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Jews Disappointed as Friend of Communities Law Is Named Under-Secretary of Cults

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, June 18—A last minute change resulted in the appointment of Ghitzo Pop, a strong supporter of the Jewish communities law which is obnoxious to the Jews, as under-secretary in the ministry of cults, in place of Professor Andrei, who is an outspoken opponent of the anti-Semitic chieftain, Professor Alexander Cuza. Professor Andrei was named under-secretary of agriculture.

The hope in Jewish circles that the reported appointment of Professor Andrei, who is vice-president of the chamber of deputies, would mean a proper regulation of the Jewish communities law, has now given way to a feeling of disappointment.

Podliszewski, President of Polish Hias, Dies at 68

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 18—Abraham Podliszewski, president of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of Poland, died here today at the age of 68. One of the pioneer Zionists of Poland, he has always been active in Jewish communal endeavors but he has given most of his time to the Immigrant Aid Society. Before the war he was a wealthy textile manufacturer but in recent years the post-war economic depression and the various discriminations to which Jews were subjected left him in poor circumstances.

Indian Moslem Delegation to Attend Wailing Wall Hearings

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 18—A delegation of Moslems from India will come to Jerusalem to attend the sessions of the Wailing Wall Commission on behalf of the 70,000,000 Moslems of India says the Arab paper "Al Hayat" in publishing a telegram from the secretary of the Moslem Council of India to the Arab Executive. The Indian Moslem leader points out that the Wailing Wall question is "occupying the attention of the whole Islamic world".

Jewish Population of Latvia Decreases Over 5 Year Span

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, June 18—The Jewish population of Latvia has decreased 1300 in the last five years. It now numbers 94,600 or 4.97 per cent of the general population. Five years ago the Jews of Latvia composed 5.19 per cent of the general population. The decrease is due to Jewish emigration.

Jewish Groups to Unite in Presenting Jewish Case to Wailing Wall Commission

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 18—The Jewish National Council at its meeting today decided on joint action with the Jewish Agency, the Rabbinat, and the Agudath Israel, world orthodox organization, in presenting the Jewish case before the Wailing Wall Commission. The actual advocacy of the Jewish case will be left to David Yellin, Mordecai Eliash and S. Blau.

It is understood that at the behest of Dr. Judah L. Magnes, a special council has been constituted to act as a supervisory body in the presentation of the Jewish case to the Commission which is to examine Moslem claims to the Wall. The Council consists of Rabbis Kook, Mayer and Sonnenfeld, marking the first significant action on which rabbis in opposing camps have united. Professor Yehudah has also indicated his willingness to assist the Jewish case.

New Roumanian Citizenship Law to Be Introduced Shortly

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, June 18—A new citizenship law that will solve the problem of those people now living in Roumania who, as a result of the war are citizens of no country will be introduced into the Roumanian parliament before the end of the present session, according to the Roumanian newspaper "Lupta".

In a long discussion in the Senate, the representative of the Jewish faith in the upper house, Senator Niemerower, demanded to know when a law will be enacted enabling Jewish children in the state schools to be educated in the Jewish religion. They are now taught Christianity. Professor Costacescu, the minister of education was absent and no reply was given.

Complains Jews Are Not Employed on Soviet Railways

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 18—Jewish workers are not accepted on the Soviet railways, the Charkov "Shtern" complains, emphasizing that despite a resolution of the Central Communist Party of Ukraina that Jewish youth be absorbed into the railway systems, only 1,581 Jews are employed on the railways out of a total of 181,000 workers.

The "Shtern" points out that there is no prospect of an increase in "this insignificant percentage in view of the attitude of the local leaders." The paper demands that those hindering the employment of Jews on the railroads be tried and that the government's ruling be enforced.

