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SCREEN, BENCHES, STOOLS TO BE BARRED AT WAILING WALL DURING HOLIDAYS

Jews Agree to Limitations Pending
Settlement of Wall Status

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 28.—In view of the approaching High Holidays, the Jerusalem authorities are making a careful inventory of appurtenances at the Wailing Wall strictly required for religious services, with the intention of not allowing any other objects, such as a screen separating men and women worshippers, matting, stools or benches. The "Kiyor," ritual wash stand, a small Aron, Kodesh Ark containing the Holy Scrolls, and a small table for reading the Torah will be permitted.

It is understood Jewish leaders have agreed to the limitations, pending the settlement of the question as to what constitutes the status quo, making only the condition that all traffic be stopped during the services.

SCHOBER REASSURES

JEWS POPULACE

Vienna, Sept. 28.—Although a special statement by the new Prime Minister, Schober, on matters affecting the Jewish population in Austria, is expected within a few days, Jewish leaders expressed satisfaction with the official statement made by him before parliament.

PALESTINE EVENTS UNITE

EGYPTIAN JEWS, LONG SPLIT

Cairo, Sept. 28.—Egyptian Jewry, continuously split on internal matters, and which previously has not participated in the Palestine upbuilding work, was brought together by the tragedy in Palestine.

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BRITISH CORRESPONDENT FASTENS RIOT GUILT ON PALESTINE ADMINISTRATION

Urges Clean Sweep: Peace in Palestine Only as Long as British
Are There, Says Abdullah

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 28.—"There is the need for a clean sweep in Palestine," declares the Jerusalem correspondent of the London "Daily Express" in a despatch today. "The Palestine crisis is for the moment ended, but one step must be taken without undue delay, a wholesale sweep in the administration which in the face of the gravest and most persistent warnings given daily for weeks in advance of the fateful outbreak, sat back complacently and did little more than nothing. It is felt equally by the Jews and Arabs of Palestine that at the time when there was an obvious imminence of danger, the British government and the Palestine government bore the full responsibility of maintaining order. This responsibility was neglected. Facts concerning this failure were revealed to the correspondent by prominent leaders, Zionists and Moslems alike.

"It is unknown in Great Britain that days immediately preceding the bloody Friday, Zionist leaders in Jerusalem went almost on bended knees to the government, imploring them to take necessary measures for safeguarding life and property. On August 7, the Zionist Executive cabled to London, for the information of the Colonial Office, that 'serious events could not be long deferred.' On August 16, after a consultation with Mr. Luke, the Palestine Zionist Executive cabled to the Zionist bureau in London: 'We are most seriously anxious about future events.'"

ORPHANED IN RECENT PALESTINE OUTBREAK

23 Widows; \$18,000 Needed Until
Youngest Child Can Become
Self-Supporting

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 28.—Sixty Jewish children were orphaned in the recent disaster, according to an estimate furnished by Miss Sophia Berger Mohl, who has undertaken the care of the orphans in behalf of the relief committee of the Zionist Executive. Only children of fifteen or under are included in this number, of whom 43 are fatherless and 17 full orphans. There are 23 widows.

In Hebron alone there are 29 orphans, 13 in Safed, 11 in Jerusalem, 4 in Beertuvia and 3 in Tel Aviv.

Without exception the widowed mothers wish to keep their children, some not asking support for themselves or the children other than the

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CHARRED REMAINS OF ANOTHER VICTIM OF ARAB MASSACRE DISCOVERED

Vaad Leumi Cautions Jews Against
Participating in Boycott Propaganda

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 28.—A burned body, believed to be that of Mr. Herzenstein, of the Jewish colony Ain Zaitiim, near Safed, was exhumed from a hurriedly dug grave found by the police, and the charred remains transferred to the Safed Health Department. Thirty Arabs of the neighborhood, now under arrest charged with premeditated murder, will have to answer for Herzenstein's death, in addition to that of others slain.

Another member of the colony, Mr. Pincus, succeeded with Herzenstein in evading the attackers when the infuriated Arab mob descended on the colony on August 29. They subsequently hid for thirty-six hours in the caves of the Galilean hills, without food or water. Herzenstein, whom Pincus saw shot, disappeared. Yesterday an Arab from a neighboring village told the Safed police he remembers having seen a man near the burning threshing floor on that fatal day. The police instituted a search and found in a hurriedly dug grave a skeleton, a few garments and some personal belongings which are believed to have been the property of the missing man.

A government commission visited Artouf, where the colonists' estimate of the damages they suffered amounts to \$30,000.

