## MOSCOW DENIES CHIEF RABBI GLUSKIN OF MINSK WILL BE EXECUTED; 11 OF 14 ARRESTED KEHILLAH LEADERS FREED; YEVSEKS CALL ALL RABBIS SPIES

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Feb. 24—Reports emanating from Berlin to the effect that Chief Rabbi Gluskin of Minsk had been sentenced to death on a charge of speculating on the foreign exchange are absolutely false. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency's correspondent has good reasons for believing that Rabbi Gluskin, who was one of the fourteen arrested on February 15 for counter-revolutionary activity, will be released at the end of this week.

The hue and cry abroad over the Minsk rabbis and the Soviet religious persecution is causing great excitement in Communist circles here. A leading Communist today told the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that "American rabbis, headed by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, are helping in the anti-Soviet crusade and are assisting American imperialists in stirring public opinion against the Soviets."

London, Feb. 24—International News Service dispatches from Berlin, based on Kovno reports to the German Telegraphen Union declaring that Chief Rabbi Gluskin of Minsk had been sentenced to death for stock gambling, are not credited here. It is known that no death sentence will be carried out until the Soviet Central Executive Committee approves it.

London, Feb. 24—The Soviet authorities have published an account of the "crimes" charged against the arrested rabbis of Minsk, the London "Times" reports from Riga. The G.P.U., describes the "crimes" as counter-revolutionary because the rabbis corresponded with Jewish organizations and Jews abroad, particularly, the "appeal sent to Jewish political groups and

economic organizations abroad, begging assistance for dying Jews.

The greatest "crime," according to the Soviet authorities, was committed by an American, Rabbi Glazer, who, it is alleged, abused the Soviet Government's confidence. When he was recently permitted to visit Minsk for family reasons, he "secretly inquired about the Soviet Government's attitude toward religion and clandestinely discussed with local rabbis, economic conditions under which the Jewish population lived."

The "Morning Post" adds that the rabbis are also accused of having received counter-revolutionary instructions from Riga.

Washington, Feb. 24—Eleven of the fourteen leaders of the Minsk Jewish community reported to have been executed after their arrest on February 15 for counter-revolutionary activity, have been released, it was learned here today from a message received by Senator Borah from Maxim Litvinoff, acting-commissioner of foreign affairs at Moscow. Litvinoff's message was in response to a cable of Senator Borah asking for information as to the fate of the arrested Jewish leaders.

## Jewish Colony Merged With Non-Jewish Ones in Crimea

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Feb. 24—The first case of the merging of a Jewish colony with a non-Jewish colony in Crimea was reported today. The students' brigade arriving from Moscow to supervise collectivization, merged the Jewish colony Rykov in the Jankoy region with three neighboring non-Jewish colonies.

The merged territory, comprising 14,000 hectares, is named "Third International," and consists of Russians, Tartars, Germans, Greeks and Armenians. Immediately upon merging, a meeting was held at which it was decided to submit candlesticks and other religious articles to the collective for a special fund.

A similar decision was adopted in the neighboring Jewish colony of Larindorf. The students' brigade reports that many Jewish villages in the Jankoy region, including Larindorf, Budimovka and Stahlinshtat, collectivized by the brigade, are submitting cattle and other inventory to the collective.

## Says Dowbiggin Opposes Special Jewish Police Divisions

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—The reorganization of the Palestine police force will proceed along proportional lines and the Jews are now adequately represented, Inspector-General Dowbiggin, in charge of the reorganization, is quoted by the Haifa Revisionist leader Weinshal, writing in the "Doar Hayom" as having told leaders of the Jewish community.

Weinshal also claims that Dowbiggin said that separate units of Arab and Jewish police are unnecessary and segregation of Jewish and Arab police is undesirable. He is further alleged to have said that Jewish constables should learn Arabic as should all Palestine Jews, being a minority. Inspector-General Dowbiggin is also said to favor a better police training school and improved discipline.

