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ARAB GENERAL STRIKE IN PALESTINE CALLED FOR TODAY BY ARAB EXECUTIVE

High Commissioner Receiver Arab Deputation in Effort to Avert Strike; Jaffa District Commissioner Advises Jews to Close Shops Today as Precaution; Arab Lawyer "Exempt," Trials Proceed

Jerusalem, Oct. 15—The final decision to call a general strike of Palestine Arabs on Wednesday, October 16, was adopted by the Palestine Arab Executive at its meeting held here on Sunday. A previous call for a general strike, issued October 2, was postponed pending the result of an interview which the Arab Executive had with Sir John Chancellor, Palestine High Commissioner. It is understood that the Arabs will attempt to extend the general strike to Transjordania.

A last effort to exert government influence against the proposed strike, collapsed when Sir John Chancellor informed the Arab Executive deputation which called on him yesterday that the present regulations at the Wailing Wall must stand until a special commission proposes a new settlement.

BAR BLOWING OF SHOFAR AT CONCLUSION OF YOM KIPPUR ON GRAND MUFTI'S PROTEST

Congregation Incensed When Muezzin's Call Mingles with Jewish Worshippers' Prayers

Jerusalem, Oct. 15—While the Day of Atonement passed in Palestine without incident, the services at the Wailing Wall concluded with a discordant note. At sundown, while the worshippers, spent after 24 hours of fast and the day-long prayers, stood waiting for the blowing of the Shofar, which did not come because of the Grand Mufti's protest, a muezzin emerged from the new door recently added beside the Wall, leading to the Mosque area, and began calling the Moslems to prayer.

Indignation over the unprecedented prohibition of the blowing of the Shofar was increased with the appearance of the muezzin. Many who were ignorant that this has been the practice for several months, since the opening of the new door, were incensed that the moment when the blowing of the Shofar was to mark the conclusion of the Yom Kippur services was chosen for the congregation before the Wall began reciting psalms to drown out the muezzin's call.

After the cantor and the congregation had proclaimed seven times, "Yehovah is God," the sexton told the worshippers to repair to the nearest

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temple. The deputation, composed of Musa Kazim Pasha and three secretaries of the Executive, Jemal Hussein, Maughanah and Abdul Hadi, refused to call off the strike unless the regulations were revoked, especially the provision that the door leading from the pavement before the Wall to the Mosque area be closed from sunset on Fridays to sunset Saturday and on holidays.

While aimed ostensibly against Attorney General Norman Bentwich, it is understood that what the Arab leaders are really after is a continued state of suspense and unrest. The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was reliably informed that the Palestine police possesses substantial proof of the importation of arms and ammunition into Palestine by Arabs.

The Moslems are still dissatisfied with the regulations at the Wailing Wall, as is indicated by the general strike called for Wednesday, when the Arab Executive hopes to make an effective protest against the temporary regulations of the government, allowing the Jews the few appearances essential to the service on the Day of Atonement, which did not, however,

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ABDULLAH THREATENS TO JOIN ARAB REVOLT IF WALL STATUS QUO INFRINGED Ruler of Transjordan Protests at Zionist Aims and Congress Resolutions

Jerusalem, Oct. 15—A threat that Transjordanian Arabs may join their Palestine brethren in a "revolt which will be worse than the Syrian," was contained in a memorandum sent to Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, by Emir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordan, protesting against the Zionist aims in Palestine.

The memorandum voices protest against the resolutions adopted at the Zionist Congress in Zurich and against what the Emir calls "the attempt of the Jews to conquer the Wailing Wall and infringe on other Arab rights."

The memorandum states: "Any infringement on the status quo of the Wailing Wall will cause a new outbreak in Palestine which Transjordan may join. The Palestine revolt will be worse than the Syrian because to the national motives religious ones will be added."

The Emir demands the immediate formation of a reserve force of Arab legions because "with the latter alone he is unable to guarantee peace in Transjordan now since the Transjordanian frontier force has been transferred to Palestine."

