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Montreal Jews Consider Court Action Against Anti-Semites

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal Apr. 17.—While a conference of Montreal Jewish leaders considered what legal steps could be taken against a number of French-Canadian publications hostile to the Quebec government who have recently been full of inflammatory anti-Semitic articles the assurance of L. A. Taschereau, Premier of Quebec, to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, that the Jews of Quebec have nothing to fear from this anti-Semitic agitation was received with great satisfaction by Montreal Jewry.

Although there was no fear of immediate anti-Jewish attacks, the Premier's statement helped to relieve a certain anxiety that was being felt. At the conference of Jewish leaders it was argued that court action might make martyrs of the anti-Semitic agitators while others expressed the opinion that a French-Canadian Jewry might not want to pass judgment on members of their own race accused of spreading hatred for the Jews.

Deny Chancellor Resigned and That Passfield to Be Replaced

London, Apr. 17.—While the "Daily News" lobby correspondent confirms his announcement of months ago that Vernon Hartshorn will join the cabinet as Colonial Minister, Reuter reports that yesterday's story to the effect that Mr Hartshorn will succeed Lord Passfield when the former is relieved of his duties as a member of the Simons Commission is unfounded.

The "Daily Herald's" diplomatic correspondent today denied the report published in various continental papers that Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, has tendered his resignation to the Colonial Office. The report had indicated that Sir John had resigned two weeks ago and that while his resignation had not yet been accepted other candidates were being considered.

Woman Bishop Argues Against Bill to Ban Old Testament

Berlin, Apr. 17.—The Berlin woman Bishop Schreiber takes sharp issue in an article with Dr. W. Frick, the Thuringia minister of education, for his law that would prohibit the teaching of the Old Testament in Thuringian schools because of its Hebraic spirit.

Bishop Schreiber points out that the Old Testament Jews gave the world the basis for its religion namely Monotheism and the ten commandments. Hence she believes that the Jews belong to the united front of religion and are opposed to the anti-Christ.

Voluntary Alien Registration Bill Approved by Senate Committee by 7-2 Vote

Washington, Apr. 17.—The so-called Blease voluntary alien registration bill has been favorably reported to the Senate by a 7 to 2 vote of the Senate Immigration Committee despite the 71-page printed report, consisting chiefly of materials in opposition to the bill, issued by the Committee in extension of the hasty oral hearings held recently.

The bill is now on the calendar of the Senate for action and there is a strong likelihood of its adoption. The two votes against the bill were cast by Senators Nye and Copeland who urged that the measure was merely an opening wedge for a compulsory registration law with all its accompanying objection of corruption and espionage. British Journalist Predicts Palestine Riots in June

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 17.—Another outburst in Palestine in June is the prediction of a special correspondent who writes in today's "Morning Post." He says that the point on which there is general agreement among Britons, Jew and Arab is that further trouble is practically certain.

The "Morning Post's" correspondent says that three dates were generally regarded as most likely to bring trouble, the coinciding of Easter with Passover and the Moslem festival of Nebi Musa, the date of the publication of the Inquiry Commission's report and the third, some time in June.

He points out that by that time sufficient time will have passed for public opinion on both sides to have hardened regarding the report. The orange season is already drawing to a close and by the end of May, he avers, the Winter crop of wheat and barley will have been harvested and the most trying climatic period of the year will have come to an end. There will be nothing doing for the moment, he writes and the minds of the people will be free to turn again to political considerations.

There are few Jews, he concludes, at any event, in the country "who have not their automatic pistol and few Arabs who cannot lay their hands upon a serviceable rifle when 'der tag' comes again."

First Safed Compensation List Includes Only Arabs

Safed, Apr. 17.—The first list of those in Safed who will get compensation from the government for injuries resulting from the riots includes only Arabs.

Sir Isaac Isaacs May Be Australian Governor-General

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Melbourne, Apr. 17.—The Rt. Hon Sir Isaac Alfred Isaacs, who was recently appointed Chief Justice of Australia, may be appointed Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia in succession to Lord Stonehaven.

The Australian Labor Government, headed by Mr. Scullin, following its declared policy to have an Australian appointed as the next Governor-General, has recommended, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative here learns authoritatively, the appointment of Sir Isaac. The recommendation has been forwarded to the Colonial Office, with whom the final decision now rests.

