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## Reich Protests Anti-Semitic Prayers in Thuringian Schools (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 14—A protest on behalf of the Reich government against the anti-Semitic prayers recently introduced into the schools of Thuringia as infringing the German constitution and violating the religious freedom of German citizens has been forwarded to the Thuringian ministry of state by Dr. Albrecht Wirth, German minister of interior.

Dr. Wirth wrote to the Thuringian ministry of state in connection with the recent demand of the National Socialists in Thuringia that unless members of their party were appointed police directors they would create a government crisis. It was also the National Socialist minister of education, Dr. Frick, who introduced the anti-Semitic prayers.

## Major Constitutional Changes Incompatible with Obligations of Mandate, Arabs Told (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 14—Sweeping constitutional changes in Palestine were wholly unacceptable, it was pointed out to the Arab delegation since such changes would render it impossible for His Majesty's Government to carry out its obligations under the Mandate, declared a statement issued by the Colonial Office.

It was made clear that no proposals could be considered which are incompatible with the requirements of the Mandate. The Colonial Office's communique points out that the conversations with the Arab delegation are now at an end and that the delegation expressed its views on a number of subjects, particularly land and immigration and the grant of a constitution, the government taking note of these views.

There was no question of the discussions having broken down because

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## Zionist Executive Names Commission to Aid Simpson (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 14—Preparing for the arrival of Sir John Simpson, who is coming here to investigate immigration and land settlement problems for the British government, the Zionist Executive has appointed a commission dealing with lands, agriculture and urban colonization, headed by Dr. Arthur Ruppin, which, together with a commission elected by the Vaad Leumi for similar and other purposes, will cooperate with Sir John.

Dr. Ruppin is a well-known agricultural expert in Palestine. During the riots he was a member of the acting Zionist Executive in Palestine.

## Wave of Anti-Semitism Reported Spreading in Roumania; Press Critical (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 14—A wave of anti-Semitic excesses is spreading from Bucharest and is reaching even the poorest Jews in the district of Marmorosch, particularly in the village of Vorsch where students, after a patriotic congress, broke windows in all Jewish houses, devastated Jewish shops and beat Jewish passersby.

The news of this disturbance only reached Klausenberg when a neighboring Jewish community informed the authorities who sent police to arrest a priest as the ringleader. This led to a demonstration with 300 villagers barricading themselves in a church and refusing to surrender the priest. The government has issued a communique assuring that it has adopted sufficient measure to ensure protection.

Bucharest, May 14—The Democratic press is criticizing the government for the anti-Semitic excesses which appear

## Eye-Witnesses to Massacre at Hebron Testify in Trial of Four Arabs (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 14—Four eye-witnesses to the murder of 24 Jews in the house of Rabbi Jacob Slonim at Hebron during last Summer's riots testified today at the opening of the trial of the four Arabs charged with the murder. Two Arab policemen and Yehuda Leib Schmeurson also gave evidence, the latter describing the attack on the Slonim house which he saw from his house nearby.

Eleven-year-old Hanania Slonim, Hayim Kastanovitch, Mina Orlansky, a daughter of a rabbi, who saw the first defendant killing her father with a stick, a seventeen-year-old servant girl in the Slonim house who saw Rabbi Slonim's son and daughter-in-law murdered, all vividly described the massacre in which two dozen people lost their lives.

With the testimony of these witnesses the prosecution completed its case. Counsel for the defense asked that the court discharge two of the defendants because of insufficient evidence, but the Court did not agree on this request. The defense witnesses will take the stand tomorrow.

## Government Bans Beggars in Front of Wailing Wall (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 14—All beggars at the Wailing Wall have been ordered removed by the police, acting on instructions from the government. The reason given is that the lane in front of the Wall is a public thoroughfare.

Some time ago, when begging was prohibited on the main streets of Jerusalem, the Jewish community, foreseeing that begging might be banned at the Wailing Wall, sent a delegation to see District Commissioner Keith Foach, who expressly promised the delegation that the ordinance would not infringe on the beggars at the Wall because the lane in front of it was not considered a public thoroughfare.

In the meantime no action has been taken to remove the beggars from in front of the Mosque of Omar, a Moslem shrine, and from in front of the Holy Sepulchre, a Christian shrine.

The beggars at the Wailing Wall have played an important part in the history of the Wall. In the first place they furnished the occasion for pious Jews giving charity, they created a certain message of security for individual Jewish worshippers and they gave some Jewish aspect to the Wall.

