ARAB EXECUTIVE CALLS OFF GENERAL STRIKE PLANNED FOR WEDNESDAY

Intended as Protest Against Harsh Sentences for Offenders; Boycott Continues (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 1-The issuance of a call for a general strike by Arabs on Wednesday, October 2, was decided

upon by the Palestine Arab Executive. The strike is intended as an expression of protest against the sentences imposed on Arabs found guilty of attacking and looting during the anti-Tewish disturbances, the Arabs considering the sentences to be harsh. The strike

will also be a protest against Attorney

General Norman Bentwich, whose dis-

missal is demanded by the Arabs.

Before learning that the Inquiry Commission had postponed its date of departure until the middle of October the Arab Executive had decided to await the arrival of the Commission before sending its delegation to London, although the Arab National League there urged the immediate despatch of the delegation. The Arab representative before the

Inquiry Commission has not yet been named, but it is reported that Abdul Hadi, one of the secretaries of the Arab Executive, will probably be appointed. Jerusalem, Oct. 1-The general strike

COMPLETE ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRIAL OF PERPETRA-TORS OF HEBRON MASSACRE Sentence Arabs Convicted of Looting:

Arab Lawyers Walk Out of Court in Demonstration (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, Oct. 1-Arrangements for

the trial of the perpetrators of the Hebron massacre have been complete ed, although it has not yet been decided as to whether the District Court will sit in Jerusalem or in Hebron. The examination of the Arabs who are accused of murdering the Ameri-can student of the Hebron Yeshiva, Wolf Greenberg, has been postponed. His suspected assailant, Khalil El labri, is imprisoned. He will be held for another fortnight to permit further investigation. The trial of Sheik Markah was also postponed owing to the necessity of examining additional witnesses.

Two more Hebron Arab notables were arrested in connection with the murder of the Slonim family. One was released on the personal guarantee of Captain Partridge. An Arab suspected of the murder of the Reizman brothers was released for lack of evidence, after nine-year-old Indith Reizman, orphaned by her father's death in the massacre, became confused in her testimony. She testified she saw the accused pursuing her father and murder her grandmother. The child became confused on cross-examination, (Continued on Page 4)

LITTLE RESPONSE IN MOSCOW TO COMMUNISTS' DRIVE FOR WORK ON ROSH HASHONAH

Only 1,000 Jewish Workers in 20 Factories Have Signified Intention to Remain at Work (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Oct. 1—The campaign of the Jewish Communists, urging Jew-ish workers to go to work on Rosh Hashonah is finding little response among the Jewish workers.

With only a few days left before the High Holidays, only 1,000 Jewish workers in 20 factories in Moscow

have registered, signifying their inten-tion to work on Rosh Hashonah, the "Emes" reports today. Because of the approaching High Holidays, Uman, Ukraine, is filled with

Chassidim who are arriving from all parts of the country to visit the grave of Nachman Braslaver. The leaders of the local Braslaver Chassidim suc-ceeded in publishing, with the permission of the Soviet authorities, Chassidic literature for the arriving visitors. The Jewish Communists protested against the grant of the permit, demanding the liquidation of the Chas-

sidic shrine which they term a nest for religious activities.

DECLARE UNFOUNDED REPORT OF KISCH RESIGNATION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 1-The reports in the press abroad concerning the alleged resignation of Col. Frederick H. Kisch from the Zionist Executive were declared in well informed circles here to be utterly unfounded.

It was explained that the reports probably had their origin in the temporary assumption by Harry Sacher of the negotiations with the Palestine government, especially in connection with the inquiry into the disturbances. Col. Kisch continues his general supervision of the work of the Executive, principally in the questions of security and the direction of the relief and reconstruction work together with Rabbi Meyer Berlin. Another report concerning the re-

fusal by Palestine government officials of a subscription from Attorney General Norman Bentwich to a British police fund is denied here. No such fund was organized by British officials in Palestine: A fund was organized by the wives of some of the officials to which Mr. Bentwich made a contribution, which was accepted.

