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Great Britain Likely to Accept Balfour's and Lloyd George's Plan for Palestine Inquiry

"Sunday Times" Says No Possibility
of England Renouncing Mandate
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 23—It appears fairly certain that the British government, which has noted the joint letter from Lord Balfour, David Lloyd George and General Jan Christian Smuts, calling for a new Palestine commission to study the workings of the Mandate, will take the advice offered by the three statesmen, who were members of the war-time cabinet that issued the Balfour Declaration.

An editorial in the "Sunday Times" warns against permitting the letter to be interpreted as a suggestion of the failure of the British Mandate policy. The "Sunday Times" points out that the Mandate has not yet had a proper chance and that the commission now sitting in Palestine is not suited to reporting on a high policy like the Mandate. The editorial goes on to say that there is no possibility of Great Britain renouncing the Palestine trust, for such a resignation would only place another power in the position of the Palestine mandator, which, in view of British interests in the Suez Canal, is not allowable.

"A wholly Arab independent Palestine would not last three years. An Arab Palestine under British protection would be a financial burden to Great Britain, something which it is not in Zionism. If Zionism were non-existent British interests would require British intervention in Palestine."

Galician Rabbis Ask Appointed Religious Council, Fearing Radicals May Be Elected

Warsaw, Dec. 23—A request not to call an election of the Jewish Religious Council, for fear that radical elements will be elected, was made to President Moscicki today by a delegation of the Galician Rabbinical Union, which was received by the President. The delegates asked that the government should appoint the members of the Council.

The members of the Jewish Religious Council, who serve in the capacity of advisory council to the Minister of Religion in matters of interest to Judaism and to Polish-Jewish problems must be elected, according to the regulations of the Jewish kehillah. The Council consists of 21 members, seven of whom are rabbis.

Jews Rank Second Among Harvard Religious Groups

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 23—The Jews are numerically the second largest religious group among the 52 religious denominations and sects represented at Harvard University, according to a recent survey made by Phillips Brooks House, a Harvard philanthropic organization. The questions as to religious affiliations were asked of more than 8,000 students when they registered last September, and replies were received of 4,702. According to the survey, the Episcopalians lead with 968 students, Jews are second with 735, and the Catholics are third with 695.

Students Invade Bucharest National Theatre Protesting Against Jewish Stage Star

Vienna, Dec. 23—According to reports received here, anti-Semitic riots broke out in Bucharest Friday night. Students invaded the Bucharest National Theatre and interrupted the performance, as protest against a Jewish actress playing the leading part.

The French ambassador who attended the performance of the French play, "The Awakening of Love," given at the National Theatre, demonstratively left the play-house in protest against the students' rioting.

Raszanu Decries Excesses

Vienna, Dec. 23—For the first time a non-Jewish deputy submitted an interpellation regarding Jewish excesses in Roumania when Professor Raszanu of the government party declared during today's session of parliament that the anti-Semitic students "desecrate the name of Roumania abroad." In his speech he discussed the student's disturbance at the national theatre and demanded harsh punishment for the guilty and said it is the duty of the government to free the students from irresponsible agitators.

The French ambassador who demonstratively left the theatre when the riot started today called on Premier Maniu to discuss in parliament the Jewish deputies in parliament, who have daily pointed out the excesses of the students, have been unsatisfied with the replies of the ministers regarding the disturbances and other Jewish problems and through the Jewish Deputies Club have decided to vote against the government.

Revisionists and Jewish Labor Group Grumbling Because All Sides Not Heard at Inquiry

Ruppini and Kisch to Testify in Private;
Report That Freedy May
Not Sum Up

Jerusalem, Dec. 23—As the Jewish case before the Inquiry Commission nears its end there appears to be dissatisfaction in several quarters because of the feeling that all sides have not been presented. While even the "Davar" representative of the labor forces, and an implacable foe of Harry Sacher, chairman of the Palestine Zionist Executive, described the evidence that he gave as "frank, comprehensive, vigorous and proud," the labor organ feels that the ideology of the Jewish pioneering was not prominently featured before the Commission.