## Germany Honors Rosenwald for Aid to War Widows, Orphans (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Chicago, May 14—Julius Rosenwald, chairman of the board of directors of Sears, Roebuck & Co., and world-famous philanthropist, was presented with a valuable vase today as the gift of the German people in recognition of the aid he extended to German war widows and orphans and for his many endowments to German cultural projects.

Hugo F. Simon, German consul general here, made the presentation at a luncheon in the Union League Club. The vase was made in the German state porcelain works.

A letter from President von Hindenburg said in part, "I have noted with deep appreciation the many magnanimous gifts that you have made to German war widows and orphans as well as to German prisoners of war before America's entry into the World War. Since the war you have made a large donation for the benefit of German children and contributed liberally to endowments established for cultural purposes in Germany and the United States. May I assure you not only on my behalf but also on behalf of the German people, of my sincerest gratitude."

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**Financial Situation Bars****Hebrew in Detroit Schools**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Detroit, May 14—The financial situation of the Detroit Public Schools prevents the introduction of Hebrew studies in local high schools, according to a statement made by Frank Cody, superintendent of schools, to the Detroit representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Mr. Cody, upon being informed of the steps taken to teach Hebrew in high schools in New York, and when asked whether there is a possibility of adding Hebrew to the curriculum of Detroit high schools in the near future, made the following statement:

"I am in favor of introducing into our Detroit high schools the study of any foreign language, provided (1) that it has a rich literature, (2) that there is a sufficient demand from the public to justify the employment of a teacher, (3) that the colleges will recognize it as constituting a proper substitute for Greek, Latin, French, German, or Spanish, and (4) that the state of our funds will permit this addition to our curriculum. The first of these requirements is entirely met by Hebrew. In order to employ a teacher, we should have in any one high school or combination of high schools not less than 175 pupils. College recognition is a matter which can be secured only by conference with individual colleges. At the present time, however, our financial situation is such that it does not seem advisable for us to undertake any expansion of our curriculum."

**Weizmann Group Wins in****Austrian Zionist Elections**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 14—The Weizmann group won a victory in the elections for delegates to the conference of Austrian Zionists. In a lively contest the Weizmann supporters elected 31 delegates, the Radicals 19, the Revisionists 7 and the Hitachduth 5.

**Senate Approves Harris Bill  
Minus Amendments Restricting  
Further European Immigration**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Washington, May 14—The likelihood of further restriction of European immigration during the present session of Congress was greatly diminished, if not entirely eliminated, when the Senate struck out of the Harris bill, recently voted recommitment to the Senate immigration committee, the amendments which would have greatly reduced European immigration, and adopted the bill, retaining only the proviso for placing Mexico under the quota.

The bill in this form having passed the Senate now goes to the House for a vote there. The action in the Senate came in the form of a vote on Senator Copeland's motion to reconsider the action of the Senate in recommitting the bill to the Senate immigration committee. The effect of his motion was to prevent the Senate immigration committee from acting on the bill and keep it pending in the Senate instead.

As passed in the Senate the bill takes a few immigrants from the quotas of all countries by reason of the addition of Mexico to the quota system with 1,500 to 2,000 immigrants out of the present annual total of 150,000.

**Local Socialist Parties to****Decide for Themselves on  
Doing Pro-Palestine Work**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 14—The individual Socialist parties in the various countries are to decide for themselves whether their members are to be permitted to participate in the pro-Palestine work it was decided upon here at the session of the Executive of the Socialist International. The Executive itself declined to participate in or to take any responsibility for pro-Palestine work.

S. Kaplansky of the Poale Zion, declared after the Executive's session that the Palestine section and the world Poale Zion had been given a free hand in Palestine to cooperate with the pro-Palestine leagues. The participation of the Poale Zion in the Zionist Congress and the Jewish Agency was also approved, he said.

**Solitary Jew in Motza****Feels Lonely But Brave**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 14—The first Jewish colonist in Motza forty years ago, Samuel Broza, is the first to return to Motza since the riots, it was learned today after a correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency had visited the town. Broza said that his Arab neighbors were still threatening vengeance because one Arab was killed during the riots, this despite the fact that seven Jews were murdered there.

Broza and his family feel lonely without other Jews, he said, but he started to rebuild with renewed energy. Broza won prizes for his fruit and fowl at every agricultural show in Palestine since 1920.

**European J.D.C. Director  
Discusses Measures for  
Relief of Polish Jewry**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 14—The desperate situation of Polish Jewry and the measures to be taken to rescue it were discussed today at a press conference with Dr. Bernard Kahn, European director of the Joint Distribution Committee, and David J. Schweitzer, assistant director. Discussing the possibilities of the \$6,000,000 Allied Jewish Campaign in the United States, Dr. Kahn indicated that the relief would not take the form of charity but of constructive help.

