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## Jewish Women Protest Ban on Female Lawyers

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 12—A protest against the recent ordinance forbidding women advocates to appear in the religious courts and in certain specific criminal cases has been submitted to the Palestine government by the Palestine Jewish Women's Equal Rights Association. The Association stresses the fact that all matters of personal status in Palestine are under the jurisdiction of the religious courts and that in such cases women always need advice.

Jewish women in such cases are usually accompanied to the rabbinical courts by members of the Association and the latter asks why the ordinance now forbids that. The Association also shows that in these specific cases troubles may be confided to a woman physician but not to a woman advocate. The Association says that such distinctions are "an attack on the dignity of the legal profession."

## Echoes of Anti-Semitic Clashes Heard in Roumanian Parliament

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 12—Echoes of the latest anti-Semitic disturbances in various parts of Roumania were heard in Parliament when M. Rosenberg introduced an interpellation on behalf of the national minorities group and M. Rediciannu did the same for the Social Democrats. In the Senate, Chief Rabbi Niemirover protested against the insult last week to the Jewish religion by the anti-Semitic leader, Professor Alexander Cuza.

The Union of Roumanian Jews has submitted a memorandum to Premier Maniu demanding satisfaction for the insult to Judaism and also demanding the release of the Targuifromos Jews who were arrested after a clash in which they resisted the attacks of the Cuzists last week. These demands will also be submitted to the Regency by the Jews at an interview this week.

A three-day congress of Roumanian students is now in session at Czernowitz. Thus far the authorities have succeeded in maintaining order by adopting the most energetic measures to prevent excesses.

## Ask Schechita Ban as Price of Support for Government

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Weimar, May 12—The adoption of a schechita ban and the appointment of National Socialists as police directors have been the conditions of further participation in the government by the National Socialists. If these demands are not met they threaten to create a government crisis.

## Military Units Patrol Jassy as New Troubles Start; Refugees Fleeing Bessarabian Villages

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 12—Military units are patrolling the streets of Jassy following attacks on Jews by Cuzists in connection with the Tenth of May celebrations. Police arrested one student who was released soon after. In the meantime a delegation of Jews, headed by Professor Botex, has lodged a protest with the attorney general against the treatment of the Targuifromos Jews arrested following a clash last week with Cuzists.

Anti-Semitic troubles are also reported from Balta in Bessarabia which are said to have started when Cuzists tried to take away a blue flag from students of a Jewish secondary school who were participating in a parade.

Czernowitz, May 12—Hundreds of Jewish refugees fleeing from the anti-Semitic disturbances raging in a number of villages, particularly in the Dishov, Borsha and Marmorash districts, have arrived at Dorne. The refugees have approached Senator Meyer Ebner asking for protection. Senator Ebner telegraphed the minister of the interior asking that measures be adopted against the hooligans. In the meantime the troubles are continuing.

## Zionist Revisionists of Great Britain Demand Royal Commission for Palestine; Urge Magnes and Brith Shalom Be Curbed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 12—A resolution demanding the appointment of a Royal commission on major policy in Palestine was adopted, among others, at the first annual conference of the Zionist Revisionists of Great Britain. The conference expressed its alarm at the tendency manifested in the activities of the Palestine and British governments "to carry into effect some of the Shaw Commission's recommendations as evidenced by the creation of an agricultural committee composed of Palestine government officials and the appointment of Sir John Simpson to report on immigration and land settlement."

Another resolution reiterated the Balfour-Smuts-Lloyd George demand for a Royal commission, and protested against local individual inquiries being allowed to override the necessity for such a commission. Resolutions expressing indignation at the introduction since the publication of the report of additional restrictions on middle class immigration, endorsing the demand for an early Zionist congress, the creation of a special political committee and the urging of the Revisionist World Ex-

## Says Harlem Jews Are Ex-Slaves of Dutch Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 12—The so-called black Jews of Harlem in New York are not of the Jewish race but are descended from Negro slaves from the West Indies who accompanied the Dutch Jews to America and adopted in the usual manner the religion of their masters. This is the conclusion of the well-known anthropologist, M. Zollschen. His theory is confirmed by Arthur Rundy in the Vienna "Freie Presse", who argues that when the Negroes were freed they remained partial Jews.

