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EFFECTS OF CHIEF RABBINATE OF CONSTANTINOPLE AUCTIONED BY GOVERNMENT

Action Taken Because of Failure to
Pay Tax on Amounts Received in
Donations; Community Aroused

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Nov. 13.—The entire inventory of the Chief Rabbinate has been sold at public auction by the government because the Rabbinate has been unable to pay five thousand Turkish liras as income tax on amounts that the Rabbinate received during the past years as various donations. Fortunately, the bulk of the auctioned articles have been purchased by Jews, who have presented them to the Rabbinate.

But the fact remains that the government's demands for an income tax on donations made for religious purposes as well as the irrelevance shown to the Jewish religion, as demonstrated by the public sale of the belongings of the Rabbinate, created a great excitement among the Jewish population. Many articles belonging to the Jewish hospital Or Chaim were similarly auctioned because the institution, supported by private subscriptions, has been unable to raise its tax of 30,000 Turkish liras.

JEWISH COMMUNIST KILLED BY KULAKS

Moscow, Nov. 13.—Michael Rostshin, a noted Jewish Communist, was killed by kulaks in the village of Maniaki in the Klintzi region while traveling through the villages to collect grain for the government. The murderers, who have been arrested, will probably be sentenced to death.

SIR JOHN MONASH GETS RANK OF GENERAL

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 13.—Sir John Monash, distinguished Australian Jewish leader and commander of the Australian forces in France, has been promoted to the rank of General. His elevation marks the first time that the rank of General has appeared in the Australian Army list.

BERLIN UNIVERSITY TO DISCIPLINE ANTI-SEMITES

Berlin, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of the Berlin University senate, it was unanimously decided to severely punish the leaders of the anti-Semitic student riots. A great number of students are to be disciplined, among them also the Volkist student leader, Hoppe.

JAFFA ARABS NOT REALLY ALARMED; STIMULATED TO ATTACK JEWS BY MOSLEM AGITATORS, DISTRICT POLICE OFFICER TESTIFIES

Quigley, in Charge of Jaffa and Tel Aviv District, Tells Inquiry Commission Police Knew of Imminence of Attack: Days Before Occurrence; Agitators Led by Hamdi Hussein, Communist; and Anti-Imperialist; Arab Counsel Try to Palm Off Book on Jewish Self-Defense in Ukraine, 10 Years Ago, as Description of Jewish Self-Defense in Palestine Riots; Duplicity Discovers

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Jerusalem, Nov. 13.—Arab agitators, led by Hamdi Hussein, leader of a small section of Arab Communists, and representative of the Anti-Imperialism League, were charged with responsibility for arousing the Arabs of Jaffa to fall upon the Jews of the municipality, spreading their bloody trail to Tel Aviv, by Police Officer Quigley, who was in charge of the Jaffa and Tel Aviv Districts, during the riots.

Testifying before the Commission of Inquiry yesterday, Quigley, under cross-examination by Viscount Erleigh, associate counsel for the Jewish Agency, stated the Arabs of Jaffa were not really alarmed, but were worked up into a restless state by agitators making full use of the Wailing Wall situation and alleging that the British and the Jews were oppressing the Arabs.

Hamdi, he emphasized, used every occasion to cause trouble on religious pretexts, which is the only way of causing trouble in this country. The Arab agitator, the witness declared, who traveled to Frankfurt to attend a meeting of the Anti-Imperialism League, had since his return used every religious pretext to foment trouble, inciting in particular the Moslem youth, who respond absolutely to his orders, despite the efforts of the moderates.

Quigley admitted that the police had indications that trouble was brewing as early as August 22nd, declaring that all the Moslems of Jaffa were urged to attend the Mosques on August 22, an order which the police regarded as a serious sign of trouble, and which was followed by the departure of both the Jews and the Arabs from the mixed quarter on the border line between Jaffa and Tel Aviv. Quigley's admission was made after Erleigh had read into the record excerpts from articles in the Hebrew publications "Davar" and "Ha-Aretz," as early as August 21, proving that there had been sufficient advance information of the imminence of the riots in Jaffa and Tel Aviv, fomented there, as elsewhere, by the Arab leaders' report Jews were attacking Moslems and the Moslem Holy places.

