

## Distinguished Gathering Dedicates New Jewish National Fund Home

Jerusalem, May 17—The new building of the Jewish National Fund was opened yesterday with an inaugural address by M. M. Ussishkin, head of the Fund, who welcomed the guests, including Herbert Bentwich, father of the attorney general of Palestine, who helped register the Jewish National Fund statutes in England; Kurt Blumenfeld, president of the German Zionist Federation; Berthold Feivel and Meyer Jaffe, South African Zionist.

Mr. Ussishkin pointed out that the building was opened on Lag B'Omer, "a day connected with the name of Rabbi Akiba and like the latter we wish to join political aspirations with cultural and spiritual aims. The architecture of our building makes it look like a stronghold and it really is by its

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## Sees Danger in Leaving Arab Grievance Unredressed

London, May 17—"There is danger in leaving the Palestine Arabs with a bitter sense of grievance not merely because Britain has to fear a rising in Palestine supported from Transjordan but a conflict with the Moslem world," declared the "Morning Post" today. "Palestine, Arabia, Iraq, Persia and Moslem India are apt to unite on this question and the government should consider whether it is wise to risk a conflict when the Mohammedans of India are the British main support against the seditious agitation of the Swarajists.

"Lord Passfield sets the interests of the Zionists above the interests of the Empire thus dismissing the Arabs with a grievance unredressed".

## Argentine Z.O. Protests Anti-Jewish Excesses in Roumania

Buenos Aires, May 17—A unanimous resolution of protest against the anti-Semitic excesses that have been sweeping Roumania in the last fortnight was adopted at the twelfth annual congress of Argentine Zionists meeting here. The resolution of protest was introduced by a group of Zionists here originally from Roumania. There are a large number of Roumanian Jews in the Argentine.

Other resolutions adopted by the congress called for the creation of a Jewish school council in the Argentine, support of Palestine products and invited Nahum Sokolow, veteran Zionist leader, to come to the Argentine for the opening of the Keren Hayesod campaign.

## Sees Commission Sued to Wailing Wall Question

London, May 17—A satisfactory solution of the Wailing Wall question is seen in the personnel of the Wailing Wall Commission by the "Manchester Guardian." The combination of diplomacy, law and colonial administration promise a satisfactory solution, the paper writes. A further advantage, says the "Manchester Guardian," is that the commissioners can act with all the independence of neutrals and all the prestige of the League of Nations.

"The question is essentially judicial and peace in Palestine depends on its full and administrative decision, the commissioners having to establish once and for all beyond any question of appeal the status of the Wailing Wall, thus removing one of the numerous opportunities for conflict."

The British government yesterday submitted to the Council of the League of Nations the names of Eliel Loefgren, former foreign minister of Sweden, Charles Barde, a Swiss jurist and A. J. Van Kempen, a former Dutch colonial official as the members of the international commission to be sent to Palestine to investigate the Moslem and Jewish claims to the Wailing Wall.

## Six Greek Towns

### Honor Morgenthau

Salonica, May 17—Henry Morgenthau, former American ambassador to Turkey, now visiting Greece, is being overwhelmed with attentions and honors. While accompanying Premier Venizelos through Macedonia and Thrace he has been made an honorary citizen of Salonica and of five other towns while his name has been given to a street in Salonica. The Greeks are paying him homage in gratitude for his services to the pro-Hellenic cause, particularly for his aid to the Greek war refugees.

After visiting the poor Jewish quarter in Salonica Mr. Morgenthau promised the Jewish community that he would endeavor to obtain a long term loan in the United States for the Jewish community here to be used for reconstruction and the building of suitable houses. He also attended a reception given him by the local B'nai B'rith lodge where he pointed out that he has been a member of the order for 52 years and feels proud of his Jewishness.

## Jewish Girls Resign from Masonic Group in Protest Against Christian Symbols

Los Angeles, May 17—The enforced use of certain Christian symbols in the ritual of Bethel Lodge No. 10, Job's Daughters, an organization affiliated with the Masonic order, and one hundred percent Jewish in membership, has caused the resignation of Cecelia Berk, University of California student, as Queen, and a large number of the 200 members.

