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Protest Blood Ritual Tales in University of Riga

Riga, June 6—The Jewish members of the Latvian parliament have filed an urgent protest with the Minister of Justice and the president of the University against tolerating the spread of ritual murder tales in the University. Faked photographs depicting Jews killing Christian children and using their blood for religious rites have of late been distributed among the students.

Merriman to Plead for Urphali Before Privy Council

Jerusalem, June 6—Sir Boyd Merriman, eminent English barrister and the legal representative of the Jews before the Palestine Inquiry Commission, will plead before the Privy Council for Joseph Mizrahi Urphali, the only Jew condemned to death in Palestine, when his appeal comes before the highest legal tribunal of the British Empire.

Simpson Hears Zionist and Non-Zionist Attitude on Agency

Jerusalem, June 6—The attitude of the Non-Zionists within the Jewish Agency was explained today to Sir John Simpson by Maurice Hexter, American member of the Palestine executive of the Jewish Agency, when Sir John visited the Agency's headquarters. Col. Frederick Kisch, Rabbi Meer Berlin and Joseph Sprinzak presented the Zionist attitude. Sir John later visited the offices of the Jewish National Council.

Thuringian Landtag to Get Anti-Schechita Legislation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, June 6—The Thuringian government has decided to place before the provincial parliament a law forbidding schechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering. Several days ago this action was foreshadowed. The Bavarian government early last week announced that the anti-schechita law in that state would go into effect Oct. 1.

Members of Semitic Union Ordered to Stay in at Night

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 6—The members of the recently organized Semitic Union have been ordered by the district officer in Nabulus to furnish security for their good behavior, to remain indoors at night and not conduct any propaganda, according to the Arab daily "Falastin". The Union favors Arab-Jewish cooperation.

Mandates Commission Vice- President Attacks Inexactitudes of Shaw Commission's Report

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, June 6—Severe criticism of the Palestine Inquiry Commission's report was contained in an elaborately prepared address read to the Mandates Commission by its vice-chairman, D. van Rees. The entire morning session was devoted to M. van Rees' address in which he pointed out many inexactitudes and inconsistencies contained in the report. His criticisms were generally favorable to the Jewish point of view. H. C. Luke, chief secretary of the Palestine government, and acting High Commissioner, was severely criticized by M. van Rees.

At the afternoon session the Mandates Commission concluded its chronological examination into the incidents from September, 1928, to August, 1929, and their immediate causes. This was followed by an inquiry into the deepening causes of the disturbances and the responsibilities involved in them. The two British spokesmen, Mr. Luke and Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary for the colonies, furnished supplementary information and replied to questions.

A charge that the Jewish communities outside of Palestine, particularly the United States, who demanded wide immigration to Palestine, were entirely ignoring the difficulties of the Mandatory power, was made by Dr. Shiels in replying to a question regarding immigration. The Jews of the United States were more blamed for providing the financial sinews that enable East European Jews to go to Palestine than for sending immigrants of their own.

Roumania Not to Consider Jewish Communities Congress Decision Before Drafting Final Statutes Governing Jewish Communities Law

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, June 6—The Roumanian Minister of Cults has dropped the plan of calling a national congress of Jewish communities to consider the regulations which will govern the application of the Jewish communities law before they go into effect, declared Ministerial Director Bradisteanu to the Jewish Deputy, M. Fisher, according to dispatches in the Czernowitz papers just received here.

The reason given for abandoning the idea of a Jewish communities congress was that a similar conclave had proven fruitless in Hungary, and hence the Roumanian government had decided to call instead a small conference of representatives of the Jewish communities and of the largest Jewish organizations.

Anti-Semitic Editor Sentenced for Attack on Jews in Hungary

Budapest, June 6—John Repassy, editor of an anti-Semitic weekly paper, has been sentenced by the penal court to a fortnight's imprisonment for an inciting article attacking the Jews. Repassy's article had alleged that the Jews were governing Christians despite the fact that the government was Christian. He had also charged that houses and fields were gradually passing into Jewish hands.

In pronouncing the sentence, the judge said that the penalty was comparatively light but he took into consideration the editor's ignorance. He had had only an elementary school education.

Hamel Jewish Community Fears Hitlerite Agitation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, June 6—The Jewish community of Hameln is greatly excited over leaflets being distributed by the National Socialist party which urges that the Jews be beaten wherever found because "they slaughtered our comrades." The anti-Semitic agitation arises from a quarrel between a Jewish bank official who slapped a member of the National Socialists after the latter had insulted him.

