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OMINOUS RUMORS PER- SIST IN PALESTINE WHILE QUIET UNDISTURBED

Government Machinery Returning to Normal; Tourist Traffic Continues
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—Despite ominous rumors, quiet prevails in Jerusalem and throughout the country.

Last night a few desultory shots were heard, no casualties occurring, it is officially reported.

A sign that the government machinery is returning to normalcy is seen in the fact that an official communiqué of this morning, instead of reporting disturbances or describing the country-wide calm, deals with the transit of Palestine citrus fruit through Italy, and the conditions of loading the fruit. Shipments of citrus fruit will be permitted only through Trieste and Fiume.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, returning from Transjordan, reports complete quiet, the only visible movement being thousands of camel grazing and bound toward Egypt. Security in Transjordan is evident from the authorities allowing women tourists to travel unaccompanied throughout the territory.

Tourist traffic was not interrupted either in Palestine or Transjordan, even during the height of the disorders. Tourist parties which landed during the last three weeks included a group of Italian professors who made a visit to the Jewish colonies. Another group, Hungarian pilgrims, conducted a tour under Archbishop Trichy of Kalosca.

SAFED PERPETRATORS CON- CENTRATE IN TIBERIAS; CONTINUE AGITATION Libelous Rumors Create Panic Among Jews

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—Arabs of Safed, who participated in the anti-Jewish massacre there, are known to be hiding in Tiberias, according to reports in Jerusalem today. These and other Arabs from other towns are circulating alarming reports among the Tiberias Arabs that the Jews propose to attack them. Several Arab families, acting on these libelous rumors, have left the Jewish quarters of Tiberias. Others depart at nightfall to sleep in the Arab neighborhoods. This is causing considerable panic among the Jews.

The Tiberias Jews have been further agitated because a Christian officer was reprimanded by his senior British and Arab officers for searching the house of an Arab notable for arms. This renders the situation increasingly difficult, as it is felt the Christian officer is bound to become indifferent.

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4,000 JEWS IN MOSCOW TO WORK ON HIGH HOLIDAYS. AVER JEWISH COMMUNISTS

Anti-Religious Program Arranged for Yom Kippur

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 17—Four thousand Jews in Moscow will engage in work on Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur, the two holiest days in the Jewish calendar, according to the expectations of the Yevsekzia, Jewish section of the Communist Party. In a statement issued, it declares that it has contracted for them to work as laborers in new buildings, as well as carriers at railway stations. The estimated number of workers is believed to be exaggerated, inasmuch as the anti-religious campaign being carried on in Soviet Russia has attracted little attention not only in the province, but even in Moscow.

The "Emes," Jewish Communist daily of Moscow, today publishes the program arranged for Yom Kippur. On Kol Nidre eve, special anti-religious concerts have been arranged throughout the city. For Yom Kippur, excursions to museums and free movies for women and children have been arranged.

In a nine column article devoted to anti-religious propaganda the "Emes" writes: "During the day when the Jewish servants of capital will through religion attempt to enslave the masses to the carriage of the exploiters, conscious proletarians, should exhibit no passive resistance but actual war, unveiling the real contra-revolutionary contents of religion."

ZIONIST EXECUTIVE URGES FILING OF CLAIMS

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—All sufferers in the recent disturbances are urged in a notice published by the Zionist Executive today to enter their claims for reparation. They are instructed to bring evidence immediately to the legal commission, which has offices in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa.

LABOR GROUP NAMES RE- CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—Reconstruction steps are to be undertaken by the Jewish Labor Federation, which appointed a special committee for working out plans for the urban and rural settlements damaged during the disturbances. All proposals will be submitted to the Zionist Executive.

The Labor Federation was advised from Paris that the Socialist mission which planned to visit Palestine before the disturbances has postponed its trip.

