95 PER CENT DECREASE IN JEWISH OFFICE HOLDERS IN LITHUANIAN ELECTIONS

**Sharp Decline Caused by Waldemaras
New Election Ruling**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Nov. 12.—Ninety-five per cent less Jews than in previous years were elected to office during the present municipal elections in Lithuania. This is due chiefly to Premier Waldemaras' law merging all villages and suburbs with the surrounding towns into one municipality thus extensively reducing the percentage of Jews in the towns. In places where there were formerly from ten to fifteen Jewish councilors elected there were but one or two elected.

The extension of town boundaries also means a larger budget without any increased income for the towns since the suburbs and villages are poor. Kovno itself will have to increase its expenditures by 800,000 lit. This huge financial burden will have to be borne largely by Kovno whose population is largely Jewish.

JEW MARK ANNIVER- SARY OF POLISH REPUBLIC

Warsaw, Nov. 12.—The eleventh anniversary of Poland's independence was celebrated by the Jewish population throughout Poland. Special services were held in the synagogues, in which the Jewish soldiers and invalids took part.

The Jewish community of Warsaw was not invited to the celebrations arranged by the government, although in previous years the Jewish community had participated.

ELECTIONS TO PRAGUE JEWISH KEHILLAH

Prague, Nov. 12.—At yesterday's election of representatives to the Jewish Kehillah of Prague the Czech-Jewish party elected eight delegates, the Democratic party six, Jewish Nationalists five, Middle Class Orthodox three, Progressives one and Poale Zion one.

JEWISH STUDENTS ASSAULTED IN BERLIN ANTI-SEMITIC RIOT

**Attack Protest Against Rector's Pro-
hibiting Announcement of Anti-
Semitic Students' Ball**

Berlin, Nov. 12.—Hundreds of anti-Semitic students attacked Jewish students in the University hall shouting, "Out with the Jews." They also destroyed the University bulletin boards, beat Jewish students and attempted to throw them from the first story windows.

The rector of the University in trying to defend the Jewish students, was insulted. Police finally arrived and arrested six of the anti-Semitic rioters. The outburst was due to the rector's prohibiting a poster announcing a ball of anti-Semitic students which was wrongly announced as a University ball.

WARNS EVERY JEWISH COLONIST IN RUSSIA MUST JOIN COLLECTIVE

**Ozet Leader Declares Jewish Coloniza-
tion Must Follow Lines of Non-
Jewish Peasants**

Moscow, Nov. 12.—Every Jewish colonist will be forced to join a collective, is the warning issued by N. Diamenstein, leader in the Ozet, Jewish society for settling Jews on the land.

Writing in the Moscow Communist Yiddish daily, "Etnes," Diamenstein declares that henceforth Jewish colonization must be conducted along new ideological lines, similar to those affecting the non-Jewish peasants. He foresees that all Jewish colonies will soon be converted into collectives. "The funds we receive from the Agrojoint," he writes, "are not more than a temporary loan which the government will repay."

MURDERER OF FIRST RIOT VICTIM GETS PRISON TERM

Jaffa, Nov. 12.—An Arab accomplice in the murder of the aged Jew, Rosen, the first victim of the riots, was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment and was fined £250.

PAY TRIBUTE TO DR. STEIN ON 70TH BIRTHDAY

JEWISH VOLKIST PARTY TO CONVENE NATIONAL CONGRESS IN POLAND

**Conference to Decide Question of Par-
ticipation in Jewish Agency**

Lublin, Nov. 12.—The conference of the Jewish Volkist Party, in which groups from various parts of the country participated, decided to call, in the near future, a Congress of the Volkist Party throughout the whole of Poland.

The conference issued a statement in which it proclaims that the consolidation of the party had been achieved at the conference. A large part of the debates at the conference was devoted to the question of entering into the Jewish Agency. It was resolved that the attitude of the party to this question be decided upon at the plenary sitting of the Congress.

