93 JEWS KILLED IN PALESTINE UP TO TUESDAY, ACCORD-INC TO COLONIAL OFFICE FIGURES

46 Moslems, 4 Christians Killed; 269 Jews, 118 Moslems, 39 Christians Wounded; London Issues Statement on Casualties and Measures Taken to Restore Order: Acting High Commissioner Denies Censorship

Palestine, according to an official statement issued by the Colonial Office Tuesday night. Several hours before statement was issued listing 83 Jews killed up to Monday morning.

"The situation is reported well in hand. All is quiet in Jerusalem and Jaffa. The country is still unsettled and continuous organized attacks are being carried out by Arabs on numerous scattered Jewish communities, according to the statement issued by the British Colonil office Tuesday evening. "No attempts have so far been made at interfering with essential services.

"Regarding the recent report that British troops at the railway at Haifa were attacked by Arabs and disarmed, no official report has been received.

"The Acting High Commissioner reports yesterday (Monday) that on Sunday a demonstration took place at Jaffa and trouble arose there after midday when the mob attempted to enter Tel Aviv. The police fired, causing casualties the extent of which is not yet known. Later the mob attacked the district office, assaulted some Moslem notables, but an armored car, firing overhead, dispersed them. Troops arrived at 2 P. M., when an attack on Tel Aviv was impending. At the sight of the troops, the crowd dispersed.

"After that, except isolated assaults the situation became and remained quiet. Impending attacks at the Hadar Ha'Carmel quarter of Haifa were prevented by the arrival of British

Throughout the night of the twentyfifth, reports were received of threat-ened attacks on the Jewish colonies. The situation in that regard was known by the following morning, but measures were taken by the military authorities in conjunction with the air force and the native police.
"In the Old City of Jerusalem, fol-

lowing the quiet of the twenty-fifth, attacks are reported, in one of which a bomb was thrown into a Jewish

quarter.

"In Transjordania the general situation is not free from anxiety, following the receipt by the tribes of news of Friday's events, but so far no disturbances were reported.

"Mr. Luke points out that it was difficult in the circumstances to give more than an indication from time to time of the principal events of the immediately preceding three days. "Attacks, threats of attack and as-

saults occurred and continued throughout the country and some events oc-curred simultaneously in different places. The outlying Jewish suburbs of Jerusalem, Jaffa and Haifa have been subjected to attacks and assault.

"The Jewish quarter of Hebron was the scene of a particularly determined attack, particulars of which have al-ready been published. The Jewish colonies from the south of Jaffa to the south of Haifa were subjected to

threats of attack

"The Jews evacuated some colonies. The Arabs were looting and destroying property in them. The Jewish col-onies in the valleys of Esdraelon and Jezreel have been under threats of attack, and actual assaults took place. In Gaza the Jews suffered some loss of life and injuries. Mr. Luke states that the prompt response to the request for naval and military assistance enables the government to maintain control. The officers of the district administration have rendered invaluable services in the very responsible situation and the special constables were indispensible. The local press is still suspended, but it could probably not function anyway.

"The Government commenced issue a series of news bulletins. No censorship is imposed on outward telegrams, but in a few cases press tele-grams were held up not exceeding 48 hours.

Mass Meetings Being Called, Days of Fast and Prayer Declared; Non-Jews Join Jews in Protest

The movement of protest against the lless of race or creed, will watch with Palestine outrages and the attitude of great interest the efforts put forth by the Palestine government in the present unparalleled tragedy, is spreading throughout the United Staes, enlisting the sympathy and cooperation of Jews of all shades of opinion, as well as non-Jews.

Extensive arrangements have been made for the holding of a monster mass meeting tonight under the aus-pices of the Zionist Organization of America, at the 71st Regiment Armory, Park Avenue and 34th Street, New

York.

Senator William E. Borah, chairman of the United States Senate Foreign Relations Committee, announced yesterday at Washington that he has accepted the request of the Zionist Organization to address the mass organization to address the mass meeting. Other speakers at the meeting will be Samuel Untermyer, who will preside; Rabbi M. S. Margolies, dean of the Orthodox Rabbinate in the United States; Col. Herbert H. Lehman, Licutenant-Governor of the State of New York; Mayor Walker, Rabbi Samuel Shulman, and others.