For the last five and a half years a special dispensation had been granted to the Bethel Lodge No. 10 to make changes in the ritual which would not offend the religious feelings of its members. Within the last six months threats had been made to the Bethel Lodge by the Grand Guardian of the state of California to revoke its charter unless it returned to the use of the Christian symbols.

Mrs. H. L. Harris, Grand Guide of the state, herself a Jewess, and Guardian of Bethel Lodge No. 10, at first fought this order, according to Miss Berk, but recently changed her mind and compelled the use of the Christian symbols in the ritual.

Miss Berk refused to go through with these symbols as did many others, and she was then ordered off the throne by Mrs. Harris. A local rabbi, a member of the aroused mothers of the girls to visit the Bethel Lodge at its last meeting, but when he attempted to enter the lodge room was forcibly ejected by Mrs. Harris. It is understood that several members of the Council of the Bethel Lodge have resigned in protest and there is a feeling of resentment against the action of Mrs. Harris.

## Says Jews Will Have to Leave Small Towns

Moscow, May 17—Eventually the Jews of the small towns of Russia will have to leave for the colonies whether they want to or not, is the conclusion reached by two Russian Jewish economists, Weizblit and Cantor, in summarizing their impressions after a trip through the small towns of the Ukrainian.

Cantor, who is the secretary of the Ukrainian Comzet, the government department for settling the Jews on the land, says that the hope that the situation of the Jews in the small towns will improve with the latest government measures to an extent where everybody will find ground in the small town is groundless. He cautioned against weakening the colonization work and pointed out that the Jewish artisans may be relieved but that the bulk of the Jewish population cannot avoid colonization.

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## Number of Jews in Palestine Trebled; \$20,000,000 Expended in 10 Years, Says Rothenberg

Tripling of the Jewish population of Palestine over a period of ten years, and the expenditure of approximately \$20,000,000 in economic, sanitary and cultural activities tending to facilitate the establishment in the Holy Land of a Jewish Homeland under the aegis of Great Britain were reported yesterday at a meeting, in the Hotel Biltmore, of the advisory committee of the New York Allied Jewish Campaign, by Morris Rothenberg, one of the national chairmen of that effort to raise \$6,000,000 for the purposes of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, and the Joint Distribution Committee. New York City will have a "drive" beginning on the 27th of this month to secure \$2,500,000 toward the \$6,000,000 quota of which the Joint Distribution Committee will receive \$3,500,000 and the Jewish Agency \$2,500,000. Heretofore funds for Palestine were raised in this country through the United Palestine Appeal which is now replaced by the Allied Jewish Campaign.

In 1919, Mr. Rothenberg said, when Palestine had just emerged from Turkish rule and been mandated to Great Britain by the League of Nations, the Jewish population was 57,000. At the end of last year it had grown to 162,000 or 18% of the total population. The stream of Jewish immigration, Mr. Rothenberg said, reached its highest peak in 1928, when 33,801 Jews entered the country. The smallest number of Jewish immigrants to Palestine was in 1927, when only 2,713 entered the country, due, Mr. Rothenberg said, to an economic depression. "This has been overcome to such an extent that Palestine is now suffering from a labor shortage, especially in its citrus-belt, and the Zionist organization has applied to the British government for additional immigration certificates for the current year," he stated.

## Arab Papers Complain Against Arab Leadership in Palestine and Hope Peace May Be Established There Between Jews and Arabs

Complaints against Arab leadership in Palestine and a hope that peace may soon be established between Arab and Jew there are voiced in recent issues of two Arabic papers in Palestine, "Al Iqdam" and "Al Salam."

While some Arabs would be greatly pleased if, as a result of the Inquiry Commission's findings, immigration to Palestine were restricted and land purchase prohibited, says "Al Iqdam," their apparent pleasure would only be on the surface. "In truth," says this paper, "their deepest wish is: 'Would that ships might bring immigrants to our shores every day, so that we could sell our lands to them at high prices.' And the proof of this is that the city dwellers—even the rich ones—hover about the doors of Jews seeking prospective purchasers for their lands. Is this not a sign that we cannot succeed in our political activities? For success can only result if we actually practice what we preach. But we have not yet made this sacrifice on the altar of consistency. For this reason we are continually meeting with failure and defeats in our political actions."

