Arabs Carry Out General Strike to Obtain Reprieve of Three Arabs to Be Hung

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 16—A general strike of the Arabs was carried out throughout Palestine yesterday. The strike was called by the Arab Executive in order to obtain the reprieve of the three Arabs who are to be executed on Tuesday in Acre. These Arabs were not included in the commutation of sentences which saved twenty-two others from the death penalty for their part in last August's disturbances.

The stoppage was said by a government official to be widespread. The Arab Executive announced that the stoppage had been successfully carried out in Nablus, Jenin, Haifa and Acre, according to telegrams received from those cities. No incidents occurred in Jerusalem or any other part of Palestine.

The strike called for Sunday obtained incidentally the participation of the Christian group which, as always, observed the Sabbath. The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, who made the rounds of the city, found that the majority of Arab shops were closed, but that all Arab provision shops were open and Arab women vegetable hawkers came as usual to the market place.

Stronger demonstrations will take place on Tuesday if the strike should prove to be of no avail. The

Arab Executive Calls Off Its General Strike

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 16—The general Arab strike protesting against the scheduled execution of three Arabs found guilty of murdering Jews during last August's riots has been called off by the Arab Executive but the Arab Nationalists in Jaffa will nevertheless continue their stoppage today and tomorrow.

In the meantime conflicting rumors concerning the possibility of a reprieve for the three condemned Arabs continue to be floated. Miss Newton in Haifa is reported to have informed the family of the Safed Arab under the death sentence that his sentence has been commuted by the High Commissioner. On the other hand it is stated that the Colonial Office has not advised the King to intervene.

The government today informed the counsel of Joseph Mizrahi Urphali, the only Jew under the death sentence and who was not reprieved pending his appeal to the Privy Council, that it is the intention to remove the irons from Urphali and to permit him to share a cell with other Jewish prisoners as soon as it is convenient.

Alarming Reports Received of Anti-Semitism in Thuringia

Berlin, June 16—Alarming reports have reached Berlin from Thuringia where incitement against the Jews since the National Socialist anti-Semitic government assumed power has reached an intense degree. Public propaganda to beat, annihilate and kill the Jews, is being carried out throughout the entire province, a pogrom atmosphere prevailing even in Weimar where only a hundred Jews live among a total population of 150,000. The percentage of Jews in Thuringia is very small, there being but two out of a thousand inhabitants. Jewish traders, according to reports received here, do not dare to visit the villages where teachers have formed Hitler groups for the purpose of inciting hatred against the Jews.

Dr. Frick, Minister of Education, is particularly responsible for the pogrom agitation. Dr. Frick introduced into the schools of Thuringia, a special prayer of an inciting nature which is recited daily by the school children. Dr. Frick admitted in the Thuringian Diet that the prayer was directed against the Jews.

Thuringian Jewry Protests Anti-Semitic Regime of Province

Berlin, June 16—An imposing demonstration by representatives of all Thuringian Jewry took place yesterday in Eisenach. Brune Weil, the chief speaker, and delegates from all parts of this German state condemned the anti-Semitic Frick regime which rules in Thuringia today and which has passed an anti-schechita law and is planning other discriminations against Jews.

The present-day anti-Semitic spirit that pervades Frick and his adherents, declared the speakers, is a violation of the old liberal spirit of Thuringia as it expressed itself in the utterances of Goethe at Weimar. A resolution was adopted calling upon the Reich government to assure the constitutional rights of Thuringian Jewry.

"Doar Hayom" Fined for Appearing Under Other Names

Jerusalem, June 16—The "Doar Hayom," only Hebrew daily of Jerusalem, which was suspended by the government because it had published articles against the government, was today fined thirty pounds (\$50), for appearing under other names. The government also ordered the Hebrew part of the plant closed for three days. The publisher is appealing the sentence.

Maniu Says Anti-Semitic Party Plays Lesser Role in Roumania Than in Some Other Countries

Bucharest, June 16—"The anti-Semitic party is insignificant and plays a lesser role in the political life of Roumania than in many other countries," stated Prime Minister Maniu today to Morris D. Waldman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee, and Joseph Leftwich, London editor of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

"The satisfaction with which the Jews throughout the world have hailed the formation of the Maniu government was well grounded," the Prime Minister continued. "The Jews are justified in anticipating fair treatment. My government has done more to ensure the rights of the Jewish people than any previous government. There are now less manifestations of discrimination than previously."