## Hinkis' Parents Awaiting Hearing on Appeal of Case

Warsaw, Feb. 24—The parents of Hinkis, the Jewish policeman in Palestine who was sentenced to death on the accusation that he was implicated in the murder of a group of Arabs, are awaiting impatiently the hearing on the appeal of his case. His mother, who is on her way to Palestine, hopes to see her son freed on her arrival there.

The parents of Hinkis have publicly thanked the Jewish press, especially the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, for the great interest they have shown in the fate of their son.

## Arab Opposition May Send Own Delegation to London

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—The Arab opposition which recently cabled the Colonial Office that the delegation coming to London was not representative of Arab public opinion may send a counter-delegation to London to demand complete independence within Pan-Arabia, according to the Nazareth correspondent of the Arab paper "El Aklam."

## DEPUTY SAYS FRANCE WANTS JEWISH PEOPLE

Paris, Feb. 24—"We want Jews in France," declared Deputy Charles Lambert, author of the immigration laws favorable to the Jews, at a meeting of the Jewish Debating Club. "The Jews have no fatherland and they therefore promptly adapt themselves to French conditions. Jews are in our French family."

## Hitlerites Annoy Worshippers in Synagogue at Hanover

Berlin, Feb. 24—During the services in the Hanover synagogue on Saturday, members of Hitler's anti-Semitic bands exploded fireworks near the synagogue, causing a panic. Immediately after the explosion the Hitlerites disappeared. Several times before, these Hitlerites had broken windows in the Jewish Community House in Hanover.

The Berlin "Central Verein des Deutsche Juden" has published a protest against the desecration of synagogues in Spandau, near Berlin.

**Confirms Bessadovsky Expose of  
Communist Work in Palestine**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—Vladimir Burtzev, noted Russian revolutionary, in an interview with the Paris correspondent of the Hebrew paper, "Doar Hayom," confirmed the recent statement of Gregory Bessedovsky, anent Communist activities in Palestine. Burtzev said that the Palestine Communists party of about 500 members is constantly receiving reinforcements as well as \$25,000 annually in addition to special grants.

He explained that propagandist material is smuggled in via Alexandria on instructions through the eastern department, one of whose heads, Piatnukzy, recently visited Palestine. Burtzev asserts that the Soviet consul-general at Jeddah conducts Communist activities in Palestine and helped to organize the Palestine riots among many sheiks on the Communist payroll who were instructed to sow hatred of England and paralyze British activities generally.

**Beirut Paper Closed for  
Publishing Mufti's Letter**

**Break Ground for \$65,000  
Talmud Torah in Seattle**

Seattle, Feb. 24—Ground was broken here yesterday for Seattle's new \$65,000 Talmud Torah. Elaborate ceremonies marked the event, which culminated a fund-raising campaign of a year and a half.

**Lithuanian Jews Here to Float  
\$500,000 Bond Issue for  
Capital for Lithuanian Jews**

Flotation of a five hundred thousand dollar bond issue in America to provide capital for the Jews of Lithuania, was decided on at the second annual convention of the Federation of American Jews of Lithuanian Descent which was held Saturday and Sunday at the Mecca Temple.

At the second session, the constructive relief plan proposed by the Fact-Finding Committee, of which Herman L. Winer is chairman, was discussed and adopted by the Federation. The plan provides for the flotation of a \$500,000 bond issue, by a corporation organized for the purpose, with the proceeds placed, on proper security, with the Jewish Folks-Banken in Lithuania, to provide capital necessary for the development of Jewish enterprises.

The convention was opened Saturday evening by Henry Hurwitz, president of the organization, who reviewed its major activities during the year. These, he declared, were the organization, for the first time, of American Lithuanian Jews throughout the country for the purpose of aiding the Jews of Lithuania, the relief campaign when crop failure caused a crisis, with the subsequent raising of \$12,000 by the Federation itself, and approximately \$50,000 raised and forwarded abroad by the landsmanschaften; political work for the betterment of Lithuanian Jewry, through interventions with the Government, and the sending of a delegation to study the situation, and the presentation of information regarding conditions to American Jews and central Jewish relief organizations.