"Therefore, we believe that our political policy will not be brought about through the decisions which the Commission of Inquiry submits on one day, and which on the next day the British Prime Minister, Mr. Macdonald, brushes aside in a statement of fewer words than can be counted on one's fingers. Nor can the welfare of Palestine be assured if we are led by a group of men who bargain us away, buying and selling us like cattle, all the while pretending to work for our good, whereas really they are not working for our good."

"The welfare of Palestine," concludes "Al Iqdam," "can be brought about only if there is peace among the different parts of the Palestine population. May God help that this wish shall be realized."

"It is true that there is a movement on foot against the leaders," says "Al Salam." This is proved by the meetings at Nazareth, Tiberias, Acre and Ajlun. The fellahs are indignant at the townsfolk and charge them with all the evils that have lately occurred. It is not less true that the people who have contributed to the expense of the Delegation would not have done so had not the money been almost forced from their hands.

"Even now the leaders have failed to raise all the money they need in spite of their efforts. The fellah finds that his interests are not identical with those of the townsman and he is indignant that the religious leaders should have misled him and incited him against his neighbors, thus bringing about murder and robbery. The fellah is now only too anxious to set up his own institutions."

"The political situation is painted in false colors by the present leaders and by the Arab press. Even the Arabs of the towns are divided and are throwing over the old political party. The Arab people have not yet said their last

word on the Arab-Jewish question. When this word has been said it will not be one of hatred and war, but one of peace and brotherhood, as is suitable for two people who live in one country."

## Zionists Pay Honor

to Meyer W. Weisgal

Hundreds of Zionists from New York City and environs gathered at the Astor Hotel Saturday night to pay tribute to Meyer W. Weisgal, who has resigned from his post as editor of "The New Palestine," official organ of the Zionist Organization of America, with which he has been connected for the past fifteen years. Addresses by nationally prominent Zionist leaders and greetings from Zionist leaders abroad lauded the services of Weisgal to Zionism in America and hailed him as one who had done much to spread the doctrines of Zionism in the United States. The banquet tendered to Mr. Weisgal was on the occasion of his departure from New York to take up his duties as editor of "The Jewish Standard," a new English-Jewish weekly in Toronto, Canada.

A cable sent from London to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, and of the Jewish Agency, read as follows:

"I am glad to see the American Zionist Organization honoring my dear friend, Weisgal, prior to his departure for Canada. He certainly deserves public recognition for the enormous services he has rendered to the Zionist cause. For fifteen years he has been at grips with Zionist work, and as editor of 'The New Palestine' and secretary of the Zionist Organization has helped to popularize and galvanize the cause of Jewish nationalism. Numerous Zionist achievements in America are undoubtedly due to his ability and vigor. His cooperation in times of stress has made me happy. His quitting the American scene is regrettable; the only compensation being that he will continue his valuable services to the Zionist cause in Canada."

The speakers at the banquet included Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization, honorary chairman of the testimonial committee; Jacob Fishman, chairman of the committee and toastmaster; Joseph Weiss, treasurer; Morris Rothenberg, vice-president of the organization; Mrs. Archibald Silverman, vice-president; Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt, Emanuel Neumann, president of the Jewish National Fund; Dr. S. Margoshes, and others.

## Roumanian Jews Here Cable Protest to Premier Maniu

A cable of protest against the reported anti-Semitic excesses in Roumania was sent yesterday to Prime Minister Maniu and to the Roumanian minister to the United States, Carol Davila, by the Roumanian Jewish Committee of America.

## Heads of 4 Rabbinical Groups Appeal for Allied Campaign

Hailing the Allied Jewish Campaign as an augury of "the unity of American Israel," the heads of four leading rabbinical organizations have issued a joint statement, calling upon their colleagues to give their active participation in this city and throughout to the country to the effort to raise \$6,000,000 to meet the 1930 budgets of the Joint Distribution Committee and of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

The call, which is signed by Rev. Dr. Louis Finkelstein, president of the Rabbinical assembly of the Jewish Theological Seminary, Rev. Dr. Leo Jung, Rev. Dr. Maurice H. Harris, president of the Association of Reform Rabbis of New York and Vicinity, and Rev. Dr. Elias L. Solomon, president of the New York Board of Ministers, declares that by giving their cooperation to the campaign, the Rabbis of this country will help inaugurate "the new era of mutual understanding, sympathy and joint effort in behalf of Israel in this country and throughout the world."

