Rosenwald Establishes \$500,000 Endowment Fund in Marshall's Memory

The steamer "Leviathan," which arrives today, will bring the body of the late Louis Marshall who died in Zurich. James Marshall, his son, is accompanying the body.

Funeral services will take place at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning from Temple Emanu-El, 5th Avenue and 65th Street, where the body will be taken. Interment will be at Salem Fields.

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LEONID SALKIND DIES; REVOLUTIONARY LEADER

Moscow, Sept. 21—Leonid Salkind, aged revolutionary leader, who worked in Kiev and Mohilev in 1880 for the Russian People's Liberty Party, died of the gripple. He was exiled to Siberia by the Czar. In late years he had devoted himself to scientific and political research.

ITALIAN JEWRY MOVED BY PALESTINE EVENTS

Milan, Sept. 21—Dr. Prato, Chief Rabbi of Alexandria, was received by Premier Mussolini before his departure from Italy. The Rabbi discussed with the Premier the situation of Italian and Oriental Jews and was thanked for his work in Alexandria.

Italian Jewry was deeply moved by the Palestine events. Synagogues in every town held special services. Three thousand pounds was subscribed for relief of the victims.

SURVEY AS NORMAL LIFE RE-NEWED SHOWS TEL AVIV AND JUDEA COLONIES UNHARMED

No Jewish Settlement in Valley of Jezreel or Jordan Valley Destroyed or Burned

Jerusalem, Sept. 21—With the streets of the cities gradually assuming a normal aspect, the cinemas reopened, people going about as usual until nine or ten o'clock in the evening and motor traffic between the principal centers practically normal, it is possible to survey the scene and say what went unharmful during the recent disaster.

Tel Aviv was never actually attacked, not a single house was damaged. Most of the inhabitants in the threatened quarters have returned to their homes.

In the orange groves in Judea and Sharon not a single tree was cut down in all the colonies. With the exception of Hulda and Ekron, which suffered partial damages, the colonies were unharmed. The Ekronites are returning home. The orphans' village, Ben Shemen, was undamaged. The children, after spending a week in Tel Aviv, returned to the village.

Contrary to previous reports, no Jewish settlement in the Valley of Jezreel or the Jordan Valley was destroyed or burned. Ruttenberg's power houses are working normally. The damage caused to Rosh Pinah and other Upper Galilean colonies was not severe. Resod Hamalah and Mishmar Hayarden near the Syrian frontier, which were raided, looted and evacuated, were subsequently reoccupied. No machinery of the Novomejsky plant at the Dead Sea was damaged and the workers have returned to their posts.

Most of the refugees are reoccupying their homes in the evacuated parts of Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, the Sharon Plain, as well as at Acre and Hittin, and Mitzpah near Tiberias.

Gud Ha'avodah, the settlement of the labor battalion on the outskirts of Jerusalem near Talpioth, returned after losing one man and about 45,000 worth of property. Eleven houses were completely looted and one house was burned. Talpioth, which was evacuated, is gradually being reoccupied.

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TYPHUS IN WHITE RUSSIA CLAIMS JEWISH VICTIMS

Moscow, Sept. 21—Typhus has broken out in White Russia, especially in the regions of Minsk, Borisov and Lohuisik. The average number of victims daily is sixteen, the majority of them being Jewish. The Minsk regional Soviet is undertaking extraordinary measures to conquer the disease. Extra medical help has been mobilized.

ROUMANIA PLEDGES STERN MEASURES TO HALT NEW ANTI-SEMITIC ATTACKS

Students Returning from Conventio Again Perpetrators

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Sept. 21—A delegation representing the Jewish Deputies Club in the Roumanian parliament called on the Ministry of the Interior, asking the government to take immediate measures to stop the new wave of anti-Semitic excesses that have broken out, the perpetrators being mainly students returning from their convention.

The Vice-Minister of the Interior, Jean Itescu, assured the delegation that the government has taken strong measures to prevent the spread of the excesses and to punish those guilty.

The excesses occurred during the last few days along the border of Bukovina up to the interior of the Old Kingdom, when a group of Roumanian students on the Bucharest-Czernowitz railroad, threw Jewish passengers out of the train and attacked Jewish homes at the stations where the train stopped. The excesses occurred at the stations Radautz, Dornesti, up to Pascani. A Roumanian professor who attempted to protect the Jewish passengers was beaten.

The Czernowitz newspapers published the full names and addresses of the Jewish passengers who were injured and robbed. The list includes the names of women and children.

The newspaper "Adevurul" reports that excesses occurred at the Bucharest railway station. It urges the government to take measures.