ARAB PROPAGANDA CONTINUES FOR ANTI- JEWISH BOYCOTT

Discontinue Electricity Current Supplied by Jewish Company

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—Propaganda of Arab agitators for an anti-Jewish boycott in Palestine is continuing. Characteristic of the agitation is the action of a group of Arabs who attended a meeting Sunday night to consider the situation. In order to live up to their boycott propaganda they ordered the caretaker to put out the electric lights supplied by the Ruttenberg Electric Workers. After the meeting the company was instructed to discontinue its supply.

The propaganda is the subject of comment in the Hebrew daily, "Ha' Aretz," in an editorial entitled, "Let There Be Darkness." The paper reports that both Moslem and Christian youth societies and the Arab paper "Yarmuk" of Haifa are supporting the boycott propaganda.

Arabs working for Jewish planters in the Judea colonies, where they did not report during the two weeks of disturbance, demanded back pay for the period. Upon receipt of the money they returned to their villages. In urging all fellahen to collect their money, the Arab villagers declared: "This Tuesday the Jewish colonies will be closed."

The Arabs are also trying to collect funds for relief of the Moslem sufferers in the disturbances. It is revealed that 18 Arabs were killed in Haifa, including 1 Egyptian, several from Tulkerem, Acre and Ayre. All evidently came to Haifa to help in the anti-Jewish attacks.

PALESTINE JEWS EXPRESS THANKS TO BRITISH FORCES FOR RESTORING PEACE

Zionist Executive and Vaad Leumi Issue Joint Statement

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—The Zionist Executive and the National Council of Palestine Jews today issued a statement expressing gratitude to the British forces in Palestine for restoring order in the country. The statement read:

"Now that calm reigns in Palestine, the Palestine Zionist Executive and the Vaad Leumi desire to give expression to the deep gratitude felt by Palestine Jewry in regard to the effective help afforded by the units of the British naval, military and air forces in restoring order in the country after the unprovoked attack on the Jewish community during the recent riots, generally protecting life and property.

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THOUSANDS OF ADMIRERS GREET LUBAWITSCHER REBBE ON ARRIVAL HERE

Says Religious Status of Jews in Russia Not as Bad as Believed Abroad

Rabbi Joseph Isaac Schnersohn, of Riga, the Lubawitscher Rebbe, arrived in New York yesterday, aboard the steamer "France," for a several weeks stay in the United States.

He was greeted at quarantine by a committee of Orthodox rabbis and lay leaders from many cities and brought to New York on a special municipal boat.

Several thousand of his admirers were massed at Pier A to welcome him to New York. An escort of several hundred automobiles accompanied him to Borough Park where he will stay while in New York.

Rabbi Schnersohn who left Palestine on the eve of the occurrence of the riots, seemed much depressed by the events which occurred in Palestine.

The religious position of the Jews in Russia is not as bad as generally believed outside the country, he declared, in an interview with a representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin." It is true that the Soviet government persecutes Jewish religious activity, but this seems to have the effect of stimulating religious belief and practice, rather than diminishing it.

"I am not a political leader," he said, "and do not presume to make any predictions concerning the future of Jews in Russia. But I do hope that Russian Jewry will yet resume its former position as one of the leading factors in world Jewry."

Rabbi Henry Travel, of Cincinnati, has been elected rabbi of Temple Beth Emeth, of Wilmington, Del., and will assume his duties there this week. He succeeds the late Rabbi L. A. Mischkind.

SUGGESTS INTERNATIONAL GENDARMERIE WHILE BRIT- AIN RETAINS MANDATE

**English Paper Would Have Britain
Invite European Cooperation in
Administration of Palestine**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 17—European cooperation in the administration of Palestine, while Britain retains the Mandate over the country and the establishment of an international gendarmerie are suggested by the "Church Times."