An Arab of Haifa, who confessed that he took part in the looting, was sentenced to four years imprisonment at hard labor. His house was found to be full of stolen articles.

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FIRE IN TEL AVIV FACTORY CAUSES \$15,000 DAMAGE

Tel Aviv, Sept. 28.—What was said to be the largest fire to have visited the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv, swept the weaving department of the Lodzia factory last night, causing damage estimated at \$15,000. A spark from an electric motor was described as the cause.

Fire fighters were forced to give up the attempt to extinguish the flames. They succeeded in saving the stocking factory and stockrooms near the burning building. The flames were visible from all parts of the city.

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EMERGENCY FUND
NEARS \$2,000,000 MARK

With the approach of the High Holy Days, the Palestine Emergency Fund is expected to pass well over the \$2,000,000 mark by Yom Kippur.

The total is well over the \$1,700,000 mark, Mr. Brown pointed out. It will not be difficult, he believes, to complete the second million, in view of the special High Holiday appeals which will be made in synagogues and temples.

In all a total of 1,328 communities have made some contributions to the fund. The totals as made public this week were as follows: Greater New York, \$596,950 and \$110,884 from 122 cities and towns in the rest of the state. Pennsylvania is next with \$89,494 from Philadelphia and \$14,489 from the rest of the state. Ninety-eight communities in New Jersey have contributed \$95,039, including \$5,778 from Jersey City, \$13,125 from Paterson, and \$27,840 from Newark.

Illinois ranks next. Including Chicago, which in addition to Mr. Rosenwald's gift of \$25,000 has given \$68,700, there has been received from 63 communities in that state \$78,989. Connecticut comes next with \$41,292 from 40 communities, toward which Hartford gave \$8,805 and New Haven \$7,787. California's contribution is \$32,795, of which Los Angeles gave \$15,796.

COURT DISMISSES APPEAL
ON CLEVELAND CENTER CASE

Cleveland, Sept. 28.—The court of Appeals here today pronounced as a strictly ecclesiastical question the four-year court controversy between Orthodox and Conservative groups of the Cleveland Jewish Center and dismissed the suit of the Center's Orthodox minority group which sought the court's aid to re-establish Orthodox Judaism in the Center.

Appellate Judge John J. Sullivan, who wrote the opinion, was unanimously affirmed by his two associates.

JACOB LANDAU, J. T. A.
MANAGING DIRECTOR,
RETURNS TO NEW YORK

Describes Organization of News Service for Palestine; Improvement of J. T. A. System

Jacob Landau, Managing Director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, returned to New York following a prolonged stay in Europe and in Palestine.

"The main purpose of my trip was the organization of a news service for Palestine," Mr. Landau stated on his return. "By the agreement I succeeded in concluding with Reuter's News Agency, the Palestine Telegraphic Agency, the Palestine Telegraphic Agency was given the representation of Reuter's for Palestine and thus became an important link in the chain of the large news gathering system of the world. The Palestine Telegraphic Agency functions as a general news service, not being limited to Jewish news and it has been placed in a position of serving the press of Palestine in a comprehensive manner by putting at its disposal the world-wide news gathering facilities of the famous Reuter agency, for which more than 4,000 journalists all over the world are working. Friendly relations between the Jews and Arabs of Palestine are dependent in a large measure on the spirit of the press and the character of the reports its publishes.

"With the spread of education among the Arabs, the Arabic press now small and undeveloped, will become a greater factor in shaping the public opinion of Palestine and the neighboring countries and the service of the Palestine Telegraphic Agency as a general news agency will become increasingly important in this connection.

"Under the arrangement, Reuter's is to be supplied with Palestine news by the Palestine Telegraphic Agency. The usefulness of this arrangement was demonstrated during the recent tragic occurrences in Palestine. Not only the American press, but the European press as well was promptly supplied, due to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, with an unbiased version of the events. The close connection which exists between Reuter's, Havas, Stephani, Wolf's and other news agencies of the world, in addition to the arrangement between the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the Associated Press in operation for many years, was instrumental in securing a world-wide distribution for the reports emanating from Palestine."

The establishment of an Arabic paper in Palestine and the organization of the Mid-Eastern News Agency covering the neighboring countries were declared by Mr. Landau to be the most important tasks of the immediate future. The Arab world is ignorant of the real aims of the Zionists. Unscrupulous agitators are permitted to poison the Arab mind against the Jews. A daily Arab newspaper and a properly organized news service for and from Bagdad, Cairo, and Beyruth, would enable the Jewish community to

create a better understanding with the Arab nation, Mr. Landau stated.

