Death Sentence of Hinkis Commuted to 15 Years in Prison by Court of Appeal

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 11.—The death sentence of Simche Hinkis, the Jewish police constable who had been found guilty of murder, was today set aside by a British court of appeal consisting of Judges Baker, Kermack and MacDonnell, and a 15-year sentence for murder without premeditation substituted. This is the second death penalty on a Jew that has been set aside, the first being in the case of Joseph Mizrahi Uprahli.

Extra editions of the papers, long distance telephone calls and word of mouth instantly flashed to all parts of Palestine the news of the commutation of Hinkis' sentence which had been foreshadowed on Friday after the successful appeal of Mordecai Eliash, Hinkis' counsel. The judgment was delivered at 9.30 in the morning and lasted but two minutes. The Chief Justice briefly expressed the court's unanimous decision convicting the Jewish police officer of only unpremeditated murder in the famous Jaffa case which the Arab counsel at the Inquiry

Retrial of Anti-Semites of Kishinev Put Off to June

Kishinev, Mar. 11.—The second trial of the anti-Semite students who are accused of participation in the recent disorders here has been postponed to the middle of June, because the defendants left for Prague as delegates to the student congress of the Little Entente countries. This excuse given for the postponement of the trial is regarded by the press here as "very queer."

Hinkis' Counsel to Appeal From 15-Year Sentence

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 11.—The authorities of the prison where Simche Hinkis, the Jewish police constable whose death sentence has been commuted to fifteen years' imprisonment by the Court of Appeal, is imprisoned, are expecting the order of commutation and as soon as it arrives, Hinkis will shed his red death robes and chains and don civilian clothes and receive food from the outside, to which privileges he is entitled as a foreign subject.

The office of Mordecai Eliash, Hinkis' counsel, informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that Eliash expects to apply for permission to appeal to the Privy Council in London against the present sentence as soon as the judgment of the Court of Appeal is received.

Jewish Shops Shut Down in Protest Against Withdrawal of Plan to Lessen Taxes

Warsaw, Mar. 11.—The day of protest set aside today by the Jewish Deputies Club against the decision of the Polish government to withdraw its plan for easing the tax burdens of tradesmen passed quietly. The shutting down of stores and shops was almost 100 percent with the Jewish business men in the principal trading centers heeding the call almost to a man.

While Jewish places of business were shut down tight their owners and employees stood in front of the shops. Street traders, too, were not working and reports from many provincial towns show that Jewish shops and a number of Christian stores were closed.

Anti-Passover Campaign Opened By Godless League in Russia

Moscow, Mar. 11.—The anti-Passover campaign was officially launched here today by the Godless League which is not, however, a government institution. Instructions issued by the League to all its branches explain that this year Passover coincides with Easter and that therefore the Godless Jews and non-Jews should establish a united anti-Passover front with anti-religious torchlight street demonstrations on the night of April 19 and anti-Passover mass street demonstrations the following day. All this will be accompanied by radio speeches and anti-Passover placards.

The League orders its members not to fail to report for daily work during the week of Passover. "The entire Passover campaign should be utilized for strengthening the propaganda for the closing of synagogues and churches," says the notice. At the same time, the central committee of the Godless League has issued a circular urging the provincial branches not to go to extremes in closing places of worship. "Closings shouldn't be carried out by administrative force when the majority oppose it because insufficient propaganda has been carried on."

Praises Jewish Student Houses in Roumania

Bucharest, Mar. 11.—James Peffer, delegate of the League of Nations Student Council, has been studying the student question in Roumania, especially with regard to the recent anti-Semitic student outbursts in Jassy, which he discussed with the notorious anti-Semitic leader, Professor Cuza. Mr. Peffer was lavish in his praise of the Jewish student houses throughout Roumania.

Students Reject Extremists' Demands for Resignation of Dr. Judah L. Magnes

Jerusalem, Mar. 11.—The proposal of the Revisionist students demanding the resignation of Dr. Judah L. Magnes as chancellor of the Hebrew University, was voted down last night at a special meeting of the students. By a vote of 49 to 31, Dr. Magnes was censured, but the question of the chancellorship was left to the Vaad Leumi.

A number of professors, while deploring Dr. Magnes' separate political activities, urged the rejection of the extremists' demand calling for his resignation.

The text of the resolution adopted by the students, censuring Dr. Magnes, reads: "We vigorously protest against the activities of Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University, which are undermining the national discipline and are diametrically opposed to the Jewish peoples' aspirations in their country. The people do not distinguish between Dr. Magnes' activities and his post, although he has announced that he is acting only on his personal responsibility. We urge the Vaad Leumi and the Actions Committee to take all measures against Dr. Magnes' activities in this direction."