After discussing the possibility of the Mandate being taken over by France or Italy, or returned to Turkey, which it dismisses as unsatisfactory, the paper declares that no British Government will regard the withdrawal from Palestine as practical politics. "We are there to stay, but there may come a time when it is absolutely impossible to endure the strain." To forestall such an eventuality, it suggests that there be yet one effort for the establishment of European cooperation in the administration of a country with whose peace Europe as a whole is concerned. An efficient gendarmerie is obviously necessary. Why not an international gendarmerie to be composed of subjects of great powers, each power responsible for the payment of its nationals? it asks. Why should not Great Britain, while clearly determined to fulfil its obligations, invite European cooperation in an admittedly difficult task. It may be that this country has bitten off, not perhaps more than it can chew, but more than it can conveniently digest. But the necessary digestion may be stimulated by common sense.

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ABRAHAM CAHAN ARRIVES IN PALESTINE

DIFFICULT FOR BUDAPEST KEHILLAH TO FIND HEAD

Budapest, Sept. 17—The Budapest Kehillah has been without a president since the death of its former head, Aladar Kasab, numerous difficulties having been encountered in selecting his successor.

At first the community could not decide whether to elect a banker or a public worker. When they fixed upon Franz Molnar, noted dramatist, he declined the post, as did Joseph Veszi, editor of the "Pester Lloyd." The Kehillah now wishes to appoint a famous professor of medicine, but has so far been unable to select one who has not left the Jewish faith.

ARABS WILL OFFER PROOF TRANSJORDANIAN TRIBES MARSHALLED FOR AUG. 21

**Agents of Moslem Supreme Council
Continue Inciting Propaganda
in Northern Palestine**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—Further proof that the instigators of the Palestine riots endeavored to draw in the Transjordanian Arabs can be furnished by two prominent Arabs of Jericho, who are prepared to give evidence regarding a great movement of Transjordanian Arabs on August 23, the Friday on which the outbreaks began.

Agents of the Supreme Moslem Council are continuing incitement propaganda in Northern Palestine, including the Huleh district, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here is reliably informed. The natives in the region are tranquil thus far.

The French are maintaining strong patrols on the Palestine-Syrian boundary above Metullah. Persons who have no business reasons for crossing the frontier are prevented from doing so. Altogether 400 French troops are patrolling the frontier from Banias to the Sea of Galilee.

PALESTINE EXPECTS NET MILLION FROM U. S.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 17—The Palestine Emergency Fund with headquarters in New York expects to obtain \$1,000,000 net for transmission for relief here. Advice to this effect were received here today.

The Vaad Leumi, cooperating with the Jewish Agency relief work, has decided not to permit any special appeals, directing all interested in reconstruction work and institutions to apply to the relief committee, with the confidence that immediate relief will be given and a systematic examination of genuine cases forthcoming within the resources available.

The Hebron Yeshiva, where more than forty students were slain, including eight Americans, is being re-established provisionally in Jerusalem under arrangements made by Rabbi Meyer Berlin in behalf of the relief committee under the Jewish Agency.

COMMENTS ON EFFECT OF MARSHALL'S DEATH

London, Sept. 17—The effect of the death of Louis Marshall on world Jewry and on the Jewish Agency is the subject of editorial comment in the "Manchester Guardian."

Marshall's death is a loss to Jewry in Palestine, but is a still greater loss to the general cause of Judaism, the paper writes. The world of Jewry is passing through an anxious time. Marshall's death comes as a serious additional misfortune, for Marshall was the protagonist of the enlarged Jewish Agency, it states.

COLLECTIVIZATION IN JEWISH AGRICULTURAL SETTLEMENTS FAILS; CAUSES FIGHTS

Object to Delivering Bread Reserves to Government

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 17.—A clash between the Jewish peasants termed Kulaks and the Communist Jewish colonists in the Sholom Aleichem colony is reported here. The clash occurred at a meeting when the Communists insisted that the Collective Einheit should deliver its bread reserves to the Government. The opposition was led by Moses Kravetz, former member of the Communist party and now President of the Collective. In the attack on the colonists for its delivery the colonist Hersch Baltakse was injured.

