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ENGLAND WILL CARRY OUT BOTH PARTS OF BALFOUR DECLARATION WITH EQUAL JUSTICE; NO RECEDING FROM MANDATE, MacDONALD TELLS COMMONS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 3.—His Majesty's Government will continue to administer Palestine in accordance with the terms of the Mandate as approved by the Council of the League of Nations, declared Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald this afternoon in the House of Commons in reply to last Monday's question by ex-premier Stanley Baldwin as to whether the government would now make a statement regarding the policy in Palestine.

The Mandate "is an international obligation from which there can be no question of receding," continued Premier MacDonald. "Under the terms of the Mandate His Majesty's Government is responsible for promoting the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil or religious rights of the existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine and the political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country."

"A double undertaking is involved, to the Jewish people on one hand and to the non-Jewish population of Palestine on the other, and it is the firm resolve of His Majesty's Government to give effect in equal measure to both parties of the Balfour Declaration and to do full justice to all sections of the population in Palestine. This is a duty from which they will not shrink and to the discharge of which they will apply all the resources at their command."

Referring to the Inquiry Commission's report, Premier MacDonald said "the report of the Shaw Commission, which is now in the hands of the members (of Commons) covered a wide field. The Commission was appointed to consider the immediate causes of the deplorable outbreaks of last August and to suggest means of preventing a

recurrence. In endeavoring to faithfully carry out the terms of reference the Commission must have found it difficult to draw a line very rigidly. The government is now studying the various recommendations of the Commission with a view to dealing with the immediate causes of the outbreak and of preventing a recurrence and is in consultation with the interests concerned."

"I wish it to be understood that this statement includes immediate provision of the police forces required to secure civil peace with the existing circumstances."

Cheers greeted the conclusion of the Prime Minister's statement and Mr. Baldwin then declared that he thought "the statement which the Premier made is as far as we can go at the moment and I think his statement will be received with satisfaction by the House. I presume that in due course, when the government has had an opportunity for further consideration, an opportunity will be given in this House for discussion." Lloyd George associated himself, on behalf of the Liberal Party, with Mr. Baldwin's statement.

Replying to Mr. Baldwin, the Premier said "as a matter of fact we are in active consultation now with all the parties concerned both in Palestine and those who are available for a conference here and no time will be lost in amplifying the statement that I have been able to make today."

See Snell's Remarks as Equal to Second Report

London, Apr. 3.—Harry Snell's remarks actually constitute a second report that comes from a different world and conception, says the "Evening Express," commenting on the Inquiry Commission's report. The "Express" is of the opinion that the British government will finally accept the Lord Balfour-General Smuts-Lloyd George proposal for a royal commission, since the present commission overstepped its competence.

Arab Fellaheen Being Searched for Weapons

Jerusalem, Apr. 3.—All Arab fellaheen entering the Old City are being searched daily for concealed arms by British police. This is an attempt to prevent any disturbances during the coming Moslem festival of Nebi Musa for which occasion the Moslems from the surrounding country are flocking into Jerusalem.

Jewish School Bill for Montreal Passes Its Third Reading; Now in Council

Montreal, Apr. 3.—The Jewish school bill, creating a Jewish commission of seven members which will have full autonomous rights in all matters pertaining to the education of Jewish children of the Island of Montreal, passed its third reading in the Provincial Parliament yesterday and will be submitted to the Legislative Council today.

The commission, which will probably be appointed early next week, will be under the jurisdiction of the superintendent of education and will have full control of all Jewish taxes and a proportional share of the neutral panel taxes. If separate schools are established, it will not require a vote of consent by the taxpayers. Provision is also made for the division of Protestant school properties in the event that separate schools are planned. The Catholic and Protestant sections of the Committee on Public Instruction will have no power to advise the commission on purely Jewish matters.

Although the bill creates a separate school status for the Jews of Montreal, it does not assure the immediate establishment of separate schools as the commission is also empowered to negotiate an agreement with the Protestant school system whereby Jewish children may

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Leningrad Rabbis and Kehillah Leaders Exiled to Concentration Camp

Moscow, April 3.—Rabbi Lazarev, the Chief Rabbi of Leningrad, who was arrested February 26, together with Rabbi Yasnogorowski by the Russian secret police on the charge that they had been maintaining illegal connections abroad, particularly with the Lubawitscher Rebbe (Rabbi Joseph Schneuersohn) was today sentenced to ten years exile in a concentration camp.