He outlined a three year programme of work which will turn unqualified Jews into productive artisans. Pointing out that the catastrophic Jewish situation in Poland was only temporary he expressed the hope that American Jews would continue untrillingly their assistance.

Yesterday, in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, he declared that the J. D. C. would continue the activities in which it has been engaged in the past, that is helping the loan "kassas", aid to sanitary institutions, the productivization of the Jewish masses, the strengthening of the present and the creation of new Jewish economic positions and the adjustment of its program according to the varying needs of the Jewish population in Poland.

He expressed great hopes in the Allied Jewish Campaign in the United States and felt that it would be brought to a successful end. Dr. Kahn explained that the \$3,500,000 which the J. D. C. will get from the Allied Jewish campaign will be distributed proportionately to the needs of the Jewish population in the various countries.

**Last Rites for Magistrate****Cohen Held in Toronto**

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Toronto, May 14—The funeral services for Police Magistrate Jacob Cohen, the only Jewish magistrate in Canada, who died on May 10 in his eighty-third year, took place on Monday, with Rabbi B. Brickner of Cleveland and Rabbi M. N. Eisendrath of Toronto conducting the services.

The deceased had occupied his position on the bench since 1918. A few months ago he collapsed in his office at the City Hall, from which attack he never recovered.

Jacob Cohen was born in Cracow, Poland, and landed in New York in 1870. After he had somewhat overcome the handicap of lack of knowledge of the English language, he went to New Orleans and later to Memphis, Tenn., where he was a buyer of hides and cotton. In 1873 he settled in Toronto and for twenty-five years occupied a leading position in Jewish circles in Toronto. He was appointed as Justice of the Peace in 1907 and became Toronto's fourth Police Magistrate in 1918.

## National Jewish Hospital Week Opens May 18

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Denver, May 14—Workers in approximately five hundred communities will start next Sunday, May 18, and will continue till May 24 in activities to raise money during the fourth annual N. J. H. week for the support of the National Jewish Hospital at Denver.

The drive this year will be conducted in a similar manner to those of previous years. "N.J.H. Bonds" will be distributed at a minimum price of \$1.00 each.

The National Chairman for N.J.H. week this year has been announced as J. L. Wolff, prominent Denver business man. The Denver committee is headed by Isadore Samuels as chairman, with J. Walter Hyer as co-chairman. The forty people on the Denver committee include both Jews and non-Jews outstanding in Denver's business life as well as the professions.

The effort to secure the money is to meet the needs of the annual budget requiring an expenditure of slightly over half a million dollars. In accordance with the institution's slogan, "None May Enter Who Can Pay—None Can Pay Who Enter," only free patients are admitted. The entire revenue of the hospital is thus dependent upon contributions.

The National Jewish Hospital at Denver was the first institution in America to care for the needy sufferers from tuberculosis on a national scale. It was founded in 1899 largely through the efforts of Rabbi William S. Friedman of this city, present president of the institution, and has in the last thirty years cared for more than 6,200 men, women, and children. These patients have come from all parts of the country, practically every state in the Union being represented by them.

Although the hospital was started by Jews, and is maintained largely by Jewish philanthropy, it has always been non-sectarian in its service. Today approximately 30% of its patients are non-Jewish.

Judge Samuel D. Levy of the Children's Court is chairman of the New York committee of the National Jewish Hospital.

## Jacob Adler's Family Forms Theatre Troupe

The family of the late Jacob P. Adler, famous Yiddish actor, has organized itself into a theatrical troupe and this week it begins its first engagement at the Second Avenue Theatre, where it will appear in Jacob Gordin's "The Wild Man," the play in which Jacob Adler first established himself as an artist. After playing a limited engagement on the East Side, the company will play before other Jewish audiences.

Mrs. Sarah Adler, the widow, is the guiding spirit of the troupe, which consists of herself and her children, Charles, Frances, Luther, Irving, Adolph, Stella, Julia, and Joseph Schoengold, a son-in-law of Jacob Adler. The title role in "The Wild Man" will be played by Luther Adler.

## Rosenberg Discusses Aspects of Allied Jewish Campaign

This is the third of a series of daily interviews with James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the New York campaign of the Allied Jewish Campaign, in which he discusses various aspects of the \$6,000,000 campaign for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency.

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"Appropriately enough 'Gemiloth Chessed' are the words applied to the free loan societies in Poland which have so many good deeds to their credit and will have even more when the additional funds to be obtained from the Allied Jewish Campaign are available.

