National Home and Not Jewish State England's Undertaking, Shiels Tells Mandates Body

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, June 10—Efforts must be made to see to it that the Jews throughout the world know that it is a Jewish National Home in Palestine and not a Jewish state that the Mandatory power undertook to advance. Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary for the colonies, told the Mandates Commission yesterday at the conclusion of its examination into the Palestine situation, in a statement on the policy pursued by Great Britain in Palestine.

Dr. Shiels declared that the ultimate success of the British policy in Palestine depended not on the machinery or attitude of the government but on the willingness of the two peoples to cooperate. Without that, he said, the Mandatory was constantly compelled to act as an empire instead of as a coordinating agency.

Stands for Full Mandate

In his statement, Dr. Shiels pointed out that the British government stood now "as in the beginning of its task for the full Mandate. That policy is not to be changed but measures have been or are being taken with a view to the application of a policy more effective and utilizing the lessons of the past".

As to the defence of Palestine, the British spokesman said that the police

Kaufman Nominated U. S. Minister to Siam

Washington, June 10—David A. Kaufman of Philadelphia has been nominated by President Hoover as American minister to Siam. Mr. Kaufman is a former U. S. Minister to Bolivia. He resigned his Bolivian post some months ago after having been intimately connected with the settlement of the Tacna-Arica dispute between Peru and Chile in which Bolivia figured as an interested third party.

Mr. Kaufman is a lawyer who has specialized in international affairs. For many years he has been active in Pennsylvania politics although he never held any elective office. He had at one time been considered as United States Ambassador to Poland.

King Honors Chief

Rabbi of Sweden

Stockholm, June 10—Dr. Marcus Ehrenpreis, Chief Rabbi of Sweden for the last sixteen years, was today honored with the Chevalier of the North Star Order on the occasion of King Gustav's nameday.

Warburg Characterizes American Jews as "Invisible Reserve"

Philadelphia, June 10—Characterizing the Jews of America as the "invisible reserve", Felix M. Warburg told an audience of distinguished Jews here that the duty of American Israel is to strengthen the hands of its leadership by subscribing generously to the \$6,000,000 now being raised by the Allied Jewish Campaign.

Mr. Warburg was the guest of honor at a dinner preliminary to the launching of the Philadelphia campaign for \$400,000. In his address he reviewed the works of the Joint Distribution Committee in 42 countries, emphasizing the extraordinary achievement in Palestine. Referring to American Jews, Mr. Warburg said "if not for this invisible reserve there would be no Jews in Palestine and there would be no Jews in Russia.

"These threads are holding us together. In many European countries Jews are already standing on their feet. Help them to walk."

In addition to the financial aspect, Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee, in his address emphasized the moral issues involved. Over-subscribing the quota, he said, will do more than adopting resolutions or staging demonstrations. Over-subscription, he added, will find its repercussion in the parliaments of Europe. Dr. Adler explained the purposes for which the money is intended and called upon the leaders of the Jewish community to help put the campaign over.

Congressman Benjamin M. Golder, local campaign chairman who presided, announced that the drive here would be officially opened next Sunday with David Bressler, one of the national co-chairmen, as the principal speaker.

Ruppin and Hexter Express Confidence in Simpson

Jerusalem, June 10—Satisfaction with the open-mindedness and fairness of Sir John Simpson, who is here for a survey of land settlement, immigration and development problems, was expressed by Maurice Hexter, member of the Jewish Agency Executive, and Dr. Arthur Ruppin, agricultural expert. Both Mr. Hexter and Dr. Ruppin have been in constant touch with Sir John, the former having lunched with him yesterday at the house of the High Commissioner.

Mr. Hexter, who is an American, is leaving for home at the end of this week. On his way he will stop off at London to attend the meeting of the political commission of the Jewish Agency which has been called for June 23.

Tarbuth Schools of Poland Lose Privileges by Decree of Minister of Education

Warsaw, June 10—The Hebrew-speaking "Tarbut" high-schools of Poland have just had all their privileges taken away from them by the Polish government, according to the latest decision of the Minister of Education.