Tumult in German Reichstag as Thuringian Anti-Semitic Activities Are Discussed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, June 18—A great tumult was created at yesterday's plenary session of the German Reichstag when the anti-Semitic activities in the province of Thuringia led by the minister of Education, Dr. Frick and his National Socialist party followers, came up for discussion. One National Socialist deputy, M. Goebbels, was ousted from the chamber by the president Paul Loebe.

During M. Goebbels' speech he pointed to the Jewish deputy, Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, and shouted "What does the Jew want here?" This utterance caused a storm of protest and the German chancellor, Dr. Wirth, arose and declared "nobody is entitled to insult a part of the German nation. I resent the statement that the Jews are traitors. The Jews have the same right of protection and liberty as all other citizens of the German Republic".

In the course of the debate Dr. Frick himself took the floor and assured the Reichstag that the National Socialists were also anxious to carry out the provisions of the Constitution. Referring to the anti-Semitic prayers in the Thuringian schools introduced by Dr. Frick, the latter said "I stated that the school prayers were directed against elements of the population alien to the German race and the Jews

Roumania May Take Stand on Mandate If England's Obligations Are Not Kept

Bucharest, June 18—Roumania may take a definite stand on the present British policy in Palestine unless Great Britain keeps its obligations, declared George Mironescu, Roumanian foreign minister today, in replying to a question in Parliament from the Jewish Deputy Landau.

M. Mironescu said he was aware that immigration to Palestine had been suspended, a matter in which Roumania was interested as a signatory to the Mandate. He also said that the Roumanians were interested in the matter from the point of view of trade relations.

Sender Morgenstern Dead

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 18—Sender Morgenstern, prominent leader of orthodox Jewry and for two decades a member of the executive of the Warsaw Jewish community, died here today at the age of 88.

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Non-Jews Give Over \$7,000 to Allied Jewish Campaign

George MacDonald, prominent in Catholic circles, yesterday sent a check for \$5,000 for the New York Allied Jewish Campaign to Hon. Joseph M. Proskauer, honorary chairman of the campaign which is raising \$2,500,000 toward \$6,000,000 which is being raised nationally for the 1930 budgets of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Other non-Jewish contributors to the New York Allied Jewish Campaign include D. M. Forgan, who gave \$1,000; Paul Cravath, who gave \$500; Hon. Edward J. Flynn, who also gave \$500; New York City Tax Commissioner Earl H. Miller, Albert H. Liebenau, deputy commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; John A. Biglan, deputy registrar; Bronx Surrogate Albert Henderson, Assemblyman Nicholas Eberhart, and Alderman William Sullivan, who gave smaller sums.

David M. Bressler, national co-chairman of the Allied Jewish Campaign, announced yesterday that chapters of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist organization, had raised \$100,000 for the Allied Jewish Campaign over a period of six weeks ending June 15th. The funds raised by the Hadassah chapters are to be applied to the Hadassah Medical organization in Palestine, the budget of which is \$405,500.

Additional contributions announced yesterday include one of \$1,500 from Max Jonas, of Borough Park, and \$1,000 each from the Union Temple of Brooklyn, Joseph J. Bach, and Max Siegel.

District No. 1, Independent Order B'nai B'rith, of which Supreme Court Justice Albert Cohn, of Bronx County, is president has adopted a resolution endorsing the campaign.

Polish Jews of Canada Protest Discriminations Suffered by Jews of Poland

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal, June 18—A resolution expressing regret and protest against the inequalities and discriminations practiced against the Jews of Poland was adopted here today at a conference of delegates representing 25,000 Jews of Polish extraction now residing in Canada.

The resolution states that the Polish Jews of Canada feel keenly "the economic crisis as well as the political, educational and social inequalities that our brethren in Poland are at present subjected to. The system of taxation in particular is made more burdensome for our fellow Jews in Poland than for the rest of the population by being discriminated against by official or semi-official government representatives as well as by government legislation."

