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COLONIAL OFFICE MAKES PUBLIC PERSONNEL OF COMMISSION OF INQUIRY

Will Proceed to Palestine Either at
End of This Month or Early
in October

London, Sept. 13—The names of the members of Parliament appointed to serve on the Commission of Inquiry under the chairmanship of Sir Walter Shaw were announced today by the Colonial Office. They are Sir Henry Betterson, Conservative, R. Hopkin Morris, Liberal, Henry Snell, Laborite. T. I. K. Lloyd of the Colonial Office will serve as secretary to the Commission.

In a statement accompanying the announcement, the Colonial Office declares that the tasks of the Commission are "to inquire into the immediate causes which led to the recent outbreaks in Palestine and to make recommendations as to the steps necessary to avoid recurrences."

"While the date of the commission's departure has not been definitely fixed, it is hoped it will sail toward the end of this month or early in October."

JEWISH LEADERS IN JERUSALEM FORMULATE RECONSTRUCTION PLANS Advisory Committee Representing All Groups Formed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 13—Plans toward reconstruction of the towns and villages which suffered damage as a result of the Arab outbreak are going forward. The Zionist Executive here is constituting an advisory committee for the reconstruction work. The committee is to be composed of one representative of the National Council of Palestine Jews, the Labor Federation, the merchants' association, the Anglo-Palestine Company, which will be represented by A. E. Hooftien, the farmers by Moses Smilansky, the Loan Bank by Mr. Mohl.

A committee under the chairmanship of Rabbi Meyer Berlin, president of the Mizrahi Organization, and a member of the Zionist Executive, is in charge of relief. Mr. Braude, chief accountant of the Executive, is honorary treasurer of the committee.

The entire relief work is being carried on under the supervision of the Zionist Executive acting as the Jewish Agency. Col. Frederick H. Kisch is in charge of political matters and I. Sprinzak of public information. Gerson Agronsky has been acting as director of information during the emergency period.

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SIMPLICITY TO MARK BURIAL RITES IN ACCORDANCE WITH LOUIS MARSHALL'S LAST WISH

Body May Reach Here End of September; Will Be Accompanied by
Members of Family Who Were at Bedside; Hoover Sends
Message of Condolence to James Marshall

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Zurich, Sept. 13—Simplicity will mark the last rites for Louis Marshall, in accordance with his last wish, it was learned here.

The transference of the body from the hospital to the Friesenberg Jewish cemetery was attended by representatives of the Zionist Federation of Zurich and of the Kehillah. A guard of honor, consisting of local Jews who volunteered to watch over the body, was on duty continuously.

No definite arrangements for the transportation of the body have been made as yet, but it is understood a steamer sailing September 18 has been selected. The body will be accompanied by James Marshall, son, and the other members of the family who were at his bedside.

The Swiss press devoted much attention to Mr. Marshall's death.

Among the messages of condolence received by James Marshall was one from President Herbert Hoover. The message read: "Please accept my deepest sympathy in the loss of your father, who was distinguished in his every public relation as a citizen and beloved in his every human contact as a friend."

Agudath Israel Honors Marshall's Memory

Vienna, Sept. 13—A glowing tribute to the memory of the late Louis Marshall was paid at the meeting of the Agudath Israel world congress which is in session here, in the presence of several hundred rabbis and Orthodox leaders from all parts of Europe and the United States.

Solemn exercises marked the memorial when Dr. Pinchas Kohn, president of the organization, delivered a eulogy in which he stated that the tragedy of Mr. Marshall's death is the greater since he was taken away just at the moment when it was believed that the goal of his life was achieved in the unity between Zionists and non-Zionists for the rebuilding of Palestine. The assembly listened to the eulogy of Mr. Marshall while standing.

Dr. Leo Jung, Rabbi of the Jewish Center, 131 W. 86th Street, New York, who is attending the Congress, spoke feelingly of the loss sustained by American Jewry. His memory will be treasured and honored by Orthodox Jews, though Mr. Marshall did not belong to this group, he said, relating that the late leader was the symbol of the unity of the divergent Jewish

groups and frequently lent moral and financial support to Orthodox Jewish movements, providing assistance for Yeshivas and the Beth Jacob schools.