Until now these high-schools had received certain privileges only for their lower classes, but because of the good reports rendered about them recently by the government inspectors, they had expected that these privileges would be extended to their upper classes as well.

In answer to the latest order of the Minister of Education taking away even their former privileges, the directors of the "Tarbut" schools have issued a statement in which they say:

"This order reveals a hostile attitude towards the Hebrew school system and a desire to force Jewish parents to change the Hebrew schools for Polish. These assimilationist tendencies will surely meet with energetic resistance on the part of Jewry and will not weaken the fight of the Hebrew schools for their rights".

See Immigration Stoppage Harming Palestine Industry

Jerusalem, June 10—A resolution declaring that the expansion of Palestinian industry is injured by the suspension of immigration was adopted today by the Federation of Jewish Industrialists in the presence of K. W. Stead, Palestinian director of trade and customs, who was asked to submit the protest to the government.

On behalf of the London Economic Board, S. Goldwater supported the resolution, saying that he had come to Palestine a Britisher but that he had become a Jew here. He declared that in view of the immigration stoppage he and thousands of others who had come to Palestine felt that they had come under false pretences.

Jabotinsky Asks Reinstatement as Permanent Palestine Resident

London, June 10—Unconditional repeal of the Palestine government's order cancelling his return visa to Palestine is demanded by Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists (opposition to the Weizmann regime) in a letter to the British Colonial Office. He urges his reinstatement as a permanent resident of Palestine free to engage in any form of activity not prohibited by law. Mr. Jabotinsky has just returned from a tour of South Africa where he addressed a number of Zionist meetings.

Jewish Center Secretaries Elect New Officers

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, June 10—At the last session of the national convention of Jewish Community Center Secretaries held yesterday at Hotel Statler, the principles governing senior age groups were discussed by Edward M. Kahn of Atlantic City and William Kolodny of Pittsburgh.

Gilbert Harris of St. Louis presided. Samuel Leff of New York presented a report of a survey of physical education work in Jewish Centers.

At a luncheon retiring Pres. A. W. Rosenthal, of New York, relinquished his office to E. J. Landow of Newark, N. J.

A message was read from Harry L. Glucksmann, executive director of the Jewish Welfare Board of New York. The new officers elected besides Mr. Landow are Maurice Bisgyer of Washington, Dr. M. C. Chaseman of Albany, N. Y., Wm. Pinsker, Savannah, Ga., Rose Sugarman, Milwaukee, vice-presidents; Wm. Cohen, Brooklyn, secretary-treasurer; Harry Albert, Paterson, N. Y., Allen Blum, Indianapolis, Mary Caplan, Bronx, N. Y., Paul Goldblatt, Harrisburg, Leo Harris, Brooklyn, Edw. M. Kahn, Samuel J. Rodman, Perth Amboy, and Samuel Shair, Scranton, executive committee.

Suspect Arab Delegation in Poland of Arms Smuggling

Warsaw, June 10—The suspicion that has gained ground here that the Arab commercial delegation from the Hedjaz which came here ostensibly to buy textiles for export has been engaged in the shipment of ammunition to the Near East via the Polish port of Gynia and Marseilles received confirmation when the French and English consuls here took precautions to examine the freight upon its arrival at Marseilles. Secrecy surrounds the activities of the Arab merchants who have instructed their agents to maintain silence regarding the contents of the freight.

U. S. No Longer Chief Country of Jewish Immigration, Jewish Social Service Parley Hears; Questions Promise to Stuyvesant

Boston, June 10—The United States is no longer the chief country of Jewish immigration although it continues to be one of several countries in this field, according to Dr. H. D. Linfield, director of the statistical department of the American Jewish Committee, who read a paper in the general symposium on "Post-War Changes in the Migration of Jews" at the National Conference of Jewish Social Service. Dr. Linfield submitted figures showing that during the last five years the first country of Jewish immigration had been Palestine, with the United States dropping to second place, and followed by the Argentine, Canada and Brazil in the order named.

