Jews Bittered as Attacks Grow and Government Does Nothing; Self-Defense Planned

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, May 16—The growing number of anti-Semitic excesses throughout Roumania while the government has yet to take energetic action to stamp them out has created general bitterness among the Jewish population and leaders who regard as the only way out the organization of a self-defence corps.

The "Courier Israelit" declares "first must follow fist" while Jewish members of parliament without regard to their political affiliations have telegraphed the government their protests and voiced their protests in parliament. The Jewish members of parliament have pointed out that even the non-Jewish press has derided the Jewish position as entirely unprotected and charge that the Roumanian anti-Semites are encouraging the people to attack the Jews by promising them economic advantages through persecution of the Jews.

Cuzist students today at midday in the center of the city attacked and maltreated Rabbi Katz. Police-prefect general Nikoleanu has promised Chief Rabbi Nimerow to find and punish those guilty. In the meantime the newspaper "Dimineaza" reports that the attacks on Jewish passersby in Galatz are being continued by the youth organization "Iron Guard".

Threats to shoot all the Jews are contained in anonymous posters that appeared today on a number of Bucharest houses. In an interview with the newspaper "Adverul", M. Davila, Roumanian minister to the United States now visiting here, declared that the anti-Semitic excesses in Roumania are harmful to Roumanian interests abroad, especially in the United States.

Revisionist Conference to Be Held in Prague August 3

Prague, May 16—The fourth world conference of the Union of Zionist Revisionists will open its five day session here August 3. Some 200 delegates representing Revisionist organizations throughout the world will attend. Elections of delegates to the conference will take place July 12, 13 and 14.

The agenda of the conference includes, apart from the programmatic and organizational questions, discussions on relations with the Zionist organization, immigration and colonization, political activity and the furtherance of Palestine products.

Would Liquidate Odessa Jewish Technical School

Moscow, May 16—The largest Jewish technical high school in Odessa, the "Yevrabort", which has 400 students and is supported by the Agro-Joint and the Ort, is in danger of being liquidated, according to a decision of the central Ukrainian school authorities.

They point out that the "Yevrabort" is producing each year not less than 150 new qualified Jewish technicians who are placed in Odessa factories. Fearing that this will result in the entire Soviet industrial organization in the Odessa region being run by these Jewish graduates within a few years the school authorities demand that the "Yevrabort" be converted into a Ukrainian technical institute.

The Jewish Communists in the Odessa region see in this liquidation of the best Jewish technical school in Odessa which has been in existence for eleven years. The Odessa Jewish Communists are appealing to the higher authorities to intervene.

Large Part of Immigration Schedule Suspended Pending Sir John Simpson's Inquiry

Jerusalem, May 16—The British government is making an effort to solve the Palestine question in accordance with the wishes of the Arabs and the High Commissioner says he has received instructions from the Colonial Office to suspend all immigration into Palestine until the arrival of Sir John Simpson for his inquiry according to a report in the Arab paper, "Al Hayat," which says that the High Commissioner told the above to the acting-president of the Arab Executive who interviewed the High Commissioner to express the indignation of the Arabs at the breaking off of the negotiations in London.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns from the Zionist Executive that there is to be no general suspension of immigration but that a large part of the immigration schedule approved by the Palestine government last week is to be suspended pending Sir John Simpson's inquiry. Immigration in the non-certificate categories is to continue as usual.

The "Al Hayat," which is a semi-official organ of the Arab Executive, says too, that the British government is contemplating replacing the native magistrates with British judges and will appoint forty-seven British police officers and twelve British sub-district officers.

Two Arabs Sentenced to Death for Murders of 24 in Slonim House

Jerusalem, May 16—Two of the four Arabs charged with the murder of 24 Jews in the house of Rabbi Jacob Slonim during the massacre in Hebron last August were today sentenced to death, one received seven years in prison on a charge of looting and the fourth, already under a death sentence in another case, was acquitted. The two sentenced to death are Isa Al Araf, a wealthy merchant, and Khalif Kattib, a chauffeur. Abdul Muni received the seven year term and Mohamed Jumjum was acquitted.

The trial of the Arabs charged with the 24 murders lasted four days. Eyewitnesses to and survivors of the murders testified for the prosecution. Those killed included the son and daughter-in-law of Rabbi Slonim as well as other members of his family and other Jews who had sought refuge in his house.

Arab Stoppage on Palestine Day 75 Per Cent Effective

Jerusalem, May 16—The Arab stoppage of business and all activity in connection with the proclamation of today as "Palestine Day" by the Arab Executive is seventy-five per cent effective. The police report that no untoward events are expected. Women vegetable hawkers brought their produce into Jerusalem as usual but there was no movement of villagers towards Jerusalem.