The congress held special memorial services of Yiskor for the victims of the Palestine outbreak.

FRIDAY PASSES QUIETLY IN JERUSALEM; EXPECT CALM TO CONTINUE

Extraordinary Precautions Taken to

Jerusalem, Sept. 13—Today, the fourth Friday since the beginning of the Arab outbreak, passed quietly. The usual services at the Mosque of Omar were attended by 4,000 Moslems from the nearby villages, as compared with 20,000 on August 23, when the riots broke out.

All outsiders were searched for arms on the roads leading to Jerusalem.

Today's quiet makes continued calm in the country practically certain.

Twenty-four Arabs from the villages Seidou and Hulda, adjoining the Hulda Jewish labor settlement and a village adjoining Kastania, were sentenced to six months imprisonment each. They were all found in possession of property looted from these colonies.

Gun-running is evidently continuing in the country, it is revealed in the Arab paper "Felestin," which reported that the police seized bags of flour

ARAB NOTABLES JOIN JEWS IN BLAMING MUFTI FOR RECENT OUTBREAKS

Prominent Arabs' Resolution Urges
Government Hold Mufti
Accountable

Jerusalem, Sept. 13.—Responsibility for the Arab outbreak in Palestine is being directed toward Amin el Husseini, Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, by Arab notables of Palestine. The government is urged to hold the Mufti accountable for the recent disaster in a statement adopted at a meeting called by Arab notables of the Agour village near Hebron. The Jaffa paper, "El Akkdan," reporting the meeting, declares that the statement against the Grand Mufti was signed by those present, while others touring the villages obtained additional signatures.

The "El Akkdan" reports the meeting in an indignant article and terms the Arabs who called the meeting and the signatories "traitors and slaves of the Zionists."

CAPPER URGES COMMISSION FOR PALESTINE STUDY TO AID ZIONIST EFFORTS

American People's Sympathy Behind
Movement, Kansas Senator States

JONAH J. GOLDSTEIN SAILS FOR PALESTINE TO AID IN INVESTIGATION OF RIOTS

Proceeds to Jerusalem at Request of
Felix M. Warburg, Jewish
Agency Head

Jonah J. Goldstein, president of the Jewish Club, Member of Executive Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee and of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, sailed Thursday night on the S. S. "Bremen" for Palestine to aid in the investigation now being carried on there as the result of the recent Arab Jewish disturbances. Mr. Goldstein, who was accompanied by Mrs. Goldstein, will also inquire into the methods of distribution and the extent of the need for relief being carried on in Palestine by the Palestine Emergency Fund. Mrs. Goldstein, formerly Harriet Lowenstein, is the controller of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Mr. Goldstein undertook his mission at the request of Felix M. Warburg, New York banker and philanthropist, who is chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine. "Mr. Goldstein is proceeding to Palestine to assist in the finding of the facts concerning the losses of life and property there. He knows and has a great deal of experience with Jewish people and is bound to understand the people over there as well."

"He is a very capable lawyer, will be most welcome there and we expect that he will bring back a full report concerning the Palestine events. While there he will assist the Jewish Agency in every possible way," Mr. Warburg said.

Mr. Goldstein before his departure defined his mission to Palestine as one of justice. "I believe that I interpret the sentiment of American Jewry when I say that the Jews of America are not interested in revenge but in justice. They are interested in the facts of yesterday only inasmuch as they affect the work of tomorrow. Mr. Warburg, the champion of peace, good will and reconstruction, has asked me to represent him in Palestine and the least I could do is to proceed there," Mr. Goldstein said.

Avenues, to protest the anti-Communist attacks in Gastonia, N. C., exclaimed: "Why don't you all become Communists?"

"He's an Arab," several in the crowd shouted. This was the signal for an attack by the crowd of 2,000, in which the orator was pulled from his box and pummeled by the crowd until he was rescued by a policeman.