On his return trip from Palestine, Mr. Landau made a study of Jewish conditions in Roumania and other Balkan countries. The Roumanian government sent a telegraphic invitation to Mr. Landau to visit the country. Prime Minister Maniu, Mr. Buzdugan, member of the Regency Council, Prime Minister Liapchev, and King Boris of Bulgaria, Mr. Marinkovitch, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Yugoslavia and Prime Minister Mussolini received Mr. Landau. In their statements to him, they surveyed the most important Jewish problems of their countries. "The question as to whether the Jews are to be considered a national minority or a religious community, is the main problem in all the newly created countries and affects the relationship between the Jewish population and the government," Mr. Landau stated. "In Italy a Jewish problem has been created because of the Catholic school system which the Concordat brought into existence."

Mr. Landau supervised the news service from the Zionist Congress and the Jewish Agency Council sessions and took charge in London of the reports from Palestine when the excesses broke out. "The Jewish Telegraphic Agency fulfilled its task at this tragic moment; in addition to cables from Jerusalem, a 'pipeline' was laid from Cairo to Jerusalem, the J. T. A. correspondents obtaining by telephone from Jerusalem every day a report of all occurrences. In addition to this, a news service was installed from Beirut, special messengers being sent from Palestine to Beirut in order to keep the J. T. A. informed through this channel also. It was due to these elaborate arrangements that every detail of the occurrences was made known to the world and public opinion immediately aroused to an extent where further bloodshed and more tragic occurrences were prevented. In this struggle for obtaining and distributing the news at that moment every one of the J. T. A. offices was working day and night. It is due only to the devotion and indefatigable efforts of the staff of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in all of its six offices, that an efficient service could be maintained," Mr. Landau concluded.

HIAS COMMISSIONER
HONORED ON RETURN

In recognition of five years which he spent in Europe as a special commissioner for the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society, a dinner was tendered to Dr. James Bernstein, Sunday night at the Hias Building, New York City. The dinner was attended by leading communal and philanthropic workers.

Dr. Bernstein, who left the United States in November, 1924, established his headquarters in Berlin and gave special attention to the unification of the various immigrant relief agencies functioning in Europe which finally resulted in the formation in April, 1927, of the Hias-Ica-Emigdirect.

INSIDIOUS PROPAGANDA OF ARAB PRESS AGAINST JEWS AND BRITISH CONTINUES

Three Publications Suspended for Spreading False Reports
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 28.—Suspension of two Arab newspapers for publication of false news regarding Jews was officially confirmed in a government communique issued tonight, reporting simultaneously the temporary suppression of another Arab paper for inflammatory articles.

The "Meraat El Sharek" of Jerusalem was suspended for one week for the publication on September 17 of false news calculated to arouse racial hatred, first, that acid was thrown by a Jew on two women; second, that Arab boys of Hebron found and ate chocolate left on the ground by Jews and that two boys died at once from the effects of the poison and four were sent to the hospital.

The "Al Jamima Al Arabiya" of Jerusalem was suspended for one week for the publication on September 16 of reports, first, that Jews, proceeding to Hebron in a car to recover their household effects, attacked or attempted to run over a number of Arabs and that the military escorts were Jews in disguise; second, that during the disturbances at Gaza, Jews fired at and threw acid on Arabs from the hotel, until the police threatened to fire upon them; third, that the Jewish flour mills at Jaffa sent 200 bags of flour to Jerusalem and that each bag was found to contain a revolver and 250 cartridges which were confiscated by the police; fourth, that Arab villagers were killed by a bomb thrown from an aeroplane and two men were killed at the village Aqur and two wounded; fifth, that British troops searching in the Sidun village stole money and jewelry belonging to one of the villagers.

The "Annafi" of Haifa was suspended for a fortnight for the publication on September 13 of articles calculated to arouse racial hatred and endanger public security.

The communique further states for general information, that all allegations that food offered for sale had been poisoned proved, on examination by the health officers, to be entirely unfounded.

WOULD HAVE 100 YEAR WAIT FOR U. S. ENTRY

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Sept. 28.—Some immigrants who have applied for visas to America would have to wait 100 years before they would be reached under the Russian quota. Under the Polish quota they would have to wait 40 years.

A report issued by the State Department yesterday regarding the status of applications under the quotas of various countries states that applications for visas by prospective immigrants in many countries are so numerous that most of them will never be reached under the present quotas during the lifetime of the applicants.

