7 as Jewish School Committee (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Ouebec City, Apr. 25-The provincial government of Ouebec today announced the names of the seven members of the Iewish School Commission, created in a recent enabling bill for a separate Jewish school system on the Island of Montreal. The commission will have power to negotiate for an understanding with the Protestant school leaders or to establish separate Jewish schools if an understanding is impossible. The seven members of the commission

are Edgar M. Berliner, A. Z. Cohen, Nathan Gordon, Rabbi H. Abramovitch, Dr. Max Wiseman, Michael Garber and Samuel Livingstone, with the latter as chairman. Mr. Livingstone, a mining

#### Reactionaries Urge Warning on Schechita Ban, Cemetery Desecrations Be Ignored (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 25-While the reactionary press protests against "the interention of the American Jewish Com-mittee and the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in German internal affairs" it urges the German states to disregard the letter from the foreign minister to the minister of the interior telling him that the American Jewish Committee and the Jewish Telegraphic Agency had called the attention of the German ambassador in Washington to the schechita ban in Bavaria and the reports of Jewish cemetery desecrations.

The Jewish press on the other hand reprints the letter and expresses satisfaction that the Foreign Office considers "the feelings of American Jews by recognizing that the schechita ban and the desecration of Jewish cemeteries is harmful to German prestige abroad." Although the Democratic press has so far not reprinted the letter it is known that in important political circles the warning that the Reich gov-ernment sent to the German states is approved.

The "Voelkische Beobachter" in its Easter issue published the foreign minister's letter which pointed out that the German ambassador in Washington had received letters from the managing director of the Jewish Telegra-phic Agency and from the president of the American Jewish Committee callting the ambassador's attention to the cemetery violations and the ban on in New York by the Jewish Telegra-phic Agency the letters from neither could be interpreted as intervention in German internal affairs.

#### Despite Recent Developments New General Restrictive Immigration Bill Unlikely

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Washington, Apr. 25-Despite the surprising developments in the Senate in the last few days it is unlikely that Congress will adopt a new general im-migration restriction bill applying to Europe, it is authoritatively learned here though the situation warrants considerable anxiety on the part of friends

It is thought that the Senate has been largely animated by a desire to show that it is grappling with the unemployment problem in adopting such drastically restrictive proposals, but even if the Harris bill, extending the quota system to South America and Mexico, together with its amendments affecting European immigration, passed in the Senate it will probably be rejected in this form by the House and in the end all of the recent startling developments will be proved to be a bursted bubble although they will undoubtedly be the basis for possible further immigration restriction at the next session.

The Harris bill is confidently expected to pass by its supporters although its opponents express skepticism because of the opposition of the administration which feels that this (Continued on Page 3)

#### Oppose Isaacs as Australia's Governor Because He Is Native (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Melbourne, Apr. 25-Widespread opposition to the proposed nomination of Sir Isaac Isaacs, recently appointed Chief Justice of Australia, as governorgeneral of the Commonwealth of Australia, has been indicated here. The opposition is not in any way antiemitic but is based on the fact that former appointees, coming from England, have been regarded as an important link with Great Britain and a continuation of the policy of appointment of someone not an Australian is thought would ensure the naming of someone more disinterested than a native ap-

The Australian Labor Party, following its declared policy to have an Australian appointed Governor-General, has recommended Sir Isaac, who climaxed a brilliant legal career of 30 years by his recent appointment as Chief Justice. Despite the outcropping of opposition to a local appointee, all the political parties pay tribute to Sir Isaac.

There is a feeling in some quarters that the recommendation that Sir Isaac be appointed was influenced by the Catholic majority in the Federal government since the British nominee is always a Protestant.

Luke to Testify for British Government at Mandates Body

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, Apr. 25—H. C. Luke, chief secretary of the Palestine government and acting High Commissioner during the riots, will accompany the representative of the British government before the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations which meets in June. Al-though he will not be the British government's representative - Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary for the Colonies will act in that capacity-he will accompany him with a view to furnishing information to the Mandates Commission and reply to various questions as the person responsible for the government of Palestine during the disturbances.

