3 ARABS EXECUTED FOR MURDER OF JEWS DURING LAST AUGUST'S RIOTS; POLICE OFFICER HURT IN CLASH WITH ARAB CROWDS; GENERAL STRIKE ON

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 17—Three Arabs, two from Hebron and one from Safed, were executed today at the Acre prison for the murder of Jews during last August's riots. The first of the condemned men was pronounced dead at 8.10 A. M. Jerusalem time and the last one two hours later. Great crowds of Arabs, including relatives of the condemned men, gathered before the Acre prison to learn the news while other crowds were informed of the executions in hourly announcements by the muezzins from the minarets of the mosques in Haifa and Acre.

Police Superintendent F. M. Scott of Tel Aviv, on duty in Jaffa, was slightly injured in a clash with Arabs following the announcement of the executions which were carried out on scheduled time. In Haifa the police forcibly broke up a demonstration while in Jerusalem schoolboys attempted to stage a demonstration at the Damascus Gate

but were everywhere dispersed by the police who deprived Arab pedestrians of clubs and sticks.

The police commandants at Acre, Haifa and elsewhere are prepared to cope with any disorders when the rela-

Comzet Official Says There Are 380,000 Jews in Ukraina Who Still Need Assistance

Moscow, June 17—There are 380,000 Jews in Ukraina even now who require relief it was officially stated today by M. Kantor, chief-secretary of the Ukrainian Comzet, the government department for settling the Jews on the land. The economic facilities which the Central Soviet government has lately begun for the relief of the declassed and voteless Jews will undoubtedly improve the position of a considerable number but many of these Jews will continue to be in need for some time because they are unable to settle anew in better circumstances.

The number of Jews requiring aid includes 72,000 ex-traders and 50,000 artisans for whom it is difficult to obtain raw materials. There are 200,000 able to work but who still remain dependent on their families while 32,000 are entirely unemployed. In Odessa alone there are 30,000 Jews capable of work, requiring relief. Of these 12,000 are registered with labor exchanges but the others cannot register because they are ex-traders and voteless.

Kantor finds that during the last three years between sixty and seventy thousand Jews have found employment in Ukraina. Of this number 15,000 were settled in the colonies, 10,000 in farm work in the vicinity of the villages, 20,000 in the cooperatives and 20,000 in various industries.

Urges Hungarian Religious Groups to Cooperate for Country's Need

Budapest, June 17—An appeal to all religious groups in Hungary to stimulate the peaceful communal life of the country as being in the interests of all citizens was issued today in the press by Minister of Cults Petri. He declared that the collaboration of the religious communities, now that the wave of revolution has passed, is necessary for a common patriotic effort.

In political circles the appeal is believed intended to influence public opinion abroad in connection with Chancellor Bethlen's trip to London in the interests of a Hungarian loan.

Proper Regulation of Jewish Communities Law Is Seen in Naming of Professor Andrei

Bucharest, June 17—Considerable hope for a proper regulation of the Jewish communities law is seen by Jewish leaders here today in the appointment of Professor Andrei as under-secretary of worship. Professor Andrei is on the faculty of Jassy University and vice-president of the chamber of deputies. He is known as an outspoken opponent of Professor Alexander Cuza, the anti-Semitic leader. M. Costacescu will continue as minister of worship.

The present Jewish communities law has been one of the principal difficulties of the Maniu government in its relations with the Jews. The law was passed without consulting Jewish leaders or spokesmen and a promise was made that before the statutes governing it would become operative a congress of Jewish communities would be consulted. This promise had been reversed and a conference of important Jewish organizations and Jewish leaders promised instead. The new political developments, however, have again changed the situation and the appointment of Professor Andrei to the ministry of worship is taken as an indication that the government is prepared to keep its earlier promises.

Jewish Agency's Administrative Body to Meet in Berlin Aug. 29

Berlin, June 17—A meeting of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine has been called by its chairman, Felix M. Warburg, to meet in Berlin August 29. A number of extremely important political developments that have arisen with regard to Palestine since the Administrative Committee met in London last March are on the agenda.