The Central Association of German Citizens of Jewish Faith has sent a representative to Hameln to help the Jewish population there and has also launched a permanent campaign to curb the growing anti-Semitism in Thuringia.

Lloyd George and Stanley Baldwin also acknowledged receipt of copies of the memorandum.

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Krass Presents Jewish View at North Carolina Symposium

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chapel Hill, N. C., June 6—Speaking here, on the subject, "Why I Am a Jew," at a Protestant-Catholic-Jewish symposium held at the University of North Carolina last week, Rabbi Nathan Krass of Temple Emanuel-Et, New York City, declared that one of the main reasons for his belief in the Jewish faith was probably because he was born and reared in it. It was his belief that one's religion depends largely upon his geography and his racial antecedents. "We are born in one faith," stated Rabbi Krass, "and it is usually in that faith we remain."

The point of view of the Catholics was presented by Hon. R. D. Douglas, former Attorney General of North Carolina, and that of the Protestants by Dean Russell of the School of Religion of Duke University. At the conclusion of his plea for good-will among religions, in answer to a question, Dr. Krass was given a hearty ovation by the large audience which had assembled for the symposium.

Would Appeal to League If Britain Does Not Heed Demands

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cincinnati, June 6—Watchful waiting and a demand on the British government to restore to 3,300 Jewish laborers their right to immigrate to Palestine was urged by Rabbi James G. Heller, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America at a protest mass meeting held under the auspices of the Bureau of Jewish Education.

Rabbi Heller declared "let us be patient and if the British government does not pay heed to our demands then let us go to the League of Nations and plead to the people of the world for our cause". A. H. Friedland, director of the Cleveland Bureau of Jewish Education, and Samuel Schmidt, editor of "Every Friday", also spoke. A resolution of protest against British policy in Palestine was adopted.

25,000 New York Jews Turn Out in Impressive Parade to Protest Against Great Britain's Policy in Palestine

Despite the sweltering heat 25,000 New York Jews turned out late Thursday afternoon in a street parade and demonstration under the auspices of the New York Zionist Region to protest against the British government for the suspension of immigration to Palestine. Promptly at 5 P. M. Rabbi Stephen S. Wise opened the demonstration with an impassioned address to the huge crowd that packed the Madison Avenue side of Madison Square and declared "we do not want to be the scapegoats of British imperialism in India."

The parade then began moving down Fifth Avenue. Led by the octogenarian Nissim Behar and a section of aged and bearded rabbis who chanted Hebrew songs as they marched, the parade proceeded slowly to 14th Street. East to Second Avenue and then to Rutgers Square via the Bowery, Grand Street and Ludlow Street.

All Sections of Jewry Represented

All sections of New York Jewry, including several thousand school children, were represented in the line of march which was greeted with cheers and applause from the thousands who lined the streets as the parade reached the East Side. Banners and slogans expressing dissatisfaction with the British policy and asking "Did the Balfour Declaration Die with Balfour?" and "Have Jewish Soldiers Died in Vain?" were carried by the marchers who plodded the nearly four mile route singing Hebrew psalms.

The grand marshal of the parade was Captain Julius S. Berg, grand commander of the Jewish War Veterans, who despite his leg injury in the World War, courageously walked three quarters of the way. Stretched out in a long line behind Capt. Berg, his fellow Jewish war veterans and the venerable Nissim Behar, who never raised his head from the Hebrew periodical he was reading, were members of the Jewish Legion, thousands of members of the various Jewish labor groups, Jewish national and fraternal organizations and a number of prominent Zionists, including Judge Bernard Rosenblatt, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Jacob de Haas, Dr. Samuel Margoshes, Bernard Deutsch, Congressman William Sirovich, former Congressman Nathan Perlman and ex-attorney general Carl Sherman.

Despite the fact that the parade turned into Fifth Avenue at the height of the evening traffic rush, everything ran smoothly as the two hour procession wended its way to Rutgers Square. Cheers greeted the school children and the halutzim as well as the Jewish war veterans and the Jewish Legionnaires. The most impressive bit of the parade was the total unconcern with which the aged rabbis plodded along with the white-bearded Nissim Behar at their head.

Crowds Join Demonstration

When the vanguard of the parade reached Rutgers Square it was welcomed with a sustained burst of applause and the crowds broke the police

lines to join the procession and listen to the speeches delivered from a balcony of the building of the "Day."

Among those who spoke at Rutgers Square were Judge Rosenblatt, Berl Locker, Chaim Greenberg, Mordecai Danzig, Dr. Juris and Dr. S. Margoshes. A resolution adopted by acclamation called on England to fulfill the Mandate obligations by permitting free immigration to Palestine within the country's economic capacity and by cooperating with the upbuilding efforts of the Jewish people. It also urged England to place the administration of the country in the hands of officials sympathetic with the aims of the Balfour Declaration and the Mandate.