"In the last few months about 100,000 people have borrowed from these free loan societies loans averaging eleven dollars. With the aid of these small sums, in most cases hardly more than what we in the United States pay for a pair of theatre tickets from a speculator, entire families have been rescued. The most remarkable thing about these loans is that 94½ percent of them are being repaid.

"More than \$3,700,000 in 354,000 small loans were loaned by these free loan kassas from 1926 to 1929.

"In order to allow these institutions that specialize in good deeds to work on a larger scale there is an immediate need for additional capital as a revolving fund. More of these free loan kassas are needed in Poland; they should be established in Lithuania, in Roumania and in other countries.

"This, however, is impossible without funds from the United States, funds to supplement what the Jews of Europe are doing to help themselves. And the funds for this widespread doing of good deeds through the 'Gemiloth Chessed' societies will come from the \$6,000,000 to be raised by the Allied Jewish Campaign."

## Jewish Charities Get Bulk of \$100,000 Mastbaum Estate

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Philadelphia, May 14—Jewish philanthropy received virtually the entire \$100,000 estate left by Jay Jacob Mastbaum, who died May 3 at the age of 71. The deceased was an uncle of the late Jules E. Mastbaum, millionaire philanthropist, and was associated with him in the Stanley Company of America.

To the Eagleville Sanatorium for Consumptives was bequeathed ten thousand dollars in memory of the deceased's parents, Solomon and Minna Mastbaum. The Federation of Jewish charities receives a direct bequest of five thousand dollars and \$2,500 in trust, the income from which is to be used to pay the donor's annual subscription.

The residuary estate, after certain personal bequests, is to go to the Jewish Seaside Home, the Jewish Foster Home, Home for the Aged, Jewish Convalescent Home and Mt. Sinai Hospital.

## New Anti-Semitic Outbreaks as Filderman Demands Targuifromos Investigation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 14—A parliamentary inquiry into the Targuifromos affair, in which a number of Jews and Cuzists were injured when the latter, returning from Professor Cuzza's successful election campaign clashed with the Jews, and satisfaction for the insult to the Jewish religion last week in parliament by Professor Alexander Cuzza, anti-Semitic leader, were demanded in a memorandum submitted to M. Popp, chairman of parliament, by Dr. William Filderman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews.

In the meantime the newspaper, "Adverul," reports new anti-Semitic excesses in Galatz perpetrated by the youth organization, "Iron Guard." This is the latest of a series of anti-Semitic disturbances that have been sweeping over Roumania. Bucharest, Jassy, Kishinev, the Bessarabian villages, and Targuifromos, have all been the scene of attacks on the Jews in the last ten days.

Although the local authorities have been informed by the ministry of the interior that they are to be held responsible for any repetition of the excesses, M. Angelescu, assistant minister of the interior, declared today that the opposition parties are responsible for the difficulties because they are provoking the disturbances in order to put the Maniu government in trouble.

## Three Atlanta Jewish Groups Select Officers

Atlanta, May 14—Annual meetings and elections of officers of three important organizations in Atlanta's community took place here during the past few days. At a meeting of the Federation of Jewish Charities, L. H. Moss was elected president. Other officers named were L. J. Elsas, first vice-president; Nathan Saltzman, second vice-president; Ernest Feibelman, third vice-president; J. B. Wolfe, treasurer, and Mrs. Sam Schoen, secretary.

The Council of Jewish Women elected Mrs. Alfred L. Myers president, and Joel Dorfman was installed as president of the Ahavath Achim Congregation. Up to a few years ago Mr. Dorfman had served for nearly 30 years as head of the congregation, being succeeded by Joseph Goldberg, whom he now succeeds in returning to the presidency.

## ARABS TO FIGHT "OPPRESSING ZIONIST POLICY" WITH ALL PEACEFUL MEANS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 14.—The Palestine Arabs do not consent to any solution that "contradicts their natural right, will fight with all peaceful means the oppressing Zionist policy, will not yield any of their sacred rights and are sure that the Arabic and Islamic worlds support them in being prepared for any sacrifices to protect their Holy Land," cabled the Palestine Arab Executive today to the Arab delegation in London replying to the latter's cable announcing that the delegation was returning home since all negotiations with the British government had broken down.

The London delegation informed the Arab Executive that "the British government during the last 12 years had appointed three commissions which proved that Zionist policy was the cause of all the disturbances. The last commission stated that Palestine in its present condition is unable to bear more immigrants and that the lands possessed by the Arabs are insufficient for their needs.

### Want Democratic Government

"The Arabs are united in their demand for a democratic government. We were sent to negotiate with Great Britain, relying upon the Commission's report and on our well-based rights but Britain rejected our just demands and informed us that she has sent an expert to inquire into questions of land and immigration and will shortly introduce constitutional changes which do not fulfill our demands.