See Lessening of Anti-Semitism in Heimwehr Chief's Expulsion

Vienna, June 16—The expulsion of Major Waldemar Pabst, chief of staff of the Austrian Heimwehr from Austria as an undesirable alien, is expected to result in the weakening of anti-Semitism in the ranks of Heimwehr because Major Pabst, like his predecessor, had favored a close contact with Adolph Hitler and his anti-Semitic National Socialist party in Germany.

In this connection it is being recalled that Major Pabst was raised in a Jewish house in Berlin.

May Prosecute Archduke for Attacks on Jews

Berlin, June 16—Archduke Leopold of Koburg will be prosecuted for robbery and criminal assault against two Jewish families in the village Autenhausem if the authorities place faith in the statements of one Goetze, who has just been released from prison. Goetze claims that he voluntarily shouldered the guilt for crimes committed by the Archduke. The Archduke, together with a group of Hitler's followers, in 1923, during the Hitler coup in Munich, attacked and robbed two Jewish families of valuables, inflicting almost fatal injuries on the members of the families. Goetze now insists upon a new trial, stating he was in a position to prove with documents and witnesses that he was prevailed upon to take the blame for the crimes of the Archduke in order to prevent the royal house from being exposed to the indignity of a court trial.

Wailing Wall Commission

Due in Palestine Wednesday

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 16—The Wailing Wall Commission will arrive here on Wednesday. It is not known yet whether its proceedings will be public like those of the Palestine Inquiry Commission. The Jewish side will be represented in all likelihood by Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University; David Yellin, president of the Hebrew Teachers' Seminary, and Dr. Elias, well known lawyer.

Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the Jewish Theological Seminary of New York and of Dropsie College in Philadelphia, has forwarded a documented brief which outlines the Jewish rights with regard to the Wailing Wall. Dr. Adler, who was originally chosen to represent the Jewish Agency for Palestine before the Wailing Wall Commission, is unable to attend in person, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

Doubts Advisability of Calling

Special World Zionist Congress

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 16—The advisability of calling a World Zionist Congress is doubted by the Hebrew daily, "Ha-Aretz," which argues that a session of the Zionist Actions Committee would perhaps suffice. A Congress and a meeting of the Jewish Agency's Council would paralyze ordinary work the paper feels. If a Congress is necessary, the "Ha-Aretz" says an extraordinary Congress is preferable to an ordinary Congress with its election of delegation.

Acting on the request of the Zionist Executive to members of the Actions Committee that they vote by cable on whether or not they favor a Congress this year the Palestine Zionist Executive intends to convene a special meeting of the Palestine members of the Actions Committee to discuss the matter.

Lord Passfield Declined to Receive Delegation of Board of Jewish Deputies to Protest Against Stoppage of Immigration

London, June 16—The refusal of Lord Passfield, Colonial Minister, to receive a delegation of the Board of Jewish Deputies who sought to register a protest against the stoppage of immigration to Palestine, was revealed at the weekly meeting of the Board. The Board wrote to Lord Passfield May 26 for an audience and his reply was not received until May 31 in which he wrote that he regretted having to refuse the request because he was leaving the country immediately and was unable to return for some time.

No General Stoppage or Prohibition

He desired to make clear, however, that there was no general stoppage or prohibition of immigration. Lord Passfield pointed out in his reply to the Board of Jewish Deputies that owing to a misunderstanding the schedule had been approved but no certificates were cancelled nor was any final decision reached regarding the labor schedule covering the whole period to September 30, 1930.

The Board of Jewish Deputies unanimously passed a protest resolution stating that in view of the worldwide protests which the suspension decision had evoked on the ground that it indicates a breach of the undertakings contained in the Mandate, and that it is being construed as a surrender to a policy of force which manifested itself in three attacks on the Jewish population and is encouragement to a continuance of hostility by those who oppose the policy of the Palestine Mandate, the Board urges the government to release the certificates as soon as possible.

Westernization of Palestine Important

d'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board, in moving the resolution, said it is important that the Westernization of Palestine continue unchecked. The present policy of the government, he stated, is not in harmony with the broadest imperial interests. As an Englishman he strongly urged the government to take immediate steps to modify that policy.

As an Englishman and a Jew he declared he feels grave regret that the confidence in the British government is so shaken abroad. We feel that while the government's intentions appear good and while public speeches here and statements in Geneva express appreciation of the services the Jews have rendered to Palestine, yet when their pledges are to be translated into acts there is a sad and deeply regrettable difference.

Asks Government to Keep Promises

"We ask the government to act up to its own promises." Mr. Goldsmid pointed out that the Jewish Agency was satisfied that the procedure followed by the government in distributing compensation for the damages that followed the riots was equitable but it was aware that it was miserably inadequate which arose from a limitation of the total

amount, \$500,000, of which \$444,880 was paid to Jewish claimants.