GERMAN JEWISH ASS'N ATTACKS ZIONISM

Berlin, Nov. 12.—A new anti-Zionist offensive was launched yesterday at a meeting arranged by the Association of German Jews. The principal speaker was Mr. Ostberg.

The burden of the argument was that Zionism was destroying Judaism. The meeting adopted the statement which was recently published by the opponents of the Jewish Agency denying the existence of the Jewish people because the German Jews were a part of the German people. A statement of Jacob Wassermann expressing his concurrence with this viewpoint, was read at the meeting.

DR. TICHO, NOTED OCULIST, STABBED BY ARAB

Jerusalem, Nov. 12.—Dr. Ticho, noted oculist, was stabbed by an Arab near his optalmic clinic. The wound is serious but not dangerous. The entire city is excited, because Dr. Ticho was extremely popular with all classes of people. Since he settled in Palestine twenty-four years ago, he has treated hundreds of Arabs gratis.

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YIDDISH PRESS LAUDS ELECTION OF DR. ADLER

Welcoming the election of Dr. Cyrus Adler as President of the American Jewish Committee, the "Jewish Morning Journal" says editorially:

"Dr. Adler is a man of extraordinary energy and versatility. An able organizer and leader in circles of Jewish scholarship, he was the first vice-president and chairman of the Executive Committee of the American Jewish Committee and his election as the successor of Louis Marshall was natural. We congratulate him on the honor, which he merited."

"Wherefore two Committees?" asks "The Day" in its issue of today. "Wherefore two institutions with the same goal. Would it not be better for American Jewry as well as world Jewry if the two institutions were united and had one leadership? Every one who has known Louis Marshall knows how highly he appreciated Jewish unity and will admit that the uniting of the Congress and the Committee would be entirely in keeping with his spirit and in accord with his opinions."

BREAK GROUND FOR NEW JERSEY SANATORIUM

Newark, Nov. 12—Ground for the new million dollar sanatorium of the Deborah Jewish Consumptive Relief Society at Browns Mills, N. J., was broken Sunday afternoon. Rabbi Hyman Brodsky of Newark, offered the prayer. The speakers included Philip J. Schotland of Newark, vice-chairman of the board of directors, and Dr. Louis I. Harris, chairman of the board of directors and former Health Commissioner of New York and Judge Jacob Panken of New York.

Checks totaling \$25,000 were received from various communities in New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, bringing the total raised to more than \$250,000.

SURVEY URGES MERGER OF BROOKLYN, BRONX, MAN- HATTAN CHARITY AGENCIES

Jewish Population in New York Is
1,835,000; Report Presented to
Citizens' Committee

A union of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies serving the charitable needs of Manhattan and Bronx, with the Brooklyn Federation of Charities, into city-wide, centralized Federation of Jewish Charities of Greater New York, was the chief recommendation of the Jewish Communal Survey of Greater New York, in a report submitted last night at the Jewish Center, 131 West 86th Street, by Dr. Lee K. Frankel, chairman of the executive committee of the Survey, to a Citizens' Committee headed by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky.

Following the meeting of the Citizens' Committee, Judge Rosalsky announced that the Committee had accepted the report and had authorized the creation of a more permanent agency to carry out the recommendations of the survey.

The report was based on a three-year study made on behalf of the executive committee by the Bureau of Jewish Social Research, under the direction of Samuel A. Goldsmith. A supplementary recommendation advocated the establishment of an organization to carry into effect the various suggestions for community reorganization in the field of child welfare, hospitalization, recreation, Jewish education, delinquency and family welfare work.

Pointing out that all the facts of the Survey indicate the need of a centralized and unified agency that will include all the boroughs of the city so that the various problems of Jewish philanthropy and social work can be considered from the community point of view, the Committee reports that at this time it is idle to believe that city-wide problems can be considered from so parochial an angle as the borough method now in vogue.