The New York Orthodox Rabbinate, through its official body, issued a call to all synagogues to recite designated chapters of the Book of Psalms and the Selichoth (prayers of invocation, recited traditionally in times of emer-gency and extreme danger) every day during the afternoon services "until

the Palestine Jewry is out of danger."
The Jewish press of New York,
commenting editorially on the continuous bloodshed, applies to the events the term "the Third Destruction." The "Jewish Daily Forward," Socialist organ, writing under the headline, "The Third Destruction," declares that "among the mourners of the Churban must be all who feel themselves to be Jews, regardless of political, so-

cial or national views.

While the entire American press takes a strongly pro-Jewish, sympa-thetic stand, the Communist press, in-cluding the Yiddish daily "Freiheit" and the "Daily Worker," attempt to present the events as a revolutionary uprising of the "oppressed Arab toiling masses against the exploitation of the Zionists and the British imperialists." These organs of the Communist agitators attempt to blame the Jews for the Palestine events.

Philadelphia Mayor Voices Protest Philadelphia, Aug. 28-From the "Cradle of Liberty" there has gone forth a vehement protest against the Arab atrocities voiced by Mayor Harry W. Mackey.

Addressing a group of Jewish citizens who called upon him this afternoon, Mayor Mackey made it clear that the interest of this country is not only in the American citizens who now chance to be in the Holy Land but in

the English Government to restore order. The Palestine riots are occurring on the eve of the disarmament conferences, and the efforts of the world powers to bring about interna-tional peace. When these conferences are held, one of the first matters to be taken up, I am sure, should be the situation in Palestine.

"The people of this country will insist as they did in 1776 when the De-claration of Independence was signed, and again in 1787 when the Constitu-tion of the United States was adopted, that men and women have a right to follow their individual religious beliefs. so long as they do not infringe upon

the rights of others.

'Philadelphia stands ready to lend all possible aid to American sufferers, particularly to those who have gone to Palestine from our own city.

"The Balfour Declaration has been adopted by all the civilized nations of the world. The people of the United States will not tolerate injustice to the Jew, no matter where it may occur. The day of intolerance and race prejudice has passed. The Jewish people of Philadelphia are a part of us. There is no distinction between them and any other American citizens. All the force of our local government is at their

Declares that 10,000 Would Be Ready to Go; Jewish Youth of the World Volunteers for Palestine Service

Headquarters of the Zionist Organi-1cluding the 2,000 ex-legionnaires now zation of America announced that great in Palestine as part of the British numbers of young Jews are reporting there to seek service in the American Palestine Jewish Legion, which was offered by the Legion to the British Government, through Ambassador Sir Esme Howard at Washington, for service in Palestine.

In the telegram offering to serve in Palestine, the legionaires stated:

"We have the honor to request that you transmit to the British Cabinet the following offer of the American Palestine Jewish Legion, an organization of Jewish American veterans who during the World War served in the Jewish Legion of the Egyptian Expeditionary Forces in Palestine and is now known as the American Palestine lewish Legion, our assistance in the present disturbances in Palestine.

"Time being the essence of safety we urgently request that a reply by cable be returned to us at yours and the British Government's earliest convenience in order that we may initiate such steps toward the recruitment of the

legion.
"We allow ourselves the liberty to observe that in our judgment the best the justice which must be meted out. interests of the mandatory power and "The people of Philadelphia, regard- of the Jewish people is served by ininterests of the mandatory power and

"Upon acceptance 10,000 American Jews stand ready to be recruited. Many of these had previous military experience in the Jewish Legion as well as in the American and Continental Armies. 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DAWES REPORTS BRITISH MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO CALM PALESTINE RIOTS President Hoover Receives Herman Bernstein; Americans at Hebron Safe in Jerusalem

Washington, D. C., Aug. 28-The State Department today issued the following official announcement: "The Department has received a

telegram from Ambassador Dawes stating that, as directed by the Secretary of State on August 26, he called at the Foreign Office and expressed the earnest hope of the Secretary of State that immediate and comprehensive steps be taken for the restoration of order and the protection of lives and property of American citizens in Palestine.

