Zionist Diplomatic Agent Files Memo Against Arabs' Protest on Wailing Wall Commission

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Jan. 22—Victor Jacobson, diplomatic representative of the Zionist organization, visited yesterday Sir Eric Drummond, secretary of the League of Nations Council, and submitted to him the following memorandum:

"Emir Arslan Ibn Djabri, who pretends to represent the Arab population of Palestine, has published a protest against the Wailing Wall resolution adopted by the League Council. I protest against the allegation that the Jews are striving to appropriate the Arab holy places and the Mosque of Akks, as well as the assertion that the establishment of a Jewish majority would necessarily result in the profanation of the Arab holy places and the elimination of the Arab Moslem elements. It was never the Jewish aspiration to appropriate the Arab holy places, which fact has already been established in official Jewish declarations.

"Arslan's new allegations are likely to spread disquiet among the fanatical masses. They render most difficult the country's pacification and the establishment of collaboration and a feeling of friendly neighborliness between Jews and Arabs. The Zionist organization has solemnly announced its desire to collaborate in the development of the entire country by all parts of

Radziminer Rabbi Visits

Nahum Sokolow in Warsaw

Warsaw, Jan. 22—The Radziminer Rabbi paid a visit to Nahum Sokolow, the Zionist leader, and discussed with him the Palestine situation. The Radziminer Rabbi was the one who, during his visit to Jerusalem last year, started the agitation among the orthodox Jews for the erection of a screen at the Wailing Wall to separate the Jewish men and women worshippers, which led to the fight between Moslems and Jews over the rights to the Kothel Maaravi.

Polish He'Chalutz Session

Warsaw, Jan. 22—The former Soviet Commissar of Justice, Steinberg, who is now in Poland, participated in a session of the central committee of the Polish "He'Chalutz," and visited a Chalutzim farm here, as well as other Jewish institutions. Steinberg is touring the provinces now and will remain in Poland for several weeks.

Professor Says Jewish People Are Slipping

Boston, Jan. 22—The Jewish people are fast losing their identity and individuality, and many of the admirable qualities which in the past made them great, declared Prof. Robert E. Rogers of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, at a meeting of the Roxbury Y. M. H. A. Religious freedom, tolerance, and lack of persecution are now doing to the Jewish people what persecution and oppression could not do, and the Jews today are trying to merge themselves with the other classes, he said.

Agency's Administrative Council May Meet in London in March

London, Jan. 22—The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that while the date and place have not yet been definitely settled, it is probable that a meeting of the Administrative Council of the Jewish Agency will be held in London March 18. Negotiations on the matter are still in progress between Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency and the Zionist Executive in London.

Propose Government Take New Palestine Census

Jerusalem, Jan. 22—A proposal that the government hold a new census was made at a statisticians' conference convened by the Zionist Executive. It was the opinion of the conference that the 1922 census is now useless. The labor department of the Zionist Executive is now taking a census of the workers in the Jewish colonies and is planning a census of artisans.

Palestine Jewry Will Rejoice As Jabotinsky Goes to Testify

Jerusalem, Jan. 22—The Palestine Jewish community will rejoice to hear that Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Zionist Revisionists, will be called to testify before the Inquiry Commission in London, says the Hebrew daily, "Doar Hayom," "not only because he will nail many falsehoods that the enemies of Zionism have circulated and will thereby rectify the Zionist Executive's blunder in concealing the views of Ussishkin and Jabotinsky, but the Commission will hear the whole Zionist truth concerning our nation which never waived the truth for immediate benefit."

Polish Constitution Should Make Provisions for Needs of Minorities—Gruenbaum

Warsaw, Jan. 22—The constitutional commission appointed by the Polish Sejm is now discussing changes in the Polish constitution. The government party is for giving the president more powers and for limiting the present powers of the Sejm.

Deputy Gruenbaum, Jewish leader, stated that the Jewish members of parliament are for giving the president more authority by changing the present manner of presidential election, but are against depriving the Sejm of some of its present powers. Gruenbaum said that the main thing to bear in mind in amending the constitution is "the creation of conditions which should make it possible for citizens belonging to the minorities to regard the state not as an instrument of suppression, but as their own state, which provides for their needs as well as for the needs of citizens of the Polish race."

New Bill Would Create Possibility of Separate Montreal Jewish Schools

Montreal, Jan. 22—Peter Bercovitch and Joseph Cohen, Jewish members of the Quebec provincial legislature, are to introduce a bill at this session amending the education act so as to allow the creation of a Jewish committee of five members, to be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor, on the existing provincial education council. These five would negotiate with existing school organizations about Jewish representation on the Protestant School Boards, or would establish separate Jewish schools should negotiations fail.