Quigley denied, under cross-examination, as had been charged by the Arabs, that the Jews had been armed

by the government, and that dressed in military, they fired upon the Arabs, one Jewish policeman even being committed to trial for such an offense. He declared as untrue that Jewish Communists were behind the Wailing Wall protest.

A characteristic example of Arab methods was offered at the sitting of the Inquiry Commission yesterday, when the Arab counsel attempted to palm off an illustrated booklet, describing the activity of the Jewish self-defense against the pogroms in the Ukraine, ten years ago, as a description of the activities of the Jewish self-defense in Palestine, during the riots. The duplicity was disclosed through the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

During Stoker's examination of Quigley, on the subject of the self-defense measures taken by the Jews during the attacks on Jaffa and Tel Aviv, Maughan, secretary of the Arab Executive, and assistant to Stoker, handed—

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COMMUNISTS AND BUNDISTS RIOT OVER BAKERS' STRIKE

Warsaw, Nov. 13.—Bloody fights between Communists and Bundists occurred today because the Communists called a strike of bakery workers while the Bundists' food union was opposed to the strike, considering it unfavorable to the workers' interests. The Communists rioted at the bakery of Isaac Freund, seriously wounding the Bundist Jewish workers Solomon Rosenberg and Hersch Olbarg, and a Christian worker, Julian Kolodziejiski.

The Communists also attacked the workers in other factories, but were repulsed by the Bundists. The police intervened in the riots and arrested several of the participants.

COURT REFUSES TO RELEASE HALSMANN ON BAIL

Vienna, Nov. 13.—The Court has refused to release on bail Philip Halsmann, sentenced to four years imprisonment on a charge of patricide, on the grounds that he might escape while free on bail.

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REPRESENTATIVES OF 3 RELIGIONS MEET TO DISCUSS TOLERANCE

Round Table Discussions at Harvard
by 500 Representatives of Jewish,
Catholic and Protestant Faiths

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cambridge, Nov. 14—The last of a series of round table discussions having for their object the mitigation of the age-old problems of religious intolerance will be concluded today at Harvard University by about 500 laymen and clergymen representing Jewish, Catholic and Protestant denominations. The discussions have been held under the auspices of the Calvert Round Table of Boston, comprised of 100 adherents of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant faiths who would promote an understanding and the eradication of religious animosities between the various religious groups.

At one of the earlier discussions Rabbi Harry Levi of Temple Israel, Brooklyn, said that the day which saw members of the three main religious groups meeting to discuss such a problem had taken so long to materialize that the occasion was one for humiliation rather than jubilation.

President A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard, one of the three speakers at the opening session, sounded the keynote of the entire series when he said: "Does loyalty to a nation or a church imply ill will to a rival? If that trait cannot be changed, our civilization can not progress to a better stage. If this is true that loyalty must be accompanied by hostility to those trying to get on in the same way, then man moves in a dismal circle. What is needed is to arouse religious fervor without religious rancor, religious sympathy, not religious antagonism."

One of the features of the discussion was an extremely frank discussion of the topics of "Misrepresentations of Religious Beliefs and Practices" and "Community Conflict and Cooperation" in which 490 representatives of the three religions participated.

FORMER LLOYD GEORGE SPOKESMAN INDICTS PAL- ESTINE ADMINISTRATION

Demands Withdrawal of 1922 White
Paper, and Earnest Effort to
Establish Jewish State

That when the Balfour Declaration was given to the Jewish people, it was implied that ultimately a Jewish state would be established in Palestine, is the gist of an article by Herbert Sidebotham, once spokesman for Lloyd George, during whose premiership the Balfour Declaration was issued, appearing in this week's "New Palestine."

Mr. Sidebotham points out that although more than eleven years have elapsed since the Turk lost control of the Holy Land, the Jews today are less secure than they were under the Moslem yoke. While England's Mandate task has been easy physically, says Mr. Sidebotham, and while Palestine has not cost the British taxpayer a single penny since 1923, recent events there lead to the inevitable conclusion that either the English are less competent to govern the country than the Turks, or that for some reason England has not put her heart into the work.

That the second is the true explanation, Mr. Sidebotham has no doubt. He blames the English administration in Palestine for the troubles, and not the Arabs. His most interesting statement is that when the Mandate promise was given, the ultimate ideal was the establishment of a Jewish state in Palestine.