LORD PASSFIELD REASSURES JEWISH DELEGATION NATIONAL HOME POLICY WILL NOT BE RENOUNCED; ADMITS POLICE CHANGES NEEDED

Cannot Say Whether Parliamentary Inquiry Sessions Will be Open to Public; Leaders from All Parts of World, Including America, in Delegation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 13.—The British Colonial Office issued the following statement late Thursday evening:

The Secretary of State for the Colonies received this afternoon a deputation consisting of representatives of the Administrative Council of the Jewish Agency and the General Council of the Zionist Organization. The deputation included O. E. D'Avigdor Goldsmid, Dr. Selig Brodetsky, Miss Nettie Adler, Meyer Dizengoff, M. M. Ussishkin, H. Farbstain, Dr. Leo Motzkin, Dr. Chaim Soloweitchik, Gedaliah Hublik and Mr. Ochberg of South Africa.

Messrs. Goldsmid, Brodetsky and Dizengoff spoke in behalf of the deputation and expressed appreciation for the promptitude with which the government acted during the recent crisis. They pointed out, however, that a feeling of anxiety has been engendered by the fact that after eight years of peace it was possible for such an outbreak to gather head at all. As representing a large number of Jews who are directly connected, both by immigration into Palestine and investment of capital there, they were anxious to obtain assurance from the government that the state of security will be maintained in the future, which would justify them in advising their friends to continue and increase their work in assisting the Jewish National Home in Palestine.

The Mayor of Tel Aviv, speaking with thirty-five years of experience of Palestine, laid emphasis on the excellent relations in normal times between the Jews and Arabs of Palestine and expressed his confidence that these relations will be restored in due course.

Lord Passfield said there could be no question of the British government giving up the Palestine Mandate or departing from the policy embodied in the Balfour Declaration of facilitating the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people. He expressed appreciation for the practical achievements of the Jews in Palestine, which are regarded as beneficial not only to themselves but also to the Arab inhabitants of the country. He certainly hoped these activities would continue, but felt bound to point out that the development must depend upon the power of absorption of the country. He appreciated the point about security. It was obvious that no government in any country could give an absolute pledge that tranquility would never be disturbed, but they might rest assured that the British government is earnest about the maintenance of order in Palestine and would do all they could to prevent further disturbances. He realized that alterations in the public security arrangements would be necessary. This applied particularly to the police force which already has been

strengthened by the appointment of a hundred British constables recruited in England who had actually started for Palestine in the last few days. A hundred more were being enlisted and would go out as soon as possible.

He referred to the question of the troops which were drafted into Palestine to deal with the disturbances. He could give no positive information with regard to their future movements, but could undertake that their departure would take place only as and when it was considered they could safely be withdrawn.

In reply to a question Lord Passfield said he could not undertake that the sittings of the Commission of Inquiry in Palestine would be public in the sense that the press and public would always be present. It must be for the Commission itself to decide upon its procedure. But he had no doubt that the proceedings would be "quite open" in the sense that both sides would be represented.

Lord Passfield further expressed appreciation of what the Mayor of Tel Aviv had said about the relations of the Jews and Arabs in Palestine. He hoped such relations would soon be re-established as the future of Palestine depended upon their living side by side in peace and friendliness.

ZIONIST LEADERS DEMAND RADICAL CHANGE IN PALESTINE POLICY

Lipsky and Wise Agree on Need for More Positive Action by Britain

Unified action among leaders of the Zionist movement on the problem of securing greater cooperation for the rebuilding of Palestine from Great Britain is foreseen from the statements issued by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, after their return to the United States on the S. S. Berengaria. Both declared that more definite steps must be taken by Great Britain to guarantee the Jewish work of reconstruction. The unanimity between Dr. Wise and Mr. Lipsky has aroused considerable interest, because of their differing points of view on Zionist questions during the past two years.

Mr. Lipsky was met at the pier by a delegation of the administrative committee of the Zionist Organization and by Felix Warburg, chairman of the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency Council.

JERUSALEM POLICE RAID "DOAR HA'YOM" EDITORIAL OFFICES; SEIZE EDITION

Paper Suppressed; Police Action Due to Poem on Palestine Events

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 13.—The Friday morning edition of the "Doar Ha'Yom," Jerusalem Hebrew daily, oppositional organ edited by Vladimir Jabotinsky, who is now abroad, was confiscated by the police in a spectacular raid carried out Thursday at midnight by Keith-Roach, Deputy District Commissioner of Jerusalem. The paper was suppressed and guards were stationed outside the building.

