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Julius Rosenwald Marries Mother-in-Law of Son; Ceremony in Philadelphia

Philadelphia, Jan. 8.—Julius Rosenwald, world-famous Jewish philanthropist of Chicago, and chairman of the board of Sears-Roebuck & Company, was married here today to Mrs. Adele Goodkind of St. Paul, the widow of Benjamin Goodkind. The first Mrs. Rosenwald died in Chicago last May. Mr. Rosenwald is 67.

The ceremony, extreme in its simplicity, was performed at 10 A. M. by Judge Horace Stern, chairman of the executive committee of the American Jewish Committee, at "The Meadows," home of Mr. Rosenwald's eldest son, Lessing J. Rosenwald, at Abington, a suburb. Mr. Rosenwald and his bride, who is the mother of Mrs. Lessing Rosenwald, came to Philadelphia from New York last night. They plan to sail from New York tonight for Egypt.

Children of the couple by their first marriages, who were the only attendants at the wedding, accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Rosenwald when they left Philadelphia in a private railroad car today for New York.

Warsaw, Jan. 8.—The new central committee of the Polish Zionist Organization, elected last night after a stormy all-night session, consists entirely of representatives of the Al Hamishmar; those elected include Gruenbaum, Hartglas, Podlizewski, Klumel, Schipper, Elenberg, Landstock, Grawicki, Kirschenbaum and two independents, A. Goldberg and Koerner. The Eth Livnoth and Revisionist groups did not participate in the elections.

Confirm Prison Sentence Imposed on Hitlerite Deputy

Berlin, Jan. 8.—The supreme court of Germany confirmed the punishment of the Hitlerite Deputy, Ley, who was sentenced to pay a thousand marks fine for insulting the Jewish religion, having declared that the Talmud prescribes ritual murder. The judgment of the supreme court is regarded as very important in establishing a principle.

Jewish Population of Hebron Totals Sixteen

Hebron, Jan. 8.—Fifteen Jewish laborers erecting tombstones to the Hebron martyrs and one Jewish policeman, constitute the present Jewish population of Hebron, which has been abandoned by the Jewish survivors. The sixteen inhabitants occupy a deserted Jewish house. The tombmakers, whose safety has been guaranteed by the district commissioner, are excavating for a concrete canal for 59 parallel graves and a concrete pillar with the victims' names, to mark each grave.

Ukrainian Yevsektzia Favors Help for Declassed Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Jan. 8.—The plenary session of the Ukrainian Yevsektzia, considering the situation of the declassified Jews in the Ukraine, adopted a resolution which runs contrary to the White Russian and Moscow Yevsektzias, which have urged the expulsion of Jewish ex-traders from the artels (artisans' cooperatives) and from the land collectives.

The Ukrainian Yevsektzia in its resolution expresses categorical opposition to Moscow and Minsk and demands that the declassified Jews be allowed to enter productive work even when they have no right to vote at Soviet general elections. "The general policy of excluding kulaks (rich peasants) from the artels and land collectives is certainly good, but it should, however, not affect the Jewish declassified or even the Jewish ex-traders without rights," the resolution declares.

Riots in Damascus as New Income Tax Law Functions

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Damascus, Jan. 8.—Indications that political agitation in the Near East is not confined to Palestine alone is seen in the two-day strike and inflammatory speeches at the Mosque that marked the introduction of the income tax with the new year. Energetic police measures dispersed the demonstrators, and a number of ringleaders were arrested.

Syrian papers see a repercussion of the events in India on the entire Middle East, asserting that the liberation of India spells the beginning of freedom for the entire East.

The Arab Executive in Jerusalem has sent congratulations to Nasa Pasha on the victory of the Waft in Egypt.

Congress Hears Proposal for Impartial Palestine Inquiry With America Represented

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Jan. 8.—Proposing the appointment of an impartial commission, on which the United States would be represented by at least one member, for investigation of the causes of the Palestine disorders and for recommendation of remedies for the future, Congressman Samuel Dickstein of New York, yesterday, in the first speech so far made in Congress regarding the Palestine outbreak, called upon Great Britain to establish a Jewish militia in Palestine as part of the regular police force, to permit the Jews to arm themselves under proper safeguards, to punish all of the guilty, beginning with the attackers and instigators and ending with the government officials unfaithful to their duty and to compensate the victims of the outrages and rebuild the destroyed buildings at government expense.