PREMIER MacDONALD VISITS FELIX M. WARBURG FOR TEA AT COUNTRY ESTATE

Premier's Attitude on Problems Discussed Fairest I Have Ever Seen, Warburg Says in Statement; MacDonald Receives Arab Representative

Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain was the guest Sunday at tea of Felix M. Warburg, Chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency Council, at the latter's country estate in White Plains, N. Y. Accompanied by his daughter, Ishbel, the Premier spent an hour with Mr. Warburg.

In response to an inquiry concerning the visit of the Premier, Mr. Warburg made the following statement: "It is a very beautiful compliment paid by the Prime Minister, which I had no reason to expect. The spirit of the visit and the conversation, so far as I am concerned, were a great joy and satisfaction and the Prime Minister's attitude toward the many problems with which he has to deal, I consider exceptionally fine and the fairest I have ever seen."

Ameen Rihani, author of "The Maker of Modern Arabia," and prin-

cipal delegate of Arabic societies in the United States, appeared before the Premier on Saturday to present the Arab side in the Palestine case. According to Rihani, he expressed the wish to Premier MacDonald that Palestine be included in a free, united Arab federation. He asked that Great Britain hold the Palestine Mandate "in trust" for the Arabs. The Arab delegate stated after the interview that the Premier had assured him he will permit no injustice to the Palestine Arab population and asked that the results of the Commission of Inquiry be awaited.

Before calling on Mr. Warburg on Sunday, the Premier and his daughter were the guests of Miss Lillian D. Wald, at Saugatuck, Conn., returning last Sunday to New York City, where the Premier was the guest of honor at a dinner in the Henry Street Settlement.

**TO CLOSE UNIVERSITIES IF

**MOSCOW SYNAGOGUES OVER-
CROWDED ON YOM KIPPUR
WHILE OTHER CAMP WORKED**

**Communist Propaganda Against Ob-
servance Lessened**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Oct. 15—Jews of Moscow were divided yesterday into two camps, one overcrowding the synagogues, the other working in the factories, offices and government stores.

The anti-religious efforts of the Jewish Communists were not as strong as on Rosh Hashanah, which fell on the Soviet rest day. Yom Kippur falling on a usual work day the Jewish colonists limited their efforts to arranging concerts for Kol Nidre night and excursions to museums for women who do not work. They also arranged a free trip to the Jewish colony, Zangen, in the Moscow region, where Collectivization Day was observed notwithstanding the order of the Wzik exempting Jewish colonists from the celebrations.

In the townships and the colonies, Yom Kippur was observed as usual, except in Kalinindorf where the opening of the first tractor station for the Jewish colonists was held.

The Communist Jewish press did not publish the order of the Wzik exempting Jewish colonists from observing Collectivization Day, sounding, however, only a mild call for participation.

**Jews Absent When Tractor Station
Opened**

Moscow, Oct. 15—Because of Yom Kippur, the older colonists in the region around Kalinindorf were absent from the ceremonies inaugurating a giant tractor station for the Jewish collectives.

The station with 200 tractors to serve the Jewish collectives was opened in Kalinindorf on Monday, in connection with the observance throughout the country of Collectivization Day.

Only the representatives of the Jewish Comsomsols, Communist youth organizations, came from neighboring colonies to be present at the inauguration ceremonies.

Ritual Murder Tale Spread

Moscow, Oct. 15—On the eve of the Day of Atonement, the old ritual murder libel was raised against Jewish settlers, mountain Jews, in Larin, a village in Dagestan. A thirteen year old Christian boy, Vasia Gubarev, was found in the river in the neighboring village, Serebriakovo. The boy had been choked to death. Immediately the rumor spread that he had been killed by the Jewish colonists for ritual purposes for the high holidays.