Jewish Immigration to U. S.

Dr. Linfield pointed out that the volume of Jewish immigration has decreased more than that of other groups. In the five years preceding the war 525,000 Jews came to the United States, Canada, the Argentine, South Africa and other places. This was an average of 105,000 a year. The war gave rise to a new country of Jewish immigration, Palestine.

Jewish immigration since the war must be divided into two periods, that from 1920 to 1924 preceding the American quota system and that from 1925 to 1929. In the first period 395,000 Jews came to the United States, Palestine, Argentine and Canada, a yearly average of 79,000 a year, while in the second period these countries absorbed only 213,000 Jews, an annual average of 42,600. For the past five years Jewish immigration has been but 53 per cent of that of the period from 1920 to 1924 and but 40 per cent of that in the period from 1909 to 1913, he stated.

Questions Promise to Stuyvesant

The traditional tale that the Jews of New Amsterdam in 1652 promised Governor Peter Stuyvesant that they would take care of their own poor was questioned as to its authenticity and criticized in its sociological implications by Dr. I. M. Rubinow, grand secretary of the Constitution Lodge of the B'nai B'rith. Mrs. Cecelia Rosowsky, Jewish social worker from South America, proposed that American Jewish social leaders invite those from Latin America to participate in the next convention.

Problems of Homes for Aged

Problems of homes for the aged, attitudes of members of boards of directors toward their jobs, the need for separate Jewish hospitals in cities with large Jewish populations and the treatment of the child problem in the home were other subjects discussed. Judge A. K. Cohen of Boston said that the community should look with disfavor on the acceptance of voluntary positions in social work without the definite understanding that the same application which directors show in commercial affairs be exercised by these individuals in communal endeavors.

Arthur J. Cohen, superintendent of

the Home for the Aged and Infirm Hebrews of New York, discussed methods of business administration in a home for the aged. Recreation is an essential element in a program for wards in a home for the aged, declared Mrs. Switton, superintendent of the San Francisco Hebrew Home for the Aged and Disabled, in describing the spontaneous play, recreational and cultural program in vogue at her institution.

Participants in Discussion

Others who participated in this discussion were Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies in New York; Armin Berger of Cleveland, Max Schapiro of Pittsburgh and Edith Mozorosky of New York. Dr. Lowenstein described the San Francisco home program as a model for such institutions and Miss Mozorosky of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research pointed out that the individual background of the inmates must be considered before determining on the type of recreation suitable.

Separate Jewish Hospitals

The need of separate Jewish hospitals in large centers of Jewish population was considered at the Health section of the Conference. Those who took part in this discussion were Samuel A. Goldsmith, director of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research; Dr. John Slavson of the Jewish Welfare Federation, Ethel Cohen of the Beth Israel Hospital, Boston, and Boris Fingerhood of the United Israel Zion Hospital in Brooklyn.

Albert Lavenson, California

Philanthropist, Dies at 65

San Francisco, June 10—Albert S. Lavenson, merchant and philanthropist of Oakland, Calif., died at the age of 65 from heart disease, probably aggravated by exposure and exhaustion which he suffered some time ago when he was lost in the mountains. Mr. Lavenson was a member of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

He was also a music enthusiast and had presented the music department of Mills College with a \$50,000 endowment fund and had also taken a leading part in organizing the Oakland Grand Opera Association and the Bay Cities Opera Association.

Says Commons Would Oppose Giving Up of Mandate

London, June 10—The suggestion made yesterday by the Geneva correspondent that the British government might relinquish the Palestine Mandate to the League of Nations to a group of states including the United States would excite the keenest opposition in the House, writes the political correspondent of the "Morning Post." He points out that there is no probability that the government would agree to such a change.