CITATION PRAISES HEBRON POLICE OFFICER BEFORE WHOM MASSACRE OCCURRED

Hebron Refugees, on Other Hand, Charge Caffera with Inability to Afford Promised Protection
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 28.—The citation in the "Official Gazette," conferring the King's police medal upon Caffera, Assistant Superintendent of Police at Hebron, reads as follows:

"He displayed conspicuous gallantry in keeping at bay single-handed several hundred armed, excited Arabs, who attacked the Jewish quarter, on which they inflicted heavy casualties, thereby stopping and preventing further attacks on the Jews of Hebron."

Far from admitting the gallantry of Caffera, before whose eyes sixty Jews were killed and scores wounded, the Hebron refugees here charge him with inability, after giving Jewish representatives positive assurance that nothing would happen to them if they remained indoors.

Major Saunders, Deputy Commandant of Police, was similarly decorated because "during the period between August 28 and the arrival of the troops, by his dispositions, energy and example did admirable work in controlling the situation with the forces at his disposal," the citation declares.

The question was also raised as to why the citation referred to Caffera's keeping the Arabs at bay "single handed," when he had at his disposal more than twenty Arab police, and why he did not control them, and why they were powerless to prevent the massacre.

MONTEFIORE COUNTRY SANATORIUM OPENED

The new Montefiore Hospital Country Sanatorium for the treatment of incipient tuberculosis, completed recently at Bedford Hills, Westchester County, at a cost of \$2,000,000, was opened for inspection for the first time yesterday to friends of the institution and the general public. Under the direction of Sol G. Rosenbaum, president of Montefiore Hospital for Chronic Diseases, of which the new sanatorium is a major department, Israel Unterberg, chairman of the Bedford Hills Committee of the hospital board, Joseph Obermeyer, chairman of the building committee, and Herbert S. Martin, chairman of the reception committee, open house was held at the model institution from 11 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Officers and members of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, as well as medical experts and authorities on hospital planning from various parts of the country were among the hundreds of visitors who took part in the open house ceremonies.

The general scheme of design adapted by Robert D. Kohn and Charles Butler, architects of the new buildings, was that of a central infirmary building, four stories high, flanked on each side by two story ward buildings.

MRS. KOHUT, PRESIDENT OF JEWISH WOMEN'S CONGRESS, RETURNS FROM EUROPE

Describes Vienna as Darkest Spot in Europe
Mrs. Alexander Kohut, president of the Congress of Jewish Women, declared her satisfaction over the action taken by the delegates at the International Congress of Jewish Women, held recently at Hamburg.

"I consider," stated Mrs. Kohut on her return on board the S. S. Leviathan, "that the action of the Congress on the Agnoth question is far-sighted and humanitarian. A brief of the Jewish women's point of view was prepared by Frau Bertha Pappenheim of Frankfurt-am-Main. This memorandum was presented by Frau Essbacher and Frau Marta Bondi of Vienna, to the convention of the Agudath Israel on September 5th. On that occasion this learned body of Rabbis and scholars gave consideration to the plea of our delegates. In addition, Prof. Guinsberg of the Jewish Theological Seminary, wrote a brochure, which was joined with our petition and submitted to the convention, which gave a learned opinion, justifying from a legal point of view, the granting of a definite status to the Jewish Agnoth who have not been able to remarky.

"The Women's Congress heard petitions of thousands of Jewish women, many of them from the United States, Australia, South Africa, Trans-Siberia who pleaded for the obtaining of a rabbinical decision to alleviate their status."

Mrs. Kohut further stated: "In addition, the Congress of Jewish Women gave sympathetic expression to their interest in the Jewish Agency but the resolution endorsing it, was not offered for a vote because the Jewish Agency itself had not at that time as yet been formed. We expect, however, to take up, in a referendum to the constituent

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PALESTINE MOURNS MARSHALL; SENDS CONDOLENCES

The Vaad Leumi, the Jewish National Council of Palestine has cabled condolences in the name of Palestine Jewry to Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, over the death of Louis Marshall.

The cable which Mr. Warburg received yesterday reads as follows:

"Knesseth Israel in Eretz Israel mourns the loss of Louis Marshall, one of the leaders of Jewry, who devoted his energy to defending the interests of his nation. His departure immediately after the establishment of the Jewish Agency, the crowning glory of the work of the deceased, and after the disheartening incidents in Palestine, at the time when there is a demand for the banding together of Jewry the world over for the strengthening and expansion of our Homeland, makes the pain in having our leader, Louis Marshall, taken from us, ever so hard to bear."

their outbreaks by agitated crowds in Jerusalem. We urge the immediate return of the Palestine Executive. When this telegram was presented to Mr. Luke, he suggested the elimination of the words: 'seriously anxious, outbreaks, agitated crowds,' declaring: 'This will only serve to stir up feeling among the populace.'