Critical Economic Situation Endangers Polish Jews' Health

Warsaw, Mar. 11.—Among the resolutions adopted at the final session of the Polish-Jewish health society "Toz," there is one which declares that the critical Jewish economic situation endangers the health of the Jewish population.

Another resolution also asks the Kheilloth not to certify mohelim whose medical competency has not been examined, since there have been many cases recently in which infants have contracted tuberculosis as a result of incompetent operations.

Anti-Semitism Depopulates Hungarian Villages of Jews

Vienna, Mar. 11.—Many Hungarian villages that formerly contained considerable Jewish populations are now left without a single Jew as a result of mass emigration of Jews during the past few years, according to the president of the Budapest Kehillah, Szolnoker, who writes in the "Egyenloeszeg." In many cases, he says, the Jewish residents of these villages have simply been expelled by force, while in most cases it is the economic anti-Semitism which has forced these Jewish villagers to abandon their fields, businesses, synagogues and cemeteries.

Sir Herbert Deplores Soviet Religious Persecution, But Opposes Severing Relations

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Mar. 11—Religious persecution undoubtedly exists in Russia but the reports of religious atrocities are exaggerated, declared Sir Herbert Samuel, former High Commissioner in Palestine, addressing a meeting of his constituency in Darwin. Admitting that the Soviets "practice spiritual oppression, outrage feelings of reverence and flout tolerance," Sir Herbert said that this was "no reason to break off diplomatic relations."

"We had diplomatic relations with the Czar," said Sir Herbert, "but that did not imply approval of his oppression. Similarly relations with Moscow do not imply approval of their internal actions. But the Russian leaders should know that the moral sense of mankind in all countries and of all classes and creeds profoundly disapproves of their attack on the primary human rights of liberty of thought."

Schachita Ban Looms in Austria as Animal Friends Claim Cruelty

Vienna, Mar. 11—The Austrian Parliament is preparing a new slaughtering law. Until now the committee on justice had decided that prohibition of cruelty to animals does not apply to those things which are done for religious or scientific purposes. Nevertheless the society for the prevention of cruelty to animals has started a protest movement demanding that the government and parliament annul the exemption to religious and scientific slaughtering.

If the society for the prevention of cruelty to animals has its way it will mean that the Jews will have to take measures to protect their rights with regard to schachita, the Jewish method of slaughtering.

Announce 40% of Ope's Books To Be Junked; Treasures Removed to Kiev Academy

Moscow, Mar. 11—Forty percent of the valuable books from the liquidated library of the Ope (Society for Spreading Culture Among the Jews) of Leningrad, will be sold as junk, it was announced today during the festive transfer of the treasures of the society, liquidated because it was "bourgeoisie and counter-revolutionary," to the Jewish department of the Ukrainian Academy in Kiev.

A number of prominent Communists, including A. Osherovitch from Minsk, Liberberg from Kiev, and Litvakov from Moscow, made a special trip to Leningrad for the ceremony. In their speeches they declared that the Ope should have been liquidated much sooner as a "Zionistic, Hebraistic, rabbinical, militarist association," but the Yevsekstria had overlooked it, "being engaged in more important tasks."

Court Upholds Sentence on Arab Sheikh Agitator

Jerusalem, Mar. 11—Within a few minutes after the Hinkis' judgment had been delivered by the Court of Appeal, the same judges upheld the two years' sentence on Sheikh Taleb Marka for incitement that led up to the massacre in Hebron. In rejecting Marka's appeal, the court ridiculed the defence's plea that he was justified in urging the Hebron Arabs to go to Jerusalem to protect fellow Arabs threatened by the Jews.

Because of denial of his appeal, Marka will begin serving his two-year sentence today. Hitherto he had been detained in the prison hospital.

Jewish Industrialist From Vienna Commits Suicide

Berlin, Mar. 11—While Swiss friends were waiting to assist him, Oscar Von Koerner, 51, Viennese industrialist and timber king of Europe who had suffered great financial losses after the failure of the Depositen Bank of Vienna in which he was majority stockholder, committed suicide here yesterday in his room by swallowing poison. During the war he accumulated a fortune of \$12,000,000 and later received a title of nobility from Hungary.