Dr. Leo Bramson reported on the economic situation of Lithuanian Jewry, which he declared, is going from bad to worse, mainly because the Jews are finding themselves unable to adjust themselves to post-war conditions without external aid.

Other speakers at the session included Dr. A. Coralnik, president, Federation of Ukrainian Jews; Leo Wolfsohn, president, Federation of Roumanian Jews; Philip Wattenberg, president, Union Galician Jews; B. G. Richards, director, American Jewish Congress, and Benjamin Winter, president, the Federation of Polish Jews.

A resolution that the Federation become affiliated with the American Jewish Congress was passed, as was also a resolution expressing sympathy with the Jews in Russia. A number of resolutions bearing on the organization and expansion of the Federation and for the creation of a committee representing all Lithuanian Jewish organizations for the purpose of dealing with the Federation, were adopted by the convention.

Judge Lewis was chosen honorary president for the coming year; Henry Hurwitz, president; H. L. Winer, I. Matz, Edward M. Chase, Myer Kreger, Levi Rokeach and A. B. Cohen, vice-presidents; Harry Kabat, treasurer and Dr. Mordecai Katz, secretary.

**Transfer from Arable  
to Orange Cultivation  
Double Settlers' Number**

The Colonization Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive has recently approved a plan of intensification and increase of membership for Kfar Malal, of the South Sharon block. The settlement was founded on land of the Jewish National Fund before the War, mainly on the basis of arable farming. The forty settlers were allotted 53 dunams each. After the War, dairying was introduced. Now the development of orange growing in the neighborhood has suggested a new line of progress. The allotments are to be reduced to 25 dunams, thus making room for 40 additional settlers. The new irrigation plant will enable each settler to set up an orange grove on a tract of 8½ dunams, and devote another 10 dunams to irrigated fodder.

The settlement being affiliated with the Labor Federation, the scheme has been worked out through the Agricultural Workers' Union, which is also responsible to the Zionist Executive for the character and qualifications of the new settlers. A group of trained agricultural workers, who have long been awaiting their turn to be colonized, has been selected for this purpose, by an agreement between the Union Executive and the old settlers.

Kfar Malal is a Moshav Ovdim—a settlement with individual allotments on National Fund land, where each settler works his own farm, while sale of produce and use of heavy machinery are organized on a co-operative basis. As a rule, no wage labor is employed, the settlers contributing a certain number of spare working days to a pool on which each can draw at need.

**Mid-West J. N. F. Conference  
Pledged to Raise \$129,000**

St. Louis, Feb. 24—A pledge to raise \$129,000 for the Jewish National Fund was given by 200 delegates from thirteen mid-Western and Southwestern states at the close of the Mid-Western Jewish National Fund conference. Prof. Gustave Klausner was elected president, Julius Livingston of Tulsa, Harry Friedberg of Chicago and H. J. Slonim, vice-presidents; S. A. Goodman, treasurer, and Mendel Faber, executive secretary.

An administrative committee of seventeen and an advisory council of fifty were created. Plans were made for an increased effort to aid the Jewish National Fund. Resolutions in line with the national Jewish National Fund Conference held at Philadelphia were adopted.

Samuel Kronick, of Toronto, Lyon Cohen of Montreal and A. J. Freiman of Ottawa, were elected vice-presidents of the Canadian branch. An executive committee of twenty-five was chosen in part.

## Educators Organize to Combat Minimum Influence on Jewish Education

Plans for the establishment of a Greater New York Council for Jewish education were laid at a conference of principals of Hebrew Schools and Talmud Torahs, functioning in various parts of New York, held this week at the Yeshiva College.