Referring to the connection of the United States with the Palestine situation, Representative Dickstein said, "the American people and the American Congress have a decided duty to take a hand in the solution of this muddle. We must in the first place protect the lives of American citizens who may go to Palestine and in the second place we must protect the investment of American capital which was made in Palestine. The government has heretofore represented to Great Britain that it will not permit the killings of

League Council to Discuss Wailing Wall Commission

Geneva Jan. 8.—The British proposal for a special League of Nations commission for settling the Wailing Wall question and the report of the Mandates Commission will be discussed Monday at the opening session of the Council of the League of Nations. It is probable that the Council will authorize the Legal Committee to consider the British proposal, and a decision on the matter will be reached at the coming session.

It was also stated here that the British government plans to modify its original proposal.

Tel Aviv Using Canned Meat as Slaughtering Impasse Holds

Tel Aviv, Jan. 8.—Meat consumers here are forced to resort to the use of canned meats, since all efforts to get the government to allow the butchers to slaughter at the temporary abattoir, pending the construction of a new building have proved unavailing.

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Hopkin Morris Says Commission Met No Hostility in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Jan. 8.—The Palestine Inquiry Commission met no hostility during its investigations, but it did encounter Arab demonstrations all the way down, meeting delegations at every station that carried black banners with the inscription, "Down with the Balfour Declaration," Hopkin Morris, a member of the Commission, told the "Manchester Guardian."

Mr. Morris said that the demonstrations everywhere were by the Arabs only. In response to a question as to whether the intensity of the antagonism between Jews and Arabs shows signs of diminishing, he replied, "I don't know that it does. It is said that the Arabs are sending a deputation to England, though I think they gave us enough evidence. There are only rumors about this deputation, and I can say nothing about its character, but I suppose it would be something similar to the delegation sent in 1922 to see Winston Churchill."

It is not yet certain here whether the Commission's sittings in London will be private or public.

Authorities Taking Measures to Stamp Out Arab Brigands

Safed, Jan. 8.—Horses have been commandeered in the villages around Safed by the combined military and police forces tracking the brigand bands believed to be concealed in the hills between Acre and Safed. Fifty British soldiers stationed in the village of Rama have been sent as reinforcements to Acre and about 80 of the Transjordanian defence force men have been detailed to Meron, where the military are installing a wireless in the Yeshiva. The authorities are determined to prevent the spread of brigandage such as menaced the safety of Syria after the 1926 rebellion.

Committee Elections Show that Polish Zionists Are Radicals

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Jan. 8.—The result of the election for a Central Committee at the Polish Zionist convention is regarded in Zionist circles as a sign that Polish Zionism has taken a decided radical turn, which will make impossible for a long time the union of the Zionists of Congress Poland with those of Eastern and Western Galicia.

The convention adopted a resolution which declares that the economic situation of the Polish Jews is a desperate one and that the pauperization of the Jewish masses is taking on terrible forms. In spite of the fact that the Jewish population is paying a large share of the taxes, the resolution declares, their cultural and religious needs are not being satisfied, and certain Czarist restrictions against the Jews have still not been abolished. At the same time, the resolution declares, world public opinion is getting a different impression of the situation of the Jews in Poland because of the vote of confidence in the government given by the Jewish Parliament Club leaders.

With regard to the Palestine situation, the conference declared that "last year's Zionist policies created a dangerous situation for the Palestine Yishub and put the Balfour Declaration in doubt. This was proven by the riots and by the declarations of members of the Palestine Zionist Executive on the witness stand before the Inquiry Commission."

The convention declared itself in favor of calling a special Zionist congress as soon as possible for the purpose of formulating demands upon the Mandatory Power and adopting new working methods. It also criticized the policies of the Brith Shalom.

Arab Executive to Discuss Safed Collective Punishments

Safed, Jan. 8.—While the hearing on the collective punishments for Safed has been postponed for a fortnight, presumably to give the Arabs time to arrange for counsel, the question of the collective punishments is on the agenda of a special meeting of the Arab Executive for tomorrow in Jerusalem. The agenda also includes the selection of the members of the Arab delegation going to London, Jewish immigration, press suspension and the imprisonment of Mouzza Far and other boycott agitators.

Palestine Electric Co. Employees All Insured

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Jan. 8.—The employees of the Palestine Electric Corporation have been collectively insured to the extent of \$500,000. The policy provides for life insurance and old-age pensions. The arrangement was concluded by Pinchas Rutenberg before he left for London.