Parliamentary circles consider it the most natural thing in the world for the Chief Secretary to accompany Dr. Shiels, while in Zionist circles the report has caused astonishment and great disappointment. In order to appear before the Mandates Commission in June, Mr. Luke's six months' leave of absence has been extended for a further period, but nothing definite can be said regarding his movements after the Mandates Commission's sessions.

Jerusalem, Apr. 25-H. C. Luke, chief secretary of the Palestine government and acting-High Commissioner during last Summer's disturbances, will represent the British government before the Tune session of the League of Nations Mandates Commission, according to the Arab paper "Falastin." The paper also says that after that he will return to his post in Palestine.

#### Court of Appeal Upholds Urphali's Death Sentence

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 25 - The Palestine Court of Appeal today confirmed the death sentence of the Jewish merchant from Jaffa, Joseph Mizrachi Urphali, condemned to death for a second time by the lower court, April 3, following a re-trial which had been ordered by the Court of Appeal when it ruled out the evidence presented by the prosecution in the first trial. Urphali is now the only Jew sentenced to death as a result of last Summer's riots.

Urphali's re-trial followed a decision of the Court of Appeal on January 25, setting aside the verdict of the lower court. It was expected that a re-trial would mean an acquittal. He was found guilty of being implicated in the murder of two Arabs who were killed on August 25 when the Arabs attempted to invade Tel Aviv from a point just outside of Urphali's house in Jaffa. His counsel, Mordecai Eliash, has asked the Court of Appeal to request High Commissioner Chancellor to pardon Urphah

#### Committee to Probe Economic Condition of Agriculturists (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 25-A committee to investigate the economic condition of agriculturists and fiscal measures that the government should take in relation to them has been appointed by Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, it was officially an-nounced here today. The committee consists of W. J. Johnson, deputy treasurer of the Palestine government, R. E. H. Crosbie, assistant district commissioner for the Southern district and an area officer to be nominated by the district commissioner in whose dis trict the committee will sit. The committee will have two secretaries, J. Gress and V. N. Levy, both treasury officials.

#### Religion Not Persecuted in Russia, Report of British Envoy to Soviet Shows

Religion is not directly persecuted in Soviet Russia, where thousands of churches are still functioning, but priests of religion are quickly shot or banished for the least act that the government regards as counter-revolutionary. The success of the anti-religious movement in Russia is due in a great measure to the fact that communism has become the new religion.

This is the gist of the confidential report of Sir Esmond Ovey, British Ambassador to Moscow, on alleged religious persecution in Russia which Foreign Secretary Henderson has persistently refused to publish. In spite of Mr. Henderson's refusal, however, the "Manchester Guardian" has just published a summary of the report, which yesterday's "New York Times" repro-

Mr. Cahn was literally drafted for this position. Upon his return from a splendid record of social service work with the Red Cross, Mr. Cahn resumed his practice of law. His avocation, however, was social work. As a member of the board of directors of the Jewish Social Service, Mr. Cahn advocated a community study. recommendation was adopted and he was named in charge of this work. More than \$25,000 was spent in the survey and after it was completed, the directors of the charities agreed that Mr. Cahn was the only man fully capable of heading the organization's activities. Whereupon, he gave up his

created position of managing director. Throughout the ten years of his service, Mr. Cahn has always emphasized coordination and unification. And he did not confine his activities to only the Jewish community, he is a prominent figure in Chicago-a man who is called upon whenever social problems arise. For years, he has been secrearise. For years, he has been seek-tary of the executive committee of the Council of Social Agencies, an organi-zation in Chicago composed of the leading social workers, executives and philanthropists of the city. He also is a member of the Cook County Welfare Council appointed by Anton J. Cermak, president of the Board of Cook County

In 1923 Mr. Cahn accomplished what many consider the greatest piece of work of his career-consolidation of the two federations of Jewish social agencies in Chicago. The orthodox groups and the liberal elements were brought together under one organization working for their common good. This was a difficult task-how difficult, only those intimately connected with the negotiations realize. But Louis Cahn's a common goal finally succeeded. It took years to accomplish that. And then, he began to work all over again, he was directing the social destinies of two widely diversified groups.