"We believe that such discriminations, inequalities, hardships and burdensome taxation imposed upon our fellow Jews is not with the official sanction or knowledge of the intelligent class of Polish people and the heads of the Polish administration. We believe that by bringing the state of affairs to the attention of government officials, amelioration of conditions will be brought about. We therefore request the consul-general of Poland in Canada, who always gave friendly and sincere cooperation to the Polish Jews in Canada, to bring the attention of the home government the feelings of the Polish Jews of Canada in connection with the hardships practiced upon our fellow Jews in Poland."

The Polish Jews of Canada are organizing an alliance to affiliate with the Federation of Polish Jews in the United States.

Four Jewish Assemblymen Praised by Citizens' Union

The records of four Jewish assemblymen from New York are praised in the report of the committee on legislation of the Citizens' Union, made public this week. For their work in Albany during the past session, Meyer Alterman, Democrat, of the Seventeenth Assembly District, Manhattan, and Louis J. Lefkowitz, Republican, of the Sixth District, Manhattan, are described as "capable, industrious and effective." Samuel Mandelbaum, Democrat of the Fourth District, Manhattan, and Saul S. Streit, Democrat of the Seventh District, Manhattan, are also praised and characterized as being "well above the average."

Los Angeles Doctor Honored by French Government

Los Angeles, June 18—Dr. S. M. Marcus, a noted nerve specialist, was informed by H. Didot, French Consul, that he had been awarded the medal, diploma and a membership in the French Academy of Science. Dr. Marcus, well known in Jewish medical circles here, is also a major in the U. S. Army reserve corps.

Issue Bibliography Study as Memorial Volume to Late Abraham Solomon Freidus

The appearance of a volume entitled "Studies in Jewish Bibliography and Related Subjects in Memory of Abraham Solomon Freidus, late Chief of the Jewish Division in the New York Public Library" is announced by the Freidus Memorial Committee. It was published under the auspices of The Alexander Kohut Memorial Foundation. The volume consists of more than forty contributions to various phases of Jewish literature written by an equal number of Jewish and non-Jewish bibliographical scholars from America and abroad.

Among the American contributors are: Rebekah Kohut, Rev. Dr. H. G. Enlow, Dr. George Alexander Kohut, Dr. Joseph Reider, Dr. Israel Schapiro, Dr. Boaz Cohen, Professors J. Z. Lauterbach, Alexander Marx, Louis Ginzberg, Harry A. Wolfson, Israel Davidson, Salo Baron, A. Z. Idelsohn and Caspar Levis. Among the American non-Jewish contributors are: H. M. Lydenberg, Assistant Director of the New York Public Library, Prof. Otto Kinkeldey of Cornell University, Dr. George F. Black, Dr. Wilberforce Eames, the dean of bibliographers and Daniel C. Haskell.

The volume is devoted not only to Jewish bibliography but to other subjects as well. Dr. A. Yarmolinsky has a study of the Wandering Jew in Slavonic literature. Prof. S. The volume is distributed by the Jewish Division in The New York Public Library.

Police Seek Assailant of Captain F. M. Scott

Jerusalem, June 18—The police hope to arrest the assailant of F. M. Scott, police commandant who received a knife injury in the head yesterday during a scuffle between the police and an Arab crowd following the execution of the three Arabs in Acre. Three Arabs were arrested for inciting. Scott's injuries are reported not to be serious. Aside from this minor incident, the day passed quietly.

The government has acceded to the request of the Arab Executive to surrender the bodies of the executed men for burial in Acre after the Executive had guaranteed that no demonstrations would accompany the burial.

Jewish Education Association to Honor Jewish Educators

A dinner in honor of the delegates to the Fifth Annual Convention of the National Council for Jewish Education will be given by the Jewish Education Association of New York, according to an announcement made last week by Bernard Semel, Honorary Secretary of the Association. The dinner will take place Tuesday evening, June 24, at the Hotel Commodore, and Israel Unterberg, president of the Jewish Education Association, has issued invitations to the members of its Executive Committee as well as to Jewish leaders, Jewish educators, and laymen active in the field of Jewish education.