To quote Mr. Sidebotham, "it is not the Arabs, poor dupes, who are on trial, but the British administration; and the charge is a very definite one, namely that there has been sufficient disloyalty in the administration to produce all the effects of a breach of trust and to fasten on the good name of England the suspicion of

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AARON BRENNER RELEASED BY BANDITS IN CHINA

London, Nov. 13—Aaron Brenner, the New York Jewish furrier, who had been kidnapped and held for high ransom by bandits in China, was released this morning. Brenner, a member of Brenner Bros. of New York, has been in China for several years. His kidnappers are said to have been a band of Russian refugees from Harbin.

His captors had permitted Brenner to communicate with the authorities at Tien Tsin and with his brother Joseph, who is also in that city, in order to ask for \$250,000 ransom. Brenner's letters told of death threats unless the ransom was paid or if information about his plight was given to the papers or the police.

Secretary of State Stimson had been in receipt of a telegram from the American consul at Tien Tsin informing the State Department that all efforts were being made to discover the whereabouts of Brenner.

He had been held captive for nearly a week.

JUNIOR ORT WOMEN TO RUN ORT TOOL SUPPLY COMPANY FOR A DAY

Mrs. Ruth Berke Leads Group Which
Will Conduct Organization's
Business Today

To come closer to the workings of the industrial relief program carried out by the Ort for destitute Jews abroad, the young women who form the Junior Ort, will take over for today, the Ort Tool Supply Company, at 331 Madison Avenue. They will run the business, which buys machinery from American manufacturers, ships it to destitute Jewish families in countries of Eastern Europe, and receives payment, frequently on the instalment plan, from Americans who order the equipment for their impoverished kin abroad.

Mrs. Ruth Berke, president of the young women's group, will be in charge of "Junior Ort Day" today. She will be assisted by her fellow officers, Miss Rose Katz, vice-president; Miss Katherine Frank, Miss Billie Wachstetter, and Miss Sylvia Lack, secretaries; and Miss Elita Frankel, treasurer; and Miss Laura Kline, Miss Jeanne Gindgold, and Miss Min Rich.

Part of the young people's work today will consist in explaining to American residents who wish to send machines to their relatives abroad, how to instruct their distant kin to make applications for the machinery in the towns in Eastern Europe, where they live. They must set forth the kind of machine they want, their need of a means of earning a living, and what industry they intend to enter.

The Tool Supply Company is one of the agencies of the American Ort, the Society for the Promotion of Agricultural and Technical Trades among the Jews of Eastern Europe, to relieve destitution abroad through industrialization rather than charity. Funds to finance it come from the Ort Campaign for Industrial Reconstruction, of which Howard S. Cullman, Commissioner of the Port Authority of New York, is national chairman, and Paul Felix Warburg, national treasurer.

JONAH GOLDSTEIN RETURNS FROM PALESTINE TOUR

The general condition of Palestine is tranquil and the better class of Arabs seem to want to get along amicably with the Jews as they had done for centuries in the past, said Jonah J. Goldstein, New York lawyer, on his return from Palestine Tuesday where he had been for two months making arrangements for the distribution of the \$2,000,000 emergency fund raised by the Palestine Emergency Fund.

"The recent rioting in Jerusalem has not broken the spirit of the Jews," said Mr. Goldstein to a representative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

Mr. Goldstein, who was met at the pier as the "Majestic" docked, by Felix Warburg and Louis Lipsky, has appointed local committees in the central towns of Palestine to handle the distribution of the fund. A report of his activities will be given to Mr. Warburg.

ed him a book in Hebrew, purporting to be a description of the Jewish self-defense. Stoker showed the illustrations to Quigley, who remarked they looked like military. At this point the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent informed Sir Boyd Merriman, counsel for the Jewish Agency, that while the book had been printed in Tel Aviv, it was a description of the Jewish self-defense corps in the Ukraine, ten years ago. Merriman challenged the Arab counsel, and Stoker, shamefacedly, put the book down.

Quigley said that he knew nothing definite about the Jewish self-defense, except that he had heard of its existence, and that he believed it to be a part of the general labor organization. He declared that he had never heard of the self-defense making inflammatory speeches.

Stoker insisted upon making the most of the murder of an Arab family in Jaffa. At this Erleigh had declared he had no intention of defending the murder of the Arab family, except to say that it followed upon the killing of four Jews and the wounding of five, who had come to rescue the marooned Jews, among them Benjamin Goldberg, son of the well known Russian Zionist, Isaac Goldberg. He declared that the Acting Mayor of Tel Aviv, Rokeach, immediately after its occurrence, expressed Jewish abhorrence at the crime.