Rabbi Lazarev's son was exiled for three years while the beadle, Zemach Zedek, was exiled for two years. The fourteen members of the Leningrad Jewish community, who had been arrested for disobeying the regulations laid down with regard to religious communities were also exiled to a concentration camp for various periods of years.

The home for the Jewish aged, that had been supported by the now liquidated Jewish community, is now closed for lack of funds. The Jewish old men and women, some of them more than eighty years old, are being distributed among various Christian homes while a few are being transferred to a former monastery ten miles from Pskov.

Shomre Shabbes Asks Parley to Regulate Working Hours

Berlin, Apr. 3.—A request for an international conference to consider means of regulating working hours for Sabbath-observing employees, whose religious scruples make it more difficult for them to obtain work, was made to Albert Thomas, director of the International Labor Office, now visiting here, by Rabbi Greenberg, chairman of the World Union of Shomre Shabbes (Jewish Sabbath Observers' Union). Mr. Thomas promised to consider the request and expressed his sympathy with the social aims of the Shomre Shabbes.

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Urpali, Jew Whose Death Sentence Had Been Set Aside, Is Resentenced

Jaffa, Apr. 3.—Joseph Mizrahi Urpali, the first Jew ever sentenced to death in Palestine since it came under British rule, and whose death sentence was set aside last January by the Court of Appeals which ordered a new trial, was today again sentenced to death. His new trial lasted hardly more than a day.

When the Court of Appeals rendered its opinion January 25 everyone expected that a retrial would mean an acquittal for the middle-aged Urpali. His counsel, Mordecai Eliash, was so certain that a new trial would vindicate Urpali, that he demanded a retrial in order to obtain complete vindication.

Urpali was charged with having been implicated in the murder of two Arabs who were killed on August 25 when the Arabs attempted to invade Tel Aviv from a point just outside of Urpali's house. The Court of Appeals, in setting aside the lower court's judgment, discredited the four Arab eye-witnesses and pointed out that it was impossible to reconcile their evidence with the medical evidence. The Court of Appeals held that the lower court had been unjustified in accepting the Arabs' story.

Urpali's new trial opened yesterday with two new witnesses testifying. Both witnesses were airmen who had participated in repulsing the attack on Tel Aviv. Of late they had been living in Egypt. They testified that when the Arab crowd attacked Tel Aviv they and other soldiers fired into the crowd of whom several fell wounded or killed. The airman also said that shots were fired by non-military people.

Since the commutation of the death sentence of Simcha Hinkis, the Jewish police constable, Urpali remains the only Jew under the death penalty.

Warsaw Jewish Community Cables Protest to MacDonald on Inquiry Commission Report

Warsaw, Apr. 3.—In a cable which has just been sent to Prime Minister MacDonald in the name of the Warsaw Jewish Community and which is signed by Deputy Farbstain, it is stated that Polish Jews are concerned and embittered over the report of the Palestine Inquiry Commission, because it ignores the historic right of Jews to Palestine, which is the basis of the League of Nations Mandate. The community expresses the hope that the government of Great Britain and the representatives of the British nation in Parliament will fulfill the historic duty which England has taken upon itself on behalf of the Jewish people, and thus justify the hopes placed in the British people by world Jewry.

In another cable sent by the Chief Rabbinate of Warsaw to MacDonald, and signed by Rabbis Gutschhechter, Kahane and Michelson, disappointment is also expressed over the fact that in the report of the Inquiry Commission the historic and religious Jewish rights to Palestine have been ignored. The religious Jews express the hope that the English people, cherishing as they do the Bible and respecting the religious feelings of the Jewish people, will not disappoint the great hopes placed in England by the Jewish people, when Britain took over the Palestine Mandate.

Jews Again Annoyed by Roumanian Anti-Semites

Bucharest, Apr. 3.—The home of Jewish students was raided yesterday by the police and eight were arrested on suspicion of being Communists. Six were later released.

Bucharest, Apr. 3.—Lupu Alexandru, Jewish medical student at Bucharest University, was mishandled by six student followers of Cuza, the anti-Semitic leader.

At Jassy University three Jewish students were beaten by Cuzist followers on the pretext that one of the students had occupied a seat belonging to a Cuzist colleague. The authorities have ordered an investigation.

Form First Jewish Women's Social Society at Chicago U.

Chicago, Apr. 3.—The first Jewish women's social organization at the University of Chicago was formed today. The society is called Aychud, and is sponsored by Mrs. Edith Flint, chairman of the University Women's Council. It has the sanction of the university authorities.

