## British Journals Sympathetic to Zionist Aspirations in Discussing Inquiry Report

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 5—An almost unanimously friendly attitude toward the Zionist aspirations is expressed in the leading week-end journals of Great Britain, in discussing the Inquiry Commission's report. While admitting that the Commission exceeded its terms of reference, the majority of the articles, however, endeavor to cover the Commission by suggesting that its findings be considered as the basis for a necessary and deeper investigation.

The "Statesman" and "Spectator" urge that the Commission's advice for a scientific inquiry into the possibilities of intensive farming be undertaken and that the government should establish a comprehensive land policy on its findings. The most outspoken on the matter, however, is the "Week-End Review," which says that the Commission, "instead of discharging its comparatively simple task, has written a long and elaborate essay on everything that has to do with the Mandate."

After pointing out that it was unfortunate that the Commission had exceeded its terms of reference, the "Review" terms the report as "in the main a white-washing report, according to which no person is particularly to blame for what happened."

The "Review" also comments on the fact that "a Commission of which the chairman was a Colonial Judge, could not be expected to criticize freely a Colonial administration but it was even less competent to make excursions into high international and imperial policy. . . . One sentence in the report reveals an amazing misconception of the whole situation, namely that the outbreak was not a revolt against British authority; but the whole basis of British authority in Palestine was the Jewish National Home and the Mandate to secure it. How then can it be said that the Arabs, who never ceased to resist the Mandate, are still loyal to British authority?"

## Anti-Semites Insult Socialist Leaders in Austrian Parliament

Vienna, Apr. 5—Stormy scenes were enacted by anti-Semites yesterday in the Austrian parliament while the anti-terror law was being repealed. Raab, the leader of the Christian Socialists and of the Heimwehr, insulted Otto Bauer, Austrian Socialist leader, and Eisler. After the latter two had intermitted a speaker, Raab shouted:

"These two Jews give us no rest. That's race for you! Both of them belong in the temple, not here."

## Dr. Melchior Named Director of International Settlement Bank

Berlin, Apr. 5—Dr. Carl Melchior prominent Hamburg banker, internationally known economist and a partner of Max Warburg, a brother of Felix Warburg, was yesterday named one of the two German representatives on the Directorate of the Bank for International Settlement, by Dr. Hans Luther, the new head of the Reichsbank.

The appointment of Dr. Melchior was no surprise, last week he had been offered the position as head of the Reichsbank, which he had declined. In every one of the post-war conferences Dr. Melchior had represented his country. He participated in the negotiations at Versailles in 1919 and was prominently concerned in the deliberations of the Reparations Conference early last year. In order to accept the position on the Directorate of the Bank for International Settlement, Dr. Melchior intends to resign from his position in the Finance Commission in the League of Nations.

## Reinstatement of Lishentzy Is Proceeding Rapidly

Moscow, Apr. 5—Of the ten thousand lishentzy (people without citizenship rights) who have applied for reinstatement in accordance with a recent decision of the Soviet government, thirty-eight percent have already been reinstated. In the Caucasian city of Satskher, 1,435 Jews were reinstated today. Most of these are poor peddlers. It is interesting to note that the entire Jewish population of Satskher is only 1,477.

The "Izvestsia," official government paper, today emphasizes that in cases where parents have not been reinstated their children should not suffer. It explains that the Soviet government is now extremely interested in the younger generation and in most cases the children of lishentzy do not agree with the views of their parents anyway. Those who have reached the age of 18 should be given full citizenship rights whether their parents are reinstated or not, the "Izvestsia" instructs.

## Roumanian Authorities Look into Anti-Semitic Troubles

Jassy, Apr. 5—New attacks by anti-Semitic students here, members of the Students' Christian League, upon their Jewish fellow-students have taken place this week. The Roumanian authorities have begun an investigation of these latest outbreaks, reports the official Roumanian news agency Rador

## Rothermere Papers Resume Campaign to Get England to Relinquish Mandate

London, Apr. 5—The "Evening News" and the "Daily Mail," both links in Lord Rothermere's chain of papers, yesterday resumed their campaign to get Great Britain to clear out of Palestine. The "Evening News" prominently displays a cartoon showing a smiling Arab riding on a grinning camel, both of whom are carried by a little man representing the British tax payer, proceeding along a limitless desert with a burning sun overhead and Premier MacDonald in a police uniform with a long sword is shown standing by smilingly. The cartoon is labeled "Carry on Sergeant" and refers to the Prime Minister's declaration in Parliament on the Palestine question.