The present conditions in the field of Jewish education in New York were the subject of a discussion which took place under the chairmanship of Dr. P. Churgin, principal of the Teachers' Institute of the Yeshiva, the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. Principals of fifteen of the largest Talmud Torahs in New York were present. A disturbing factor for the future development of Jewish education was seen in the tendency of the so-called "minimalists," i.e., those communal leaders and educators who advocate the adherence to a minimum of Jewish education in the Hebrew schools and Talmud Torahs. It was asserted that this tendency is gaining ground in certain quarters and that it endangers the scope and effect of a traditional Jewish development. Those present declared themselves in favor of a maximum program of Jewish education.

The contemplated Greater New York Council for Jewish education will have for its purpose to study the problem of Jewish education in New York, to strengthen the educational institutions adhering to the maximum program and to combat the trend of the "minimalists."

## Owner of Houses in Which Hebron Jews Were Killed Gets Jail Term

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—Regretting that the law does not permit a heavier sentence, district officer Miller, sentenced the owner of a house in Hebron in which six Jews were killed to six months. The accused when arrested, was wearing a coat belonging to Moshe Harbeter, an American rabbinical student. The Arab pleaded that the coat had been sold to him by a bedouin.

## Wailing Wall Commission to Leave England After Naming

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—The Wailing Wall Commission to be appointed to settle Jewish and Arab claims to the Wailing Wall, will leave England as soon as it is named. In the meantime the Jewish Agency has appointed a number of scholars to prepare material for presenting the Jewish claims to the Commission.

## SOVIET ORT IN WHITE RUSSIA LIQUIDATED

Moscow, Feb. 24—The Soviet Ort, the society that provides the Jews in Russia with tools and machinery, in White Russia, was today ordered liquidated by a special decision. This, however, does not affect the International Ort in White Russia.

## Sophie Levin, Red Cross Worker, Dies in Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, Feb. 24—Sophie Levin, 44, nationally known Red Cross worker, who instituted the annual "roll call" plan and directed work for raising funds for Belgian and German war relief, died at her home here today. For fifteen years she was identified with Red Cross work in western Pennsylvania. She was the founder of the Mothers' Pension League of Allegheny County.

Born in Troy, N. Y., she came to Pittsburgh at an early age. She was first connected with the Pittsburgh Industrial Development Council and was later employed by the late Dr. Leonard Levy of Temple Rodef Shalom. Her first connection with the Red Cross, in which she received national honors some weeks ago, was in the campaign for Belgian war relief. Later she directed the work of raising funds for German relief and the Mississippi flood sufferers. Her years of effort along welfare lines culminated in the award of a gold medal from the National Red Cross, which was presented to her while she was in the hospital.

## Telegraphs on Riots Boost Palestine Postal Revenues

Jerusalem, Feb. 24—A great increase in the revenue of the Palestine post office department is reported. The bulk of the increase is due to the riots during which the telegraphic department of the post office obtained a great revenue from the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Other news agencies, too, swelled the income. The number of telephones is also on the upgrade, primarily for purposes of security. It is estimated that the post office department's earnings for 1929 are double what they were in 1928.

## White Russian Ozet Opposes Expulsion of Poor Ex-Traders

Moscow, Feb. 24—Henceforth ex-traders who used no hired labor and gave up trading last year will not be expelled from the collective, according to a resolution adopted at the closing session of the White Russian Ozet meeting in Minsk. Most of the speakers criticized the Central Committee for expelling poor ex-traders.

## Prof. Moritz Bonn of Berlin Going to Leland Stanford U.

Berlin, Feb. 24—Moritz Julius Bonn, professor in the Berlin Commercial High School, German delegate to the Carnegie Foundation and author of "The Problem of America," has accepted the invitation of Leland Stanford University in California to deliver a series of lectures there during the summer semester of 1930 on the problems of international finance economy.

## Better for Russian Jews To Be Collectivized Than to Settle Individually, Says Dr. Rosen

It is better for the Jews of Russia who are colonized on farms today to be grouped together in collectives than to colonize them on an individual basis, according to the statement made by Dr. Joseph Rosen, director of the Agro-Joint in Russia, in an interview with S. Dingol of the "Day," before he left New York last week to return to his post in Russia.