The officers are Dorothy Lindenbaum, president; Dorothy Zernits, vice-president; Ann Sarastine, secretary, and Rose Giblichman, treasurer.

Likens Arab-Jewish Quarrel to Hindu-Moslem Feud; Says M. P.'s Should Not Participate

London, Apr. 3.—The quarrel between Jews and Arabs in Palestine is compared to the long-existing conflict between Moslems and Hindus in India, by Lord Winterton, former Secretary for India, writing in the "London Times" as "one who served with the Arab forces during a portion of the War and having some knowledge of Palestine."

"Both feuds," says Lord Winterton, "are rooted as deeply in mutual jealousy, fear and ambition as in religious and racial difference." Speaking as one who is experienced in Indian administration, Lord Winterton says he knows that the results in feeling would be worse, if it were not for the fact that the British are in India and have generally always refused to favor either side. Yet in the case of Palestine, distinguished politicians and others have not hesitated to write articles, form committees, and vigorously exert themselves on behalf of one or the other contestants.

"This not only makes the task of the local administration harder, but leads both Arabs and Jews to think they can gain advantages by bringing pressure to bear through their supporters in both houses on the government in Great Britain. Moreover," continues Lord Winterton, "when an allowance is made for the fine cultural traditions of both races and the high ideals held by their responsible leaders, the Arab-Jewish quarrel in Palestine is a squalid one, based on the worst tradition of the Eastern bazaar. It is surely beneath the dignity of British legislators to participate in such a struggle as active participants."

Wolfsohn Library in Jerusalem Near Completion

Jerusalem, Apr. 3.—Statistics concerning the cost and contents of the Wolfsohn Library of the Hebrew University to be opened here April 15 by High Commissioner Chancellor were given to the press yesterday at a two hour interview by Dr. Hugo Bergman, the librarian. His figures show that to date the building costs, furniture and other expenses have been \$240,000.

The Library will have an annual budget of \$40,000. It now contains 225,000 books and receives regularly 1,500 periodicals, including 400 in English and 400 in German. In addition to its bookstores the Library contains thirty rooms. It owns 630 ancient manuscripts. All of these are preserved over by 27 officials.

Palestine Raises Import Duty on Wheat and Flour

Jerusalem, Apr. 3.—The import duty on flour and wheat coming into Palestine has been increased. This was one of the measures urged by the Arab Executive to protect native products.

Reinstatement of Jews to Rights Proceeding Rapidly

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 3.—The reinstatement of Jews to their election rights has begun on a large scale, it is reported today from White Russia, as a result of the recent government order. In Minsk 746 Jews without rights have applied for reinstatement and forty percent of them have already been reinstated. In Vitebsk the regional election commission has been dissolved because it is now established that it had deprived many of their rights illegally.

In the township of Horodok in the Minsk district twenty-five percent of the population, most of which is Jewish, were deprived of their rights with no proper reason. They will all be reinstated now it is announced.

Many Young Jews To Be Employed in Soviet Factories

Moscow, Apr. 3.—Twelve hundred young men from White Russia will be sent to Stalingrad to a tractor factory for work and half of them will be Jews, is the order of the labor commissariat. A high official of the labor commissariat today explained that of the 750,000 new workers which the government is planning to employ during the fiscal year in its great industries great consideration will be given to the Jewish youth from the small towns.

Seek Conference to War on Dr. Magnes' Activities

Jerusalem, Apr. 3.—An extraordinary meeting to discuss what measures should be taken against "the pernicious activities of Dr. Magnes" is urged in an open letter from the Hebrew Teachers' Organization to the Vaad Leumi, Jewish National Council.

Would Bar Teaching of Old Testament in Thuringia

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 3.—Negotiations regarding a proposed law in the Thuringian provincial parliament to exclude the Old Testament from the religious instruction because the Jewish spirit of the Old Testament is not fit for the Christian spirit, are being carried on by the Thuringian minister of education, W. Frick, with teachers and clergymen.

Head of Noted Austrian Jewish Family Is Dead

Vienna, Apr. 3.—Max Ritter von Guttman, head of the house of Guttman, died here today at the age of 72. He was related to the Rothschilds and the Montefiores. The Gutmans were the pioneers in the development of Austria's mining industry which they now control. He was a famous philanthropist whose gifts compared favorably with those of the Rothschilds.

