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N. Y. "Times" Report of Palestine Canton Plan Is Officially Denied

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 14—In response to inquiries made by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, an official denial has been issued on the report in the "New York Times" of April 8 to the effect that the Palestine government is working on a plan to divide Palestine into cantons, similar to the canton system in Switzerland. The official denial termed the report as without foundation.

The report had declared that the government's plan, which was to be submitted to London, called for the establishment of an experimental canton by the creation of an all-Jewish district to include Tel Aviv and forty Jewish colonies in the environs of Petach Tikvah, Kishon Le Zion and Rehoboth, which would be organized into a compact group with a total Jewish population of 70,000. The report also said that Major J. F. Campbell, commissioner for the Southern district of Palestine, would probably be named special commissioner of this initial canton which would be named "Judaea."

London, Apr. 14—Commenting on the report that the Palestine government is planning a canton system in Palestine, the "Jewish Chronicle" suggests that the proposal merits serious consideration because it might prove to be the most desirable policy for the Jews in establishing a true nucleus for their national regeneration.

In official Zionist circles here, however, the report is not credited. No official would speak for publication on the subject but the general impression seems to be that it is undesirable because it would lead to the creation of Jewish ghettos.

New Bill in Senate Would Cut Down or Completely Stop All Immigration Into U. S.

Washington, Apr. 14—Only those people who can pass a so-called selective immigration test would be admitted to the United States if the bill introduced into the United States Senate by Senator Allen of Kansas with the approval of the administration and of Secretary of Labor Davis is passed. This bill, however, would not affect existing categories of relatives and other non-quota and preference categories. The bill, which creates a fundamental change in immigration policy is likely to cut down greatly the number of aliens admitted or to stop im-

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Learn MacDonald Made No Offer of Legislative Council to Arab Delegates

London, Apr. 13—No offer of a legislative council of any kind was made by Prime Minister MacDonald or Lord Passfield, Colonial Minister, in the course of their interview with the Arab delegation, as was announced last week by Azmi Nashashibi, who accompanied the delegation, it was learned today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency from a good source. The Premier and Lord Passfield merely discussed broadly some lines on which they could negotiate but at the same time made it clear that any proposals that the Arab delegation makes must be within the terms of the Mandate.

Any demands for a parliament in Palestine being inconsistent with the Mandate could therefore not be negotiated. It is known that the Premier and the Colonial Minister informed the delegation that Great Britain could not carry out the Mandate if the Arabs were given a legislative council. The Arabs are reported to have been informed that it was up to them to make

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Moscow Synagogues Crowded on First Day of Passover

Moscow, Apr. 14—Moscow's synagogues were crowded during the first day of Passover, and seders were performed throughout the city by religious Jews without any anti-religious interference. The Jewish Communists limited themselves to the three peaceful anti-Passover meetings in different parts of the city, but they fully obeyed the government's orders to avoid any disturbance. Those who are not religious, worked as usual and many were even unaware that it was Passover, because the Jewish Communist press carefully avoided any mention of the date, and a Jewish calendar is unobtainable here.

Altogether, neither Passover nor anti-Passover was particularly felt in Moscow, but in the provinces, where religious sentiment is stronger, things were different. Judging from preliminary reports from Minsk, Odessa and the smaller towns, the Jewish artisans were not working. In Kiev, however, thousands of Jewish needle trades workers went to their jobs as usual.

Reports from White Russia indicate that in a number of small towns, the Jews held a seder first and then attended anti-religious meetings. Yesterday's Moscow "Emes" does not mention Passover, which compared with its attitude in previous years, is a revolutionary about-face, indicating that the editor received definite instructions not to slander religion.

Dubrovna Jews, Encouraged by Stalin's Decree, Demand Return of Their Synagogue

Moscow, Apr. 14—Establishing a precedent that has not been heard of in Russia since the Revolution, the religious Jews of Dubrovna, in the Minsk region, called on the chairman of the local soviet to return to them the synagogue which the local soviet had converted into a Communist club against the will of the worshippers and without the knowledge of the Soviet Central Executive Committee. The Dubrovna Jews were encouraged in their unprecedented demand by the recent order of Joseph Stalin and the Communist Party that no place of worship should be converted unless a majority of those concerned and unless the Central Executive Committee sanction it.