There are a number of colored people in Harlem, who claim to be Jews. They maintain two synagogues which have certain of the Jewish religious customs. Some of the members of these congregations speak Yiddish.

## Complete Spectacular Drive on Locusts in Palestine

Jerusalem, May 12—The greatest and most spectacular attempt to put an end once and for all to the locust plague has now been completed with the laying down of twenty miles of zinc-sulfate with a series of pits between Beersheba to Khan Yunis. Tons of poisoned bait have been strewn over the sheeting with the object of trapping the vast hordes of hoppers which are advancing from the Sinai Peninsula.

executive to organize "a political offensive which will make clear to the whole world the real objectives of Zionism and affirming the readiness of the Revisionists of Great Britain to place themselves at the disposal of the Revisionist Executive for a political offensive" were adopted.

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## Motion Pictures Show How "Palestine Jewry Carries on"

How the Jews of Palestine carry on the work of building the Jewish National Home is graphically told in a series of motion pictures now being exhibited in New York and booked for exhibition in various cities throughout the country.

The motion pictures were taken in Jerusalem and in other parts of Palestine following the Arab riots of last August. The entire history of the Jewish Movement to and in Palestine, the construction work which is revitalizing the Holy Land, the creation of farm settlements in long neglected valleys, the growth of modern cities, the work of irrigation and plantation, of sanitation and education in Judea, Samaria, and Galilee is graphically shown in the pictures, which comprise three reels and have a length of 4000 feet.

The famous and historic sites of Palestine, sacred to Judaism, Christianity and Islam figure prominently in the fascinating films, which tell a continuous and engaging story of international significance.

The films were made partly by Palestinian and partly by American photographers, under the general direction of the Jewish National Fund Headquarters of Jerusalem. The films will be shown in the following cities on the following dates: Detroit, Mich. on May 14; Jersey City, N. J. on May 15; Buffalo, N. Y. on May 18; Boro Park, N. Y. on May 18; Cincinnati, Ohio on May 28, and Spokane, Wash. on June 3.

## Mosul Pipeline Not to Terminate at Haifa

Jerusalem, May 12—The Mosul pipeline will terminate at Tripoli in Syria instead of at Haifa, as had been planned according to Charles Debbas, president of the Lebanese Republic, who is quoted to that effect in the Beirut press. A large air station will be built at Tripoli shortly.

## Convention of Polish Jews Here Protests Against Injustice to Jews in Poland and Delay in Calling Joint Conference

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

The 22nd annual convention of the Federation of Polish Jews, which opened Saturday night, May 10, at the Pythian Temple in the presence of 1,500 delegates and guests from many cities in the United States and Canada, closed Sunday night, May 11, with a dinner for the delegates, after adopting a series of resolutions for the welfare of the Jews in Poland.

Benjamin Winter, the president of the Federation, expressed in his message the determination to pursue the policy to free Polish Jewry from the unbearable economic and political burdens. "There is no doubt whatever that the Polish Republic takes due note of us and our doings," he said. "It takes note of us because tens of thousands of us are united for the one objective, to see that the rights of the Jews in Poland shall not be disregarded."

Z. Tygel, the executive director, pointed out in his report the growth of the Federation all over the country and that all are willing to do practical work for the three million suffering Jews in Poland.

The conference was then greeted by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America; Alexander Kaha, in the name of the Joint Distribution Committee; Abraham Herman, in the name of the Hias; James Rosenberg for the Allied Jewish Campaign; B. Richards for the American Jewish Congress, and several others.

The convention greeted with great enthusiasm the announcement made by Philip Wattenberg, president of the Federation of Galician Jews, that his federation is ready to join the Federation of Polish Jews in order to work together for the welfare of the Jews in Poland. A committee of both federations was appointed to work out the plan for the amalgamation.