North Dakota Jews Come Far to Open Allied Jewish Drive

Fargo, N. D., June 10—Representatives of North Dakota's 2700 Jews came from points 400 miles away to attend the state conference which opened the Allied Jewish Campaign here today at which Fargo contributors raised \$1,500 of the state's \$20,000 quota. Despite the agricultural and economic depression prevailing here the all-day conference which was addressed by Rabbi Albert G. Minda of Minneapolis expressed confidence that the quota would be raised.

Harry Lashkowitz of Fargo, prominent lawyer and B'nai Brith official, was elected state chairman of the drive and Herman Wilk, also of Fargo, was named treasurer. Max Rabinovich of Grand Forks was chosen honorary chairman.

"Daily Mail" Again Asks That England Relinquish Palestine

London, June 10—"The British public has noticed with annoyance the manoeuvres of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, which in attempting to put the British nation in the dock, is subjecting the British administration to bitter criticism for the performance of costly and thankless duties in Palestine," says an editorial in the "Daily Mail." The criticism, says the "Daily Mail," is by states none of whom would undertake "our unprofitable task with all its painful and expensive commitments. Financial stringency will force us to relinquish Palestine some day, and the sooner we are out of it the better."

Opening of Menorah Summer School to Be Observed July 7

The opening exercises of the 1930 Summer School conducted by the Menorah Association will take place on Monday evening, July 7 at 8:15 in the auditorium of the Jewish Institute of Religion. Dr. Cecil Roth, Fellow of the Royal Historical Society of England, will deliver a lecture on "Paradoxes of Jewish History."

The School will be held for six weeks beginning July 7 and ending August 15. All the lectures and classes will be held in the building of the Jewish Institute of Religion. The Menorah Summer School is open to college students and the general public.

Far Rockaway Raises \$18,000 for Allied Jewish Campaign

The New York Allied Jewish Campaign, which is raising \$2,500,000 toward the \$6,000,000 being sought nationally for Jewish relief in Eastern Europe and Palestine, announced yesterday that \$18,000 had been raised at a dinner at the Jewish Centre, Far Rockaway. Dr. Norman Salit presided and the speakers were Mrs. Irma Lindheim, former president of Hadassah; Justice Mitchell May and Rabbis Abraham Dubin and Irving Miller.

Yiddish Culture Society Branch Founded in Boston

Boston, June 10—A branch of the Yiddish Culture Society of the United States and Canada has just been organized here as an outgrowth of the course in Yiddish literature recently given by Dr. A. A. Roback under the auspices of the Massachusetts department of the University Extension and the Boston Community Institute. The Boston branch will hold bi-weekly meetings at the Jewish Welfare Center, Dorchester. For those of its members who do not yet speak and read Yiddish fluently, the society has organized free courses of instruction. It is also planned to organize a Yiddish dramatic club and a choral society.

Seymour Schiff Heads Board of Directors of Chicago Synagogue

Chicago, June 10—Seymour Schiff, one of the younger members of Anshe Emeth Synagogue of Chicago, was elected president to succeed Isadore Cohen, who has served for several terms, by the newly elected board of directors of the congregation. H. Kramer and Louis H. Harrison were named vice presidents; Samuel Phillipson, treasurer; A. G. Feldman, financial secretary, and Michael Atz, recording secretary. Rabbi Solomon Goldman is spiritual leader of the congregation.

Cleveland and Portland Zionists Join in Protest Against Britain

Cleveland, June 10—One of the greatest meetings in the history of Cleveland Jewry took place last evening in the Jewish Center Synagogue when speeches were made and a resolution adopted protesting against the stoppage of Palestine immigration and the issuance of the White Paper by the British government. Over four thousand Jews filled the great auditorium of the synagogue and at least two thousand were turned back. Those who were turned back stood for hours outside, expressing in this way their protest against the recent action of Great Britain.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver moved the great crowd to tears and many cried aloud when he declared that the Jews are not demanding any special favors, but merely want to come to Palestine to live and struggle for their national existence.