The report presented by the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association stated that the Roumanian outlook was far from clear and not without disturbing possibilities. The suggestion was made by the Committee that new homes be found for the Yemenite Jews in Abyssinia. The Board of Jewish Deputies decided not to participate in the congress of the Shomre Shabbos, Union of Sabbath Observers.

Louis Klotz, Ex-French

Finance Minister, Dead

Paris, June 16—Louis L. Klotz, former minister of finance under the premiership of George Clemenceau, and active in French politics for two decades, died suddenly yesterday of a heart attack at the age of 62. M. Klotz was a member of the War-time cabinet and was one of the signers of the Treaty of Versailles. He also aided in working out the post-war financial problems of France.

Prior to his entrance into politics he had been one of the outstanding members of the French bar. In 1889 he achieved a national reputation by his campaign with the French students against Boulangerism. He was elected to the Chamber of Deputies in 1897 where he specialized in financial matters. Later he served as chairman of the Commission des Douanes and vice-chairman of the Commission on Budget and the Army.

M. Klotz had six terms as a cabinet officer, starting in 1910 and ending in 1920. In the post-war era he was considered the one man who could lead France out of its financial difficulties. He was also mentioned for the premiership.

Simpson to Begin Inquiry

Into Arab Agriculture

Jerusalem, June 16—An inquiry into Arab agriculture will be begun this week by Sir John Simpson who is investigating problems of land settlement, development and immigration. Sir John has expressed himself as tremendously impressed with the Jewish achievements in the Emek and Jordan Valleys which he toured extensively with Dr. Arthur Ruppin.

J.N.F. Shows 15 Percent

Increase in Its Income

Jerusalem, June 16—May receipts of the Jewish National Fund were \$113,255 making a total of \$841,361 for the nine months of the present financial year compared with \$707,660 for the same period last year. This is an increase of 15 per cent. Most countries recorded an increase, even where no special campaign was made.

before our government took office, their present status is a distinct improvement, and it is due not only to the government's actions but to the general opinion the government created that if there were excesses the government would act," said M. Maniu.

"The government, at the next session of parliament will submit a new citizenship law which will facilitate the nationalization of many thousands of Jews. It is the intention of the government to treat all minorities in accordance with law and the principle of equity.

"The government will consult all Jewish communities before proceeding further with the Jewish communities law," the Prime Minister stated.

Roumanian Jews' Union Assures King of Its Loyalty; Jews Are Relieved at Maniu Appointment

Bucharest, June 16—Assurances of the loyalty of the Jews of Roumania to the new regime were sent to King Carol by the Union of Roumanian Jews following a plenary session under the chairmanship of its president, Dr. William Filderman. The message sent to the King said, "The Central Committee of the Union of Roumanian Jews salutes Your Majesty's accession to the throne and hopes that the Roumanian Jews who were emancipated under the glorious reign of your great father, Ferdinand I, will find under your rule protection of the law and authorities.

"We assure Your Majesty that the Roumanian Jews will, as in the past, be loyal and devoted citizens in the service of the throne and the fatherland. We wish Your Majesty a long, glorious and happy rule". Dr. Filderman called at the Palace to present his respects to King Carol. The Union of Jewish Communities of Old Roumania wired the King in similar terms while Senator Niemierow, representative of the Jewish faith in the Senate, also telegraphed his loyalty.

The appointment of Julius Maniu as premier has relaxed the anxiety created in Jewish circles when the possibility of General Presan's premiership was entertained. General Presan is regarded as an avowed anti-Semite because during the war he pursued a policy which earned for him a reputation as being responsible for the persecution of the Jews of Moldavia to which the Roumanian army retreated.

Senator Niemierow, on the other hand, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that General Presan had repeatedly expressed to him the friendliest sentiments to the Jews, assuring him that the accusations against him were untrue. Nevertheless in Jewish circles there is relief that he was not appointed.

Hopes for American Section of Agency to Speak for All U. S. Jews on All Matters

Buffalo, June 16—Hope that the day will come when there will be an American section of the Jewish Agency which will represent the Jews of the United States, Zionists and non-Zionists, not only in connection with Palestine but which will be the articulate voice on behalf of the Jews throughout the world was voiced by Judge William Lewis of Philadelphia, Grand Master of the Independent Order of Brith Sholom, in his presidential address to the more than 300 delegates here for the Order's 25th annual convention.

