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## Many Injured in Latest Anti-Semitic Outbreaks in Cities of Roumania

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Mar. 12—New anti-Semitic disturbances occurred today in Jassy and Klausenberg. At Jassy, the seat of the university, four Jewish students were injured. None of the professors participated in the trouble. The police arrested the rioters including the leaders and the chairman of the Cuzist students.

At Klausenberg, during a demonstration against minorities, students beat and injured a number of Jews. The police intervened and broke the riot when the students began breaking windows.

In Bucharest theological students leading a demonstration against religious persecution in Russia carried anti-Semitic flags.

The International News Service reports from Bucharest that more than 100 persons were injured, a number seriously, when a mob of Roumanian students stormed the town hall in Klausenberg during a demonstration against Jews and Hungarians studying at the university there.

Taking possession of the town hall the rioters resisted the police and a detachment of troops for an hour. In the meantime a miniature battle raged with the students hurling stones and anything else they could lay their hands on from the windows and roof of the building. Many women were injured as the troops dispersed the students by charging the building with unsheathed bayonets.

## Rabbis to Discuss Wailing Wall Question in Paris

Warsaw, Mar. 12—Rabbi A. Schorr, Chief Rabbi of Warsaw, has been invited by Rabbi Israel Levy, Chief Rabbi of France, to come to Paris for a consultation on the Wailing Wall question. A number of other prominent rabbis and scholars will participate in the deliberations, among them Rabbi Solomon Kahane, president of the Orthodox Rabbis of Poland.

## Jews Generous Contributors to Flood Sufferers' Fund

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Mar. 12—The Jewish banking firms of Rothschild, Lazards, Weill and Dreyfus have been among the largest contributors to the emergency fund for the flood sufferers in southern France. The Rothschilds gave one million francs, the Lazards 250,000, Weill 50,000, and Dreyfus 50,000, while the list of minor donors contains an abundance of Jewish names.

## Cardozo, Leman Suggested for U. S. Supreme Court Vacancy by "Telegram"

Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo, chief justice of the New York Court of Appeals and Monte M. Leman of New Orleans, a member of the Hoover Crime Commission are suggested by the New York "Telegram" as the type of men to be selected to fill the vacancy in the United States Supreme Court caused by the death of Justice Sanford. The "Telegram" terms Judge Cardozo a man "whose eminence as a jurist is almost unique."

## Palestine Jewry Prepared for Purim Celebration

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 12—While all synagogues in Palestine have been directed to recite psalms on Esther Taanith (the day before Purim) to implore divine mercy for the Russian Jews persecuted because of the religious war, the entire country is preparing to celebrate Purim, March 14, despite the abolition of the carnival in Tel Aviv.

The railways have reduced the fares, and thousands are expected to throng Tel Aviv, where the merchants announce that the shops will remain open until 10 P. M.

## To Abolish Prison for Debtors Unable to Meet Obligations

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 12—Only those debtors who are financially able to pay but who refuse, will be imprisoned for twenty-one days instead of ninety days as at present, under the terms of a new ordinance to be enacted shortly which will abolish imprisonment for debtors who are unable to meet their obligations. The announcement of the new ordinance was made by High Commissioner Chancellor at Jenin.

## Roumanian Justice Minister to Facilitate Citizenship

Bucharest, Mar. 12—Volici Nitgescu, the new Roumanian minister of justice, today promised the Jewish deputy Fischer that one of the first laws he would bring before Parliament would be one facilitating citizenship.

## SEVEN YOUNG BOYCOTT LEADERS ARE ARRESTED

Jerusalem, Mar. 12—Seven young Arab boycott agitators have been arrested here and bailed in \$50 each. The leader was detained pending a hearing because he resisted arrest.

## "Emes" Asks Jews Give Up Their Religious Articles During Week of Passover

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 12—In a nine-column article in today's "Emes," the organ of the Moscow Jewish Communists, the paper explains how to conduct the anti-Passover campaign and calls upon the Jews to voluntarily submit during Passover week their religious articles for the industrialization fund and also to collectively resign from the kehilahs where they still exist.