Finding it impolitic to use Premier MacDonald's statement as the basis of an attack on the labor government because both the Conservatives and Liberals have associated themselves with the declaration, the Rothermere papers utilize the opportunity to attack all of the existing parties and to propagate the new economic Empire Party, head-

## Felix Warburg Comments on Commission's Report

## Ukrainian G. P. U. Trying to Get Rabbis to Sign Declaration

Riga, Apr. 5—The Ukrainian secret police have assembled some twenty rabbis with a demand that they sign a declaration similar to the one issued some weeks ago by the Minsk rabbis, according to an unconfirmed report received here. The report says that Rabbi Matson of Kiev and Rabbi Grinfes of Paltava are opposed to signing the declaration while Rabbis Levy, Rosman and Shneurson of Yekaterinoslav are ready to sign. Negotiations are still under way and the secret police call on the rabbis every so often with a new text of the declaration.

### "Journal de Geneve" Sees Need for Active Declaration of British Policy in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Apr. 5.—The necessity for an active and positive policy in Palestine by the British government and the need of declaring such a policy is one point in the Inquiry Commission's report with which the whole world will agree, writes the "Journal de Geneve," which is influential in League of Nations circles. The "Journal" points out that the mere fact of the Commission giving expression to this desire implies "that serious blame is attached to the Mandatory who carried the policy of reducing the garrisons too far." The Commission, in its search for the general causes of the disturbances, should perhaps have taken this into account. The editorial also expresses surprise that the Commission, "under the pretext of equality, criticizes the influence of the Zionist Executive over the Palestine government, whereas the Arabs themselves refused in 1922 the same power." The "Journal" also asks on what the Commission bases its declaration that the country cannot support a larger agricultural population than exists today, "since the Commission itself urges the necessity for an inquiry in order to establish facts in this connection."

"The part of the report dealing with land and immigration," concludes the "Journal de Geneve," "although containing interesting data, is beside the point. The commissioners did not master sufficiently the facts and arguments with which they were supplied."

### Women's League, United Synagogue of America, Plans Speakers' Bureau

At a recent meeting of the National Speakers' Bureau of the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America, at the home of Mrs. Israel Davidson, plans were made to organize speakers' bureaus in every section of the United States for the purpose of stimulating Jewish cultural programs in the various sisterhoods.

### Kisch Says Zionist Executive Reaction to Report Reflected in MacDonald's Statement

Jerusalem, Apr. 4.—The Zionist Executive in Palestine, through its counsel at the Commission hearings, Sir Boyd Merriam, had protested against the Commission exceeding its terms of reference and hence is able to adopt its present attitude toward the report, an attitude already reflected in Premier MacDonald's statement, declared Col. Frederick Kisch, chairman of the Palestine Zionist Executive and one of the trio entrusted with the task of administering the Palestine Emergency Fund.

Col. Kisch pointed out that Harry Snell's reservations are important not only because he belongs to the government party but also because he proposed an Arab-Jewish understanding on the basis of the National Home. The full text of the report is better than the summary in some respects and worse in others, declared Col. Kisch.

He explained that certain changes suggested to Inspector-General Dowbiggin, now engaged in reorganizing the Palestine police force, by the Zionist Executive and the Vaad Leumi might result in changes that would improve the force and the position of the Jews in it. Col. Kisch also reported on the activities of the commission presided over by David Yellin which is preparing material for Dr. Cyrus Adler who will represent the Jews before the League of Nations' Wailing Wall Commission.

Referring to the progress of reconstruction in the Jewish colonies, Col. Kisch stated that the colonists have started to return to Motz and those of Hartuv will be on their way back next week. The restoration in Beer-tuvia has begun while work on a new Jewish center consisting of dwellings and shops has started in Safed. Dwellings are also being built in Haifa, he said, in conjunction with the Jewish National Fund and the Palestine Economic Corporation.

### Jewish Communist Press Silent on Anti-Passover Campaign

Moscow, Apr. 5.—Comparative silence is being maintained in the Jewish Communist press on the anti-Passover campaign despite the fact that Passover begins next week. The "Emes," especially is quiet. This sudden change is due to the general Soviet policy not to be aggressive at present regarding religion.

In publishing today provincial reports regarding the collection of religious articles among the Jewish population, the "Emes" adds an editorial note saying "it would be more advisable that the religious article be brought in voluntarily by their owners instead of collecting them." This will probably be taken by the provincial Communists as a hint to go easy in their anti-Passover campaign and in the collection of religious articles.