"The Zionist Executive, however, insisted and the telegram was sent out." The correspondent's account further relates the representations made in vain by the Zionists in Jerusalem. Within two days after his arrival, Sir John Chancellor stirred the Moslems of the country almost to a rebellion by the issuance of a proclamation which his officials now admit as having been ill-advised. Only the second proclamation, in which he withdrew the first implication, quieted the Moslems, pending the arrival of the Inquiry Commission. Another surprise was the official announcement that under no circumstances would Sir John receive journalists who would be in a position to correct the anti-British propaganda broadcast through antagonistic sources, says the correspondent.

London, Sept. 28—Great Britain promised "Hedjaz, Iraq, Syria, Palestine and Nejd would be independent states in an Arab Commonwealth," declared Emir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordan, in an interview granted the correspondent of the London "Daily Chronicle" at Amman.

"Our people were excited by false reports from Palestine, but all stories of raids from Transjordan on Palestine were false," the Emir continued. "Palestine is in the unhappy position of being surrounded by Arab countries, where any suggestion that the Jews create a national home there would be preposterous. Zionism is quite impossible and is bound to fail. Peace will be preserved while British soldiers stay there, but the British flag will be hauled down," he said.

Wahabi Tribes Raid Transjordanian Frontier

Wahabi tribes are reported to be conducting raids at three points across the Transjordanian frontier. Aeroplanes and armored cars were sent from Amman to repel the attack upon the border villages.

Details are as yet unavailable, but it is believed the Wahabis were defeated.

"Daily Mail" Again Urges British Evacuate Palestine

The campaign for Great Britain giving up the Mandate is being continued by the London "Daily Mail." Editorially the newspaper says that it learns from its correspondent at Geneva that the evacuation of Palestine could be accomplished in one year from the present. All that is necessary for the British Government to do, the paper states, is to give the League Council notice of its determination to relinquish the Mandate. The Council then

"The Executive members of the Congress formulated a program for constructive measures to enhance the social, economic and spiritual welfare of the Jewish women of Eastern Europe. We have established an office of the Congress in Berlin and in New York. A constitution has been prepared which will be submitted to the constituent organizations.

"I was struck particularly during the sessions of the Congress with the progressive character of the delegation of Jewish women of Lithuania and Poland. There was an insistent demand on the part of these delegates that the Congress take cognizance of the need of extension of authority over religious schools, curricula and conditions to the Jewish women. Lithuanian delegates pressed the question of the formulation of a definite attitude on the religious education of Jewish girls under modern auspices.

"My saddest observation was that of Vienna which I consider the darkest spot of Europe. Conditions have gone from bad to worse with the result that the Jewish community (Kulteis gemeinde) is virtually placed in the position where in order to get those sums raised by taxation from the members of the Jewish community, they have to resort to suit against the Austrian government. The loss of income and members, which it has sustained, virtually cripples it."

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CHARRED REMAINS OF ANOTHER VICTIM OF ARAB MASSACRE DISCOVERED

A strong stand against the anti-Jewish boycott was taken by the Vaad Leumi at its last meeting. In a statement issued by the National Council, the Jewish public is cautioned "against being dragged into any boycott propaganda," despite the Arab boycott agitation against the Jews.

Arabs Also Present Claims

The Arabs, too, have filed numerous applications. The Arab claimants include inhabitants of the marauding villages, such as Kolonia near Motza, Surbah and others.

Says Commission Not to Permit Counsel on Either Side

The parliamentary Commission of Inquiry will not allow counsel for either side during its investigation of the causes of the Arab outbreak, nor will cross-examination of witnesses be permitted, declares the Arab paper "Felestin," citing a reply given to the Arab Executive by the Chief Secretary, who was alleged to have said that both Arabs and Zionists will be invited to give evidence. The "Felestin" states that the Arabs asked the question because they heard the Jews had invited eminent counsel from England.

It is understood that the procedure of the Commission is not definitely settled, but if no counsel or cross-examination is allowed, Jewish representatives will be inclined to abstain from the inquiry altogether, feeling the limitation makes a thoroughgoing investigation impossible.

Arabs May Send Delegation to London

Acting on an urgent call from the "National Women's Club" to send an Arab delegation to England before the re-opening of parliament, the Arab Executive will decide today on the personnel of the delegation. Jaffa Arabs are said to favor one Moslem and one Christian delegate, Mousa Kazim Pasha and Shibli Jamal, Arab leaders, have agreed in principle to proceeding immediately to London, it is said, and two others proceeding after the Commission of Inquiry completes its investigation.
