## Revive Year-Old Project for Peru Jewish Colonization

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 9—A year old project by a former German marine officer, Captain Perl, to colonize Jews in Eastern Peru has now been revived here by Dr. Kirschberg, a Jewish lawyer, who is cooperating with a group interested in German colonization in Peru.

This information was obtained by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today following an inquiry made here after a report had appeared in yesterday's New York "Forward" which stated that the Peruvian government was prepared to offer 2,000,000 hectares of land in Eastern Peru for exclusive Jewish colonization.

The Russian correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that Captain Perl, the originator of this project, last year approached various Jewish organizations in Berlin as well as Professor Albert Einstein in an attempt to interest them in his plan. He also offered a brochure outlining his proposals. Jewish leaders here, however, then declined to discuss the project with him.

Now Dr. Kirschberg, who is comparatively unknown in Jewish circles here, has taken up Captain Perl's idea and in cooperation with a group interested in German colonization in Peru is endeavoring to obtain the assistance of Jewish leaders. Dr. Kirschberg told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that no society or company had as yet been created for that purpose, but it was first intended to send an expert commission to Peru to investigate the conditions there. Jewish leaders here know nothing about the matter and have done nothing about it.

## Arab Executive Orders Shops Closed and Prayers May 16

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 9—All Arab shops will be closed, special prayers will be said in the Mosques and messages will be sent to High Commissioner Chancellor and the Colonial Office May 11, urging the abolition of the Balfour Declaration and the creation of a national government in Palestine, according to a proclamation issued today by the Arab Executive.

The Arab paper "Meraat Al Shark" is indignant that the Executive did not also order demonstrations and advised the Palestine Arabs to follow the methods of the Indian Moslems.

At a recent All-India Palestine conference of Moslems in Bombay May 16 was declared Palestine Day and all Moslem countries were urged to observe the day.

## Jassy Police Chief Plans Investigation of Activities of Cuza, Anti-Semitic Leader

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 9—An investigation into the activities of Professor Alexander Cuza, leader of the Roumanian anti-Semitic party who has just been elected to Parliament, has been started by the police prefect of Jassy because Professor Cuza told the prefect that he (the prefect) was "also Jewified" when the prefect refused to accept the professor's complaint in which he charged that the Jews of Targuromos had attacked him.

While Cuza and some of his followers were returning from his successful election campaign they passed through Targuromos. A clash with the Jewish population ensued in which a number of injuries were suffered on both sides. The Cuzists have lodged a complaint against the Jews.

While Rador, the Roumanian news agency, learns that the Cuzists are preparing anti-Semitic manifestations, officials in Bucharest are giving assurances that the authorities have taken the fullest measures to ensure the safety of the Jews. The government has instructed the authorities in Old Roumania to keep a careful watch on the movement of the Cuzists and to avoid clashes. In the meantime a commission has gone to Targuromos to determine who is guilty in the clash since there were a number of injuries on both sides. All Jewish shops have closed in the towns where the Cuzists are celebrating their election victory.

## Hoover Endorsement of Allied Jewish Campaign Announced at Luncheon Given in Honor of James Rosenberg; Warburg Host

That President Hoover endorses the Allied Jewish Campaign was a statement made by James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the New York City "drive" for \$2,500,000 during the course of a luncheon given in his honor Thursday at the Hotel Biltmore by nearly one hundred leaders of the city's commercial and industrial life, who have volunteered their services to the campaign. Mr. Rosenberg read an extract from a letter written to him by President Hoover subsequent to his visit to the White House, accompanied by Harry L. Glucksmann, director of the New York Allied Jewish Campaign.

Speaking of the work of the Joint Distribution Committee, of which Mr. Rosenberg is a vice-chairman, President Hoover wrote:

"It is inconceivable that such work should be left unfinished. What has been accomplished in rescuing lives is a historic achievement in human engineering."