55 Organization Unite in Protest

The following were among the 55 organizations that participated in the impressive demonstration which was so long that when the head of the line reached Rutgers Square many of the marchers had not yet left Madison Square:

Union of Orthodox Rabbis of America, New York Board of Jewish Ministers, New York Association of Cantors, Mizrahi (the orthodox wing of the Zionist organization), Hadassah (women's Zionist organization of America), New York Zionist Region, Order Sons of Zion, Zionist Revisionists, Yeshiva College of America, Avukah (students' Zionist Federation), Junior Guard, Young Judah, Young Israel, Junior Mizrahi, Menorah, Women Pioneers, Poalei-Zion, Jewish National Workers' Alliance, Zei Zion, Independent Order Brith Abraham, Agudath Ezrath Galilee, B'nai Erez Israel, Jewish Sports Clubs.

Rabbi Wise's Speech

Rabbi Wise, in his speech that launched the parade, said, among other things:

"Better for England to have denied us at the outset, than to have granted our wishes and now to have betrayed us. The suspension of the immigration permits into Palestine in purely political interests, after they were granted by the High Commissioner, is a suspension of the mandate. We are gathered not to let the Balfour declaration merely become another scrap of paper in the history of the nations, and to the end that England may not be the England of Luke but the England of Balfour. The day may come when England may need friends. In that day it will be not the Arab people, but the Jewish people, who will befriend them."

"What is it we now ask of Britain? To keep its word to facilitate the establishment of the Jewish National Home. And if we must lose faith in Great Britain (and it is the last thing in the world that we wish to do), let us remember that as for ourselves, however threatening the hour, 'our hope is not destroyed.'"

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Rabbi Perelmutter Gets Post-Mortem Decoration from Poland

Warsaw, June 6—Rabbi Zevi Perelmutter, the oldest rabbi in Poland who died yesterday at the age of 90, has received post-mortem the highest Polish honor, "Polonia Restituta" according to a presidential decree published today in the "Monitor Polski", the official government organ. Letters of condolence have been received from various members of the cabinet and other leading government officials by his four daughters and five sons.

The venerable rabbi was buried today with a public funeral at the expense of the Jewish community. Many government representatives followed the body to the grave while Premier Sawek sent his condolences. The Rabbinate has declared a special period of mourning.

Dallas Congregation

Honors Rabbi Cohen

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Dallas, June 6—Rabbi Henry Raphael Cohen of Congregation Shaareth Israel was honored by his congregation at a reception here and reelected for another three year term although his present term still has a year to run. Rabbi Cohen is now studying medicine at Baylor University.

Judge Pam Lost \$2,500,000 by His Untimely Death

Chicago, June 6—Had the late Judge Hugo Pam, Superior Court Judge and Zionist leader of this city, who died in New York last week, lived twenty days longer, he would have inherited a quarter share of a \$2,500,000 estate, it was revealed yesterday when his will was filed for probate. After June 17, Judge Pam and his three sisters would have benefited from the estate of their brother, Max Pam, which has been held in trust for five years until that date.

Roumanian Jews in Canada

Protest Roumanian Excesses

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal, June 6—A resolution protesting against the violent acts that are at present being perpetrated against the Jews of Roumania and calling for the restoration of law and order and the protection of minority rights, was adopted at a special meeting of the Canadian Alliance of Roumanian Jews held here this week.

Alderman Joseph Schubert, in a speech, pointed out that the atrocities perpetrated against the Jews of Roumania have assumed serious proportions and are equal to the darkest days of Roumania. While in some countries, said the Alderman, such indignities committed against the Jews were usually perpetrated by the lowest ranks in the nation, in Roumania today, however, it is the more dangerous because the inspiring force is Professor Cuza, regarded as an intellectual power, who is backed by students. He also stated that the Roumanian government is quite indifferent about the situation, and in some cases it is even willing to have it continue.

Public Opinion on the Allied Jewish Campaign

This is the eighth of a series of letters from prominent leaders in the American Jewish community showing what they have to say about the \$5,000,000 Allied Jewish Campaign.

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LEE K. FRANKEL

Dear Mr. Rosenberg:

The Allied Jewish Campaign has my active support for four reasons:

1. Because I am a Jew.
2. Because I have been in Poland, Galicia, Hungary, on the borders of Russia, and in Palestine, and have seen the conditions there.
3. Because the present campaign is the first concerted attempt on the part of Jewry in the United States to aid in the rehabilitation of Jews across the ocean.
4. Because the money to be collected will go far towards making fellow-Jews in Europe and in Palestine self-supporting and independent.