A delegation of the "Separate Jewish School Committee," headed by M. Caismann, chairman, Rabbi Cohen and M. Garber, will interview Premier Taschereau in Quebec City this morning, insisting that the provincial government make provision for the establishment of separate Jewish schools in Montreal.

Canadian Hias Committee to Seek Government Concessions

Montreal, Jan. 22—The conference of the Canadian Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society here yesterday, under the chairmanship of B. Robinson, decided to send a committee to the government asking for larger immigration concessions, and to start an organization campaign for members.

Hebron Refugees Return to Seek Looted Belongings

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Jan. 22—One hundred and five Jewish refugees yesterday revisited Hebron, some for the first time since the massacre. They were accompanied by two British soldiers, a representative of the collective punishments office and of the Zionist Legal Aid Committee. Fifty sacks packed with the looted belongings of the survivors filled two store-rooms in the police station. All of the loot was recovered in Hebron and in six of the surrounding villages, a fact which apparently gives the lie to the allegation that the Bedouins and not Hebronites did the massacring and looting.

Many of the visitors recognized belongings of murdered relatives, an identification which caused the air to be rent with sobs all day long. The most valuable articles are still missing, although one Jew who casually visited his former Arab neighbor saw some of his goods in possession of the Arab. Burned and torn papers and books, and broken bottles littered the floor of the Hadassah Clinic.

Montreal Jewish Library Plans \$10,000 Campaign

Montreal, Jan. 22—A \$10,000,000 campaign in the interests of the Jewish People's Library of Montreal will be held the week starting January the 26th. Founded in 1914, this library constitutes the only institution of its kind in this city. It contains more than 6,000 select volumes in Yiddish, English, Hebrew and other languages. The present quarters being insufficient to meet the needs of the Montreal community, \$10,000 is sought to purchase a new home. Officers of the campaign include M. L. Brown, campaign director, J. Schaffran and N. Myerson, joint campaign chairmen.

Arab Executive Names New Delegation of 6 to London; Mouzza Kazim Chairman

Jerusalem, Jan. 22—Mouzza Kazim Pasha, president of the Arab Executive, has been named chairman of the delegation of six that will be sent to London to plead the Arab case. The other members of the deputation named by the Arab Executive are the Grand Mufti, Jamal Hussein, secretary of the Arab Executive, Mayor Nashashibi of Jerusalem, Alfred Roch, a Christian, and Auni Abdul Hadi, one of the staff of counsel for the Arabs at the Inquiry Commission hearings.

The delegation, aside from the lone Christian, is equally divided between the opposition and the Mufti's party, the latter having waived its original demand that the Mufti should head the delegation. With the final appointment of the delegation, there ends what at one time appeared to be an irreparable break in the ranks of the Arab Executive growing out of dissatisfaction with the complexion of the delegation. Two of those originally appointed had resigned and the president, vice-president and secretary of the Arab Executive had also quit. Peace-makers patched up the trouble, and a new election smoothed the troubled waters.

SULTAN ATRAASH MAY SETTLE IN PERSIA

Jerusalem, Jan. 22—The Sultan Atrash, who has been ordered to leave Transjordan territory, intends to settle in Persia, according to news from Arab sources, which also report that Sheik Arslan, head of the Arab delegation bound for America, has invited the redoubtable Druse rebel chieftain to join him in Europe.

These same Arab sources maintain that the Emir Abdullah is anxious to rid his domain of undesirable elements, especially while he is away in Europe.

Labor Pledges Help to Boston Jewish Charities

Boston, Jan. 22—Following a conference of representatives of all of the Greater Boston Jewish labor organizations, fraternal orders and other societies, a resolution was adopted pledging the support of these organizations in aid of the \$900,000 campaign for the Associated Jewish Philanthropies.

This is the first time that members of Jewish labor organizations have been asked to participate actively in a drive for funds for Jewish charitable organizations.

Joseph Bearack was chairman of the conference. In addition to the resolution pledging support, another resolution was adopted asking that the various organizations be represented on the committees of the Associated Jewish Philanthropies.

Dr. Filderman Asks Roumanian Jews in America to Welcome Prof. Jorga to United States

Bucharest, Jan. 22—In connection with the coming visit to the United States of Prof. Nicolai Jorga, noted Roumanian scholar, Dr. William Filderman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews, has appealed to the Roumanian Jews of America to receive Professor Jorga with enthusiasm.

