Attacks Jewish Film Chief for Bringing Eisenstein, Russian Director, Here

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Hollywood, Cal., June 20—A bitter attack against the Jewish clergy and leaders of the United States for not having cautioned the Paramount Film Company against bringing to this country the noted Russian moving picture director, Sergei Eisenstein, and against the officials of the Paramount Company for having brought Mr. Eisenstein here is contained in a telegram to Jesse L. Lasky, vice-president of the Paramount Company, from Major Frank Pease, president of the Hollywood Technical Directors' Institute.

Saying that "if your Jewish clergy and scholars have not enough courage to tell you, and you yourself haven't enough brains to know better, or enough loyalty to this land which has given you more than you ever had in history, to prevent your importing a cut-throat red-dog like Eisenstein, then let me inform you that we are bending every effort to have him deported," Major Pease terms the Paramount Company's bringing of Mr. Eisenstein to this country as "an unrepentable crime."

Eisenstein Called "Monster"

10,000 Turn Out for Funeral of Abraham Podliszewski

Warsaw, June 20—Ten thousand people turned out here yesterday for the funeral of Abraham Podliszewski, pioneer Zionist and Jewish communal worker, who died Wednesday. The funeral was attended by Zionist leaders, officials of the Jewish community and members of the Jewish Deputies Club.

Addresses were made by Prof. A. Schorr, Deputy Isaac Graubman, Leon Lewitte, Dr. J. Gottlieb and Dr. Noah Davidsohn, all of whom praised the achievements for the Jewish people of Podliszewski. After the funeral the huge gathering sang Hatikvah.

Seek Egyptian Jews as Agents for Land Sales in Palestine

Cairo, June 20—Egyptian Jews are being sought as agents to sell Palestine land owned by Arabs. Many Palestine Arabs have recently arrived seeking Jews willing to serve as agents. Fearing to sell land directly to the Jews in Palestine because of the propaganda of the Arab Executive, the Arabs who have land to sell are endeavoring to secure Egyptian-Jewish agents for that purpose.

Arab Scholars Spur Search for Moslem Records on Wailing Wall

Jerusalem, June 20—Professor J. Azhar of the University of Cairo, noted Arabic historian, has been asked by the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem to search the Moslem records in Jerusalem regarding the Wailing Wall, which has again become an important issue here with the arrival of the Wailing Wall Commission which will start its examination Monday into the Moslem and Jewish claims to the Wall. Issak Darwish, superintendent of the Moslem schools, has been sent to Damascus to search records there on the Wailing Wall.

Although unable to travel to Jerusalem for the Wailing Wall Commission, Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee and of the Jewish Theological Seminary, who has forwarded a detailed memorandum on the Wailing Wall to Jerusalem, Geneva and London in his capacity as chairman of the Jewish Agency's Wailing Wall Commission, will go to Geneva if the Wailing Wall Commission holds hearings there after its return from Palestine, the Hebrew daily, "Davar," reports.

In an endeavor to impress the Wailing Wall Commissioners with the sanctity of the Wall in Moslem eyes the Moslem Supreme Council has draped the top of the Wall facing the Mosque of Omar enclosure with carpets and has hung a sacramental light there giving the impression of a shrine. This is an unprecedented action.

Inquiries in New York by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency indicated that Dr. Adler will leave for Geneva July 16 in order to be present at any hearings there that the Wailing Wall Commission may decide to hold. He will be prepared to answer any questions on his memorandum and to discuss it or defend it before the Commission.

Says Arabs Confessed to Murders Before Execution

Jerusalem, June 20—Ahmed Elzeer, Arab executed at Acre Tuesday for the murder of Jews during last Summer's riots, confessed before he went to the gallows that he had killed "three foreign Jews in Hebron," according to the Arab paper, "Al Yarmuk." The same paper says that Mohammed Jamjum, another one of the Arabs who was hanged, confessed to having killed five Jews in Hebron.

The Arab paper, "El Hayat," reports that all three Arabs went to the gallows with henna-painted finger nails, as is customary among the Arabs for a feast.

Hear Mandates Body Critical of British Administration in Holy Land During Disturbances

Geneva, June 20—The attitude of the British administration in Palestine during last Summer's disturbances is severely criticized in the completed draft of the editorial committee's report on the Mandates Commission's observations on the Palestine situation, it is learned. The unanimously completed draft of the report is understood to be a large elaborate document touching on all Palestine questions. The next plenary session of the Commission will be devoted to a discussion of the draft of the report.