"Must the Joint agree to the collectivization of the Jewish colonies? Aren't they protected against it in the contract which you have with the Russian government?" Mr. Dingol asked Dr. Rosen.

"This is not a question of 'must,' but a question of what is better for the Jews who are in the colonies," Dr. Rosen replied. "We have before us the example of the German colonists, who started a rumpus against collectivization and returned to their colonies only when the government allowed them to remain at their former system. What did they gain by it? They are hated by their neighbors. They are boycotted by the cooperatives. They cannot buy in the government stores and they are regarded as enemies of the government. We don't want to place the Jews in such a position."

"If it should come to a quarrel between the Agro-Joint and the government, have you a right to withdraw from Russia, and could you get back the capital which American Jews have invested there?" Mr. Dingol asked.

"There is a clause in our contract with the Russian government that in case of a dispute the question should be submitted to arbitration," was the reply.

"Who are to be the arbitrators?" "One is to be appointed by us, another by the 'Comzet,' representing the Russian government, and a third is to be the dean of the law faculty of either Harvard University, or of the university of Oslo, Norway—in any event a neutral party."

## Jewish Senator Sleeps in Bed of Polish King

Warsaw, Feb. 24—Senator Rabbi Rubenstein slept Friday night in the historic bed of the Polish king, Jan Sobieski, which is located in the Polish parliament building.

Friday evening, during a session of a senate committee, Senator Rubenstein suddenly became sick. The speaker of the Senate, Szymanski, who is a physician, offered him first aid, and also put a government automobile at his disposal to take him home. But since it was the Sabbath, Senator Rubenstein refused to ride home. As a result, Szymanski invited Rubenstein to make use of Sobieski's bed for the night.

The bed of Sobieski was removed some time ago from the royal palace to the parliament building.

## Moscow Denies Chief Rabbi Gluskin Will Be Executed; 11 Kehillah Leaders Freed

Minsk rabbis had been executed, the newspaper, "Oktobre," the organ of the Jewish Communists in Minsk, declares that all rabbis in Russia play an important role in the present anti-Soviet crusade abroad and that they are all spies for foreign-counter-revolutionaries and that therefore "these holy damagers should be carefully watched."

The entire Soviet press, from the "Isvestzia," the official government paper, to the smallest sheet, today carries a furious official attack on the Jewish Telegraphic Agency because of the furor raised abroad over the danger of the Minsk rabbis. The attack is directly traceable to the promise made by Senator Borah to Congressman Dickstein to inquire from Moscow for official information as to the fate of the fourteen leaders of the Minsk Jewish community, allegedly sentenced to death.

In a denial circulated here today through Tass, the official government news agency, the story of the execution of the rabbis is termed a "deliberate lie" and "similar information emanating from Warsaw is false and part of the ring in the present anti-Soviet campaign abroad."

Inquiry at the Russian foreign office by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency's correspondent revealed that Senator Borah's inquiry has not been received.

Anti-religious Jewish street demonstrations allegedly organized by the entire Jewish population are reported from a number of townships in the Minsk, Mozir, Bobroisk and Vitebsk regions. The Jews are said to be marching on the local soviets asking that the synagogues be converted. The last synagogue in Krupke has been converted while a red flag waves over the synagogue in a Vitebsk region township.

(Editor's Note)—The first story of the arrest of the Minsk kehillah leaders that came from Moscow via J.T.A. gave no indication that they would be shot. The same day that the reports that the kehillah leaders would be executed or had already been executed, reports emanating from Warsaw where information to that effect had been received by Rabbi Israel Schapiro, known as the Grodissker Rebbe, and Rabbi Chaim Ozer Grodzenski, the Moscow correspondent of the J.T.A., cabled that there was no danger of their being executed. Later, after a long distance telephone conversation with a prominent Jewish leader in Minsk, the J.T.A. correspondent wired the reassuring news that not only were the kehillah leaders not to be shot but some of them were actually to be released.

