# Wailing Wall Commission Opens First Session; Jewish Case to Start Wednesday (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 23—The international Wailing Wall Commission here to investigate Moslem and Jewish claims to the Wall, held its first session today. The Arabs proposed fourteen representatives at the hearings and Emil Loefgren, the chairman, informed the press that after the first meeting the Jews will probably have an equal number.

## Yellin Applauds Neutrality

## Release Rabbi Lazarev (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Moscow, June 23—The correspondent

of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency has learned that the Soviet government intends to recall Rabbi Lazarev, Chief Rabbi of Leningrad, from his exile in Marim, permitting him to reside in Soviet Russia but not in Leningrad, Moscow or four other centers. Rabbi Lazarev was arrested on Feb-

ruary 26 by the Russian secret police on the charge of maintaining illegal connections with Rabbinical organizations abroad. On April 3, Rabbi Lazarev was found guilty and was sentence to ten years exile in a concentration camp.

#### Political Commission of Jewish Agency in Session (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 23-The British government must be impressed with the fact that the Jewish National Home in Palestine is impossible without men and land, declared Lord Melchett, president of the English Zionist Federation and chairman of the political commission of the Jewish Agency which opened an urgent session here today. Lord Melchett pointed out that in fact "the Mandate without these essentials is a contradiction. In the meanwhile Jewry must not relax its efforts, but on the contrary must concentrate its energies on overcoming the present difficulties."

The first session was given over to reports on studies and research of ber of Jewish cities. Dr. Alexander M. Dushkin of Chicago presided at this session. Ine surveys presented traced the problem of Jewish education during the past five years in Omaha, Bufalo, Montreal, Boston, Detroit, Camden, Wilmington and Seranton, and Trenton. Education Community Responsibility

It was the consensus of opinion in these reports that in an increasing the National Council for Jewish Educaing a community responsibility rather than the function of individual synagogues or special groups within the community. This factor, the speakers stated, has resulted not alone in securing greater funds for the development of this work but it has made communities more "education-minded" and it has tended to break down the great indifference to Jewish education.

## Indifference Noted

One of the greatest drawbacks to the development of Jewish education in this country, it was declared, was the indifference of parents towards having their children attend Jewish schools. This indifference, the speakers announced, is particularly devastating in nounced, is particularly devastating in its effect in breaking up the Jewish home in America. The surveys also pointed out that in the number of cities investigated there are from 30% to 60% of the children in those communities who are receiving a Tewish education.

The second session held in the afternoon was devoted to reports on "Jew-ish History Inquiry." A. P. Schoolman, Executive Director of the Central Jewish Institute and Camps, presided. Dr. Julius B. Maller, director

#### Results of Test On the whole the children, according

to Dr. Maller, seemed to be better able to repeat facts than to interpret events in Jewish history. This is probably due to the fact, he pointed out, that insufficient time is given to instruction in Jewish religious schools, and further that insufficient emphasis is placed on the idea of continuity in the instruction of Jewish history. Dr. Maller also discovered an interesting sex difference in that boys scored higher than girls, age for age and grade for grade Dr. Emanuel Garoran, educational director of the Department of Syna-gogue School Extension of Cincinnati, spoke on "Recent Tendencies in the Teaching of History." He said that one of the most important problems the teaching of Jewish history is that of finding out what ought to be taught.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Saratoga Springs, June 23-The establishment of a colony in Palestine by contributions to the Jewish National Fund and the taxation of members for the reconstruction work done by the Ort and Peoples' Tools Campaign in Eastern Europe were approved by the 44th annual convention of the Independ-426 lodges in all parts of the country

The convention, which is being presided over by former Congressman Nathan Perlman, Grand Master, received greetings from President Hoover expressing appreciation for "the high service this Order has done through teaching and practice of the best ideals of humanity and citizenship". Greetings were also received from Lieutenant Governor Lehman. Former Judge Irving Goldsmith welcomed the delegates to the city on behalf of the mayor.

In his presidential message, Grand Master Perlman reported that the Or-der now has 103,793 members, 51,610 being women. Class A membership has 95,977, class B 2,360, class C 5,456. He recommended the elimination of membership classes and the creation of one type of membership. A financial report showed that on June 1, 1930 the en-dowment reserve fund amounted to \$2,022,980.

Dr. Samuel Margoshes, editor of the "Day," speaking in the name of the Jewish National Fund, appealed for the creation of a Brith Abraham colony in Palestine. Harry Lang spoke for the Ort and the Peoples' Tool Campaign and Bernard Richards spoke for the American lewish Congress.

### Leo Feist, Music Publishing King, Is Dead at Sixty

Leo Feist, the owner of the largest publishing house for popular music in the world, is dead at his home in Mount Vernon. He was sixty years old. He is survived by a wife and three sons, two of whom are in the firm.

Among the famous songs which the Among the famous songs which the Feist house published were "Over There", for which Mr. Feist paid George M. Cohan \$35,000; "Three o'Clock in the Morning"; and songs by George Gershwin and Paul Whiteman George Gershwin and Faul Williams and members of his orchestra. Last December Mr. Feist merged his company with Carl Fisher, Inc., and the National Broadcasting Company as the Radio Music Company, a corporation capitalized at \$6,600,000.

With Rabbi Meer Berlin presiding, Rabbis Kook, Sonnen-feld and Blau and David Yellin and Mordecai Eliash put the finishing touches on the memorandum. The rabbinate here has received telegrams from rabbinical councils all over the world empowering it to present the Jewish case. Mesages have come from New York, Montreal, Antwerp, Rome, Amsterdam, Bucharest, Paris, Johannesburg and Copenhagen.

The Commissioners today informed the Jewish Agency that they intended to visit the principal synagogues in Jerusalem. Emir Said El Jazairi today arrived from Damascus to appear before the Wailing Wall Commission on behalf of the Moroccans living in the vicinity of the Wall.