#### Reversing Self Senate Adopts Amendment Restoring National Origins Immigration Plan (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Washington, Apr. 25—Making one sensational about face after another, the Senate yesterday by a vote of 37 to 36 adopted the amendment offered by Senator Swanson of Virginia, reversing the vote of last Monday repealing the National Origins plan, and restoring this plan. Senator Swanson in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency after the vote, said that the Senate is today expected to so perfect his amendment that the 150,000 immigrants admissible annually under the National Origins scheme will be cut to 82,000, thus restoring the National Origins plan in principle and cutting it in quantity.

The adoption of the Swanson amendment was followed by the adoption of an amendment to the Harris bill by Senator Harris himself reducing from the one and a half percent, as provided by the Norbeck National Origins repealing amendment, to one percent of the 1890 census the annual immigration quota, which means 80,000 admitted annually instead of the 120,000 provided by

the Norbeck amendment.

#### National Socialists Plan to Oust Jews When They Control Germany (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 25-Every Jew will either be expelled from Germany or it will be made impossible for him to do business in Germany when the control of the Reich government passes into the hands of the National Socialists through the creation of a third German Empire, says an order from the highest party executive of the National Socialists to their local groups as published by the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith.

#### Senator Wagner to Assume Lead in Fight on Blease Voluntary Registration Bill (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Washington, Apr. 25—Senator Robert Wagner of New York is expected to assume the leadership of the fight in the Senate on the Blease voluntary alien registration bill. He indicated today that he was in touch with national Jewish and other organizations opposed to the bill. Senator Wagner said that he was interviewing a number of Senators with a view to organizing the opposition in preparation for a strong fight on the proposed measure when it comes up

for consideration and a vote on the floor

of the Senate.

Both Senator Wagner and Senator Copeland have taken steps to prevent a repetition of the recent surprise vote when Senator Copeland frustrated Senator Blease's effort to obtain the bill's adoption without debate. It is known that the Progressive bloc of Senators, inchiding Senators La Follette, Morris, Nye, Wheeler and Johnson, have expressed themselves as bitterly opposed to compulsory alien registration and Senator Wagner is hopeful that he will be able to demonstrate to them the dangerous character of Blease's voluntary registration bill. Senator Wagner is furnishing them

with material supplied by the American Jewish Committee.

#### New Jewish National Fund Headquarters to Be Dedicated (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 25-The Jewish National Fund has moved its headquarters into its own building, a new structure, facing King George Avenue, one of the leading thoroughfares of the city. new headquarters is one of the few buildings in Palestine which has a central heating plant. The building will be dedicated shortly.

The decision of the Actions Committee of the Zionist organization to inscribe 5,000 names in the Golden Book received with enthusiasm by Jewry all over the world and the Jewish National Fund headquarters is making intensive plans for this effort which must be completed by the end of July to enable the August meeting of the Actions Committee to appropriate the funds.

The fourth volume of the Golden Book is now complete. This volume was manufactured in its entirety in Palestine and is specially devoted to the 25th anniversary of the Jewish National Fund. It contains 2,000 inscriptions.

#### Onnose Isaacs as Australia's Governor Because He Is Native

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Melbourne, Apr. 25-Widespread opposition to the proposed nomination of Sir Isaac Isaacs, recently appointed Chief Justice of Australia, as governorgeneral of the Commonwealth of Australia, has been indicated here. The opposition is not in any way anti-Semitic but is based on the fact that

former appointees, coming from England, have been regarded as an important link with Great Britain and a continuation of the policy of appointment of someone not an Australian is thought would ensure the naming of someone pointee The Australian Labor Party, follow-

ing its declared policy to have an Australian appointed Governor-General, has recommended Sir Isaac, who climaxed a brilliant legal career of 30 years by his recent appointment as Chief Justice. Despite the outcropping of opposition to a local appointee, all the political parties pay tribute to Sir Isaac.

There is a feeling in some quarters that the recommendation that Sir Isaac be appointed was influenced by the Catholic majority in the Federal gov-ernment since the British nominee is always a Protestant.

