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## Warns of Danger of Losing Jewish Youth from Colonies; Criticizes Their Treatment

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 7.—A project that will insure jobs for 200,000 Jewish youths in Soviet industry within the next five years is occupying the attention of the Soviet cabinet and the Central Committee of the youth Communist League, it was learned today. At the same time the statistician, J. Wieszblit, issued figures that show that the number of Jewish proletarians in Ukraina will increase only 20,000 annually for the next half decade.

Wieszblit foresees that the Jewish youth from the Jewish colonies will quit the fields and migrate to the cities to become industrial laborers. Hence he advises that urgent attention be paid to this problem because the Jewish colonization work will be greatly affected by the loss of its youthful members.

The press of the youth Communist League today places the blame on the Ukrainian Comzet for the failure that has met the efforts to place Jewish youth in the Kertch, Ural, industries. It discloses that the Jewish youth in the Ural was badly treated. It instances that fifty were crowded into one room with no beds and that they were not fed properly and that the attitude toward them was anti-Semitic.

The press holds the Comzet responsible, saying that it supervised poorly the industrialization of Jewish youth.

It was announced today that the Ort has received a permit to place 500 declassified Jewish youths from Moscow in the Moscow Labor Institute where they will be trained in industrial professions.

## Soviet Commission to End Illegal Acts Against Artisans

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 7.—A special commission that will see to it that artisans are provided with raw material, that they are not expelled from the cooperatives, and that their property is not confiscated because of non-payment of taxes was organized here today by the Soviet government in order to put an end to the illegal acts against the artisans. The Commission will also provide credits for the artisans to assist them in disposing of their products.

The Commission includes representatives of the trade, finances and labor commissariats as well as from the government bank and Central Association of Cooperatives. It is pointed out that the production of the artisans is still valuable for the Soviet's industrial development and consequently more attention should be paid to its normal functioning.

## Wave of Anti-Semitic Feeling Sweeping Lithuanian Villages

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Apr. 7.—A strong recrudescence of anti-Semitism in the Lithuanian villages where the Jews live in daily expectation of pogroms is indicated from the frequency with which Christian children disappear and Jews charged with spiriting them away, and terrorizing attacks by hooligans on Jews.

In the village of Darshunishok, near Kovno, a gang of hoodlums have been terrorizing the Jews, robbing houses, beating pedestrians and desecrating religious sanctuaries. Jewish appeals to the courts for protection resulted in a temporary cessation of the trouble but the hooligans then returned to the attack with threats to wipe out the entire Jewish population.

A delegation of Jews from the village have come to Kovno asking the local Jewish leaders to take measures for their protection. The delegation also visited the Minister of the Interior but nothing came of the visit.

In Kovno itself, in order to pacify the anti-Semites because of their growing agitation over the release of

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## \$6,000,000 Allied Jewish Drive Officially Launched in Texas

Dallas, Tex., Apr. 7.—Texas has the distinction of being the state selected to open the \$6,000,000 drive for the Allied Jewish Campaign. The Lone Star State's Campaign for \$200,000 was officially launched here yesterday at a meeting of 100 delegates from all parts of the state.

Morris Rothenberg of New York, one of the national co-chairmen of the Campaign, was the principal speaker. J. K. Hexter of Dallas was elected chairman of the state campaign, U. M. Simon of Fort Worth, vice-chairman and David Wunth of Tyler, president of the Texas Zionist Organization, was named chairman of the permanent organization committee. Other members of the committee are Gilbert Lang and Rabbi Ephraim Frisch of San Antonio.

## Hooligans Attack Jewish Traders in Polish Town

Warsaw, Apr. 7.—Forty Polish hooligans in the township of Inowroclaw, district of Posen, attacked eight Jewish traders on the market day, robbing them of their goods and mistreating them, according to a report in the "Haint," which is confirmed by the signatures of the traders who were attacked. The small number of police could not overcome the hooligans, it is stated.