Major Wainright, police superintendent, expects that all Arab shops will reopen after the evening prayers. There will be no assembly at the Mosque beyond the usual Friday congregation but the mass meeting at the Moslem school will be held as planned. The Arab Executive is pressing all Arab shopkeepers and workers to strike and is threatening Christians in Bethlehem with a boycott if they do not join.

New Jewish Palestine Colony

Jerusalem, May 16—A new Jewish settlement, a small colony of laboring people, has been started near Nesziuna. The settlement has been named Bestoved. The twenty families at Bestoved have seven dunams of land each, received from the Jewish National Fund.

Thuringia Establishes Chair of "Racial Science" at Jena

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 16—A chair of "racial science" has been established at the University of Jena by the Thuringian state ministry on orders from Dr. A. Frick, Thuringian minister of education. The noted anti-Semite and racial fanatic, R. Guenther, has been appointed professor of racial science despite the fact that other professors at the University of Jena consider him an unlearned person.

In the meantime the German press is complaining that the actions of Dr. Frick, who recently introduced anti-Semitic prayers in the schools of Thuringia, are disgracing Germany.

Ludwig Hollander, executive director of the Central Association of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, has published an open letter in which he challenges Dr. Frick to "prove that the Jews are demoralizing Germany or else be considered a slanderer." In connection with the anti-Semitic school prayers, Dr. Frick had said that they would "reduce the Jews morally and humanely."

Jewish Situation Improved Since Yevsektzia Liquidated

Moscow, May 16—The situation of the Jews in a number of Ukrainian small towns has improved since the Jewish section of the Communist Party was liquidated. This was revealed today in the report of an investigator sent to Ukraine by the Moscow Yiddish Communist daily, "Emes," formerly the organ of the Jewish section of the party.

The investigator reported that every local soviet is directly doing its best for the Jewish under the jurisdiction because it feels a direct responsibility, something that was non-existent while the Jewish section of the party still functioned.

Arab Press Bitterly Disappointed at Breakdown of Negotiations While Jewish Papers Warn Against Unjustified Jubilation

Jerusalem, May 16—Bitter disappointment at the breakdown of the negotiations between the Arab delegation in London and the British government is expressed by the Arabic press while the Hebrew press cautions the Jews against finding any cause for jubilation in the rebuff suffered by the Arabs.

The "Jamal Al Arabia," organ of the Moslem Supreme Council, writes, "we know that there should not be great hopes in the delegation because we know the attitude of imperialistic governments towards weak peoples. We know the injustice of the Westerners. We also know the Zionist financial influence on the British government but we never imagined that the Zionist influence was so great. Our hopes for a just solution of the Palestine problem have been cut owing to Zionist influence. It is our duty now to reveal the whole injustice done to Palestine to the Arabic and Islamic worlds. All Arabs must unite in order to achieve their common aim."

The Hebrew daily, "Ha'Aretz," points out that "there is no occasion for jubilation. Nothing decisive has occurred. The Arab delegation stopped its negotiations obviously in order to influence the forthcoming Palestine debate in Parliament. The Arab delegation in its statement willfully put the Palestine Arabs in the rank of Egypt and India in order to frighten the British man in the street, the taxpayer.

"It seems from the 'Mokkattam's' report that the Colonial office promised the Arab delegation too much. We must remind Great Britain and the whole world that there are 17,000,000 Jews who will never renounce their right to Palestine whether one intends to take it away officially or by practicing compromises."

The Arab daily, "Falastin," writes that "it is no surprise that Great Britain disregarded the Palestine Arabs after breaking off negotiations with Egypt and in view of her severe attitude towards India. British policy relying on military force therefore disregarded our claims."

"But she is mistaken. Great Britain will learn tomorrow, Palestine Day, and after that, that the Palestine Arabs are supported by the whole Arab and Islamic worlds and that she lost by breaking off negotiations with the Arab delegation. The Jews will bring her to an abyss as they did Russia. The appointment of an expert in lands and immigration and the promise of some constitutional changes are worthless."

"The British government could not act otherwise," the Hebrew paper, "Doar Hayom," writes, "because the Arabs demanded that Great Britain cancel the obligation signed by 52 nations. But we must not be too optimistic. Reality in Palestine teaches us that a solemn statement about the

faithfulness of the Mandate is not as important as ways of carrying out the Mandate.