Approved as Professor for Chair of Racial Science

Berlin, June 20—Despite certain professorial opposition Professor S. Gruenter has been appointed to the chair of racial science recently created at the University of Jena by Dr. Frick, the Thuringian minister of education, whose anti-Semitic activities have been under fire in the German Reichstag. By negotiating with a number of professors inclined to support of the National Socialists, Dr. Frick was able to have Professor Gruenter's appointment approved.

Lay Cornerstone for Palestine Museum of Antiquities

Jerusalem, June 20—A tribute to the Rockefeller's two greatest interests in life, measures for combating disease and the advancement of education, was paid today by Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, in an address at the laying of the cornerstone of the Palestine Archeological Museum. John D. Rockefeller gave the funds for the Museum's building.

Sir John said that the Museum would house the antiquities of all the peoples who inhabited Palestine from the earliest times. The High Commissioner recalled that Palestine was the third country in which he had governed that was indebted to Mr. Rockefeller's beneficent activities. He declared that the Museum would be a "veritable treasury of antiquities of a country whose history has been the subject of the passionate interest of all races in the world."

Speaking on behalf of the Palestine department of antiquities, J. Richmond said that the Museum will add beauty to the ancient city. The building will house antiquities from pre-historic days to 1700. It will also contain a library, a lecture theatre and will serve as the headquarters for the government department of antiquities.

**Britain Probes Charge of Labor
Federation Against Hyamson,
Chief Immigration Officer**

London, June 20—The British government is inquiring into the complaints received from the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine that the evidence tendered to the Palestine Inquiry Commission by Albert Hyamson, chief immigration officer of Palestine, that the immigration certificates under the labor schedule were supplied in blank to the Federation was incorrect, the House of Commons was informed by Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary for the Colonies, in replying to a question from William Brown as to what steps the government proposed to take regarding these representations.

Dr. Shiels today denied that Sir John Simpson, investigating problems of land settlement, immigration and development in Palestine, had also been instructed to investigate the possibilities of greater agricultural development in Transjordan and the closer settlement of the nomadic population there.

**Non-Zionists in Egypt Aiding
Balfour Memorial Golden Book**

Cairo, June 20—Jewish circles far removed from the Zionist movement here have become interested in subscribing to the Balfour Golden Book which the Jewish National Fund is building up as a memorial to the father of the Balfour Declaration. Physicians, agronomists, lawyers, pharmacists, teachers, societies and various institutions have decided to take inscriptions.

**Seek to Assess Losses
from Field Mice Plague**

Jerusalem, June 20—Experts of the Palestine department of agriculture are touring the Jewish colonies in the Emek where the crops were recently destroyed by a plague of field-mice. The tour is being made in order to assess the losses to the colonists.

**New Educational Methods Being Tried Out in J.D.C. Schools
in Eastern Europe and Jewish Agency Schools in Palestine**

The newest trends in educational thought and endeavor are now being tried out in war torn Europe, as well as in Palestine, according to a statement issued yesterday by David M. Bressler, one of the national co-chairmen of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

In the areas of Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Czecho-Slovakia, Hungary, Austria, Transylvania, and Palestine there have been subsidized by the Joint Distribution Committee, he said, no less than 2,031 schools with 245,835 students. This committee is the instrumentality through which funds contributed by the Jews of America for the reconstructive relief of their co-religionists overseas are administered. It is one of the beneficiaries of the Allied Jewish Campaign which is raising \$6,000,000 from American Jewry for the continuance of the Joint Distribution Committee work, and for the economic program of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

Three Types of J.D.C. Schools

These schools which dot the various parts of Eastern Europe and Palestine are of three distinct types, Talmud Torah schools, schools for girls and trade schools.

Of the three types, the trade schools present the most interesting experiment, Mr. Bressler said, as in these schools cultural courses combined with instruction in manual training, to enable the graduates to integrate themselves into the changing industrial order of Eastern Europe.

"One of the most unique schools subventioned by the Joint Distribution Committee is in Sighet-Mamoresch, a town in Sub-Carpathia, where the age old Talmudic study-traditions of the Jews are carried on, alongside with tuition in the modern crafts of the present industrial era," Mr. Bressler said. "Here the young men and boys wearing the biblical fringed garment, called the 'Arba Kanofth' (four corners) and their heads covered with skull caps, study the Talmud in the morning, and do knitting, weaving, and brush-making or carpentry in the afternoon.

6,000 in Trade Schools

"Almost 6,000 young men and women are receiving manual training in the trade schools. Girls, too, have been taught to do their share in the rebuilding of Eastern Europe. And, it is no unusual sight to see girls standing on top of threshing machines, feeding grain into the hopper, and young men driving their tractors throughout the country.