## Senate Committee Aids in Direction of Selective Immigration Policy

Washington, Apr. 7.—What appears to be the first step of a policy in the direction of the so-called selective immigration program, lately agitated, has been taken by the Senate Immigration Committee, which has reported favorably to the Senate, with certain changes, Senator Metcalf's bill which would grant preference, within one-half of the quota, to immigrants who are needed by bona-fide employers to engage in executive, administrative or supervisory work for which unemployed persons cannot be found in the United States.

The bill would also admit within one-half of the quota such workmen who are needed here to work independently or as employers, together with their wives and dependent children under the age of 21. Senator

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## Arab Youth Leaders Warn Against Government Policy

Jerusalem, Apr. 7.—A statement to the effect that the arrest of a number of young Arabs in Gaza has greatly excited the Arab population there and that it indicates that the government is provoking riots by its actions, was published yesterday by a group of Arab young men headed by Ahmed Shukeiri, the son of the prominent sheik of Acre.

The statement warns the government that if it does not stop its present policy, a revolt is inevitable. In the meantime, the Arab paper "Meraat Al Schar," published in Jerusalem, and edited by Ichram Saitar, leader of the Arab youth group, announces that the "faithful Arab youth have organized a defence army in order to tour the villages and towns to awaken a national feeling, to encourage the Arabs to retain their lands and to support Arab products."

## No Government Credits for Those Declining Newcomers

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 7.—The Comzet will not give government credits to those Jewish colonists who refuse to share their houses with the newly-arrived Jewish settlers, it was announced today by A. Merezhin, Jewish Communist leader. He instructed the Comzet representatives in Ukraina and Crimea to use no compulsion in placing new colonists in the homes of the older settlers, but those who decline to accept the newcomers are to be refused government credits on the ground that they do not want to assist the government, Merezhin added.

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## Yeshiva College Membership Campaign Launched at Rally of Young Israel Organization

One thousand young men and women members of Young Israel, the Orthodox Jewish youth organization, attended an enthusiastic grand rally held Sunday afternoon in the auditorium of the Yeshiva College, under the chairmanship of Edward S. Silver, former United States Assistant District Attorney, who is president of the organization.

The grand rally was held in preparation for the city-wide campaign which has for its purpose the securing of 10,000 members making annual contributions towards the maintenance fund of the Yeshiva and its College for Liberal Arts and Sciences, the first and only college under Jewish auspices in the United States. The campaign is being conducted by a volunteer army composed of 100 teams, all of whose workers are members of Young Israel.

Twenty percent of the quota has already been secured, according to reports submitted at the rally by the chairmen of the nine sections into which the greater city has been divided. A contribution of \$1,000 towards the campaign has been announced by Louis Gold, prominent realtor, who is chairman of the board of directors of the Yeshiva College.

The campaign is to open officially on April 15 and is to last until May 4. A house to house canvass of the Jewish sections of the metropolitan population will be made by the Young Israel teams, soliciting \$10, \$15 and \$25 annual contributions.

## Arabs Seek to Have Foreign Office Deal with Palestine

Jerusalem, Apr. 7.—The British Foreign Office and not the Colonial Office would have to deal with Palestine matters if one of the planks in the program of the Arab delegation now in London wins approval, according to dispatches in the local Arabic press.

## Jewries of New England Pledge Their Aid to Boston Hebrew Teachers College

Brighton, Mass., Apr. 7.—New England Jewish communities rallied to the support of the Hebrew Teachers College of Boston at a conference held here yesterday. More than fifty delegates from fourteen New England towns and cities promised cooperation in order to produce better equipped Hebrew teachers and to speed up Hebrew learning in New England.

The conference, which was called to interest New England Jewish communities outside of Boston in the welfare of the college, listened to a report by Dr. Samuel Perlman, dean of the college, on its present status and scope of work, an address by Prof. Nathan Isaacs of Harvard, president of the Bureau of Jewish Education, of which the college is a part, on the need and service of the college and a report by Louis Hurwich on advanced Jewish education in New England.