The dinner at the Biltmore will be one of the events in a series of sessions of the convention some of which will be held in New York, and others in the camp of the Central Jewish Institute at Port Jervis, N. Y. The opening session will be held June 21 and the closing session on June 24.

The membership of the National Council for Jewish Education includes the outstanding professional Jewish educators of America. The purpose of the Council is to provide a forum for the interpretation of Jewish educational theory, and the discussion of the practical problems of Jewish education with a view to stimulating Jewish educational progress in America.

Yiddish Theatrical Circuit to Be Organized in Nine Cities

A Yiddish theatrical circuit which will include nine cities in the United States and Canada will be organized for the coming theatrical season, according to a resolution adopted by the Hebrew Actors' Union at its meeting here on Tuesday, on the recommendation of Reuben Guskin, its manager.

Boston, Newark, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit, St. Louis, Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg will be included in the circuit. One theatrical troupe will play four weeks in each city, where several troupes will play in rotation. Half of the salaries of the actors will be guaranteed by the Hebrew Actors' Union. A strong propaganda campaign will be conducted throughout the country to interest potential Yiddish theatre goers in the circuit.

Young Mizrahi Elects Officers at Closing Session

At the final session of the Young Mizrahi convention, held Tuesday night at the Hotel Pennsylvania, Manhattan, under the chairmanship of Z. Carp, the following officers for the ensuing year were elected: I. Epstein, president; Z. Carp, first vice-president; B. Hilson, second vice-president; Eva Aronson of Chicago, third vice-president; Jennie Cutler, secretary; M. Hagler, treasurer. The convention was brought to a close late at night with a speech by A. L. Gelman, editor of the St. Louis "Jewish Record."

Lubawitscher Rebbe Blesses America at Bunker Hill Day Fete

Boston, June 18—A huge throng crowded the grounds of the Crawford Street Synagogue, Roxbury, at the flag-raising exercises held on Bunker Hill Day, Tuesday morning, June 17. The chief guest of honor was the world-aristocratic Jewish family, Rabbi Joseph Schneersohn, better known as the "Lubawitscher Rebbe," who in a short speech, blessed America for its liberal attitude towards the Jewish people and all other races and creeds. The Rebbe was given a tremendous ovation.

Governor Allen, ex-Senator Butler, Representative Reverend Page, Representative Abraham Casson, Assistant Attorney General Louis Sawyer, Rabbi Harry Katzen, Rabbi William Drazin and Alexander Brin were the other speakers. Louis H. Steinberg, who presided, was introduced by Arthur Rabinowitz.

Stokowski Third Jew to Join Rockefeller Entertainment Plan

The \$250,000,000 Rockefeller radio and entertainment project in which two Jews are already actively interested, David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, and S. L. Rothafel, known as "Roxy," who will direct the amusements has enlisted the services of another Jew, Leopold Stokowski, one of the outstanding conductors in America, who is at present leader of the Philadelphia Orchestra.

Stokowski, who has conducted only one radio concert thus far, is at present studying the electrical technique of broadcasting and is experimenting with tonal apparatus for different effects.

Rabbinical Assembly Convention to be Held July 7

The Rabbinical Assembly of America in whose membership there are about 200 Conservative Rabbis, will have its annual convention at Tannersville, New York, on July 7, 8 and 9. The subjects that will be taken up at the convention are "The Community Federation and Jewish Religious Work," "The Community Center and the Synagogue," "A Federation for the Support of Jewish Religious Organizations," "The Relations of the Jewish to the Non-Jewish Community."

Among the speakers will be: Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, director of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies; Dr. A. A. Neuman and Ben Rosen, director of the Philadelphia Associated Talmud Torahs; Rabbi Eugene Kohn and Rabbi Leon S. Lang of Newark, and Rabbi Max Kadushin.

Over 150 rabbis are expected to attend, according to Rabbi Israel M. Goldman, chairman of the convention committee, and Dr. Louis Finkelstein, president of the Assembly.