"The Arabs adopted the old method; whatever they were offered they expressed indignation and demanded more. They now open a new political offensive. Is the Zionist Executive ready?"

Murders Frequent in Palestine, Samuel Says

London, May 16—Murders are very frequent in Palestine, declared Sir Herbert Samuel today in the course of giving evidence in his capacity as former Home Secretary before a select committee of the House of Commons which is considering a capital punishment bill with a view to deciding whether capital punishment should be abolished or retained. Sir Herbert was the first High Commissioner in Palestine.

He said that he would be very chary about recommending its abolition in a country like Palestine. At present, he pointed out, the risk is too great. Speaking of the question generally Sir Herbert said that "capital punishment may be justified if it is necessary as a deterrent and for that reason alone." While he was Home Secretary in the last Liberal government he reprieved eight of the fourteen condemned people that came before him.

Jewish Workers' Alliance Convention in Montreal

Montreal, May 16—The twelfth annual convention of the Jewish National Workers' Alliance of the United States and Canada opened here yesterday at the Hotel Mount Royal. More than 300 delegates from all parts of the United States and the Dominion are attending.

The convention was welcomed by representatives of the municipality and the Canadian Labor Party. Among those attending are David Pinski, Berl Locker, Chaim Greenberg and Anton Erenreich.

Individual Artisans Also to Get Raw Materials

Moscow, May 16—Individual Jewish artisans who are not working in co-operatives should be supplied with raw material on the same basis with those who are working in co-operatives providing they form associations, the Soviet cabinet decided today. The associations are necessary because the government cannot deal with each artisan individually and hence the association will receive the raw material for all its members. The decision, which will become effective in a month, is a great relief to thousands of artisans hitherto unable to obtain raw material.

No Change in Attitude Towards Zionism of Socialist International

There will be no change in the attitude of the Socialist International towards Zionism, according to a statement issued yesterday by the Central Committee of the American Poale Zion party, which is affiliated with the International, and printed in the New York "Day."

"The Socialist Labor International which was founded in 1923 through the union of the Second and the Vienna International, has never as such taken any attitude towards Zionism," says the statement. "The Poale Zion have never wished to start a quarrel in the International around Zionism, but have endeavored to organize independently all those international Socialist forces who are willing to help the Palestine workers. Thus during the Socialist International Congress in Brussels in 1928 was founded the Socialist Committee for the Palestine Workers, with the participation of such eminent Socialists as Vandervelde, de Bruker, Huysman, Henderson, Leon Blum, Eduard Bernstein, Victor Chernoff, Zeretelli and others. Therefore the present decision of the Executive to the effect that the International as such takes no attitude towards Zionism confirms the situation that has existed until now."

Jewish Sabbath Alliance 25th Meeting Today

The 25th anniversary meeting of the Jewish Sabbath Alliance of America will be held this afternoon, beginning at 2 P. M., in the Hebrew Technical School. The speakers will be Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of Dropsie College; Rabbi Ch. Bloch of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis; Hon. Royal C. Copeland, United States Senator; Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein of the Union of Orthodox Congregations; Rev. Dr. Moses Hyamson of the Board of Jewish Ministers; Hon. Charles H. Tuttle, United States Attorney, and Rev. Dr. Bernard Drachman, who will preside.

I. O. B. B. District 3 to Meet in Lancaster

Lancaster, Pa., May 16—The B'nai B'rith Lodge of Lancaster and the Jewish Community at large will be hosts to the convention of District Grand Lodge No. 3 I.O.B.B., which will convene in this city May 24 to May 26. Delegates will come from more than fifty lodges in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and West Virginia. A large attendance of delegates and prominent communal leaders are expected to attend the convention. Abraham Berkowitz, assistant district attorney of Philadelphia, is the president of the District Grand Lodge No. 3. Dr. Harry Elins is president of Lancaster Lodge No. 228, one of the oldest lodges in the state of Pennsylvania and Capt. Joseph Goldberg is the chairman of the convention committee.

Rosenberg Discusses Aspects of Allied Jewish Campaign

This is the fifth of a series of daily interviews with James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the New York campaign of the Allied Jewish Campaign, in which he discusses various aspects of the \$6,000,000 campaign for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency.

"What about the children? It is for them that these fine men and women, the Jewish leaders overseas, do their best work both in conducting welfare activities and in providing the great bulk of the moneys for these activities. American Jewry is still helping them and must continue to help for a while. The American backing is the stimulus which keeps alive the child-care federations, medical associations and schools for trade and vocational training overseas, reaching over 18,000 children.