#### Luke to Testify for British Government at Mandates Body (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 25-H. C. Luke, chief and acting High Commissioner during the riots, will accompany the representative of the British government before the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations which meets in June. Although he will not be the British government's representative — Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary for the Colonies will act in that capacity-he will accompany him with a view to furnishing information to the Mandates Commission and reply to various questions as the person responsible for the government of Palestine during the disturbances.

Parliamentary circles consider it the most natural thing in the world for the Chief Secretary to accompany Dr. Shiels, while in Zionist circles the report has caused astonishment and great disappointment. In order to appear before the Mandates Commission in June, Mr. Luke's six months' leave of absence has been extended for a further period, but nothing definite can be said regarding his movements after the Mandates Commission's sessions

Jerusalem, Apr. 25—H. C. Luke, chief secretary of the Palestine government and acting-High Commissioner during last Summer's disturbances, will represent the British government before the June session of the League of Nations Mandates Commission, according to the Arab paper "Falastin." The paper also says that after that he will return to his post in Palestine.

#### Court of Appeal Upholds Urphali's Death Sentence (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 25 - The Palestine Court of Appeal today confirmed the death sentence of the Jewish merchant from Jaffa, Joseph Mizrachi Urphali, condemned to death for a second time by the lower court, April 3, following a re-trial which had been ordered by the Court of Appeal when it ruled out the evidence presented by the prosecution in the first trial. Urphali is now the only Iew sentenced to death as a result of

Urphali's re-trial followed a decision of the Court of Appeal on January 25, setting aside the verdict of the lower court. It was expected that a re-trial would mean an acquittal. He was found guilty of being implicated in the murder of two Arabs who were killed on August 25 when the Arabs attempted to invade Tel Aviv from a point just outside of Urphali's house in Jaffa. His counsel, Mordecai Eliash, has asked the Court of Appeal to request High Commissioner Chancellor to pardon Urphab.

#### into disastrous provocative incidents. Gruenbaum Denies Negotiating For United Minority Bloc

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Warsaw, Apr. 25-A denial of the report in the local Yiddish daily, "Moment," that deputies representing minorities in the Polish parliament are partial first and the forthcoming election, was issued here today by Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, Jewish leader. He declared that no negotiations of any kind had taken place. Deputy Gruenbaum was re-ported to be representing the Jews in the parleys.

#### Religion Not Persecuted in Russia, Report of British Envoy to Soviet Shows

Religion is not directly persecuted in Soviet Russia, where thousands of churches are still functioning, but priests of religion are quickly shot or but banished for the least act that the government regards as counter-revo-lutionary. The success of the anti-religious movement in Russia is due in a great measure to the fact that communism has become the new religion.

This is the gist of the confidential report of Sir Esmond Ovey, British Am-bassador to Moscow, on alleged reli-gious persecution in Russia which Foreign Secretary Henderson has persisteigh Secretary Henderson has persist-ently refused to publish. In spite of Mr. Henderson's refusal, however, the "Manchester Guardian" has just pub-lished a summary of the report, which yesterday's "New York Times" repro-

"Priests are automatically deprived of all civil rights-that is to say, they are not allowed to possess ration cards nor are they allotted to any housing space," the report says. "They have to shift for themselves or-as usually hanpens-they are fed and housed by their congregations. It has to be said that the majority of priests are well cared for. At the slightest sign of counterrevolutionary activity they are at once shot, imprisoned or banished to Siberia."

#### Jewish Deputy and Polish Justice Minister in Conflict

Warsaw, Apr. 25 - A sharp conflict has developed between the Socialist Deputy in the Polish Parliament, Herman Lieberman, and Minister of Justice Stanislaw Car, which has caused a great sensation, because it has developed into a personal conflict.

Dr. Lieberman had published are article in the "Robotnik," Socialist organ, in which he sharply criticized Car's political activities, saying that the Minister insults the parliament. As a result of this Car sent a letter to Lieberman, the Premier and the Speakers of the Seim and the Senate, in which he declared that Lieberman attacked not only his political activities, but also him personally, for which Lieberman deserves to be slapped in the face.

In reply, Lieberman stated that he does not feel offended by the Minister's remarks and that Car's threats do not frighten him. For publishing this reply, yesterday's issue of the "Robotnik" was confiscated, but the order of confiscation was raised at Car's order.