ORDER BRITISH WARSHIPS TO CALL AT PALESTINE PORTS

Jerusalem, Sept. 21—Re-embarkation from Palestine of the landing parties from the British warships has been made, followed by changes in the distribution of the vessels in the Mediterranean fleet.

Arrangements have been made for periodical visits of the ships to Palestine waters. The aircraft carrier "Courageous" will call at Haifa on September 26 and at Jaffa on the 27th. One ship of the third cruiser squadron will visit both ports on September 30. According to the original program of the cruise, the battleship "Barham" is to be off Jaffa from October 1 to 8, in addition to the battleship "Manaya" going to Jaffa on October 17.

BRITISH GOV'T MEMBERS ENROUTE TO PALESTINE

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MOSLEMS IN LONDON DENOUNCE BALFOUR PAPER AND MANDATE

Chairman Says Meeting Not Anti-Semitic; Cites Jewish Contributors
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 21—Jaffar Pasha, Iraq Minister in London, in commenting on the announcement in Bagdad of Great Britain's willingness to recommend Iraq for membership in the League, declared:

"Iraq was in steadfast opposition to the Mandate and wanted to replace a friendship treaty with Great Britain, leaving Iraq free to develop her own resources and particularly her own defense."

London, Sept. 21—Sixty persons attended a meeting held under the auspices of the International Moslem Federation which denounced the Iraq, Syrian and Palestine Mandates. The meeting condemned the Balfour Declaration and the Zionists as "controlling international capitalism."

Mahammed Ali Khan, secretary of the British section, read a letter sent to Lord Balfour, blaming him for not withdrawing the Declaration which, they stated, was the original cause of the massacre by the Moslems. The Federation will decide whether the only alternative of the Moslems is to ally themselves with Communism. The responsibility rests with Lord Balfour, he said.

Lord Balfour acknowledged the letter but made no comment.

A voice from the hall called out: "The Palestine Jews are the scum of the European ghetto." J. Howell, chairman of the meeting, a Socialist, replied that the meeting was not anti-Semitic. The Jews enriched the world in the realm of literature and philosophy, he declared.

RUSSIAN JEWRY GRIEVES OVER MARSHALL'S DEATH; "EMES" ATTACKS HIM

**European Jewry Mourns Passing;
Memorial Meetings Held**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 21—While the Jews in Soviet Russia grieved over the death of Louis Marshall, the Yiddish Communist daily, "Emes," devoted a long article in which the late leader was attacked.

"The Jewish reactionaries lost one of its most interesting and energetic figures," writes the "Emes." "Louis Marshall understood how to lead astray the Jewish workers from their class path. His philanthropic methods served well to demoralize the Jewish labor movement, being assisted in this by the New York 'Forward'."

The "Emes" enumerates Mr. Marshall's activities, with the exception of Russia, concluding with the Jewish Agency which, the "Emes" states, "Mr. Marshall organized for the purpose of combining Zionism with dollar imperialism with the ultimate outlook of getting Palestine for the United States."

The death of Louis Marshall came as a shock to Russian Jewry and inquiries poured into the Jewish Telegraphic Agency office from nationalist, Orthodox and Communist leaders. The fear was expressed that the interests of the Jews in Russia may suffer due to his death and because of the concentration on Palestine relief. Memorial services were arranged by the Moscow Kehillah and in the Jewish colonies.

Berlin, Sept. 21—Following a joint meeting of the German section of the Jewish Agency Council and of the praesidium of the German Keren Hayesod under the chairmanship of Oscar Wasserman, the following message of condolence was despatched to James Marshall, Louis Marshall's son. "We admired the outstanding Jewish leader who was the first chairman of the Jewish Agency Council. Since it was not given to him to lead the Jewish Agency to its goal, you endeavor to carry out your father's task to continue the peaceful reconstruction work in amity between Jews and Arabs."

Vienna, Sept. 21—A memorial meeting to honor the memory of Louis Marshall was held here under the auspices of the Zionist Federation. Dr. Gelber delivered an address on the late leader's work.

At a meeting of the radical Zionists here the memory of Mr. Marshall was honored. Mr. Plaschkes delivered an address.

Warsaw, Sept. 21—Memorial meetings for the late Louis Marshall were held by the Executive Committee of the Warsaw Kehillah and by boards of various Jewish institutions here. Messages of condolence were despatched to the family. The Jewish press devoted much space to a description of the late leader's life and to eulogies for him.

