, was predicted by Lieutenant-Governor Herbert H. Lehman.

Speaking at a luncheon Wednesday at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, given in honor of Raymond V. Ingersoll, Impartial Chairman, by the four factors in the cloak and suit industry, the first of its kind to be attended by representatives of the unions and the three employers' groups, the Lieutenant Governor, who was largely instrumental in settling the recent strike in the industry, forecast the beginning of a new era of sympathy and understanding, and the elimination of sweat shop conditions.

Lieutenant Governor Lehman lauded the services to the industry of Mr. Ingersoll, declaring the industry for-tunate in having a man of his tact, imagination and vision as its impartial chairman.

MRS. STERNBERGER REPORTS ON RUSSIAN JEWISH COLONIES

Conditions in the Jewish colonies in Crimea as she observed them were described by Mrs. Estelle M. Sternberger, Executive Secretary of the National Council of Jewish Women, in a report to David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, upon her return from abroad where she visited Poland and Russia to study Jewish conditions. On her tour of the Jewish colonies Mrs. Sternberger was accompanied by agriculturists from the staff of the Agrojoint, the agency of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

"The colonists I saw in those places," Mrs. Sternberger says in her report, "were in striking contrast to the spirit of the Jews in the cities, where they are experiencing much difficulty in adjusting themselves to the new economic conditions. Accustomed to occupations allowing wide latitude for initiative, they are now compelled to accommodate themselves to occupations in which

the are mere cogs. "The despair for the future of the Jew in Russia, which this spectacle in the large cities arouses, is quickly dispelled when one tours the colonies. There the Jews move about with an air of freedom. They go about their tasks with zest and energy. They are not intimidated by the strain of physical la-bor, but exert their utmost strength in an atmosphere of independence. They feel that they are partners in the task of developing the riches and resources of agricultural Russia.

Though millions of dollars have already been expended, many more millions are required to make it possible for the Joint Distribution Committee to give the colonists something more than tools and land. They must be aided in their aspirations for establishing schools and synagogues to assist them in living a well-rounded and happy religious, so-cial and communal life," Mrs. Sternberger declared.

While in Warsaw, Mrs. Sternberger visited the Jewish School for Nursing, the only one in Europe, which was established there by the Joint Distribution Committee under the direction of Miss Amelia Greenwald of New York, and spent two days at the institution to famspent two days at the institution to ramiliarize herself with its workings. "I was gratified," she says, "to find it an institution which any American metropolitan city would prize. It is unbelievable that so much could have been accomplished with such meagre resources and facilities. The school can indeed be regarded as one of the most outstanding and enduring services of the Joint Distribution Committee to East European Jewry. I am confident that the influence of the school will ex-tend far beyond the limits of Poland

EDITOR, SAILS FOR PALESTINE Dr. S. Bernstein, editor of "Dos Yid-dishe Folk," Yiddish organ of the Zionist Organization of America, sailed for Palestine on the steamer Aquitania. He will remain abroad six weeks.

During his stay in Palestine, Dr. Bernstein was entrusted with the special mission of making arrangements with the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem by which American relatives may facilitate the entry of prospective Jew-ish immigrants to Palestine, even though they are not classified under the labor schedule or under the category of persons with means. This could be accomplished by a guarantee of the American relatives that the immigrants will receive a minimum amount for their livelihood. This is of special importance in the case of parents and elderly persons who are receiving support from America in the countries where they now reside and are desirous of settling in the Holy Land. Proposals to this effect have been made on previous occasions, but Dr. Bernstein was given the task to bring about a final agreement on the matter.

Before his departure, Dr. Bernstein was the guest of honor at a luncheon on this occasion under the auspices of members of the Administrative Commembers of the Zionist Organization of America and a group of Hebrew and Yiddish writers. Harry Fierst acted as toastmaster.

IFWISH COMMUNISTS CAMPAIGN AGAINST HIGH HOLIDAY OBSERVANCE

Proclaim Second Day of Rosh Hashanah "Jewish Industrialization Day" (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 22-An intensive camnaign against the observance of the Jewish High Holidays, beginning this year on October 5th, is under way under the leadership of the Jewish section of the Communist party.

"Red Rosh Hashanah" and "Red Kol Nidre Night" will be features of the campaign, which is designed to wean the Jewish working masses away from observing the traditional Jewish holidays. The original plan of declaring the Day of Atonement, October 15, as a compulsory day of labor for 15, as a computery who are to give the Jewish workers, who are to give their day's earnings for the industri-alization of the Jewish masses, was abandoned, but a voluntary "Jewish industrialization day" will be proclaimed on the second day of Rosh Hashanah, October 6.

A decision to this effect was reached last night at a conference between Jewish Communist leaders and representatives of artisans' and workers' organizations in Moscow. After heated discussions, it was decided that the observance of the industrialization day by working is to be voluntary and that the earnings are to be given by the workers towards the fund required for the construction of a Soviet aeroplane to be named Bidjan. The Jewish section of the Communist party plans to carry out a registration of Jewish workers in the various factories and of the Jewish artisans, thus checking up on those who will not participate in the industrialization work.

Denver Hospital Convention Opposes Information Service on National Appeals

Denver, Col., Aug. 22-Disapproval of the program of the National Appeals Information Service "to pass on the worthiness of all national philanthropic agencies making national ap-peals" featured the sessions of the peals" twenty-fifth annual convention of the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society held at the Brown Palace Hotel here. Over two hundred delegates attended the sessions.

