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Charge Jewish Refugees Are Advised to Become Catholics to Obtain Hungarian Citizenship

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, June 26—A charge that in certain circles the Jewish refugees of Fuenfkirchen, Hungary, have been advised to submit to conversion as Catholics as a condition of attaining Hungarian citizenship was made today in the Hungarian parliament by Rothenstein and Esterjalyos, Social Democratic deputies, in the debate on the government's control of aliens.

The two Social-Democratic deputies blamed the government's "barbaric method of alien control" for the expulsion of only Jews or Socialists, while the ministry of the interior "generally deals with Jewish matters differently than it does with affairs affecting Catholics or Protestants." M. Sztovszky, minister of the interior, limited his reply to saying that his chief concern was the safeguarding of the interests of the country at all costs and it was for that purpose that the order concerning alien control was promulgated.

Academical Senate Denounces National Democratic Students' Attacks on Jewish Students

Warsaw, June 26—The Polish Academical Senate has decided to publicly denounce the National Democratic students for their March 12th attack on Jewish students in the Anatomical Institute of the Warsaw University, after a street demonstration. The Senate described the attack, in which a number of Jewish students were hurt when the National Democrats expelled them from the Institute, as premeditated.

In initiating the inquiry in justice to the Jewish students, the Academical Senate declared that the question of Jewish corpses for Jewish medical students must be solved by corresponding legislation. The trouble at the Anatomical Institute began when the Polish students insisted that their Jewish classmates be expelled until they could obtain more Jewish corpses.

Five Berlin Synagogue Desecrators Sent to Jail

Berlin, June 26—Five members of the National Socialist party found guilty of desecrating the Kottbusser synagogue in Berlin, have been sentenced to five months imprisonment. Of the entire quintet none is over twenty. At first they behaved impudently but later expressed regret and said that they committed the desecration while they were drunk. It is noteworthy that Adolph Hitler, leader of the National Socialist party, has ordered them expelled from the party.

Wailing Wall Commission Will Ask Moslems to Prove Exact Title to Wall, Buildings

Jerusalem, June 26—The Wailing Wall Commission will ask the Moslems to prove their exact title to the Wall and to the surrounding buildings, it was announced at this morning's session of the Commission by its chairman, Emil Loeffgren. He expressed the thanks of the Commission to the Jews for "the interesting memorandum" on the historical connection of the Jews with the Wall which was submitted yesterday. In order to read it the Commission held no afternoon session yesterday.

Chairman Loeffgren said that he observed that the Jews do not claim ownership of the Wall, yet absolute property laws are not applicable to Holy Places, he declared, "over which the fiercest battles are always fought." Hence he said the Moslems will be asked to prove their title to the Wall and the surrounding buildings, while the Commission will desire the Jews to explain whether individual or congregational ritual is performed at the Wall, the difference between a congregational service at the Wall and one in the synagogue, what appurtenances are necessary for the service and what for the personal convenience of the worshippers and finally who arranges the services.

Dr. Mordecai Eliash, chief of the Jewish counsel, explained that the Jews do not intend to dispute the Moslems' property rights but they do consider that ownership does not entitle the owners to rebuild or alter the structure. He handed the Commission a list of the members of the Rabbinical Committee for Safeguarding the Rights of Religious Jews at the Holy Places.

He explained photographs of the inscriptions on the monoliths of the Wailing Wall, several score of which were defaced before the Commission arrived. Dr. Eliash also disputed the Moslems' claim that Jewish worshippers in the past observed silence at the Wall, offering photographs showing dense multitudes as evidence that silence was impossible.

Dr. Eliash submitted photographs of screens at the Wall as well as Wailing Wall accounts recording numerous vouchers for payments to the Arabs for the removal of camel dung, repairs, fixing of benches and the water supply.

Select Weinstein to Succeed Late Rabbi Jacob Nieto

San Francisco, June 26—Rabbi Jacob Weinstein of Austin, Tex., has been selected by Congregation Shearith Israel's board of directors to succeed the late Rabbi Jacob Nieto. The congregation will meet July 8 to ratify the selection.

Polish Jewish Council in Memo to Premier Details Needs of Polish Jewry

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 26—A memorandum specifying the great need which Polish Jewry is suffering was submitted to the Polish premier today by the Jewish National Council, a body representing Jewish Jewry. The Council enumerated the particular hardships under which the Jews are laboring and stated that the continuously falling income from relatives abroad, particularly from America, added to the difficulties of their position.