With the fiscal year of the Jewish Agency closing September 30, the adoption of the Agency's new budget will be one of the major matters to be placed before the members of the Committee. So many developments of the greatest significance concerning Palestine have transpired since last March that the August session of the Administrative Committee will be faced with urgent problems such as its attitude to the report of Sir John Simpson, which may be ready by August, the British policy in Palestine and the Wailing Wall issue.

It is expected that the measures to be recommended by the special meeting of the Administrative Committee's political commission which will meet in London, June 23, will also be acted upon.

Radicals Again Take Part in Austrian Zionist Parley

Vienna, June 17—The Austrian Radical Zionist groups headed by Robert Stricker participated in a party conference of Austrian Zionists today for the first time in a year and a half. The party conference had been postponed for a number of weeks without electing an executive because the majority group was making efforts to find a way to agree to the conditions of the Radicals and Revisionists for participating in the Executive.

The differences are chiefly concerned with internal politics in Austria, a renewal of national political activities by the Austrian Zionist Organization and the prohibition of general Zionists from belonging to the Social-Democratic or other non-Jewish political parties. The conference expressed sharp protest against the stoppage of immigration and the British government's anti-Mandate policy.

Vandals Deface Jewish Names from Wailing Wall

Jerusalem, June 17—Jewish names inscribed on the Wailing Wall's monoliths were defaced and erased in 24 different places during the night by unknown persons. The police have instituted an investigation. The act is interpreted here either as a piece of Arab vandalism or an attempt by interested parties to remove generation-old Jewish marks prior to the arrival of the Wailing Wall Commission.

Judge William Lewis Again Heads Brith Shalom Order

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Buffalo, June 17—Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia was again elected Grand Master of the Independent Order of Brith Shalom at the 25th annual convention of the Order meeting here. The nomination of Judge Lewis was upheld by a tremendous ovation. Moses Helfgart was named vice-Grand Master and Martin O. Levy of Philadelphia was re-elected Grand Secretary.

The following state deputies were chosen: Morris Orenstein, New York; Peter Lippman, Trenton, N. J.; Max Epstein, Pittsburgh; S. Gittlis, Chicago; Harry Derman, Detroit; Meyer Weintraub, St. Louis and Wm. Weinblatt, Baltimore.

The presidential recommendation that all members of the Brith Shalom join the Zionist Organization was adopted. The Allied Jewish Campaign was unanimously endorsed. A resolution calling for aid to the Hias was approved but one asking help for the American Jewish Congress was tabled. Considerable time was devoted to a discussion of the Order's insurance problems. New classes of membership were created.

Morrison Named to Board of Jewish Theological Seminary

I. D. Morrison was unanimously elected a member of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Theological Seminary at a meeting of the Board held in the office of Felix M. Warburg. Mr. Morrison, who is well known in Jewish circles, has for several decades participated in many Jewish philanthropic and communal undertakings. He was honorary secretary of the Zionist Organization of America from 1898 to 1903 and was one of the first volunteer workers for the Educational Alliance in 1896 as well as for the United Hebrew Charities.

N.Y. Zionists to Discuss Brandeis Memo for Reorganization

Nine local Zionist leaders, representing, it is understood, a much larger group, have summoned the rank and file of the New York Zionists to convene for a discussion of the Brandeis plan for the reorganization of the Zionist Organization of America. On May 22, Justice Brandeis and his associates, Judge Julian W. Mack, Robert Szold and Jacob de Haas, for their group, issued a plan for the complete reorganization of the personnel of the American movement. The Administrative Committee of the Z.O.A. passed no opinion on the plan but referred it to the forthcoming convention in Cleveland, O.

Rabbi Israel Herbert Levinthal, Dr. Norman Salit, David Tannenbaum, Morris Dlugasch, Morris A. Zeldin, Benjamin Fain, Harry Zirn, Isidore Hassan and James Waterman Wise, have signed this call as a "group of individual Zionists with no partisan intentions whatsoever" to "provide the opportunity for discussion and clarification of any ambiguities."

At the meeting which will be held at the Hotel Pennsylvania this evening, at 8:00 P. M., the convenors are determined to make clear that Justice Brandeis has not presented the Zionists with an ultimatum and that the general principles laid down by him should in their judgment, be acceptable to the majority of American Zionists.