The Revisionists are unbittered because their chief, Vladimir Jabotinsky, was not invited to testify. Following the refusal of Sir Boyd Merens, chief of the Jewish counsel, to summon Jabotinsky, the latter wrote to the Commission offering to appear but he declined to hear him before his departure for Europe, holding out, however, the possibility of hearing him in London. Sir Boyd evidently feels it unwise to tax the patience of the Commission, which already has stayed long. (Continued on Page 4)

Urges English Zionists to Defend Rights in Palestine

Jerusalem, Dec. 23—Chief Rabbi Abraham Kook has cabled the English-Zionist Federation, welcoming their meeting for strengthening Hebrew culture and urging them to demand security for life and property, the fulfillment of Jewish rights in Palestine, to protest against murders and lootings and to strengthen the Jewish spirit.

BERLIN KEHILLAH HOST TO HABIMAH PLAYERS

Berlin, Dec. 23—A reception to the Habimah, Hebrew players now in this city, was given yesterday by the Berlin Jewish community at the historic Meeting Hall. The most prominent Jews in the city and a number of noted German stage stars were present. The president of the kehillah, Herr Kareski, lauded the Habimah as the pride of the Jews and intimated that the Berlin kehillah will donate the cornerstone for the Tel Aviv Habimah Theatre for which the municipality of Tel Aviv has donated the site.

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Government Witnesses Tell Commission About Jewish Activities in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 23—At its Saturday afternoon session, the Palestine Investigating Commission heard four government officials comment on statements made by Jewish witnesses about Jewish activities in Palestine. All four witnesses were heard at a secret session.

Mr. Staubbs, the Registrar of Lands, told about the land purchases of Jews in Palestine. Mr. Abramson, chairman of the Colonization Commission, told about the possibilities of Jewish colonization and about the effect it has already had upon the Arabs.

Albert Hyanson, who is Director of Immigration, answered questions concerning Jewish immigration into Palestine. Mr. Davies, Chief of the Palestine Finance Department, told about the capital that Jews have invested in Palestine, according to the evidence presented by Siegfried Hoofen, manager of the Anglo-Palestine Company.

It is regarded as certain now that the Inquiry Commission, which has been in session since October 24, will conclude its hearings by the end of this week.

Anti-Semitic Riots Disturb Agricultural School Classes

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Dec. 23—At Debreczen, a city on the Roumanian-Hungarian border, anti-Semitic student riots broke out at the Agricultural school. Christian students prevented the Jewish students from attending classes.

The rector of the Agricultural school left for Budapest to consult government authorities as to the measures to be taken to restore order.

Asks Moslem-Jewish Agreement Over Wailing Wall Question

A conference of representatives of world Jewry and world Islam should attempt to solve the Wailing Wall question, according to a suggestion made in an editorial in the "Juedische Rundschau," Berlin Zionist organ.

"Judaism as a religious community and Islam as a religious community have until now not had any organized body that could represent them in dealings with the outside world, but their interests are so distinct that the establishment of such authoritative bodies is absolutely possible. It would mean a great progress if this question, about the solution of which the European powers are not agreed and which really lies outside of their jurisdiction, were to be discussed and solved by bodies that are historically the proper ones to solve it.

"Representatives of world Jewry and world Islam should attempt among themselves a solution of the question. Perhaps in this way these bodies could show that they do not need a trusteeship. Let us not waste any more time in waiting until some new international body will take up the question. The sooner this religious strife will have been brought to an end, the better it will be for the entire situation in Palestine."

Jewess Appointed Finance Commissar of Soviet Russia

Moscow, Dec. 23—Vera Yakolevka, who comes from a well-known Jewish family, was yesterday appointed People's Commissar of Finance by the Soviet Union Central Executive Committee. The 44-year-old Jewess thus becomes the first woman member of the Soviet cabinet.

Madame Yakolevka has the difficult task of being responsible for the entire Soviet budget, the largest in the world. She has long been prominent in the Soviet revolution. The new finance commissar joined the revolutionary movement in 1905, when she was only twenty. She was twice expelled from the Nashin district and twice she escaped. Prior to her appointment to the cabinet she was assistant commissar of education.

RABBI SCHAFFRAN DEAD

Bucharest, Dec. 23—Rabbi Bezalel Schaffran, author of a number of well-known Talmudical works, died yesterday in Baku, at the age of 70. The entire Jewish population there is in mourning.

Student Publications at Hebrew University Will Be Censored
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 23—Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University, has issued an order forbidding the students to publish anything before the secretariat of the University had seen it.

Says German Jews Merit Support for Their Fight Against Rabid Hitlerites

The present menacing growth of anti-Semitism in Germany, as described by Ernst Wallach, vice-president of the Central Association of German-Hebrew Citizens, in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, receives editorial attention in last week's issue of the "Jewish Tribune."