It is learned that the "Emes" will this year concentrate not against the eating of matzoths, because there won't be any matzoths, but on getting more brass, silver and gold religious articles during the Passover week. Instructions to this effect have been sent by the "Emes" to all its provincial correspondents.

A new matzoth tariff of ten roubles per kilo has been announced. This together with the additional duty will make the price of matzoths about three dollars per pound.

## Ogpu Chief Attorney Says No Religious Persecution in Russia

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 12—P. Katayan, the chief attorney of the G. P. U., the Russian secret police, denied today that religious persecution existed in Soviet Russia. "Only those who harm socialistic industrialization and who are agents of imperialistic government or who hide and assist foreign spies who are preparing for capitalistic armies for an anti-Soviet war have been persecuted," he said.

## Hebrew Press Says 15-Year Hinkis Sentence Still Unjust

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 12—Expressing satisfaction at the commutation of the death sentence of Simche Hinkis, the local Hebrew press feels that even the lesser term of 15 years penal servitude is not justified. The "Doar Hayom" says, "no Jew, however much he rejoices that Hinkis has been saved from the gallows, can accept the new judgment. From the general viewpoint there is no difference between the former and the present sentence. It is savagery and absurd for one of us to be sentenced to fifteen years for we have been attacked and defenders are unpunishable."

While there is a breath of life hope lingers, declares the "Davar," urging the defense for Hinkis not to confuse its efforts for his vindication with justice.

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### Baltimore Jews Organize to Aid in Unemployment Crisis

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Baltimore, Mar. 12.—"Due to the urgency of the need and the various problems involved in the unemployment situation," according to an announcement made today by the Associated Jewish Charities, a lay group, representing business and professional interests, has been organized into a permanent advisory committee to the Vocational and Employment Department of the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

The purpose of the committee, as outlined at the organization meeting by Reuben Ottenheimer, chairman of the committee, is two-fold: job-finding and analysis of the unemployment problem as it exists in the community and its relation to the work of the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

The committee is representative of most of the industries in Baltimore, having among its personnel representatives of the needle trades, building trades, department stores, factories of various kinds, banking houses, advertising agencies and law, real estate and insurance firms. There are also in the group women familiar with domestic service needs.

### Palestine Jewry Welcomes Chalutzim from America

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 12.—Welcoming the American chalutzim who arrived here yesterday, the Hebrew daily "Davar" says "when American Jews link up directly their personal life with Palestine the same as the Russian, Yeminite, Polish and Persian Jews, then the upbuilding of Palestine becomes vital and compelling for them." The 24 chalutzim who arrived on the "Mauretania," create a bridge between the United States and Palestine that is stronger than any amount of capital or any program.

### Lowenstein Chief Speaker at 30th Jewish Hospital Meeting

Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, will be the principal speaker at one of the sessions of the thirtieth annual meeting of the National Jewish Hospital at Denver, which is to be held at Hotel Baltimore, Sunday.

According to Judge Samuel D. Levy, of the Children's Court, chairman of the New York Committee of the hospital, trustees of the institution from all parts of the country will attend the three sessions. In the morning, Dr. H. J. Corper, research director of the hospital, will summarize the studies completed by the department during the year and will describe for the first time to a lay audience the employment of the potato instead of the guinea pig in the detection of tuberculosis. Paul Felix Warburg, New York treasurer, will submit his report on local finances. Dr. William S. Friedman, founder and present president of the hospital, will preside.

The luncheon session will be devoted to a testimonial to Ben Altheimer, who was eighty years old on March 6, and who for more than thirty years has been the treasurer of the hospital. Among the luncheon speakers will be Adolph S. Ochs, Ludwig Vogelstein, Dr. Nathan Krass and Dr. Samuel Schulman. Following the luncheon, Dr. I. D. Bronfin, medical director of the hospital, will submit a report on the services rendered by the institution during the last year. Dr. William Rosenau of Baltimore also will address the afternoon meeting.