After reciting the many acts of injustice and discrimination practiced against the Jews of Poland at the present time, the convention unanimously adopted the following resolution:

"We do hereby express our strongest protest against the acts of injustice committed against our fellow-Jews in Poland, and our earnest belief that all the sundry discriminations enumerated above should long since have been abolished in Poland, a country that has suffered for a period of 150 years under the galling yoke of Russian Czarism; that despite our deep satisfaction with the spirit of friendship displayed to us by the representatives of the Polish government in America, for which we are duly grateful, we can not possibly overlook the fact that the semi-official promises made to us with regard to the calling of a conference between the representatives of the Polish government and the Jews, together with the representatives of American Jewry, has been unduly delayed, and that it is our earnest hope that such a conference will be called as speedily as possible, so that the vex-

ing Jewish problem in Poland shall be definitely solved, for the welfare not only of the Jews of Poland but for the welfare of Poland as a whole."

The convention then decided to transmit the resolution to the Polish Ambassador in Washington and to have the Canadian branches of the Federation submit it to the representatives of Poland in their country for them to cable it to the Polish Government.

Sunday morning's sessions were taken up mostly with plans and discussions concerning future activities. Mr. Tygel reported that he submitted a memorandum about the situation of the Jews in Poland to the newly-appointed Ambassador from the United States to Poland, John Willys, before he left to assume his post there.

The main feature of the closing sessions was an address by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, which made a tremendous impression upon the gathering. Rabbi Wise spoke about the situation of Jews the world-over and particularly in Poland. He pointed out that time of humiliating mediation is long past and that Jews everywhere are to point out to governments the wrongs committed against them and demand to be treated on basis of equality. "Not MacDonald, neither Luke, nor any other head of a country, will solve our problems or determine our fate, but the determination of the Jews themselves, Rabbi Wise said. He then announced that he intends to visit Poland this summer for the first time in order to acquaint himself with the Jews in that country.

Among the other resolutions are: (1) To come into contact with federations of Polish Jews in other countries, especially in Argentine and England, in order to create united front for the protection of the Jews in Poland; (2) To support the Hias and the Ort; (3) To protest against attempts at alien registration; (4) To support the Allied Jewish Campaign; (5) To greet the Zionist leader Nahum Sokolow on the occasion of his 70th birthday now celebrated by World Jewry.

Benjamin Winter was reelected as president and Z. Tygel as executive-director. Jacob Leichman was elected as treasurer. The vice-presidents are: Philip Wattenberg, Solomon Rosenfeld, Abraham Harris, Alfred Rosenstein, Herman Oberman and J. Stofsky. Honorary vice-presidents are: Charles Green and J. Glatstein. Provincial vice-presidents are: H. Tuch, Pittsburgh; Dr. Putnam, Boston; and A. Wolofsky, Montreal. The new executive will consist of two members from each society of the federation.

## Five Arab Policemen Dismissed

Jerusalem, May 12—Five Arabs have been dismissed from the Palestine force. It is believed their dismissal is due to misconduct during last Summer's riots.

## Jewish Physicians Here to Raise \$100,000 for Hebrew University Medical College

The sum of \$100,000 will be raised during the coming year for an administration building of the proposed medical college of the Hebrew University in Palestine, according to an announcement by Dr. Nathan Ratnof, president of the American Jewish Physicians' Committee, at their annual meeting last night in the Academy of Medicine. Dr. Ratnof, who organized the Committee in 1921, and was elected its president last night for the tenth consecutive time, said that the Committee had purchased land in 1922 on Mt. Scopus, the site of the University, on which the proposed medical school would be erected.

Dr. Emanuel Libman, heart specialist of New York, and chairman of the Executive Committee of the Physicians' Committee, said that the fund would be raised in honor of Dr. Ratnof whose devotion to the work has been largely responsible for the achievements of the Committee.

Dr. S. S. Goldwater, expert in hospital planning and administration, and former director of Mt. Sinai Hospital, addressed the meeting on the place of the Hebrew University Hospital in Palestine. The Hospital, which is a joint project of the Physicians' Committee and the Hadassah Organization, is the major concern of over 1,000 physicians who are members of the committee, according to Dr. Goldwater.