Since the Kulaks are in the majority in the colony, a resolution was adopted against the delivery of the bread to the Government.

Reports of similar resolutions adopted in the colonies, Freiheit, and Veg Tzum Sozialism, in the Kalininordor region, were received.

The decline of Jewish collectivization in Dobroye and Novopoltavke, both old colonies in the Ukraine, is reported. In the spring 83% of the Jewish colonists entered collectives, only 23%, however, remaining.

In White Russia, however, collectivization has increased, with 1,547 collectives on record. These, however, have delivered to the government only five per cent of the amount of bread they are scheduled to deliver.

Conditions in the Ukraine are better inasmuch as the Ukrainian government today agreed to give 30,000 pud seeds to the Agro-Joint; 20,000 pud to the Jewish Colonization; 5,000 to the Opa.

Reports from Crimea state that the Jewish colonists are now refusing to contract their winter crop to the Government, inasmuch as their satisfactory summer harvest enables them to exist until next year without credits.

BAMBERGER GIVES \$1,000,000 TO 236 EMPLOYEES

Newark, N. J., Sept. 17.—Louis Bamberger, retiring head of the Bamberger Department Store, of Newark, yesterday fulfilled the promise made a month ago that he would discharge his personal obligations to the employees of the store who had worked with him for more than 15 years, when he handed out checks in the amount of \$1,019,000.

Two hundred and thirty-six employees benefited by the bounty of Mr. Bamberger, one receiving as much as \$18,000 and several \$10,000. The gifts were fixed, according to term of service, salary and age of recipient, by a firm of actuaries. The presentation was accomplished with the utmost simplicity. To safeguard them from approach of fake stock salesmen, the list of those receiving the gifts was withheld. NIECE BRINGS BALFOUR MESSAGE TO WOMEN'S ZIONIST MEETING

Although Tragedy Immense, It Should Be Turned to Good Account, Balfour Declares

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 17.—Although the tragedy in Palestine was immense, it should be turned to good account, using it for consolidating the Zionist movement, strengthening them in their determination to build up the National Home in Palestine. This message was brought from Lord Balfour by Mrs. Dugdale, his niece, in addressing a meeting of the Federation of Women Zionists of Great Britain and Ireland.

An appeal was made by Viscountess Erleigh, daughter of Lord Melchett, who is honorary treasurer of the women's special effort for the Palestine emergency fund.

Other speakers were Miss Nettie Adler, Mrs. Edith Eder of the Women's International Zionist Organization, and Mrs. Sieff, who presided. A message was read from Miss Henrietta Szold.

Resolutions of grief and indignation at the Palestine events were adopted, as well as a pledge to support the Executive of the Jewish Agency in demanding that the Palestine administration carry out the spirit and letter of the Mandate.

ARAB-JEWISH UNDERSTANDING IMPOSSIBLE UNDER BALFOUR PAPER, ARAB ORGAN SAYS

Balfour and Friends Responsible for Arab and Jewish Blood Already Shed, "Felestin" Charges

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 17.—Commenting on the statement of Dr. Chaim Weizmann that the Jews will seek an Arab-Jewish understanding after receiving indemnity for the losses suffered, the Arab paper "Felestin" declares that an understanding is impossible as long as the Balfour Declaration exists.

"Lord Balfour and his friends are responsible for the blood of Arabs and Jews already shed and that is bound to be shed in the future on the land sacred to Moslems and Christians," the paper declares.

An English edition of the "Felestin" is to appear today. The Arabs are also proposing to publish a book alleging Jewish atrocities against the Arabs.

Haifa, Sept. 17.—A Moslem postal official here was sentenced to six months imprisonment and fined \$50 for circulating a libelous accusation that he saw an Arab porter murdered by Jews.