"With a country overburdened with taxes and groaning under the yoke of post-war depression, it is natural for a certain mob element to seek a culprit, real or imaginary, upon whom to vent its woe," says the editorial. "Leaders who cling to their perch only by satisfying the momentary passions of their followers, always manage to provide the culprit. Hitler and his followers have provided anti-Semitism as an outlet for grievances that are too complex to trace the real guilt.

"In the face of this deplorable situation, the Jews of Germany are fortunate in the counteractionary work of the German-Hebrew Association. Supported by 60,000 members, it is fighting the false with truth. There is a desperate defense. They have distributed hundreds of thousands of pamphlets, have held thousands of meetings and enlisted the aid of countless fair-minded Germans who might have been the tools of deception. The German body unquestionably deserves the support of all Jews who are more fortunately placed."

Sokolow Foregoes Visit to Jassy to Prevent Trouble

Bucharest, Dec. 23—Nahum Sokolow, Zionist leader, now visiting in Roumania, has been asked by the police prefect of Kishinev, in the name of Premier Maniu, to abandon his proposed visit to Jassy, because the student disturbances there still continue. The attorney-general of Jassy has made a similar request to the local Zionist federation.

While a large crowd of students awaited his train, Sokolow, according to the request, did not leave the train, but continued on to Bucharest.

While Minister of Education Kostascescu, who is constantly in touch with the situation at Jassy, has informed the striking students, he will close down the University for a whole year unless they maintain order, the students have demanded the resignation of the rector and the introduction of a numerus clausus.

NAME STREET FOR PERETZ

Warsaw, Dec. 23—Sadowa Street in the township of Baranowicz was renamed I. L. Peretz Street, after the famous Yiddish writer of that name. The city council carried through the change by a vote of 15 to 3.

32 Delegates Take Steps to Organize Union of Orthodox Jews in New York City

A first step toward the union of all orthodox Jewry in Greater New York was taken Sunday when delegates representing thirty-two synagogues, with an approximate membership of 10,000 Jews, voted to establish a New York branch of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America.

The meeting was attended by seventy-five representatives of congregations in Manhattan, the Bronx and Brooklyn. Committees were appointed to consider the terms of the federation, to study, define and eliminate the "mushroom" synagogue, and to consider means to aid financially congregations throughout the city. All action taken by the delegates is subject to ratification by the individual synagogues.

Rabbi Jacob Leibowitz, executive director of the Union, explained that the delegates represented only a fraction of New York's orthodox Jews, but that "fully 80 per cent of the 700 congregations in Greater New York are in sympathy with our movement."

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, president of the union and a member of the committee which organized Sunday's conference, told the representatives that "we are here to increase synagogue membership, to better organization and to aid finances."

Dr. Moses Hyamson, rabbi of the Orach Chaim Congregation, pleaded for the need of unity and organization and urged his hearers to work together so that some day "all mankind will form one brotherhood."

Arthur L. Levine, treasurer of the union and chairman of the committee in charge of the conference, who presided Sunday, emphasized the importance of training the young in the tenets of Judaism.

NEW BOOK OF POEMS BY ALEPH KATZ

Aleph Katz, who made Long John Silver and his pirate crew speak Yiddish in his translation of Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island," has now published his latest volume of poems "Akertzeit (Plowing Time)." Mr. Katz is also the author of "A Tale of the Sea." The publisher of the new volume is F. W. Biderman, New York.

Mr. Katz belongs to the modern school of Yiddish poets in America. He is the head of the night staff of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in New York.

Hartman and Reit Added to Congress Committee

Judge Gustave Hartman and Hyman J. Reit have been added to the committee named by Bernard Deutsch, president of the American Jewish Congress, to study conditions in Russia with regard to the persecution of Judaism and Zionism there.

Government Again Bans Use of Temporary Tel Aviv Abattoir (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Dec. 23.—The Jews of this city are again excited over schechita, because the government has forbidden slaughtering at the temporary abattoir, a former leather factory, on the ground that the permission to use the converted tannery, which held good for only a month, has expired.

Plans submitted by the Tel Aviv municipality for a new building to house the abattoir have not yet been approved, nevertheless the ban on the temporary slaughtering house stands. Since the butchers and shoachim are resolved not to return to Jaffa to riot their slaughtering, the Tel Aviv municipality has decided to fight the new order.