### Temple Sholom's \$1,750,000 Edifice Dedicated in Chicago

Chicago, Apr. 5.—More than three years of construction activity and the expenditure of \$1,750,000 will culminate Monday at the end of the formal three-day dedication of the new Temple Sholom, Chicago's largest, best equipped and most magnificent synagogue. The formal opening of this magnificent structure marks the 63rd anniversary of Temple Sholom, the pioneer Jewish congregation of the north side, founded in 1867 as the North Chicago Hebrew Congregation.

Formal presentation of the building to the congregation by W. B. Frankenstein and its acceptance on the part of the congregation by president Benjamin M. Engelhard, president, Friday evening, marked the opening of the three-day dedicatory program.

Dedicatory prayers were offered by Dr. Gerson B. Levi and Rev. Dr. Joseph Stolz both of The Temple and were followed by addresses by Rev. Dr. Samuel Hirschberg of Temple Emanuel B'nai Mishurun of Milwaukee, Wis., and Rev. Dr. Louis Wolsey of Philadelphia. On Saturday morning, prayers were offered by Rev. Dr. Jacob Singer, Rev. Dr. Felix Mendelsohn, Rev. Dr. G. George Fox and Rev. Dr. Mayer Lipman. Addresses will be delivered by Dr. Louis Mann of Sinai Temple and Rev. Dr. Solomon B. Freehof of Temple K.A.M.

Sunday saw the close of the formal dedication ceremonies with an address by Rev. Dr. Morris Feuerlicht of Indianapolis. Prayers were offered by Dr. Julian Gusfield and Samuel Schwartz. Greetings from the Chicago Rabbinical Association were delivered by Rev. Dr. Felix A. Levy of Temple Emanuel.

The new Temple Sholom and Frankenstein Memorial Community Center Building have been characterized as an amazing contribution to Chicago's religion.

### Proportional Equality Would Mean Halt to Immigration of Jews, Says Hopkin Morris

London, Apr. 5.—Pointing out that "proportional equality means that not another Jewish immigrant can be admitted to Palestine," Hopkin Morris, Liberal member of the Inquiry Commission, is quoted in the Sheffield "Independent" as suggesting too that "Prime Minister MacDonald's statement means that for the first time the Balfour Declaration will be interpreted equally between Arab and Jew." Mr. Morris expresses his happiness over MacDonald's statement, and continues: "But it is one thing to profess equal treatment and another to practice it."

"It is impossible," he says, "for instance, to secure equality in population until Palestine has been properly irrigated. Proportional equality means that not another Jewish immigrant can be admitted. Equality in standards of immigration is also difficult to obtain."

## Says Inquiry Report Tends to Whitewash Government and Discredit Labor Party

"Concession to Criminality" is the name of the long editorial in the current issue of the "New Palestine," official organ of the Zionist Organization of America, which discusses the report of the Palestine Inquiry Commission.

After showing that the Commission in its report is trying to hedge around the question of who were guilty of causing the August riots, the editorial says:

"Having thus muddled the public mind in regard to the guilt which it was forced to admit, the report of the Commission then goes on to make recommendations which can only be regarded (apart from the fact that they are entirely outside the terms of reference) as a direct reward to the Arab leaders for their connivance at the causes leading to murder: 'In conjunction with other and more immediate causes for the disturbances, the feeling of Arab apprehension caused by Jewish immigration was a factor which contributed to the outbreak. The selection of immigrants under the labor schedule is, in effect, entrusted to the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine. In the allocation of certificates supplied to them for this purpose, it is the practice of the Federation to have regard for the political creed of several possible immigrants rather than for their particular qualification for admission into Palestine.'

"Even if the accusation were true (which it is not) it would be an intolerable intrusion on our rights. We are building the Jewish Homeland, and not the Commission. Not even England. Shall we admit that in addition to the enormous natural difficulties of the task we shall put up with interference in our choice of human material? Shall we admit that others than ourselves are to judge which Jews make the best and most devoted workers?"

Two impulses were at work in the report, says the editorial, a desire to whitewash the Palestine administration and to discredit the Labor Party.

## Honolulu Lodge of B'nai B'rith Order Established

San Francisco, Apr. 5.—Honolulu is the latest outpost of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith.

In this city the Louis Marshall Lodge was instituted recently, with a total of 50 charter members, according to Richard E. Gutstadt, executive director of District Grand Lodge No. 4, who has just returned to this city from the islands.

Gutstadt made the trip at the request of the General Committee after Jewish residents of Honolulu had asked to have a lodge instituted there. He was directed to proceed to that end if he found that conditions warranted such a course. He also instituted a Ladies' auxiliary.