When the chairman of the local Soviet refused the request the Jews went to the synagogue, removed the Communist lock and locked the building with their own keys. When the members of the Communist club arrived they found the entrance barred. The Dubrovna Jews felt that since the action of the local soviet in converting the synagogue was illegal they are well protected by the orders of Stalin and the Communist Party and they plan to reopen the synagogue for Passover services.

Kosher Meat Again Made Available in Ukraina

Moscow, Apr. 14—Kosher meat has again been made available in Ukraina while the government trade department, anxious to get more feathers for export, has opened kosher slaughters under the supervision of local rabbis in a number of Ukrainian cities. The slaughterers will get small salaries from the Soviet government and will be classified as qualified laborers.

On the other hand, the Moscow "Emes" criticises the government trade department in Zinovievsk for reopening three kosher slaughter houses.

Zik Demands Speeding Up Reinstatement of Lishitzny

Moscow, Apr. 14—Instructions demanding that summary measures to reinstate the lishitzny or rightless people be submitted to the Central Executive Committee by the regional and central authorities not later than May 10 are contained in instructions issued by the Central Executive Committee today over the signature of Michael Kalinin, president of the Soviet Union. This means that the decree to reinstate the lishitzny is to be pushed as fast as possible.

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Philadelphia Jew Receives Decoration from Pope

Philadelphia, Apr. 14.—Cardinal Dougherty announced that Albert M. Greenfield, well-known real estate broker and banker, had been honored by Pope Pius XI by having conferred upon him the order and title of Commander in the Order of Pius XI.

Mr. Greenfield is the first non-Catholic in Pennsylvania to be thus honored by the head of the Catholic Church. The award was given him by the Pope in recognition of Mr. Greenfield's services to the Catholic Diocese of Pennsylvania.

The award was given to Cardinal Dougherty when he was in Rome during the course of his recent trip around the world, and was brought to this city by the Cardinal himself when he returned last week in company with Bishop O'Hara, who accompanied the Cardinal on his world tour. The title was bestowed upon Mr. Greenfield by the Cardinal yesterday.

Mr. Greenfield is a member of the Keneseth Israel Congregation. The list of his donations embraces many faiths.

Buffalo Names Director of Jewish Education

Buffalo, Apr. 14.—The Buffalo Bureau of Jewish Education has appointed Ben M. Edidin as director of Jewish education. Mr. Edidin has been associated with the Board of Jewish Education in Chicago in the capacity of supervisor of schools and director of the Extension Department for the past seven years. Mr. Edidin will assume office on July 1st.

Simultaneously with the appointment of a director, the Bureau has also undertaken the remodeling of the Buffalo Talmud Torah, which is expected to be finished before the Summer. The building when completed will contain adequate and modern facilities for over five hundred pupils.

SET QUOTA OF \$2,500,000 FOR NEW YORK CITY IN NATION-WIDE DRIVE TO RAISE \$6,000,000 IN ALLIED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

A quota of \$2,500,000 as New York's share in the \$6,000,000 Allied Jewish Campaign, was agreed upon by close to one hundred of the leading figures in the communal and philanthropic life of the metropolis, at a dinner meeting held at the Hotel Biltmore last Thursday night.

Simultaneously, national headquarters announced that the quota for the rest of the state had been fixed at \$350,000, making the entire quota for the Empire State \$2,850,000. The dinner-meeting, which marked the inauguration of New York City's Allied Jewish Campaign, was called by Paul Baerwald, one of the national chairmen of the campaign, and Hon. Joseph M. Proskauer, who during the evening was elected honorary chairman of the "drive."

In the address with which he opened the discussion of New York City's participation in the campaign, Judge Proskauer, who presided, said:

"There are certain phases of this campaign upon which we are about to enter that I think must give us encouragement and hope. For the first time, all the forces of Jewry are united in this community in one common aim. I care not whether you be devout Jew, observant or non-observant, whether you be Orthodox or Reformed, whether you be anti-Zionist or Zionist or a non-Zionist, the purposes of this campaign must appeal to every man and woman in whose veins Jewish blood runs.