Declaring that the problem of saving the Polish Jews has now become a general state problem, since continuous appeals to Jews abroad diminishes Poland's prestige and decreases her credit possibilities abroad, the Council added that the government shows no understanding of the problem and is not taking into account the seriousness of the situation, which, it is charged, the government has thus far ignored.

"The government," says the memorandum, "must show initiative and must prepare a clear program that will lead to the abolition of these causes which have resulted in our present catastrophic position".

National Socialists Launch Attack on Jews in Schleswig

Berlin, June 26—A policy of terrorization has been launched in Schleswig-Holstein province against the Jews by the National-Socialist party. Members of this party hold many positions in the courts as well as provincial offices. A slogan "don't buy from Jewish shopkeepers" has been circulated through the province by the National Socialists, in an attempt to frighten the population which does not dare to enter Jewish places of business, as a result.

Arabs and Jews Unite in War on Plague of Field Mice

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 26—The mukhtars from the Arab villages of Kaslot and Doriah today met with representatives of the Zionist settlements in the Afulah district preparatory to common action against the plague of field mice which has already destroyed crops in the region. A committee of five, three Jews and two Arabs, was named to demand that the government agricultural department abolish the land and tithe taxes this year, grant loans for maintenance and seed and take more energetic action against the plague.

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**Judge Max S. Levine Head
of United Yeshivah Chest
For Greater New York**

The Honorable Max S. Levine, Judge of the Court of General Sessions, was elected President of the United Yeshivah Chest, a federation of Jewish parochial schools in Greater New York, at a meeting of a representative Council held yesterday at the Chest headquarters.

The Chest was organized for the purpose of aiding the work of the schools, known as Yeshivahs, having for their purpose the combination of secular studies with Jewish learning. The English departments of these schools are conducted in accordance with the standards of the New York elementary and secondary schools under the supervision of the New York Board of Education. The Hebrew departments are conducted on the basis of a curriculum which has the approval of the Orthodox rabbinate.

The eight schools composing the Chest have a total enrollment of approximately 5,000 children and a general annual budget of close to a million dollars. Most of the schools provide both elementary and secondary education for their pupils.

A large percentage of the children attending these schools are given tuition free. It will be the purpose of the Council to place the administration of the schools, which have been suffering lately from shortage of funds, on a sound budgetary basis and to coordinate the fund raising activities.

**Mrs. Mayer and Max Adler
Trustees of Chicago Exposition

Chicago, June 26—Mrs. Davis Mayer, widow of the late owner of Schlesinger & Mayer, now Carson Pirie Scott & Co., and Max Adler, donor of the Adler Planetarium, were among the two women and seven men who were elected to the board of trustees of the Chicago's Century of Progress exposition, it was announced at fair headquarters.

**See Jewish Education Minus Religion Estranging Jews
from Judaism; Dushkin Heads Jewish Education Council**

Jewish education without religion is estranging Jews from Judaism, declared speakers at the concluding session of the Fifth Annual Conference of the National Council for Jewish Education which met at the Jewish Club. Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism and Ludwig Vogelstein, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, were the principal speakers. Dr. Leo L. Honor of Chicago, presided.

Professor Kaplan, in his address which dealt with "How to Teach Religion in the Jewish Schools," advocated the training of teachers who would specialize in the science and pedagogy of religion. Men and women, Dr. Kaplan said, who devote themselves exclusively to teaching ought to qualify as teachers with the same concentration of attention to pedagogic details as those who qualify as teachers of subjects like music or the arts. The teaching of religion should not be entrusted, he added, to the average teacher, for it requires considerable specialization.

Elect New Officers

Following Dr. Kaplan's address, the election of officers took place with Dr. Alexander M. Dushkin of Chicago chosen as president. B. Isaacs of Detroit, Michigan, was elected treasurer and Dr. Mordecai Soltes, secretary. The new executive committee is composed of: I. Abrams, Pittsburgh, Pa.; S. Benderly, New York City; I. S. Chipkin, New York City; E. Gamoran, Cincinnati; J. S. Golub, Cincinnati; A. H. Friedland, Cleveland; Ben Eddin, Chicago; L. L. Honor, Chicago; Louis Hurwich, Boston; M. M. Kaplan, New York; J. B. Pollak, New York; Ben Rosen, Philadelphia; Z. H. Scharfstein, New York; A. P. Schoolman, New York; M. Soltes, New York.

A luncheon was tendered to the delegates by the Department of Synagogue and School Extension of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, with Ludwig Vogelstein acting as host. In his address, Mr. Vogelstein stated that a large portion of the present generation of American Jews is growing away from Judaism. The problem of winning it back can be solved to a great extent, he emphasized, by Jewish educators.