A plan to organize associate boards of trustees consisting of representatives from cities other than Boston, proposed by Nathan E. Goldstein of Springfield, was adopted and a committee on constitution consisting of Prof. Isaacs, Judge A. E. Pinanski, Judge J. J. Kaplan and Lewis Goldberg was appointed. The committee on organization is composed of the following: Chairman, Henry Yozell, of Lynn; Edward Cohen, Cambridge; Nathan E. Goldstein, Springfield; Dr. S. G. Pavlo, Malden; Henry and Hillel Haasenveld, Providence; Samuel Salny, Fitchburg; John L. Davis, Portland; Albert A. ## European Art World Celebrates Jewish Painter's Centenary

Paris, Apr. 7.—The European art world is now celebrating the centenary of Camille Pissarro, eminent Jewish painter and founder of impressionism. The Paris Musee Orangerie possesses the largest collection of his works.

London, Apr. 7.—The leading art authority, Frank Rutter, writing in the "Sunday Times," points out that the world now realizes that Pissarro rather than Manet was the pivot around which the French impressionists revolved. Mr. Rutter says that Pissarro "was a master magician at expressing light and heat in terms of color and in this field he has never been surpassed. This gifted and exquisite artist was never a follower of others but always a leader."

## American Jewish Committee Members Actively Opposing Alien Registration Proposals

Members of the American Jewish Committee throughout the country are actively engaged in opposing various bills now pending in Congress, providing for the registration of aliens, according to a statement of Morris D. Waldman, secretary of the Committee. A number of the national organizations are also affiliated with the Committee are also cooperating through their respective branches in the same direction. Among the active organizations are the National Council of Jewish Women, the National Conference of Jewish Social Work, the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America, United Rumanian Jews of America and the United Synagogue. At the request of the Committee, the Independent Order B'nai B'rith has also agreed to cooperate.

## Locust Menace Serious as Pests Cross Dead Sea

Jerusalem, Apr. 7.—A grave situation has arisen as a result of the dangers from the locust plague. The huge army of locusts has crossed the Dead Sea and is passing the Suez Canal on its way to the Eastern provinces. Airplanes will not be used in fighting the locusts but patrols in cars with flame throwers will be used as the chief weapons. These are to be supplemented by frontiersmen, camel drivers, laborers and rewards to bedouins.

## Police Skeptical of Bomb Plot Tale in Jerusalem

Jerusalem, Apr. 7.—The police commandant of Jerusalem attaches no significance to the discovery of five old unfinished bombs found in the Garden of Gethsemane. An official statement on this matter will be issued today. The Arabs had become alarmed at the discovery of the bombs and alleged that it was a plot to blow up the procession of Nebi Musa which is to pass near the Garden. The police are skeptical as to the tale of a plot.

## MacDonald Statement on Palestine Policy Reassuring, Says Emanuel Neumann

The statement made in the House of Commons by Prime Minister MacDonald supported by the former British Prime Ministers Baldwin and Lloyd George, again pledging the British Government to the enforcement of the provisions of the Palestine Mandate calling for the establishment in Palestine of a Jewish National Home is reassuring, declared Emanuel Neumann, president of the Jewish National Fund of America.

"The accord between the Government and the opposition parties in regard to the Palestine policy is not at all surprising in view of the fact that the Jewish National Home policy, inaugurated during the World War by a Coalition Government, was successively endorsed by Conservatives, Liberals, and Laborites alike both in and out of power," said Mr. Neumann. "What the Jews of the world regardless of party affiliation, do expect now is the formulation of a complete program which will indeed put into effect the provisions of the Palestine Mandate that will leave no doubt in the minds of anyone as to the course which is to be followed by the Administration of Palestine for the creation of such conditions as will facilitate the establishment of a Jewish National Home, the formula first employed in the Balfour Declaration, which has since become an irrevocable international obligation," Mr. Neumann stated.

The president of the Jewish National Fund also took exception to the assertion made in the Shaw Commission report in regard to the land question.