### Clubhouse for Jewish Boys To Be Erected in Chicago

Chicago, Mar. 12.—Plans for a clubhouse to be erected in Chicago as the Robert E. Franks Memorial for the American Boys' Commonwealth, sponsored by the Young Men's Jewish Charities, are practically completed. The late Jacob M. Franks left \$100,000 to provide a memorial to his son, part of which money will be devoted to the clubhouse and the balance to be utilized for improvements for Camp Wooster, at Round Lake, Ill., where boys from congested districts are sent during the summer for country outings.

### New Yonkers Synagogue To Be Dedicated Sunday

Yonkers, Mar. 12.—Formal dedication of the new synagogue of the Congregation Sons of Israel will take place Sunday at 2 P. M., according to announcement today by Morris Adlerblum, treasurer. Public ceremonies are planned. The structure is less than a block from the former temporary home of the congregation on Radford Street.

### Frederick Brown, Realtor and Philanthropist, Honored

Frederick Brown, real estate operator and philanthropist, was presented with the American Arbitration Association medal for the promotion of industrial peace, at a luncheon yesterday, held at the Hotel Astor, in recognition of his distinguished service in promoting good-will in business relations." Two others have been similarly honored in the past years. They were Charles M. Schwab and Harry Guggenheim.

Felix M. Warburg, a personal friend of Mr. Brown's, made the presentation. In pinning the medal on Mr. Brown, he said he was glad Mayor Walker was in Albany on official business so that the privilege of honoring his friend fell to him, and expressed the wish that he might be present when Mr. Brown was again honored. More than eight hundred persons attended the luncheon, and six other speakers, besides Mr. Warburg, acclaimed the leadership and character of Mr. Brown.

### Joseph Fromberg Heads 5th District B'nai B'rith

Baltimore, Mar. 12.—A banquet and Purim ball Sunday at the Lord Baltimore Hotel, brought to a close the annual two-day convention of the Fifth District, Independent Order of B'nai B'rith. At the business sessions yesterday, officers were elected and appointments made of representatives to the Constitutional Lodge, governing body of the International Order of B'nai B'rith, and to the Fifth District general committee.

Joseph Fromberg, of Charleston, S. C., was reelected president, as were the other officers with one exception. Simon E. Sobeloff, Deputy City Solicitor of Baltimore, was chosen second vice-president, succeeding Nathan H. Saltzman, of Atlanta, Ga. Other officers are William A. Goodhart, Baltimore, first vice-president; Julius Reis, Washington, treasurer, and Edwin L. Levy, Richmond, secretary.

Sidney J. Stern, of Greensboro, N. C., was named chairman of the general committee, the other members being J. Lyon, Roanoke, Va.; A. Schefferman, Washington; Dr. Leon Banov, Charleston, S. C., and Louis Assinsky, Daytona Beach, Fla. The representatives to the Grand Lodge are Harry Alexander, Atlanta, Ga.; Joseph Wilner, Washington, and Mr. Stern.

It was announced at the convention yesterday that after four years of effort, a \$250,000 tuberculosis sanatorium for Asheville, N. C., had become a reality. The sanatorium will be operated by the Fifth District.

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### Survey Reveals 11% of Students in Catholic College Are Jews

Scranton, Mar. 12.—In a compilation of statistics concerning the student body of St. Thomas College, an institution harbored by the Scranton Roman Catholic diocese, officials have announced that eleven percent of the nearly 600 students enrolled are Jews.

Six years ago, less than a half-dozen Jewish students were studying at the college, of whose faculty the Christian Brothers, a Catholic teaching order, comprise approximately fifty percent. In the past several years, two Jewish professors have been members of the faculty. They were Dr. Louis Myers, Baltimore, Md., and Dr. Louis Milkman, Scranton.

The time-worn slur in college and university circles that Jewish students fail to contribute part of their time to extra-curricular activities in institutions where they are greatly in the minority, is blasted at St. Thomas, the survey reveals.

### Sen. Wagner to Discuss Alien Registration at Hias Meeting

United States Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York will discuss the passport legislation now before Congress in his speech at the annual meeting of Hias, which will take place Sunday, March 23, at 1 P. M., at the Hotel Astor. In accepting the invitation to address the Hias meeting, Senator Wagner declared that an energetic fight on the part of all progressive elements against the registration bill is now a vital necessity.