To adequately solve all of the social problems facing the Jewish community of New York, these problems must be considered from the community viewpoint, says the report, and in the opinion of the Committee the logical way of accomplishing this most desirable

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JACOB FISHPAN IN VIENNA. ENROUTE TO UNITED STATES

Vienna, Nov. 12—Jacob Fishpan, Managing Editor of the "Jewish Morning Journal," passed through here on his way to the United States from his extended trip to Palestine.

Mr. Fishpan, who attended the first meetings of the Inquiry Commission, stated that the inquiry discloses the sentiments and attitude of the leading Palestine officials regarding the Mandate, but all interest is particularly concentrated on the impending examination of H. C. Luke, the Chief Secretary.

RABBIS ADOPT PROTEST RESOLUTION AGAINST CALENDAR REFORM

Ask President and House to Oppose
Plan Aiming to Destroy Fixity
of Sabbath

Resolutions protesting against the proposed calendar reform on the ground that it would militate against the Jewish Sabbath were adopted at a meeting of over 100 rabbis from New York and the surrounding cities at the Broadway Central Hotel in New York Monday night.

The resolutions asked the President and Congress not to favor any legislation that called for an American delegation to an international calendar simplification congress unless the bill provided that the American delegates be instructed to fight any plan that includes the blank day which would destroy the fixity of the Sabbath.

The meeting held under the auspices of the League for Safeguarding the Fixity of the Sabbath was addressed by Dr. Moses Hyamson of the Jewish Theological Seminary, president of the League, Rabbi Max J. Weis of the Association of Reform Rabbis, Dr. Elias L. Solomon of the Board of Jewish Ministers and Rabbi B. M. Klein of the Greater New York Association of Orthodox Rabbis.

The proposed calendar reform was termed "not calendar reform but a deformation thereof, in the interests of industry" by Dr. Stephen S. Wise in a letter read at the meeting.

4 JEWS ELECTED TO N. J. LEGISLATURE

Trenton, Nov. 12—Four Jews were re-elected to the New Jersey legislature. These are assemblymen David M. Litwin of Newark, Joseph Greenberg of Jersey City, Benjamin Stein of Passaic and Joseph Altman of Atlantic City. Philip Lindeman of Newark was re-elected to Essex County Board of Freeholders.

LEHMAN NAMED TO NEGRO ASS'N BOARD

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People announces the election of Lieutenant Governor Herbert H. Lehman to the board of directors. Mr. Lehman succeeds to the place made vacant by the death of Louis Marshall. Professor Felix Frankfurter, of the Harvard Law School, was chosen to the legal committee of the Association.

ZIONIST REGIONAL CON- FERENCE IN PITTSBURGH

JEWISH INDUSTRIES MORE DEEPLY AFFECTED THAN AGRICULTURE BY ARAB BOYCOTT

Jewish Merchants Assert Credits More Drastically Cut than Conditions Justify; Merchants and Industrialists Want Loans or Subsidies from Reconstruction Fund

Haifa, Nov. 12.—In speaking today with several business men and industrialists of this city and of Tel Aviv, your correspondent learns that certain Jewish industries are more seriously affected by the boycott against the Jews than seems to be the case with agriculture. One important local wholesaler went so far as to say that if the boycott lasts six months the merchants will face bankruptcy unless substantial emergency loans are forthcoming to aid them.

According to figures shown me today several Tel Aviv industries such as furniture, iron works and hosiery, are experiencing cancellation orders from Syria and Transjordan totalling 30,000 pounds. Salesmen for American and English firms handling the same line of goods show no commensurate increase in orders indicating that the Arabs are beginning to do without manufactured goods rather than shift trade to non-Jewish firms.