"The Shaw Commission must have acted in great haste, when it formulated its recommendation regarding the land question. At this late date it recommends 'a scientific inquiry' with a view of ascertaining the prospects of improving methods of land cultivation. Has the Shaw Commission not heard of the scientific survey made by a group of American experts headed by Dr. Elwood Mead of the United States Reclamation Bureau only a short while ago? Have the members of the Shaw Commission not acquainted themselves with the contents of the report of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission, an impartial and exhaustive study of the very question? It seems hardly probable. Had they been acquainted with the facts, the members of the Shaw Commission should not have asserted, as they did, that the purchase of land by Jewish settlers in Palestine had really worked any great and unusual hardship on the native Arab population."

## Vaad Leumi Urges Agency to Counteract Commission Report

Jerusalem, Apr. 7—Resolutions protesting against the conclusions of the Palestine Inquiry Commission and urging the Jewish Agency to take measures to counteract them were adopted here yesterday at an extraordinary session of the Vaad Leumi, the Jewish National Council.

## Says Poland Must Drop "Fear Complex" Towards Jews to Achieve Prosperity

If Poland could only drop the "fear complex" which it exhibits towards its Jewish population and cooperate with the Jews in the development of industry, not only the Jews of Poland, but the non-Jews as well, would be greatly helped towards the attainment of prosperity. This is the opinion expressed by Morris D. Waldman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee, in the current issue of the "Jewish Quarterly Review," reviewing a book by Georges Glicksman on the "Economic Aspect of the Jewish Question in Poland."

At present, the population of Poland is too large for the agricultural and industrial resources of the country, and birth control would be an obvious remedy for excessive population, thinks Mr. Waldman, but birth control is impossible there because of the attitude towards it on the part of the churches.

"The remedies must be found in other and perhaps slower, more tedious and more costly directions," says Mr. Waldman. "And they lie largely in the hands of the Polish government, from whom the initiative must come. Its efforts must be based on an objective view of the situation and upon a realization of the truth that an unhealthy condition of any element in the population unavoidably injures the country as a whole. 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## Warsaw Yiddish Daily Approves MacDonald's Statement

Warsaw, Apr. 7—The Warsaw Yiddish daily, "Haint," comments favorably upon Prime Minister MacDonald's statement to the effect that Great Britain will stand by the Balfour Declaration and the Palestine Mandate. It is the duty of the British government now to reject the recommendation of the majority of the Shaw Commission that Jewish immigration to the land purchased in Palestine be limited, believes the "Haint," which feels that MacDonald's statement has somewhat ameliorated the discouragement created in Jewish circles by the report of the Shaw Commission.

"Nasz Przegląd" in an editorial shows that the Shaw Commission bases its conclusions upon the White Paper of 1922. It declares that not only the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations has accepted this interpretation, but also the Zionist Executive, which has thus itself made it impossible to bring the problem of the interpretation of the Balfour Declaration before the forum of the League of Nations. This paper also thinks that the final decision as to the interpretation of the Balfour Declaration may depend on the result of Anglo-Egyptian negotiations over the protection of the Suez Canal.

## Vatican Bible Commission Would Alter Passage in Vulgate If Jews Asked It

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Apr. 7—The Bible Commission of the Vatican is ready to alter the passage in the Vulgate which speaks of a God of revenge, if the Jews of the world would officially apply for such a correction. This was the statement made by Cardinal Gasquet to the Budapest Jewish Bible scholar, Donath, after the Catholic Bible Commission realized that Donath's interpretation of the passage was the correct one.

However, Donath's efforts during the past half-year to induce Jewish religious leaders to take such an attitude have been without avail, due to obstacles which cannot be overcome, says a report in the "Neue Freie Presse," as a result of which Donath began negotiations in leading Catholic and Protestant circles.

Both Christian sects were ready to help make the corrections in the Vulgate, for they felt that the rejection of the idea of a God of revenge would also relieve Christianity of criticism which has been directed against it, as well as against Judaism, for containing this notion. As a condition for such revision they demanded, however, that Donath should become baptized into Christianity, which would have been a tragedy for science as well as for Donath personally, according to the "Neue Freie Presse."

## Organize Jersey Region of American Jewish Congress

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Newark, Apr. 7—Responding to the pleas of Jewish leaders of New York and New Jersey, who urged the need for an aroused Jewish consciousness in relation to the manifold Jewish problems in Europe and the United States 250 delegates representing leading Jewish communities of New Jersey, meeting at a conference held Sunday afternoon and evening at the Newark Y. M. H. A., organized a permanent New Jersey State region of the American Jewish Congress.