In elaboration of these reasons, I might add under

1. If each of the 1,800,000 Jews in Greater New York would give his share, the New York quota would be much more than over-subscribed.

2. I am confident that under the wise guidance of the Joint Distribution Committee, many Jews in Eastern Europe can be established in trades and small business enterprises and thus enable them to earn a livelihood under the new conditions prevailing there. I am equally confident that if assistance can be given to Palestine for a limited number of years, the Jews now there and those who may migrate within the next few decades will not only become self-sustaining, but will be able to develop successful agricultural and industrial communities.

3. We Jews in the United States desire the respect of our neighbors. We can gain this only by developing our own self-respect. The Allied Jewish Campaign is the first attempt of all elements of American Jewry to join in an undertaking which will do both.

4. If one remembers that the Jews of the United States have within the last few years spent nearly \$50,000,000 for new synagogues, there should be no difficulty in raising \$2,500,000 in New York City and \$6,000,000 throughout the United States.

Jew with Byrd Expedition

Honored by War Department

Washington, June 6—Technical Sergeant Benjamin Roth, one of the two Jewish members of the Byrd Expedition, has been promoted to master sergeant for excellent work during the Byrd Antarctic Expedition. The usual method of procedure which requires competitive examinations, has been waived by Secretary of War Hurley, in view of Sergeant Roth's absence. Admiral Byrd has attested to his ability.

Arab Memorandum to League Demands Palestine Parliament

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, June 6—A demand for the creation of a parliament in Palestine, in which the various sections of the Palestine population are to be represented according to their numbers, the numbers to be determined by religious affiliations, is contained in the memorandum which has just been presented by the Palestine Arab Executive to the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations.

The Palestine Arab Executive bases its demand for a parliament upon Article 22 of the League of Nations constitution and upon Article 2 of the Palestine Mandate. Nevertheless their memorandum states that they do not recognize the Palestine Mandate, regarding it as an illegal document.

The Arabs of Palestine will be offered a legislative council immediately by the British government as an initial measure towards the eventual creation of the representative government they have been asking for Palestine, the New York World's Geneva correspondent cables on reliable authority.

The World's dispatch says that the announcement of the establishment of the legislative council will come through the High Commissioner of Palestine as soon as the inquiries now under way by the League of Nations Wailing Wall Commission and Sir John Simpson are completed.

The proposed legislative council would consist of one representative for every 25,000 Palestine inhabitants, which on the basis of the present population would mean six Jewish representatives and 34 Arabs and Christians. For the time being, the World reports, the British administration will insist upon reserving the executive and judicial power to the Mandatory power and will also retain the veto power over the legislative council as a safeguard against discriminatory legislation and the authority to formulate necessary laws, which the council might refuse to enact.

The World's correspondent cables that in the highest Moslem sources it is learned that Conservative Arabs are learned to accept anything that Great Britain offers, provided it does not mean relinquishment of their ideal—the creation of a sovereign Palestine state.

It is also understood that a majority of the members of the Mandates Commission would approve immediate establishment in Palestine of a parliament with legislative powers, but only provided Great Britain continues its administration of the affairs of the country in accordance with the terms of the existing Mandate.

Jewish Students' Union Asks

Increase and Is Sponsoring

Vilna, June 6—Because of repeated demands for an increased subsidy the activities of the Jewish Students' Union at the University of Vilna have been suspended by the University's rector, it was announced today.

Mt. Clemens, Mich. Board of Commerce Starts Movement Against Hebrew Koshers Signs

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mt. Clemens, Mich., June 6—Evidence of an anti-Semitic movement has cropped up in Mt. Clemens, the mineral bath city which annually attracts thousands of Jews from every section of the land.

The board of commerce of Mt. Clemens, in a letter addressed to all members of the board, advocates that all local signs in the Hebrew language bearing the information that hotels and restaurants serve "strictly kosher" meals be removed and that they be replaced with English signs. The board of commerce advocates this "in fairness to everybody concerned," the letter stating that 98 per cent of the population as well as of the visitors are non-Jews who do not appreciate Jewish signs. Local residents dispute the accuracy of these figures.

The letter of the board of commerce also objects to the display of signs on many non-Jewish hotels reading "strictly gentile" or "Gentiles only." The letter further states: "The good of the whole must be considered. We would like to suggest that if the kosher sign must go up that it be printed in English. Why leave these signs up the year round to accommodate a few visitors in the summer time?"