Pittsburgh Zionists Say Brandeis Memo Will Not Aid United Front

Pittsburgh, June 18—Endorsement of the campaign of American Zionists for a united front and the belief that the proposal of Justice Brandeis would not further that aim was contained in a resolution adopted at the pre-Cleveland convention conference of Zionist Region No. 5, comprising delegates from Western Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio and West Virginia, held in the Y.M.H.A. here.

The text of the resolution adopted is as follows:

"We endorse the steps taken by the administrative committee of the Zionist Organization of America, aiming to unite all factions in the Zionist movement in America through the creation of a consolidated National Zionist administration, and especially endorse its action to that end in sending a delegation to consider this matter with Mr. Justice Brandeis.

"The conference places on record its judgment that the proposal made by Mr. Justice Brandeis would not lead to the establishment of the desired united front, nor the creation of harmony and cooperation in Zionist ranks, and therefore cannot be taken as a basis for action at the forthcoming Cleveland Zionist convention. We urge, however, the continuance of efforts to establish a united front which is so urgently needed."

Terms Judea Democratic Club "Irresponsible"

The Judea Democratic Club, in inviting Mayor Walker to speak before its Fourth of July gathering on the question of discrimination against Jews in employment in New York City, is attacked by Jacob Fishman, managing editor of the "Jewish Morning Journal." Writing in Tuesday's issue of his paper, Mr. Fishman says:

"The Judea Democratic Club has received once before in the Jewish press its merited slap for calling itself by the name it does. But it seems that this club is not concerned with public opinion and continues to exploit Jewish questions in connection with local politics. There lies before us an 'open letter' which this club has sent to Mayor Walker, asking him to be the great savior of the Jews who are being discriminated against with regard to employment in public utility corporations. What should the Mayor do? He must only come, on the Fourth of July, and deliver a speech before the club. He is even promised an audience of seventy-five thousand people. Then the question will probably be settled, and 'Hurrah for Mayor Walker!'

"It may be useless to attempt to talk to this group, but neither can one be silent about such irresponsibility. Jewish public opinion should cry out to these people, 'Hands off Jewish Affairs!'

Argentine Zionists Decide to Devote More Time to Hebrew Education of the Young

(By Our Buenos Aires Correspondent)

Buenos Aires, May 28—The twelfth annual convention of the Federation of Zionists in Argentina, which has just concluded its sessions here, decided to devote more time to the Hebrew education of the Jewish youth in this far South American republic than it has done hitherto. After a protracted discussion, in which several speakers pointed out how the younger Jewish generation of Argentina is being estranged from matters Jewish, the conference decided to appoint a Zionist "Vaad Ha-Hinuch", or Board of Education, which will control the existing Hebrew schools in Buenos Aires and the provinces, unify the curricula and open new schools. It was also decided that parents should be required to pay for the Jewish education of their children.

Among other resolutions which the conference adopted were:

To support the Argentine-Palestine Chamber of Commerce which was established here a year ago and which has since been making good progress.

To establish a publishing house which will issue Zionist literature in the Spanish language.

To bring Nahum Sokolow, world Zionist leader, to Argentina in the interests of Zionism.

To protest against anti-Semitic activities in Roumania.

The conference was greeted by Senator Dr. Diego Molinari, one of the leaders in Argentine political life and one of the best orators in the country who has many times before exhibited great sympathy for Jewish causes and who appeared last year at the meeting arranged by Argentine Zionists to protest Arab brutalities in Palestine.

The Chief Rabbi of the Sephardic community of Argentina, which consists of thirty thousand souls, and Senor Elnekave, former editor of the Constantinople paper, "El Judeo", expressed the hope that a better understanding and a spirit of more cooperation would soon be reached between the Sephardim and Ashkenazim of this country.