Under the Federal Constitution, the Commonwealth is governed by the Governor-General, who is appointed by the British Crown, acting on the advice of the Cabinet which is responsible of the Crown as Viceroy in India of two Houses.

Sir Isaac, if he is appointed Governor-General, would therefore be again following the precedent of his namesake, Lord Reading (Sir Rufus Isaacs), who left the Chief Justiceship of England to become the representative of the Crown as Viceroy in India.

Jewess Removed from Office on Plea People Don't Want Jews

Eisenach, Ger., Apr. 17.—An official explanation that the population of Thuringia did not want a Jew in office was the reason accompanying a notice of dismissal to Dr. Lewin, a Jewess who is the manager of the professional consultation department in the Thuringian department of labor. The labor supervisor first demanded Dr. Lewin's resignation although her work was admittedly excellent.

When she declined to resign the notice of dismissal was sent her. Dr. Lewin maintains, however, that the labor department's explanation is unfounded because she says she has found that the working population has always manifested complete trust in her advice.

Eighty-third Jewish Cemetery Desecrated in Germany

Berlin, Apr. 17.—The eighty-third desecration of a Jewish cemetery within the last few months occurred yesterday at Bottrop where many grave stones were demolished and others marked with profane inscriptions. The police discovered a woman's footprints in the cemetery.

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Urges England to Announce Boldly Change in Palestine Policy, if One Is Planned

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 17—Calling upon Great Britain to boldly announce a change in its Palestine policy, if one is contemplated, the "Near East and India," a magazine reputedly close to the Colonial Office, declares it is "really intolerable that after ten years of administration we should not know whether Palestine is to be treated as a part of Arabia or as an extension of Europe, whether it is to resemble Switzerland, South Africa, Canada or Ireland or whether ultimate self-government for Palestine as an independent state is planned or whether or not there is to be a Jewish majority."

The magazine points out that thus far England has been groping for policy and says "let there now be an end to such a fatal policy of vagueness." It also urges the Arab and Zionist leaders in London to confer in an endeavor to reach an agreement, emphasizing that "a conciliatory spirit is the surest way of gaining British sympathy." On the other hand, "Near East and India" regretfully assumes that no definite step in shaping Arab-Jewish relations will be taken until Parliament has debated the Inquiry Commission's report.

Palestine General Z. O. Urges Fight on Report, Parliament

Tel Aviv, Apr. 17—Resolutions strongly condemning the recent acts of violence between members of the Histadrut (Jewish Labor Federation) and the British "Trumpet" in the colony of Kfar Saba, urging Jewish national institutions to oppose the project for a Palestine parliament, approving the fight on the Inquiry Commission's report, and expressing regret that the new Agency Executive does not include Henrietta Szold and Harry Sacher were adopted at a conference of the Palestine General Zionist organization today.

Greenfield Sees Pope's Honor to Him as Friendship to Jews

Philadelphia, Apr. 17—"I feel that the title Commander with which I have been honored was not meant exclusively for myself, but also as a mark of friendship to the Jewish people."

This was the statement made by Albert M. Greenfield, millionaire philanthropist of Philadelphia, who was honored by having conferred upon him the title of Commander in the Order of Pope Pius IX, in an interview which he gave to Jacob Ginsburg, editor and publisher of the Philadelphia daily, "Jewish World."

Mr. Greenfield made it clear that the honor bestowed upon him by the Pope has nothing whatever to do with any religious convictions, is purely civil in its nature and is so recognized throughout the world. "The title of Commander," he declared, "was created by Pope Pius IX and has for its purpose to honor people not of the Catholic faith who have contributed to the betterment of mankind."

"Some of the leading Jews of the world as well as some of the leading Protestants have been honored in this way. Moses Montefiore received the title from the Pope of his day. The well-known Jewish statesman, Nathan, who for some time was Mayor of the City of Rome, received a similar title. Nahum Sokolow, the great Zionist leader, received the title of Commander from the present Pope."

Jamaica Jewish Center in Membership Drive

Jamaica, L. I., Apr. 17—Magistrate Benjamin Marvin, president of the Jamaica Jewish Center, announced yesterday that an intensive campaign is now being conducted on Long Island, especially in the Kew Gardens and Hollis sections, to enlist the membership of the Jewish families there and to encourage among them an active interest in the center. Teams, headed by captains, are now being formed to canvas special zones.