President Abraham Herman of the Hias will read an important message at the meeting. Addresses will also be made by John L. Bernstein, Rev. Z. Maslinsky, B. Vladek, Jacob Masel, Harry Fischel, Hias treasurer, and Albert Rosenblatt, vice-president of Hias, who is also chairman of the membership committee.

### Philadelphia Jewish Charities Remembered by Mrs. Daniel

Philadelphia, Mar. 12.—Jewish charitable institutions are beneficiaries of a large part of an estate of \$100,000 and upward by the will of Mrs. Fannie S. Daniel, daughter of the late Isaac and Isabella Steppacher, probated yesterday. Mrs. Daniel, widow of the clothing manufacturer, Gustav Daniel, died March 2.

Charitable bequests are as follows: \$10,000 each to Jewish Hospital, Jewish Foster Home and Orphan Asylum, Neighborhood Center of Philadelphia, Philadelphia Jewish Sanitarium for Consumptives at Eagleview, Pa.; Orphans' Guardians Society of Philadelphia and the Convalescent Home. The Jewish Welfare Association receives \$5,000 and the residue is bequeathed to the Jewish Hospital and the Philadelphia Jewish Sanitarium at Eagleview.

### DR. SAMUEL SCHULMAN REPLIES TO ATTACK OF RABBI HERBERT GOLDSTEIN ON "SO-CALLED LIBERAL PREACHERS"

March 10th, 1930.

To the Editor,

Dear Sir:

As you saw fit to report, in your issue of March 10th, the attack which Rabbi Herbert Goldstein made on me before his Congregation in his sermon on Saturday morning, you will permit me to reply. I would not have taken any notice of such unprovoked personal attack, if it were not for the fact that I do want your readers to have a clear understanding of what is involved. Rabbi Goldstein accuses me and Dr. Fosdick, as "so-called liberal preachers" who have "pussy-footed the issue and have made their protest a sorry appendix to the white-washing of the actual facts of the illiberality of Soviet Russia's liberalism."

Dr. Fosdick can take care of himself, but I want to assure Rabbi Goldstein that those who know my ministry for forty years in this country, know that I have never pussy-footed anything. And when I speak from the pulpit, I do not speak, in the first place, as a "liberal." I speak as a Jew and as a Rabbi. I have always defended the Jews, and what is more, even Judaism in this city, against attacks from all sources, "liberal and illiberal," while many Rabbis remained discreetly silent. And in this Soviet matter, I want to assure this zealous Rabbi, that it required more moral courage to do what I did, than merely to be an echo of the leadership of others.

If the Rabbi refers to the address that I delivered at Congregation Emanu-El, Sunday morning, March 2, on "Religion, Liberty and the State—Abroad and at Home," in which I discussed the whole question of the relation of government to personal liberty, he should have, in a gentlemanly way, quoted what I said and given his reasons for criticizing it. If he referred to my signing of the protest, he has no right to question my motives.

It is evident that he does not know what he is talking about. The Soviet government is not priding itself upon its "liberalism." I venture to say that liberalism is for it, something bourgeois, at which it laughs. The Soviet government is engaged in a tremendous experiment of the socialization of Russian life, industrial and agricultural. Incident to that experiment, it is treating the individual very rigorously. I did make clear that the Soviet government is making it hard to perpetuate the Jewish religion in Russia. But I have nothing to take back from what I said, that the Soviet government, at its worst, is better than the Czaristic government was. The Soviet government is not discriminating against the Jews. If the Jews suffer, they suffer like all other religious bodies, from the anti-religious trend of present Russia. But the Soviet government has shown its good will to the Jews, in its policy of encouraging the Jew to go on the land. There are three million Jews living in Russia, and I wanted the world, including the Sov-

iet government, to know that there are men who take a somewhat different view from that taken by those who have officially organized a protest against Soviet Russia. In my opinion, the present fanatical opposition to religion in Russia, is an inevitable reaction against the conditions in Russia, when the State-Church dominated Russian life and allied itself with the oppression of the masses, with the keeping them in ignorance and with the persecution of religious minorities.