Arabs Do Not Hate England But Do Not Love Mandate, Mufti's Organ Declares

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Jan. 8.—"We do not hate England but we do not love the Mandate," argued the Arab paper "Jamel El Arabia," the Mufti's organ, in the last issue before it was suppressed indefinitely for publishing the story of an alleged Jewish conspiracy against the Mufti's life, in answer to the "Festini's" contention that the Arabs seek the repeal of the Balfour Declaration and not of the Mandate.

"Why concentrate our war against the Balfour Declaration when the Mandate is more dangerous to the Pan-Arab-Union than Zionism?" asks "El Arabia." "Arab hostility to the trusteeship means a struggle for complete independence and not tolerating foreign rule of any shade. The repeal of the Mandate will strengthen Anglo-Arab friendship. Britain does not regard as enemies the Egyptians who are fighting for independence."

Thus the leading Moslem organ goes a long way to confirm Harry Sacher's evidence before the Inquiry Commission that the Arabs are using Zionism as a lightning conductor, while they are really fighting the Mandate.

Jassy Officials to Demand Student Promise of Order

Bucharest, Jan. 8.—At a conference of all the Jassy authorities, under the chairmanship of Minister of Education Costachescu, it was decided to demand of the students of Jassy University individual promises that they will not in the future participate in any disorders. Those who break their promises will be immediately punished and expelled from the University.

It was also decided that in case the students shall insist on continuing their strike, the University shall be closed for the remainder of the year.

Child Marriage Case To Be Heard by Rabbinate

Jerusalem, Jan. 8.—Child marriage in oriental Jewish communities is again in the public eye as the result of an application to the Rabbinate, which will be heard today, with Yakob Meir presiding, to annul the compulsory engagement of a 13-year old girl to an old man.

FIRST JEWESS NAMED TO SCHOOL BOARD

Bangor, Me., Jan. 8.—Mrs. Edward I. Gleszer has been elected a member of the local school board. She is the first Jewess to hold such a position, not only in Bangor, but also in Maine. She was formerly a member of the city council. Mrs. Gleszer is the wife of Judge Edward I. Gleszer of the Bangor municipal court. He was the first Jew to be appointed to the bar in Maine.

Rabbi and Weather Expert to Debate on Proposal to Reform Calendar

Washington, Jan. 8.—A public debate on calendar reform involving interference with the Jewish Sabbath which may be broadcast over a network of radio stations, will be held here Tuesday evening, January 14, at the Jewish Community Center between Charles F. Marvin, Chief of the United States Weather Bureau and foremost government expert on calendar reform, and Rabbi Louis J. Schwefel of Washington who lent much assistance to the Jewish group opposing calendar reform during the hearings before the House foreign affairs committee. Members of the committee have been invited to attend.

Says Palestine Can Never Be Jewish National Home

Palestine can never become a national home of the Jewish people because they represent not a nationality but a religion, said Dr. Samuel Schulman, rabbi of Congregation Emanu-El, in his sermon last Sunday. He declared that he was opposed to any nationalistic ambitions in the rebuilding of Palestine but was in sympathy with the movement in so far as it offered a home for those Jews who desired to live in Palestine.

"We should not only sympathize with our brethren there," he stated, "but we should recognize that if sufficient numbers gather there they may create a new Jewish spiritual center."

Named Police Magistrate in Baltimore Northern Court

Baltimore, Jan. 8.—Samuel Lasch, attorney and associate judge in the Juvenile Court, has been appointed police magistrate in the northern Police Court, filling the vacancy caused by the recent death of Magistrate Jacob Schroeder. The appointment was made by Gov. Albert C. Ritchie Saturday, and is effective until May 1931.

Magistrate Lasch had formerly been elected a member of the old First Branch of the City Council for three successive terms. He is a member of the Independent Order of B'rith Shalom and active in the work of the Jewish Educational Alliance.

Charles Hirshfield, Nevada Pioneer, 74 Years Old, Dies

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—Charles Hirshfield, 74 years old, former president of the San Francisco Stock Exchange, died here Wednesday following a heart attack. Mr. Hirshfield came to San Francisco alone at the age of 14, from Germany, and engaged in mining in Nevada for a short period. He was later the personal broker for the Bonanza Four—Mackay, Flood, O'Brien and Fair—who made their fortunes in Comstock Lode mining stocks.

Arabs Seen Hoping for Constitutional Changes

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Jan. 8.—That the Palestine Arabs, with little enough reason, hope for sudden constitutional changes, is revealed by an article in the "Elakdam," a paper in Jaffa, which is very close to the Waft, the Egyptian Nationalist Party.