Present Generation Estranged

"There is no doubt," Mr. Vogelstein said, "that the generation which is now grown to manhood is largely estranged from our religion. Judging from my experience, I do not believe these men and women are entirely lost to Judaism. The best elements of this generation will find their way back to the faith of their fathers as they grow older and assume family responsibilities, especially the education of their children. However, having lost one generation in the mad scramble for material wealth and in the course of adjustment of immigrant families to American conditions, let us consider how we can save the children of this

generation. These youngsters have been born in America. Many of their parents were born here and they are quite adjusted to their surroundings. In short, they are American boys and girls."

In the evening a dinner was tendered to the delegates by the Jewish Education Association of New York City at which members of the Council and other speakers commended the Board of Education of the City of New York for its cooperation in inaugurating a course in Hebrew in the local high schools. Among those who spoke were Dr. H. G. Campbell, Associate Superintendent of Schools; Jacob Billikopf, Executive Director of the Philadelphia Federation of Jewish Charities; Israel S. Chipkin, Israel Unterberg, president of the Jewish Education Association and Bernard Semel.

**N. Y. Delegates to Zionist
Convention Turn Down
Brandeis-Mack Memo**

The Brandeis-Mack memorandum was declared to be unacceptable in a resolution adopted by a majority vote at a meeting of New York delegates to the Zionist convention in Cleveland, which was presided over by Leo Wolfsohn. A minority of the delegates was of the opinion that the memorandum would be acceptable with certain modifications. All the points in the memorandum were thoroughly discussed at the meeting which lasted until 2 o'clock in the morning.

Among those who spoke against acceptance of the memorandum were Abraham Goldberg, Jacob Fishman, Leo Wolfsohn, Charles Cowen and several others. Among those who argued for accepting the memorandum with certain modifications were J. Waterman Wise, Rabbi Benjamin and Morris Zeldin. A steering committee of New York delegates to the Cleveland convention was elected at the meeting.

**Jewish Engineer Wins \$7,500
Prize for First Novel**

Irving Fineman has been awarded the \$7,500 Longmans Green & Company prize for his first novel, "This Pure Young Man," which was chosen from some 1,000 manuscripts submitted in the competition. The book will be published, probably in September.

Mr. Fineman, who is a civil engineer, and who has been on the engineering faculty of the University of Illinois, is in his early thirties. He has traveled extensively and two years ago spent some time in Palestine and Roumania, investigating conditions of the Jews, which resulted in several articles published by the "Menorah Journal" and the "New Palestine."

At present Mr. Fineman is in France where he is working on his new novel, which is on a Jewish theme.

Z. O. A. Reports \$20,000,000 Raised Here for Palestine in 9 Years; Suggests U. S. Interference on Palestine

Cleveland, O., June 26—Five hundred delegates from every part of the United States are gathering here for the opening Sunday afternoon at the Cleveland Public Auditorium of the thirty-third annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America. Because of the critical situation that exists with regard to Palestine and because of the demand for a united front in the Zionist ranks, there is an unprecedented interest in the annual gathering, and the sessions are expected to be of a stormy nature, particularly when the delegates debate the proposals on Zionist administration submitted by Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis, who was ousted from the leadership of the Zionist Organization exactly nine years ago—also at a convention in Cleveland.

Administrative Committee Reports

A report by the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization, which is to be submitted to the convention, covers the financial, political and cultural work of the Organization during the past year. At the same time there is a review of what the administration which came into power in 1921 accomplished during this period. Between May, 1921 and April 30, 1930, the records show that under the auspices of the Zionist Organization of America, through the Keren Hayesod and the United Palestine Appeal, the amount of \$20,044,160.32 was raised for reconstruction work in Palestine. Comparison is also made with the amounts raised by the previous administration, which was headed by Supreme Court Justice Brandeis. These figures show that between August, 1914, and May, 1921, the Provisional Zionist Committee and the Palestine Restoration Fund raised \$5,738,988.32.

Discussing the attitude of the British Government in the administration of Palestine, and the policies of the Government toward establishing the Jewish National Home, the report of the Zionist Organization declares:

Britain's Attitude Disquieting

"The attitude adopted by Great Britain with regard to Palestine ever since the August disturbances has proved ever more disquieting. The nullification attitude reached its climax in the middle of May when the British Colonial Office suspended Jewish labor immigration into Palestine, and rescinded immigration certificates that had been authorized previously by High Commissioner Chancellors as economically justified. A few weeks later the British Government issued a White Paper in which it accepted practically all the findings of the Shaw Commission of Inquiry which had been sent to Palestine to ascertain the origin of the disturbances of August.