The following is the text of Dr. Filderman's appeal:

"The Roumanian Jews of America know Professor Nicolai Jorga. Many generations of Jewish students have received the benefits of the learning of this great scholar, and not only the Jews in Roumania, but the Jews of the world over, have had the opportunity to admire the qualities of Professor Jorga, and know that in the great struggle which we have had since the war, we have always had the support and kind word of this generous and wise man.

"Convinced that the progress of Roumania depends upon the brotherly cooperation of all her citizens, without distinction, and that her good name abroad is based upon culture and civilization, Professor Jorga has propagated by word of mouth and his writings, the great idea of brotherhood and cooperation. In the constructive work of Roumania, he has, as a man of science and as a statesman, and in more recent times as Dean of the University of Bucharest, fought against race hatred, condemning the false prophets and their deeds.

"The Roumanian Jews of America will undoubtedly receive Professor Jorga with enthusiasm and with all the honors due this great scholar, the ambassador of Roumanian science and the apostle of humanity and brotherhood. You who have been on Roumanian soil, and who are interested in the welfare of the country where dwell your parents and brothers, now have the occasion to manifest the sentiment that binds you to our country; Professor Jorga is amongst you."

Heads of N. Y. Congregations in Conference Next Sunday

A city-wide conference of leaders and presidents of Orthodox congregations in Greater New York will be held Sunday, January 26, at 2 P. M., in the Assembly Hall of the Yeshiva College.

Over 500 leaders of congregations in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Jamaica and Queens have already signified their intention to be present at a conference which was called by Rabbi M. S. Margolies, president of the Yeshiva College. The call was issued also in the name of the united Orthodox Rabbis of Greater New York, following the adoption of a resolution to this effect at an extraordinary session of the rabbinical organizations held ten days ago.

American Jewish Committee Names Advisory Committees

The appointment of several standing advisory committees, whose function it will be to give close study to matters coming within their scope and advise the Executive Committee from time to time as to such action as they may deem opportune, was authorized by the executive committee of the American Jewish Committee at a recent meeting. The Standing Advisory Committees will be as follows:

A committee on foreign affairs, with sub-committees on Poland, Central Europe, Russia, Balkan countries, and Baltic countries, and on Federal legislation, State legislation, immigration and naturalization, anti-Jewish manifestations, finance, and office. In view of the recent establishment of the extended Jewish Agency, no committee on Palestine will be appointed.

The executive committee also discussed the recent meeting between Dr. Adler and the Rumanian Minister to the United States, Carol A. Davila, the new regulation of the Bureau of Naturalization under which applicants for naturalization are classified according to race or people, the classification including "Hebrews," and the statement made by Judge Nathan Clayton of Washington, D. C. regarding criminality among Jews. In connection with the last subject, the results of a further investigation by the Statistical Department of the Committee were presented.

The Committee also discussed conditions among the Jews in Russia, Poland, Turkey, and the Yemela.

Morris Wolf of Philadelphia was elected a member of the executive committee. The meeting was attended by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president; Judge Horace Stern, chairman of the executive committee; David M. Bressler, Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo, Max J. Kohler, Judge Abram I. Elkus, Cyrus L. Sulzberger, Judge Eli Frank, Judge Irving Lehman, James Marshall, Felix M. Warburg, Morris D. Waldman, the secretary, and Harry Schneiderman, assistant secretary.

Mittenthal Again Heads Dallas Jewish Social Service Body

Dallas, Tex., Jan. 22—N. E. Mittenthal was reelected president of the Jewish Federation for Social Service recently, with the following officers also reelected: M. I. Freedman and Robert Stern, vice-presidents; Leonard Epstein, treasurer; Louis Kleinman, secretary; and Samuel C. Blumenthal, executive director.

The campaign to raise \$60,000 fell short by about \$5,000, it was reported. Efforts will continue to raise the additional amount, and appropriations were made in the 1930 budget on the assumption that the additional funds will be received.

U. S. Prohibitionists Plan Palestine Dry Campaign

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Jan. 22—A fight to introduce prohibition in Palestine, Syria and Egypt will soon be begun by American prohibitionists, according to an announcement Monday by Mrs. Ida B. Wise Smith, national vice-president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union. Mrs. Smith announced that she will address a conference of prohibitionists in Jerusalem on March 22. Mrs. Smith has been fighting for prohibition in Iowa during the past half-century.