On the basis of recent British concessions to Egypt and Iraq, the Jaffa paper predicts home rule for Palestine, including a parliament and a share in the administration. It reports, too, the yarn that the "London Times" correspondent in Cairo has arranged for a special train to Palestine to be ready in the event of the necessity for proceeding at short notice to Palestine on the report of a declaration of independence there.

Whatever constitutional changes are in the offing, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency can state on reliable authority that the Palestine government has not received any instructions to resume conversations with the Arabs, which had been suspended as a result of the riots. Both London and Jerusalem, but especially London, are likely to move very slowly, particularly after Premier MacDonald has undertaken to consider carefully the Balfour-Lloyd-Smuts proposal for an inquiry into the workings of the Mandate system.

4,000 More to Join Strike of Cleveland Garment Workers

Cleveland, Jan. 8.—Four thousand more workers are expected to join the 2,500 already on strike here in the ladies' garment industry. All shops that have hitherto employed union labor and several of the non-union shops are affected.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, who is the spiritual leader of most of the garment manufacturers in Cleveland, yesterday issued a call to end the strike and to decide all matters by arbitration. Benjamin Schlesinger, president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, arrived here today to take personal charge of the strike.

ORT PRESIDENT ON WAY TO THE UNITED STATES

Berlin, Jan. 8.—Dr. Leo Branson, president of the International Ort, has left for New York on the invitation of American leaders of the Ort, with whom he will take up the question of the serious economic situation of European Jews and the reconstruction work of the Ort.

Rabbi Delivers Prayer at Session of Congress

Washington, Jan. 8.—Rabbi Louis I. Newman, of Temple Emanuel, San Francisco, gave the opening prayer at the session of the House of Representatives, yesterday. Rabbi Newman was invited to deliver the prayer by the Chaplains' Association and the Jewish Institute of Religion.

See New York Yiddish Theatre Becoming "Slumming Center" for Broadway-Minded Jews

That the Yiddish theatre in New York is becoming a sort of "slumming center" for Broadway-minded Jews, who regard an invasion of the East Side White Light area with all the elan of a trip into Chinatown or any of the better-known Russian cafes, is the opinion that was recently expressed by several Yiddish theatrical managers. One of the inevitable outcomes of this state of mind, they say, is the appearance of the type of Yiddish play in which fifty percent of the lines are spoken in Yiddish, while fifty percent are spoken in English.

That the Broadway influence is also leading to the disintegration of the Yiddish stage, is another fear expressed by leaders in the New York Yiddish theatrical world. The Broadway musical comedy, they point out, has been tried out in Yiddish houses where years ago it might have been looked upon as a sacrilege. Yiddish playwrights, recognizing the trend, have been sure to fashion their drama with an eye toward the more glaring uptown scene.

Speaking of the distress of the Yiddish theatrical managers, Maurice Schwartz, director of the Yiddish Art Theatre, has recently said:

"Our producers are desperate; expenses are three times higher than they used to be; people grow more and more Americanized and attend the English shows. To lure them back, 50 percent English is spoken in Jewish plays, English songs are sung, the music smacks of the same jazz rhythms that you hear on Broadway. Entering any of the playhouses on Second Avenue, you promptly feel yourself on a Jewish version of Broadway. Young girls, half dressed, wiggle around just as they do uptown. Everything is fine and everybody's happy. But will the slumming audience stay? Being so consistently reminded of Broadway, won't they eventually want Broadway itself? At a time when so many national organizations are striving to teach Jewish children their own language, the downtown stages feature more English than ever. Why don't they speak Yiddish or some other language in the Broadway plays?"

Reflecting on the struggle the Yiddish Art Theatre has had to resist the "easy temptation of the Melting Pot," Mr. Schwartz declares that his troupe has presented eight-five plays of world renown during the past twelve years, in which time they had refused to allow Broadway to affect them. "In fact," observes Mr. Schwartz, "it might be said that Broadway has been beneficially influenced by the Yiddish Art Theatre. The troupe attracts a clientele 30 percent of whom are non-Jewish. The percentage is even higher now with the feature of 'Jew Suss,' because of the wide familiarity with Feuchtwanger's novel, 'Power.'"

Congress Hears Proposal for Impartial Palestine Inquiry With America Represented

Straus established milk stations in Jerusalem on the same scale and in the same manner in which milk stations are conducted in New York. Incidentally, these milk stations are not established for Jews alone. They are open to all residents of Jerusalem, Jew and non-Jew alike."

Referring to the desirability of American representation on the proposed impartial commission, Representative Dickstein said this would show that the events in Palestine were not merely of local importance but have assumed world wide character and would also add prestige to the Commission.