The resolution on the National Appeals Information Service, which was

unanimously adopted, read:

"Whereas a body of social workers organized under the auspices of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service as the National Appeals Information Service is attempting not only to pass on the worthiness of all national philanthropic agencies but to determine their policies, budgets and expansion program, and,

"Whereas the plans of the National Appeals Information Service have been drafted without consultation with representatives of the national agencies and, in fact, by their exclusion from

the deliberations;

"Whereas the proposed plans con-stitute a loss of autonomy of the various national organizations and would place them in control of individuals not possessing the requisite training and experience in these specialized fields,

"Whereas the national budgeting scheme proposed by the National Appeals Infromation Service is a hazardous experiment which would cause irreparable injury to the national orga-nizations, there, be it

"Resolved that the members of the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society in convention assembled disapprove of the proposed plans of the National Appeals Information Service to control the policies or budget of our organi-

zation;

"Resolved that the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society are hereby empowered to use their best endeavors to counteract any plans to curtail or alter the traditional policies, functions or methods of fund raising of the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society which in their opinion they deem necessary to the welfare of our patients;

"Resolved that the Jewish Consumptives Relief Society is heartily in favor of coordinating the activities of the respective national anti-tuberculosis agencies but is firmly convinced that this can only be brought about in due time by concerted action of the respective organizations on their own initiative and without coercion, ex-pressed or implied, by outside sources."

TUTTLE AIDS RABBIS'
GROUP IN PROBLEM OF DESERTED WOMEN

Pledges Co-operation to Federation of Orthodox Rabbis

The office of the United States District Attorney will gladly cooperate with the Federation of Orthodox Rabbis of America, with headquarters at 198 E. Broadway, New York, in help-ing to solve the problem of Jewish women who were deserted by their husbands.

The matter is particularly acute in the cases of hundreds of Jewish women who reside in Europe and whose husbands have been lost track of in the United States. In addition to their economic plight because they have received no support for themselves and their children, these women cannot remarry, as they belong to the category known in Jewish religious law as "Agunoth," women whose husbands' whereabouts are not known. The problem of these women can be solved only by ascertaining the death of their husbands or by finding them and compelling them to give their de-serted wives a formal divorce.

There are thousands of such women in Eastern Europe. The Rabbinate offices in various countries maintain special departments for the gathering of information about the lost husbands. These rabbinical offices are in touch with rabbinical offices in the United States, including the Federation of Orthodox Rabbis of America which maintains a special Agunoth Bureau. This bureau frequently invokes the aid of the authorities to compel missing husbands that have been found to fulfill their duty to the wives they deserted. In this connection the office of the District Attorney has been greatly helpful of late.

Mr. Tuttle, receiving a delegation of the Federation of Orthodox Rabbis, composed of Rabbi M. Eskolsky and Rabbi Neuman, assured them that his office would continue to cooperate with the rabbis in this social problem. Assistant U. S. Roumanian Government's Communities Law Is an Imposition on Jews, Filderman Declares

Paris, Aug. 22-"What right has a Christnan, government member or ordinary citizen, to say how many cults we Jews are allowed to have," stated Dr. William Filderman, discussing the recently promulgated Jewish communities ordinance enacted notwithstanding the protests of Jewish leaders in Roumania, in an interview with a representative of the Jewish Telegraphic If you are pleased with the "Jewish Daily Agency, on his arrival here from Zu-

rich. "If it is admitted that a minister can make a law then there is no more independence and no longer religious freedom left. One minister will today pass an excellent law and another will pass a bad one tomorrow. Religion will then be in the hands of the government, becoming a pawn in every minister's game. The same minister who decides that an infinite number of Jewish cults can exist and that for each cult an infinite number of communities will be established, soon after completely changed his decision, declaring that Jews are entitled to only three cults, without the power to constitute more than one community for each. It is being said that in England and America, Jews are entitled to constitute all the congregations they wish. While in America, the church and state are separated, the Roumanian church forms part of the constitutional system.

"The government member takes liberties with us which he would not take with other religious communities, therefore we claim that the Peace Treaties and the constitution have been violated. that religious freedom no longer exists in Roumania, and that we became religious slaves, at the desire of this or that other government member.

"Besides, how can the fact be explained otherwise that Iews unanimously protested, that all political parties in Roumania, the Liberals, the Socialists, the peasants, the Germans and Hungarian parties, as well as the press, protested against the Communities law. How can it be explained that certain deputies of the government party itself, also protested against the law? The statement that the Sephardic community and the Union of Synagogues asked for the law is only a brave attempt to bolster up the lie. The Union of Syna-gogues not only did not ask for the law, but associated itself with our protest, signing it. The Sephardim did not ask for anything when the law was published. They simply wrote that the law did not affect them, without approving of the law insofar as it concerns us. The Orthodox communities through their president, protested against the law. However, the Roumanian minister of education claimed to have a petition signed by 300 people. I believe that the signatures were false. Even if it is true, is it right to pass a law for 300 people when there are a million op-posing it? It is not democracy but re-

"It is untrue that the majority in Iewish life in Roumania wish to onpress the minority. On the contrary, our statutes provide that the communities are obliged to satisfy the religious needs of every minority," Dr. Filderman declared.

Mayer S. Polloch, of Pottstown, Pa., died at the age of 68. He was a charter member of the Mercy of Truth Congregation of Pottstown. He gave a home for Jewish charity work in Atlantic City.

Arab shepherds. It is apparent that Arab agitators are spreading rumors among the Moslem population that the Jews are at-tacking the Arabs and that they in-tend "to capture the Western Wall and the Mosque of Omar."

Among those beaten by the police during the funeral of Abraham Mizrachi, 17-year-old Bukhara Jewish youth who died of wounds inflicted by Arabs, were Rabbi Jacob Berman, Mizrachi school inspector, and Mr Braudo of the staff of the Zionist Executive. Two sexagenarians were among the wounded.

Steps are under way for expressing the indignation of the Jewish population in New York City at the attitude of the Palestine government in the Wailing Wall controversy which resulted in the deplorable events.