"Ambassador Dawes states that the Foreign Office assured him that every effort is being made, and will be made, to restore order and to protect American lives and property.

"The Department has received a telegram from Mr. Paul Knabenshue, the American Consul-General at Jerusalem, requesting that a consular officer be assigned temporarily to his office for urgent duty at Tel Aviv to assist in work connected with the protection of a large number of American citizens residing there. The De-partment has assigned Mr. Harry L. Troutman, an American Consul at present in Beirut, to this duty.

"Mr. Knabenshue has reported to the Department that all the American citizens at Hebron as listed in the Department's press release of yesterday, are now safe in Jerusalem."

AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE URGES CALM IN PRES-FNT PALESTINE TRIBULATION

Holds Emergency Meeting Upon Arrival of Dr. Cyrus Adler from Europe; Is Assured that British Employ All Means to Restore Order; U. S. Government Keenly Alive to Situation; Will Continue Vigilance

ing the return of Dr. Cyrus Adler from Europe, revealed that the Committee had intervened with the United States Department of State on Monday regarding the Palestine events, asking the government that it indicate to the British government how profoundly disturbed they were and urging the government to take such add tional measures as would ensure the protection of the Jewish inhabitants of the Holy Land.

An emergency meeting of the Comand the following statement was issued .

"An emergency meeting of the American Jewish Committee was held August 28 to consider the outrages in Palestine. Dr. Cyrus Adler, who returned last night from abroad, presided. Based on a radio communication received from him Monday afternoon, Morris D. Waldman, Secretary of the Committee, has sent to the State Department a telegram and a confirmatory letter, in which the United States government was urged to make known to the British government its intense grief these happenings have aroused in the hearts of millions of American citizens, whose attachment to the Holy Land is one of their most cherished traditions, and who view with profound disappointment and sorrow the fact that in spite of tension known to have existed for some time, the unfortuntae outbreak was not averted The telegram concludes with the suggestion that, in order to prevent possible spread of anti-Jewish excesses in other countries where Jews and Moslems live, the United States govern-ment bring to the attention of the governments of such countries the desirability of taking necessary precau-tionary measures. The Committee tionary measures. The Committee further indicates to the State Department that it is imperative to inform the British government how profound-ly disturbed they are over these unfortunate events and urged the government to take such additional measures as would insure the protection of the Jewish inhabitants of the Holy Land.

"The Committee fully understands and profoundly sympathizes with the intense indignation and sorrow which have been aroused among the entire Jewish population of the United States by the outrages committed in the Holy Land. At the same time the Committee is reliably assured that the British government is now employing all available means to restore order and tranquillity in that country. The Committee knows also that the government of the United States is keenly alive to the situation and to its sense of responsi-bility for the protection of the lives and property of American citizens. Nevertheless the Committee will con-

"The Committee believes it the part of wisdom for the Jewish people to meet this new tribulation with as much calmness and self-restraint as are possible under the distressing circumstances, feeling confident that no effort will be spared to obtain the fullest cooperation of both the governments of Great Britain and the United States to the restoration of order and the protection of life and property," the statement declared.

LORD MELCHETT PRESENTS JEWISH DEMANDS TO BRIT-ISH COLONIAL SECRETARY Assured by Lord Passfield That Military Forces Have Situation Well in Hand; Felix Warburg Sails

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Aug. 27-Lord Melchett, a member of the Jewish Agency Council for Palestine, the Jewish organization including Zionists and non-Zionists recently formed, was received this afternoon by the British Colonial Secretary, Lord Passfield, in relation to the Palestine situation.

Lord Passfield, it was stated following the interview, promised to secure quick telegraphic communication be-tween the Jewish Agency headquarters in London and the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem whose cabled reports were delayed due to the censorship of

the Palestine government.