"We think a new inquiry into lands and immigration after the scrupulous inquiry of the Shaw commission means only disregard for our just demands. Therefore our negotiations are suspended and the delegation is returning home conscious that the Arab question is not settled justly by Britain.

### Duty to Inform Islamic World

"As we believe a continuation of the Zionist policy means to destroy the Arab nation we are sure that our people will fight this policy by all peaceful means. We are sure that every Palestine Arab will prefer death for the protection of his natural rights rather than agree to oppression. Our duty is to inform the Arab and Islamic worlds who are co-partners in Palestine about the danger menacing their brethren in Palestine. We think the British people sympathize with us despite the government's attitude."

## Clothing Workers' Union Meets in Toronto, 233 Delegates Present

Toronto, May 14.—At the first business session of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers' Union convention here yesterday, it was reported that there are 233 delegates, who represent 13 joint boards and 118 local unions in 22 cities in the United States and Canada. The session was presided over by President Sidney Hillman. Greetings were received from the Socialist mayors of Milwaukee and Reading, Pa. At the afternoon session Ignatz Petrowski, labor member of the Polish parliament, greeted the convention on behalf of 350,000 organized workers in Poland. Jacob Panken, former Municipal Court Justice of New York City, received an ovation when he rose to greet the delegates and was presented with a bouquet of 50 roses, in honor of his fiftieth birthday.

## Canadian J.I.A.S. to Hold Annual Meeting May 18

Montreal, May 14.—The Jewish Immigration Aid Society of Canada will hold its annual meeting on Sunday, May 18, with the participation of delegates from all over the Dominion. The gathering will be addressed by Lyon Cohen, honorary president of the organization, and chairman of the Canadian Hicem.

The Jewish members of the Federal Parliament, S. W. Jacobs and A. A. Heaps, will explain the new immigration regulations of the Canadian government especially in relation to the project which gives the provinces the power to decide the number and sort of immigrants they desire, and the effects this law will, eventually, have on Jewish immigration in Canada.

## Jew Heads Atlanta Political Reform Body

Atlanta, Ga., May 14.—Aroused by the conditions revealed in the recent grand jury investigation of municipal graft and corruption independent voters at Atlanta have organized the "1930 Club" of which Julius Boehm, a prominent insurance man and social worker, was today elected president.

The club is planning to enter candidates for all offices in the forthcoming primary elections. Mr. Boehm accepted the presidency against his wishes but when all the other candidates resigned he was elected by acclamation.

The "1930 Club" is the outgrowth, and includes many of the leaders of the citizens' movement, that aided in the city-wide graft probe with the subsequent indictments and trials now under way.

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## Warburg and Newton Baker Join in Marking 80th Year of Cleveland "Temple"

Cleveland, May 14.—Felix M. Warburg and the Hon. Newton D. Baker, former Secretary of War, will be among the guest speakers at the eightieth anniversary celebration of Congregation Tifereth Israel, better known as "The Temple," which will be held on May 25 and May 26.

On Sunday morning, May 25, a commemorative religious service will be held in the Temple at which Abba Hillel Silver, for the past thirteen years Rabbi of the Temple, will deliver the anniversary address. The anniversary dinner will be held on Monday evening, May 26, at the Cleveland Hotel, where Messrs. Warburg and Baker will deliver addresses.

The Tifereth Israel Congregation was established on May 29, 1850. It had forty-seven charter members. Worship was conducted for a time in the homes of the members. A bequest which the Congregation received from the noted Jewish philanthropist, Judah Touro, enabled it to purchase a lot and to build its first house of worship, which was dedicated in 1855. In 1894, under the leadership of Rabbi Moses J. Gries, the Temple was built and in 1924, in the rabbinate of Dr. Silver, the present magnificent house of worship was dedicated.

In 1929 a new and radical experiment in Temple life was inaugurated when the annual meeting of the Congregation adopted the "new temple policy" aimed at the elimination of the purely recreational activities of the Temple—plays, dances, athletics, etc., and at the centering upon purely religious and cultural activities. Eugene E. Wolf is president of the Temple.

## Jewish Women's Organizations of New York to Meet May 21

The All-Day Session of the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations, Inc. of Greater New York will take place at Tremont Temple on Wednesday, May 21, with Mrs. David E. Goldfarb, president, presiding. A large part of the All-Day Session will be dedicated to the Allied Jewish Campaign. Mrs. Morris Jacoby, president of the Sisterhood of Tremont Temple, who will act as hostess, will welcome the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations.

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