"Both acts are universally regarded by Zionists as a violation of the spirit and the letter of the Mandate and tend to impair the confidence of Jewry in the sincere intentions of the Mandatory Power to carry out the promise which

it made and which was sealed by the nations of the world, including the United States Government."

The report points out that a demand has been made in various Jewish quarters that the Mandate over Palestine be withdrawn from England. Considering the steps which should be taken by the Zionist Organization at the Convention, the report says: "Whether American Zionists care to give closer consideration to this aspect of the problem should be taken up at the convention. Another course open to Zionists is to appeal in a body to the United States Government for its intervention with Great Britain in regard to the latter's administration of Palestine. This course suggests itself both on moral and legal grounds, particularly in view of the sympathy which both President Hoover and Vice-President Curtis have repeatedly shown to Jewish aspirations in Palestine."

The convention opens Sunday afternoon with greetings by former City Manager William R. Hopkin, Rabbi Barnett Brickner and Ezra Shapiro.

Rothenberg to Resign Zionist Post for Personal Affairs

Morris Rothenberg, vice-president of the Zionist Organization of America, one of the national co-chairmen of the Allied Jewish Campaign and a factor in the consummation of the enlarged Jewish Agency, will not accept any post in the coming Zionist administration and will carry out his intention of resigning in order to devote himself to his personal affairs. This was made known in a letter sent by Mr. Rothenberg to Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization.

The text of Mr. Rothenberg's letter follows:

Dear Mr. Lipsky:

You will no doubt recall that last summer in Zurich I told you that my personal interests required that I reduce the large demands made upon my time by Zionist and other Jewish activities in which I have been engaged as a volunteer worker during many years, and since my labors in connection with the formation of the enlarged Jewish Agency, a subject in which I was deeply interested, had come to a close, it was my intention to withdraw from the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, upon my return to the United States.

The many serious problems, however, which confronted the Zionist Organization following the tragic events in Palestine of last August, the organization of the Allied Jewish Campaign and the responsibilities which were placed upon me in connection therewith, the liquidation of the affairs of the United Palestine Appeal, the added responsibilities which fell to me as a result of your several visits to Europe since our return from the

Central Rabbis' Conference to Take Steps to Fight Bible Reading in Public Schools

Providence, June 26—The Central Conference of American Rabbis today transferred its proceedings to Newport where the delegates to the 44th annual convention visited Touro Synagogue, the oldest in the country, for services. The invocation was delivered by Rabbi Seidell and addresses were made by President David Lefkowitz, Mayor Sullivan and Judge Levy of Newport. Rabbi Louis Wolsey of Philadelphia today presented the final draft of the new Union Hymnal for revisions.

Measures to fight compulsory reading of the Bible in the public schools and to combat the introduction of religious education and other sectarian activities in the tax-supported schools were taken by the Conference following the reading of the report of the committee on Church and State by Rabbi Edward N. Calisch of Richmond.

Rabbi Calisch's report told of the defeated attempt to introduce Bible reading in the Memphis schools, the New Jersey bill to allow school time off for religious instruction, the frustrated plan to show the Passion Play in Louisville and in a tax-supported building in San Francisco, in all of which the Conference was concerned. Instances of attempts at Bible reading in the schools of other sections were also cited.

Recommends Test Case

The committee headed by Rabbi Calisch commended the Jewish school rights in Montreal, cited New Orleans as an example of the complete separation of church and state and recommended that "a special committee be appointed to collate arguments, decisions, both in state and Federal courts, con-

cerning the Bible reading question and to prepare an elaborate pamphlet to be printed in large numbers whenever the occasion may arise for its use." The necessity of a test case in the United States Supreme Court to decide the issue permanently was also stressed.

Rabbi Solomon Foster praised the work and purposes of the Synagogue Council of America. He described the five-year old organization as a promising and progressive Jewish institution fulfilling the practical need of establishing good-will among different Jewish groups. Rabbi Foster said that the Reform group recognizes other groups.

In his report on the Conference's co-operation with international and national organizations, Rabbi David Lefkowitz, president of the Conference, said that the Conference was represented at the tenth anniversary celebration of the League of Nations, that it had joined the League for the Fixity of the Sabbath and the World Union for Progressive Judaism.

Religion Needed in Colleges

Rabbi Leo Franklin of Detroit saw an increased enrollment of Jews in the colleges and stressed the need for religious education in the universities. He said that the Hillel Foundations were social in purpose and the Menorah societies put slight emphasis on religious life. Rabbi David Bookstaber of Harrisburg advised working through the Jewish fraternities while Rabbi Marvin Nathan of Philadelphia saw a practical plan in separate trained representatives in the colleges with a definite program of action.