The Colonial Sceretary also stated he would order the Palestine government to organize the distribution of food to the isolated Jewish colonies and towns. He assured Lord Melchett that the military forces of Great Britain "have the position in hand."

The interview between Lord Melchett and Lord Passfield took place following a conference held this morning by Zionist leaders with the participation of the Marquis of Reading, Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, Harry Sacher and others.

At the meeting of the Jewish Agency Council held tonight under the chairmanship of Dr. Weizmann, the demands of the Jewish Agency Council were formulated for submission to-morrow by Dr. Weizmann to Lord Passfield. It was understood that Dr. Weizmann will ask, among other things, for the compensation for loss of life and property from the British govern-ment to the families of the Palestine disaster victims.

Felix M. Warburg Sails

Felix M. Warburg, who attended the meeting, before sailing on the Homeric tonight, stated to the Jewish Tele-graphic Agency correspondent here that he was deeply shocked by the Pales-tine crisis. "I am sure that the government in London is conscious of its responsibilities," he said.

A young Jew was shot dead early Wednesday morning in front of the headquarters of the Jewish communal board of Jerusalem when the British police or-dered him to give up his arms. Because the instruction was given in English, which he did not understand, he did not comply immediately and was

Notwithstanding the presence of the British soldiers in Jerusalem, much fighting went on during Tuesday night in the Old City. The fighting assumed a more dangerous character in other, parts of the city. The synagogue in the Georgian Jewish quarter near the Damascus Gate was destroyed by fire.

Representatives of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem presented a vigorous protest to the Acting High Commissioner, H. C. Luke, against alleged discrimination in the carrying out of the order for disarmament as between Jews and non-British Jews. The Acting High Commissioner is reported to have declared that the order was final.

London, Aug. 28-The Zionist head-quarters here was in receipt this quarters here was in receipt this morning of a cablegram from the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem requesting its intervention with the Colonial Office against the orders issued by the Palestine authorities to disarm the specially enrolled Jewish constables and the Jewish self-defense body. The message declared that the order, under the conditions still prevailing in Palestine was premature and may create a more dangerous situation for the Jews of Palestine.

The despatch charged that while the Jews were being disarmed, the Palestine authorities enrolled fifty Felaheen who were formely members of the Transjordanian Frontier Force, many of whom are residents of the village Lifta near Jerusalem, the hot-bed of the Moslem anti-Jewish agitation.

More casualties among the Jewish population of Haifa, with a large number of wounded, are reported from there, where the Moslem Arabs perpetrated new attacks on the Jews on Tuesday. The leaders of the Jewish community in Haifa have complained of the great difficulty they encounter in obtaining the cooperation of the au-The Haifa barracks were thorities. burned down. Some of the inhabitants of the barracks were shot. The habi-tation was looted. Many parts of Haifa were evacuated by the Jewish groups who are being concentrated in the suburb Hadar Ha'Carmel.

The troops are being replaced by marines who were landed Tuesday morning at Haifa from a battleship. An order was issued immediately prohibiting the inhabitants to go abroad on the streets, the Zionist Executive Two more Jews who was informed. Two more Jews who were wounded in Haifa on Monday, died Tuesday.

Quiet in Tel Aviv and Jaffa

In Tel Aviv and Jaffa quiet prevails. Mr. A. R. Oofien, manager of the Anglo-Palestine Bank, after touring the city recommended the commencement of normal business on Wednesday. The government also permitted a Russian boat to land emigrants at Jaffa on Tuesday.

Jaffa Arab merchants approached Jewish leaders with proposals of "peace."

Two Arab families were found killed

in Jaffa on Tuesday. It was said that they were killed during the Jewish counter-attack.

A deputation of Moslem Arabs called on the Acting High Commissioner Tuesday protesting against the alleged general arming of the Jewish population. It was assumed that this call was the cause of the consequent order for disarming the special constables.

Much confusion and loss of time is caused by the continuous changes in the command. At first the Palestine police was in command of the situation. Later it was the Royal Air Force, then the infantry regiment. As the situa-tion is now the command is divided; in some places the naval authorities are in charge.