## Young Judaea Celebrates Twentieth Anniversary

America's first and largest Jewish youth organization, Young Judaea, is now celebrating the twentieth anniversary of its founding, having grown from a single club in New York City to a national organization comprising almost twenty thousand Jewish boys and girls between the ages of twelve and eighteen, according to an announcement issued by Dr. Israel Goldstein, President of Young Judaea, who is also Rabbi of Temple B'nai Jeshurun.

In a proclamation sent to the five hundred clubs throughout the country Dr. Goldstein reviews the progress that has been made in American Jewry during the past two decades and concludes that these twenty years have seen the emergence of American Jewry from an unimportant section of Jewry to leadership in all Jewish affairs throughout the world.

The entire month of March will be devoted to anniversary banquets in every town where there is a Jewish community. The founders of Young Judaea, of which Samuel J. Borowsky is today executive chairman, and Nathan Straus, honorary president, included the late Israel Friedlander, Dr. Judah L. Magnes, now chancellor of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem; Miss Henrietta Szold, member of the Palestine Zionist Executive, and Emanuel Neuman, president of the Jewish National Fund of America.

## Amtorg Claims Books Bought, Not Confiscated

While admitting that they had been selling Jewish books brought to this country from Russia, the Amtorg yesterday denied that these books were the same as those that had been confiscated by the Soviet Government in its anti-religious campaign. The Amtorg claimed that the Jewish books sold by them were purchased from individual owners and from book-dealers by the State Trading Company of the White Russian Republic located at Minsk. The Amtorg further declared that all these purchases are accompanied by certificates of sale from the owners, which were forwarded to this country.

## Heads Washington Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association

Washington, Feb. 24—Mark Lansburgh, a leading Washington Jewish business man, has been elected president of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association, which together with the Chamber of Commerce, constitute the two general organizations of business men in the city. Mr. Lansburgh has participated in many local Jewish philanthropies.

## Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences to Give Public Lectures

In a paper on "Scientific Research in Jewish Music," presented Sunday at the annual convention of the Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences by Professor Jacob Weinberg, the resumption of studies which were undertaken by the Society of Jewish Music in Russia years ago but which were interrupted by the wars and revolutions there, was urged. In reviewing Jewish music from the folk-songs of the Palestinian Jews and Arabs to the present day, Professor Weinberg particularly emphasized the value of religious music in interpreting the character of the race.

At a dinner concluding the third annual convention of the Academy, it was announced by Dr. Barnet Elzas, a director of the organization, that the Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences will give this year a lecture course for the public. This course, to be given by members of the academy, will include all branches of the arts and sciences. The academy will also raise a fund to provide for the publishing of the works of needy scholars and will also give prizes for the best works of art.

## Call on U. P. A. Officials and Zionists to Aid Allied Drive

State and local officers of the United Palestine Appeal and the rank and file of the Zionist movement are called upon, in a statement issued yesterday by Judge William M. Lewis and Morris Rothenberg, national chairman and chairman of the board of directors of that body, to give their fullest cooperation to the Allied Jewish Campaign. The statement points out that the latter organization, of which Felix M. Warburg is honorary chairman and Paul Baerwald, David M. Bressler, Judge Lewis and Mr. Rothenberg are chairmen, and which aims to raise \$6,000,000 for 1930 for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, has assumed the American share of the budget for that country, heretofore met by the United Palestine Appeal, which it replaces.

The statement calls upon U.P.A. workers and Zionists generally to attend the national conference at Washington, D. C., on March 8th and 9th, of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

Announcement was also made that Detroit is the first city to get under way for the new fund-raising effort. In response to an address last Sunday evening by Mr. Bressler, outlining the purposes of the campaign and its urgency, "The Service Group" of Detroit, composed of leaders of the Orthodox, Reform, Zionist and non-Zionist elements, agreed to raise \$125,000 for the Allied Jewish Campaign in a "drive" which is set for April 27th.