Twelve Jewish colonists who arrived at Serebriakovo with their grain to be ground at the government mill, were surrounded by an enraged group which began shouting, "Here are the murderers of Vasia" and began to attack them. The crowd grew wilder and wilder with the cry, "Kill the Jews!" Although the situation was extremely serious, the Chairman of the village Soviet, Zabelin, refused to interfere. **Government Communique Announces
Departure for Investigation**

London, Oct. 15—Sir Walter Shaw, chairman of the Parliamentary Commission of Inquiry which is to investigate the causes of the recent Arab outbreak in Palestine, and members of the Commission, R. Hopkin Morris, Liberal; Henry Snell, Laborite; and the secretary to the Commission, T. I. K. Lloyd, left on their way to Palestine. The other member of the commission, Sir Henry Betterton, Conservative, is proceeding overland.

A government communique issued this morning regarding the departure of the Commission members stated:

The chairman and members of the Commission of Inquiry, with the exception of Sir Henry Betterton, who is traveling overland, left this morning to embark on the S. S. Oronsay at Tilbury, for Palestine. Lieutenant-Colonel H. D. Satge represented the Secretary of State for the Colonies at their departure."

**JEWISH LABOR COOPERATIVES
CLOSED ON YOM KIPPUR**

Warsaw, Oct. 15—For the first time in many years the Jewish labor cooperatives were closed on the Day of Atonement. Fights which had occurred in previous years did not mar the observance of the holiday yesterday.

All synagogues in the capital were crowded. Memorial prayers for the victims of the Palestine outbreak were recited.

An attempt by Communists to arrange an anti-religious demonstration was prevented by the police.

**MURDER OF ARAB CAUSES
GREAT EXCITEMENT**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 14—Great excitement prevailed in Jerusalem today over the murder of Musa Isdeh, an Arab from a village near Hebron, who was killed at Herod's Gate, Sunday night. The excitement somewhat abated when three Arabs were arrested this morning on suspicion of being the murderers.

It is presumed that the Arab is a victim of inner political enmities between Arab factions, the murdered man supposedly being active in propaganda against the Grand Mufti.

Comsomol, Communist youth organization, succeeded, after adopting extraordinary measures, in quieting the enraged crowd.

An investigation which was started immediately, disclosed that the boy had been choked and thrown into the river by Pavel Melnikov, in revenge for fighting Melnikov's small brother who was Vasia Gubarev's chum.

Melnikov was immediately arrested as were the attackers of the colonists and the Soviet Chairman, Zabelin.

GREAT BRITAIN HAS POWER TO FURTHER OR HAMPER PROGRESS OF PALESTINE WORK, EINSTEIN SAYS

Jews Will Never Abandon Reconstruction Work; Do Not Wish to Live Under Protection of British Bayonets, They Expect Mandatory to Promote Friendly Relations Between Jews and Arabs; Pledge Should be Fulfilled Not Because Once Undertaken, But Because Mandatory Is Convinced of Significance and Importance of Task Involved

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Manchester, Eng., Oct. 15.—"It lies in the hands of the Mandatory materially to further or materially to hamper the progress of the Palestine work," declared Prof. Albert Einstein in a letter published in the Manchester Guardian on the recent occurrences in Palestine. The Jews will never abandon the work of reconstruction which they have undertaken, he declared. They do not wish to live in the land of their fathers under the protection of British bayonets, and what they expect of Great Britain is that it shall promote the growth of friendly relations between Jews and Arabs.

Censuring certain sections of the British press for advocating Britain's relinquishing the Mandate over Palestine, the scientist states that Britain should fulfill the trust, not because it was once undertaken, but because she is deeply convinced of the importance and significance of the task.

"I have been following with anxious concern the comments in the British press on the recent events in Palestine," Prof. Einstein writes. "Despite my general reluctance to enter the political arena, I feel impelled to make the following observations. It was with wonderful enthusiasm and a deep sense of gratitude that the Jews, afflicted more than any other people by the chaos and horror of the war, obtained from Great Britain a pledge to support the re-establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine. The Jewish people, beset with a thousand physical wrongs and moral degradations, saw in the British promise a sure rock on which it could recreate the Jewish national life which, by its very existence, as well as by its material and intellectual achievements, would imbue the Jewish masses, dispersed all over the world, with a new sense of hope, dignity and pride.