A large Haifa jobber of European made goods, who is suffering from the boycott, says that the Arab retailers are ordering direct from Europe. Inquiry among druggists indicates that they are badly hit. The Arabs are spreading rumors that the Jewish pharmacists are compounding poisonous prescriptions. An Arab woman buying medicine at a Jewish pharmacy insisted that the druggist taste it first before she accepted it. The Arabs asked a Christian chemist in the German colony to assure them that the prescriptions of the Jewish doctors are not poisonous.

The condition is beneficiary to the Christians since no new Arab shops have been opened. The Christian shops are enjoying a rushing business. The belief is current among Jewish merchants that the banks are cutting Jewish credits more drastically than business conditions justify. Barclay's Bank is said to be the only non-Jewish bank giving the Jewish merchants fair treatment.

Retail merchants are asking for a fund for long term loans to help them struggle through the boycott which in their opinion is bound to collapse in six months.

Wholesalers and manufacturers are seeking a way out by dumping huge quantities of goods in Syria and Egypt at lower prices. By this step they believe they can break the boycott and prevent the flooding of the home market and the bringing of industry to a standstill.

Merchants and industrialists want assistance in this program with loans or subsidies from the reconstruction fund. They argue that while physical rebuilding is necessary it should not be limited to agricultural and personal property but that industry is entitled

to similar help in reconstruction through exporting its surplus at low prices.

It is impossible to deny that there is considerable pessimism in industrial circles because of the boycott but the business men and industrialists are manifesting the same determination as the agriculturists, to fight through to the end.

ARRAIGN USE OF "JEW" OR "HEBREW" IN DESIGNATING POLITICAL GROUPS Memorial Services for Louis Marshall and Felix Fuld at N. J. State "Y" Convention (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Jersey City, Nov. 12.—The use of the name, Jew or Hebrew, in connection with any political group, club or organization, was severely arraigned and condemned at the 18th annual convention of the New Jersey Federation of Y.M.H.A.'s and Y.W.H.A.'s, which was held in the Jersey City Community Centre Sunday night. Delegates from practically every community in New Jersey attended.

A conspicuous feature of the convention was the joint memorial service held for the late Louis Marshall and Felix Fuld. More than 800 attended the memorial service, which was addressed by Supreme Court Judge Samuel Kalisch of Newark, Rabbi Nathan Krass, Judge Irving Lehman, and Judge William Newcorn of Plainfield.

Philip H. Bruskin of New Brunswick was elected president. Other officers chosen were Philip Diamond of Paterson, first vice-president; Michael A. Stavitsky of Newark, second vice-president; Harry Goldowsky, Jersey City, third vice-president; Mrs. Charles Fishberg, Englewood, recording secretary; Mrs. Leo Jacobson, Perth Amboy, financial secretary; J. Jerome Schneiderman, Bayonne, treasurer.

In his report to the delegates, E. J. London, field secretary for New Jersey of the Jewish Welfare Board, reported that there are now community centres functioning in a score of municipalities throughout the state.

BERLIN NOTARY AND WIFE COMMIT SUICIDE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Nov. 12.—Siegfried Aron, prominent Berlin notary and his wife, committed suicide here. Aron, who was once very wealthy, had lost his entire fortune during the inflation period. Some time ago he defrauded a philanthropic institution of 500,000 marks which was destined for the care of orphans, whereupon he fled.

Riots Seized as Opportunity to Propagate Arab Unity

Beirut, Oct. 15.—The recent Palestine riots have been seized by the Syrian nationalists as an opportunity to propagate the Arab idea of solidarity and the idea of the unity of the Moslem countries of the Near East. The Arab press of Damascus and Beirut have been publishing highly exaggerated reports of the Palestine troubles. They systematically described the situation in Palestine as being the reverse of the truth, viz., that the Arabs are the victims of savage assaults of the Jews, and that the latter are profaning the harem, killing defenseless Moslem women and children. Some papers even dare to represent the Hebrew atrocities as having been committed by Jews against the Arabs. Such continual false propaganda resulted in great excitement among the Moslems of this country and particularly those of the interior. The climax of the effervescence was reached when all the local press published at the same time, (a fact which leads one to believe that there existed an organized false press propaganda) that the Jews threw bombs on the Mosque of Omar and destroyed it.