Celebrate 35th Anniversary of Kaufmann Settlement

Pittsburgh, Jan. 22—The thirty-fifth anniversary of Pittsburgh's Irene Kaufmann Settlement, pioneer welfare and social institution of this section of the country was observed here recently, simultaneously with the dedication of the new \$500,000 annex, the gift of Henry Kaufmann, Pittsburgh philanthropist. With the formal opening of the annex, to be known as the Theresa L. Kaufman Auditorium as a memorial to the late Mrs. Henry Kaufman, the settlement buildings represent an investment of \$1,000,000.

Founded by the National Council of Jewish Women, the institution was supported by the Jewish community until 1909, when following the death of Irene Kaufmann, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kaufmann, twenty years ago, \$200,000 was given by the parents for the erection of the present structure, completed in 1910 and dedicated under its present name. Since then the settlement has been supported by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies and by Mr. Kaufmann.

Land, buildings, and equipment of practically the entire institution are gifts of Mr. Kaufmann. In addition he has given more than \$50,000 to a fund which awards scholarships in local universities to outstanding men and women of the settlement. Heading the list of speakers at the dedication of the annex was Paul U. Kellogg, editor of the "Survey."

First Jew Named Head of National Inter-Frat Body

Columbus, O., Jan. 22—The election of Buddy L. Moser of the class of '31, at Ohio State University, as the national undergraduate president of Interfraternity Councils, brings to Columbus what is perhaps the highest distinction that can be awarded to an undergraduate in the United States.

Mr. Moser, whose home is in Lorain, is the first Jew to be so signally honored, his election to the office following an active career at the university which has gained for him the title of being one of the most active undergraduates the institution has ever known.

19% Increase in Cases of Brooklyn Jewish Aid Bodies

During the year 1929 the United Jewish Aid Societies of Brooklyn, which is affiliated with the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, increased its relief activities 19 percent over the year previous, according to the report rendered by Mortimer Brenner, president of the organization, at its nineteenth annual meeting held Monday night.

One thousand two hundred and twenty-five families were added to the United Jewish Aid Societies charity list as new cases during 1929, declared Mr. Brenner. Altogether it gave financial aid or personal service to 3,643 families, or 17,386 persons in Brooklyn. The society incurred a deficit of \$4,000 during the past year.

N. Y. Hadassah's \$50,000 Campaign Ends Feb. 18

A campaign for \$50,000 conducted by the New York Chapter of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, will be culminated at a luncheon to be held at the Hotel Roosevelt on February 18. Mrs. David de Sola Pool, chairman of the committee, announced that the proceeds of this event will go to the Hadassah Medical Organization, which maintains the largest public health agency in Palestine.

Mrs. Felix M. Warburg has accepted the chairmanship of the patroness committee. Mrs. Pool stated that Mrs. Warburg's entry into the active work of the New York Chapter campaign is a fulfillment of a hope that the creation of the Jewish Agency has aroused, namely, that Zionists and non-Zionists are working together for the upbuilding of Palestine.

Major Hopkin Guest of Boston Zionists Today

Boston, Jan. 22—Major Daniel Hopkin, Labor member of Parliament and an officer of the Jewish Legion in Palestine, will be the guest of the Boston Zionists tomorrow evening, when he addresses a huge mass meeting, with Ben Leve presiding. During the day he will be the luncheon guest of Mayor Curley, will be received by Governor Allen, and in the afternoon will be tendered a reception by the members of the Harvard department of government.

Sondheim Reelected Head of Baltimore Jewish Charities

Baltimore, Jan. 22—Walter Sondheim was reelected president of the Associated Jewish Charities, at the annual meeting of the organization this week.

Other officers chosen were Jacob Blaustein, first vice-president; Milton E. Gundersheimer, second vice-president; Nathan Katz, treasurer, and Adolph Ginsberg, assistant treasurer.

School Superintendents to Hear Plea for the Teaching of Hebrew in N. Y. Schools

That the Hebrew language should be added to the courses given in New York City high schools and colleges as an elective subject, was the opinion expressed by Magistrate Hyman J. Reit in an interview on Monday. Magistrate Reit is president of the New York City division of the United Synagogue of America and chairman of the committee appointed by the United Synagogue to interest city and state educational authorities in the project.

Magistrate Reit declared that his committee has been assured by the Board of Superintendents of New York City that it will hold a hearing on this matter shortly. A resolution favoring the study of Hebrew in New York City schools was adopted on Sunday by the Long Island Conference of the United Synagogue.

"Our suggestion is made not only for the benefit of our Jewish people, but for the non-Jewish as well," said Magistrate Reit. "In the first place, Hebrew is an old language, like Latin and Greek, but unlike these two classics, it is still a live language. It is my personal belief that Hebrew as a course would be more popular than Latin or Greek.