The Zionist headquarters in London were further informed by the Zionist Executive of Jerusalem that it has approached the Palestine government with a request to officially deny the rumor published in some London

RESPONSIBILITY RESTS ON MOSLEM LEADERS AND PALESTINE GOVERNMENT, JEWISH VIEW

Leaders Reject With Indignation Invented Lies, Spread in Some Newspapers, that Jews Provoked Outbreak: Attack Well Planned and Organized in Advance, Events Show; Palestine Jews Will Not Be Intimidated, Spokesman Declares: Descriptions of Scenes During Bloodshed in Holy City; Jewish Heroism Amidst Drama and Tragedy (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Palestine Moslem leaders. Contrary to the views inspired by the leaders of the Moslem rebellion and transmitted by certain newspaper correspondents who proved too willing to become the vehicle for the Moslem inspired propaganda, authoritative Jewish Palestine sources protest against any assertion that there was any action or attitude on the part of Palestine Jews which tended to provoke the conflict. The controversy over the Wailing Wall between the Jews and the Moslems is of long standing and nothing has been done or said by the Jews of Palestine prior to Friday August 16 which has not been said or done before in support of the Jewish position.

Isaac Ben-Zvi, leader of the Jewish self-defense corps in Palestine during the present emergency days, branded as "malicious invention and thorough lie" the rumor spread that the attack was started by the Jewish youth in Jerusalem who allegedly threw a bomb on the Arab crowd. The Colonial Office will be in a position to confirm the fact that the riots were started Friday, August 16, by Moslem worshippers, following their leaving the Mosque of Omar, with shouts and cries. It was then that they started to beat and assault all Jewish passersby whom they encountered during their march.

Blames Palestine Government, Order "Not to Shoot" When 24 Were Dead

"We are certain that if the Palestine government would have sent to patrol the Arab demonstration on Friday at least the same number of police which it sent to patrol the Jewish demonstra-tion on Thursday, order would have been maintained in the Holy City. It is the government of Palestine alone which is responsible for the horrible events. The Palestine government repeated its orders 'not to shoot' even when there were already more than 24 Jews dead in Jerusalem alone. Even later the Palestine government did not assist the Jewish self-defense The number of Americans killed in Hebron reached 15. There are many Americans who were wounded in the attacks throughout the country," Mr. Ben-Zvi stated.

Jewish Leaders Demand Commission of Inquiry

All Jewish leaders in Palestine, without regard to party of group affiliation, are unanimous in their demand that the London government send a commission ot inquiry with full powers.

Moslem Attacks Were Well Planned in Advance

Cairo, Aug. 27—The responsibility of the Arab merciless attacks on the for the anti-Jewish atrocities committed by the Moslem Arabs for the past and agricultural centers, evidence is accumulating that the attack was well

planned in advance. In all authorative Jewish quarters beginning with the official Zionist spokesmen and ending with the man in the street, the view is held and expressed that the Moslems' attack was the direct result and product of the British ad-ministration's policy. The Palestine administration was inclined to pay too much attention to the presumed Mos-lem susceptibilities, on the authority of one highly reactionary leader, namely, the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, Mohamed Amin El Hussini. On the other hand the government again and again failed to take into consideration the susceptibilities of the Jews.

Attempts to Hold Balance Blamed

Amidst the greatest tragedy which has befallen Palestine in recent years the view is expressed that if the previous policy is persisted in it is to be feared that the sacrifice of men of all creeds will have no end. They are victims of the conflicts growing out of the disastrous attempts at holding the balance between presumably opposing claims, but which invariably result in the cruellest injustice to Jews.

