Good Harvest Expected in Russian Jewish Colonies (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, May 27-A good harvest which will exceed the returns in previous years is expected in the Jewish colonies this year, declared Dr. Joseph Rosen, director of the work of the Agro-Joint in Russia, who has just returned from a tour of the colonies in Crimea and Ukrainia. The only exep-tion to the good harvest report is in the Kalinindorf region where the local Jewish Communists have reduced the Jewish colonists to such a condition during the enforced collectivization period that a considerable time will elapse before the impoverished colonists there can return to normality.

Document Indicates Jesse Seligman Sought Vatican Aid in Czarist Persecution of Jews

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Moscow, May 27-A secret document

from the archives of the Czarist government, revealing the part played by the Vatican in the anti-Semitic persecutions in Czarist Russia is published in today's "Isvestzia", the official government organ. Last week the same paper published a document from a similar source indicating the role of the Vatican in the famous Beilis case.

The second document is a report dated April 19, 1892 from the Czarist ambassador in Rome, M. Yizvalsky, to the Russian foreign minister in St. Petersburg, wherein M. Yizvalsky points out that the Jewish banker, Se-ligman, from the United States, had come to Rome in order to induce the Vatican to use its influence with the Czar to raise the restrictions against the Jews in Russia.

immigration ban and the activities of the Brith Shalom Society was discussed at an all night session of the All-Palestine conference of General Zionists. Col. Frederick Kisch, chair-man of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, and Rabbi Meer Berlin attended.

Roumanian Deputy Asks Why No Measures Taken Against Paper Spreading Anti-Semitism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Bucharest, May 27-A question as to

why no measures have been taken against the incitement of the official Cuzist organ in Constanz, the "Stralucidoro," which has been urging the peasants "to kill the Jews and burn their synagogues" was raised today in Deputy Lutchian. Minister of Industry Madgearu replied that the matter was within the jurisdiction of the Constanz district attorney but that he would nevertheless draw the matter to the attention of the Minister of Justice.

Quoting M. Lutchian's interpellation, the Bucharest daily, "Dimineatza", says that while it does not desire to draw an analogy in the attitude towards the Jews between the Constanz district Attorney and the Jassy police "the happenings of last week do not justify any optimistic expectations as a result of the Minister's interven-

The Jewish paper "Unser Zeit", published in Kishinev, states that the re-port of Inspector Coma, who investigated the Targufromos affair recommended the removal of the Jassy police inspector, M. Ganya for his mal-treatment of the arrested Jews who

In a number of Bessarabian villages in the vicinity of Kishinev "Unser Zeit" has been confiscated by the authorities. An editorial in "Unser vigorously protests against the confiscation declaring that the reason given by the local authorities was that it was not permissible to write anything about Prince Carol. Protesting against this "limited view", the editor-ial emphasizes that while it realizes that the confiscation was undertaken at the behest of the local authorities it is regrettable that the government permits such action.

Dreyfus Asks Publication of Documents in His Case (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 27-Captain Alfred Dreyfus, the Jewish officer in the French army who was the central figure in the famous Dreyfus Affair two generations ago, on his recent visit here to Bruno Weil, author of a book on the Dreyfus Affair, declared that he had demanded the publication of all the documents in his case by the French Foreign Office but the government had given him an unsatisfactor, reply.

M. Weil said today that the French League for Human Rights is bringing the matter to the attention of the French Parliament. M. Weil describes Captain Dreyfus as a friendly old officer, optimistic and with no signs of bitterness. Madame Dreyfus, he says, is supporting 350 indigent families.

Papal Legate in Jerusalem May Be Asked to Resign

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Rome, May 27—The possibility of the resignation of Monsignor Louis Barlassina, Papal Legate in Jerusalem, is admitted by the Italian press here. An American news agency recently reported that the British Colonial Office had made a formal request to the Cardinal for Foreign Affairs of the Vatican asking that he be retired from his post because of his alleged activities in hampering a rapprochement between Jews and Arabs in Palestine.

Although agreeing that Monsignor Barlassina's recall is possible the Italian papers deny that the request, if one was made, of the British Colonial Office has anything to do with it. In the meantime the Catholic newspapers utilize the news as an opportunity for attacking the Zionists, accusing them of using their influence in British government

First Woman Judge in Bukhara Is Jewish Girl (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Old Bukhara, May 27-The first wom-an judge in a Soviet court at Bukhara is a Jewish girl from Samarkand. She has been appointed as judge in a Jewish has been appointed as juage in a Jewish court specially opened for the Bukharian Jews. Jewish women in Bukharian the the Soviet rule are permitted to go about unveiled, something not allowed under the previous regime. While many Moslem women here continue to cover their faces the Jewish women have abandoned the veil.

Over 500 Jewish women occupy important posts in social and cultural works in Bukhara under the Soviets, according to official information obtained here. A certain percentage of them have left the Jewish religion but a majority of them have remained Jewesses according to traditional Judaism.