"We are for the first time in a communal endeavor of this sort presenting a united front. I wonder if we all quite realize what that common urge of race means and should mean to us. 'Gentlemen, let there be no escape with us and no desire for an escape. And let the loyalty of our own brethren, which is our heritage, and which has come down to us through the ages as the great distinction of the Jewish people, their impulse, in their desire to care for their own—let that urge us on, not as a fury but as an inspiration here at this time.'

Judge Proskauer then read the following cablegram to the meeting from Felix M. Warburg:

"Encouraged by attitude and spirit of Jewish Agency administration but even more so by what prime minister and leaders of other parties have stated publicly, feel that period of prophecies, statements and fears is over and that constructive steps should be the order of the day. Get people to furnish us the means to do progressive things benefitting different lands and groups and ways will be found for harmonious cooperation; the more united and generous we are the more hope that we gain the respect and understanding of leaders of other faiths and governments. Good luck in your efforts."

Messages were also received from Lieut. Governor Lehman and Morris Rottenberg, one of the national chairmen.

David M. Bressler, also one of the

national chairmen, was the first to strike the note of optimism that animated the meeting, as he reported the progress of the Allied Jewish Campaign nationally.

Judge William Lewis of Philadelphia, another of the "big four" of the campaign, announced that preparations for a drive in his city would begin the following week, and said: "There is no doubt that your investment in this campaign will bring immediate results to thousands and tens of thousands of beneficiaries and it is bound to bring tremendous satisfaction to you."

Senator Nathan Straus, Jr., the next speaker, brought the greetings of his father.

Other speakers included Judge Albert Cohn, who pledged the support of the Bronx Jewish community, and Judge Mitchell May, who gave assurance that Brooklyn Jewry would do its full duty. James Rosenberg, Judge Otto Rosalsky, I. D. Morrison, Sol M. Stroock, former president of the Federation, and Jonah J. Goldstein.

Jewish Socialists Injured at Concert on Passover Night

Lodz, Apr. 14.—The serious injury of 16 people in the collapse of the stage in the Philharmonic Hall here last night, where the Bund (Jewish Socialist Party) was sponsoring a concert on the second night of Passover, is viewed by the religious Jews as an act of God in retribution for having committed sacrilege (a chilul hashem).

During the concert, which was being given by a choir composed mostly of women, the beams supporting the stage suddenly collapsed, burying all the singers and creating indescribable confusion and a panic. The fire brigade extricated the injured and rushed them to a hospital.

"Berliner Tageblatt" Writer Criticises Bias Against Jews

Berlin, Apr. 14.—"An unheard of misuse of state funds" is how the Vienna correspondent of the "Berliner Tageblatt" characterizes the action of the rector of the University of Vienna in giving the German Students' Group the sole right to represent the student body and thus discriminating against the Jewish students, because the German organization admits no one, not even Austrian citizens, unless they can prove their German origin.

Hitlerite Party Moves Office to Berlin to Increase Activity

Berlin, Apr. 14.—The "Montagspresse" says that the forthcoming removal of the head office of the National Socialist Party, of which Adolph Hitler is the leader, as well as the transfer of the offices of his organ, the "Volksische Beobachter," from Munich to Berlin, is an indication that the party is planning increased parliamentary activity.

Lloyd George Says Arabs' Cry of Not Enough Land Is "Mischievous Nonsense"

In terming the Arabs' cry that there is no more room for Jews in Palestine without evicting the Arabs from the land "mischievous nonsense," Lloyd George, British war-time Prime Minister, during whose term in office the Balfour Declaration was issued, writing in Sunday's "New York American," in a signed and cabled article, comes out with a complete denunciation of the report of the Palestine Inquiry Commission.

Although not referring directly to the report, the former Premier, and leader of the British Liberal Party, takes issue with the document and says, "Zionism, inspired by its remarkable leader, Dr. Weizmann, is rendering a service to civilization and profits to the Arabs." Lloyd George points out that one million acres could be added to the cultivatable area in Palestine which, he says, would provide for an additional 200,000 families on the land.

After showing what the Jews have done for the country and for the Arabs, Lloyd George recalls that "the report made for the government, of which I was the head, in 1919, by competent and experienced engineers, stated that by well-planned schemes of irrigation, one million acres could be added to the cultivatable area of Palestine and that by this plan 16 persons could be maintained for every 'one there now'."