## Zukor Leaves Birthplace as Charity Applicants Swamp Him

Budapest, May 9—Besieged by 1,400 applicants from neighboring Hungarian and Czechoslovakian villages who demanded money aid or economic assistance, Adolph Zukor, American movie magnate has been compelled to leave hurriedly his native town of Ricse which he has been revisiting. When he left he had a trunkful of applications for aid. Not even the police who were called out could establish order among the crowd that sought his assistance.

He had previously generously assisted some 400 poor people and gave large sums to religious organizations of all sects. He also established an endowment as dowries for poor Jewish brides and a free school for children in his birthplace.

## Order Colonists to Prepare Smoke for Invading Locusts

Jerusalem, May 9—In the expectation that flying swarms of locusts from neighboring countries will pass through Palestine, all cultivators have been officially warned to be ready to produce rapidly large volumes of smoke, as flying locusts do not settle in smoke covered areas. The Jordan Valley, Jerusalem and Hebron areas are now cleared of the pests and in other areas as well as in Transjordan the work is progressing satisfactorily.

with the work of the Joint Distribution Committee while he was the head of the American Relief Administration.

Felix M. Warburg was the host at yesterday's luncheon to Mr. Rosenberg, who, he said, during the course of his opening remarks, had, in 1921 and 1922, given a whole year of service, voluntarily, and was one of the most active factors in the consummation of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Speaking of the purposes of the campaign, Mr. Warburg told the gathering, that the Jews of America, by their generosity during the past fifteen years, had raised the Jews overseas, out of the abyss of despair into which they had been hurled by the world-war. "Now we must help them to their feet and make it possible for them to walk on their own feet," he said.

Jonah J. Goldstein, who was called upon to speak, pointed out that the present campaign is the first unified effort on the part of American Jewry to help solve the problems of the Jews

### Case Against Directors of Judea Industrial Dismissed; Judge Censures Plaintiffs

The case brought by a group of stockholders against Municipal Court Justice Jacob S. Strahl of Brooklyn and other directors of the Judea Industrial Corporation, in which it was alleged that the funds of the corporation were mismanaged, was dismissed last week by Supreme Court Justice Wasservogel. The court found that the defendants acted in good faith and for the best interests of the corporation. The plaintiffs, on the other hand, were censured by the court, which held that in bringing up the case they were animated by "unclean motives."

Colonel Stoddard, attorney for the defense, in summing up the case, showed that witnesses for the prosecution contradicted each other, that one of these didn't even know whom he was suing and why, and that out of five thousand stockholders only seven have brought suit. Mr. Silverman, attorney for the prosecution, on the other hand tried to show that the Judea Industrial Corporation was established as an idealistic venture to aid in the reconstruction of Palestine, but was converted into a private business undertaking by its present directors.

### Anti-Semitic Undercurrent In Europe's School Systems

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cincinnati, May 9.—The two-fold force of anti-Semitism and racial animosity due to the poor economic conditions is one of the five forces underlying European educational systems, declared Dr. Paul Dengler of Vienna, director of the Austro-American Education Institute, who addressed the Cincinnati school teachers today.

### Felix Warburg Gets Gottheil Medal for Service to Judaism

During the past decade Felix M. Warburg's contributions to philanthropy have totaled nearly ten million dollars. This was the statement made last night by Harold Riegelman in presenting the Gottheil Medal for distinguished service to the cause of Judaism to Mr. Warburg in behalf of the Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity at a key dinner in this University fraternity in the Park Central Hotel, Manhattan.

The Medal was established by the fraternity five years ago. It had previously been awarded to Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York, David Brown of Detroit, Aaron Sapiro of New York, and Julius Rosenwald of Chicago. The jury making the award consists of sixteen editors of Anglo-Jewish newspapers.