OXFORD STUDENTS WHO DE- FENDED JERUSALEM JEWS RETURN TO LONDON

**Jewish Students Arrange Reception in
Their Honor**

London, Sept. 21—The Oxford students who defended the Jews in the Arab attacks in Jerusalem arrived in London from Palestine today in charge of the Rev. Graham Brown, principal of Wycliffe Hall. All wore sun helmets and carried rucksacks. They looked bronzed and fit and seemed none the worse for the trying time they went through in Jerusalem. The students were reluctant to recount their experiences.

The father of one of the students, who met them at the boat, said that the Jewish community of Tel Aviv had presented each with a special memento. "My son appreciates greatly the treatment accorded the party by the Palestine Jewish communities. The memento will ever be a treasured possession."

The students are all young men studying for the ministry. The oldest is 25. They were pleased at having enrolled in the police force and aided in restoring order in Jerusalem. On their return they all attended divine services to offer thanksgiving for their safe arrival. Jewish university students in London are arranging a reception in honor of them.

SEE COMMUNIST HAND IN PALESTINE RIOTS

London, Sept. 21—That the Communists had a share in the recent Palestine disturbances is the conviction of the authorities, according to the Jerusalem correspondent of the London "Morning Post." A raid was carried out in Haifa, resulting in the arrest of a number of Communists, the correspondent reports. It is recalled that the Communists have a means of playing on the fanaticism of the Arabs through their consulate at Jeddah. Palestine Arabs making the pilgrimage to Mecca, come under the influence of the Soviet consul and return to Palestine incited to excesses.

Peace in Palestine is more apparent than real, states the correspondent. Precautions still deemed necessary for public security suggest that the confidence of the authorities in restored order is unfounded. It is still illegal to carry any weapon, even a stick, which in the police officer's opinion might be used for disturbance. The officers are made the arbiters of the effect of a song or gesture and are given authority to arrest offenders without warning. Assemblies are still prohibited.

MACCABEAN HEROISM

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Jerusalem, Sept. 20.—Evidence of the supreme heroism of the Jewish pioneers in holding out against overwhelming odds is coming to light through a dozen official and private investigations, the eye witness accounts evoking unbounded admiration from the British officers and soldiers who, themselves, are veterans of the most sanguinary battles of the World War. As the patrols belonging to the Welsh Guards, the famous Green Howards Regiment, penetrate the evacuated Jewish villages, they become familiar with episodes of magnificent endurance and can find no other words but "Incredible!" "Unbelievable!" to express their astonishment.

The officer in charge of the Hebron area for pacification and "mopping up" operations declared cryptically, "The spirit of Judas Maccabee still goes on," when eye witnesses, Arab and Jewish, described the lone fight of a twelve-year-old Jewish boy in defending himself on the roof of a house, his sole weapon an iron bar, against eight frenzied Arabs wielding razor-edged Damascus swords, holding them at bay a solid hour until finally falling wounded in a dozen places. There are other instances of the calloused veterans of the Mons retreat and the Somme battles growing aghast at the ruthless slaughter of innocents and inoffensive old people, who were butchered in a heartless fashion after undergoing refined tortures surpassing the horrors of the Inquisition.

The consensus of opinion among the investigators is that the Hebron massacre found no parallel in history except the Sicilian Spers and the Petlura pogroms in the Ukraine.

It is now well established from the various investigators proceeding independently that the Hebron governor, an Arab, disarmed the police a few hours before the massacre, restoring arms only after corpses choked the Jewish houses and blood streamed in torrents. The police, when solely equipped with light batons, were incapable and unwilling to confront the horde of 3,000 Arabs who had worked themselves into a frenzy of religious fanaticism with the electric shout, "Allah is Allah. Death to the Jews." The Jews in this town were wholly unprepared. They had discounted the rumors of a coming uprising, not believing that the Arab neighbors with whom they had lived in peace and amity for many years, whose sick were treated in the Jewish clinics, whose poor and distressed were alleviated with Jewish charity, whose children played with their own children, could resort to violence. A ghastly deception followed. Arabs stormed their homes the moment the Jews were preparing to go to the synagogue and were at prayer. The infuriated mob raged for hours in unbridled savagery. Little children were slaughtered, the oldest unspared. The only people who es-

caped this Hebraic Bartholomew, according to personal accounts given me by refugees in Jerusalem, were those who were covered by the falling corpses. In one house where Jews had congregated forty were slain. Arabs battered the doors and windows, finally breaking in. What took place inside nobody will ever know exactly, but from the chaos of corpses, the wounded, demented people who were found afterwards, it was an inferno of bestiality and bloodthirst. One Yeshiva student who came through the horror, Ralph de Cohen of 7230 Sheridan Road, Chicago, declared he had seen greater horrors than Dante in hell.