No Compulsion To Be Used in Anti-Passover Campaign League of Godless Orders

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 3.—No compulsion is to be used during the anti-Passover campaign, is the order issued today by the League of the Godless.

The order says that no house-to-house collection of candlesticks, praying shawls or phylacteries should take place during Passover, and that the delivery of such articles should be of an absolutely voluntary nature.

The resignation of Jews from membership in the organized Jewish communities and their joining the Godless League should also not be carried on under compulsion, the instructions state. The order aims at showing that those who submit their religious articles for the industrialization fund, do it not under pressure. "We know that the Jewish nomen and the Jewish clericals will represent our anti-Passover campaign as an evil edict and persecution and will try to compromise it by saying that we confiscate their religious articles and sell them for junk, thus robbing them," says the order.

"We are, therefore, anxious to show that we accept contributions for our industrialization fund only from those giving them with a full heart. We don't want anything from rabbis or religious leaders who will later cry that they were forced to give up their candlesticks. Urging people to give up religious articles demonstrates a departure from religion and must, therefore, be done voluntarily," the order declares.

Under the headline, "Organize Our Jewish Workers Against the Religious Swindle," the "Emes," Moscow Jewish Communist daily, today publishes reports from the provinces showing how the anti-Passover campaign is being prepared there. All the reports show that the anti-Passover campaign this year centers on collecting religious articles.

Austrian Jewish Papers Vigorously Denounce Report

Vienna, Apr. 3.—A most vigorous and unanimous rejection of the Palestine Inquiry Commission's report is contained in today's Austrian Jewish papers. They term it a one-sided and anti-Jewish report. The "Juedische Stimme" expresses the hope that the English people will decline the Commission's recommendations as infringing the Palestine Mandate.

The "Neue Welt" prefers to wait until the full text of the report is available because the telegraphic extracts "so far received are unbelievably shocking." The organ of the Agudath Israel, World Orthodox Organization, is also postponing comment, maintaining that the press extracts do not produce a full picture.

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Warsaw Yiddish Dailies Find Report Not as Bad as Expected

Warsaw, Apr. 3.—The Yiddish daily "Haint," organ of the Polish Zionist Organization, finds that the report is not as terrible as the rumors had predicted. "The report," it says, "is a typical official document usual in similar 'investigations' by various governments following pogroms when the reason is not simply a search for the truth.

"Surely the report would have been different if there were twice as many Jews in Palestine right now."

The "Moment," the other leading Yiddish paper of Warsaw, says that the Commission's recommendation to limit the sale of land means in fact the limitation of the right of Palestinian citizens to dispose of their private property. "This not only does not belong to the Commission's terms of reference but is contradictory to the Mandate because the League of Nations has not authorized a new mandatory code or a new constitution."

Veteran Jewish Actor Drops Dead in Milwaukee Theatre

Milwaukee, Apr. 3.—Joseph Weinstein, 70, veteran Jewish actor of Chicago, dropped dead of a heart attack here last night in the Fabst Theatre, a few minutes after the final curtain of "Senorita." He had been on the stage for more than half a century and was widely known in Chicago and Milwaukee. He was a member of the Lawndale Jewish Theatre Company.

21 Jewish Organizations Join in Alien Registration Protest

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, Apr. 3.—Twenty-one Jewish organizations responded to the call of the local B'nai B'rith lodge to join in an organized protest against the alien registration bills pending in Congress.

A conference of Jewish and non-Jewish groups opposed to alien registration is to be convened on April 16 by the council of representatives of these 21 organizations. With Julius Deutelbaum as chairman and Elias Goldberg as secretary, a committee of 11 is perfecting plans to enlist the aid of every immigrant group in the city as well as of liberal American public opinion against the proposed Blease, Cable and Aswell bills.

Congressman Robert H. Clancy is to address the conference on April 16.

Allied Jewish Campaign Conference to Be Held Apr. 10 at Biltmore Hotel

The conference of representative Jews who will meet in the Hotel Biltmore with Paul Baerwald and ex-justice Proskauer to discuss the methods to be used and the date of opening the drive in New York of the Allied Jewish Campaign will be held April 10 and not April 3 as erroneously reported yesterday.

French Ex-Premier Extols Poet Heinrich Heine as Model of Future Man

An article in praise of Heinrich Heine, written by Edouard Herriot, former French Premier and leader of the Radical-Socialist Party, has recently appeared in "Le Petit Provençal," under the title "Un Européen" (A European). In his article, M. Herriot points out that Heine was great enough to love both Germany and France.