#### Tribute to Warburg

Paying tribute to Mr. Warburg's activities on behalf of world Jewry, Mr. Riegelman said among other things:

"The records of these activities are voluminous. If the future student of this renaissance decade gains access to those records he will find a certain fine, vigorous name constantly recurring high in the several rosters of leadership of the many agencies entrusted with important and major portions of the vast program of relief and upbuilding. As he pores over the archives of the Joint Distribution Committee, the American Jewish Joint Agricultural Corporation, the United Jewish Campaign, the American Society for Jewish Farm Settlements in Russia, the Palestine Economic Corporation, the Jewish Agency, the Allied Jewish Campaign, the Hebrew University and other vehicles for the expression of the profound determination of the Jewish people to survive and to insure the honorable and dignified survival of their fellow Jews in every country, he will discover in each of these undertakings as a kind of common denomination of them all the wise, the statesmanlike, the human and the controlling counsels of a great and good Jew.

#### Inspired Founding of Federation

"The most noteworthy cooperative effort for relief of poverty and disease ever undertaken within any city at any time is the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of the City of New York. The federating of over ninety separate and competing philanthropic institutions followed by substantial and growing public financial support was largely inspired and made possible by this same man. He was the Federation's first president and ever since he has been its chief advisor and chairman of its board of trustees.

"The golden thread of his counsel and activities gleams through the work of the American Jewish Committee, the Jewish Theological Seminary, the Jewish Welfare Board, the Training School of Jewish Social Work and the Bureau of Jewish Social Research.

### Brandeis Contributes \$15,000 to Histadruth in Palestine

The National Labor Committee for Palestine announces the contribution of \$15,000 from Justice Louis D. Brandeis to the fund which is being collected in the United States for the Histadruth, the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine.

Justice Brandeis made his contribution on the condition that the American Labor Committee for the Jewish Workers in Palestine collect the amount of \$500,000 and that his contribution shall be used in productive work designed to furnish additional employment to the Jewish workers in Palestine. The choice of the specific enterprise was made by consultation between E. M. Mohl, representative of the Palestine Economic Corporation, and representatives of the Histadruth, who will together supervise the expenditure of the contribution with a view of ensuring its economical and efficient use. All these conditions have been complied with. Up to May 1, 1930, the National Labor Committee of the United States has raised \$675,000. After a very careful survey of the field it was agreed by both Mr. Mohl and the representatives of the Histadruth that the contribution of Justice Brandeis should be used for Yakhin, the agricultural contracting cooperative association of the Histadruth in Palestine.

### \$200,000 Kirstein Memorial Library Opens in Boston

Boston, May 9.—Louis E. Kirstein, vice-president of the William Filene's Sons Company, and president of the Associated Jewish Philanthropies of Boston, has contributed \$200,000 in the memory of his father, for the erection of the Edward Kirstein Memorial Library.

The new library, which was opened Thursday, is essentially for downtown business men, and was well patronized on the opening day. Because of the absence of Mr. Kirstein from the city, no dedicatory exercises took place, but it is believed that the library will be formally dedicated some time in the Fall.

Jaffa, May 9.—Itzaack Wolhandler has been exiled to Raanana for one year by the district commissioner for belonging to an illegal organization. While there he must remain under the supervision of the police. This is the first case of a Jew being exiled.

## Seven Jews Acquitted of Murder; Communists Jailed

Tel Aviv, May 9—Lea Fich and Hava Halpern have been sentenced to six months in prison and deportation for having participated in a Communist demonstration on May Day. Joseph Hershenbaum, Mordecai Berditchevsky and Pua Alami have been sentenced to 35 days in jail or a fine of \$35 each for creating a disturbance when they were arrested on April 30.

Haifa, May 9—Seven Jews charged with attempted murder on four Arabs during the riots were acquitted for lack of evidence. Three of them, however, Bergman, Getler and Bengero were given their choice of a year in jail or a fine of \$240 each for keeping a revolver. A fourth, Friedman, was sentenced to three months in prison or a fine of \$50 for having a dagger in his possession.

## All-America Conference

### Names Survey Committee

A Survey Committee of ten to prepare a detailed and definite plan for the activities of the All-America Organization, which aims to foster cultural cooperation between the minority groups in this country together with Americans, was appointed at its first conference which took place on May 8 at the Civic Club. The committee is to report its findings at the next conference which will be called in the near future.