"The World War practically destroyed, in fact virtually obliterated, all of the systems of Jewish cultural and religious training, and one of the most notable achievements of the Joint Distribution Committee was the revivification and restoration of elementary, middle and higher systems of learning among the Jews. The effort has been made," Mr. Bressler stated, "to maintain in all countries not alone elemen-

tary and intermediate schools, but all the higher types of Jewish institutional schools of learning, such as theological schools, seminaries, and teachers' colleges."

Complete Hebrew System in Palestine

In Palestine, Mr. Bressler declared, there is one of the most complete Hebrew educational systems in the world, ranging all the way from the kindergarten to the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus. The Jewish pioneers there regard schools for their children indispensable as bread. And, a village having as few as ten children, has a kindergarten, at least. It was in 1903 that the first Hebrew Kindergarten was established in Palestine, along Froebel lines. Since that time, however, the kindergartens have been influenced by the Montessori system, and now have a synthetic program of work and play. A delightful, homelike atmosphere prevails in the Palestinian kindergarten, where hot meals are furnished to the children at a very low charge, as part of the child welfare program of Ha-dassah, the women's Zionist Organization of America.

Teaching of Hebrew Songs

Excellent results have been achieved in recent years by the kindergartens in the teaching of Hebrew songs, said Mr. Bressler. The youngsters are taught to form and conduct choirs of their own. The Hebrew language, long reckoned, like Latin and Greek, among the classical, but "dead" languages, has taken new life and has become the living, every day language of the people.

"This renaissance of the Hebrew language can be directly traced to the influence of the public school system in Palestine, beginning with the kindergarten where the little tot is taught to prattle his numbers and nursery rhymes in Hebrew," he said.

"Indeed, modern Palestine has a most striking educational system with its village schools, the great gymnasium at Tel Aviv, the Technicum at Haifa, where artisans and engineers are trained, the "Co-Ed" farm school at Mikveh, the girls' farm school at Nahalal, and at the apex of the whole system, the Hebrew University."

28,000 in Agency Schools

Mr. Bressler said that 28,000 children attend 227 schools under the jurisdiction of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, divided as follows: 117 kindergartens; 95 elementary schools; 8 secondary schools and seminaries; and 7 vocational schools. The educational system is so far reaching that notwithstanding there is no compulsory education law in Palestine, almost every Jewish child receives some schooling. To the upkeep of this unique system of education, the government of Palestine gives 20,000 pounds; the municipalities and colonies 16,165 pounds; the parents pay about 8 per cent in fees, and the remainder comes from the funds of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, which is the other beneficiary of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

Facts of Discrimination Against Jews Discussed

Facts about discriminations practiced against Jews in this country in their efforts to obtain employment, which are now being investigated by a committee appointed by the American Jewish Congress, were discussed on Thursday at a closed meeting following a luncheon at the Biltmore Hotel. Eighteen business leaders who came to the meeting and who listened to an address by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise offered their support and cooperation in the investigation.

In his address Dr. Wise declared that Jewish men and women in the United States are now so handicapped in business that the situation is assuming serious proportions. He urged those present to cooperate in the investigation and declared that several Christian organizations had promised their support in this work.

Investigating Committee

Among those who reported on the results of the investigation up to now were David L. Podell, chairman of the committee which is undertaking the work; Bernard S. Deutsch, president of the American Jewish Congress; and Rabbi Jacob X. Cohen, executive secretary of the Free Synagogue. At the next session of the American Jewish Congress, to be held in October, a full report of the study will be made.

Judge Josiah Cohen Died a Poor Man

Pittsburgh, June 20—Although he had made continual contributions to charities throughout his life, the will of Judge Josiah Cohen, dean of Pennsylvania judiciary, offered for probate today, revealed that the jurist died practically a poor man.

An estate, valued at \$5,000 by officials in the office of the Register of Wills, was left to his wife, Carrie Cohen, in the will of Common Pleas Court Judge Cohen, who died in his ninetieth year June 11. Mrs. Cohen is named sole executrix.

Judge Cohen was known throughout Pennsylvania for his support of various charitable institutions. With Mrs. Cohen he contributed \$20,000 last month to the Allied Jewish Campaign. The jurist had been judge in the Common Pleas Court of Allegheny county for 30 years. He was the first Jewish attorney and later the first Jewish judge in the county.

The will made by Judge Cohen, it was revealed today, was very brief in text. Mrs. Cohen, it is reported, has an independent income.