More than half a million pesos were raised during the past year for Zionist purposes, according to the report rendered by Senor Caplan, Executive Secretary of the Federation. This however included 316,000 pesos that were raised for the Palestine Emergency Fund after the August riots, and several speakers criticized the administration for not having raised larger sums during the year for the regular Zionist funds. A majority of the delegates however gave a vote of thanks to the present administration, and especially to Dr. Nisenson, retiring president of the Federation, for their fund-raising efforts.

Senor N. Gesang, until now vice-president, was elected president of the Argentine Zionists by the convention.

United Synagogue Raps Plan of School Time Off for Religion

A resolution opposing the plan to allow children in the public schools to take one hour a day from their regular class time to receive religious instruction was adopted by the executive council of the New York branch of the United Synagogue of America. The council contends that such a system would tend toward the integration of the school system with religious activities. The resolution adopted reads as follows:

Whereas the principle of total separation of Church and State is well established and fundamental in American life, and **Whereas** it is for the best interest of the American people that our great public school system should make for the unity and tolerance of all religious and non-religious elements that make up our great American population, and **Whereas** there has appeared in this country a movement for the utilization of our public school system in the service of the religious organizations for the purpose of strengthening various and diverse faiths, and **Whereas** one of the ways in which an attempt is made to use our schools for religious purposes is to ask the public schools to release children of various faiths one hour from their regular class work to obtain religious instruction, and **Whereas** this deprivation of full time school attendance and instruction and the requirement to attend and the sanction to permit the attendance during the time set for school attendance will tend toward the integration of the school system with religious activities,

Now, therefore be it resolved that the New York branch of the United Synagogue, representing 67 Jewish congregations in this city expresses its strong opposition to this attempt and it further calls upon the board of education definitely to rule against this projected plan, and to see to it that in those districts where the plan has already been instituted, directions be given for its discontinuance.

Hyman J. Reit, president, New York branch of the United United Synagogue of America; Rabbi Moses J. S. Abels, Rabbi W. B. Leon Hurwitz, Judge Benjamin Marvin, M. R. Silverman, and Harry H. Goebel signed the resolution.

Judge Reit, announcing the resolution, stated that he regarded the proposal to release children from school for the purpose of being given religious instruction as being "subversive to the best interests of both religion and state. Nothing must come into the school system that would tend to divide and emphasize differences."

are the chief part of these elements. Nevertheless these prayers are not prayers of hatred but prayers of freedom."

The spokesman of the German People's party, M. von Kardorff, dissociated himself from his party members in Thuringia who lend their support to Dr. Frick's anti-Semitic program. He called on the German government to establish order in Thuringia and to prohibit the anti-Semitic prayers and to take action against the anti-Semitic professors and the police officials.

Berlin, June 18—Berlin Jewry voiced its protest against the anti-Semitic activities in Thuringia at three huge mass meetings here sponsored by the General Association of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith. Speakers at the meetings deplored the fact that the German Government has not speedily put an end to the anti-Semitic agitation of Dr. Frick and his followers but has instead delayed the successful suppression of the agitation, by calling upon the German State Court to take legal action.

Johns Hopkins Honors Los Angeles Judge

Los Angeles, June 18—Judge Harry A. Hollzer, president of the Nathan Straus Palestine Society, president of the Temple B'nai B'rith Men's Club, and active in all local Jewish affairs, was signally honored by Johns Hopkins University, it was announced by Chief Justice Waste of the State Supreme Court.

Judge Hollzer was appointed on the proposed advisory committee of the University's Institute of Law at Baltimore, Md., to represent the Judicial Council of California, of which Judge Hollzer is secretary. At a recent convention of judicial councils held at Washington, D. C., Judge Hollzer presided for one day.

80% of Jewish Immigrants to U. S. in Decade Came Ere 1925

During the decade from 1920 to 1930, 345,477 Jewish immigrants arrived in the United States, according to figures given to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society yesterday. About four-fifths of this number, or 275,000, arrived in this country during the first four years, before the 1924 immigration laws of the United States went into effect.

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