"Jews of all lands gave of their best in manpower and in material wealth in order to fulfill the inspiration that had kept the race alive through the martyrdom of centuries. Has the rock on which we built begun to shake? A considerable section of the British press now meets our aspirations with lack of understanding, with coldness and disfavor. What has happened?

"Arab mobs, organized and inflamed to fanaticism by political intriguers working on the religious fury of the ignorant, attacked the scattered Jewish settlements and murdered and plundered wherever no resistance was offered. In Hebron the inmates of the Rabbinical College, innocent youths who never handled weapons in their lives, were butchered in cold blood. In Safed the same fate befell aged rabbis, their wives and children. Recent-

ly some Arabs raided a Jewish orphan settlement, where the pathetic remnants of the great Russian pogroms had found a haven of refuge. Is it not, then, amazing that the orgy of such primitive brutality upon a peaceful population has been utilized by a certain section of the British press for a campaign of propaganda directed not against the authors and instigators of these brutalities, but against their victims?"

Prof. Einstein further complains of the ignorance of the British press of the Jewish achievements in Palestine, which were undertaken on the basis of official recognition, approved by almost every civilized government. The Jews are developing flourishing agricultural settlements, industry and education in the language of the Bible. "Is it not bewildering that after all this, brutal massacres by a fanaticized mob can destroy all appreciation of the Jewish effort and lead to a demand for the repeal of the solemn pledges of official support and protection?" he demands.

Discussing the two-fold basis of Zionism, on the one hand arising from the Jewish sufferings, persecutions and suppressions of intellectual life, which today exists even in Western Europe, and on the other hand springing from the deeper motives which are rooted in spiritual tradition, namely the re-establishment of the Jewish nation in its ancient home, where spiritual values could again develop in a Jewish atmosphere, Prof. Einstein writes: "Zionism is not a movement inspired by chauvinism or by scarce egoism. I am convinced that the great majority of Jews would refuse support of a movement of that kind. Nor does Zionism aspire to divest anyone in Palestine of any rights or possessions he may enjoy. The Zionist movement is entitled, in the name of its higher objectives and on the strength of the support which has been promised to it most solemnly by the civilized world, to demand that its unprecedented reconstructive effort carried out in a country which still largely lies fallow and in which, by methods of intensive cultivation such as the Jews have applied, room can be found for hundreds of thousands of new settlers, without detriment to the native population, shall not be defeated by a small clique of agitators, even if they wear the garb of ministers of the Islamic religion.

"Does public opinion in Great Britain realize that the Grand Mufti in Jerusalem, who is the center of all the troubles and speaks so loudly in the name of all the Moslems, is a young political adventurer of not much more, I understand, than thirty years of age, who, in 1920, was sentenced to several

MANDATE COMMISSION NOT TO DISCUSS PALESTINE EVENTS AT COMING SESSION

To Await Results of Inquiry Commission's Investigation; May Call Extraordinary Session
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Oct. 15.—The Palestine events will not be discussed at the session of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations which will open here on November 6, the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

The Commission has decided to await the results of the parliamentary Commission of Inquiry before forming conclusions. The next regular session of the Mandates Commission will meet in June 1930, but the possibility is entertained in League of Nations circles that an extraordinary session of the Mandates Commission will be called early in January should the British Government submit the findings of the Commission of Inquiry before then, in which case the League of Nations council, meeting on January 20, will also deal with the report of the extraordinary session of the Mandates Commission.

REFUGEES. STILL AFRAID. REFUSE TO RETURN TO REMOTER QUARTERS

Relief Committee Tries Pressure; Reduces Food Allotments
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 15.—A conflict has arisen between the Central Relief Committee, organized to aid the sufferers in the recent outbreak, and the refugees here who refuse to return to the Old City and to remote quarters because they fear those districts are still unsafe.

The Committee, unable to persuade the refugees to return to these quarters which have been declared safe by the government, has resorted to pressure and reduced the food allotments. Indignation at this measure was voiced by the refugees.