Jewish Banker Sponsor of New Atlantic University

Richmond, Va., Apr. 17—A new university to be known as the Atlantic University will be opened under the chairmanship of Morton H. Blumenthal, member of the New York Stock Exchange firm of Blumenthal Brothers and author of "Heaven on Earth." The institution is to be located at Virginia Beach, Va., and will be opened in September.

Psychic research and the fourth dimension will be included in the curriculum that is offered to advanced and graduate students besides courses in English, science, chemistry, botany and biology. Edgar Cayce, the head of the Cayce Hospital, in which Mr. Blumenthal is also interested, will be a director of the university, as well as David E. Kahn, New York furniture manufacturer.

Rabbi Fisher Follows Rabbi Feinberg in Quitting Active Connection With Rabbinate

Following the example of Rabbi Abraham L. Feinberg, who resigned recently from the rabbinate because he regards the American synagogue as devoid of idealism, Rabbi Mitchell Salem Fisher, Acting Rabbi of Congregation Rodeph Shalom in New York, in a letter to Ernest J. Wile, president of the Congregation, announces that when his term with Rodeph Shalom is completed he will no longer continue in the active rabbinate. In his letter Rabbi Fisher declares that the ideals of the synagogue are removed from the real issues of everyday living and that the office of rabbi has now become synonymous with that of "an exalted lecturer, entertainer and institution promotion agent."

"No sincere student of the American Jewish scene can fail to realize the tragedy now eventuating," declares Rabbi Fisher. "Preachers enunciate ideals, but these must remain so indefinite, so unpointed, so unchallenging, so completely removed from the real issues of everyday living and struggling that these ideals become patently and utterly vain."

"The rabbi becomes an exalted lecturer, entertainer and institution promotion agent. My colleagues may loudly protest and will boldly assert upon learning of this letter that they are free. They may even think so. The fact remains that with very, very few exceptions none of them is the possessor of effective freedom. And those few who have won their fight to such freedom usually have done so outside of the conventional paths of rabbinical success."

Commenting on Rabbi Fisher's withdrawal, the current issue of the "American Hebrew" says:

"Rabbi Fisher is not the first man to be disillusioned nor will he be the last. What disturbs us is that an intellectual, upstanding young Rabbi of great promise, after ministering to two congregations finds a dreadful contrast between what the synagogue should be and can be and what the synagogue is. If the modern synagogue shackles a Rabbi's idealism so that the ideals he preaches become patently and utterly vain our lay leaders ought to know it and ascertain the reasons why."

Goldberg Says Jews United on Future of Work in Palestine

The Jews are united on the future of the work in Palestine and on what should be done to counteract the effect of the Palestine Inquiry Commission's report, declared Abraham Goldberg, a member of the National Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, speaking at Tuesday's conference to discuss what action American Jewry should take on the Commission's report. Mr. Goldberg's remarks at the conference were inadvertently omitted from the published report of the proceedings.

Hebrew Education Board to Foster Maximum Curriculum Formed at Yeshiva Conference

A Board of Hebrew Education whose purpose it will be to foster adherence to a maximum curriculum in the Jewish religious and Hebrew schools in the United States, was formed at a conference of Hebrew educators held at the Yeshiva College, it was stated in an announcement issued by the Yeshiva College authorities at whose initiative the gathering was held.

The conference, which convened for the purpose of counteracting the efforts of the so-called "minimalists" who advocate the adherence to a reduced minimum curriculum in the Hebrew Schools, was attended by representatives of Jewish bodies interested in the problem of Jewish education. Among those present, were representatives of the New York Jewish Principals' Association, the New York Jewish Teachers' Association, the Yeshiva Teachers' Institute, the Yeshiva and the Education Committee of the Union of Orthodox Congregations of America.

The Board of Hebrew Education, according to the plans adopted at the meeting, is to consist of fifteen members, three representing the Educational Board of the Yeshiva's Teachers' Institute, three representing the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, three from the New York Jewish Principals' Association, three from the New York Jewish Teachers' Association and three representatives at large to be chosen by the Board when it convenes. An advisory committee of 23 is to be elected at another conference of Hebrew School Presidents and members of the Boards of Education of Talmud Torahs in Greater New York, which is to be held soon.

Suprasky Here in Interests of Tiberias Hot Springs Co.