## Austrian Zionists Excited at Immigration Stoppage Order

Vienna, May 17—A great deal of excitement and bitterness has been created in Austrian Zionist and Jewish circles at the news that the Palestine government has suspended a large part of the immigration schedule approved last week pending Sir John Simpson's inquiry into the problems of immigration and land settlement.

An editorial in the "Neue Freie Presse," the leading Vienna paper, emphasizes the fact that the stoppage of immigration would cause serious reactions among the Zionists throughout the world and lead to a protest movement. "It is necessary, however, to wait and see whether England really wishes to make decisions which would destroy the good will created by a policy friendly to Zionism as hitherto conducted by England because such mistakes as the immigration stoppage order result in very unfavorable consequences."

## Jewish Communities Organize for J. N. F. Flower Day

Extensive plans for the holding of Flower Day for the benefit of the Jewish National Fund of America, the Zionist agency for the acquisition of land in Palestine as the property of the Jewish people, have been completed, according to an announcement issued by Emanuel Neumann, president of the Fund. Jewish communities in more than 70 cities and towns in the United States have reported to the New York headquarters concerning the organization of large groups of volunteers who will participate in the flower sale which will be held throughout the country on June 8th. The proceeds of Flower Day last year amounted to \$40,000, and it is expected that the income may be doubled this year.

## Rosenberg Discusses Aspects of Allied Jewish Campaign

This is the sixth of a series of daily interviews with James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the New York campaign of the Allied Jewish Campaign, in which he discusses various aspects of the \$6,000,000 campaign for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency.

"What use is \$6,000,000? It is a mere drop in the bucket. If the need for upbuilding the life of the Jews in Russia and Europe and Palestine is still urgent, what has the work of the last fifteen years accomplished?"

"These were questions propounded to me yesterday. Is there an answer? The answer lies in the fact that today 75% of the moneys needed for the communal and the reconstructive efforts overseas are supplied by the people over there themselves.

"Then can't they supply the last 25%?"—to which I answer that the case is like that of a farmer who has enough money to plant his seeds and start his crops, but who in mid-Summer needs a little help and has no one to whom to turn. That help gives him an agricultural machine or the means of watering his crops or doing something else that means the difference between ruin and self-support.

"That is what the 25% supplied by America means. If the support given during the past fifteen years were now to be cut off, it would be like leaving a building whose foundations are securely laid, whose walls are built, but which still needs the roof."

## No Anti-Semitism in Suspension of Brown University Jewish Student; He Criticized Prominent Chapel Service Speakers

Providence, May 17—Rollo Gabriel Silver, a Jewish student of Brown University in the class of 1931, was not suspended from the university because he protested that Jewish students were forced to attend Christian religious services, as was stated erroneously in a New York paper, but because he wrote a letter which appeared in the college publication, in which noted men and preachers who spoke at the Brown chapel during the year were ridiculed and treated in a manner regarded as flippant and disrespectful.

Faculty members who are interesting themselves in Silver's case are now circulating a petition asking for Silver's reinstatement. In their petition they point out that in his letter Silver expressed himself no more violently than authors of past letters to the "Brown Daily Herald", none of whom has been suspended. The petition regards the punishment as disproportionate to the offense, attributing the faults of the letter rather to lack of taste than an intention to insult. Silver's suspension, says the petition, will be considered by many persons as a blow to the fine reputation of Brown University as a col-

## Cleveland Colony Is Planned in Palestine

Cleveland, May 17—A Zionist colony in Palestine will bear the name of a leading American city according to plans adopted by a group of Cleveland, Ohio, Zionists.

A group of leading Zionists of Cleveland at a luncheon held last week pledged to raise the amount of \$100,000 in the course of four years as a contribution towards the Jewish National Fund, the Zionist Agency for the acquisition of land in Palestine, on the understanding that the fund is to be used for the establishment of a colony, which is to bear the name of Cleveland.