The Bukharian Jewish girls do not yet know anything about Soviet marriages for in Bukhara marriages are still performed according to the old Bukharian Jewish customs and traditional orthodoxy.

British Sergeant Murdered by Stranger Who Called Him "Jew"

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, May 27—Sergeant William Singleton of the British division of the Palestine police force was murdered last night in Haifa on the shores of Acre Bay. Sergeant Single-ton was one of the oldest members of the British section of the police and was originally a member of the Irish

He was accompanied by a Jewish giri when accosted by a stranger who called him a Jew. The stranger, re-turning about twenty minutes later, shot him dead. The culprit has not yet been apprehended. No political motive Senate in supplementary elections in the is attributed to the crime by the police who have instituted an investigation.

Parade and Mass Meeting Plan of N. Y. Zionists as Protest on British Policy

A huge street demonstration and parade was selected as the means of expressing the protest of New York Iewry against the British policy in to make the necessary arrangements from the thirty-nine Zionist districts of the city, held Monday night at the Pennsylvania Hotel. The committee was also empowered to arrange a mass meeting to be held in conjunction with the demonstration if it saw fit.

The protest will not be directed solely against the recent action of the British Colonial office in cancelling immigration permits, a number of speakers declared, but against the British policy in general as not being consonant with the spirit and letter of the

Balfour Declaration.

Jewish Workers Protest

Nearly 1,500 men and women gathered at a demonstration held at Cooper Union Monday evening to applaud the sharp criticism levied against the British Labor government for its recent order suspending immigration to Palestine and to approve unanimously a resolution protesting against the order which will be forwarded to Prime Min-ister MacDonald, Lord Passfield, the Colonial Secretary, the British Labor Party and the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine.

The meeting was held under the ausmittee for Palestine, the Central Com-mittee of the Poale Zion and of the Zeire Zion, general executive of the Jewish Workers' National Alliance and the Pioneer Women's Organization.

Criticizes Hoover, Coolidge, and Harding for Failure to Name Cardozo to Supreme Court

Praise for Chief Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo of the New York State Court of Appeals on the occasion of his sixtieth birthday and criticism of the last three presidents for their failure to appoint Cardozo to the United States Supreme Court bench, is contained in an enitorial in yesterday's "New York Telegram", which characterizes Judge Cardozo as "the most adroit and enlightened juristic guidance available in

"Cardozo has been the leader among active jurists in the United States in the effort to see law as a product of social opinions and institutions", says the can be no sound conception of law which is not based upon a full knowledge of man, human nature and social institutions. His 'Nature of the Judicial Process' and 'The Growth of the Law have influenced legal thinking in America more than any other two treaties of their type in the whole history of our legal publications.

"We may well congratulate Judge Cardozo and New York State. But we cannot say as much for the United States of America. The fact that he is sixty years of age and is not yet on the bench of the Supreme Court of the United States is but a reminder of what we have lost through the negligence of cui Chief Executives during the last decade. This failure to appoint Judge Cardozo would in itself alone be a suf-ficient proof of the lack of vision and statesmanship on the part of Harding, Coolidge and Hoover

Cincinnati Seeks \$100,000 for Allied Jewish Campaign (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cincinnati, May 27—The Jewish Community Council here voted to seek \$100,000 as Cincinnati's quota next Fall for the \$6,000,000 Allied Jewish Camration of the first joint campaign ever scheduled in Cincinnati for all Jewish fund-raising organizations not eligible to the Cincinnati community chest. In addition to this \$100,000 another \$100,000 or \$125,000 will probably be needed for other organizations expected to participate in the joint campaign.

Warburg and Baker Speak as Cleveland Temple Marks Its Eightieth Jubilee

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Cleveland, May 27-The two day celebration of the 80th jubilee of Temple Tifereth Israel, the spiritual leader of which is Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, was concluded here with a dinner at the Cleveland Hotel where more than 1,500 people applauded addresses by Felix M. Warburg and Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war. Mr. Baker spoke on the part "The Temple" played in Cleveland in the last 80 years while Mr. Warburg discussed the status of Reform synagogues in America.

Mr. Warburg, touching on the situa-tion in Palestine, assured Cleveland Jewry that there are no reasons to despair and expressed the wish that the recently created united front in American Jew-ish life might remain. He appealed to the Jews of Cleveland to make the \$6,000,000 Allied Jewish Campaign a success and he discussed this matter with leading Jews of the city.

The celebration, which was in the nature of a tribute to Rabbi Silver, was featured by the unveiling of a bronze bust of Rabbi Silver which was presented to "The Temple". A warm greeting from President Hoover as well as from other men prominent in religious and civic life were read.

The first day of the celebration opened with a sermon by Rabbi Silver. Later in the afternoon Mr. Warburg in an ad-dress at the Men's Club of "The Temple", appealed to the Iews of Cleveland to assist in the upbuilding and development of the Hebrew University.

\$105,000 Fund for Aged Home

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Providence, R. I., May 27-Nearly \$105,000 has been donated to the fund for a new Home for the Aged Jewish Men and Women in Rhode Island Judge J. Jerome Hahn and Samuel M. Magid are chairmen of the committee. The quota sought is \$150,000.