"Emes" Says Jewish Religious Spirit Exists in Nevel

Moscow, Mar. 11—Nevel, where the famous rabbinical seminary, was liquidated last year is still the center of illegal Jewish religious activities, complains the Jewish Communist daily "Emes." The spirit of the Lubavitcher Rebbe still prevails there, the paper says, relating that the local rabbi still heads a rabbinical seminary, that funds are collected to which Jewish workers and even Communists contribute.

Krass Makes Strong Plea for Unity at Session of Allied Jewish Campaign Conference

It is not a question now of Palestine or Russia, but of Palestine and Russia, declared Rabbi Nathan L. Krass of Temple Emanu-El, who was the last speaker at Saturday night's session of the conference of the Allied Jewish Campaign. Dr. Krass made a strong plea for Jewish unity in aiding Jews wherever they are in distress today.

"The time has come when we must lay aside all our internal differences, which are all right, academically speaking," said Rabbi Krass. "The time has come when we must all unite, all Jews—those within the fold and those without the fold—in order that we may help our brethren abroad, because if we do not help them, it is very dubious whether anybody else will help them. We are their brethren whether we like it or not. God has joined us together and what God has joined together, no Jew has the right to separate," declared Rabbi Krass.

Palestine Jewish Press Takes Issue with Shields

Jerusalem, Mar. 10—The entire Jewish press takes issue with the statement recently made by Dr. Drummond Shields, under-secretary for the Colonies, to a delegation of Scotch Zionists, about the economic capacity of Palestine. The "Palestine Weekly" sums up Jewish sentiment by saying "like Syria, which is richer in natural resources, Palestine has always been a country of emigration. If 100,000 Jews came in during the last decade and have been absorbed in the economic structure that is not due to economic capacity but to the fact that the Jews themselves created the absorption possibilities."

David Goldbaum, Son of Jewish Pioneer in Mexico, Dies at 71

San Diego, Mar. 11—David Goldbaum, 71, mayor of Ensenada, Mexico, died here yesterday. He was born of a Jewish father who came from Poland in the early fifties and settled in Mexico. Together with a number of his schoolmates, he was kidnapped by the "Tiger of the Allicas," a notorious Mexican bandit whose habit was to abduct children of wealthy parents and hold them for ransom.

Goldbaum's father paid a heavy ransom and sent him to school in San Francisco. Later he was graduated from the Colorado School of Mines and returned to Ensenada. Goldbaum surveyed the town and the greater part of Lower California, becoming a recognized authority on exploration and mineralogy. During his travels he collected valuable relics and presented to his town the Museo Regional. Goldbaum was mayor of Ensenada for many years and was a personal friend of Presidents Diaz, Calles and Gil.

Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities Plans \$175,000 Deficit Drive

The Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities has decided to conduct an Emergency Deficit Campaign this Spring for \$175,000, according to an announcement by Nathan D. Shapiro, president of the organization. The decision was made at a meeting of the finance committee and later approved at a meeting of the entire board, held at the Unity Club, in Brooklyn. The Emergency Campaign, Mr. Shapiro explained, is made necessary by the increased demands for relief that are being made upon the Federation agencies, and the decrease in annual collections following the recent decline of stocks on the market.

The decision of the finance committee to conduct a campaign at this time, Mr. Shapiro said, was based upon reports presented by the Federation societies, indicating that a reduction in their allotments of last year would seriously undermine the efficiency of their work in rendering service to the poor and needy of the borough, and in many instances, would jeopardize the very existence of the societies.

On the basis of these reports, Mr. Shapiro explained, the committee and the board decided upon a campaign for \$175,000, which would make possible the continuance of the work of the Federation agencies. "We felt," said Mr. Shapiro, "that we could not possibly undertake to make these drastic reductions in the allotment to our societies without first appealing to the great Jewish community of Brooklyn to make possible the continuance of the work which our agencies are doing in the community. We are all convinced that the Jewish community of Brooklyn will maintain the ancient tradition of our people of taking care of their own poor and needy, when the situation is properly presented to them."

Another important factor in the decision.

Soviets Liquidate Jewish Relief Society in Leningrad

Moscow, Mar. —The Jewish relief society, Yekopo, established in Leningrad in 1914, has been liquidated by the local authorities. The society maintained a kitchen that served kosher food to poor Jewish students, to the old people's home and to a number of other institutions.

Arab Press Jubilant at Favorable Rumors of Commission's Report

Jerusalem, Mar. 11—The Arab press echoes a triumphant note at the report of an Arab victory in the Inquiry Commission's report. The "Flestin" scores Harry Snell, the Labor member, for holding a minority view favoring Zionism. The paper declares that Snell is carrying out the government's instructions.