## Stress in Jewish Communal Life Must Shift from Philanthropy to Jewish Education, Judge Rosalsky Tells Education Association

The emphasis in American Jewish communal life will have to be shifted from philanthropy to Jewish education or the Jewish historian of the future will be compelled "to write a sad chapter on the decline and fall of American Jewry," declared Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, in an address before the annual meeting of the Jewish Education Association yesterday at the Jewish Club, which was attended by 200 of the officers and leading workers and supporters of the organization.

The opening address and message was delivered by Israel Unterberg, president of the Association. Mr. Unterberg made a brief survey of the progress of the Jewish Education Association since its organization, showing how its various activities including scholarship grants for the tuition of children of poor parents, a repair and mortgage service to improve and increase the physical facilities of Jewish schools, the granting of prizes to pupils, the establishment of a Board of License for teachers, and other activities, developed and grew by a natural process of evolution. Owing to its expanding work, he stated, the Association had adopted an increased budget for the coming year.

Reporting on the Committee for Scholarship Grants, Jacob Wener, the Chairman, stated that in the year 1928-29 scholarships were provided for 2,234 children distributed over 63 schools at a cost of \$64,403. During the current year, the number of free scholarships has been increased to 2,439 representing 75 schools and involving an expenditure of \$78,000. The total number of boys and girls in the 75 schools benefiting from the scholarships of the Association is 23,863.

A report for the Committee on Prizes was presented by Samuel Rottenberg, who is Chairman of the Committee. A total of 2,726 prizes, most of them consisting of books, were distributed to as many pupils during the past year, Mr. Rottenberg stated. These pupils represented 156 Jewish schools with a register of over 40,000 children. Since 1923, when the distribution of prizes by the Association began, a total of 24,000 prizes had been distributed.

Reporting on the various methods adopted by the Association to stimulate interest in Jewish education, Bernard Semel, Honorary Secretary of the Association, stated that the organization had addressed itself during the past year to Jewish parents under the slogan of "Your Children—Will They Be Yours?" and "Jewish Education: a Communal Responsibility." Mr. Semel reported also on the establishment of the Committee and Board of License, and on the work of these bodies during the past year. Applications for licenses are now being received by the Board, Mr. Semel stated, and 600 applicants have already filed applications.

A financial report was presented by Harry H. Liebovitz, the Treasurer. The budget adopted during the coming year,

he stated, amounts to \$154,000 for which the sum of \$75,000 would have to be raised in addition to the funds already received during the current year.

A report on the fund-raising activities of the Association was submitted by Jonah J. Goldstein who is in charge of this activity.

The work of the Association, in improving the physical and sanitary conditions of Jewish schools, and in helping in the construction of new school buildings, was reported by Jacob H. Cohen, who is Chairman of the Committee on Repairs as well as President of the Jewish Education Association Mortgage Service, Inc., who stated that during the past year financial aid for repairs was granted to 15 schools, and that in the past year the grants of the Association, amounting to 18% of the total, led the schools to make repairs amounting to \$100,000.

A report on Ivriah, the Women's Division of the Jewish Education Association, was presented by Mrs. Gabriel Hamburger, the Chairman of the Women's Division. Mrs. Hamburger stated that since September 1929, the membership of Ivriah had been increased by 500, the total now being 4,000 organized in 18 districts of the city. Ivriah conducts classes in Bible and Hebrew for its members and cooperates with Jewish religious schools in their efforts to increase their pupil registers by means of children's entertainments, festival celebrations, etc.

## Riga Hears 4 Schochtim and Rabbi Imprisoned in Russia

Riga, Apr. 5.—An unconfirmed dispatch received here reports that Rabbi Hirsch Gorelik from Yassina, Russia, for whom a visa to the United States is available, is among the arrested ritual slaughterers of Rogatshov who have been in prison for more than nine weeks while fear of the consequences has prevented anyone from intervening.

According to the dispatch the wives and children of those under arrest are starving and have sold all of their possessions in order to buy bread. In addition to Rabbi Gorelik those under arrest are Abraham Yashnizki, Abraham Ridner, Mendel Frankel and Feivel Dropkin.

## Louis Lipsky, Zionist Leader, Returning Tuesday

Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, who spent the last two weeks in London, attending the sessions of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, will return to the United States on the S. S. Bremen, which is due to dock on Tuesday, April 8th, at the 58th Street pier, Brooklyn.

Mr. Lipsky is expected to state the American Zionist point of view with regard to the report of the Palestine Commission of Inquiry, which was recently submitted to Parliament.