"It is only natural, too, that the Jewish people should wish to have their young people educated with a knowledge of the language of their race, for this language constitutes an essential part of the ritual used in our religious services. As it is now, many of our young people do not understand the services and there is a tendency for them to drift away from the synagogue. If they are educated in the public schools to understand the tongue of their fathers, they will naturally be stimulated to a greater and more far-reaching interest in their religion," Magistrate Reit concluded.

Heads Pittsburgh Zionists

Pittsburgh, Jan. 22—Emil Steinbach was reelected president of the Pittsburgh Zionist District at its annual election. Other officers reelected were Samuel L. Fuss, H. M. Caplan, vice-presidents; J. E. Rosenberg, secretary, and A. M. Kess, treasurer. Henry Eilenbogen, Pittsburgh attorney, was chosen financial secretary. Dr. M. B. Lichtenstein, president of Zionist Region No. 3, is honorary president of the Pittsburgh Zionists.

Heads Jersey Rabbinical Association

Newark, Jan. 22—Rabbi Max D. Davidson, of Temple Beth Mordecai, Perth Amboy, N. J., has been reelected president of the Rabbinical Association of New Jersey. Rabbi Eliezer Kaufman, of Temple Emanu-El, Paterson, N. J., was chosen secretary-treasurer.

Reorganization of Federation Seen as Result of Report on Survey of Omaha's Jewry

Omaha, Jan. 22—Reorganization of the Jewish Welfare Federation to include all Jewish organizations, the consolidating of the planning of community activities, and an increased staff for Jewish social work, were the outstanding recommendations made before a committee of over 100 citizens, by Samuel Goldsmith, Director of the Bureau for Jewish Social Research of New York, in making his report of the communal survey, which has been in preparation here for several months.

The survey recommends that divisions of family case work, child care, medical service, education and recreation, and Jewish education be established. This plan would require a reorganization of the budget, of which the Omaha Community Chest would be asked to support the work for family welfare, child care and delinquency, medical service and about half of the budget for education and recreation, which is the work of the Jewish Community Center. This would be the same amount that the Chest now gives. The remainder of the Community Center budget would be supplied by membership dues, leaving \$25,000 to be raised annually in a Jewish Welfare Fund, which would include expenditures in behalf of deficits incurred in Jewish education, subventions to national organizations and other local expenditures which could not be met by the Community Chest. The total budget would be about \$80,000, and would imply a redistribution of income but no increase.

The survey recommended the organization of a Council of Jewish Education to coordinate all efforts at Jewish education in the city, and the engaging of a Director of Jewish education to head this division. Under this head, also, the report suggests that the City Talmud Torah be moved into the Community Center and reorganized along modern methods. About 37 per cent of the Jewish children of Omaha are now receiving Jewish education.

In the field of child care, the report recommends that the Federation engage a worker to supervise family case work and to give special attention to child welfare and the development of a system of foster homes.

The survey gives the Jewish population of Omaha as 10,000 and the number of Jewish school children as 1700. The Jewish Community Center is well located in regard to the Jewish population, according to the report, since a large proportion of the Jewish children are living within easy distance of the building. The survey reflects also the prevailing tendency in all cities, of the Jews to be represented by a larger ratio of Jewish children in the high schools than white children in general in these schools.

The Bureau recommends the organization of a Federation of Jewish women's organizations, which would

the population, which forms the basis of Jewish aspirations in Palestine. The Jews do not desire the subordination of the Arab population, but they resent the policy of elimination which has recently been practiced by others towards the Jews."

The memorandum cites the resolution adopted in 1921 by the Zionist congress, and which was mentioned in the White Paper issued by Winston Churchill regarding the relations between Jews and Arabs.

"We are firmly convinced of the necessity and possibility of the coordination and harmonization of the interests of Jews and Arabs," says the memorandum.

"We welcome with satisfaction the Council's decision to settle the Wailing Wall question, which has been attacked by the delegates from the Syro-Palestine Committee," the memorandum concludes. "On behalf of the high principle of peace and justice we protest against the menacing attitude which Arslan has adopted in opposing the Council resolution. We protest against the policy of violation and intimidation of which they seemingly avail themselves, together with the abettors and instigators of the Palestinian troubles, who were denounced by Prime Minister MacDonald at the last session of the League of Nations."

Jewish Women's Organizations of N. Y. in Convention Here

One hundred and sixty organizations with a membership of approximately 119,000 were represented at the Tenth Annual Convention of the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations of Greater New York, at the Hotel Astor, all day Wednesday. Mrs. David E. Goldfarb presided.