ARAB CLANS PREPARE FOR HOSTILITIES AMONG SELVES IN CENTRAL ARABIA

Ibn Saud Started to Be Massing 32,000 Troops for Clash

Jerusalem, Sept. 17.—While the British authorities in Palestine are engaged in restoring normal conditions in the country, reliable reports reached here concerning the preparation for grave hostilities in the Arabian desert between the warring Arab clans. Ibn Saud, the Sultan of the Wahabis and ruler of Nejd and Hedjaz, commanding 32,000 troops under the leadership of three generals, and Feisal Dawish, leader of the Akhwan, who mobilized 4,000 rebels, are at the point of clashing.

Official quarters here confirmed the report of new unrest in Central Arabia, but it was added that the anti-Wahabi campaign took an adverse turn in the last ten days.

Reports from less reliable sources describe Wahabi raids on sections of the Howeita and movements of the Bnei Atah tribes, which owe allegiance to Transjordan. According to another report, the Wahabis are marching on Akaba, where a British officer was despatched to investigate the situation.

London, Sept. 17.—Sheik Hafez Wahba, counsellor of Ibn Saud, who is now in London, declared in a press interview that he is not surprised at the reports that Ibn Saud is massing 30,000 troops in order to attack the rebel Feisal El Dawish. Ibn Saud has always been determined to suppress this rebel and as fighting is difficult during the summer months, owing to the heat and lack of water, "it is natural that operations should now be attempted," he said.

Feisal El Dawish, East Arabian rebel chief, is the Wahabi leader who organized the raids into Iraq in 1927 and 1928.

The correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph" declares without foundation the reports of a great concentration of Arabs in Ibn Saud's territory, with the intention of marching into Transjordan and Palestine. Air patrols failed to discover a hostile movement, the correspondent declares.

URGES CHRISTIANS BRING ABOUT PEACE IN PALESTINE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Sept. 17.—Describing himself as a direct descendant of King Solomon and representative of the only Christian nation in Africa, Lidj Andargue Massai of Abyssinia made a plea before the League of Nations Assembly for Christian peoples to unite to bring peace to Palestine.

Christian residents of Palestine took sides in the Arab-Jewish question, instead of acting as peacemakers, he said. He urged Christians to do everything in their power to bring about an amicable settlement.

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the responsibilities will grow less burdensome and the work of civilization and direction less exacting, and finally completed.

Discussing the possibility of giving up the Mandate, it writes: If Britain through its representatives at Geneva would declare itself no longer able to keep order in Palestine, there would be a mighty wrangle as to whom the overlord should be. France is the recognized protector of Latin Christians in the Near East and might be acceptable to the Vatican, but certainly unacceptable to Mussolini. The great majority of the Latin monks in Palestine are Italian Franciscans. The Latin Patriarch is an Italian prelate. It has frequently suggested that Palestine is an admirable country for Italian colonists. But neither France nor Italy is acceptable to the Greek Orthodox nor to the Zionists, even if either power should be willing to pledge itself to the policy of establishing the Jewish national home.

The Zionists would bitterly resent the immigration of Italians. Indeed the return to the Turks is perhaps the only practical alternative to the British Administration, but no British government can regard withdrawal as British politics. We are there to stay.

Moslems Allowed Too Much, "British Weekly" Asserts

London, Sept. 17.—The recent events in Palestine and the future policy to be pursued, continue to be the subject of discussion in the British press.

There has been a little slackness along the lines of allowing too much to the Moslems, says the "British Weekly." Perhaps the best solution would be for Britain to make Palestine a crown colony.

Concerning the Holy Sites, it says, when peace is restored, an effort should be made to nationalize the genuine Holy Sites in which people of various faiths have equal historical interests. The thinking Jew would gladly see Isaiah's old prophecy fulfilled and the Temple Court become "a House of Prayer for all nations."