**Montefiore Hospital Spent \$1,117,975 in 1925, Annual Report of President Shows**

The opening of the model \$2,000,000 Montefiore Hospital County Sanatorium at Bedford Hills, Westchester, and the modernization and expansion of the city institution in the Bronx, were stressed as outstanding achievements for 1929 at the forty-fifth annual meeting of the Montefiore Hospital for Chronic Diseases, held yesterday morning in the hospital auditorium.

Fred M. Stein, president of the institution, stated in his annual report that last year Montefiore Hospital spent \$1,117,975, of which the Federation contributed \$377,628 and \$139,495 was received in gifts, bequests and endowments. During this time the hospital gave 159,624 free days of care at a cost of \$597,934. The actual cost per patient per day at the hospital and the county sanatorium was \$3.69, and to give this service the hospital suffered a deficit of \$44,857, the report stated.

In his report to the hospital board, Mr. Stein paid tribute to Sol G. Rosenbaum, who resigned from the presidency of Montefiore Hospital at the end of last year, after devoting a decade of service to the institution.

With more than 100 patients on the waiting list, "the policy has been adopted and is gradually and humanely being enforced to admit to the hospital only those patients for whom something constructive can be done in a medical way," Mr. Stein stated. "There is a great need in this city for additional institutions or pavilions that can be run with limited expense and that will serve as homes for those incurable for whom constructive aid is impossible and who for that reason ought not to be occupying the facilities of a hospital."

Three new trustees were elected to the hospital board. They are Myron I. Borg, Jr., George A. Spiegelberg and John L. Loeb. At the same time a resolution was passed to increase the number of trustees from forty to fifty.

gious and civic welfare. Since its organization in 1867, the congregation saw its synagogue destroyed in the Chicago fire and has occupied four other houses of worship prior to building its fifth and last one.

ed by Lord Rothermere, and one of whose chief planks is get Great Britain out of Palestine.

In an attempt to show that Great Britain has not even a moral obligation towards the creation of the Jewish National Home, the "Evening News" editorially criticizes the Jewish Legion formed by Vladimir Jabotinsky as composed of "Russian Jews who had taken refuge in England from military service in Russia. It was a unit that never saw military service and one of which Jabotinsky himself once allegedly observed 'we are not merely a regiment. We are a political performing company.' The formation of that unit, whose members otherwise faced the alternative of being conscripted into the British army or being shipped back to Russia, was hardly an adequate consideration for the responsibilities that the Balfour Declaration envisaged."

The editorial further explains that there was no Jewish "drang nach osten" because "Palestine is an agricultural country and the Jew is not an agriculturist. The Jewish National Fund and the others possess only 75,000 acres of land. For the Jews Palestine is not a business proposition and if certain politicians have their way Palestine will be administered by British bayonets indefinitely."

**St. Paul Zionists Urge Z. O. A. to Negotiate with Brandeis**

**First Hebrew School Graduation Marks Turning Point in History of Indianapolis**

Indianapolis, Apr. 4.—For the first time in the Jewish history of Indianapolis and for the first time since the establishment of the local Hebrew School system twenty years ago by the sainted Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Neustadt, Indianapolis Jewry celebrated a Hebrew school graduation, Sunday, March 30. An unusually large crowd attended the exercises which were conducted mostly in Hebrew. After the invocation by Rabbi Benjamin Cohen, the graduates who have studied six years gave Hebrew recitations. Addresses were delivered by Rabbis S. A. Katz and Milton Steinberg, the former speaking Hebrew.

"This is not just a graduation," Rabbi Steinberg declared. "This event is to us Jews in America generally and in Indianapolis particularly a symbol rich in meaning. Today's graduation represents a milestone in the struggle against Jewish ignorance. Never before in our history has the Jewish people been so crushed because of racial ignorance. The work of this graduation represents a turning point," he asserted.

Meyer Gallin, superintendent of the schools, presented the diplomas after a Hebrew address to the students. Each of the graduates received a volume of Chaim Bialik's poems, presented by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Rabbi Neustadt Talmud Torah and Lillian Sacks, honor student, received the valedictory prize, the complete works of Bialik, which was the gift of the Council of Jewish Women. All of the graduates expressed a desire to take post graduate courses and arrangements are being made to institute a Hebrew High School.

The Jewish Educational Association operates the Neustadt School and its branch, the Ezra School. Nineteen classes including a kindergarten, are held daily and on Sunday.

Following the graduation exercises the annual meeting of the educational association was held and eleven new directors were elected.