Joshua Suprasky, president of the General Zionists' Federation of Palestine, arrived in this country last week in the interests of the Tiberias Hot Springs Company, and for the purpose of enlisting American aid in bringing to Palestine one thousand Jewish families from Eastern Europe. Mr. Suprasky, who is a member of the Zionist Actions Committee, of the Jewish Agency Council and of the Vaad Leumi, or Jewish National Council, of Palestine, participated in the recent sessions of the Actions Committee and of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency in London.

With regard to the Tiberias hot springs concession, of which he is the manager, Mr. Suprasky stated that seventy thousand dollars has already been invested in the work of erecting modern bath facilities in that section of Palestine. To complete the work a million dollars will be necessary. He has come to this country to raise \$200,000 which is necessary for a start.

Amendment to Pending Bill Seeks to Ban Immigration for 5 Years

Washington, Apr. 17.—Complete suspension of immigration for five years will be offered as an amendment to the pending Harris bill for extension of the quota system to the Western hemisphere immigration it was announced today by Senator Black of Alabama during the debate on the Harris bill.

Senator Hayden of Arizona declared he would support such an amendment in order to cope with labor problems in this country. Bills with a similar purpose have been offered from time to time but neither the immigration committee of the House nor the Senate has ever taken action on them.

Striking Arab Workmen Decline Aid of Jews

Haifa, Apr. 17.—The support of the Jewish workers will never be accepted by the Arab Workers' Association declares a statement issued by the latter to the Arab paper, "Falastin," in connection with the continued strike in an Arab factory. The Arab workers declined the aid of the Jewish workers because they consider the latter "the vanguard of the Jewish bourgeoisie and servants of Zionist imperialism aiming to rob the Arabs of work and land."

Jewish Students Break Montana Scholarship Record

Missoula, Mont., Apr. 17.—Two Jewish students have broken the academic record in the University of Montana, with Morris Silver, a sophomore pre-medical student, taking the honors by setting a new scholarship mark. Silver, carrying twenty-five hours of academic work, earned seventy grade points, thereby breaking Eveline Blumenthal's record of sixty-nine grade points established last fall, when Silver had taken second place.

Jews Building New Urban Quarters in Palestine

The building of new Jewish urban quarters in Palestine and enlarging those in existence, the rebuilding of ruined colonies on a more expansive scale, the reconstruction of the destroyed section of Safed on a sounder sanitary and economic basis, the improvement of industry and the increased development of preventative medicine are among the chief problems being tackled in Palestine in the program of reconstruction made necessary by the riots of last summer, according to Dr. Haim Yassky, acting director of the Hadassah Medical Organization.

In an article in the current issue of the bi-monthly magazine published by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, Dr. Yassky outlines the plan of restoration.

Effort to Obtain Adoption of Selective Immigration Plan Launched in Senate

Washington, Apr. 17.—Declaring that his bill "marks the first effort on the part of the United States to place its immigration upon a properly restrictive and selective basis," Senator Henry J. Allen, of Kansas, in a speech before the Senate yesterday launched the effort to obtain adoption of Secretary Davis' "Selective Immigration" policy, as set forth in the bill recently introduced by Senator Allen, which would subject all immigrants except those falling under the non-quota and preference classes to the "selective immigration" restriction governed by the economic requirements of the country.

"This provision does away with all of the rigidity which belongs to quota restrictions and is properly elastic," asserted Senator Allen in his speech. "It also gives the Secretary of Labor and his associate cabinet officers the power to choose, not only Mexican labor, but in reference to labor from Canada and every other country, the immigration personnel according to the qualifications needed at the particular periods."

"It adds further necessary restrictive features to our immigration laws by providing that fifty percent of the quotas in the quota countries shall be reserved for relatives and members of families. This gives new meaning to a very necessary movement for the uniting of immigrant families."

"It is only within comparatively few years that we have sought to restrict Occidental immigration, and such restrictions as we have provided have unhappily confined themselves principally to numbers. This amendment introduces the principle of selectivity according to definite qualifications. It provides for the precise and impartial administration of this principle."

"It would be of peculiar value to us at a time like this, when unemployment has become a problem. It gives the Secretary of Labor and his associates in the cabinet the power to relieve that problem of the added burden of new immigration. It is a blessing, moreover, to those who immigrate to this country in that it prevents their coming at a time when there is nothing for them to do."

other members of the Committee, however, were firmly determined and refused to be budged.