"Through local Jewish medical organizations all over Eastern Europe no less than 66,000 children of school age receive medical attention and hygienic instruction. In Russia, where 70% of the Jewish children are tubercular or in the early stages of that disease, over 40,000 children are being helped by summer colonies, sanatoria, by milk stations, etc. The cultural work gives financial aid to schools in Eastern and Central Europe and Palestine, with a student membership of over 250,000.

"It would be absurd and unfair to create the inference that the money from America supplies everything for the Jewish children of Europe. What we are giving is only a small proportion. We who have studied the problem for years are convinced that it is fair to say the European Jewish communities that supply over seventy-five per cent of the funds for this child-welfare work are immensely stimulated and encouraged by American aid and would be seriously handicapped and in many cases would have to stop entirely if American backing ceased at this time. In fact, this is already threatened in a number of important Jewish communities overseas.

"Let us not desert the children."

Calls on Christians to Aid Moslems Against Jews

Jerusalem, May 16—Calling on the Moslems and Christians to prevent the land sacred to both from falling into the hands of the Jews the Arab paper "Al Hayat" declared, "Attention Arabs! Your case can be solved only in Palestine. Attention Moslems! The Holy Land is in danger. Attention Christians! Great Britain wishes to donate the Holy Land, where Christ was crucified, to the Jews. We Moslems have done all we can, now you Christians must join our efforts." The paper concludes by saying "until now we fought only the Zionists. Now it is the time to consider Great Britain our enemy."

Says Separate Jewish Schools Must Be Faced If Agreement With Protestants Impossible

Montreal, May 16—If no agreement can be reached with the Protestants the question of establishing Jewish schools would have to be faced, pointed out Joseph M. Cohen, a member of the provincial parliament, in explaining the Jewish school bill to a local gathering of Jewish women. Creation of Jewish schools would require time to work out and would involve the training of Jewish teachers, he declared in appealing to the Jewish community to be patient until a solution of the problem could be reached.

Referring to the work of the Jewish school commission Mr. Cohen said that although most of the Jewish community are against the idea of separate schools yet they would undertake to establish them rather than be placed in a position of inferiority such as the inability to conform to an "honorable agreement" with the Protestant school commission would imply.

American Jewish Committee Endorses Allied Campaign

The executive committee of the American Jewish Committee today announced that it has issued a call to its members and to the Jews of America to give their unstinted and generous support to the Allied Jewish Campaign. The executive committee, of which Judge Horace Stern of Philadelphia is chairman, is composed of Dr. Cyrus Adler, James H. Becker, David M. Bressler, Leo M. Brown, Judge Benjamin M. Cardozo, Abram I. Elkus, Hon. Eli Frank, Max J. Kohler, Lt. Gov. Herbert Lehman, Hon. Irving Lehman, James Marshall, Julius Rosenthal, Lewis L. Strauss, Cyrus L. Sulzberger, Felix M. Warburg and Morris Wolf.

The call of the executive, after pointing out that the American Jewish Committee in 1914 initiated the nation-wide effort of the Jews of America to come to the aid of their brethren in Europe and gave the sum of \$100,000 as the first contribution to this relief and recalling that in 1918 it greeted the Balfour Declaration and pledged its support to those who seek to establish in Palestine a center for Judaism, urges its members and all other Jews to support the Allied Jewish Campaign and whole-heartedly endorses the purposes of the campaign.

United Roumanian Jews Meet

The United Roumanian Jews of America will hold a quarterly-annual conference of delegates and members of the Executive Committee today, at 2 p. m. at the Hotel Pennsylvania, to consider the critical situation of the Jews in Roumania, and to take appropriate action in connection therewith.

Good-Will Seminar Debates Religion in Public Schools

St. Louis, May 16—Religious instruction in the public schools and a program on which Catholic, Jew and Protestant can unite with regard to parochial schools were debated at the concluding sessions of the St. Louis good-will seminar. Rabbi A. E. Halpern of St. Louis declared that the public schools should let the homes become more religious. This was his answer to the Catholic representatives who expressed an uncompromising attitude in favor of parochial schools.

Rev. Hugo Slotmeyer of St. Louis University, and Michael Williams, editor of the "Commonweal," were the chief Catholic spokesmen, while Rabbi Samuel Cohen of the Hebrew Union College, Rabbi Halpern and Rev. J. E. Crowther, claimed that an agreement among the groups could be found but religion must be kept out of the schools.

Rev. Elias Newman, apostate in charge of the Presbyterian mission, caused a sensation at the afternoon session when, in commenting on Rabbi Wise's speech, he urged, as a former Jew, that the Christians eliminate the concept of the Jews as "Christ-killers." He proudly referred to his Jewish associations and supported the Rabbi's plea against proselytizing among Jews.