The Physicians' Committee annually contributes \$25,000 toward the scientific departments of the Hebrew University, of which \$15,000 is given to the Microbiological work, and \$10,000 to the Chemistry Department. The Committee also sets aside a special appropriation for the Medical Library of the University, which is the only one of its kind in the Near East.

Dr. Julius Jarcho, member of the Committee, established an endowment fund for the Medical Library, for the purchase of new books, and personally subscribes for the majority of the 330 medical periodicals now in the University Library and the Medical Branch in Tel Aviv.

## Judge Kalisch's Will Leaves \$116,000 to Charities and Kin

Newark, May 12—Bequests totaling more than \$116,000 to local charitable institutions and relatives, are made in the will of the late Supreme Court Justice Samuel Kalisch, who died in a New York hospital, April 29. The document was filed with Surrogate Whinery yesterday. It was drafted Nov. 5, 1929.

The following charities were benefited: Beth Israel Hospital \$1,000; St. Barnabas Hospital \$500; St. Michael's Hospital \$500; St. James Hospital \$500; Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum \$1,000; Newark Orphan Asylum, \$250; Home for the Friendless \$250; Home for Crippled Children \$250.

## Anti-Semitism Shifts Home for Aged from Florida to Newark

Newark, May 12—Alleged racial prejudice of residents of Delray Beach, Florida, and damage wrought there by the hurricane of 1926 are directly responsible for shifting a proposed \$300,000 home for aged Jews from that municipality to Essex County in this state. Vice-Chancellor Backes several days ago signed an order directing the executors of the estate of the late Charles Bierman, wealthy Newark operator, to abandon the Delray project which was specified in his will.

The home was planned originally for Maplewood or its vicinity by Mr. Bierman, according to testimony of his widow, but he decided early in the winter of 1926 to erect it in Delray Beach. This decision was made, she testified, while they were on a vacation trip and Mr. Bierman bought land for the home. He died June 10, 1926.

## Sees Judaism Extinct If Intermarriage Bars Raised

Declaring Judaism would be extinct in four generations if the bars against intermarriage were removed, Dr. Maurice H. Harris, rabbi of Temple Israel, in his sermon Sunday, vigorously attacked marriage between Jew and Gentile unless the Gentile adopts the Jewish faith.

"People normally marry in the circles in which they move—the aristocracy, like the poor, within their classes," he said. "For the same reason people marry within their specific religious cults."

"Jews have long lived aloof from the world by compulsion rather than choice. There was little temptation or opportunity to intermarry in the outside world. But after the era of emancipation came, with admission to citizen status in the Western World, Jews and Gentiles have freely intermingled. Some intermarriages have occurred in consequence. They seem to be growing. Why should they not grow? That depends on what the Jews stand for. Jewish law from Bible times downward has opposed marriage with the Gentile. This is not for any reason of race exclusiveness or national pride. There would be no justification of the law on such grounds. The objection is religious, wholly. We Jews must not intermarry with those of other creeds."

## Wailing Wall Commissioners Said to Be All Nordics

Geneva, May 12—The names of the commissioners who will make up the Wailing Wall Commission that will look into the Moslem and Jewish claims to the Wall will be submitted to the Council of the League of Nations at its next meeting by the British delegation, it was learned today. It is also learned that three commissioners are from Nordic countries. Nevertheless the matter of the Wailing Wall Commission does not yet appear on the Council's agenda.

## Detroit Raises \$180,000 for Allied Jewish Campaign as \$305,000 Drive Opens

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Detroit, May 12—The first important Allied Jewish Campaign to open in an American city was virtually assured of success when it was announced that \$180,000 was raised towards the Detroit quota of \$305,000 at the opening dinner of the campaign Sunday night at the Hotel Statler.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland, who made the principal address, moved his audience to action with an appeal for European relief and Palestine upbuilding. In a stirring plea for the local Hebrew schools, which are included in the Detroit drive, Rabbi Silver declared that if it were up to him he would put a stop to every social effort until the problem of education is solved. Dr. John Slawson, campaign director, pleaded for the establishment of a community center, which is one of the items in the drive. Henry Wine-man, campaign chairman, was toastmaster and other speakers were Adolph Finsterwald and Clarence H. Engass.