Judge Lewis pointed out that the work of other bodies duplicating each other and "attempting at times to rival each other could much better be done by such a representative body". A beginning in that direction has been made by the Allied Jewish Campaign, he said. Judge Lewis urged that all members of the Brith Sholom join the Zionist Organization of America and recommended that this suggestion receive the consideration of the convention.

On behalf of the Zionist Organization, Louis Lipsky, its president, extended greetings in an address in which he deplored the lack of cooperation of England in Palestine. He said that the Jews had been placed in the position of contenders for rights, instead of being given rights without asking. Mr. Lipsky attacking the method of England's administering the Mandate.

He charged that the party in power in England was more interested in perpetuating itself than in justice for the Jews. It gives concession to the Arabs, he declared, but no help to the Jews. Calling attention to the various protest meetings he asked for moral and financial support in the face of all opposition.

The benediction was said by Rabbi Israel Efros of the Temple Beth El.

Jewish Support of Maniu's Government Dependent on Fulfillment of Promises

Bucharest, June 16—Making their support of the government dependent on the fulfillment of the promises made the Jewish people, Deputy Joseph Fisher, on behalf of the Jewish Parliamentary Club, gave expression to the rejoicing of the Jews in Roumania at the ascension to the throne by King Carol. The Club, however, the deputy stated, cannot express its confidence in the new government without reserve in view of those acts of the Maniu government which shattered the hopes of the Jews.

He demanded more vigorous steps by the government against the militant anti-Semitism which manifests itself throughout the country and the enactment of the nationalization law which has been promised repeatedly; more serious measures to improve the economic condition of the country, and

Arab Executive is determined to utilize any legal technicality to cause a stay of execution. The government, which is aware of the plans of the Executive, is taking precautionary measures to maintain order. M. Mavrogordata, Commandant of the Police, has proceeded to Acre where the three Arabs await execution. Special steps are being taken by the authorities to increase the guards around the prison and to prevent the prisoners being rescued by force.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed by a government official that the government does not intend to yield to Arab threats and demonstrations. The determination of the government to carry out the executions on Tuesday is unshaken, according to the statement made by the official.

The boycott against the Jews will be revived by the Arabs on Wednesday should the executions not be stayed. The Arab Executive is completing preparations for the boycott. A last minute effort was made to have the Zionist Executive join in the demand for the reprieve.

Practically all patriachs have appealed for the reprieve of the condemned. Similar requests have come from the kings of the Hedjaz, Mesopotamia and Transjordan.

"Tuesday will become a day of explosion, not only in Palestine but in all Arab countries," declares the Arab paper, "Al Hayat" in an editorial in which it insists on the reprieve lest "the volcano erupt." "Yarmuk," another Arab paper, declares that England would be wise to prevent disturbances in view of the many perplexities she faces in the East.

The possibility that the three condemned Arabs may yet be saved from the gallows to which they are scheduled to go on Tuesday is seen in two developments, according to a cable to the "New York Times": first the strenuous efforts being made by the Arab leaders and the report that Attorney-General Bentwich has instructed the courts to furnish him with the trial records of the three Arabs with a view to his examining them and then perhaps making new recommendations to the High Commissioner.

Dedicate New \$200,000 Home of Elizabeth Y.M.H.A.

Urges Support for Union of American Hebrew Congregations; Union's Income Shows Gain

Atlantic City, June 16—Urging more generous support of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the appointment of eight more regional rabbis, Ludwig Vogelstein, speaking before the Union's executive board of which he is chairman, stated that there is "grave danger if we allow a Godless and irreligious generation to grow up. Do not permit it to be said of us that in our prosperity we forgot the blessing which our religion brought to our fathers when they settled in this country."

Adopts \$698,491.12 Budget

The executive board, which met here at the Hotel Ambassador Saturday and Sunday, adopted the report of the budget committee providing for a budget of \$698,491.12 for 1930-31, which represents an increase of \$19,446.50 over that of the past year.

Rabbi George Zepin, Cincinnati, secretary of the Union, reported that the organization now has 281 congregations with a membership of 61,662. He stated that the total income for the first six months of the present fiscal year, November 1, 1929 to April 30, 1930, was \$321,986.04 as against \$248,502.10 for the corresponding period the previous year. Expenditures for the same six months were \$311,651.64 as against \$298,775.32 for the corresponding six months of the year before. For the second six months Rabbi Zepin estimated a probable income of \$307,538.09 and probable expenditures of \$371,389.17.