"I hear that the city of Duesseldorf (Heine's birthplace) intends to erect a monument for Heinrich Heine and to ask the liberals of all countries to raise funds for that purpose," writes Herriot. "I should like to be among the first to comment upon this. I regard it as useful that the present generation, which has probably forgotten it, should be reminded of the role this inspired 'pamphleteer' played in the first half of the nineteenth century.

"In Germany, and even among us, no writer was more vilified for his independent spirit than Heinrich Heine. Heinrich Mann (noted contemporary German novelist) has truthfully said that Heine represented the anticipated model of the future man. As the anticipated model and expression of the German European, according to Mann, Heine honored Germany as well as himself.

"A German European; that's it! He loved his country with the same fervor that Musset, who was similar to him, loved his. But he also loved our France, our nation. I sincerely hope that our country will contribute to the erection of this monument. Better still, if we wish to work for a German-French spiritual rapprochement—an undertaking which is not without its difficulties—then there is no writer whom we should take more to heart than Heine. I hope that a Heinrich Heine Society will be founded and am the first to place my name on the list of members."

Late American Envoy to Austria Friendly to Jews

Vienna, Apr. 3.—The tragic death of the American ambassador here, Albert Henry Washburn, has shocked the leading Jewish families of the city, for he had many important social connections with them and always invited them to the embassy receptions. Jewish artists were also his frequent guests at the official art evenings.

Hungarian Church Mourns Untimely Death of Rabbi

Budapest, Apr. 3.—The untimely and sudden death of Rabbi Feldmann is being mourned not only by the Jewish community of Cegléd but by the local church. Bishop Toertely has ordered flags draped over the church in honor of the late rabbi.

New Jersey Zionists Form Zionist Region in State

Newark, Apr. 3.—With an attendance of 150 representative Zionist men and women from twenty-three communities throughout the state, the New Jersey Zionist Region was formed at a conference held here Sunday.

The new Region will concern itself with enrollment of more members in the Zionist ranks; strengthening of existing constituent bodies; intensive cultural and propaganda work; formation of Zionist youth societies and Young Judea groups; and a more concentrated effort in behalf of the Jewish National Fund.

Considerable discussion was devoted to the National Fund and it finally culminated in the passage of a resolution pledging the Region to the raising of \$210,000 within the next six years to establish a colony in Palestine in the name of the Jews of New Jersey. Speakers at the conference declared they were endeavoring to have the Jews of the state follow in the footsteps of Canadian Jewry.

The conference was addressed by Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt, head of the Zionist Region of New York. In resolutions adopted, the conference pledged the support of the new Region to the Allied Jewish Campaign and unanimously approved the Nathanyah Colony project in Palestine.

Aaron Levinstone of this city presided over the conference, and the following officers were unanimously elected for the Region proper: President, Philip J. Schotland, of Newark; vice-president, Judge William Newcorn, of Plainfield; Miss Sarah Kussy, Rabbi Julius Silberfeld and Aaron Levinstone of Newark; treasurer, Mordecai L. Lipis, of Newark; secretary, David E. Bernstein, of Newark; executive director, Meyer S. Mintz, of Newark.

Menorah Summer Classes at Hunter College

According to an announcement made by the Hunter College branch of the Menorah, a Menorah Summer School will be conducted from July 7th to August 15th. This is to afford men and women the opportunity of deepening their knowledge of both Jewish history and present day Jewish life and also endeavor "to make vivid and intelligible the living heritage of modern Jewry" and "clarify the forces and issues of contemporary Jewish life in relation to our total life as modern men and women."

continue their education in Protestant schools. This point was stressed in the debate on the bill when its sponsors expressed the hope that no separation would occur.

Saying he would deplore the introduction of a separate system for Jewish children in the province "for though I am proud of being a Jew I am also proud of being a Canadian citizen," Peter Bercovitch, Jewish member of Parliament, said he felt that it was to the best interests of Canada that there should be as little cleavage as possible among the different races. "But on the other hand," he declared, "if our Protestant friends should persist in their refusal to give us those rights to which we are entitled as British subjects, there is nothing left for us to do but establish our separate schools."

Former Greek King Attends Jewish Play

Yeshiva College Will Seek \$3,000,000 Endowment Fund

The endowment campaign will be in charge of H. L. Selig, director of the Yeshiva Campaign Committee.

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