The city of Damascus closed for three consecutive days, and the nationalists were organizing protest meetings and manifestations. Beirut and Aleppo and very soon all the cities of Syria joined the movement. In every place Arab manifestations and protest meetings were organized, which led to the belief that an inevitable general Syrian upheaval was at hand. The French authorities who at first adopted a passive attitude were compelled, in view of the approaching danger, to react energetically, prohibiting rigorously any new manifestations.

Great panic reigned all the time in the Jewish communities of the country and particularly in Damascus and Aleppo and where the Arab nationalists are very numerous and influential.

The French authorities, fearing an attack on the Jewish community of Damascus guarded the Jewish quarter by means of French troops and tanks during the three days of the manifestations. Two Jewish young men, Dr. Shallouh, a dentist, and a certain Joseph Kayat, who by no means represent either the Jewish community of Damascus or its youth, published in the Arab press a circular declaring that the Jews of Damascus had nothing to do with the Zionists in Palestine.

A similar declaration was issued by the frightened Jews of Aleppo.

In Beirut things were different for the Jewish community, and more serious. This was due first of all to the presence of a branch of the Anglo-Palestine Co., Ltd., and secondly to a recent incident that had occurred with the editor of "Al-Ahrar," the most in-

able end is by a centralized federation. Although the Committee is well aware that many difficulties will be met in the attempt to unify the city's Jewish social agencies into one central organization, it is of the opinion that none of the obstacles are insurmountable. The Committee expects the process of merging the two large federations to be a gradual one.

Interesting statistics concerning the Jewish population of New York are also revealed in the Communal Survey. According to these figures there are now 1,835,000 Jews in the five boroughs. It is apparent from the population statistics by boroughs that in the last ten years the Jewish population has spread from Manhattan into Brooklyn and the Bronx. Based on the drift of population as now apparent, the Survey prognosticates that the population of New York will be distributed in 1930 as follows: Manhattan, 400,000, or a decrease of 100,000 from 1925; Brooklyn, 916,000, an increase of 116,000; Bronx, 500,000, or an increase of 110,000; Queens, 75,000, a gain of 19,000, and Richmond 5,000, a gain of 1,500.

Although the Jewish population of the city has been increasing rapidly, there has been a commensurate rise in the scale of living, too. The Survey points out that the Jews of New York are moving to less crowded and more comfortable homes in the outlying sections of the city. In Manhattan there has been marked falling off in the Jewish population of every section, with the exception of Washington Heights, while a notable increase has been noted everywhere in the Bronx and in all sections but two in Brooklyn.

The picture of Jewish social work in New York, according to the report, "is one for thoughtful consideration and also for a great deal of pride. It has its vague and groping outlines, its unfinished spots, its areas of duplication; but it has as well its highlights of achievement. It is a picture, generally speaking, of an economically poor, but young, vigorous and ambitious group, which has taken advantage of the opportunities in a new country, has struggled up to a considerably higher scale of living than it enjoyed when it first came, and has shown a disposition to bear an increasing share of community responsibility.

"It shows, too, an ever smaller number of families dependent on charitable aid, and an ever larger amount given to those who receive it. It reveals a continually more scientific approach to the problems of the dependent, the delinquent and the physically handicapped, and the gradual development of a specialized technique in dealing with these problems. The survey finally points to a need for greater unification and coordination of all lines of Jewish social work to promote efficiency, prevent overlapping, and plan intelligently for future developments."

fluent and most important paper in Syria. Mr. Tueni, editor of the "Ahrar," presented himself in June last to the elections of the Chamber of Deputies of the Lebanese Republic. He applied to the Jews then, requesting their votes. They refused to comply with his request, explaining to him frankly the reason; viz. his blind systematic attitude towards Jews in general. When the Palestine troubles broke out, and Arab excitement was reaching its highest pitch in Syria, Mr. Tueni took his revenge in attacking the Jewish community of Beirut as being purely Zionist and consequently anti-Syrian. Some other Arab papers, the most conspicuous of which was the "Balah," followed the example of the "Ahrar." The "Balah" went so far as to ask the Jews to leave the country.