Judea Industrial Corporation Undergoing Reorganization

Reorganization of the Judea Industrial Corporation, which is a holding company of the Judea Insurance Company, which is also to be reorganized, is in the process of being carried out, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency reports. A new board of directors was elected at the general meeting of stockholders.

Julius Lonschein, textile industrialist, was elected president, succeeding Judge Jacob S. Strahl, while Isaac Zaar has been chosen secretary, succeeding Jacob Ish-Kishor. Benjamin S. Lewis was named vice-president. The Board of Directors also includes Irvin Rosenzweig, Isidor Wenginsky, Judge Strahl, Jacob Ish-Kishor, Leopold Kehlman, Morris Gerst and Charles Stein.

The new board intends to make available for the corporation, which represents the only large Jewish undertaking of a definite Zionist character, all available Jewish talent.

University of Pennsylvania Honors Dr. Cyrus Adler

Philadelphia, June 17—Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee and the Jewish Theological Seminary, was one of the nine internationally known men to be honored at the commencement exercises today of the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Adler was awarded the degree of Doctor of Letters.

Warburg Gives \$150,000 to Allied Jewish Campaign

A gift of \$150,000 by Felix M. Warburg and contributions by the Women's Division of \$273,800 were announced at a rally of the workers in the New York Allied Jewish Campaign at the Hotel Biltmore. Mr. and Mrs. Warburg were the hosts of yesterday's function for the workers in the drive to raise \$2,500,000 toward the sum of \$6,000,000 which is being sought nationally.

James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the drive in this city, presided at the rally and the speakers were Supreme Court Justice Albert Cohn, chairman of the Bronx section of the campaign; Arthur Lehman, an honorary chairman of the New York drive; Mrs. Blanche E. Goldfarb, president of the Federation of Women's Organizations of Greater New York; and Mrs. Abram I. Elkus.

The \$273,800 announced by the Women's division yesterday represents contributions turned in at headquarters prior to the rally in the afternoon. The quota for the Women's Division was originally \$250,000, but Mrs. Warburg announced yesterday that efforts are being made by her workers to carry the total for this division beyond the \$300,000 mark.

Paul Baerwald reported that the Bankers' and Brokers' Division had raised \$453,000, and Louis J. Vorhaus reported \$68,000 for the Lawyers' and Judges' Division. Chairmen for the various sectional groups in the Men's Division reported as follows: Samuel A. Telsey, \$40,000 for Brownsville; Senator Nathan Straus, Jr., \$80,000 for the Upper West Side of Manhattan; Justice Albert Cohn, \$45,184 for the Bronx and Rabbi Nachman H. Ebin, \$13,000 for Bensonhurst.

Arthur Salmonsohn, German Banker, Dies at Age of 72

Berlin, June 17—Arthur Salmonsohn, 72, founder of the Disconto-Gesellschaft, died here today. Recently, together with Oscar Wasserman, he amalgamated the Disconto-Gesellschaft with the Deutsche Bank creating the largest European banking enterprise. Salmonsohn started his banking career as a poor clerk. He was known as one of the leading economists of Europe.

Citizens' Union Praises Sen. Samuel Hofstadter

Praise for Samuel H. Hofstadter, the only Republican State Senator from New York City, is contained in a report on the records of the members of the New York state legislature issued last week by the Citizens' Union. Mr. Hofstadter is characterized in the report as "the city's chief legislative asset." The records of the other three Jewish state senators from New York City, Philip M. Kleinfeld, Henry G. Schackno and Benjamin Antin, all democrats, are characterized in the report as not displaying enough aggressiveness.

Congressman Hamilton Fish in House Speech Protests Stoppage of Immigration

Washington, June 17—Calling upon the people of Great Britain "to see to it that their Government respects the sacred promise which it made not only to the Jews but to the entire world" with regard to the establishment of a Jewish Homeland in Palestine, Representative Hamilton Fish of New York in a speech today in the House of Representatives protested against the recent order of the British government temporarily suspending Jewish immigration into Palestine.