Jewish Member of Byrd South Pole Expedition Had Talith, Tefilim, Sidur with Him

The first talith (praying shawl), tefilim (phylacteries), sidur (prayer book) and tsitsit (fringes worn by Jews on edge of clothes), to be taken to the South Pole was part of the baggage of Master Sergeant Benjamin Roth, the only Jewish member of the Byrd Expedition to the South Pole, who together with the other Polar heroes and explorers was honored by the City of New York on his return. Sergeant Roth, who was recently promoted for his excellent work with the expedition to the Antarctic regions, is 38 years old, and was one of Admiral Byrd's chief assistants on the expedition, his duties consisting chiefly of keeping the aeroplane engines in order.

Sergeant Roth was known to the rest of the members of the expedition as "Benny" and sometimes as "Jew-fellow" in a good-humored vein, and was very popular with them. He formerly lived in the Brownsville section of Brooklyn where his brother, Samuel, still lives. Roth was born on Avenue A on the East Side. His mother died when he was four years old and five years later his father too died. At the age of 24 he joined the United States Army where he distinguished himself as a motor mechanic, taking a special interest in aeroplane motors.

When Admiral Byrd was preparing for his South Pole Expedition and was picking the personnel that was to accompany him, he asked the United States Army to recommend a first-rate aeroplane mechanic. Benjamin Roth was recommended and received the appointment.

Other members of the expedition, speaking of Roth, declared that the latter never sought to hide his Jewishness, either in the Army or as a member of the expedition, but, on the contrary, has been very proud of it. The talith, tefilim, sidur and tsitsit that he took with him to the Antarctic were given him by his brother. Roth had already finished serving his Army term for which he had enlisted, but desirous of going to the South Pole, enlisted for another three-year period.

Deny Yiddish Section in Detroit Library to Be Closed

Detroit, June 20—A rumor that the Jewish section at the Utley Library is to be given up and the Jewish Reading Room closed, was denied yesterday by M. Olveling, superintendent of branch libraries of the Public Library of Detroit.

The only change, declared Mr. Olveling, to be made is that the Jewish Reading Room will also be used to house books in English and other languages, due to the decreased use of the room by Jews and the decrease in demand of Jewish books. For the same reason the Jewish librarian employed on a part-time basis has been discharged because the small use of the room and Jewish books does not warrant continuing this position.

Hadassah Raises \$100,000 for Allied Jewish Campaign

The headquarters of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, announced yesterday the receipt of \$100,000 for the Hadassah Medical Organization in Palestine. This amount is credited to the Allied Jewish Campaign, in which Hadassah is participating, and represents contributions by Hadassah chapters for six weeks up to June 18.

Included in the total sum contributed through Hadassah was \$50,000 from the Chicago chapter. Credited to the New York Allied Jewish Campaign were \$15,000 from the Brooklyn chapter; \$4,500 from Mt. Vernon, and \$1,000 from Kew-Forest. Contributions of \$1,000 or more from other parts of the country were: Boston, Mass., \$5,000; St. Louis, Mo., \$2,000; Baltimore, Md., \$1,500; Akron, O., \$1,350, and \$1,000 each from Portland, Me.; Newark, N. J.; Atlanta, Ga. and Chelsea, Mass.

Prominent Catholic Endorses Campaign

The following is the letter that accompanied a \$5,000 check to the New York Allied Jewish Campaign, from George MacDonald, prominent Catholic layman and Papal Marquis:

"I am deeply impressed with the terrible conditions in Eastern Europe which still continue as a result of the war. They present a picture of horror which challenges the sympathy of everyone. I am also happy to see that the relief work is along the lines of reconstruction and of making people again self-supporting instead of merely alms-giving.

"I recall frequent instances of generosity of Jewish givers to Catholic philanthropies, and I in turn would like to emphasize the thought that in an undertaking such as this all creeds and denominations should stand together. Accordingly I am sending you here-with my check for Five Thousand Dollars as a contribution to the New York Allied Jewish Campaign."

Zionists of Lynn Choose New Officers

Lynn, Mass., June 20—The annual election of officers of the Lynn Zionist District was held this week with Abraham Goldberg, orator and publicist, as guest speaker. Mr. Goldberg urged that all efforts be exerted in the hope of strengthening the Z.O.A., and expressed the hope that a united front of American Zionists be realized by encouraging further negotiations with the Brandeis group.

The officers elected for the coming year of the Lynn district were: honorary president, Henry L. Yozell; president, Willy Nordwind; vice-president, Abraham S. Burg; treasurer, Louis Ravven; secretary, Herbert M. Leavitt. In order to stimulate an interest in Zionist work in Lynn, there was elected a membership committee, consisting of the officers, together with Mrs. Henry Yozell, the chairman of the sisterhood of the Lynn Temple, and other leading Jews and Jewesses of the community.