## Palestine Agricultural

### Survey Nears Completion

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 9—While the commission recently appointed by High Commissioner Chanceller to investigate the status of Palestinian agriculturists is nearing the completion of its task, the Hebrew press complains that the commissioners have visited many Arab villages in their tour of investigation but none of the Jewish villages.

## Lack of Funds Closes

### Harlem Talmudical Institute

The Talmudical Institute of Harlem, after twenty years of service to Harlem Jewry, has been forced to close its doors to some 200 pupils because of lack of funds. Max Kaufman, secretary of the school, claims that only twenty of the pupils have been paying their tuition fee of \$3.00 per month, the rest, who come from families of moderate circumstances, have been unable to pay.

"I appeal to the public to help us," Mr. Kaufman said. "In the past our directors have made up whatever losses we sustained but this year business conditions will not permit." The sixteen teachers of the school have not been paid for five months, and in order to resume classes, \$10,000 will be needed.

## Loss of Membership Laid to Communist Secession

As a result of a secession movement on the part of the Communist faction, the Arbeiter Ring, or Workmen's Circle, Jewish radical fraternal organization, lost 2,516 members last year. This was the statement made at the semi-annual meeting of the National Board of Directors of the Workmen's Circle held last week in New York, by M. Haskell, chairman of the Organization Committee, who declared that although the Arbeiter Ring has suffered a loss in membership the resignation of the Communist element has relieved the order of an undesirable element.

The loss in membership by the Arbeiter Ring during the past year was also attributed to the general unemployment crisis in the country, which has made it difficult for many members to pay their bills. At the meeting reports were also rendered of the Workmen's Circle Sanitarium for Consumptives in Liberty, N. Y., and of the progress of the Women's and Youth branches of the Order.

## Council Women to Aid

### Naturalization Applicants

The organization of a loan fund to assist applicants for naturalization who are unable to pay the present high fees, was one of the recommendations made by speakers at the Regional Conference on Naturalization and Adult Education for Foreign Born, held at Council House, New York City, in response to the invitation of Mrs. Maurice L. Goldman, Chairman of the Department of Service for Foreign Born, of the National Council of Jewish Women. One hundred and fifteen delegates representing the states of Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Maryland and Pennsylvania, met to discuss the problems arising out of the enforcement of the new naturalization law.

## Kramer Will Give Mt.

### Sinai Hospital \$100,000

The will of Louis N. Kramer, retired banker and miner, filed in Surrogate's Court on Thursday, bequeaths \$100,000 to the Mt. Sinai Hospital for the endowment of "a ward containing at least twelve beds to be maintained in perpetuity and to be known as the Louis N. Kramer Memorial." One Catholic and two Jewish charitable organizations in Scranton, Pa., where Mr. Kramer was born, receive legacies of \$5,000 each. Mr. Kramer, whose estate is estimated at \$1,000,000, was killed when he plunged from the his apartment on the twelfth floor, May 1.

## Founder of Bnei Brak Here

Isaac Gerstenkorn, founder and mayor of Bnei Brak, Palestine, arrived in New York May 9th on the Berengaria. His stay in the States is expected to be of short duration and solely for the interests of sharing in the upbuilding of Eretz Israel along commercial lines.

## 40 Jewish Women's Groups Pledge Aid to Campaign

Forty Jewish women's organizations were represented either by their presidents or other officers at a meeting at the Hotel Biltmore Thursday afternoon which was addressed by Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Women's Division of the New York Allied Jewish Campaign.

Mrs. David E. Goldfarb, president of the Federation of Jewish Women's organizations of Greater New York, who presided, announced that the Federation which consists of one hundred and sixty organizations, with a membership of ninety thousand had endorsed the campaign and pledged its cooperation to the Women's Division.

Among the speakers were Mrs. Moses Hyamson and Mrs. Anna Moskowitz Kross, the latter representing Hadassah. All of the women present pledged themselves and their organizations to render service in the campaign. Reports of contributions obtained by them and their organizations will be rendered at a meeting of the Federation of Jewish Women's organizations on the 21st of this month.