Revised Prayer Book Question

The question of the proposed revision of the Union Prayer Book was submitted to the executive board by a joint committee consisting of members from the Union and the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Members included Roger W. Straus, New York, chairman; A. Leo Weil, Pittsburgh; Edward E. Mayer, Pittsburgh; Dr. F. H. Hirschland, New York, and M. L. Aaron of Pittsburgh for the Union. For the Central Conference of American Rabbis the members were: Dr. David Philipson of Cincinnati; Dr. Edward N. Calisch, Richmond, Va.; Dr. Abram Simon, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Samuel Schulman of New York and Dr. Samuel H. Goldenson of Pittsburgh.

Philadelphia Raises Fourth of Its Allied Campaign Quota

Philadelphia, June 16—Approximately \$100,000 representing a fourth of the city's quota was subscribed at the opening dinner here of the Allied Jewish Campaign. Nearly 500 men and women representing all elements in the community attended and pledged themselves to work an entire week to put the campaign over.

David M. Bressler, one of the national co-chairmen, delivered the principal address in which he reviewed the condition of the Jewish people in various parts of the world. Congressman Benjamin M. Golder, local campaign chairman, presided.

Rabbi Solomon of Vineland Dies at 40

Vineland, N. J., June 16—Funeral services for Rabbi Hyman Solomon, for six years rabbi of Beth Israel Temple here, and who died suddenly yesterday, were conducted by Rabbi Max D. Klein of Philadelphia with the entire Jewish neighboring towns in Southern New Jersey present. Rabbi Solomon, who was 40, came to Vineland from Springfield, Mass. He was secretary of the Rabbinical Assembly.

Jewish Groups to Cooperate with Hias for Immigrants

At a conference attended by 300 delegates representing 147 Jewish organizations of Greater New York and vicinity, held at the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society, Sunday afternoon, it was decided to organize a permanent body of representatives of Jewish organizations such as lodges of fraternal orders, benevolent societies, synagogues, temples, labor unions, etc., for the purpose of cooperating with the Society in its activities on behalf of Jewish wanderers.

The conference also decided to help raise sufficient funds so that the work may be extended.

It was further decided that the new organization shall have representation on the Board of Directors of the parent organization so that complete cooperation may be established between them, and that efforts be made to interest Jewish organizations in all parts of the country.

The conference was held in accordance with a resolution adopted at the last annual meeting of the Society held at the Hotel Astor in March of this year.

Lubawitscher Rebbe Sees Young Israel Movement Only Hope for Orthodox Judaism

Long Branch, N. J., June 16—The Lubawitscher Rebbe, famous chassidic leader who is now in this country, is greatly interested in the work of the Young Israel organization, in which he sees the only assurance for the future of orthodox Judaism in this country, and will soon call a special conference to interest orthodox Jewry in America in the work of this organization of orthodox American-Jewish youth.

This announcement was made at the convention of Young Israel which ended its sessions here yesterday, by its president, Attorney Edward Silver, in his annual report. Mr. Silver also declared that the Lubawitscher Rebbe is planning to start a Young Israel movement among the Jewish youth of Eastern Europe.

The convention adopted a resolution which calls upon every Young Israel branch to set aside one week for the advancement of the Yiddish language, Yiddish newspapers, the Yiddish stage, etc., and use the Yiddish tongue for all announcements and sermons on the Sabbath of that week. The resolution deprecates the fact that American-Jewish youth is gradually forgetting the Yiddish language and declares that this causes a breach between the older generation and the youth. Another resolution adopted by the convention endorses the movement to bring all Hebrew parochial schools and Hebrew high schools into one educational system with central educational and budgetary authorities.

Among other matters that the convention of Young Israel decided are: to endorse the movement for the general establishment of a five-day week for all labor, to support the Yeshivah College, other yeshivah and orthodox institutions in this country and abroad, as well as the Mizrahi, the orthodox wing of the Zionist organization, to endorse the aims and activities of the Welt Verband der Shomre Shabbos and to send a message of greeting and an offer of cooperation to the World Congress of this organization, which is to be held in Berlin on August 24, 25 and 26 of this year, to protest against proposed calendar reforms which would destroy the fixity of the Jewish Sabbath.

The following officers for the ensuing year were elected: Edward Silver, president; S. Belman, vice-president; Charles Levin, treasurer; Sadye Garfinkle, 2nd vice-president; David Loewenkrantz, financial secretary and Sadye Koenig, recording secretary.

Jews Have Spent Sum of \$220,000,000 in Palestine

In the report in Monday's Bulletin regarding the Jewish Agency survey of Palestine the total amount expended there by Jews was given as \$44,000,000. This should have been 44,000,000 pounds, or \$220,000,000.