Rabbi Heller on St. Paul Letter of Jacob de Haas

Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin,

My attention has been called to a letter written by Jacob de Haas to Louis Gordon of St. Paul. This letter has been given some publicity, and was not intended by Mr. de Haas for private consumption.

I do not wish to enter into a discussion for the present of the specific proposals of Mr. Brandeis and his friends concerning Zionist reorganization. I write merely to correct two statements made by Mr. de Haas. I would not like them to go uncontradicted.

Mr. de Haas is correct in saying that the Brandeis statement was published with the consent of the Committee representing the Zionist Administration. Abraham Goldberg is, therefore, wrong in his public statement to the contrary.

Mr. de Haas proceeds to say that the Brandeis proposal "was not an ultimatum." This is misleading in the extreme. Nor is it true that our Committee came to Washington without a plan, and without "even a united opinion as to what it was driving at." At the first meeting we were not permitted by Mr. Brandeis even to begin the discussion of plans. At the second, after the Brandeis statement had been read and discussed, we presented a carefully considered counter-proposal, intended to create a genuine union of all Zionist forces in the United States. It was at once made clear to us that this counter-proposal could not be entertained.

When asked by one of the members of our committee whether then we must regard the proposal of his "group" as an "ultimatum," Mr. Brandeis himself smilingly objected to the word, which savors somewhat of military parlance, but said something like this: "No, let us say rather that it is our final judgment." The conclusion intended was that the Zionist Organization is in the position of either taking or leaving their proposition.

Personally I regretted and regret this attitude. Perhaps Mr. de Haas's letter indicates a desire for further negotiations. I hope that is the case. If so, I am sure I can speak for the committee in saying that we shall be glad to meet again and to continue our conversations. The truth remains, for the present, that the Brandeis proposal is the "final judgment" of the group we met, and the many suggestions that have been made in Jewish journals that they be made the basis of further negotiations are impossible of execution on our part.

"What are you trying to do, turn the American cinema into a communist cesspool? Remember, America is a harbor and asylum, the refuge of the ages for the Hebrews, a land where there has never been a pogrom, a land where never a Jew has been killed because he was a Jew—a land that has no Pale, a land where worthy, intelligent and characterful Jews are as respected and honored as all other men. "Your unspeakable crime in importing Eisenstein should be as much reprobated and resisted by decent Jewish Americans as it will be by all the other loyal Americans. It won't take any Samson to pull down the Bolshevik temple you are starting, and at this rate it won't be long now. Mene, Mene, Tekel, Upharsin."

Boraisha Executive Secretary of American Friends of Vilna Institute

At a recent session of the executive committee of the American section of the Friends of the Yiddish Scientific Institute of Vilna, Menachem Boraisha, well-known Yiddish writer, was appointed executive secretary. Hitherto the efforts in this country on behalf of the Institute were conducted by a secretariat of three persons, consisting of I. L. Cahan, Dr. A. Mukdoni and Dr. Jacob Shatzky.

Anglo-Jewish Leader Satisfied With Hungarian Jews' Status

London, June 20—Satisfaction with the improved situation of the Jews in Hungary and congratulations to Count Bethlen for having taken the initiative in bringing about the present state of affairs by amending the numerous clausus law were expressed by Lucien Wolf, prominent Anglo-Jewish leader and secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association, at a meeting today with Count Bethlen, the Hungarian premier who is now visiting in London.

Count Bethlen told Mr. Wolf that the law had to be amended and that he was glad it was done, adding that the unwholesome post-war mentality was passing and the situation regarding the Jews as well as the general situation was becoming more normal.

Cherson and Krivorog Jewish Colonists Lacking in Flour

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 20—The Jewish colonists in the Krivorog and Cherson districts are suffering from an acute lack of flour and other foodstuffs. It is understood that the Soviet government will send immediately 3,000,000 pud (98,000 pounds) of flour to Nikopol and similar quantities to Krivorog and Cherson districts.

The government is also expected to supply the colonists in these regions with other foodstuffs that will suffice until the new crop, which in the Krivorog region is expected to be very good, exceeding even the good crops in other colonies.

Jews Aid in Brooklyn's \$100,000,000 Medical Center

Brooklyn's planned \$100,000,000 medical center became an actuality over the week-end when Joseph J. Baker, prominent Jewish attorney and president of the Jewish Hospital, announced that in his capacity as counsel for the new center, that the New York State Board of Regents had voted the charter to organize the Long Island College of Medicine. The new College is to be affiliated with nine Brooklyn hospitals, the Jewish Hospital among them. Judge Harry E. Lewis is also sponsoring the new center.