Jonah J. Goldstein, who was sent to Palestine by the Palestine Emergency Fund committee shortly after the August uprising to organize the relief of the Jewish victims, made an appeal for cooperation with the campaign over Station WPCB last night.

## Avukah to Hold National

### Summer School Camp

A National Summer School Camp of the Avukah, American student Zionist organization, will be held this year at Camp Scopus on Lake George, from June 26 to July 6. The idea of a Summer School Camp arises out of the need felt by Avukah members for the crystallization of the concepts underlying the Zionist movement and for a deepening of the understanding of the values inherent in Zionist ideology, as well as the growing significance of the role of Palestine in Jewish life and in the world at large.

Among those who will deliver lectures at the camp will be Jacob de Haas, Dr. Shalom Spiegel, Louis Lipsky, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, James Waterman Wise, Samuel Blumenfeld, Maurice B. Pekarsky and Mitchell Salem Fisher. There will be two cycles of lectures, "Zionism and Palestine" and "Avukah and Jewish Youth."

## 22nd Annual Convention of

### Polish Jews in America Opens

The Federation of Polish Jews in America opened its 22nd Annual Convention last night at the Pythian Temple.

Representatives of the out-of-town societies affiliated with the Federation, have come from Pittsburgh, Boston, Lynn, Providence, and Montreal, Can. For the first time in the history of the Federation of Polish Jews in America, delegates from Canada were present at the conference.

## Governor of Michigan Endorses Allied Drive

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, May 9.—Governor Fred W. Green of the State of Michigan, in a statement issued on Thursday, heartily endorsed the Allied Jewish Campaign to be launched in Detroit at a dinner Sunday evening. His statement reveals a deep understanding of the problems in the campaign. The statement by Gov. Green said:

"To no people in the world has the post-war period brought more serious problems of readjustment than to the Jews. In Palestine and throughout Eastern and part of Central Europe great Jewish populations have been subjected to conditions that are inconceivable to us in America.

"That the Jews of America and of Michigan especially should contribute toward the reestablishment of the peaceful lives of their oppressed kinsmen, as well as for the furtherance of Jewish culture in this country, is in line with the high traditions of the Jewish people. The Allied Jewish Campaign represents both an opportunity and an obligation. It is an opportunity to aid the oppressed, such a call as Americans of all races gladly embrace."

## Leonard Freiberg President of District 2 B'nai B'rith

Louisville, May 9.—Leonard H. Freiberg, Cincinnati attorney, was elected president of District Grand Lodge No. 2, Independent Order of B'nai B'rith at the final session of the 78th convention at the Kentucky Hotel, succeeding Samuel I. Sievers of St. Louis, Mo. He had been first vice-president and secretary of the district.

Other major officers unanimously elected with Freiberg were: Simon J. Heller, Denver, first vice-president; Samuel Goldstein, Lorain, second vice-president; William Ornstein, Cincinnati, reelected treasurer; and Chauncey D. Pichel, former Cincinnati municipal judge, secretary. Sidney Kusworn presided over the installation ceremonies.

Edward J. Schanfarber, Columbus, O., attorney, was named as district lodge representative for Hillel Foundation in appreciation of his work at Ohio State University. Retiring President Sievers was presented with a silver Menorah.

Resolutions were read by Rabbi Jacob J. Gittleman, chairman of the committee on national and international questions, which endorsed the Kellogg Peace Pact, formation of the Jewish Agency in Switzerland last summer and launching of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

overseas, whether in Poland or Russia or Palestine, or in whatever lands the Jews are in travail.

Dudley Sicher, president of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, delivered a brief address heartily endorsing the campaign.

Mr. Rosenberg, in the course of his talk, stressed the Free Loan Societies fostered by the Joint Distribution Committee, through which, he said 100,000 loans averaging about \$10 each have been made to the Jews of Poland. With such small sums, he said, they are able to make out a livelihood for themselves and their families.

"We need more money to make more such loans to give the Jews of Europe a chance to rebuild their lives," he concluded.