The University Religious Conference is composed of all creeds cooperating to encourage the spirit of religion among the university students. Meyer and Irving Hellman are the Iewish representatives on the business and building committee which consists of some of the most prominent citizens of all denominations in Los Angeles,

South African Zionists See Stoppage Breach of Declaration (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Capetown, May 27-Zionists from all parts of South Africa met here today to protest against the immigration ban ir. Palestine. The resolution that was adopted pointed out that the non-admis-sion of the immigrants, particularly since the Palestine government had granted permission for their entrance after it had satisfied itself that economic conditions justified it, is a breach of the Balfour Declaration.

The South African Zionists consider that the interests of Palestine were fully justified by the action of the Palestine administration in approving the admission of the immigrants and that the Colonial Office's veto "tends to weaken the administration and encourage further massacres". The resolution pledged the South African Zionists to continue their work for Palestine but appealed for "the upholding of promises made by successive English governments since

Polish Rabbis Call Fast to Protest Immigration Ban (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 27-A call for a fast, similar to the one on Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement) has been issued to the Jews of Poland by a conference of 100 rabbis meeting in the border states under the leadership of the Chofetz Chaim (Rabbi Israel Meyer Cohen) one of the most famous Polish rabbis. The call for a fast day is in protest against the immigration stoppage in Palestine.

"Pravda" Did Not Call Alex Gumberg "Deserter"

A dispatch from the Moscow cor-respondent of the J. T. A. published in the Bulletin of April 9th, regarding a letter printed in the Moscow "Prayda" from Alex Gumberg, a Director of the American-Russian Chamber of Commerce, had a statement that Mr. Gumberg denied that he gave up Soviet citizenship for American citizenship. A copy of the "Pravda" of April 7th has been received in New York since then, and shows that Mr. Gumberg's letter contains no such statement or any statement that can be so in-

Mr. Gumberg's letter was written in reply to an article signed by L. Ninin, published in the "Pravda" of February 8th, which Mr. Gumberg characterized in his letter in the "Pravda" as absolutely false and entirely lacking of foundation. Mr. Gumberg's "Pravda" letter also contains the following statement: "My reputation in the business circles in America and in the U. S. S. R., and my many years of work in connection with the development of economic relations between the United States and the U. S. S. R., make it unnecessary for me to make any further reply to misleading insinuations contained in Ninin's article.

Ninin's article, however, had no statement which called Mr. Gumberg a "deserter", as was reported in the J. T. A. dispatches.

Orthodox Union Forms Vaad Ha-Chinuch

(Jewish Daily Bulletin) Chicago, Ill, May 27—The Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations of Chicago, responsive to the fact that only 9 per cent of the Jewish children of Chicago receive a Hebrew education and that many of the independent Talmud Torahs are in financial straits has organized a Vaad Ha-Chinuch with N H. Bolotin as chairman, B. Morris and Gerstein as vice chairmen and A. Shapiro as secretary.

An appeal will be made on the second day of Shuvuouth in the synagogues, when the aims and aspiration of the Vaad for Jewish education will be explained. Arrangments are also being made by the women's auxiliaries for a \$25 luncheon at which one thousand women are expected to attend. Mrs. L. Cohen will be chairman of this affair.

The Vaad Ha-Chinuch is to consist of representatives of the Kehillah, representatives of the Misrad Horabbonim and a representative of each Tal-mud Torah. Relief Must Be Continued

"You will find people who are tired of giving, who do not believe that dispenser of philanthropy in European countries, that these countries existed before the War without our help and should do so again. Some of us have felt that way too, but when you see the struggles that they have to make in contrast to the life over here, when you see the handicans and the conditions put into their way, you feel that our efforts ought to be continued for that before the War the Jews in these countries stood entirely on their own feet. At that time innumerable small societies existed who spent money collected in their own little groups through people who went over there and dispensed it in a haphazard fashion wellmeaning though they were. Today we get these contributions for our efforts and we may truthfully say that no soft-hearted, poorly directed spending of charity funds takes place any more. "If you have traveled in these dif-

ferent countries, you know you still find the children born in the years of the War and during the aftermath suffering from rickets and tuberculosis. efforts which as you know have to be of longer duration and are expensive. Even countries like Germany, though they have made a brave struggle since the War and have asked for mighty little, are not blessed by nature with altitude and mountain air such as is needed for tubercular care.

"Russia's troubles are known to some of us in detail. That struggle is so big that no private effort could make any great impression, but the 200,000 and more Jews who live on the farm today more Jews who live on the farm today are not struggling as they did in the famine. They are bringing up their children under their eyes as strong, healthy citizens and, notwithstanding the many new and unproven theories surrounding them, these children are brought up with reverence for home life and the knowledge of what Jewish home ideals mean. The late Felix Fuld, who was president of the Federation for more than six years, was known to be strongly opposed to the use of the racial terms by the political bodies.