It is stated that the police action was the result of the publication of a poem by Reuveni on the Palestine events. Rumors of the impending raid were current during the day.

The Arab paper "Felestin" today published an article warning that "Palestine will become a blood bath if the Jews persist in their claims." The Arab paper was not confiscated.

A number of Arab students who signed an appeal to the Arab population to boycott all Jewish merchants, were arrested today, charged with spreading seditious propaganda.

While Jewish housewives boycott only Arab products coming from Hebron, Motza and Lifta, where the perpetrators of the anti-Jewish massacres are centered, the appeal issued by the students, and printed by the Moslem orphanage press, widely distributed, said:

"Arabs! Sever all commercial relations with Jews if you are concerned for the life of your country and your future. Keep away from the Jews who killed your innocent Arab brethren with weapons purchased with the money you paid in buying his goods, which he intends to utilize for the acquisition of land which should have remained in your hands, in order to drive you away from your fatherland. Know that in buying from the Jew you will work yourself for the extermination of your life and your country with your own hands and betray your fatherland and your religion. Therefore, you Arabs, whether Moslem or Christian, should boycott the Jew, buying nothing from him except land, selling him everything except land. Remember always, the words of the upright Caliph Omar Bekhutab, who said: 'Foreigners shall overcome you in trade, which is one-third of domination.'

"Arab! Remember that the Jew is your strongest enemy and that of your ancestors. Do not be misled by his cunning, for it was he who tortured Christ, peace be upon Him, and poisoned Mohamed, peace and worship upon Him. It is he who now endeavors to slaughter you as he did yesterday. Be aware that the best way to save yourself and your fatherland from the grasp of the foreign intruder, the greedy Jew, is to boycott him and support the industry of your fellow countrymen, thus winning satisfaction of your fatherland and God."

Tributes to the memory of Louis Marshall continue in an unabated stream, among them the following:

Albert D. Lasker—"The followers of the Jewish faith lost a great and useful co-religionist in the death of Louis Marshall, whose interest in the members of his sect was very compelling. The nation has lost a truly patriotic American and his myriad friends share their loss with the general public."

Louis Wiley—"The passing of Louis Marshall has taken from the world a generous, humane philanthropist, a courageous and able champion of justice, an untiring leader of his co-religionists and a noble, lovable man. His death brings a feeling of deepest sorrow and irreparable personal loss. I grieve that this lofty and inspiring personality—my friend of forty years—has been removed and that his beneficent services in law, in government and in social and religious activities have been stilled. The rich achievements of a life devoted unselfishly to others will stand always as a monument to the affectionate and grateful memory of our beloved friend and guide, Louis Marshall."

Congressman Samuel Dickstein—"The news of the untimely death of Louis Marshall is a shock from which we cannot easily recover. It seems that there never was a time in the history of our Jews of the United States and in the world, when Louis Marshall's name would not be heard whenever any matter affecting the welfare of our race came up to the foreground of public discussion."

"Louis Marshall was always the first Jew active as spokesman of his people whenever it became necessary to raise the voice of the Jew in a public cause. In my own experience as a member of the immigration committee of the House of Representatives, I frequently had occasion to come into contact with the enlightened, humane and philanthropic views which Louis Marshall so ably represented. Mr. Marshall's clear-cut and intelligent view of our entire immigration problem was in a large measure responsible for the mitigation of the rigor which Congress saw fit to impose in our National Immigration Legislation."

"Louis Marshall's death at this inopportune time will long be felt by our race and by the country at large. We have lost a sincere friend and champion, and the country one of its best constitutional lawyers."

Israel Unterberg, President of the Jewish Education Association—"As leader of American Jewry, Louis Marshall was more than a great statesman and wise counselor. He was also a genuine lover of his people. Everything he did and said was shot through with the quality of love. He was no

mere palliator. He looked far ahead and saw more deeply than other men. I know of none that will suffer more by his death than the work carried on by the United Distribution Committee and the United Jewish Campaign."