Concluding, Lloyd George says that "Zionism, inspired by the enthusiasm of its remarkable leader, will insist on seeing that it gets fair play in the discharge of its mission. It has been treated so far with suspicion, jealousy and prejudice. The recent outbreak in Palestine will do good if it calls attention to the fine achievement of the Jewish colonists and to the need for according them not only protection, but reasonable encouragement. They must not be allowed to trample on the legitimate rights of men of any other race or religion, but they have not shown any disposition to do so. Let them have fair play in carrying out one of the most interesting and fruitful experiments of the age."

London Hears Luke Will Not Return, Chancellor Resigns

London, Apr. 14—It is being generally rumored here in official circles that H. C. Luke, Chief Secretary of the Palestine government and Acting High Commissioner during the riots, will not return to Palestine, according to a decision of the Colonial Office. It is also said that the High Commissioner, Sir John Robert Chancellor, had tendered his resignation to the Colonial Office nearly two weeks ago. While his resignation has not yet been accepted, it is known that the government is negotiating with other candidates for the post.

All Jews of Moscow Have Full Supply of Matzoth for Observation of Passover

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 12—Hundreds stood in line last Friday before the Moscow synagogues for the last day on which matzoth could be obtained. The matzoth were sold at two roubles a pound to those who could afford it and given free to the needy. No bread cards or flour were asked in exchange for the matzoth since it was the last day.

It is estimated that every Jew in Moscow desirous of observing Passover is sufficiently provided with matzoth. From Minsk, Charkov and other cities it is reported that not only Jewish artisans but Jewish workers and Communists have bought matzoth for Passover. The Minsk "Oktiebr" publishes a list of the names of Jewish members of the Communist Party who were found to have secretly purchased matzoth. Two Jewish women delegates to the Lipovetz soviet have been impeached because it was found that they had baked matzoth.

Red seders to counteract the traditional Jewish seder were organized for Saturday night in Minsk but not in Moscow or Charkov where the anti-Passover campaign will be limited to anti-religious concerts and theatrical performances. There will be no anti-religious street demonstrations anywhere but in Minsk red wagons will tour the city to collect religious articles for the tractor fund.

The Moscow "Emes" published an extremely mild anti-Passover editorial containing no violent calls and not even mentioning planned anti-religious concerts or anything about attending them.

Frederick Brown Again Heads Hospital for Joint Diseases

Frederick Brown, real estate operator and philanthropist, was re-elected president of the Hospital for Joint Diseases for the fifth consecutive year at a meeting of the hospital board. The Hospital for Joint Diseases is one of the twelve medical agencies affiliated with the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, and the largest orthopedic hospital in the country.

Other officers elected at the board meeting, whose names were made public yesterday, included Max Wilner, first vice-president; Samuel Arnshten, second vice-president; Louis F. Rothschild, treasurer; Judge William Blau, secretary; and Lewis Straus, chairman of the board.

Lithuanian Decree Threatens Jewish Schools' Existence

Kovno, Apr. 14—The existence of the Jewish schools in Lithuania is endangered by the government's intention to "Litvinize" all private schools by ruling that instruction should be given in Lithuanian. A delegation of Jews has visited President Smetana to object to this but despite his promises the Litvinization continues.

Mufti Says Jewish National Home Policy Responsible for Riots of Last Summer

London, Apr. 14—Only the policy of the Jewish National Home led to last Summer's riots declared the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem in addressing a meeting of British M. P.'s in the House of Commons last Thursday, that was presided over by Lord Brentford, former Home Secretary. Expressing the disappointment of the Arabs with the Balfour Declaration, the Mufti said that the Arabs' demands call for the establishment of equality for all the inhabitants of Palestine through representative government.

Others who addressed this meeting were Lord Brentford and Auni Abdul Hadi, a member of the Arab delegation. Jamal Hussein, also a member of the delegation, translated the Arabic addresses of other members of the delegation. Lord Brentford pointed out that the Inquiry Commission could not confine itself in the investigation only to the immediate causes of the riots "because it was necessary to ascertain what was at the bottom of the trouble."