Declaring that the suspension order was issued on purely political grounds, since the 3,300 certificates that were withdrawn had been previously approved by the High Commissioner as economically justified, Representative Fish stated that "it may become necessary for the Government of the United States to call upon the Government of Great Britain to inquire with regard to its future intentions in Palestine, whether it proposes to carry out the obligations which it assumed in accepting Palestine as a mandated territory."

"For us in America the situation in Palestine is of particular concern," Representative Fish declared. "Our Jewish citizens have poured tens of millions of dollars into the country for the purpose of upbuilding it. They have made great sacrifices so that there could be laid a basis for a new center of Jewish civilization, and so that tens of thousands of Jews from Eastern Europe, suffering from economic destitution and political and religious discrimination, might find a haven."

"The attitude taken by the British Government threatens the work that has been done in Palestine by the Jews of the world in the past decade. There has been laid down the principle that Jewish immigration into Palestine should be governed by the economic capacity of the country. That principle is now being violated by Great Britain. To hinder the entrance of Jews into Palestine for any other reason is to make mockery of the Jewish National Home; it is to betray the trust that has been placed in Britain by the civilized countries of the world. It is finally to nullify the agreement that has been entered into between Great Britain and our government."

"I speak here today to state that it may become necessary for the Government of the United States to call upon the Government of Great Britain to inquire with regard to its future intentions in Palestine, whether it proposes to carry out the obligations which it assumed in accepting Palestine as a mandated territory. Millions of dollars of American money are invested in Palestine. Besides that, the hopes of millions of our fellow citizens are centered in its development. The United States is interested in the property of its nationals wherever it may be. It is therefore our grave concern that the interests of American Jews in Palestine shall not be jeopardized."

tives of the hanged men claim the bodies and the news of the executions spreads through the country. In Jerusalem large crowds of Arabs idled in the vicinity of the public buildings awaiting the news from Acre while British military reinforcements were everywhere.

The general strike called by the Arab Executive has been renewed and is being more generally observed than strikes called hitherto by the Arabs owing to the active picketing of shops in the Old City which are practically all shut. Jewish shops in the neighborhood of Arab places of business are also closed. A number of black flags are flying from various Arab buildings.

In Hebron, Nablus, Acre and other Arab centers photographs of the three executed Arabs are being offered for sale. Work has been discontinued at the match factory in Acre and in Haifa and Acre Jewish families are hastily withdrawing from their quarters adjoining the Arab districts. A partial protest strike is on in Amman, capital of Transjordan, where Emir Abdullah has been memorialized.

The Arab papers today appeared in black borders. The "El Carmel" has suggested that the Arab Executive proclaim a forty-day period of mourning and that on the anniversary of the executions all Arabs wear black bands and that in the future the execution day be observed as a national day of mourning.

The "Meraat Al Shark" announces "the sacrifice of the martyrs" and says that "the gallows is the first tree of independence." The same paper, claiming that "the executions are one of the results of the Balfour Declaration," prints a message that the government has refused to turn over the bodies of the executed men to their families. It was learned later that the

Government finally acceded to the request of the Arab Executive and planned to turn over the bodies to the Executive after the latter had guaranteed that the burial, which will be at Acre, would be accompanied by no demonstrations.

The Arab Executive moved heaven and earth to prevent the execution of the three Arabs who were the only ones not reprieved on the occasion of King George's birthday. The three who were executed are Ahmed Elzeer, a porter from Hebron, found guilty of the murder of Rabbi Kastel and his family; Mohammed Jamjum, a driver from Hebron, convicted of the murder of the Aboushids, and Fuad Hedjazi of Safed, a government health official, convicted of the murder of A. Mizrahi, Afriat, the former's French pupil, and members of the family of Afriat. Hedjazi was identified by a surviving daughter of Afriat.

2 Jews Inspired \$250,000,000 Rockefeller Entertainment Plan

Two Jews, David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, and S. L. Rothafel, known as "Roxy," are declared to have inspired John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to undertake the building of a great entertainment and radio center in New York City, between 48th and 51st Streets and 5th and 6th Avenues, at a cost of \$250,000,000.