The committee on social justice emphasized the importance of intelligent birth regulation in its report but Rabbi Foster attacked the subject as of dubious significance while Rabbi James Heller said there was no more concrete problem at present. It was decided to discontinue the "Union Tidings" magazine. Rabbi Felix Levy of Chicago, advised action regarding the Polish and Russian situations and urged the naturalization of foreign-born Jews immediately.

London Delegates Named

The thirteen delegates, of the nineteen allowed to the central conference by the World Union for Progressive Judaism, who have already been assigned to the London gathering, are: Rabbi Martin Zielonka, El Paso, Tex.; Rabbi Nathan Stern, New York City; Rabbi H. Kahn, Lexington, Ky.; Rabbi Ferdinand Isserman, St. Louis, and Dr. Lefkowitz.

Court Dismisses Suit Against School Bible Reading Here

The suit brought by Joseph Lewis, president of the Free Thinkers Society, to restrain the New York City Board of Education from permitting the reading of the Bible and the singing of hymns in the public schools, on the ground that they violate State and Federal constitutional provisions with regard to religious freedom, was dismissed on Wednesday by Supreme Court Justice Ford without an opinion.

The reading of the Bible has been authorized under a provision of the City charter which has been in existence for seventy-nine years, counsel of the Board of Education argued before the court. They also declared that school principals are allowed to choose the passages to be read, while pupils who object to the reading may be excused. Consequently, they argued, the reading of the Bible in the schools is no interference with religious liberty.

Magistrate Rayfel Promoted To Court of Special Sessions

Magistrate Hyman Rayfel of Brooklyn is one of the two city magistrates whom Mayor Walker yesterday promoted to the Court of Special Sessions to fill one of the three justiceships created by the New York City Board of Estimate a few weeks ago. Magistrate Rayfel, who was appointed to his present post in 1915, has less than a year left of his term.

Judge Rayfel has been one of the pioneers and leaders of the Brownsville and East New York community. His appointment to the Court of Special Sessions marks the first appointment of a Jew from Brooklyn to this court.

Rabbi's Attitude to Jewish Flag May Affect Chances as Coast B'nai B'rith President

Seattle, Wash., June 26—A resolution of protest against the attitude towards the Jewish flag displayed recently by the incoming Grand President of District No. 4, B'nai B'rith, Rabbi Samuel Koch of this city, has been sent by Bellingham Lodge, No. 756 to the General Committee of District No. 4 and to all the Pacific Coast Jewish papers and the B'nai B'rith magazine. It will undoubtedly be considered at the convention of District No. 4 which will take place at San Diego, Cal., tomorrow.

Rabbi Koch Censured

In the resolution Rabbi Koch is censured for having objected, at an open meeting of the Seattle Lodge in February to having the Jewish national emblem, the Mogen David on the Blue and White background, hanging beside the American flag at a meeting of the B'nai B'rith. The meeting taking place in the month of the birthdays of Lincoln and Washington, Rabbi Koch was to speak on Americanism. He stated that the two flags hanging there were at variance with his subject, standing as they did for a double allegiance; that the B'nai B'rith had always respected the personal sentiments of their members whether they were in the minority or majority, and that since some of them did not believe in a national homeland in Palestine, the flag of Zionism had no place at a B'nai B'rith meeting.

"In a front page editorial, entitled "Look Before You Leap," the "Jewish Transcript" of this city comments as follows on the resolution censuring Rabbi Koch.

May Cause Defeat

"If the matter is brought before the Grand Lodge it is possible by reason of the strong Zionist tendencies of the great bulk of delegates that it might lead to the defeat of Rabbi Koch as candidate for Grand President of the District. A defeat of Rabbi Koch at this time would not be a defeat for Rabbi Koch personally, but a defeat for Washington Jewry."

Union Yiddish Actors Barred from Appearing in "Talkies"

A resolution prohibiting members of the Yiddish Actors' Union from appearing in Yiddish talkies was adopted by a large majority at a meeting of the Union. It was stated that the Yiddish talkies which have been produced up to now are of a sort to injure the reputation of the Yiddish theatre. Besides, it was said at the meeting, the company which produces the Yiddish talkies hires non-union actors without any theatrical experience.

Reuben Guskin, manager of the Yiddish Actors' Union, pointed out that the Yiddish talkies are not being shown in non-Jewish neighborhoods, but only in such neighborhoods where there are Yiddish theatres.