Palestine Jews Will Not Allow Intimidation

The scores of heroic Jews who fell defending the honor and tradition of their race will have died in vain and the misguided Moslems who were incited to murder and plunder will also have died vainly. Peace in Palestine cannot be had by an attempt to intimidate and terrorize the Jews, was the statement of a leading authority to the correspondent of the Jewish Tele-

graphic Agency here.
"The Jews who made Palestine their home live unafraid of pogroms. perience taught them the art of selfdefense. The attempts at pogroms in Jerusalem in 1920 and in Jaffa and other parts of Palestine in 1921 were miscarried because if there is one spot in the world where Jews will not allow themselves to be pogromized, with or without the tacit consent of the authorities, it is Palestine, where the British government has solemnly pledged its best endeavors toward the establishment of the Jewish National Home.

Consternation Set in When Palestine Government Took Moslems Side

"Consternation among the Jews of Palestine became greatest," the Jewi-ish leader continued, "when the British law officers rendered the opinion to allow the Moslems to build and augment their facilities for their access to the Wailing Wall, when the British officials countenanced the presence of the Muz-Jerusalem, Aug. 27-On the fifth day zim (sexton) and his calling to prayers

during the customary hours of Jewish worship at the Wall, from a minaret directily overlooking the Temple remnant. Against this opinion, the Sixteenth Zionist Congress held several weeks ago in Zurich, Switzerland, and subsequently the Jewish Agency Council, held in the same city, uttered a solemn protest, the Zionist Congress sending a special committee to London to make vigorous representations.

"The Palestine government cannot claim that it had not been advised against pursuing its disastrous policy and the Jewish people in Palestine are united in demanding: first, that an end be put to the bloodshed which is rapidly taking the form of an Arab revolt against British authority; second, that a thorogoing investigation be ordered into the course of the events; third, the removal of officers who, having been warned, were not forcarmed; fourth, a definite declaration of policy from the British government that it is not its intention to eucourage the Arabs who believe that they can effect a change of policy by riots and massacres.

"The Jews of Palestine feel that

when the world will balance the historic claim of the Jews to the Temple wall against the legendary connection of the Prophet's horse with the passage in front of it, there will be no hesitation in deciding in favor of the

"The Moslems' claim, as generally admitted in Jerusalem, is being exag-gerated and insisted upon by the Grand Mufti whose ambition it is to consolidate his position by making his term of office a lifetime one," the Jewish leader said

How It All Started, Outsiders Main Instigators, Christians Stood Aloof

Jerusalem, Aug. 27-In the first comparatively quiet hours which Jerusalem enjoyed today before the new attacks in the Old City started, it was possible for the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency to gather authentic information from eve witnesses as to how the trouble started in the Holy City five days ago.

The first act which effectively strikes an investigator is the circumstance that the Moslem Arabs alone were the perpetrators of the crimes and massacres against the Jews. Unlike the situation in 1921, the Christian Arabs have stood aloof and in some localities the Christians mark their houses with crosses to warn both Moslem attackers and Jewish self-defenders of the neutrality of those within.

The second observation made on the basis of testimony of eye witnesses was that Jerusalem Moslems took a small part in the first riots on Friday.

Disarming Jewish Self-Defenders Is

Cause of Friction and Complaint Cairo, Aug. 28-Isaac Ben-Zvi, in an uncensored telephone message sent on Wednesday at 10.30 A. M., reported that during the preceding night many Jews in Palestine were disarmed and arrested by the military authorities, who do not differentiate between armed brigands and Jewish defenders who risked their lives when the govern-ent was powerless to accord protec-tion to the menaced Jewish population. "Notwithstanding the presence of a large British force, the country is not yet quiet. The surviving remnant of the Jewish population of Hebron is panicky, as are the population groups at other points and in the agricultural settlements," he said. The members of the self-deefnse are being arrested and will be tried like criminals," he added. "British officials and Arab officials are the only persons permitted to bear arms, while British Jews, offi-cials in the Palestine government, were disarmed," he said.

The Zionist Executive in Jerusalem vigorously protested against this discrimination in presentations to the Jerusalem government as well as to London

Moslems Demand Jews Give up Arms

A Moslem mass meeting was held A Moslem mass meeting was held Tuesday afternoon at the Mosque of Omar in Jerusalem. The Grand Mufti presided in the presence of the Jeru-salem District Commissioner, Mr. Keith-Roach, who came to the Mos-lem shrine escorted by 25 policemen.