In connection with this, Jacob Fishman says in the "Jewish Morning Journal":

"While Sarnoff convinced Rockefeller of the great future for broadcasting and television, 'Roxy' enthused him with his description of the tremendous progress of entertainment in general. This is natural, because the amusement industry in America was brought to its present high position mainly through Jewish initiative. The exit of William Fox was somewhat of a regression from the Jewish point of view, but no manipulations of Wall Street bankers can hide the main fact that the amusement and film industry became what it is only through Jewish initiative."

"Roxy" will be the manager of this huge enterprise, which is expected to be finished in 1933. He will direct the amusements which will be broadcast nightly to 12,000,000 radio set owners. It is planned to build a sixty-story skyscraper, in which 27 broadcasting studios are to be provided for the Radio Corporation's subsidiary, the National Broadcasting Company. Four theatres, one each for musical comedy and legitimate drama, vaudeville, sound pictures and symphonies, are being planned for the center. A garden plaza, three blocks long, running between the buildings, is to contain foundations and statuary.

Einstein and Toller Plead for Pardon for 3 Arabs

Berlin, June 17—Speaking as Zionists and non-Zionists, Dr. Albert Einstein, Oscar Cohen, former Socialist member of the Reichstag, Rabbi Check and Ernest Toller, signed a telegram that was sent today to Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine urging him to pardon the three condemned Arabs as an action which would facilitate Arab-Jewish good-will.

The telegram read as follows: "From reasons of pure humanity we are opposed to capital punishment in whatever form and admitting of no exception however great any individual crime may be. Our consciences urge us at this hour as human beings and Jews to speak. We, as Zionists and Non-Zionists, entreat Your Excellency to grant a pardon to the three Arabs as an action which would greatly help the establishment of peace between Jews and Arabs for which we are working".

Soviet Allegation Against Rabbi Glazer Refuted

On April 22nd the Jewish Telegraphic Agency received a report from Moscow which reproduced a statement of the White Russian Academy of Science which alleged that a number of rabbis had been in the service of either the Russian or American governments, mentioning, among them, Rabbi Simon Glazer. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency, upon investigating this matter, established the fact that Rabbi Simon Glazer, born in Lithuania in the town of Erzwilkes in the year 1878, immigrated to the United States when he was 21 years of age, and never resided in Russia. He was never connected with any department of the American government.

Rabbi Glazer has had a distinguished career, having taken an active part in a number of important Jewish developments. It was largely due to his efforts and particularly to his initiative that in 1922 both houses of the American Congress unanimously adopted the resolution expressing the sympathy of the United States for the establishment of the Jewish National home in Palestine. It was also due to his efforts that the anti-Shechita law in Canada was defeated in 1913 in the High Court in Halifax.

Last year Rabbi Glazer took a trip to Lithuania in the interests of the Jewish community in that country, where he was the guest of President Smetona; he also went to Poland and Russia. It was his visit to Minsk and the observations he made while in Russia which made him the target of attacks by the Soviet officials and newspapers when, on his return, he issued a statement in Paris revealing the severity of persecution of the Jewish religion in Russia. The statement of the White Russian Academy has obviously been issued in Soviet Russia with the purpose of damaging Rabbi Glazer's reputation. In more than three decades in many vital movements he has served Jewish interests unselfishly and at a great sacrifice.

In Russia, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed by Rabbi Glazer, assurances were given him that the Jewish section of the Communist party which played the main role in the confiscation of synagogues and in the persecution of religious Jews would be dissolved, an action which was taken soon afterwards.

Rabbi Glazer emphatically denies that illegal conferences were held by him with rabbis in Minsk. On the contrary, Rabbi Glazer, before proceeding to Russia, informed the Russian authorities of his desire to study Jewish conditions in Russia and it was with their express consent that he proceeded there, where he carried on all his activities in the fullest light and in contact with the Government. Rabbi Glazer was requested to make his journey to Russia by the Assembly of Hebrew Orthodox Rabbis at Lackawacastan in Pennsylvania in 1927, over which he presided.

Presbyterians Fete Members of Jewish Congregation

Huntington, W. Va., June 17—More than 150 people assembled here at a good-will dinner tendered by the men of the First Presbyterian Church of this city, of which Dr. J. Blanton Belk is the pastor, for the men of the Ohev Shalom Temple, of which Rabbi Abraham Feinstein is the leader.