Among the contributions announced were \$15,000 by Henry Wine-man, or five percent of the quota; \$7,500 each by Meyer Prentiss and Andrew Wine-man; \$5,000 by David Simons; \$3,000 each by Fred Butzel, Samuel Summerfield, Alfred Hecht and J. W. Allen; and \$11,000 in anonymous gifts. Tracy MacGregor, president of the Community Fund, headed the list of non-Jewish contributors with \$1,000.

More than a thousand volunteer workers have enrolled to canvass the Detroit community and Henry Wine-man, chairman of the campaign, and his associate leaders, hope to reach the goal in ten days. In Detroit's drive, besides the items for the Jewish Agency and the Joint Distribution Committee, are included the following causes: \$100,000 for the purchase of a site and planning for a Jewish community center; \$50,000 for the United Hebrew Schools; \$15,000 for the Hebrew Free Loan Association, and 25 other local, national and international causes.

## Difficulties Arise Over Burial of Posner, Socialist Leader

Warsaw, May 12—Considerable difficulties have arisen over the question as to where Stanislaw Posner, Polish Socialist leader and vice-president of the Senate who died last week, should be buried. Although he was thought to be a Jew he was to be buried in the Evangelistic cemetery because it was said he was converted.

Members of his family deny that he forsook Judaism and therefore are demanding that he be buried in a Jewish cemetery. Socialist leaders maintain that he was not religious and hence since it is not permitted to bury a non-believer in a Jewish cemetery, therefore insist that he be buried in the Evangelistic cemetery. In the meantime a delegation of rabbis have asked the authorities not to permit his burial in a Christian cemetery.

## Sir Ernest Dowson to Aid Sir John Simpson

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 12—Sir Ernest Dowson will be the assistant of Sir John Simpson in the latter's mission here to investigate land settlement and immigration, says the Arab paper, "Falastin," in announcing that Sir Ernest has arrived and brought with him the Colonial Office's order of his appointment.

Sir Ernest was in Palestine a number of years ago and prepared plans for a land survey according to which land settlement is now being carried out under Abramson. The "Falastin" expresses itself as pleased that Sir Ernest is to be Sir John's assistant and is also pleased that the government's agricultural commission will get into touch with Sir John Simpson and his aide.

Jerusalem, May 12—The report in the Arab paper, "Falastin," that Sir Ernest Dowson will be the assistant to Sir John Simpson on his mission here to investigate land settlement and immigration was today authoritatively denied. The "Falastin" reported that Sir Ernest had arrived here with the Colonial Office's order of his appointment.

Sir Ernest has just arrived from Iraq en route to England. He had been an official in Iraq and on his arrival here submitted a memorandum to the Palestine government on the land question.

## Rabbis Join in Plea for Peace in India

A message urging him to "avoid the tragedy of a conflict" in India and to seek a friendly settlement with Gandhi and other leaders, was sent Prime Minister McDonald by 102 American clergymen.

Among those signing the petition were Rabbi Samuel J. Abrams, Brookline, Mass.; Rabbi William Fineshriber, Philadelphia; Rabbi Mitchell Salem Fisher, New York; Rabbi Israel Goldstein, New York; Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, New York; Dr. Jacob Kohn, New York; Rabbi Alexander Lyons, Brooklyn; Rabbi Abram Simon, Washington; Dr. Stephen S. Wise, New York, and Rabbi Louis Wolsey, Philadelphia.

The message was circulated, it is believed, by Dr. John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Community Church. It asks the prime minister "to avoid the tragedy of a conflict which would mean catastrophe for Britain, India and mankind."

## 246 Jews Entered Canada Last Month

Montreal, May 12—During the month of April 246 Jews, out of a total of 16,548 immigrants, arrived in Canada. The Canadian Jewish Immigrant Aid Society met 45 boats which arrived at the ports of Halifax, St. John and Quebec during the month of April. Of the Jewish arrivals, 94 were destined for Quebec province, 106 for Ontario and 30 for Manitoba.

eral support of the Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund, the popularization of the special Revisionist fund of Tel Hai and the extension of markets for Palestine products.