The decision was taken following an appeal by Abraham Goldberg, Zionist leader of New York. George J. Klein was chosen Chairman of a special committee in charge of this project. It is planned to interest a group of 200 Cleveland Jews as founders of the colony.

When Silver will be permitted to return to his studies the Dean was not prepared to say. In his statement the Dean said:

"Brown University is not willing to have its students treat impolitely and in an ungentelemanly fashion those who should be treated with respect."

Among those guest-speakers whom Silver criticised in his letter were Dean Sperry, formerly of Harvard Theological School; Dean Gilkey, of the University of Chicago Divinity School; Prof. William Lyon Phelps of Yale; Rev. S. Parkes Cadman; and Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland.

## Seasongood and Ach, Nominees for County Posts in Ohio

Cincinnati, May 17—A committee of prominent Democrats and Independent Republicans have agreed to nominate Murray Seasongood for county commissioner and Samuel Ach for county treasurer, if they will consent to run in the November election, it was learned today.

Mr. Seasongood, as mayor of Cincinnati from 1926 to 1930, made a great record for himself and brought prestige to the Jewish people of this community through his bold leadership of the forces of reform. He is a member of Rockdale Avenue Temple. Samuel Ach was president of the Board of Education here for several years before his election as county treasurer in 1926. He refused a second term and Edgar Friedlander, another prominent Jewish business man, is now county treasurer but has also refused a second term.

## Percy Straus Gets Degree from Oglethorpe University

## 10,000 Jewish Children Celebrate Lag B'Omer

The United Synagogue of America fittingly celebrated Lag B'Omer, the Jewish Arbor Day, which commemorates the deliverance of the Jews from Roman bondage, by gathering together more than 10,000 Jewish girls and boys at the Lewisohn Stadium Friday. Bands from the New York Hebrew Orphan Asylum and the City College R. O. T. C. played for the youngsters, who danced Jewish national dances and for the singing by the entire gathering.

The opening address was made by Magistrate Hyman J. Reit, president of the N. Y. branch of the United Synagogue of America, who urged the assembled youth to think of its duties first to God, second to their country, third to other and fourth to themselves.

Other speakers were Rabbi Israel Goldfarb of Congregation Brith Israel Anshei Emes, Brooklyn, and "Uncle Bob" Sherwood, the oldest living Barnum clown.

## Omaha Seeks \$42,000 for Jewish Philanthropies

Omaha, Neb., May 17—Three hundred workers, about equally divided between men and women, will set out Tuesday morning to raise \$42,000 for the Jewish Philanthropies of Omaha, a new organization composed of three local Jewish institutions and seventeen national and international causes.

The campaign will be opened with a mass meeting Monday evening at which Rabbi Solomon Goldman of Chicago will deliver the keynote address. On Tuesday morning a breakfast will be held at the Jewish Community Center immediately preceding the canvass. The campaign is being conducted under the general chairmanship of Sam Beber, with the assistance of Samuel Gerson, executive secretary, and an executive committee of nine members.

Children of kindergarten age are giving their pennies for this drive which will include a solicitation of the entire community.

## Nine Members of Adler Family Revive Jacob Adler's Triumph

Nine members of the family of the late Jacob P. Adler have come virtually from the four corners of the earth to participate in the revival of Jacob Gordin's "The Wild Man," the play in which Adler himself scored many a success.

It was presented, Friday, in the tradition as created by Adler when he first appeared in the play as Lemach; to which full justice is now being done by his son, Luther.

The play is reminiscent of late nineteenth century melodrama, where the rich old father marries a young woman, who robs him of his money, betrays him, and is the cause of his children's alienation. It is full of drama and pathos and despite its potentialities for burlesque that would appeal to a modern audience, the Adlers succeeded in maintaining a sober and sincere unity throughout the play which was indeed worthy of their name.

## Buy Land in Nathanyah Colony

Elias and Samuel Gurvitz of Los Mochis, Sinaloa, Mexico, bought land through the Erezisrael Land Agency, New York City, in the new colony, Nathanyah, named in honor of Nathan Strauss, and will plant orange groves there, according to an announcement by the land company.

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