Rabbi Charges Anti-Semitism on Michigan University Campus (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Ann Arbor, Mich., Dec. 21.—Declaring that Jewish students are being discriminated against on the campus of the University of Michigan here, Rabbi Adolph G. Fink of the Hillel Foundation, said that "the existence of Jewish and Christian fraternities and sororities, side by side, shows that there is little genuine feeling of good-will among the students."

Rabbi Fink said that Jewish non-sorority women are compelled to go from house to house in search of lodging, being refused on one pretext or another.

While Regent James O. Murfin, speaking at the recent University of Michigan student good-will banquet, declared that universal acceptance of the Golden Rule would solve the religious problem, Rabbi Fink declared that "today only the Romanticist can think that any degree of satisfactory understanding exists among Protestants, Catholics and Jews."

Rabbi Fink called the problem no longer that of the Jews, but a Christian problem. He said: "No group is seeking pity, pardon or a condescending tolerance, but rather a sympathetic understanding, inasmuch as the difference of faiths is not in the essentials but in the material manifestations."

"For the crime of being Jewish," Rabbi Fink concluded, "Jewish students are subjected to spiritual and mental humiliation."

Chicago Clothing Workers' Union Establishes Hillman Fellowship at University (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 23.—Establishment of a graduate fellowship at the University of Chicago by the Chicago joint board of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America was announced by Samuel Levin, Chicago leader of the organization.

The board is providing \$1,000 a year for unbiased and unrestricted research in industrial relations. The fellowship, open to graduate students who have done meritorious work in the field of labor, is to be known as the Sidney Hillman Fellowship, in honor of the president and leader of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers.

The fellowship was offered the University of Chicago in a letter written by Samuel Levin.

"The fellowship," Mr. Levin wrote, "is provided in recognition of the statesmanlike leadership in the labor movement of Sidney Hillman, of his pioneering and his contribution to the betterment of social and industrial relations." The terms outlined by Mr. Levin's letter provide that the fellowship shall be filled on recommendation of the department.

Palliere Speaks at Mid-Winter Regional Conference of Avukah

At the mid-winter regional conference of Avukah, the American Students Zionist Federation, held on Saturday and Sunday, Monsieur Anne Palliere delivered the concluding address last night upon the theme, "The Pillars of Jewish Regeneration." Welcomed by Rabbi Mitchell Salem Fisher, Chairman of the conference, and Samuel Blumenfeld, National President of Avukah, Monsieur Palliere prefaced his address by a greeting spoken in Hebrew, declaring that Jewish regeneration rests upon three pillars—language, law and land.

In the rebirth of Hebrew he saw the first sign of a healthy, normal Jewish life.

Acquitted Arab Murderer Suspect Arrested Again (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 23.—A gold watch and other articles belonging to the murdered Rabbi Kastel were found yesterday in the house of Abdel Hadi, an Arab chauffeur of Hebron. Hadi, who had previously been acquitted of participating in the murder of Rabbi Kastel, has been re-arrested.

Arabs Sentenced for Leading Anti-British Demonstration (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Haifa, Dec. 23.—Two Arabs have been sentenced to three months in prison or a fine of \$125, for heading the anti-government and anti-Zionist demonstration on November 2.

German-Jewish Writer Says Understanding with Arabs At Present Is Impossible

Answering all those Zionists and others who have recently come out for peace between Jews and Arabs, Dr. Aron Sandler, writing in the "Juedische Rundschau," German Zionist weekly of December 3, argues that an agreement between the two peoples in Palestine at present is impossible unless Zionism wishes to surrender everything. He says:

"As everyone knows, the Zionist Actions Committee, the Executive and the Palestine Yishub are agreed that, however necessary it is from an economic, social and cultural point of view to bring about immediately a better understanding between Jews and Arabs, it may on the other hand give rise to the direst consequences if the question of the formation of a parliament at an indefinite date be made the topic of discussions between Arabic and Jewish representatives now. None of the German group who demands such negotiations has any clear ideas as to what we should offer the Arab opponents, those opponents of whom he knows that only one thing will be acceptable to them: the abolition of the Balfour Declaration; those opponents who by means of the lie about the bombardment of the Omar Mosque incited the Arab populace. Every attempt at such negotiations which does not wish to renounce our demand for a strong Jewish immigration, is not only of itself doomed, but must carry with it dire consequences for the near future, since it must be regarded as a reaction to the terroristic acts of the Arabs and as a sign of weakness, and thus give encouragement to new deeds of violence.