They all disagreed with the contention of Senators Nye and Copeland and of those who appeared in opposition to the bill. Those voting for it maintained that the bill was entirely harmless, merely giving such previously legally admitted aliens who wish to do so an opportunity to obtain certificates of legal entry into the United States by applying. Therefore Senator Blease, in his report on the bill to the Senate, objected to calling such application "registration."

Hebrew Loan Society Busy During Business Depression

Unemployment conditions and general business depression during the past year brought to the doors of the Hebrew Loan Society many hundreds of small business people as well as unemployed men and women, according to the report made by Julius J. Ducas, president, at their annual meeting yesterday. A total of 9,551 loans amounting to \$1,129,850 and ranging from \$5 to \$500 were made during the year, and according to Mr. Ducas the resources of the society were taxed to the limit.

Mr. Ducas, who has been president of the organization for twenty-five years, has been re-elected. Samuel Heller was elected second vice-president to succeed Meyer Goldberg, who died a short time ago.

Jersey Plan for Religion in School Is Abandoned

Trenton, N. J., Apr. 17—Efforts to inject religious teaching in the public school system of the state, appear to be downed for at least this session of the Legislature. What was known as the religious feature of the McAllister Bill has definitely been withdrawn due to considerable opposition, and it is considered very unlikely that the bill itself will be acted upon by the Legislature, which is preparing to adjourn.

The religious provision of the McAllister Bill was modeled after the bill introduced by Assemblyman Rittenhouse, which went down to an overwhelming defeat in the Assembly last week. The defeat of the latter measure is believed to have foreshadowed the doom of the McAllister measure and hence the decision to dispense with it altogether. Jews throughout the state were especially strong in opposition to both measures.

Julius Fleischl Elected to Board of Bronx Y.M.H.A.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Directors, Julius Fleischl, merchant, was elected to the Board of Directors of the Bronx Y.M.H.A., to fill the place made vacant through the resignation of Bernard Crausman.

Mr. Fleischl has been active in Federation activities and is a member of the Bronx Business Men's Council of Federation.

Molly Picon to Play on Loew Circuit for Ten Weeks

The well-known Yiddish actress, Molly Picon, has just signed a contract to play ten weeks for the Loew circuit at a salary of \$3,500 a week. Miss Picon will start her performances for Loew at the Capitol Theatre the latter part of May.

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Jewish Charity Federation Adopts Record Budget of \$5,080,000 for 1930

A budget of \$5,080,000 has been voted by the board of trustees of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies for 1930 toward the maintenance of ninety-one constituent agencies, it was announced yesterday by Dudley D. Sicher, president of the Federation, following the board's approval of recommendations by the distribution committee of the organization. The amount recommended to the societies is the largest ever voted in the history of the local Jewish charities, and is more than \$150,000 greater than the amount in 1929.

The budget for the current year presents a more difficult problem than any budget since the period of readjustment following the war, according to a statement by Harry G. Friedman, chairman of the distribution committee. "Only with extreme difficulty was the deficit of 1929 covered. We are all aware of the business and financial uncertainties prevailing at the present time. As against these considerations which dictate caution, if not retrenchment, the committee has been obliged to weigh carefully the needs of the societies reflected in their financial results for 1929 and in their requests for 1930."

Although the Federation budget this year has not encouraged new activities or expansion of existing activities, a considerable part of the increase reflects past building operations and expansion, as in the case of the Young Men's Hebrew Association which will open its new building at Lexington Avenue and 92nd Street this year, and the Hebrew Orphan Asylum's new building at Edenwald, for housing boys presenting special behavior problems.

Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation, in pointing out that the increased grants mean that the Business Men's Council of the Federation will be compelled to ask the public for the largest sum in the history of the Jewish charities, stated that nevertheless the appropriations to a great many of the societies show a reduction this year.

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Boston Ready for \$250,000 Jewish Philanthropy Drive

Boston, Apr. 17—Plans for a \$250,000 campaign for the Associated Jewish Philanthropies of Boston were completed yesterday at a meeting of the campaign's leaders. The funds are needed to insure the efficient operation of 20 Jewish institutions affiliated with the association. The regular annual campaign that began last Fall netted over a half million dollars but was interrupted because of business conditions. It will now be resumed in full swing to meet the annual budgetary requirements.