Ochs Elected Honorary Head of N. Y. Reform Congregations

Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the New York "Times," was elected honorary president, and Judge Irving Lehman of the Court of Appeals was made an honorary vice-president of the Metropolitan Association of Reform Jewish Congregations, at a meeting of the association Monday night at Temple Emanu-El. Judge Lehman succeeds the late Louis Marshall in this office, just as he succeeded Mr. Marshall to the office of president of Congregation Emanu-El at the time of the latter's death in September.

Other honorary vice-presidents elected at the meeting were Meier Steinbrink, Dr. Lee K. Frankel and Albert M. Levi. Sydney H. Herman was elected president and Max L. Schallack, David M. Bressler, Ludwig Vogelstein and Judge Mitchell May the vice-presidents. Rabbi Jacob B. Pollak was elected secretary and the following were chosen as the executive committee: Maurice Blumenthal, H. Louis Jacobson, Nathaniel H. Lyons, Seymour Mork, Dr. Nathan Stern, S. H. Sternberg, Dr. S. S. Tedesco, Henry M. Toch, Benjamin Veit, Harry N. Wessel and Dr. Jonah B. Wise.

Uniformity in Sunday school curricula and the problem of bringing the Reform congregations in the Metropolitan area into closer relationship were discussed at the meeting. Many delegates expressed themselves as opposed to a strict uniformity in the conduct of the Sunday schools.

Immigrants Leave England for U. S. After Waiting 7 Years

London, Mar. 11—After seven weary years of waiting at the English equivalent of Ellis Island, a party of 30 immigrants are on their way to the United States. They are the remainder of 600, mostly Jews, who were stranded in England and interned when the quota was enforced in the United States. The last 30 have been known as lost souls who despite tremendous hardships had given up hope of ever reaching America. Every case is a most pathetic story in itself, which through the years often engaged attention in the papers.

MURDERER OF JEWS GETS FOUR DEATH SENTENCES

Coblentz, Mar. 11—A court in Coblentz has sentenced Stanislaus Szmari to die four times for four murders. Szmari, a smuggler was tried in 1921 for breaking into the house of the Jewish merchant Kocherl on the German-Polish border in the town of Proсна and killing the merchant Yakobowitch, his wife, sister and an 8-year-old boy.

Szmari escaped into Germany, adopted the name of Miller, and settled in the town of Vestun on the Rhineland. In 1928 he was recognized and arrested. At the trial, Mrs. Kocherl identified the murderer.

Efforts of Those Preaching Christian-Jewish Goodwill Termed Insincere by Rabbi

Philadelphia, Mar. 11—Speaking on the general topic of "Genuine and Spurious Types of Goodwill," Rabbi Bernard Heller, rabbi of the Madison Avenue Temple, Scranton, occupying the pulpit of Congregation Keneseth Israel, Sunday characterized as insincere the efforts of those who are engaged in preaching goodwill between the Jews and the Christians in this country. Rabbi Heller pointed to the superficiality of their attempts, to the lack of scientific approach and to the insincerity which surrounds much of this propaganda.

"Goodwill," Rabbi Heller declared, "resolves itself into a challenge as well as a creed. If the promoters of goodwill, therefore, are sincere in their professions, they must become more scientific in their procedure. If their interest be the attainment of their objective but not mere ballyhooing and the whirring of the organizational machinery, they must cease to be content with pious platitudes and hollow proclamations. They must see to it that their very selves and surroundings incarnate their beliefs. Deeds must supplement words and the shafts must be leveled against the definite and concrete practices that prevail in their beliefs. If goodwill and better understanding of the Jew is their aim, they must strive to eradicate economic discrimination against the Jew. They must take steps to introduce into their schools and churches a true and historic rendition of the life and death story of Jesus."

Dr. Melchior Declines to Head the Reichsbank

Berlin, Mar. 11—Dr. Karl Melchior, a partner of Max Warburg, noted Hamburg banker, and brother of Felix Warburg, American philanthropist, is being considered in government circles here as president of the Reichsbank to succeed to Dr. Schacht, who resigned last week. Dr. Melchior is one of the outstanding economists in Germany and has represented his country at all of the recent international economic conferences as well as in the reparations negotiations.

Dr. Melchior, himself, however, has officially declined to accept the position.

10,000 Ukrainian Jews Placed in Industry During Last 6 Months

Moscow, Mar. 11—Ten thousand Jews in Ukraina were placed in different industrial enterprises during the last six months, the Ukrainian Comzet reports.