Rabbi Meyer Berlin, who is heading the Relief Committee, stated to the representative of the Hebrew daily, "Doar Ha'Yom": "There are areas still dangerous and we are feeding the refugees from these areas, but there are areas already safe. Nevertheless, the refugees are refusing to return there. We are extending loans to small traders and artisans, about \$4,000 having been loaned already. The government is feeding only the refugees from Hebron. We are furnishing food to the refugees from the Jerusalem area. Jews have returned to Gaza but not to Beer Sheva."

A letter published in the "Doar Ha'Yom" presents the views of 200 refugees, who declared that the relief committee has stopped feeding them.

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include benches for the fasting worshippers.

It is pointed out that the strike called by the Moslems is to include Christian Arabs as well, though they are not concerned in the dispute over the status quo of the Wailing Wall.

It is reported that the Mufti has appealed to King George to "protect" the Wall, which is claimed as a sacred Moslem site. Declaring that the Moslems have always respected the Christian Holy Places, the Mufti states that the Christians should now reciprocate. Simultaneously, the Arab Executive has cabled Moslem bodies in India, Iraq, Egypt and Syria to assist in safeguarding the Wailing Wall which, they assert, the Jews have converted into an open synagogue.

It had been expected that the strike would include Arab lawyers, causing a further delay of the murder trials which are scheduled for Wednesday. On that day Chief Justice Sir Michael MacDonnell is to resume at Haifa the trial of three Arabs, accused of the murder of Isaac Mamaan of Safed, which was interrupted last Thursday after the withdrawal of the Arab counsel. The trial of Sheikh Taleb Markah, accused of being responsible for the murder of the Jewish family Slonim at Hebron, is to be opened by Senior British Judge Corrie on Wednesday. It was thought that sabotage of justice by the Arabs was one of the two motives of the general strike, which is ostensibly aimed against Attorney General Norman Bentwich, whose dismissal is demanded by the Arabs. However, the Arab Executive decided to exempt lawyers from the strike, enabling them to defend the many prisoners. Hence, the trials will proceed as scheduled, that of Sheikh Taleb Markah of Hebron in the Jerusalem District Court before Judge Corrie and Judge Defreites.

Arab government employees and officials in the railways and posts will not participate in the strike, which will be limited to the closing of shops in the towns. It is expected that Jewish businesses will also be closed down in order to avoid any possible trouble.

The Arab executive, at its meeting, besides its decisions for the calling of the general strike, which was declared to be because of the severity of sentences imposed on Arabs for participating in the outbreak and against the collective punishment ordinance, also considered final steps for an Arab delegation to proceed to London, as well as the temporary arrangements for Jewish worship at the Wailing Wall, against which the Grand Mufti submitted his objections to the government.

British Counsel Briefed by Arabs

The Executive confirmed a decision to brief as the Arabs' counsel before the Commission of Inquiry, William Henry Stoker, K.C. Mr. Stoker was Attorney General for the Leeward Islands in 1889. He has held numerous

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synagogue to hear the blowing of the Shofar, but the worshippers stood, insistent on hearing it there.

Guards in Jewish quarters were reinforced, since, due to continuous services in the synagogues on the Day of Atonement, the occupants would be absent from their houses, which might become a prey to thieves unless well guarded.

Seek Change of Venue

Jerusalem, Oct. 15—Arab lawyers are seeking a change of venue for the trial of the Arabs charged with murdering the Jewish mechanic, Isaac Mamaan of Safed, on the claim that Judge Litt, who is sitting with Chief Justice MacDonnell, is disqualified because he expressed an opinion during the proceedings. The Arab lawyers submitted a report in the "Palestine Bulletin" as evidence of such a statement by Judge Litt.

After an interview with the Chief Justice, in which apologies were submitted for the conduct of the Arab lawyers' Maughan and Asfaur, in the Haifa court, withdrawing from the defense, it was arranged that Arab counsel appear to defend the prisoners when the trial opened on Tuesday morning.

The task may not be easy for the Mandatory, but for the success it will attain it is assured the undying gratitude not only of the Jews, but of all that is noblest in mankind," Prof. Einstein concludes.