Schwartzman, the presiding officer, vigorously attacked the Zionist Executive and Dr. Weizmann, saying that "history will never acquit the present leadership of blame for their blunders." He demanded that the Zionists should clearly state that they "do not desire a new ghetto in an Eastern country and that they do not desire a new Yemen."

Welcoming the conference on behalf of the Zionist Executive, Professor Selig Brodetsky said that the outstanding difficulty with ordinary public opinion "was to make it realize that the troubles in Palestine were not a racial squabble that occasionally happened in some colony between two uncivilized peoples." He pointed out that the problem now was not whether the British government stands by the Balfour Declaration "but whether the government will now carry this Declaration into effect and the next few months will be decisive months for the future of our work under the Palestine Mandate."

Referring to Sir John Simpson's mission, Professor Brodetsky said that the Zionist Executive welcomes every "impartial and honest investigation of the facts in Palestine, feeling convinced that they must lead to a Zionist victory." He appealed to the Revisionists to abstain from separatist political actions, pointing out the necessity for an external united front.

## See Precedence Order As Slight to Jews

Jerusalem, May 12—A symbolic slap in the face, is how the Hebrew daily, "Davar," describes the ordinance just made public that regulates the order of precedence in public ceremonies. The ordinance was published in the Official Gazette and regulates precedence in the following order:

The High Commissioner, commanders of British forces, chief justice, district commissioners, Grand Mufti, Orthodox, Latin and Armenian patriarchs, Anglican bishop, Chief Rabbis, president of the Moslem Court of Appeal, members of the advisory council, solicitor general, presidents and members of the various courts, police chiefs, commander of the Transjordan frontier force, mayors, members of the Moslem Supreme Council, chairman of the Zionist Executive, chairman of the Vaad Leumi, magistrates, muftis, bishops and town councillors.

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## Freiman Honored as Canada's U. P. A. Campaign Opens

Montreal, May 12—A dinner in honor of A. J. Freiman, president of the Zionist Organization of Canada for the past ten years, was given last night by the Zionist Order of Hahonim on the occasion of the opening of the United Palestine Campaign of which he is chairman. Mr. Freiman ranks among the outstanding Jewish citizens not only of Ottawa, but of the Dominion as well. He is a member of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization and has been president of the Adath Yeshurun Congregation, the oldest synagogue in Ottawa, for the last 25 years.

Lyon Cohen, well-known Montreal Jewish communal worker, was on the occasion of his 62nd birthday today initiated as an honorary member of the Zionist Order of Hahonim. Mr. Cohen is one of the outstanding leaders of Jewish welfare work in Canada. He was chairman of the Canadian Jewish Congress, president of the Baron de Hirsch Institute, and now holds the presidency of the Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue, the wealthiest congregation in the Dominion.

## Seminar of Religion Opens Tomorrow at St. Louis

St. Louis, May 12—A seminar to discuss the relations between the three leading religious faiths in this country will be held here on May 14 and 15, when Protestants, Catholics and Jews will discuss methods of reaching a better understanding. This is the third seminar of its kind to be held in the United States, the two previous ones having been held last year at Columbia and Harvard Universities. Rabbi Stephen S. Wise will be one of the speakers at the conference, which is expected to draw the largest representation of the three faiths ever assembled.

Among the questions which the seminar will discuss are: "Are Jews, Catholics and Protestants to preserve their cultural differences (in philosophy, religion, the arts and folkways), or are they to be assimilated in the American melting pot conception?"

## Agency Preparing Memos for Colonial Office and League

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 12—Two memoranda, one comprising the fundamental questions of the Palestine upbuilding work for submission to the Colonial Office and another containing a detailed reply to the Palestine Inquiry Commission's report to be given to members of Parliament and to the members of the League of Nations Mandates Commission are being prepared by the Jewish Agency.

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