The District Commissioner was told at the meeting that the Moslems of Jerusalem cannot be quieted unless the Jews will be disarmed. Mr. Keith-Roach undertook to see to it that the entire civil population, including the Britishers, will be disarmed.

A British convoy proceeding toward the Jewish colony Kastinia, under at-tack by the Arabs, in order to rescue the surviving Jews, was attacked by the marauders. Several British sol-diers were killed. The entire Jewish party proceeding with the convoy was wounded. The Arab village near Kastinia was burned as a reprisal. As this despatch is being written, the village is in flames.

Dr. Reifenberg, an assistant professor of the chemical department of the Hebrew University, was wounded.

A third official bulletin issued by the Palestine government, summing up the situation as of eight o'clock Tuesday morning, added to the figures of casualties and wounded (similar to the one issued by the British Colonial Office) that in Haifa the British troops arrested 30 persons, confiscating 25 rifles.

Jewish Body Places Number of Jewish Dond at 120

A communique issued today by the Vaad Leumi, National Council of Palestine Jews, gave the total number of Jewish dead in Palestine as 120.

Arab attacks on the Jewish colony Dilb were repelled by the settlers with the assistance of troops.

Here the Hebronites met for the first time with the Jewish self-defense body. Not only youths, but all Orthodox Jews seized whatever weapon they could get hold of and offered heroic resistance.

Gradually the movement spread into the suburbs when the Moslems of the neighboring villages, incited by newly arrived propagandists, joined the marauders, who were armed with sticks. clubs, daggers and knives.

Friendship and Humanity Amidst Raging Hatred

Single cases in which humanity and friendship of old neighbors survived the raging hatred of racial warfare were recorded in Jerusalem's Arablewish mixed quarters. There were cases when Arab families invited their Jewish neighbors to seek shelter in Arab houses and Jewish families protecting neighboring Arabs against the vengeance of the Jewish self-defense warriors

Jewish Youths Voluntarily Guard Minaret

A tragic feature of the Jerusalem bloodshed and disorders was the action of a group of Jewish youths who risked their lives constituting themselves into a voluntary guard to protect a Moslem minaret situated near the densely populated Jewish quarter, Zichron Moshe.

Fate Plays Havoc with Victims

Fate played havoc with some of the victims of the Moslem atrocities. Benjamin Goldberg, son of the well known Russian Zionist I. L. Goldberg, participated in the Jewish self-defense action on Friday in Jerusalem. Although he fought in the front ranks, he emerged at the close of the hostili-ties uninjured Friday night and returned on Saturday to Tel Aviv, be-lieving to be out of danger in the all-Tewish city. He was slain the following day, on Sunday, during the first attack of the infuriated Moslems on Tel Aviv. He fell in the action of the self-defense corps.

Quiet in Jerusalem But Fighting Continues in Other Parts

London, Aug. 28-While Jerusalem is quieter fighting continues in other parts of Palestine, particularly in Haifa, says a despatch from Jerusalem to the Central News Agency here.

More troops were despatched to Hebron where the situation is still threatening. Haifa is again said to be threatened by a new attack on the part of the Hauran tribesmen.

Cairo, Aug. 28—A day of heavy fighting, with many new casualties and wounded, passed in Haifa. In the evening quiet prevailed.

In the old city of Jerusalem, an uncensored report reaching here states, three Jewish houses have been set on fire. In Haifa two barracks have been destroyed by fire, with no one to extinguish the flames.

The Jewish colony Motza, near Jerusalem, is in flames. The Jewish colony Artuf, in the Judean hills, was totally destroyed. A part of the con ony of Tel Joseph was burned down.

A detachment of British soldiers arrived at Meier Shfeya, a settlement maintained by Junior Hadassah, the American young women's Zionist organization, following an urgent appeal to the authorities in Palestine from the American Consul.

Jewish members of the self-defense corps are being disarmed and arrest-ed, Isaac Ben Zvi, leader of the self-defense, telephoned here at one o'clock this morning.