Writing in the "New Leader," Frank Hancock declares: "We have inherited from the Tory administration an aggravated Palestine problem. Under the old diplomatic rule of divide and conquer we connived, perhaps, to encourage a continuous feud between the Arabs. One wonders whether the administration is altogether dissatisfied with the turn affairs have taken. Already the Liberal and Tory journals are crying for a strong permanent garrison. Has disorder been encouraged, or at any rate not discouraged, in order to supply us with the pretext for a firm hand in the Near East?" the writer asks.

The name of the late Brigadier General Sir Gilbert Clayton, High Commissioner of Iraq and former Chief Secretary of Palestine, was freely

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some places where the troops were stationed, distress arising from the disturbances made it difficult for the inhabitants to extend to them the degree of hospitality they would have liked to offer in expression of appreciation and gratitude.

"The Zionist Executive and the Vaad Leumi regret that many members of the British naval, military and air forces saw Palestine for the first time under such tragic circumstances and hope they will be able to visit the country again under happier conditions and witness the progress of the Jewish work, settlement and social development. At the same time it is desired to record the appreciation felt by the responsible bodies for transmission to many British citizens who voluntarily enrolled themselves as special constables, being engaged night after night in helping to afford protection to the inhabitants," the statement declared.

A number of English papers carry the following obviously inspired notice to the effect that: "The Colonial Office is surprised that Lord Passfield's statement should be considered 'strange.' It is perfectly innocuous and contains nothing which the British public does not know by heart."

One official said there is little doubt the interview was given in the hope of enlightening Zionist opinion in the United States. It is not often realized how many Jews there are in the United States. Of every three New Yorkers, one is a Jew. The statement consists of nothing but contradictions of a few extraordinary notions which have been seized upon by the American Zionists.

The campaign urging Britain to abandon the Mandate for Palestine is continued in today's issue of the "Daily Mail," as well as in a number of provincial papers.

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SAFED PERPETRATORS CONCENTRATE IN TIBERIAS; CONTINUE AGITATION

Jerusalem, Sept. 17.—Anxiety is growing in Jerusalem over proclamations issued under the direction of Arab public prosecutors in Haifa and elsewhere. Of the 51 Jews arrested in Haifa, 4 are charged with premeditated or attempted murder and bail was refused. Anyone holding firearms is automatically charged with murder, the legal authorities not differentiating between a person possessing arms for purposes of attack or defense. In Jerusalem 8 were arrested; 2 tried were given light sentences, but in Tel Aviv there are 22 prisoners including 2 charged with murder. Women and 3 children are among the 15 persons arrested in a house where 2 rifles were found.

Three Yemenites were arrested while guarding Rehoboth.

KANSAS CITY JEWS AND NON-JEWS JOIN IN PROTEST

Kansas City, Sept. 17.—Representatives of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant faiths joined last night in a united protest against the atrocities committed against the Jews by the Arabs in Palestine. A capacity audience, composed of Jews and non-Jews at Ivanhoe Temple, heard the arrangements of Rabbi Solomon Goldman of Chicago, Dr. Persell, representing the Catholic Bishop, and Dr. Deer of the Council of Protestant Churches, Dr. Rabelsky, Rabbi G. Hadas, Rabbi Mayerberg and Rabbi Mayer. Dr. Abi Miller presided. Three thousand dollars for the Palestine Emergency Fund was raised. A campaign for additional funds for the victims is now under way under the chairmanship of E. S. Michelson.

London, Sept. 17.—"The revolt of the Arabs against Zionism is in reality a revolt against economic and political serfdom, to which they have been reduced by British imperialism in Palestine." This statement was made by the Communist League Against Imperialism in a manifesto it issued. J. Maxton, M. P., is president of the League.

"The lackeys of imperialism, the Zionists, received the whole-hearted support of the social democratic parties, the Second International and especially members of the British Labor Party. The Zionists have been the most bitter enemies of the Arab national revolutionary movement," the manifesto declares.

The League has been denounced by the International Federation of Trade Unions as a Communist agency and its finances are believed to be derived from the Communist International.

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