All these press attacks were published at the time of the general excitement of the country and when the Moslems of Beirut were organizing public meetings and manifestations. The Jewish Communal Council paid a visit to the Grand Mufti of Beirut and while directing his attention to the aggressive attacks of the local press against the Jews, requested him to use his influence with the organizers of the public meetings and manifestations with a view to avoiding any eventual aggressions being committed against the Jews of Beirut.

The French authorities on their part, took all the necessary measures for the protection of the Jewish quarter of Beirut during these critical days, and no untoward accident had to be registered.

MAINE ZIONISTS HOLD ANNUAL CONVENTION

Bangor, Me., Nov. 12—The annual Zionist convention of the State of Maine was held November 10 at Lewiston with 100 delegates and 200 guests present. Sessions were held at Ohel Jacob synagogue. Myer Minsky, president, read reports on the activities of Maine Zionists and announced that the Jews of Maine had contributed \$20,000 to Palestine during the past year.

Judge Max Pinansky was elected honorary president. Myer Minsky was re-elected president, Charles Green of Biddeford and Harry Stern of Waterville were chosen vice-presidents, Sarah Cohen of Portland, secretary, and Moe Rudman of Bangor, treasurer.

RABBI GOLDMAN AT WAR MEMORIAL DEDICATION

Providence, R. I., Nov. 12—Rabbi Israel Goldman of Temple Emanu-El represented the Jewish community of Providence at the dedication of the War Memorial on Armistice Day. Sol Bromson was chairman of the day.

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ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION AIDS PALESTINE HEALTH

A fellowship in sanitary engineering has been granted by the Rockefeller Foundation to a native of Palestine who, after a period of special study in the United States, returned during the past year to the post of engineer in the malaria survey section of the Palestinian Department of Health, according to the annual report of the Rockefeller Foundation.

It is expected that he will assume some of the functions of the Foundation's engineer, who withdrew from Palestine at the end of the year. From 1918 to 1928 there has been a marked downward trend of malaria in Palestine, as shown by a decrease in the malaria deaths and the percentage of palpable spleens. In some places—for example, in Jerusalem—the decrease can be justifiably attributed to antilarval measures; in the country as a whole, however, there are not sufficient data available to deduce with certainty what part of the malaria reduction has been accomplished by such efforts.

ZIONIST ROLL CALL RALLY AT TEMPLE EMANU-EL

A rally for the National Zionist Roll Call will be held at Temple Emanu-El Community House, 1 East 65th Street, Sunday evening, November 17. The meeting, which is to be held under the auspices of the Yorkville-Harlem Zionist districts, will work out a plan of cooperation for all West Side congregations, societies and young people's groups so that the West Side may secure its full quota for the Roll Call. Speakers will be Rabbi Joseph Silverman, Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Emanu-El, Maurice Bloch, minority leader of the Assembly, and Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt.

\$17,750 ADDED TO EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND

Although the Palestine Emergency Fund Campaign was officially closed on November 2, additional contributions totaling \$17,750 were received this week, according to David A. Brown, chairman. This raises the total to \$236,768.

FRATERNITY TO MAKE AWARD TO JEWISH PHYSICIAN

Pittsburgh, Nov. 12—The 1929 award to the American Jewish physician who makes the greatest individual contribution to the progress of medicine will be made at the annual convention of the Phi Lambda Kappa medical fraternity which will meet in Pittsburgh December 27-29. The 1928 award was given to Dr. Solomon Solis-Cohen of Philadelphia.