"Our business interests intertwine and overlap," declared Dr. Belk at the dinner. "Our social contacts are more and more real and genuine. Why not find in our religions a common meeting ground?" Rabbi Feinstein in his talk said: "I believe that before a true religious fellowship between Jews and Christians can be established we must all rid ourselves of our sense of superiority. Friendship can only exist between equals, never between inferiors and superiors."

Says 1,000 Jewish Capitalists Could Solve Palestine Problem

Montreal, June 17—One thousand Jewish capitalists can solve the entire Palestine problem, declared Asher Pierce, Canadian Zionist and financier, and president of the Gan Chayim Corporation, who has just returned from a long sojourn in Palestine. The Gan Chayim Corporation employs 3,000 persons in Palestine. Through the efforts of Mr. Pierce and private individuals, \$8,000,000 have been invested in Palestine, converting a large stretch of desert land between Tel Aviv and Rehoboth into orange plantations.

The economic situation in Palestine is satisfactory considering the general economic situation in the world, Mr. Pierce said. He found the Palestinian Jews firmly resolved to continue their upbuilding efforts. Although he declined to discuss political questions, Mr. Pierce said that the Palestine administration is not unfriendly to the Jews. Private initiative, he pointed out, plays an important role in the upbuilding of Palestine and used his Gan Chayim company as an example.

Mr. Pierce said it was necessary for rich Jews to invest themselves in the upbuilding of Palestine not only as an ideal but from a practical business point of view. He said he himself is planning further large investments in Palestine.

Sail to Dedicate Y.W.H.A. Building in Haifa

A committee representing the Women's League for Palestine sailed for Palestine yesterday, to lay the cornerstone for the Young Women's Hebrew Association which is being erected by the League for the working girls in Haifa. This committee consists of Mrs. Charles Hyman, Mrs. Louis Kloss, Mrs. David Bloom, and Mrs. Louis Shiffman.

The building will proceed at once, and the League hopes that within four months the home will be ready for occupancy.

Junior Mizrahi to Raise \$6,000 for Loan Fund

A protest against the restriction of Jewish immigration into Palestine and a pledge to raise \$6,000 during the coming year for the Loan Fund of "Ha-Poel Ha'Mizrahi" in Palestine, were among the resolutions adopted on Monday by the convention of the Young Mizrahi at the Pennsylvania Hotel. 52 delegates from New York City, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and Seattle were present at the convention, which opened on Sunday.

Z. Karp is president of the Young Mizrahi and I. Epstein is Executive Director. In his annual message Mr. Karp reported that many new branches of the Young Mizrahi have been organized in this country during the past year, and that the organization sent \$5,000 to Palestine for the "Ha-Poel Ha'Mizrahi", besides raising considerable sums for the Jewish National Fund, the Allied Jewish Campaign, Yeshivah and other Jewish educational institutions.

City Says Bible Reading Doesn't Infringe on Religious Freedom

Bible reading and hymn singing in New York City public schools do not constitute interference with religious liberty, according to Assistant Corporation Counsel Mayer who on Monday argued before Supreme Court Justice Ford asking the court to dismiss the complaint brought by Joseph Lewis, president of the Free Thinkers' Society, to restrain the Board of Education from permitting the reading of the Bible and the singing of hymns in the public schools. The court reserved its decision until next week.

Arthur Garfield Hayes, arguing for the plaintiff, declared that many of the Bible selections which are read in the New York City schools are meaningless without an explanation. He also insisted that Bible reading was a mode of worship.

Grand Rabbi of Argentina Dead

Buenos Aires, June 17—The Grand Rabbi of Argentina, Saul Dabbath, died here yesterday at the age of 80. For nearly a decade he had served the Jews of this South American Republic. He came here in 1912 from Aleppo where he founded a noted seminary in 1900. From this seminary many rabbis went out to minister to Jewries in all parts of the world.

25,000 Protest Immigration Ban in Lodz Demonstration

Lodz, June 17—An impressive street demonstration protesting against the stoppage of immigration to Palestine was carried out here today with 25,000 people in the line of march. Shops in the Jewish district were closed. Similar demonstrations were to be held today in Bialystok and Rovna.