After the preliminary riots on Friday night, resulting in wounding one Jew, Rabbi Slonim went to the police to ask for protection. He was roughly told to mind his own business, says de Cohen. The next day, when the massacre was at its height, Jewish boys ran to the mounted police, clung around the necks of the horses, imploring to be taken away. The Arab troopers pushed them off and galloped away, leaving them to the mercy of the savage mob. The blood orgy did not abate until the governor re-armed the police. Then a few shots scattered the entire mob. Attacks on the houses thereafter were not repeated.

COLONEL AMERY STATES VIEWS ON SITUATION IN PALESTINE

Says Difficulties Will Be Cleared up;
Possible for Jews and Arabs
to Live Amicably

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Toronto, Sept. 21.—The Rt. Hon. Leopold H. Amery, Secretary of State in the Baldwin cabinet, who is now on a visit to Canada, addressed the Empire and Canadian Clubs here yesterday on Great Britain's work in the Middle East. Speaking of Palestine, the former cabinet member declared:

"Palestine presents a difficult problem. We have obliged ourselves to assist the Jews to develop the land and make of it their home, at the same time without prejudice to the Arabs. We intend to stand by the Balfour Declaration. The recent uprisings in Palestine are most regrettable, revolving about the Wailing Wall. There will naturally be an inquiry about the persons responsible for the outbreaks and the tragic murders of innocent people will be punished."

The difference must eventually be cleared up and there is reason to believe that both Jew and Arab will live amicably there. Religious outbreaks of this nature in the East should not make us pessimists. The religious ardor of the Eastern peoples is extremely warm and it does not require much to set their passions aflame, with consequent revolts and bloodshed," he declared.

PALESTINE JEWS GATHER STRENGTH TO GO FORWARD ONCE MORE, SAYS COL. KISCH

Desires Relief Work and Plans for
Future Reconstruction
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 21.—"Traveling through the country one has a feeling that Palestine Jews are standing with their back to the wall, while gathering strength to go forward once more," declared Col. Frederick H. Kisch, member of the Executive of the Jewish Agency, in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative here. "The wall is founded on confidence in our cause and built up with the support forthcoming from throughout the world."

"Even to one who went through the war as a combatant officer, the house at Hebron, where A. D. Slonim and his wife were murdered, with 19 students of the Yeshiva, is an appalling sight. It is perfectly clear that at Hebron, Safed, Motza, Jerusalem and everywhere that rioting occurred, the Arabs taking part behaved like savages untouched by the hand of civilization. It has been repeatedly brought home to me that many of them really believed the stories maliciously circulated about the Jews attacking the mosques. I put the greatest share of responsibility upon those responsible for circulating the stories and on the authorities for allowing them to be circulated without an official denial until after the disaster they provoked."

"Immediately after the first blow had fallen upon the Yishub, Palestine Jews, within their own limited resources, provided the first needs for relief, splendidly helped by Hadassah. Followed generous help from America and elsewhere. We all greatly appreciate the fact that the initiative was taken by the American Zionists, who called on David A. Brown to head the Palestine Emergency Fund, and in England, where the president of the Jewish Board of Deputies, O. E. D'Avigdor Goldsmid, and Simon Marks cooperated with the Zionists without waiting for an appeal from Jerusalem."

"The High Commission from the first took a strong line in regard to the duties of the government in meeting the relief needs, but there was an inevitable delay before the necessary sanction was obtained. In the meantime, our relief organization got working, mainly helping with money which came from abroad. The government is now feeding the refugees, but there is remaining a great variety of relief needs, involving calls upon our funds, since foodstuffs alone cannot enable the victims to recuperate. We are anxious to avoid anything resembling pauperization, and plans are being made in order to set them on their feet again for useful and constructive lives, with such happiness as the sympathetic handling of their distress can give." Col. Kisch declared.

Mekor Chaim, another Jerusalem suburb, was fired.

In Motza a few houses were burned, including the one where the Makleff family was murdered and burned. All the other houses were looted. All buildings were destroyed or burned at Hulda. The settlers have not yet returned there. In addition to the school house at Hartuv being burned, several houses were looted. The inhabitants have not returned.

Kastania, an isolated point in the south, was severely damaged. The huts of the girls farm on the outskirts of Haifa were burned. Shops and houses in the Jewish quarter of Haifa were looted, while a large estate on the Haifa Bay was burned and plundered. The damage here alone amounts to more than \$15,000. In the following colonies in the Valley of Jezreel the granaries were wantonly fired: Beth Alpha, Mishmar Ha'emek, Jeddah, Nachlath Jacob and Geva, while many head of cattle were stolen from the colony Mescha.