Addresses were delivered by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Bernard S. Deutsch. Judge Joseph Siegler of Newark who presided at the afternoon session, was named president of the conference, and Bernard Miller was toastmaster of the dinner. Following an appeal for funds by Rabbi Wise and Bernard Miller, nearly \$1,500 were pledged, Mr. Miller giving the largest individual contribution of \$300.

## Moslem Congress in Bombay to Discuss Palestine Situation

Jerusalem, Apr. 7—A Moslem congress will be held in Bombay April 18 to discuss the Palestine situation and to adopt resolutions supporting the Arab case it is reported in the Arab paper, "Jamal El Arabia," official organ of the Moslem Supreme Council.

## Senate Committee Aids in Direction of Selective Immigration Policy

## Arab Executive Trying to Get Death Sentences Commuted

Jerusalem, Apr. 7.—While the Arab delegation in London is using all the influence at its command to get a commutation of the death sentences imposed on Palestine Arabs as a result of last Summer's riots, the Arab Executive here is leaving no stone unturned to accomplish the same object, despite the fact that the Privy Council has already turned down an appeal from the death sentences.

Following a meeting of the Arab Executive yesterday, at which the Privy Council's action in the death sentences was discussed, a memorandum was sent to High Commissioner Chancellors, urging commutation of the death sentences to imprisonment. The memorandum protested against the Privy Council's decision and expressed fear that trouble might arise as a result of it. The Arab Executive also has sent a delegation to Emir Abdullah of Transjordan, asking him to solicit a commutation of the death sentences.

## Jewish Workers in Ukraina Reject Yiddish as Language

Moscow, Apr. 7.—Only eight thousand of 28,000 Jewish workers in Ukraina declared Yiddish to be their mother tongue, published statistics revealed today. The number of those who refused to recognize Yiddish as their mother tongue has increased during the last three years by sixteen per cent. The figures also show that the tendency to substitute Yiddish with Russian is growing tremendously among the Jewish workers in Ukraina.

### San Francisco Jews to Welcome Two New Rabbis to Principal Synagogues of City

(By Our San Francisco Correspondent)

San Francisco, Apr. 7.—For the first time in its history, the San Francisco Jewish community is to see two new rabbis take the pulpits of the two largest temples of the city. And at the same time, two newcomers will assume their places in the religious and Jewish cultural life of the city.

Dr. Irving F. Reichert of New York will assume the pulpit of Temple Emanu-El for the high holy days, taking the place of Dr. Louis L. Newman, who resigned to become rabbi of Temple Rodoph Shalom of New York City.

Probably at the same time a new rabbi will have been selected by Congregation Sherith Israel to succeed the late Rabbi Jacob Nieto, who for 37 years occupied the pulpit of that synagogue. It is expected that in deference to the memory of the late leader, who only recently was made rabbi emeritus of the Temple in recognition of his long and faithful service, no move will be made to select a successor until just before the high holy days.

The selection of Dr. Reichert by the board of directors of Congregation Emanu-El was ratified unanimously by the congregation at a general meeting on March 27. During a recent visit to San Francisco, he occupied the pulpit of Temple Emanu-El and made a strong impression on the congregation. In succeeding Dr. Newman, he will have a big place to fill in the community, for the departing rabbi, since coming to San Francisco, made his influence felt in communal life. His popularity extended to all denominations. He was active in civic affairs, served on committees in charitable and social welfare movements of all creeds, and was regarded as one of the most outstanding leaders in community matters.

The successor of the late Rabbi Nieto likewise will have a heavy responsibility. The departed rabbi exerted a powerful influence in the life of his city. He was active in a diversity of endeavors, his efforts extending far outside of the Jewish sphere. He was an important figure in Masonic work, took a keen interest in Boy Scout activities, busied himself with prison reform and in the anti-capital punishment movement, and was an outstanding leader in social welfare work.

## Grand Mufti to Address Members of Commons