Death Sentence of Hinkis Commuted to 15 Years in Prison by Court of Appeal

Commission hearings had capitalized.

Hinkis, with his chains clanging, but clean-shaven and bright-eyed, heard the judgment that freed him from the death sentence. Happy smiles diffused the court room, which was filled with lawyers, newspapermen and a number of patient Jews. On the streets, the eager Jews embraced each other and congratulated themselves on what is being termed here a partial triumph of justice.

The 23-year-old police corporal had been sentenced to death for the murder of an Arab family of five, between Tel Aviv and Jaffa, on August 23. The charge against him was that on the day of the crime, after learning that Benjamin Goldberg and his friends had been murdered, Hinkis doffed his police cap, removed the number of his regiment and joined the crowd that stormed the house in which five Arabs were killed and two wounded.

The entire case of the prosecution was predicated on reports of experts who identified the marks of the cartridges that were fired with those on Hinkis' rifles and on reports of his movements in the neighborhood on the day of the murders. Great tension marked the trial which opened in Jaffa, January 3, and on February 5 he was sentenced to death.

The appeal which was immediately filed was heard on Friday and the Court reserved judgment. Hinkis' counsel argued during the hearing on the appeal that the death sentence should be set aside because the lower court had convicted the youthful police officer on the strength of nothing but expert evidence and that even if circumstantial evidence were accepted, premeditation had not been proven.

When Hinkis was sentenced, the entire Jewish community was shocked and amazed. Hinkis insisted on his innocence and repeated it in a touching letter to his parents in Rovno.

Students Urged to Ask for Magnes' Resignation

Jerusalem, Mar. 11—Arguing that Dr. Magnes' influence is due to his being chancellor of the Hebrew University, a circular issued by the students' fraternity urges the students to demand his resignation because "Magnes' activity lowers the dignity and honor of the University in the eyes of the entire people. The students are not doing anything to halt his activity and therefore share in the responsibility."

Former Editor of Hebrew Daily Charged With Espionage, Gossip

Moscow, Mar. 11—Leon Rabbino-witz, 77, former editor of the Hebrew daily "Hameilitz," who was arrested some time ago with other leaders of the Leningrad Jewish community, is accused of espionage and conducting anti-Soviet gossip abroad. The accusation is very serious and its basis is the fact that he sent newsletters to the New York Yiddish daily, "The Day."

TEXAS ZIONISTS PLAN PALESTINE COLONY

Dallas, Mar. 11—A campaign to raise \$100,000 for the establishment of a Texas colony in Palestine will be launched in San Antonio March 30, it was announced here today by Dr. Henry Raphael Gold, honorary president of the Texas Zionist Association. All Zionist factions in the state have united to make the campaign a success.

Purim Observance Takes

Form of Aid to Needy

Yonkers, N. Y., Mar. 11—Because of the current unemployment and distress, Purim observance on the part of several Jewish groups here is taking the form of relief of needy families. For instance, Temple Emanu-El Sisterhood has garnered dry groceries, which it will distribute on the holiday, to disseminate cheer among needy.

Bill Annulling Czaristic Restrictions in Poland Passes Its Second Reading

Warsaw, Mar. 11—Another step in the voiding of the anti-Jewish restrictions that remain in Poland from the Czaristic days was taken when the Polish Sejm unanimously adopted the second reading of the bill to annul these restrictions. The third reading is expected next week.

FOUR ARABS TO BE HELD FOR SLONIM MASSACRE

Jerusalem, Mar. 11—All Hebron notables testified today in the preliminary hearing regarding the commitment for the Slonim house murders. The notables all tried to quash the case against Nasser Eddin and Issa Elaraif, two prominent citizens accused of participating in the massacre. Examining magistrate Miller agreed to discharge Eddin for good, but committed four others, including Elaraif, for premeditated murder.

cision to have a campaign at this time, Mr. Shapiro said, was the proposed merger of the Brooklyn and New York Federations of Charity. "One of the conditions of the proposed merger," Mr. Shapiro declared, "is that neither organization shall have a deficit at the time when the merger becomes effective. Since the only condition attached to the gift of \$1,000,000 by Ralph Jonas to the combined Federation is that the merger become effective not later than January 1, 1931, it means that we must close the year 1930 without a deficit if the amalgamation is to become a fact. An analysis of the sources of revenue of the Brooklyn Federation shows that we cannot possibly accomplish this without a campaign for additional funds.