The damage to Beisan, Safed and Hebron is already known.

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left with a dependent family of five, will have to be treated in a more personal manner.

"The Executive entrusted Rabbi Meyer Berlin with the task of conducting the relief and reconstruction work in cooperation with the Vaad Leumi and special committees under the general direction of the Executive.

"Submission of claims for compensation is proceeding with legal assistance organized by the Executive. The government attitude is sympathetic and helpful.

"All are anxious to see the Hebron Yeshiva restored to life and work with the least possible delay," he continued. "The first steps toward this restoration have already been taken. We are trying as much as we can to get back to normal conditions of life. It is important that the regular Zionist work, such as colonization, shall proceed and the development of projects independent of the recent destruction shall also go ahead.

"It is gratifying that within the last fortnight about 250 immigrants entered the country, and 930 are due in the next few weeks on the present schedule. In addition, the reconstruction needs and new opportunities for Jewish labor in the colonies and public works will enable us to submit a fresh labor schedule now under urgent preparation. Although the final distribution of the Executive portfolios

scores of Jews were slaughtered, will go down in Jewish history as the equivalent of the Black Hole of Calcutta. The Yeshiva student, Benjamin Sokolovsky, who, hidden across the street observed the raid, heard the blood-curdling cries of the Arab fiends as they hurled themselves on the cowering, indeliberate old people. For hours terrifying screams, hardly human, emanated from the house. Then the Arabs emerged, wiping blood and sweat from their faces, saying: "Finished! No more Jews." From the house came piteous moaning, prayers trembling with sobs. Then silence.

If 300 Jews were saved, they owed their lives to the few Arab Hebronites who observed the ancient Moslem principle, Dahili, meaning: "Kill me first before touching anyone who sought shelter in my home."

Hebron, Sept. 20—Although your correspondent thought himself inured to the sight of bloodshed and horrors, after witnessing the bloodiest fighting at Ypres and the holocaust at Verdun, he was shocked to nausea this morning when he walked about the rooms of Rabbi Slonim's home in Hebron remembering those of a slaughter house, an indescribable confusion of blood-soaked clothing and smashed furniture. Evidence of unspeakable brutality was rendered irrefutable when, under the eiderdown feathers, a complete human stomach was found in an advanced state of putrefaction. Even the ten foot high ceiling was splashed with blood. Of unlooted articles, not a single item was left intact. Clocks, crockery, tables, and windows were smashed to smithereens. Rosenwald Gives \$500,000 to Theological Seminary

An endowment to be known as the Louis Marshall Memorial Fund will be established at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America through the gift of \$500,000 by Julius Rosenwald, Chicago philanthropist.

The Board of Directors of the Seminary voted to accept the gift, Dr. Cyrus Adler, president, announced at a meeting held Friday at the office of Felix M. Warburg.

Mr. Rosenwald, who previously gave small gifts totalling \$5,000 to the Seminary, stated he was moved to make the gift by a letter the late Mr. Marshall wrote shortly before his death expressing great interest in the Seminary and Jewish education in general.

The meeting adopted a resolution of sorrow at the death of Mr. Marshall, who was a director of the Seminary since 1901 and chairman of the board of directors since 1905. He was elected president of the board of the Library Corporation in 1924. Tribute was paid in the resolution to "his distinguished career as an advocate, as a citizen of his native state and of the United States, his services on behalf of industrial peace, his defense of the Jewish cause at home and abroad, his ardent labors in Paris before the peace conference in 1919, his painstaking and earnest endeavors on behalf of Palestine, culminating in the creation of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, his passion for justice and his defense of the rights of men wherever assailed."

Dr. Adler, Sol M. Strock and Israel Unterberg were designated to represent the Seminary in a guard of honor which is to meet the "Leviathan," on which Mr. Marshall's body is being brought from Switzerland.

The Roumanian newspaper "Dimineata" reports that followers of Alexander Cuza are spreading ritual murder propaganda, disseminating brochures containing illustrations which purport to depict how Jews slaughtered a Christian girl for ritual uses.

Deputy Meyer Ebner of Czernowitz telegraphed to the Minister of the Interior asking for immediate steps. Chief Rabbi Niemcewicz personally intervened with Vice-Minister Itzeson.

The Roumanian press reports that the students who attacked the Jewish passengers on the Bucharest-Czernowitz train did not spare two-year-old children. They tortured the passengers with untold cruelty, inflicting burns with their cigarettes. Leading among the perpetrators, the reports say, was a baptized Jewish student, Botetzat from Petronamtze.