Sees Britain Preparing Palestine Constitution

London, May 16—The passage in the statement made at the session of the Council of the League of Nations by Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, to the effect that the British government is devising means within the framework of the Mandate of satisfying legitimate aspirations "only signifies that it is studying some form of constitution for the Holy Land which ought to satisfy the moderate Arabs and Zionists though neither the Revisionists nor extreme Arab leaders may accept," declared the "London Times" today.

It also pointed out that "the most important and not the least satisfactory part of Henderson's statement was the unequivocal recognition that the primary duty of the Mandatory power is to preserve peace and order in Palestine. He made it abundantly clear that the Labor government is studying how best to carry out the principal recommendations of the Shaw Commission and that the government is ready to remove any reasonable apprehensions on the part of the Arabs."

Work in Rural Communities Described by Council Chairman

Though the Jewish educational classes organized in the rural communities by the Department of Farm and Rural Work, of the National Council of Jewish Women, were attended by approximately 800 children, this number represents but a portion of the several thousands who ought to receive these opportunities, it was reported by Mrs. Abraham H. Arons, national chairman of the department, in a statement describing its activities for the twelve months ending April 30.

"Only those who have worked in the isolated districts can begin to estimate what the program of Jewish education means to the Jewish farmer, whose children in most instances are growing up without any knowledge of the history or traditions of their ancestors," stated Mrs. Arons.

The program of the Council's rural department also includes classes in Americanization, citizenship and English. Lectures are provided and evening schools established. Seventy rural communities received the benefit of these activities.

Another phase of the Council's rural program, which was discussed by Mrs. Arons, is its rural social service.

"The farm and rural department of the National Council of Jewish Women is the only women's organization in America rendering this type of service to the isolated family," declared Mrs. Arons. "We have become known to all social agencies and whenever a case involving a Jewish individual or family is to be investigated in the rural communities, we are invariably called upon to extend our cooperation in such instances." The Albany, New York Section has contributed a part time worker and generous relief for needy cases during the past year. Special contributions were made by a number of other Council Sections to promote this activity.

The rural program of the National Council of Jewish Women is carried on in the states of Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan.

Session of Central Conference of American Rabbis, Providence

Providence, R. I., May 16—The Central Conference of American Rabbis, represented by some 150 delegates of the liberal Jewish element of both the United States and Canada, will attend its 41st annual session at the Temple Beth-El of this city, June 25-29.

The findings of this conference will be made public not only to all Jews throughout America, but will be made available even to the most remote hamlets in Poland and Germany. The congregation of Temple Beth-El is making elaborate preparations for entertaining the members of the conference.

Compulsory Sunday Rest Abolished in Lithuania

Kovno, May 16—The compulsory Sunday rest has finally been abolished in Lithuania, the cabinet ministers deciding that while the law making Sunday a compulsory day of rest will continue to be enforced in Kovno itself trading outside of Kovno will be permitted Sunday afternoons between 1 and 4 P. M.

In explaining the new law it is pointed out that the old restriction was not adapted to Lithuanian life because a majority of the Lithuanians are peasants who are unable to visit the markets on the working days which compelled them to break the law and trade through back doors or through unnecessary intermediaries.

Under the old law non-Christian factory owners and their workers were compelled to work only five days in the week throughout the year, which had an unfavorable effect on their earnings and production. The new law will permit artisans without hired labor to work on Sundays and holidays if they do not work publicly or noisily.

Aaron DeRoy Gives Detroit Allied Jewish Campaign \$10,000

Detroit, May 16—A *demonium* broke loose at the luncheon of workers for the Allied Jewish Campaign at Hotel Statler on Thursday when Aaron DeRoy, head of the DeRoy Motor Sales Company and treasurer of the campaign, announced a contribution of \$10,000. Mr. DeRoy's contribution swelled the fund of the special gifts committee to \$192,517, and with the \$61,669 announced raised by the general solicitations committee made the total subscribed in the first four days of the drive \$254,186.

Campaign Will Aid Hadassah, Kupat Cholim Hospitals

To clear up a misunderstanding that has arisen in some quarters relative to the scope of the Allied Jewish Campaign, the Jewish Daily Bulletin has been asked to say that the only hospitals in Palestine that will receive support from it, are the institutions of Hadassah and the Kupat Cholim. The Bikur Cholim Hospital in Jerusalem is not included among these institutions, and therefore does not come within the scope of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

The Hebrew Technical School for Girls Announces Examination Date