"Professor Brodetsky, in his talk here in Berlin, rightly concluded that it is useless to speak of negotiations with the Arabs as long as the Arabic people does not recognize, and does not offer guarantees that it will abide by, the principle of the Jewish homeland in Palestine, the principle of free immigration and of no limitation of Jewish national development in Palestine.

"Those, however, who have lost their belief in political Zionism should state so openly," concluded Dr. Sandler.

ISAAC MIRKIN NAMED TO YESHIVA ISAAC ELCHANAN

Dr. Isaac Mirkin, noted Hebrew scholar and educator, instructor in Mizrahi Teachers Seminary in Jerusalem, has been appointed instructor in Pedagogics and Child Psychology at the Teachers Institute of the Yeshiva Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. Dr. Bernard Revel, president of the faculty, announces for the year 1930. Dr. Mirkin is author of several noted volumes in the fields of Child Psychology and Pedagogics.

... than originally intended and is disappointed because it has not finished in time to return to England for Christmas, with more witnesses than are absolutely necessary.

The evidence to be given today by Dr. Arthur Ruppin, member of the Palestine Zionist Executive, treating of the problem of the 16,000,000 Jews of the world versus the Arab race of a similar number is expected to emphasize the vital necessity of Palestine as the solution of the Jewish problem. He will stress Palestine's limited area compared with that of the neighboring countries, including Transjordan, where the Arabs have been given an opportunity to develop themselves politically and the country economically. Ruppin's evidence will be in secret, which is another cause of complaint, because the evidence offered by the Arabs attacking the Jewish National Home was in public. Col. Frederick H. Kisch will also submit his evidence privately. His testimony will discuss a general scheme of self-defence for the Jewish settlements.

Some bewilderment has been caused by the report that Kenneth Preedy, counsel for the government, will not sum up. The report is particularly surprising in view of the vigorous attacks that have been made on the conduct of the Palestine administration during the disturbances. It is also possible that Sir Boyd Merriam's final address will include an attack on Preedy's advocacy, especially in view of the latter's insinuation that the massacres may have resulted from the Zionist policy. On the other hand it is admittedly difficult for Preedy to sum up without openly taking sides.

Pittsburgh "Y" Gets Second \$150,000 Gift from Edgar Kaufman and His Mother

Pittsburgh, Dec. 23—The second gift of \$150,000 within five years, to the Pittsburgh Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. by Edgar J. Kaufman, president of Kaufman's department store, and his mother, Mrs. Betty W. Kaufman, was announced here today. One hundred thousand dollars of the new gift will be applied to reducing the mortgage indebtedness of the institution, and \$50,000 will be used to liquidate the entire operating deficit of the Association accumulated since the opening of the building in May, 1926.

In 1924 Edgar Kaufman and Mrs. Betty Kaufman gave \$150,000 towards the erection of the Morris Kaufman Memorial Auditorium in the new Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. building. Mr. Kaufman has long been interested in the work of the "Y," and since his first large gift in 1921, he and his mother have given it approximately \$350,000.

Jew Heads New Pittsburgh Good Government Group

Pittsburgh, Dec. 20—A movement to improve the quality of government, municipal, state, and national, by inducing the citizens to perform the duties of citizenship was launched by a score of well-known Pittsburghers at a meeting held in the Pittsburgh Athletic Association when A. Leo Weil, Sr., one of Pittsburgh's leading Jews and prominent barrister of this city, was named president. Weil held the same position in the old Voters' League of Pittsburgh, whose purpose was quite similar to this new organization.

A "Committee of Education on Citizenship" has been organized to start its work in the local schools, settlements, and other agencies having to do with the training of youth.

Included in the preliminary officers already chosen are also Dr. Samuel H. Goldenson, spiritual leader of the Temple Rodef Shalom, and Marcus Aaron, president of the Pittsburgh Board of Public Education.

JEWS LIVE LONGEST

Americans, born of native American parents, have a longer life expectation than persons of any foreign group, excepting Russians, who are mostly Jews in New York state, and who are noted for their longevity, declared C. B. McKenna, in a recent address before the Historical Society of Trinity College, Dublin, as reported in a recent copyrighted dispatch to the New York "Evening Post."

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