FUND, ISSUES APPEAL Says Answer to Recent Attacks Must Be Thrice Intensified Energy

An appeal for greater work for Palestine was issued by M. M. Ussishkin, president of the Jewish National Fund, who is now in Jerusalem. The mes-

sage addressed "To our comrades everywhere," was issued through the Jewish National Fund headquarters in New York. The message read: "A terrible calamity has overtaken us. Our pioneer in Palestine was again attacked, the enemy intending to ruin and destroy what has been built. There have been sacrifices of men and money, but the building re-mains. The nation's answer, from the

four corners of the earth, is-Building

proceeds.' Not only did we tie the future of our people with the building of our land, but we interwined with it, what is more important, the honor of the nation. No adversary can stop the historic process, the prophetic idea of the 'Return of the Sons to Their Boundaries. "When, at the time of the war, Jemal Pasha, the chief of the Turkish army, tried to destroy our edifice-the answer given was the Balfour Declaration; after the first attack in April 1920, in Upper Galilee, and the heroic death of Trumpeldor and his comrades-our reply was the Chaluzim movement; after the Jerusalem riots on Passover, 1920—the confirmation of the Balfour Declaration at San Remo; after the organized attack in Tel Aviv and the Judaean colonies in May, 1921-we answered by the acquisition and the settlement of our physical and spiritual fortress—the Valley of Jezreel—and the extension

Moscow, Oct. 1-The Hebrew alphabet lost five characters by a decree of the Ukrainian Commissariat of Education, acting upon request of the Jewish section of the Communist party. The ancient alphabet has five double

letters, for the sounds equivalent to ch, m, n, z, ph, the double being used only at the end of a word and called the final character. The Commissariat of Education now ordered the Yiddish language schools to eliminate from the reading and writing in the classrooms and in the publication of text books the "long chaf, long mem, long nun, long zadic, long phe."

Jerusalem, Oct. 1-Four Arabs were arrested in the Jerusalem bazaar for intimidating would-be Arab purchasers in Jewish shops. The charge against them will apparently be intimidation since there is no law obtaining in Palestine against boycott propaganda.

Jewish employees in an Arab cigarette factory were warned by Arab pickets to leave their work before they

are forced to leave.

Jerusalem Jews were forced to go without meat at their meals today owing to a false report circulated among Jewish butchers yesterday that Arabs intended to attack them if they came to the slaughter house.

"Because you walk through the streets with uncovered arms, you brought down the anger of God. You brought down the anger of God. are responsible for the riots and blood-shed in the Holy City!" This charge was hurled this morning by an old man in the Meah Shearim quarter when two American girls passed, wearing summer dresses. The old man brandished his cane, but cause no violence. A declaration urging a boycott against Jews was not adopted by the Arab Executive at its last meeting, it is reported, owing to sharp differences which arose between Moslem and Christian members: The Moslems asserted that the boycott benefits Christian shopkeepers in the towns, since the Arabs, boycotting the Jews, are obliged to trade with them, but the Moslems are losing, owing to the Jews'

During the hearing an important statement was made by an Arab doctor of the public health department, contradicting the statement of Dr. McQueen in connection with the mutilation issue. Contrary to Dr. Mc-Queen, the Arab doctor said that the bodies of the Hebron victims were not examined before burial because "the situation in the town on that day did not permit time for such examination." Sentences ranging from six lashes

to one month imprisonment were handed down on Arab youths who were found with various articles of furniture belonging to the Jewish settlers of the colony Beer Tuvia and Hulda. Fifteen Arabs were remanded for trial on more serious charges.

A plea on the part of the defense

counsel that the anti-Jewish attack was "a revolution" and therefore the charge of theft during the riots is not sustainable, was ignored by the Judge. Arab Jawyers, as a demonstration,

walked out of the court presided over by Land Commissioner Abramson, by Land Commissioner Abramson, who is to decide which villages in the neighborhood of Artouf are liable to collective punishment. The lawyers contended that Abramson does not have jurisdiction in this matter, since many individuals from these villages altready have been sentenced for loot-

The investigation is continuing des-pite the Arab lawyers' demonstration. It will continue for several days. Commissioner Abramson is of Jewish origin, the son of an apostate.

Any village found guilty of partici-pating in the attacks and therefore liable to collective punishment, will not be allowed to file claims for compensation even on behalf of innocent persons who suffered from the raids of the troops, it was declared.

Because nearly a hundred Arabs are imprisoned in Gaza, accused of incite-ment and rioting, it is considered unsafe for the Jews to return to the towns for the present. Twenty British troops will be stationed at Gaza and ten at Beersheba. An airforce detachment is stationed near Gaza to assist the ground troops. One hundred sol-diers stationed at Nazareth are being transferred to Haifa, which is becom-ing the headquarters of the northern division of the British troops. The soldiers will be temporarily quartered in Jewish public buildings in Haifa and Hadar Ha'Carmel.