Quigley said that there had been other allegations against the Jews, including the looting of four Arab houses.

The attempt of Stoker to show that there was Jewish provocation, during the Arab demonstration at the Jaffa Mosque on August 25, was made light of by Quigley, who said that while some Jews were there, they did no harm, and although they did no good to themselves, they did nothing irritating or annoying.

To Stoker's query, whether the Jews were armed and whether they used hand grenades, Quigley answered: "We captured four rifles and two revolvers at a Jewish house, near the borderline between Jaffa and Tel Aviv, otherwise the Jews were at no time armed, not even the Jewish police. On the other hand, we also captured one rifle and four revolvers from the Arabs."

Quigley's only reference to the historic defense of the colony of Hulda, where a small band of Jewish colonists beat off a horde of Arab attackers with but a single casualty, was that eighteen rifles had been found in the colony, which had defended itself, but later had been evacuated and burned. Quigley showed a surprising ignorance of what both Jewish and Arab leaders said and printed. He declared he never saw the two notices issued by the municipality of Tel Aviv on August 25, urging the inhabitants to remain

quiet and observe national discipline. "They were very proper documents to issue, were they not?" asked Erleigh. "Yes," was Quigley's reply. He also told Stoker that he had never seen the manifesto of the Grand Mufti urging the Arabs to keep peace.

Referring to the rescue party led by Benjamin Goldberg, who was killed, Quigley asserted that the rescue attempt was unnecessary, because an armored car had orders to rescue the marooned Jews, which it subsequently did. Goldberg was told not to go, but the rescuing party, not knowing the way, rode straight into the Arab village to destruction.

He said that Jaffa is an excitable town, and the principal preoccupation of the police was to keep it from attacking Tel Aviv, which it adjoins.

He denied knowledge that an Arab protest demonstration had occurred in Ludd, which is in his district, or that there were ominous indications in Petach Tikvah, such as the departure of the Arabs and their women from the colony, after demanding pay.

Stoker's attempt to mystify the Commission with the resolutions adopted by a big Jewish protest meeting in Tel Aviv, was countered by Sir Boyd Merriman with the offer to read the resolutions into the record. The resolutions adopted, protested to the gov-

HADASSAH OPENS ITS 15th ANNUAL CONVENTION IN ATLANTIC CITY TODAY

300 Delegates, Representing 36 States,
Expected to Register; Sessions
Continue Until Sunday

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Atlantic City, Nov. 14.—American women Zionists are gathered here for the opening today of the fifteenth annual convention of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, in the Hotel Ambassador. Three hundred members of Hadassah are expected to register as delegates, representing 40,000 American Jewish women in thirty-six states. Sessions will continue until Sunday.

As the first Zionist convention in America since the recent disturbances in Palestine, it is attracting wide attention among American Jews. Representatives will attend from a number of other women's organizations.

"This convention will undoubtedly be one of the most vital Hadassah has ever had," said Mrs. Robert Szold, acting national president. "It is of special significance, occurring as it does since the recent riots in Palestine and during a period of revival and reconstruction there. The health of the people of Palestine has suffered much because of deprivations and abnormal living conditions during and since the riots. Hadassah conducts the largest public health agency in Palestine, and as such its responsibilities have greatly increased. Preventive care among infants and children is of primary importance. We hope during the coming year to enlist the active interest of thousands of American women in our medical and health work in Palestine, which we conduct alike for all creeds."

Preliminary meetings were held yesterday. A regional institute took place in the afternoon and a national board meeting at night. The members of the national board gave a dinner to the delegates attending the Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations, being held in this city.

The convention speakers will be Mrs. Robert Szold, acting national president; Miss Henrietta Szold, dean of American women Zionists and founder of Hadassah; Mrs. Rebekah Kohut, author, Mrs. Rose Halprin, who spent six months in Palestine, and Dr. Nathan Ratnofsky, chairman of American Jewish Physicians' Committee. Mrs. Felix Warburg will be a guest of the convention.

Reports will be given on all branches of Hadassah public health work in Palestine and fund-raising and cultural activities in America. Decisions will be made on proposals for expansion in certain phases of the work and budgets for all funds will be determined.