While I respect the convictions of those who have officially organized the protest, I have a right to my own convictions. And as I said in my address, "If we are really in earnest about the world's peace, we will not encourage the possibility of arousing the religious passions of the Western world, so that they become a trumpet-call to a crusade against Soviet Russia." In this matter, politics and religion are so intertwined, that I consider it best, on the whole, for ministers of religion not to agitate against Russia.

Entertainment and music will be furnished by the Radio-Keith-Orpheum. The Jewish Home for Convalescents, located at Grand View-on-the-Hudson, is supported by voluntary contributions. It admits and cares for the needy sick between the ages of 16 and 65 years, irrespective of creed or nationality. In conjunction with the show, a moving picture of the activities of the Home will be reeled off, so that the public may be enlightened as to its work.

### Widow of Mauritchev Blank Dies in Paris

Vienna, Mar. 12.—Bettina Blank, the widow of the late Mauritchev Blank, founder of the famous bank of that name in Roumania, died here today. She will be buried in the family plot at Topoli.

### 16,347 Jewish Arrivals Entered United States Last Year

Despite the restrictive immigration laws in effect, the United States still is the most important country for Jewish immigrants. During the year 1929, there arrived here 16,347 Jewish aliens hailing from all parts of the world. This represents a larger number of Jews than are going to any other country, and is approximately one-third of the total number of Jewish arrivals in the whole world during the last year.

The new arrivals, men, women and children, coming on 946 steamers, to the various ports of entry, were met and received by representatives of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, and their needs attended to. Those discharged at the piers, and for whom relatives were waiting, were immediately transferred to the latter and the others were brought to the Hias Building, where contact was established with their relatives and subsequently they were entrained for their destinations. Of the latter there were 1,517. The immigrants sent to Ellis Island were taken care of by the Ellis Island Bureau of Hias.

Practically all of the new arrivals passed through the various foreign offices of Hias—in Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Roumania, Danzig, Harbin, Germany, France and elsewhere. Of the 16,347 Jewish arrivals, 12,883 were qualified as immigrants and 3,464 as non-immigrants.

### Elaborate Synagogue To Be Built in Atlanta

Atlanta, Mar. 12—The final architectural plans for the new temple of the Hebrew Benevolent Congregation have been approved and actual construction of the edifice, which will be one of the largest synagogues in the south, costing when completed and furnished about \$500,000, will begin immediately. The building is scheduled to be completed by February 1, 1931, and will contain a main auditorium with a seating capacity for 1,000 and a religious school plant with a center auditorium seating 500.

The Hebrew Benevolent Congregation is one of the oldest religious groups in the city, having been organized 63 years ago. Rabbi David Marx, who has been pastor of the congregation since 1895, will continue to be spiritual leader of the congregation.

### Lee Hecht Renamed to Baltimore Tax Court

Baltimore, Mar. 12—The reappointment of Lee I. Hecht as a member of the Appeal Tax Court of Baltimore was announced today by Mayor William F. Broening. His name was sent to the City Council tonight and confirmed. Mr. Hecht, who is a lawyer, is the Democratic member of the Tax Court, and has been holding over since March 1, 1929.

### Winnipeg Wins A. Z. A. Debating Tournament

Detroit, Mar. 12—The Winnipeg, Manitoba, team won the debating tournament of A. Z. A., junior B'nai B'rith, in the sixth annual convention which closed here this week. Sol Kane and Max Cohen composed the team. Second debating honors went to the Kansas City chapter, the debaters being Isidore Ninookin and Sidney Glaser.

Gorman Silen, representing the Oakland, Cal., chapter, won first place in the oratorical contest. Leo M. Cherne of Rehoboth Chapter of New York was second, and Arthur Magidson of Milwaukee third. The topic for the debate was "Resolved that it is to the best interests of the Jew that the British Mandate over Palestine be continued." Winnipeg upheld the negative.

### Jewish Business Man Honored in Oakland