Condemns Britain for Betraying Jews

Another speaker was Max Hayes, editor of the "Citizen," official organ of the American Federation of Labor, one of the most prominent labor leaders in the Middle West and a personal friend of the Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. He assured the assembled Jews that organized labor in Ohio and the Middle Western states are in sympathy with them, and condemned the British Labor government for betraying the Jews.

Other speakers were former City Manager William R. Hopkins, former United States Senator Atlee Pomerene, Rabbi Harry S. Davidovich and Mr. Crouse, A. H. Friedland, superintendent of the Cleveland Hebrew Schools, read the resolution of protest which was adopted unanimously and which was sent to the British ambassador in Washington. A telegram from Congressman Charles Mooney, who declared that he intends to bring the question of the Palestine Mandate before Congress, and a message from Mayor Marshall, who was out of town, were read at the meeting.

Portland, Ore., June 10—A resolution protesting against the action of the British government in suspending Jewish labor immigration into Palestine was unanimously adopted at a meeting of the Portland Zionist District last week. The resolution declares that the policy pursued by the British government since the August disorders must tend to weaken the faith of the Jews in the intention of the Government of Great Britain to live up to the terms of the Mandate.

Urge Brandeis to Work for Unity

Another resolution adopted recently by the Portland Zionist District urges Justice Louis D. Brandeis "to help full-heartedly to bring about unity in American Zionism, since the Zionist District of Portland, Oregon, feels that with Justice Brandeis as an active participant in American Zionism, World Zionism will be strengthened and the Jewish National movement will benefit thereby."

force now has a greater margin of safety. Press excesses and seditious propaganda, he declared, would be under greater control.

Dr. Shiels said that "it is sometimes said that the British obligation to the Jews is a positive one and the obligation to the Arabs negative." He thought this a dangerous line of argument and believed that it was in the best and ultimate interests of the Jewish National Home that the non-Jewish part of the population should feel that the Mandatory was equally and actively solicitous for its welfare.

Cooperation of Peoples Essential

He also expressed the opinion that the principles and policy normally applied in the British dependencies were peculiarly suitable to Palestine "where the progress of a unique enterprise could only be won by the adaptation of lessons constantly being learned. Success however ultimately depends not on the machinery or the attitude of the government but on the willingness of the two peoples to cooperate. Without that the Mandatory is constantly compelled to act as an empire instead of as a coordinating agency. The Arab leaders must see that the scenes of last August are never repeated. The government is amenable to reason and argument but not to actions abhorrent to the spirit of civilization and progress."

Dr. Shiels also suggested that while National independence was good, the power and willingness to cooperate with another people was better. The Jewish leaders, on the other hand, he stated, must see that more trust is shown in those who have undertaken solemn obligations. Persistent criticism of government officials, he stated, was unwise and often unfair.

Great Hope for the Future

On the whole he thought there was reason for great hope for the future. He thanked the Mandates Commission for the thoroughness and care with which it had investigated the problem and expressed the hope that the week's proceedings would contribute to the welfare of all sections of the population of Palestine.

The annual report of the High Commissioner of Palestine will be discussed today and the extraordinary session of the Commission will be concluded by Thursday or Friday.

Jewish Student Wins N. Y.

Physical Fitness Contest

David Weiner, a 16-year old student at Seward Park High School on the lower East Side of New York was the winner of a physical fitness contest in which 28 boys were selected to compete from 65,000 male high school students, who comprise practically the entire male student body of the city's high schools. The contest was under the auspices of the P. S. A. L. and the 28 boys who were qualified to compete were presented with gold badges.

Sees Rabbinate as Business and Congregations Unconcerned With Learning of Rabbis

Six new rabbis were graduated from the Jewish Theological Seminary at the graduation exercises held at the Town Hall. They are: Elias Charry, Jacob Freedman, Edward E. Gelber, Jacob Kraft, Philip Lipsic and Joseph Zeitlin. Abraham L. Lassen received the degree of Doctor of Hebrew Literature. Diplomats of the Teachers Institute were awarded to 43 men and women.

Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the seminary who conferred the degrees, announced that among the gifts received during the past year were \$7,500 from the estate of Abraham L. Erlanger for the library, \$250,000 from the estate of Conrad Hubert and \$500,000 from Julius Rosenwald. The Rosenwald gift, said Dr. Adler, will be used in the establishment of a Louis Marshall Memorial Fund, if an equal sum is contributed by friends and admirers of Mr. Marshall, according to the intention of Mr. Rosenwald when he donated the \$500,000. Dr. Adler also announced gifts by Felix M. Warburg of the painting "The Rabbi", by Joseph Margolies, of a portrait of Louis Loeb by Leo Mielziner, presented by the artist.

That religion and the rabbinate today are regarded as a sort of business and that congregations are not concerned over the amount of learning possessed by their rabbis, was the statement made by Professor Israel Davidson of the Seminary in speaking to the graduates. Professor Davidson said:

Rabbi Supposed to Be Omniscient

"Today the rabbi is supposed to be an omniscient, a social worker, a campaign manager, a literary critic, a judge of art—everything except a scholar or a landau. You expect him at every marriage and funeral; he must be present at every public function; he must be up to date on every problem, economic, political, literary and social; you expect him to be nice to the ladies, to fondle the children; to shake hands with the Mayor, to pat the Alderman on the shoulder; to be interested in civic affairs; not to be strange to national questions; to pass an opinion on the force of the navy, the strength of the army, the future of aviation and the relation of relativity to the stock exchange; all possible and impossible subjects — but you never question whether you have left the Rabbi time to study the Talmud, the Midrash, Jewish philosophy, the works of Maimonides, Ibn Ezra or Juda Halevy, or the works of the modern scholars, Zunz, Rappaport, Luzzato, Geiger and a host of others."

No Place for Cowards

Sol M. Stroock, chairman of the board of directors of the Seminary, in a talk to the graduates warned them that the rabbinate was "no place for cowards or weaklings" and that there may be unpleasant and disheartening experiences ahead of them, for which they must be prepared.

Intercongregational Service Opens Jewish Part in Boston's Tercentenary Celebration

Boston, June 10.—The intercongregational service of thanksgiving and commemoration of Boston's tercentenary celebration held at Temple Ohabei Shalom, the second oldest Jewish congregation in New England, marked the first affair of the various features planned by the Jewish Tercentenary committee in connection with the general celebration. All of the leading rabbis of Greater Boston, state and municipal officials were present.

The principal address was made by Rabbi David de Sola Pool, rabbi of the Spanish Portuguese synagogue Shearith Israel in New York. Dr. Pool traced the influence of the Hebraic tradition upon early Puritan Boston. He pointed out that it "was the inspiration of the Jewish Bible which led the Puritan pioneers to these shores and it was that same Jewish literary guidance which determined the course of their lives as individuals and of the polity of the commonwealth which they built up.

"For those first settlers in Boston and in Massachusetts generally were devout and devoted readers of the Jewish scriptures. It was the Jewish Bible which provided them with their morals and ideals. The infant colony bringing no code of laws from the mother land looked up to Moses as their lawgiver, and in the organization of the colony and the administration of its courts, they definitely adopted the Mosaic code as their standard."

Other speakers were Rabbi H. H. Rubenovitz of Temple Mishkan Tefilah, chairman of the committee in charge of the meeting, Alexander Brin, editor of the "Jewish Advocate" and chairman of the Jewish Tercentenary Committee, Hon. Gaspar G. Bacon, president of the state senate, Samuel Silverman, corporation counsel of Boston and Charles F. Crowley, of the Brookline board of selectmen.

Hebrew University Willed

\$150,000 by Jewish Doctor

By the will of Dr. Benedict Weissman, which was filed on Monday in the Surrogate's Court in Brooklyn, \$150,000 will be donated to the Benedict Weissman Foundation for medical students in the Hebrew University in Palestine.