Mrs. Samuel Shile, president of the Atlantic City chapter of Hadassah, will welcome the delegates.

either incompetence or ill will."

In tracing English responsibility for the recent outbreaks, Mr. Sidebothom explains that the tendency of the Palestine administration to compromise, the fat lies about the expense of Palestine to British taxpayers and the unpopularity of Lloyd George all contributed to the conspiracy of silence broken only by the whittling down of the big ideal of which England had been appointed guardian.

A misreading of the Arab character, the anti-Zionist bias of the old-time population of Jerusalem, and the undercurrent of opposition to Zionism on the part of the Palestine administration are also blamed for the recent outbreaks by Mr. Sidebothom.

Mr. Sidebothom not only criticizes, but he offers some suggestions for reform, among which are the withdrawal of the Colonial Office Memorandum of 1922, in which the National Home promise was whittled down as a sop to the Arabs, the avowal by England of its intention to create in the future a Jewish state in Palestine, the establishment of a police force on which the government can rely, a purging of the administration to get rid of those unsympathetic to the policy of the Mandate and lastly a new High Commissioner, for which place he suggests General Smuts.

CHICAGO JEWISH CHARITIES SEEK 5,000 NEW MEMBERS (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Nov. 13.—The official opening of the drive for additional members of the Jewish Charities of Chicago got under way yesterday at the Standard Club. The campaign committee, headed by Max Adler, hopes to enroll 5,000 new members. The fact that 3 per cent of the Jewish Charities' members now contribute about 63 per cent of its revenue is responsible for the membership drive, since the loss of one or two of the key members would work havoc with the Charities' resources. Seventeen philanthropic organizations in this city are affiliated with the Charities.

ABYSSINIAN GOVERNMENT DECORATES DR. FAITLOVITCH

The Abyssinian government has bestowed a decoration of an officer of the "Order of the Ethiopian Star" upon Dr. Jacques Faitlovitch, the international explorer and executive director of the work among the Falashas in Abyssinia, conducted under the auspices of the American Pro-Falasha Committee, according to an announcement yesterday from the Committee's office in New York.

Dr. Faitlovitch has made six expeditions into Abyssinia, during which he made scientific studies of the Falasha, a people that has observed the Jewish faith for over 2,000 years. King Tafari Makonen of Abyssinia had previously granted Dr. Faitlovitch a personal contribution towards his explorations.

PHILA. A. T. T. MARKS TENTH ANNIVERSARY (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—With the annual meeting and election of officers of the Associated Talmud Torahs held November 10, at Jewish Educational Center No. 2, the Jewish community of Philadelphia brought to a close the tenth anniversary celebration of the founding of the Associated Talmud Torahs, a constituent of the Federation of Jewish Charities.

ernment against the attack at the Wailing Wall, demanded the resignation of the Palestine officials responsible for retarding the upbuilding of a Jewish state; proposed a commission to inquire into the rights of the Jews to their Holy places; and endorsed the activities of the Wailing Wall Committee headed by Dr. Klausner.

Merriman also read the by-laws of the Brith Trumpeldor Association, which has been under attack by the Moslems, which revealed that it is a group numbering 250 members, devoted to physical, moral and mental upbuilding.

Vincent Sheean, Palestine correspondent of the North American Newspaper Alliance, testified before the Inquiry Commission that on Tish Ab he went to the Wailing Wall with a Jewish of his acquaintance, who told him that three-quarters of the chaluzim were arriving armed and that there would be trouble. He stayed at the Wailing Wall for a few hours and saw some Jewish worshippers and many chaluzim, none of whom carried sticks and only one a revolver. Although no trouble occurred, Sheean said that the chaluzim were in a fighting mood.

One Arab crossed the Wailing Wall area several times, until he was escorted away by the police, said Sheean who was informed by his friend, the Jewess, that there would be trouble on the following day, but he did not return to the Wailing Wall the next day.

Mr. Sheean, who is also correspondent for the New York "World," testified that he discontinued his cables to the North American Newspaper Alliance because there had been Jewish demonstrations outside of the World Building in New York. He explained this action by saying that he did not want to hurt the paper by cables unfriendly to Zionism. Mr. Sheean admitted that he arrived in Palestine with friendly feelings toward Zionism, but that such sentiments were now non-existent where he was concerned.