At the second meeting under the auspices of the Seventh Dominion League, founded to make Palestine a dominion of the British Empire, Col. Josiah Wedgwood, Labor M. P., and founder of the League, criticized the Commission's finding that the outbreaks were not directed against British authority. He indicated that British authority and the safety of the Jews was the same thing. Col. Wedgwood expressed satisfaction that the English press had received the report with "so much doubtful praise and cold water" and said that "it opened the eyes of many people to England's danger in the situation that had been created."

Michael Marcus, also a Labor M. P., pointed out that Palestine, in the transition stage before it is granted self-government, must prove it is fit for it. Commander Kenworthy, a prominent member of the Labor Party in the House of Commons, described the strategic imperial and commercial aspects of Palestine as vital for the British Empire. He added that "the roaring traffic in arms across the Jordan constitutes a continual source of danger to Palestine."

Rabbi Burstein Heads Jewish Ministers Board

San Francisco, Apr. 14—Rabbi Elliot M. Burstein of Temple Beth Israel, was elected president of the Board of Jewish Ministers of Northern California at a meeting today. He succeeds the late Rabbi Jacob Nieto of Temple Sherith Israel who was instrumental in creating the board and who had been its presiding officer in its several years of existence.

Rabbi Rudolph I. Coffee of Temple Sinai, Oakland, was elected vice-president, and Rabbi Melbourne Harris of Temple Emanu-El was chosen secretary.

The first gun in the campaign for the adoption of the new plan will be fired with a speech that Senator Allen expects to make shortly in the Senate. He declared he considers that the time has come for the United States to stop admitting aliens indiscriminately and to adopt the selective policy already pursued in Canada through its Orders in Council and in Great Britain through the Board of Trade.

As presented by Senator Allen's bill, the new plan would make all, except non-quota and preference aliens, subject to selective regulations which would make it impossible for the non-excepted aliens to obtain admission unless it were first determined that they come within the regulations to be jointly issued by the Secretaries of Labor, State, Agriculture and Commerce, based on the economic needs of the country.

Cincinnati to Raise \$175,000 in Jewish Community Campaign

Cincinnati, Apr. 14—A Jewish Community Campaign for \$175,000 will be made this fall, the Cincinnati Jewish Community Council having just endorsed this long discussed plan to eliminate a number of separate drives. The council voted each organization in the joint campaign shall receive no more money than it received the year before the joint drive except in such extraordinary cases as the council's executive committee deems worthy.

First Jewish Sorority at Iowa University

Iowa City, Iowa, Apr. 14—Gamma Theta Phi, a local organization for Jewish women, was granted a charter at Iowa City, by the authorities of the University of Iowa. This is the first time in the history of the University that there have been sufficient Jewish students on the campus to warrant such an organization. There are 230 Jewish students enrolled in the University of Iowa.

Jew Heads Tampa Merchants Association

Tampa, Fla., Apr. 14—Julius Weil, prominent businessman of this city, was elected president of the Tampa Merchants' Association at the annual meeting of the organization. He succeeded David Falk.

French-Canadian Weeklies in Anti-Semitic Attack

Montreal, Apr. 14—Last week's issue of "Le Goglu," a local French weekly, is entirely devoted to an attack on the Jews. This paper is one of the three French-Canadian weeklies which are using anti-Semitism as their weapon in a campaign against the Liberal provincial government. These papers cry, "Tascherau has sold the province to the Jews."

The anger of these papers has been aroused by the government's decision to give the Jews the right to separate schools in Montreal and by the recent election of three Jews to the municipal council of Montreal. Jewish newsboys who declined to sell the papers have been threatened that they will be deprived of the right to sell papers on the streets.

Recall Part Played by Jews in South Carolina

Charleston, S. C., Apr. 14—Recollections of the colorful part played in early American history by Jewish settlers in South Carolina, were brought forth in the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of Charleston, now being observed.

In a photogravure anniversary souvenir edition just published by the "News and Courier" of Charleston, the Temple of the Beth Elohim congregation is pictured along with other landmarks of the ancient city. The inscription under the picture recalls that the congregation was founded in 1750, the present synagogue being rebuilt in 1841.