Epstein Gives Baltimore Valuable Rodin Bronze

Baltimore, June 6—The Baltimore Museum of Art today came into possession of one of the original bronze casts of Rodin's "The Thinker" (Le Penseur). The gift of Jacob Epstein, a member of the Baltimore Art Commission and art collector, the bronze has been installed at the foot of the steps leading to the museum entrance.

Mayor William F. Broening, who was present at the ceremonies today, expressed the city's appreciation of the gift. "I hope this gift," he said, "will arouse in other Baltimoreans a spirit similar to that which burns within Mr. Epstein's breast and that they will give of their art wealth."

The bronze is valued at \$20,000.

Baltimore J. N. F. to Hold Monster Bazaar

Baltimore, June 6—The Jewish National Fund Bazaar of Baltimore will open June 10 with a dinner to be addressed by Mayor William F. Broening. The bazaar will be held for three days in the state armory donated by Governor Ritchie. Fifty organizations with a total membership of 25,000 are participating.

N. Y. Business Leaders Pledge Aid to Allied Jewish Campaign

Leaders in the financial, industrial, real estate and insurance fields who were the guests of Felix M. Warburg, at a luncheon at the Mid-Day Club, Thursday, volunteered their services as canvassers in the "drive" of the New York Allied Jewish Campaign for \$2,500,000 toward \$6,000,000 that is being raised nationally for the 1930 budgets of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Those who were present at the luncheon and pledged their personal efforts to the campaign were Paul Mazur, Sam Rosoff, Roger W. Straus, Joseph Bach, Samuel Bayer, Louis E. Berman, C. J. Epstein, Elisha M. Friedman, Dr. Max Heller, Arthur C. Lampert, Alexander Landesco, Louis Lawinson, Dr. Henry Moskowitz, John Polachek, Joseph Polstein, Benjamin C. Census Reveals Jewish Exodus from Harlem

The exodus of Jews from Harlem to Washington Heights and the Bronx has caused a decrease in the population of many sections of Harlem, according to figures just made public by the Census Bureau. The preponderance of old tenement houses lacking modern conveniences is regarded as the chief reason for the exodus from Harlem. Besides the Bronx and Washington Heights, the Borough of Queens has also profited from the losses of Harlem.

Roumanians Will Not Call Jewish Communities Congress To Deliberate New Law

by the Roumanian legation in Washington confirmed reports in the Bucharest papers that Premier Maniu would take into consideration the decisions of a special congress of the Jewish communities before drafting the final regulations governing the application of the law.

Shortly after the Maniu government came into power the entire Jewry of Roumania was aroused by the abolition, without consulting the Jewish members of parliament or the organized Jewish community, of the law passed under the Bratianu regime which recognized the Jews as constituting one unified cult and a single community. In place of this law the Maniu government passed another one which if put into effect would have created chaos in the Jewish community. Roumanian Jewry has unanimously opposed the new law.

Jewish Infant Death Rate Reduced in Palestine

The death rate of Jewish infants in Palestine has been reduced from 131.3 per 1,000 births in 1925 to 90 per 1,000 births in 1929, while the infant mortality rate among the Arabs rose in that period from 200.5 to almost 305, according to a statement issued by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, which conducts the largest medical and health agency in the Holy Land. In 1928 there were 95 deaths of Jewish infants per 1,000 births, and 203 among Arabs.

These figures, the statement says, are taken from the 1929 report of the Department of Health of the Government of Palestine. It is pointed out that the infant mortality rate among Arabs, which is almost 44 percent higher than among Jews, reflects the difficulties encountered by modern medical institutions in Palestine in influencing the Moslems toward acceptance of scientific methods to replace superstitions and taboos. Of the 5,000 babies born of Jewish parents last year 3,800 were registered in the twenty-one health welfare centers of Hadassah, and nearly 950 in the three similar centers conducted by the Women's International Zionist Organization. Thus while ninety-four percent of the Jewish babies were given medical supervision and care the non-Jewish population took small advantage of the centers.

Wherever Jewish or Moslem populations predominate striking comparisons exist in the death rate. Whereas the wholly Jewish city of Tel Aviv had an infant death rate of about 75 per 1,000 in 1929, the wholly Arab town of Bethlehem lost over 300 and Nablus over 175 out of every 1,000 infants born. In Jaffa, which is preponderantly Arab, 200 out of every 1,000 Arab infants died. In Tiberias, which has a mixed population, the Arabs take more advantage of the Hadassah health service, and here the infant death rate was accordingly lower, 115 per 1,000.
